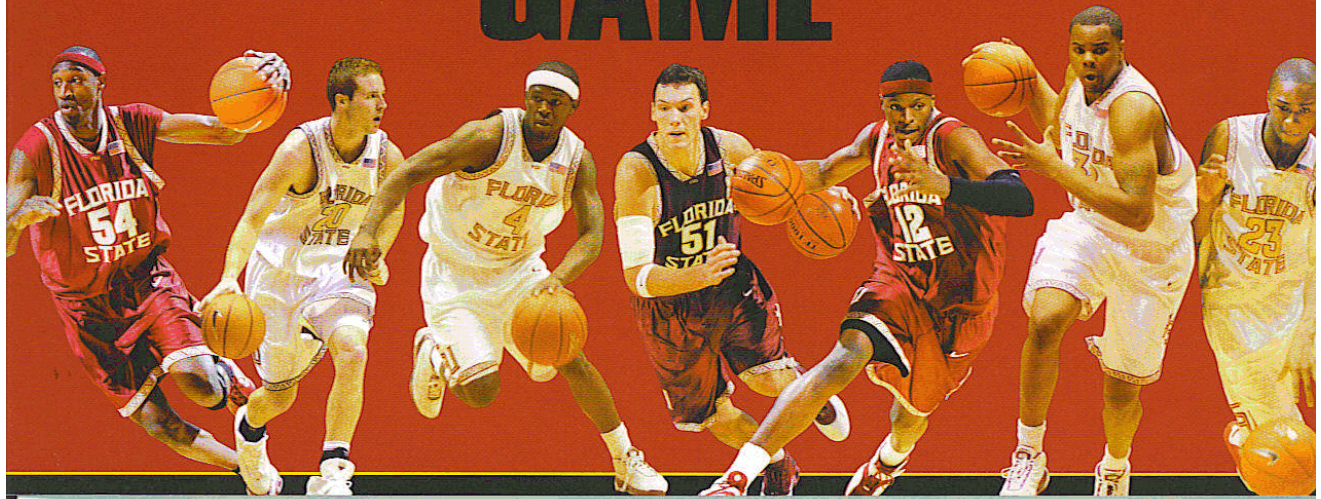



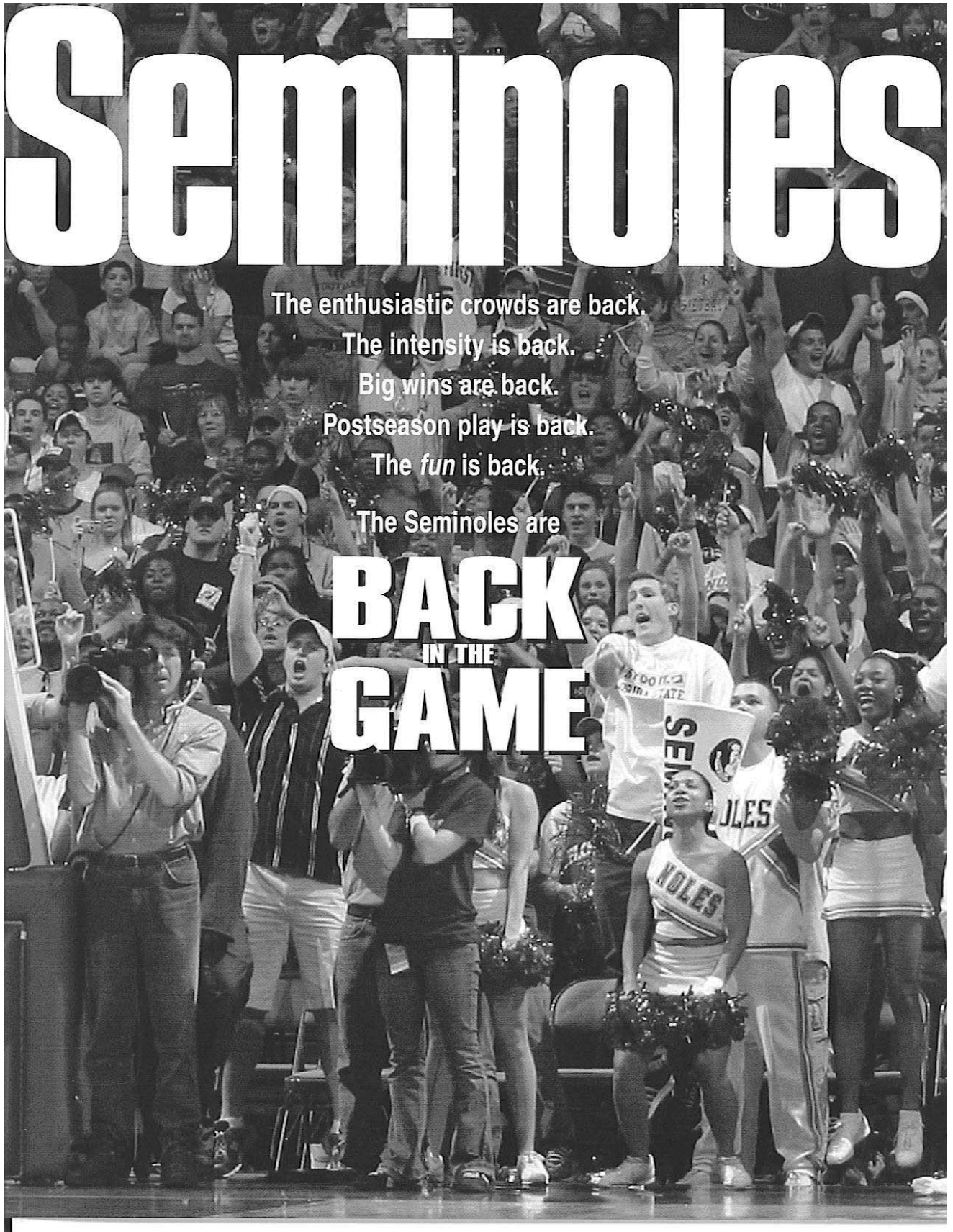

Last season Deckerhoff was recognized for 30 years of service as the voice of Seminole basketball. ESPN and ABC analyst Dick Vitale has called Deckerhoff one of the top college basketball play-by-play voices.

Welcome to Florida State University. Head coach Leonard Hamilton, his staff and players welcome your interest and hope you enjoy your visit to Tallahassee, the capital city of the Sunshine State. The Seminoles are looking forward to a groundbreaking season of pressure defense and up-tempo basketball that will make Florida State one of the most exciting teams in the nation to watch both at home and on the road. Everyone associated with the Seminole men's basketball program would like to thank you for your interest and will assist you in any way possible.

This media guide has been prepared as a source of information for the news media and Seminole fans. Additional information, including press releases, photographs, video footage and clips are available upon request to all members of the media. Any questions not covered in this publication may be directed to the Florida State Sports Information office.

### Before Your Visit

Game credentials are issued to accredited members of the media only. Working space along press row at the Civic Center is limited and seats are expressly reserved to those working on deadline, with no exceptions. Children and other nonworkers are not allowed in the press area. Credentials should be ordered at least one week prior to each game and are issued through the Sports Information office. Requests for credentials should be made in writing on letterhead stationery to Chuck Walsh, associate director of sports information. If it is convenient to FAX your request, you are welcome to do so. The FAX number in the Sports Information office is (850) 644-3820. If you would rather e-mail your