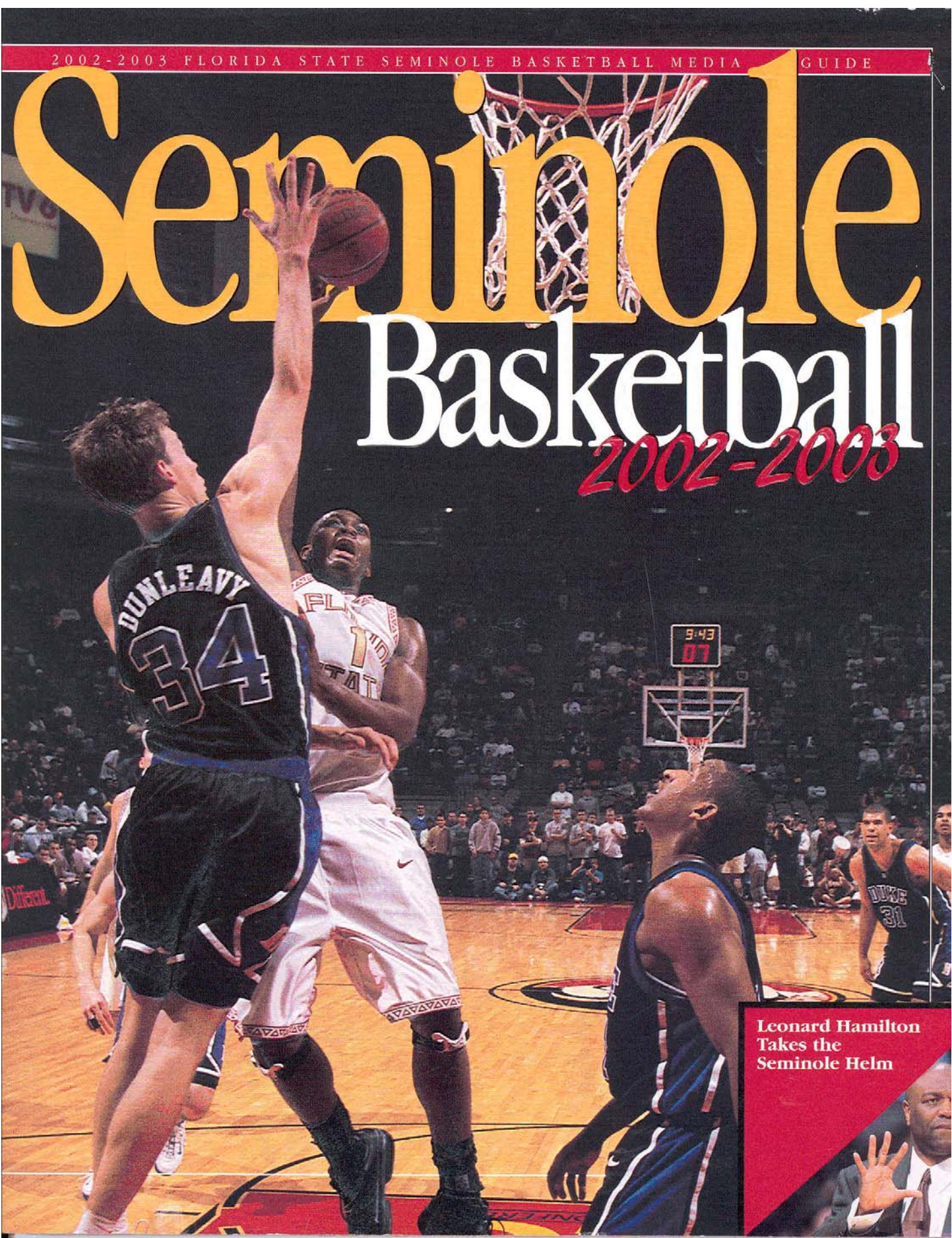


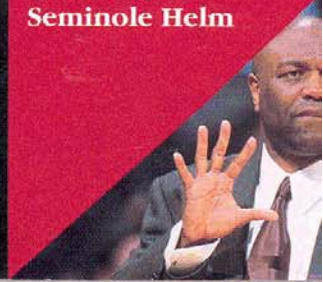

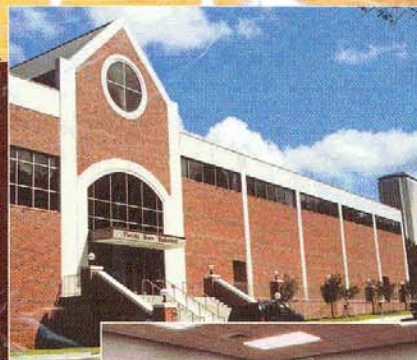


Our past, present and future basketball players will feel very proud as they walk through the new facilities. What they will see is a very positive message about Florida State basketball.

Florida State's locker room consists of four rooms: a player lounge, study room, locker room and showers.

