97 SEMINOLE BASKETBALL

he 1995-96 season began with hope and promise for Florida State. Returning all but two players from the previous year, the Seminoles sported a young but experienced roster. For the fourth time in the last three years head coach Pat Kennedy had to replace a first-round NBA selection.

FSU returned three starters and looked to the talented duo of James Collins and Corey Louis to fill the void left by the departure of Bobby Sura, the school's all-time scoring leader. They were joined by point guard LaMarr Greer, who returned for his sophomore year after starting 24 games as a freshman. Collins and Louis were both tabbed to preseason All-ACC squads and, with five other returnees, formed the team's nucleus.

Unfortunately, the Seminoles were soon to discover an underlying theme to the season — distractions. Before preseason drills started, the team learned they would be without the services of junior forward Derrick Carroll, who was dismissed from the program. Tim Wooden, one of two seniors, would not be available until after the fall semester due to suspension. Prior to FSU's first exhibition game it was announced that Corey Louis had been suspended for both preseason contests. His suspension was later expanded to include the first two regular season games.

The Seminoles proved resilient, winning their first three games before suffering a heartbreaking setback at Tulane when Jarold Huneycutt's desperation three-pointer at the buzzer gave the Green Wave a one-point victory. Florida State headed into a mid-December matchup with No. 8 Connecticut before a national television audience poised to re-establish the program among the nation's elite.

But a player suspension and a mid-week game during final exams proved to be insurmountable obstacles as the Seminoles were beaten 79-61 by UConn. The Tribe's starting five combined to make 8 of 43 field goal attempts in the game as FSU shot a season-low 27.1 percent.

Florida State rebounded nicely, compiling a four-game win streak heading to Virginia for its ACC opener. Believed to have one of the more talented teams in the league, the Seminoles raised some eyebrows with a 69-64 victory over the Cavaliers. The win pushed the Tribe's unbeaten streak to a season-long five games. James Collins also became the 30th player in FSU history to eclipse the 1,000 point plateau during the game.

The Seminoles brought a 9-2 overall record home for a tilt with 11th ranked Wake Forest and a chance to jump out to a 2-0 league mark. Florida State appeared poised for the upset with the return of freshman Randell Jackson, who had missed three games due to a concussion sustained in the team's first practice back after Christmas. In one of the programs best comebacks ever, the Seminoles overcame a 19-point second half deficit in forcing their only overtime game of the year. The Tribe's rally fell short as Tim Duncan swatted away LaMarr Greer's last second shot to preserve a 75-73 Demon Deacon victory.

Duncan's block and the overtime loss to Wake Forest had a perverse effect on the Seminoles, who dropped seven of their next eight. LaMarr Greer was unable to shake off the side effects for nearly a month as he went from averaging 11.3 points through the first 11 games to 4.0 over the next five.

Pat Kennedy looked for solutions to the Seminoles' tailspin. Mired in a season-long five game winless streak, the Tribe looked for answers by starting six different lineups in as many games. Offensive production became a major concern. In three straight losses FSU endured prolonged periods without scoring. Duke turned a halftime nail biter into a rout by holding the Tribe scoreless for 6:00. Florida State never recovered from a 7:13 stint between points against North Carolina, enabling

the Tar Heels to cruise to an 82-71 victory. The Seminoles then spotted Georgia Tech 14 points before scoring their first points 6:58 into the contest.

The Seminoles had a week off to regroup following the Georgia Tech game in preparation for a rematch with Virginia. FSU looked uninspired against the Cavaliers, shooting below 38 percent for the third straight contest and being held under 60 points for the second consecutive game. With an eight-point performance against the Cavaliers, James Collins' 49-game double-figure scoring streak, the longest among active ACC players, came to a halt.

Six proved to be a charm for Florida State. Starting its sixth different lineup in as many games the Seminoles snapped their five-game losing skid with an impressive 100-78 win

Carolina, winning for only the second time ever in Chapel Hill.

Pat Kennedy announced prior to the Georgia Tech game that if the Seminoles were going to mount a win streak prior to the ACC Tournament, they would have to do it without the services of Corey Louis, who would be suspended for the final two regular season games. The team's hopes were quickly dashed when, for the first time in a year, Florida State lost a game when shooting over 50 percent from the floor in an 83-63 setback to Georgia Tech.