request, please do so. The e-mail address is [cwalsh@mailersfsu.edu](mailto:cwalsh@mailersfsu.edu). These requests are accepted from sports editors and sports directors only. Credential requests are carefully screened to insure proper working conditions in the press area. When time permits, a working press pass and a parking pass will be mailed. When mailing is not possible, they will be left at the Press Will Call entrance near the bottom level at the Elephant Doors located in the southwest

corner of the arena. The Press Will Call is located near the television trucks and directly opposite the Florida State Basketball Training Center. Media Will Call is located at this entrance and is open 90 minutes prior to tip-off.

### Photography Credentials

Photographers, too, should make their credential requests at least one week in advance. Strobe lights may be installed in the Civic Center; arrangements must be made through the Civic Center at least two weeks prior to game day. Space for strobe lights is available on a first come, first serve basis. Arrangements may be made by calling Roger Englert at (850) 487-1691.

The NCAA has an established policy to control congestion within photography areas on the basketball court. Only photographers on assignment will be issued photo passes along with members of the working television media. Admission to the court and photo boxes is by photo pass only. Photographers, both still and electronic, must shoot from the baselines at the northwest (visiting bench press row side) or southeast (Florida State bench) corners of the court. Photographer's floor access is governed by Atlantic Coast Conference and NCAA policy. Please note, only game photographers, no runners, assistants or producers will have access to the photography areas. Photographer positions are at the complete discretion of the basketball game officials and the Sports Information office at ALL TIMES.