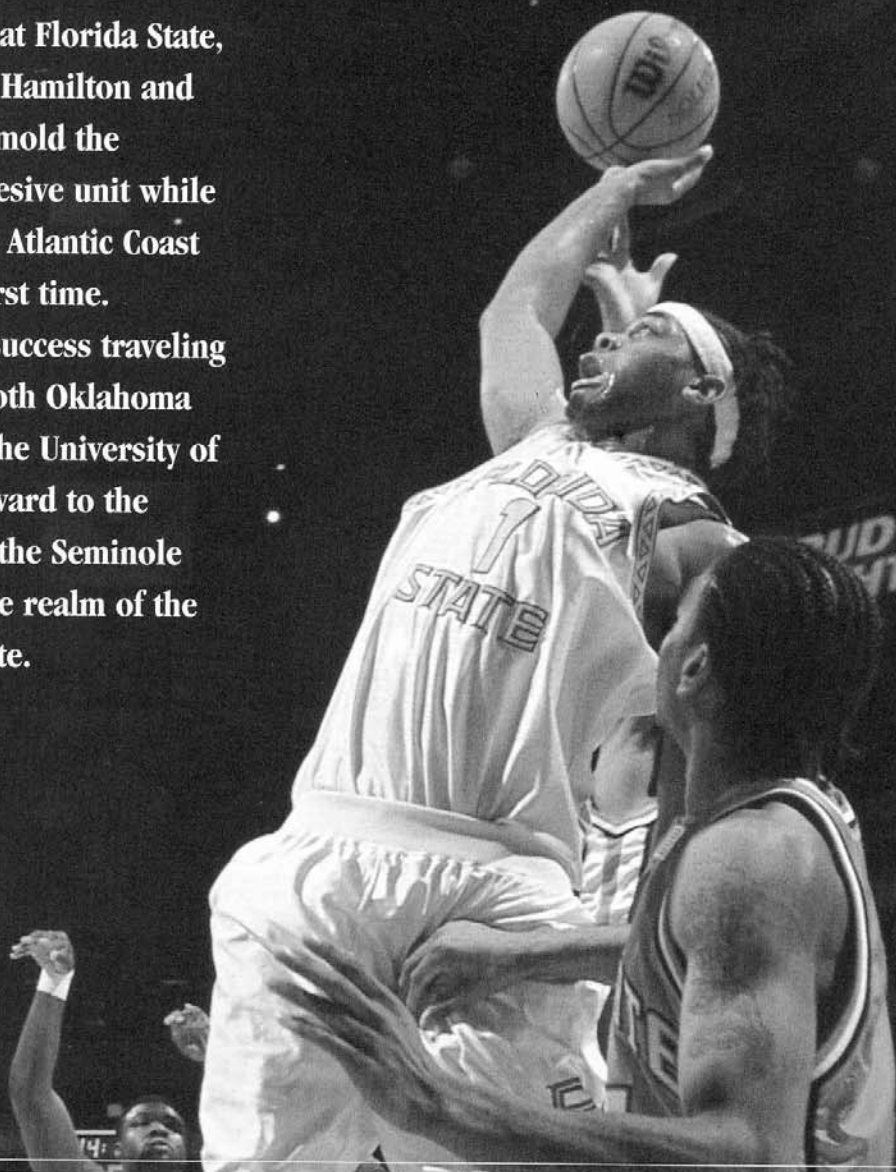

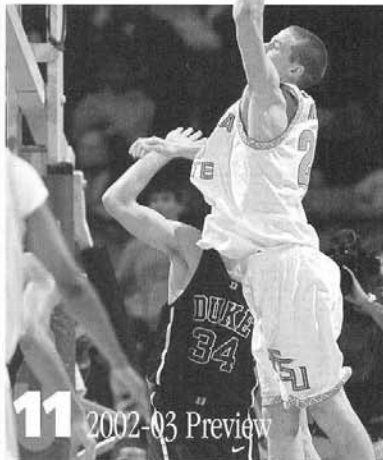

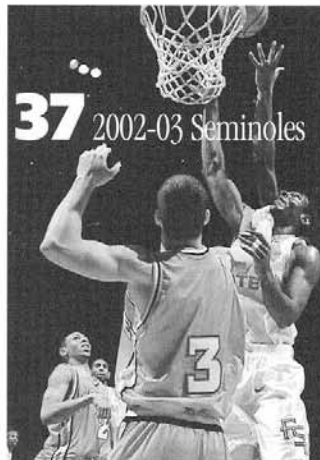

Covering The 2002-2003 Seminoles

Leonard Hamilton and the Florida State men's basketball program would like to welcome you to Florida State. Coach Hamilton, his staff and players are eager to display their talents and talk with you as the first season of the Hamilton era in Tallahassee takes flight. The members of the Seminole men's basketball program thank you for your interest and are here to help you in any way possible.

This media guide has been prepared as a source of information for the news media and Seminole fans. Additional information, including press releases, photographs, video footage and clips are available upon request to all members of the media. Any questions not covered in this publication may be directed to the Florida State Sports Information Office.

BEFORE YOUR VISIT

Game credentials are issued to accredited members of the media only. Working space along press row at the Civic Center is limited and seats are expressly reserved to those working on deadline, with no exceptions. Children and other non-workers are not allowed in the press area. Credentials should be ordered at least one week prior to each game and are issued through the Sports Information Office. Requests for credentials should be made in writing on letterhead stationery to Chuck Walsh, associate director of sports information. If it is convenient to FAX your request, you are welcome to do so. The FAX number in the Sports Information office is (850) 644-3820. If you would rather e-mail your request, please do so. The e-mail address is cwalsh@mailers.fsu.edu. These requests are accepted from sports editors and sports directors only. Credential requests are carefully screened to insure proper working conditions in the press area. When time permits, a working press pass and a parking pass will be mailed. When mailing is not possible, they will be left at the Press Will Call entrance near the bottom level at the southwest corner of the arena.

PHOTOGRAPHY CREDENTIALS

Photographers, too, should make their credential requests at least one week in advance. Strobe lights may be installed in the Civic Center arrangements must be made through the Civic Center at least two weeks prior to gameday. Space for strobe lights is available on a first come, first served basis. Arrangements may be made by calling Roger Englert at (850) 487-1691.

The NCAA has an established policy to control congestion within photography areas on the basketball court. Only photographers on assignment will be issued photo passes along with members of the working television media. Admission to the court and photo boxes is by photo pass only. Photographers, both still and electronic, must shoot from the baselines at the Northwest (visiting bench press row side) or Southeast (Florida State bench) corners of the court. Photographer's floor access is governed by Atlantic Coast Conference and NCAA policy. Please note, only game photographers, no runners, assistants, or producers will have access to the photography areas. Photographer positions are at the complete discretion of the basketball game officials and the Sports Information office at ALL TIMES.

MEDIA SERVICES

Weekly Interview Schedule: The Sports Information office will, in conjunction with head coach Leonard Hamilton, establish a weekly interview schedule throughout the 2002-03 season. The schedule, which will vary in accordance with the Seminoles'

practice and game schedule, is established to assist the media in their coverage of the Seminoles. The interviews will take place in the Florida State Basketball Training Center and will provide the media with an opportunity to speak with coach Hamilton as well as various Seminole players. Media requests for specific players to be made available should be made to basketball sports information director Chuck Walsh.

Seminole players will also be made available for interviews with accredited members of the media throughout the season. All interview requests must be made in advance and must be made with at least a 24 hours notice. Player's individual phone numbers will not be given to the media and game day interviews will not be granted until the end of each game. Players will return phone calls at a mutually convenient day and time.

ACC COACHES' TELECONFERENCE

Media members wishing to speak with head coach Leonard Hamilton are encouraged to call the Atlantic Coast Conference's weekly teleconference. The nine ACC coaches will be featured each Tuesday from 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. beginning Tuesday, Jan. 7 and concluding March 4.

Each coach will be available for comments and to field questions for 10 minutes beginning with Wake Forest head coach Skip Prosser and continuing in alphabetical order by school. Leonard Hamilton is available from 12:00-12:10. The weekly press conference can be accessed by calling (913) 981-5507.

Florida State practices are generally closed. However, a select number of practices will be open to the media. Please contact Chuck Walsh for a schedule of open practices and give advance notice that you will attend.

GAME DAY SERVICE

Parking: A limited number of spaces in the Leon County Civic Center's main parking lot have been set aside for media use. Vehicles should enter the Civic Center lot from Pensacola Street. They will then be directed to the appropriate area. All requests for parking passes should be made along with requests for press credentials.

Entrance/Media Will Call: Media should enter the Civic Center through the elephant doors at the bottom level of the southwest corner of the arena. Media Will Call is located at this entrance and is open 90 minutes prior to tip-off.

Media Room: The media room at the Civic Center is located beneath the west side of the arena in Meeting Room B.

Press Seating: Press seating is located on the court across from both team benches. The area is manned by members of the Sports Information Office throughout every game. The sports information staff desires to be as helpful as possible during each game.

Phones: A limited number of phones are available in the Civic Center press room (calling card or reversed charges required). Members of the media may order their own phone lines for the media room or at courtside through Sprint of Tallahassee. Call Sprint at (866) 366-2500 to arrange for service.

Visiting Radio: Phone lines are reversed for both the Florida State and visiting radio network on the court level of press row. The broadcast rights to the game are granted to visiting radio stations on a reciprocal basis. Phone lines are available through an ACC agreement. Please contact Chuck Walsh of the Sports Information office for the details.

Press Meals: A buffet dinner is available in the Seminole Spirit Room to members of the media with a meal ticket attached to their credential. Television crews will be provided with meal tickets to accommodate talent and producers. Any catering needs for television crews should be addressed to Roger Englert of the Civic Center (850) 487-1691.

Postgame Press Conference: Postgame interviews with the respective head coaches are held in the media room at the conclusion of the game. The head coach of the winning team

will be brought to the interview room immediately after the game. He will be followed by the losing coach. The Florida State locker room is open to credentialed media for a brief period after Coach Hamilton concludes his comments to the media. This is in accordance with ACC rules. The visiting team's locker room access policy is determined by officials of that school.

Postgame Statistics: Statistical packets including running play-by-play, first half and final box scores and postgame quotes, are compiled and available to the media at press row and in the press room following each game.

Faxing: Faxing of the final box score is available through the final Florida State Sports Information Office. The Sports Information office will fax to outlets provided on both school's postgame fax lists. If any special needs arise, please contact a member of the Florida State Sports Information staff.

E-mail Services: Basketball releases can be obtained electronically by contacting Chuck Walsh at cwalsh@mailersfsu.edu. List basketball news on the subject heading, and include the name of your media outlet and phone number in your message. (This is a media service only.)

Seminole Radio Network

The Florida State Radio Network brings Seminole fans closer to the action whenever the Seminole men's basketball team takes to the court.