After a loss to Maryland in its conference finale, FSU headed into its opening round match up at the ACC Tournament pitted against No. 9 seed N.C. State. Participating in the "play-in" game for the first time in five years of ACC competition, the Seminoles were hoping to snap a four-game conference tournament losing streak. However, in its most uninspired performance of the season, Florida State did not score its first points until the 14:11 mark and was never able to rebound from a 19-0 deficit.

n the 1995-96 Season, Kennedy once again had to replace a first-round NBA selection, the fourth time in only three years. All-time Seminole career leading scorer Bob Sura's shoes would prove hard to fill.

LaMarr Greer (top) began the season at point guard and shared time through the season with senior Scott Shepherd.

Leading the squad in field goal percentage was Kirk Luchman (above). Luchman's 62.6 percent accuracy rating for the season ranks sixth on FSU's all-time single-season list.

over Maryland. Behind a 65-point second half outburst, equalling its best-ever point production in a half during an ACC contest, the Tribe reached the century mark for the first time in over a year. The game also featured 54 points from the guard trio of LaMarr Greer, Scott Shepherd and Geoff Brower, the highest output by a guard trio since 1994.

Behind a trapping, pressing defense Florida State forced 25 N.C. State turnovers in pushing its win streak to two. Heading into the final five games of the ACC schedule the 4-7 Seminoles went to Clemson looking to move up in the conference standings. But its third sub-60-point effort of the year, equalling FSU's total for its first four years in the league, spelled doom for Florida State in a 67-59 defeat

In an unprecedented move, the Seminoles would be without their head coach when they hosted Duke. Because of his actions following his second technical foul and subsequent ejection at Clemson, Pat Kennedy was suspended for one game by athletic director Dave Hart. FSU's 93-87 loss to the Blue Devils marked the first time in three years the Tribe lost when scoring over 80 points, accumulating a 20-0 record during that span.

With three games remaining and the conference tournament around the corner FSU needed to run the table to avoid the ACC's 8 vs. 9 opening round game. The Seminoles took a huge step toward avoiding the "play-in" game with an 84-80 triumph over North

With a 13-14 overall record the Seminoles became the first team in 26 years to compile three straight sub-.500 finishes. Florida State finished its fifth season in the ACC by tying its worst conference record with a second straight 5-11 mark.


Rebounding proved to be key to FSU's fortunes in conference play. The Seminoles were out-rebounded in 13 of 16 ACC games. Florida State's rebound margin of

-4.8 was the lowest in the league. Consistent offense also proved to be a treasured commodity as the Seminoles were outscored 301-35 in 14 conference games when going more than three minutes between field goals. Point guard play was

another of Florida State's inconsistencies. FSU point guards accounted for 18.8 percent of the team's points and 93 turnovers.

Sophomore Corey Louis was never able to get on track. Coming off a stellar freshman campaign that earned him ACC All-Freshman team honors, Louis was never able to recapture the form that saw him average 11.2 points, 7.6 rebounds and 2.7 blocks per ACC contest during his first year. He endured a pair of suspen-

sions during his sophomore season and ended the year averaging 9.3 points, 6.5 rebounds and 1.9 blocks per game.

James Collins once again proved to be the Seminoles' offensive workhorse. Collins posted team-high scoring figures 19 times, including 12 league games, in being named third team All-ACC. He finished his junior year 17th on FSU's all-time scoring list (1,279), eighth in career steals (136), third for three-pointers made (180) and

performances, missing only one field goal in 17 attempts

Sophomore guard Avery Curry could not find his shooting stroke and was taken out of the starting lineup. He went from averaging 29.6 minutes a game in the first 18 games, to 7.0 over the last nine. His .346 shooting per

Senior guard Scott Shepherd's playing time increased significantly over the last nine games. Coming off the bench to share point guard duties with LaMarr Greer, Shepherd gave the Seminoles a longrange threat. He went seven games in the middle of the season without committing a turnover. Shepherd netted a career-high 21 points in FSU's win over Maryland and put together a three-game double-figure scoring streak for the first time in his career.

During the year the Seminoles showed flashes of brilliance. Unfortunately, the flashes were sporadic as the team was unable to play all aspects of the game consistently.

n 80-56 vvin over Maryland-Baltimore County in December chalked up a milestone for Pat Kennedy's coaching career, providing his 300th win. The victory made the 43-year-old coach one of the youngest to reach the 300 mark.

Another source of optimism was provided by the aggressive play of freshman guard Geoff Brower (above). Inserted in the starting lineup in February, Brower scored 17 points in each of his first two starts.

second for three-point attempts (473). Collins once again placed among the league's top scorers with an 18.3 points per game average.

The Seminoles proved unbeatable when taking a lead into a game's final minutes. FSU went 13-0 when leading with 5:00 left.