### Parking

Parking for media covering the Seminoles at the Civic Center is available on a very limited basis. The media parking lot is located in the main Civic Center parking lot. Access is via media parking pass only. Vehicles should enter the Civic Center lot from Pensacola Street. They will then be directed to the appropriate area. Please contact the Sports Information office in plenty of time to request a parking pass to be mailed or left at your hotel.

### Media Services

Weekly Interview Schedule: The Sports Information office will, in conjunction with

head coach Leonard Hamilton, establish a weekly interview schedule throughout the 2004-05 season. The schedule, which will vary in accordance with the Seminoles' practice and game schedule, is established to assist the media in their coverage of the Seminoles. The interviews will take place in the Florida State Basketball Training Center and will provide the media with an opportunity to speak with coach Hamilton as well as various Seminole players. All interview requests must be made in advance and must be made with at least 24 hours notice. Players' individual phone numbers will not be given to the media and game day interviews will not be granted until the end of each game. Players will return phone calls at a mutually convenient day and time. Media requests for specific players to be made available should be made to basketball sports information director Chuck Walsh.

### ACC Coaches' Teleconference

Media members wishing to speak with head coach Leonard Hamilton are encouraged to call the Atlantic Coast Conference's weekly coaches' teleconference. Each of the 11 ACC coaches will be featured each Monday from 11:00 a.m. to 12:50 p.m. beginning January 3 and concluding March 7. The coaches will participate in two teleconferences prior to the start of the ACC schedule on Dec. 6 and Dec. 13.

Each coach will be available for comments and will field questions for 10 minutes beginning with Skip Prosser and continuing in reverse alphabetical order by school. Florida State's Leonard Hamilton is available from 12:20 to 12:30. The weekly press conference can be accessed by calling (913) 981-5509.

**Game Day Services**

**Media Room:** The media room at the Civic Center is located beneath the west side of the arena in Meeting Room B.

**Press Seating:** Press seating is located on the court across from both team benches. The area is manned by members of the Sports Information office throughout every game. The sports information staff desires to be as helpful as possible during each game.

**Phones:** A limited number of phones are available in the Civic Center press room (calling card or reversed charges required). Members of the media may order their own phone lines for the media room or at court side through Sprint of Tallahassee. Call Sprint at (866) 366-2500 to arrange for service.

**Visiting Radio:** Phone lines are reversed for both the Florida State and visiting radio network on the court level of press row. The broadcast rights to the game are granted to visiting radio stations on a reciprocal basis. Phone lines are available through an ACC agreement. Please contact Chuck Walsh of the Sports Information office for the details.

**Press Meals:** A buffet dinner is available in the Seminole Spirit Room to members of the media with a meal ticket attached to their credential. Television crews will be provided with meal tickets to accommodate talent and producers. Any catering needs for television crews should be addressed to Roger Englert of the Civic Center (850) 487-1691.

**Postgame Press Conference:**

Postgame interviews with the respective head coaches are held in the media room at the conclusion of the game. The head coach of the visiting team will be brought to the interview room immediately after the game. He will be followed by Seminole head coach Leonard Hamilton. The Florida State locker room is open to credentialed media for a brief period after Coach Hamilton concludes his comments to the media. This is in accordance with ACC rules. The visiting team's locker room access policy is determined by officials of that school.

**Postgame Statistics:** Statistical packets, including running play-by-play, first half and final box scores and postgame quotes, are compiled and available to the media at press row and in the press room following each game.

**Faxing:** Faxing of the final box score and running play-by-play is available through the Florida State Sports Information office. The Sports Information office will fax to outlets provided on both school's postgame fax lists. If any special needs arise, please contact a member of the Florida State Sports Information staff.

**E-mail Services:** Basketball releases can be obtained electronically by contacting Chuck Walsh at [cwalsh@mailers.fsu.edu](mailto:cwalsh@mailers.fsu.edu). List basketball news on the subject heading, and include the name of your media outlet and phone number in your message. (This is a media service only.)

# SEMINOLE RADIO NETWORK

The Florida State Radio Network brings Seminole fans closer to the action whenever the Seminole men's basketball team takes to the court.