Florida State fans throughout the Southeast can listen to every slam-dunk of head coach Leonard Hamilton's first season on the Seminole Radio Network. The regional network brings the excitement of Florida State basketball, including pre-game and postgame analysis to alumni, fans and basketball enthusiasts across the state.

The Seminole Radio Network is owned and operated by Host Communications Inc., one of the nation's leaders in collegiate sports broadcasting. Florida State joined forces with the Lexington, Ky., based company to establish a comprehensive marketing opportunity that includes radio, television, print and corporate sponsorship components. Host Communications printed the 2002-03 Florida State men's basketball media guide.

In addition to Florida State, Host owns the network rights of other outstanding schools including Texas, Kentucky, Notre Dame, Tennessee, South Carolina and Mississippi State, to name a few.

The Seminole basketball network will reach more than 30 markets during the 2002-03 season, including some of the nation's largest markets with Tampa, Jacksonville and Orlando, among others, all receiving the Seminoles' basketball broadcasts this season. In Tallahassee, the Seminoles are heard on flagship stations WTNT-FM (94.9) and WFLA-AM (1270).

In addition to all of Florida State's games, the Leonard Hamilton Seminole Basketball report can be heard three times daily on WTNT and WFLA. Hamilton's call-in show can be heard in most markets weekly (usually Thursday) from 7 to 8 p.m. during the season.



Gene Deckerhoff Florida State's broadcast crew is annually recognized as one of the nation's best as they provide insight and entertainment as well as detailed and expert play-by-play.

The broadcast team features award-winning play-by-play commentator Gene Deckerhoff, a 28-year veteran of the Florida State radio network and Keith Jones, who is in his third year as a member of the team.

Deckerhoff is nationally known as one of the finest football and basketball announcers in both collegiate and professional sports. He has been known as the voice of the Seminoles for the past 23 football seasons and the past 28 basketball seasons. A native of Jacksonville, Fla., Deckerhoff also handles the play-by-play duties of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers of the NFL, which makes for some busy weekends during the fall and winter.

ESPN and ABC basketball analyst Dick Vitale recently mentioned Deckerhoff as one of the top college basketball play-by-play voices. Vitale named Deckerhoff to his "All-Cawood Ledford" team, in honor of the legendary Kentucky broadcaster, as the best basketball announcers in his opinion.

Deckerhoff is also the host of the Leonard Hamilton/Seminole Basketball Highlight Show and the Bobby Bowden Football Show. He runs Gene Deckerhoff productions, a firm specializing in sports broadcasting and the production of radio and television commercials.

Keith Jones, a former Seminole football player, is the color analyst for the basketball broadcasts. He is in his third season as a member of the basketball broadcast crew. Jones is also a broadcaster for Sunshine Network's college football coverage.

Jones, 43, was a member of Bobby Bowden's first recruiting class in 1977. As a senior at Wildwood (Fla.) High School, he was named an all-state quarterback and the salutatorian of his graduating class. He was a three-year starter at strong safety and a three-time Golden Chief award winner for the Seminoles. Jones still ranks in the top-10 in career interceptions and led the Seminole defense in interceptions in 1978 and 1980. During his career, Florida State compiled a four-year record of 39-8 and appeared in three consecutive bowl games, including consecutive Orange Bowls.

Jones was Florida State's first ever two-time NCAA first-team Academic All-American and graduated in 1981 with a degree in risk management. He graduated magna cum laude and is currently a professor in Florida State's school of business.

