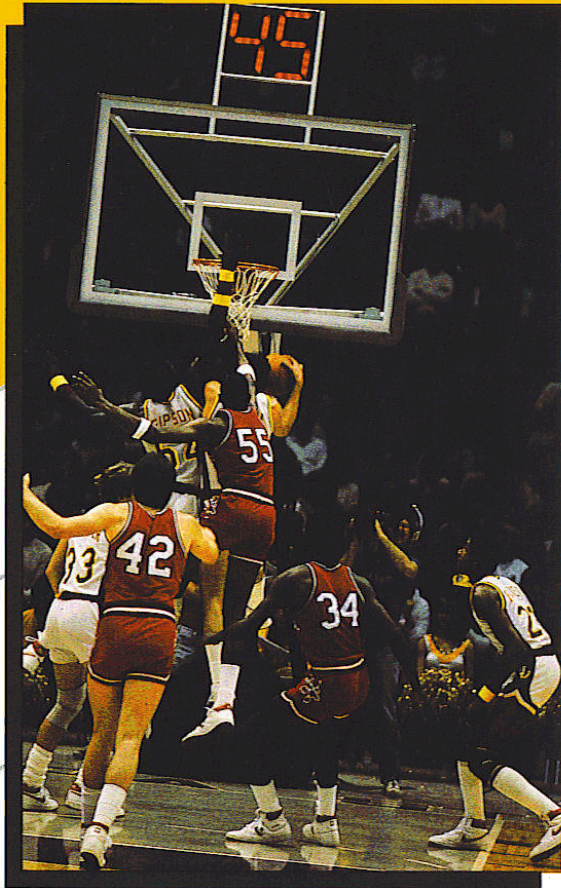
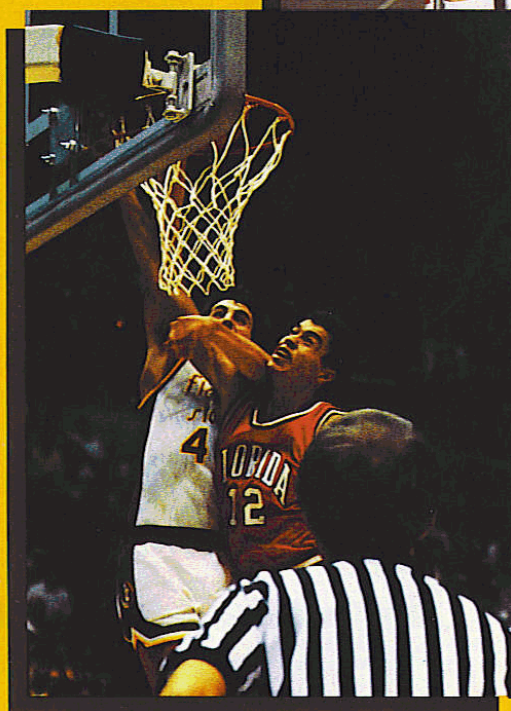


THIS IS FSU BASKETBALL

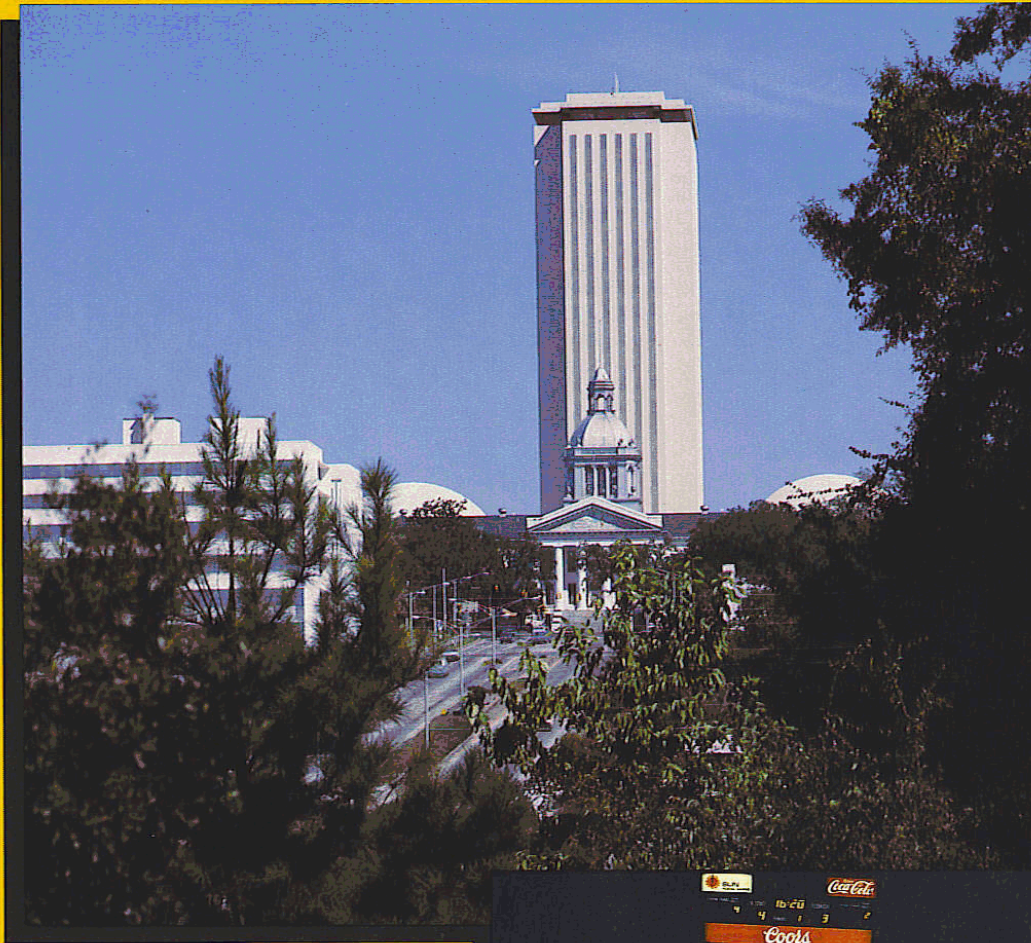