Head Coach Pat Kennedy chalked up a personal milestone with his 300th career victory on December 28th, with an 80-56 win over Maryland-Baltimore County. Just 43 years of age at the time, Kennedy is one of the youngest coaches in history to register 300 career wins.

A pair of freshman emerged as bright spots and proved themselves capable of playing in the ACC. Randell Jackson finished the year as the Seminoles second leading scorer (9.5 ppg) and third leading rebounder (5.3 rpg). He showed himself to be a threat at both ends of the floor finishing among the conference leaders in blocked shots. After being inserted into the starting lineup in early February, Geoff Brower proved himself deserving with a pair of 17-point performances in his first two starts. The redshirt freshman posted his third 17-point effort of the year on the strength of 5-for-5 shooting from three-point range in a win at North Carolina.

The Seminoles field goal percentage leader, Kirk Luchman, had an up and down year offensively. His 62.6 percent accuracy from the floor ranked fifth best on FSU's single season list. However, he went 80:26 between field goals in ACC play, but came on strong at season's end with four straight double-figure


"I think we as a coaching staff, and the players, have got to take responsibility in saying this is a disappointing season," commented Kennedy. "But I think there is a tremendous amount of encouragement. I think the program is really on track.

"I think the biggest thing our teams have lacked the last couple years is identity. But this team had chemistry. The main difference in this team and the last few is this team worked its butt off and was a joy to coach."

The Seminoles dedicated their 1995-96 season to Aubry Boyd who played at FSU from 1987-91. The team wore "AB" patches in Boyd's honor after he was paralyzed playing a game of pick-up football in October. Boyd was the first recruit signed by Pat Kennedy at Florida State and served as the team's captain his senior year.



James Collins made four three-pointers in the second half and scored 23 points as Florida State handed 19th-ranked Clemson its second straight defeat, 75-62. Collins sank three straight long-range bombs after Clemson had pulled to 49-45 with a 19-8 run to start the second half. Avery Curry scored seven points in the final minute of the first half when the Seminoles opened a 41-26 lead at the break. Curry was the only other Seminole in double figures with 16 points, 12 in the opening half. Clemson lost its second straight game after an 11-0 start. FSU made 10 of 20 threes and shot 61.4 percent from the field. Collins, who was 5 of 8 on three-pointers, also had six assists, six rebounds and three steals. Clemson, which opened the game with four freshmen and a sophomore in its lineup, shot 46.3 percent.



Virginia dominated the boards in the second half by a 20-11 margin and shot 55.6 percent for the half while FSU hit just 37.5 percent for the game, its highest mark in its last three games.



WAKE FOREST Demon Deucons

Rusty LaRue powered a second-half run that sent No. 9 Wake Forest to an 81-67 victory over Florida State in Winston-Salem. LaRue hit 6 of three-point attempts and scored a career-high 22 points. The Deacons made 32 free throws, six more than their previous season high, and 11 three-pointers, one short of their season-high. Wake Forest extended its school-record home winning streak to 17. Florida State used a variety of defenses and a frequent-foul strategy to harass Tim Duncan into 1 for 4 field goal shooting and five turnovers. But Duncan, whose lone basket came with 3:45 left, sank 15 of 16 free throws and finished with 17 points and seven rebounds. Wake Forest hit 22 consecutive free throws and wound up with a 32 of 39 performance from the line to give the Seminoles their fifth loss in a row. Florida State trailed by 12 early in the second half before going on a 10-0 run. Geoff Brower, making his first career start, scored five points and James Collins, who led the Seminoles with 19 points, had the other five, including a dunk that cut Florida State's deficit to 45-42 with 15:39 remaining. LaRue took over at that point by scoring the next eight points, starting a 15-3 run that propelled Wake Forest to a 60-45 advantage at the 9:24 mark

MARYLAND Terrapins

Duke used a 21-8 run to start the second half and held on for a 93-87 win over Florida State at the Leon County Civic Center. FSU played without head coach Pat Kennedy. Serving a one-game suspension for being ejected in a loss at Clemson, Kennedy watched the game on television in his office. Assistant coach Tom Carlson took over for Kennedy but he could not find the defense to stop Duke's long-range trio of Chris Collins, Ricky Price and Jeff Capel. Those three made 14 three-pointers and hit the key baskets to kill FSU rallies in the second half. Collins made seven shots from behind the arc, a career-high, and led all scorers with 27 points. The Seminoles matched Duke shot for shot in the first half and held a 40-39 halftime lead. FSU got to within two twice in the second half, but their 45-31 rebounding disadvantage provided Duke center Greg Newton several second-chance opportunities. He finished with 10 points and 16 rebounds. For Florida State, James Collins had a team-high 20 points and was one of four Seminoles to tally double digits.