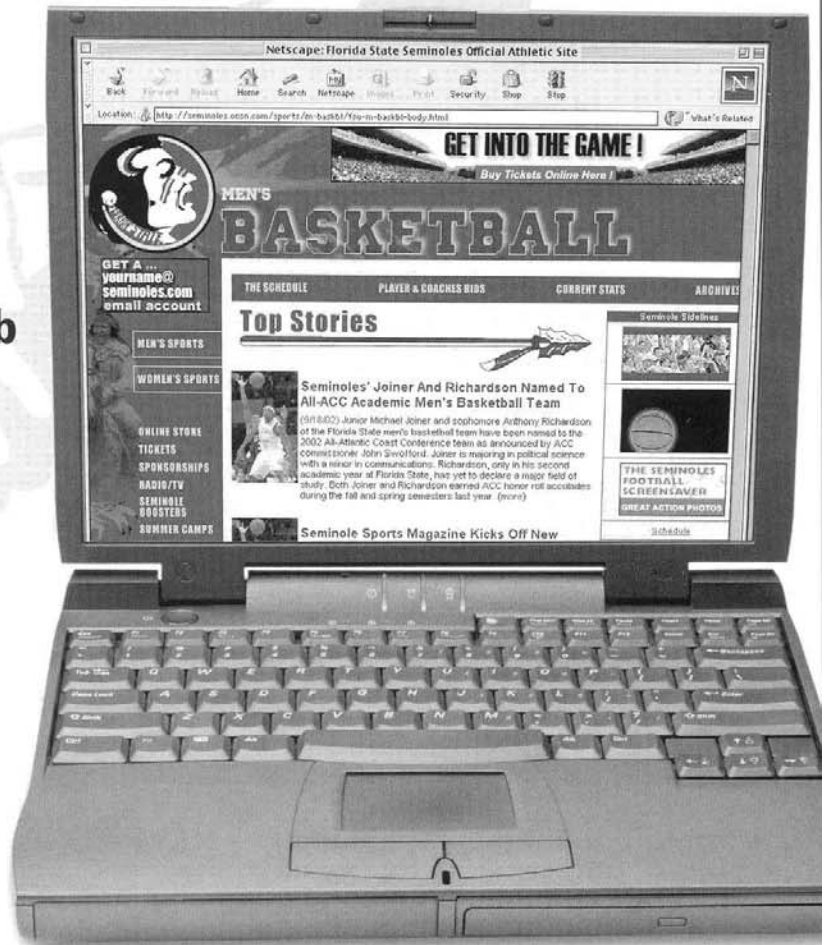

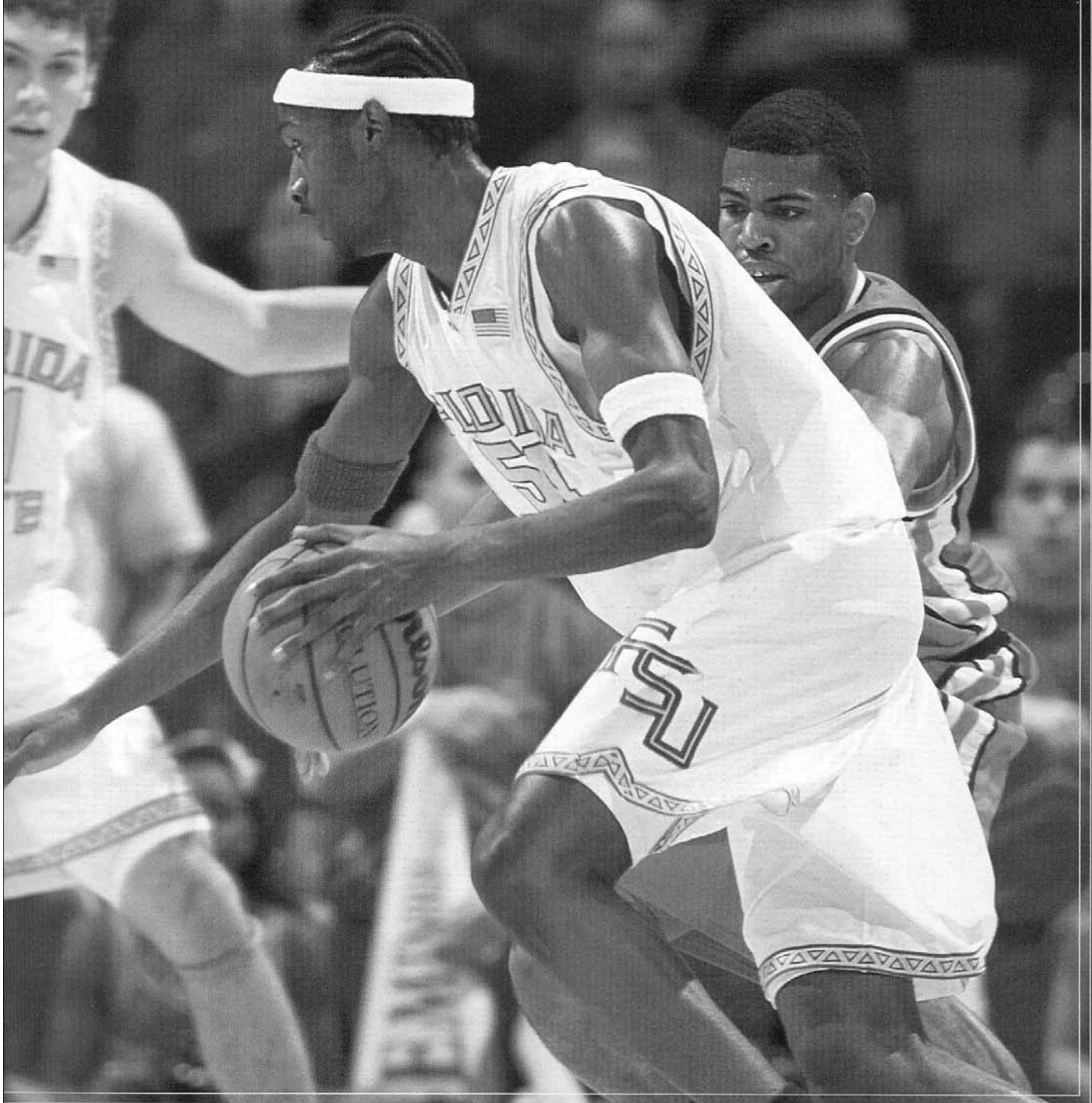

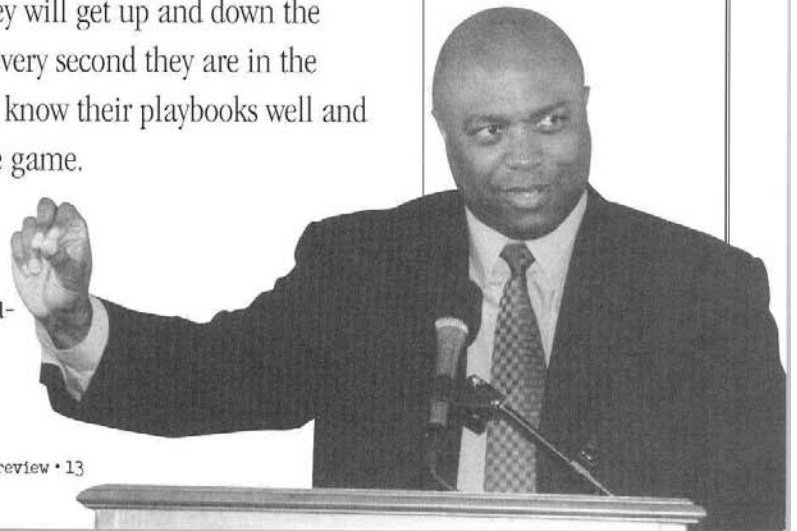


New Attitude New Approach

IN HIS FIRST SEASON AT FLORIDA STATE, HAMILTON AND HIS STAFF WILL LOOK TO MOLD THE SEMINOLES INTO A COHESIVE UNIT WHILE TRAVELING THROUGH THE ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE FOR THE FIRST TIME.

Leonard Hamilton's first Seminole basketball team will certainly mirror his previous 14 college teams. His players will be versatile, they will get up and down the court, they will score points and they will play hard every second they are in the game. The players will be well-conditioned, they will know their playbooks well and they will be well-schooled in the fundamentals of the game.

Hamilton has found success traveling this road before at both Oklahoma State University and the University of Miami and looks forward to the opportunity to guide the Seminole program back into the realm of the college basketball elite.

Junior Michael Joiner will lead Florida State into the 2002-03 campaign as one of the most experienced players in the ACC. Joiner has played in 58 career games and leads the Seminoles in six statistical categories entering the season. He has started two of the biggest wins in school history – the Seminoles' 74-71 victory over No. 18 Maryland during his freshman season and Florida State's monumental 77-76 victory over No. 1 ranked Duke his sophomore season.

Joiner, 6-7, from Fayetteville, N.C., is comfortable playing either forward position and can handle and shoot the basketball with the confidence of a guard. He averaged 7.8 points, 4.7 rebounds and 1.4 assists and led the team with a career-high .403 (31-of-77) shooting percentage from the 3-point line during the 2001-02 season. Joiner begins his junior season with 496 career points and is nearly halfway to 1,000 with two complete seasons remaining.

Joiner is also an excellent defender who has ranked among the team leaders in both steals and blocked shots in the last two seasons. He averages nearly one steal per game for his career and has blocked multiple shots in six different games during his career.

Mike Mathews and Trevor Harvey, a pair of battled-tested seniors, combine to form one of the top-shot blocking duos in the nation and will be important members of the Seminole front-court during the upcoming season.

Mathews, a 6-10 forward/center from Blountstown, Fla., is a two-year letterwinner who, after only two years in a Seminole uniform, is already ranked among Florida State's all-time top-ten in blocked shots with 78. He has played in 57 career games and is already on pace to become one of the top-five shot blockers in school history. He is the ACC's leading returning shot blocker for the second consecutive season with a 1.4 blocks per game average. Mathews ranked seventh in the ACC with a 1.2 blocked shots per game average as a sophomore and ranked fifth in the conference with a 1.6 per game average last season.

Mathews, who has started 14 games during his career, has also displayed his ability to score and grab rebounds during the first two years of his career. He averages nearly six points per game for his career and has scored in double figures 10 times during his career. Mathews' career-high of 16 points came against Ohio State during his freshman season. He has also been among the team leaders in rebounds each of the last two years.

Mathews played extremely well in Florida State's 77-76 victory over No. 1 ranked and previously undefeated Duke to help the Seminoles earn one of the biggest victories in school history during the 2001-02 season. On the final deciding play of the game, Mathews boxed out Carlos Boozer on Jason Williams' second missed free throw allowing Seminole forward Antwan Dixon to grab the rebound on the play and then sealed Boozer on his right hip at the other end to allow Monte Cummings past the imposing Duke center on Cummings' way to basket and the game-winning lay-up with 7.4 seconds remaining. On the final

defensive stand of the game, Mathews blocked Williams' initial shot attempt at a game-winning basket as the time ran out.

Harvey, a junior college transfer, played in 28 games during his first season as a Seminole last year. He proved to be a quick leaver and improved his game by leaps and bounds during his first season on the Division I level. Harvey is at the top of the list of the blossoming big men in the ACC and ranked tied for 10th in the ACC in blocked shots per game (0.9 bpg) last season.

Also a developing offensive force, Harvey shot 54.8 percent from the field and is comfortable playing with his back to the basket on the blocks that compliments his soft shooting touch for his size. He is also very active on the offensive glass and ranked among the conference leaders in offensive rebounds as a junior.

Harvey averaged 4.2 points, 3.1 rebounds, and 0.9 blocks in 12.6 minutes of playing time as he played in 28 games. He earned three starting assignments and was on the court to begin conference games against Wake Forest (Feb. 2) and NC State (Feb. 10) and at Duke (Feb. 7) and averaged 5.6 points, 4.0 rebounds and 1.0 blocked shots in his three starting assignments.

Harvey must continue to improve on both the offensive and defensive ends of the court to continue not only his personal development but to preserve his position in the Seminoles' most-used rotation.

A pair of underclassmen, Anthony Richardson and Adam Waleskowski, will battle for increased playing time as sophomores. Both players earned considerable playing time last season with Richardson earning All-ACC Rookie Team honorable mention honors. Both players are hard workers and should be revitalized by Hamilton's up-tempo style of play on both ends of the court.

Richardson, a 6-7 forward from Raleigh, N.C. burst onto the ACC scene as a freshman as one of the most heralded recruits in Florida State basketball history. The McDonald's All-American got a good taste of college basketball last season and hopes to become a gourmet eater during the remainder of his career in Tallahassee.

Richardson averaged 7.2 points and 3.7 rebounds while ranking among the team leaders in blocked shots (15), assists (27), 3-point field goals made (24) and steals (21). He ranked in the top five of four different statistical categories for the Seminoles last season (blocked shots, assists, 3-point field goals made) and was one of the top all-around freshmen in the ACC during the 2001-02 season. Richardson was the only player to rank among the ACC's top-10 freshmen in rebounds, scoring, blocked shots and steals during the season.

Richardson earned ACC Rookie of the Week honors once during his freshman season (Jan. 13) after scoring his career-high of 19 points and grabbing six rebounds against NC State (Jan. 8) as he returned home to play in Raleigh for the first time during his career. He scored his career-high of 19 points, made a career-high tying five free throws and grabbed a career-high tying three offensive rebounds in a career-high 29 minutes played against the Wolfpack with nearly 20 family members and friends in attendance.

Waleskowski was a late bloomer for the Seminoles as a freshman and enters the 2002-03 season looking to dramatically

improve his output on both the offensive and defensive ends of the court. The 6-8 sophomore from Kettering, Ohio must accept an increased role on both ends of the court for Florida State to find success this season.

Waleskowski averaged 2.9 points, 2.4 rebounds and shot .806 percent from the free throw line to lead the team in that category. In addition, he finished sixth on the team in steals with 17 for a 0.6 steals per game average and was one of only four players

(joining Delvon Arrington, Antwan Dixon and Mike Mathews) on the team to play in all 29 games during the season.

Waleskowski started Florida State's final two games of the 2001-02 season in the ACC Tournament and averaged 19.0 minutes played per game against Clemson and National Champion Maryland. He scored eight points (on a perfect eight-of-eight from the free throw line) as Florida State

defeated Clemson (March 8), 91-84, in overtime to advance to the quarterfinal round. Earlier during the season, he scored his career-high of 11 points as Florida State defeated Savannah State.

Benson Callier, a 6-6 freshman from St. Petersburg, Fla., is one of four newcomers to Florida State's roster who will have an immediate impact on the good fortunes of the Seminoles. He could become one of the Seminoles' most athletic players and most consistent highlight reel performers.

Callier averaged a double-double (18.0 points and 10.0 rebounds) as a prep senior and brings with him a fantastic reputation as a versatile, all-around player with leaping ability that is awe-inspiring. Callier is a tremendous athlete who makes shots, grabs rebounds and gets up and down the floor in transition well and who has the ability to play all five positions and play them well.

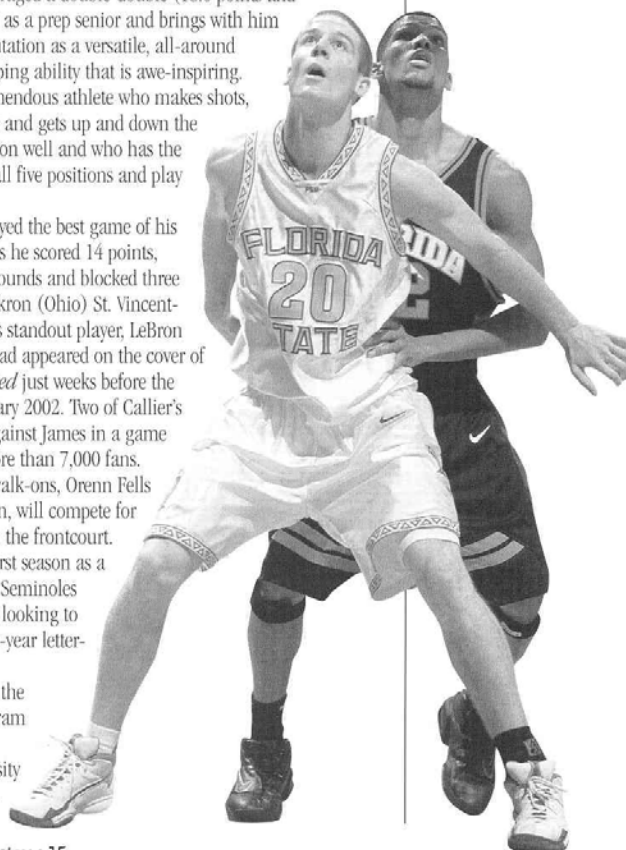
Callier played the best game of his senior season as he scored 14 points, grabbed 11 rebounds and blocked three shots against Akron (Ohio) St. Vincent-St. Mary and its standout player, LeBron James. James had appeared on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* just weeks before the game in February 2002. Two of Callier's blocks came against James in a game attended by more than 7,000 fans.

A pair of walk-ons, Orenn Fells and Nate Moran, will compete for playing time in the frontcourt. Fells is in his first season as a member of the Seminoles while Moran is looking to become a three-year letter-winner.

Fells joins the Seminole program after a year at Auburn University (2000-01) and

one at Abraham Baldwin Junior College (2001-02). He will challenge for playing time from the beginning or practice and can play both forward spots. Fells' size and athleticism allow him to be an excellent rebounder who runs the floor well and finishes in transition.

Moran is in his third year as a walk-on member of the team and played in a career-high four games as a junior in 2001-02. He has played in six games during his two-year career and is a valuable bench contributor who adds intensity and a spark on the offensive and defensive ends.

Junior Nate Johnson will be given the basketball and will be Florida State's starting point guard this season. The junior college transfer is an aggressive player with the ability to play up-tempo while at the same time playing under control. Johnson will fill an immediate need at the point guard position for the Seminoles who are faced with the loss of four-year starter and all-time assist leader Delvon Arrington, who finished his career following the 2001-02 season.

Johnson has long arms, can handle the ball in traffic, can hit 3-point shots from all over the court, takes care of the basketball and is very effective in half court sets. His best attribute may be his ability to find open teammates.

Johnson graduated from Moberly Area Community College with an Associates Degree in 2002 after averaging 10.2 points, 7.3 assists, 3.0 rebounds, and 3.1 steals in addition to shooting 35.0 percent from beyond the arc as a sophomore. He earned All-America second-team honors as he led Moberly to the Junior College National Championship tournament in Hutchinson, Ks. in 2002.

Todd Galloway, a 5-11 freshman who is rated by many as one of the top prep guards entering the collegiate ranks for the 2002-03 season, will battle Johnson for playing time at the point guard position. He has an explosive first step, can get to the basket and is fearless on the court. In addition, he handles the ball well and has a strong ability to keep his dribble alive in traffic.