NORTH CAROLINA Car Heels

James Collins scored 27 points as Florida State all but ended North Carolina's hopes of winning the ACC regular season title, dumping the 17th-ranked Tar Heels 84-80 in Chapel Hill. The eighth-place Seminoles broke a nine-game losing streak against the Tar Heels, who uncharacteristically lost three of their four last league games at home. The Seminoles last beat North Carolina in the 1991-92 season when they swept the season series in their first year in the conference. Florida State won with clutch three-point shooting from Collins and freshman Geoff Brower, who tied a career-high with 17 points, and a pesky zone defense that forced the Tar Heels into a 3 for 18 shooting slump down the stretch. Collins and Brower combined to make 10 of 12 treys and the Seminoles tied a season-high with 11 of 17 from long range. North Carolina made four straight threes in the final 26.2 seconds to make the score close. Florida State had entered the game 3-19 all-time against the Tar Heels and 2-18 in its last 20 games against ranked teams.

GEORGIA TECH Yellow Jackets

Matt Harpring scored 22 points to lead No. 18 Georgia Tech to an 83-68 victory over Florida State to clinch the Atlantic Coast Conference regular season title. Drew Barry and Eddie Elisma had 16 points each as Tech had little trouble handling the Seminoles in setting a school record for conference victories. The win, the Yellow Jackets' sixth straight, also made Bobby Cremins the winningest coach in Georgia Tech history with a 293-170 record. With Corey Louis on the bench in street clothes serving a two-game suspension, FSU was outrebounded 35-29 as the Jackets used their advantage in the paint for second and third shots. Despite a 41-30 halftime deficit, FSU had two good chances to challenge for the lead in the second half. Twice they cut the lead to less than six, including 60-56 with 7:41 to play. But Barry squashed both rallies with three-pointers. Tech put the game out of reach as FSU scored only two more points over the next 6:23. James Collins led the Seminoles with 14 points and Kirk Luchman added 12.

Freshman Laron Profit scored 22 points to lead Maryland to an 88-78 win over Florida State in the ACC's regular season finale. The game was a make-up of the January 9th contest that was postponed due to snow and ice. Keith Booth just missed a third consecutive double-double with 19 points and nine rebounds for Maryland. Profit hit a pair of three-pointers and had several slashing drives to score the most points by a Maryland freshman since Joe Smith had 24 against Loyola in 1994. Profit was 8 of 9 from the field and also had five rebounds and three steals. Duane Simpkins added 20 points for the Terrapins in his final home game. Johnny Rhodes had 13 for the Terps. Kirk Luchman hit three straight baskets as Florida State started the second half with a 21-6 run to take its largest lead at 55-48 with 12:57 remaining. Profit was the catalyst, however, as Maryland responded with 10 straight points to regain the lead. Profit capped the run with two free throws and a three-pointer that put the Terrapins ahead 60-57 with 11:20 remaining. FSU played without starting center Corey Louis, who was serving the second game of a two-game suspension. James Collins led three Seminoles in double figures with 17 points, despite shooting 3 for 13 from the field.

N.C. STATE Wolfpack

Eighth seeded Florida State opened the 43rd annual Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament with an 80-65 loss to last-place N.C. State at the Greensboro Coliseum. With the loss, FSU climaxed its third straight losing season. Danny Strong scored 10 of N.C. State's points during a 19-0 run in the game's first 4:37. Not even a 16-minute delay for a shot clock malfunction less than two minutes into the game could derail the Wolfpack, which hit seven of their first eight shots, including five consecutive three-pointers. The Seminoles, who missed their first 10 shots, have lost five consecutive ACC postseason games and have not advanced past the quarterfinals in four seasons. The Wolfpack lead reached 23 points with 7:02 to play before intermission after an 11-4 run. N.C. State's barrage was accomplished without ACC scoring leader Todd Fuller taking a shot. The Seminoles, led by James Collins' 11 points, cut the margin to 14 at intermission despite shooting 29.4 percent and piling up 16 team fouls, including three each on Corey Louis and Kirk Luchman. Luchman managed only seven minutes in the first half, and Louis, coming off a two-game suspension, played 11 and fouled out with 9:08 remaining after scoring four points. Luchman, one of four Seminoles to foul out, left with his fifth foul less than four minutes later. The two teams combined to commit 59 fouls.