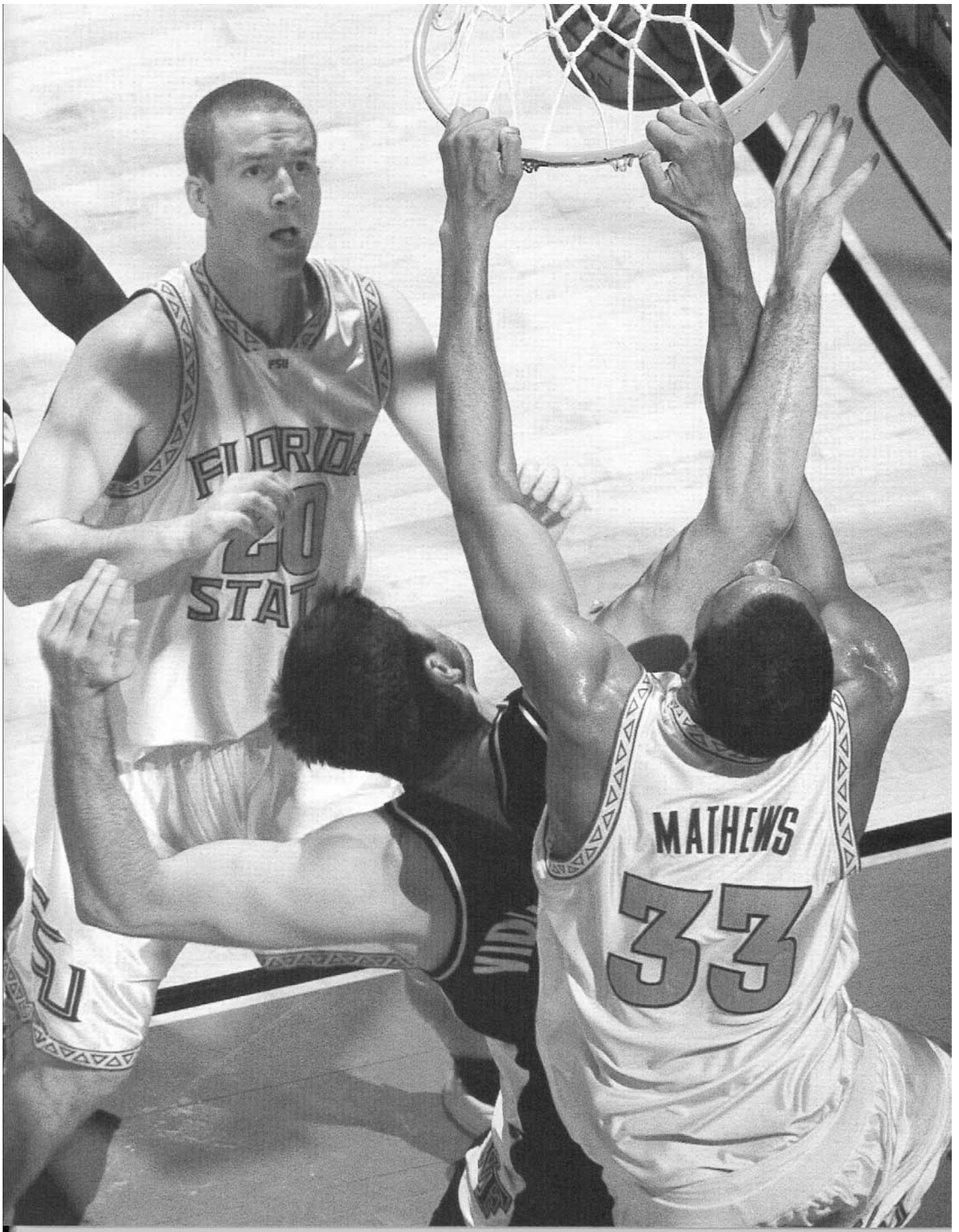
Galloway averaged a career-high 16.5 points and 7.5 assists as a senior in leading Notre Dame (Va.) Academy to one of the top seasons in school history in 2002. He scored in double figures in 26 of Notre Dame's 29 games including a season-high of 28 points against Southwest Florida Christian on Dec. 5. Galloway also scored 24 or more points five times and 20 or more points 10 times as a high school senior.

Tim Pickett, a 6-4 guard from Daytona Beach, Fla., looks to fill Florida State's need at the shooting guard position. Pickett was a consensus top-50 national junior college player who earned National Junior College Athletic Association All-Region VIII honors and was named the 2002 Most Valuable Player at Indian River Community College following the 2001-02 season.

Pickett averaged 21.0 points and 6.1 rebounds in leading Indian River to within one game of the National Junior College National Tournament in Hutchinson, Ks. In helping the Pioneers to the Florida Community College Activities Association (FCCAA) championship game, Pickett was named to the All-Tournament team.

In addition to leading Indian River in scoring, he also averaged 4.7 assists and 2.4 steals a game and shot nearly 37 percent from the 3-point line during last season.

Andrew Wilson, one of the Seminoles' top outside shooting threats, returns to the lineup this season after missing virtually all of the 2001-02 season with a knee injury. With Wilson out of the lineup, Florida State's field goal shooting percentage suffered. With Wilson back in the lineup this season, look for Florida State to be a much better shooting team.



Wilson, a 6-7 guard/forward from Kennesaw, Ga., suffered a sprained MCL in his right knee against Florida in the 2001-02 season opener after having played only seven minutes. He worked extremely hard to get back into the lineup but decided on a medical redshirt which was granted after petitioning the NCAA.

As a freshman, Wilson led Florida State in free throw shooting percentage with an .808 shooting percentage and was the first freshman in school history to lead the Seminoles in free throw shooting. He averaged 4.3 points and 1.7 rebounds while playing in each of Florida State's 30 games as a freshman. Wilson was a member of Florida State's rotation and averaged 13.0 minutes per game during his inaugural collegiate season.

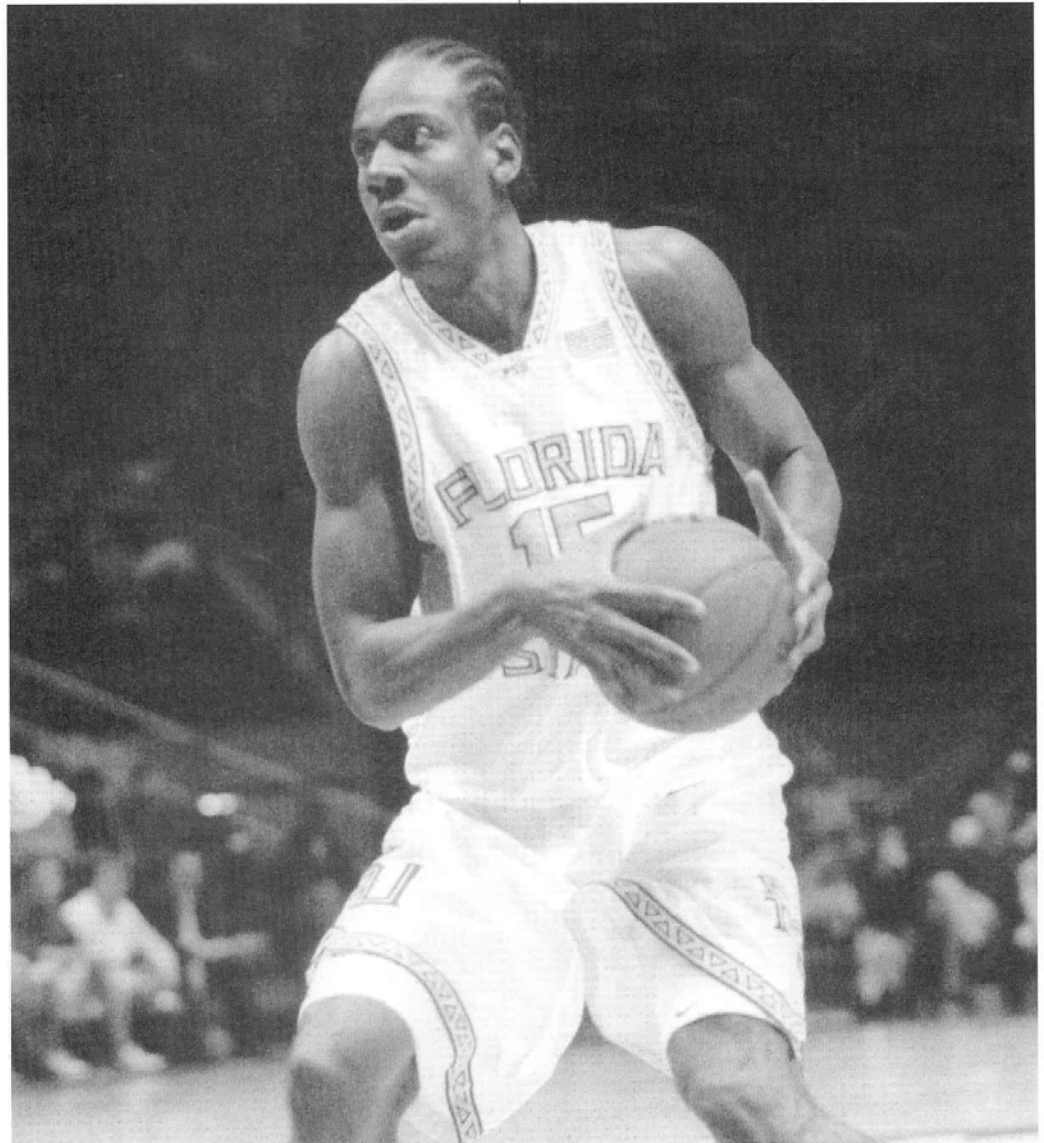
Senior Marcell Haywood and freshman Will Wightman will look to add depth to the guard position for the Seminoles.

Haywood, a 5-11 guard from Plantation, Fla., is walk-on member of the Seminoles who earned his undergraduate degree in information systems in April of 2002. He played in a career-

high 25 games (including the final 20 of the season) as Florida State's primary back-up point guard during the 2001-02 season. Haywood averaged a career-high 5.4 minutes as he played in every game from Dec. 27 through both of Florida State's games in the ACC Tournament.

Wightman will add depth at the guard position and will be one of the Seminoles' hardest working players. He is a very fundamentally sound player who shoots the ball well from all over the court. He played at a very high level in high school and was successful in all phases of the game.

Adrian McPherson, a 6-4 guard from Bradenton, Fla., will join the basketball team as a guard following the completion of the Seminoles' football season. The talented athlete is expected to continue his career as a two-sport star at Florida State after playing in three games during his freshman season before deciding to concentrate on football as the Seminoles' back-up quarterback.

HAMILTON NAMED AS SEMINOLES SEVENTH HEAD COACH

Leonard Hamilton was named head coach of the Florida State men's basketball program in a press conference held at the school March 19. Hamilton, who brings 29 seasons of experience as a collegiate and NBA coach, takes over the Seminole program after most recently coaching the NBA's Washington Wizards and resurrecting the University of Miami's program in 10 seasons with the Hurricanes. Hamilton, 53, is just the seventh head coach in Florida State history. He comes to Tallahassee after a one-year stint with the NBA's Wizards during the 2000-01 season. Prior to his NBA stint, Hamilton accepted the challenge of taking on the Miami Hurricane program, taking them to three straight NCAA Tournaments over his final three seasons and earning UPI Coach of the Year honors in the process. In his final season with Miami, Hamilton guided the Hurricanes to their second straight 20-win season, a share of the Big East regular season championship and the school's first trip to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Hurricanes finished 23-11, including a 13-3 conference record, and concluded the season ranked 23rd in the nation by the Associated Press college basketball poll and 20th in the final USA Today/ESPN poll. Miami's 23 wins matched the team's 1998-99 total and, at the time, tied the school record for victories in a season.

HAMILTON NAMES THREE MEMBERS OF HIS FLORIDA STATE COACHING STAFF

Leonard Hamilton named the first three additions to his Seminole coaching staff on March 22. Hamilton named Stan Jones as associate head coach and Mike Jaskulski and Tony Sheals as assistant coaches. Both Jones and Jaskulski helped

Hamilton revive the fortunes of the basketball program at the University of Miami. Jones was an assistant at Miami from 1995-2000 and Jaskulski worked with Hamilton and the Hurricanes from 1993-97. Jones comes to Tallahassee from Mississippi State University where he helped lead the Bulldogs to a 27-8 record and an appearance in the second round of the NCAA Tournament this season. Jaskulski was the head coach at Towson (Md.) University from 1997-2001 and an assistant at Miami for five years. While serving as an assistant to Hamilton at Miami, Jaskulski helped the Hurricanes to the fifth best win-loss record in the highly competitive Big East Conference. Sheals comes to Florida State from Miami, where he served as the Administrative Assistant for Basketball Operations during the 2001-02 season. He joins Hamilton's Seminole staff with 19 years of head and assistant coaching experience. During his coaching career, he has been the head coach at Delaware State University (1999-2000), Bethune-Cookman College (1993-97), South Florida Community College (1990-92) and Kathleen High School in Lakeland, Fla. (1984-90).

HAMILTON ROUNDS OUT STAFF WITH MCDONALD AND BRADLEY

Thom McDonald, director of basketball operations, and Michael Bradley, assistant strength and conditioning coach, were the final additions to Leonard Hamilton's Seminole staff. As the director of basketball operations, McDonald will be involved in all phases of the day-to-day operations of the men's basketball office.

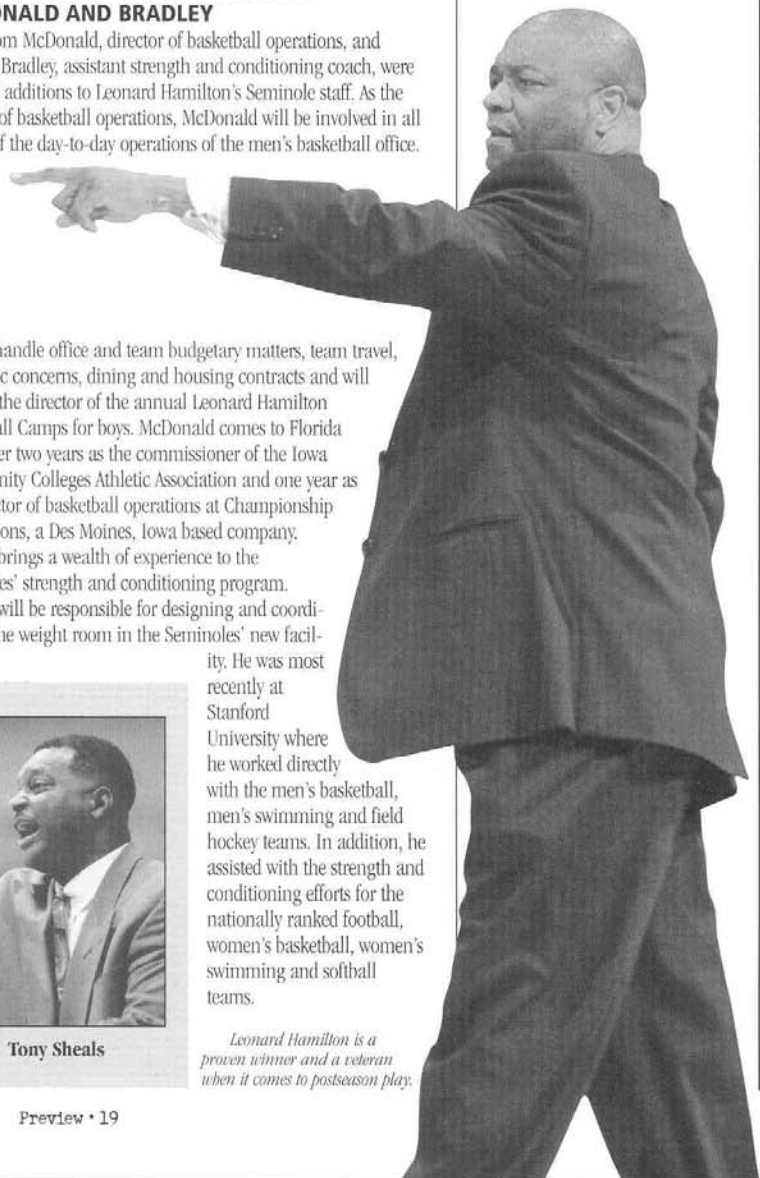
He will handle office and team budgetary matters, team travel, academic concerns, dining and housing contracts and will serve as the director of the annual Leonard Hamilton Basketball Camps for boys. McDonald comes to Florida State after two years as the commissioner of the Iowa Community Colleges Athletic Association and one year as the director of basketball operations at Championship Productions, a Des Moines, Iowa based company. Bradley brings a wealth of experience to the Seminoles' strength and conditioning program. Bradley will be responsible for designing and coordinating the weight room in the Seminoles' new facility.

He was most recently at Stanford University where he worked directly with the men's basketball, men's swimming and field hockey teams. In addition, he assisted with the strength and conditioning efforts for the nationally ranked football, women's basketball, women's swimming and softball teams.

SEMINOLES MOVE INTO NEW TRAINING FACILITY

The Seminole men's basketball program recently moved into the Florida State Basketball Training Facility. The \$10 million facility is adjacent to the Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center and is the permanent home of the basketball staff. It is a three-floor structure located on the southeast perimeter of campus and is a state-of-the-art building containing the newest and finest equipment for the future of the basketball program. The first floor holds team locker rooms with extensive team lounges and study areas. The first floor also has oversized locker areas for the coaching and support staff. The second floor has two regulation size basketball courts that mirror the Seminoles' game floor in the adjacent Civic Center. The second floor also has a media relations center, a sports medicine/training center, a weight training center and team meeting rooms. The third floor holds office suites, an extensive video production and editing center and a traditions area. The Department of Athletics at Florida State has now spent more than \$30 million dollars on the Civic Center complex to make the facility one of the best in the ACC.

JOINER RETURNS AS SEMINOLES' MOST EXPERIENCED PLAYER

Junior All-ACC candidate Michael Joiner, who has started 53 games during the first two years of his career, enters the 2002-03 season as the Seminoles' most experienced player. He has played in 58 games (while starting 53) and averages 28.1 minutes per game through his freshman and sophomore seasons. Joiner is the Seminoles' current career leader in seven categories – points per game (8.6 ppg), rebounds per game (5.3 rpg), 3-point shots made (45), assists per game (1.4 apg), steals per game (1.0 spg) and minutes played per game (28.1 mpg).

JOINER AMONG ACC OFFENSIVE REBOUNDING LEADERS

Junior All-ACC candidate Michael Joiner ranked second on the team and 15th in the ACC in offensive rebounding as a sophomore with a 2.1 per game average. It marked the second consecutive season he has ranked among the conference leaders in

offensive rebounding as he also ranked 15th in the ACC as a freshman. He is one of only five ACC players returning for the 2002-03 season who has ranked in the league's top 15 in offensive rebounding in each of the last two seasons. Virginia's Travis Watson and Chris Williams, Wake Forest's Josh Howard and Clemson's Chris Hobbs join Joiner, who averages 2.1 offensive rebounds in his 58-game career, as the ACC's leaders in career offensive rebounds for the upcoming season.

Junior All-ACC candidate Michael Joiner, who made a career-high 31 3-point shots as a sophomore, begins the 2002-03 season as the Seminoles' current career leader in 3-point shots made. He led the Seminoles in 3-point shooting percentage during the 2001-02 season with a career-high .403 mark. Joiner made his career-high of three 3-point field goals in three different games (vs. Birmingham Southern, vs. Virginia Tech and at Duke) and made multiple 3-point shots in a career-high 11 games.

WILSON SET TO MAKE RETURN IN 2002-03

Sophomore Andrew Wilson, who missed all but one game during the 2001-02 season, will look to make a triumphant return to the Seminoles' lineup during the upcoming season. Wilson is considered one of the top shooters on the team and will look to help Florida State raise its field goal shooting percentage. He suffered a sprained MCL in his right knee in last year's season opener after having played only seven minutes. Wilson led the team in free throw shooting percentage as a freshman with a .808 mark from the line.

DEFENSE, DEFENSE, DEFENSE

Leonard Hamilton's teams are known for team defense and his first Seminole team should fit his mold well. Hamilton's 1997 University of Miami team led the nation in field goal percentage defense. Many of his other Hurricane teams ranked among the nation's and Big East Conference leaders. Florida State ranked fourth in the ACC in field goal percentage defense last season and has held its opponents below 50 percent shooting from the field in each of the last 16 years.

CHARTING HARVEY'S IMPROVEMENT

Senior Trevor Harvey, who averaged 4.2 points and 3.1 rebounds in 28 games last season, displayed a consistent improvement throughout his first season as a Seminole. After starting slowly, he finished with a flourish and enters the 2002-03 season as one of the top big men in the ACC. He scored 81 percent of his points (105 of 130), grabbed 62 percent of his rebounds (33 of 53) and blocked nearly 70 percent of his shots (18 of 26) in his final 19 games of the season. During those 19 games, he played double figure minutes 15 times and played his career-high of 22 minutes against Maryland in the ACC Tournament.

WALESKOWSKI TO EARN PLAYING TIME

Sophomore Adam Waleskowski, who started the final two games of the 2001-02 season, is expected to earn increased playing time during the upcoming season. He started both of Florida State's games in the ACC Tournament and averaged 4.0 points, 5.5 rebounds and 19 minutes as the Seminoles defeated Clemson in the first round but lost to national champion Maryland in the quarterfinals. Waleskowski became the second consecutive freshman to lead the Seminoles in free throw shooting as he shot .806 from the line. He tied Florida State's free throw shooting percentage record for a single game with his perfect effort from the line against Clemson in the ACC Tournament. Waleskowski ranked second among ACC freshmen (slightly behind Virginia's Jermaine Harper at .833) with his .806 free throw percentage.

HAYWOOD TO PLAY AS A SENIOR - AGAIN

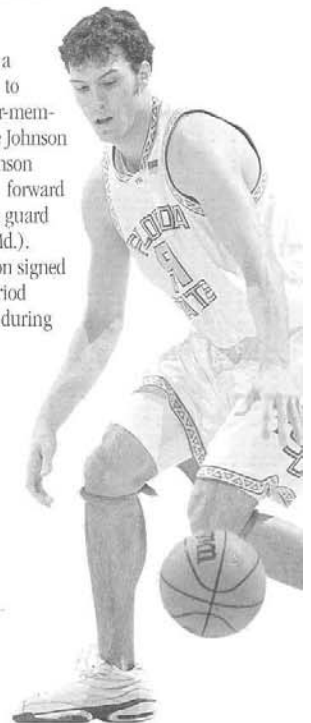
Senior Marcell Haywood will play as a senior when he begins practicing with the Seminoles this fall. He earned his undergraduate degree in information systems in April of 2002. Haywood played in a career-high 25 games last season (including all 16 regular season ACC games) as Florida State's primary back-up point guard to the record-setting Delvon Arrington. He averaged a career-high 5.4 minutes played per game and will be playing in his fourth season as a member of the team in 2002-03.

MCPHERSON TO PLAY BASKETBALL

Sophomore point guard/quarterback Adrian McPherson is expected to continue his career as a two-sport star at Florida State as a member of the basketball and football teams during the 2002-03 season. He played in three games during his freshman season before deciding to concentrate on football as the Seminoles' back-up quarterback. McPherson joined the basketball team for practice on Dec. 3 after the Seminoles' football victory over Georgia Tech on Dec. 1 and participated in two-a-day practices with the football team in preparation for the Gator Bowl while he was practicing with the basketball team.

HAMILTON ADDS STELLAR RECRUITING CLASS

First-year head coach Leonard Hamilton welcomes a four-member recruiting class to Tallahassee this fall. The four-member class includes guard Nate Johnson (Kansas City, Mo.), guard Benson Callier (St. Petersburg, Fla.), forward Al Thornton (Perry, Ga.) and guard Todd Galloway (Baltimore, Md.). Johnson, Callier and Thornton signed during the spring signing period while Galloway signed a NLI during the early signing period.