Florida State fans throughout the Southeast can listen to every slam dunk of head coach Leonard Hamilton's third season on the Seminole Radio Network. The regional network brings the excitement of Florida State basketball, including pregame and postgame analysis, to alumni, fans and basketball enthusiasts across the state.

The Seminole Radio Network is owned and operated by Host Communications, Inc., one of the nation's leaders in collegiate sports broadcasting. Florida State joined forces with the Lexington, Ky.-based company to establish a comprehensive marketing opportunity that includes radio, television, print and corporate sponsorship components.

In addition to Florida State, Host owns the network rights of other outstanding schools including Texas, Kentucky, Notre Dame, Tennessee, South Carolina and Mississippi State, to name a few.

The Seminole basketball network will reach more than 30 markets during the 2004-05 season, including some of the nation's largest markets with Tampa, Jacksonville and Orlando, among

others, all receiving the Seminoles' basketball broadcasts this season. In Tallahassee, the Seminoles are heard on flagship stations WNTN-FM (94.9) and WFLA-AM (1270).

In addition to all of Florida State's games, the Leonard Hamilton Seminole Basketball Report can be heard three times daily on WNTN and WFLA. Hamilton's call-in show can be heard in most markets weekly (usually Thursday) from 7 to 8 p.m. during the season.

Florida State's broadcast crew is annually recognized as one of the nation's best as they provide insight and entertainment as well as detailed and expert play-by-play.

The broadcast team features award-winning play-by-play commentator Gene Deckerhoff, a 31-year veteran of the Florida State Radio Network, and Keith Jones, who is in his fifth year as a member of the team.

Deckerhoff is nationally known as one of the finest football and basketball announcers in both collegiate and professional sports. He has been known as the voice of the Seminoles for the past 26 football seasons and the past 31 basketball seasons. A native of Jacksonville, Fla., Deckerhoff also handles the play-by-play duties of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers of the NFL, which makes for some busy weekends during the fall and winter.

Deckerhoff is one of only four sports broadcasters ever inducted into the Florida Sports Hall of Fame. In calling FSU football since 1979, FSU basketball since 1974, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers since 1989 and all sorts of other things in between, Deckerhoff's deep, rich voice has become instantly recognizable to sports fans all over the state. Deckerhoff is the only radio voice who has broadcasted an NCAA football championship team (1993 and 1999 with the Seminoles) and a Super Bowl championship team (2003 with the Buccaneers). In addition, he was inducted into the 2002 Florida State University Athletic Hall of Fame.

ESPN and ABC basketball analyst Dick Vitale recently mentioned Deckerhoff as one of the top college basketball play-by-play voices. Vitale named Deckerhoff to his "All-Cawood Ledford" team, in honor of the legendary Kentucky broadcaster, as the best basketball announcers in his opinion.

Deckerhoff is also the host of the Leonard Hamilton/Seminole Basketball Highlight Show and the Bobby Bowden Football Show. He runs Gene Deckerhoff Productions, a firm specializing in sports

broadcasting and the production of radio and television commercials.

Keith Jones, a former Seminole football player, is the color analyst for the basketball broadcasts. He is in his fifth season as a member of the basketball broadcast crew.

Jones is also a broadcaster for Sunshine Network's college football coverage.

Jones, who will turn 46 during the 2004-05 season, was a member of Bobby Bowden's first recruiting class in 1977. As a senior at Wildwood (Fla.) High School, he was named an all-state quarterback and the salutatorian of his graduating class. He was a three-year starter at strong safety and a three-time Golden Chief award winner for the Seminoles. Jones still ranks in the top 10 in career interceptions and led the Seminole defense in interceptions in 1978 and 1980. During his career, Florida State compiled a four-year record of 39-8 and appeared in three consecutive bowl games, including consecutive Orange Bowls.

Jones was Florida State's first ever two-time NCAA first-team Academic All-American and graduated in 1981 with a degree in risk management. He graduated magna cum laude and is currently an account executive with the Earl Bacon Agency, Inc. Jones is also an adjunct professor in the Florida State College of Business.

Jones was the only sports analyst in the state of Florida to receive a 2002 regional Emmy Award. He earned the honor for his expert commentary on the Sunshine Network broadcast of Florida State's football games. Jones finished his 16th consecutive year in the football broadcast booth for Sunshine, making him the longest-tenured announcer of any pro or college sports team in the state of Florida.

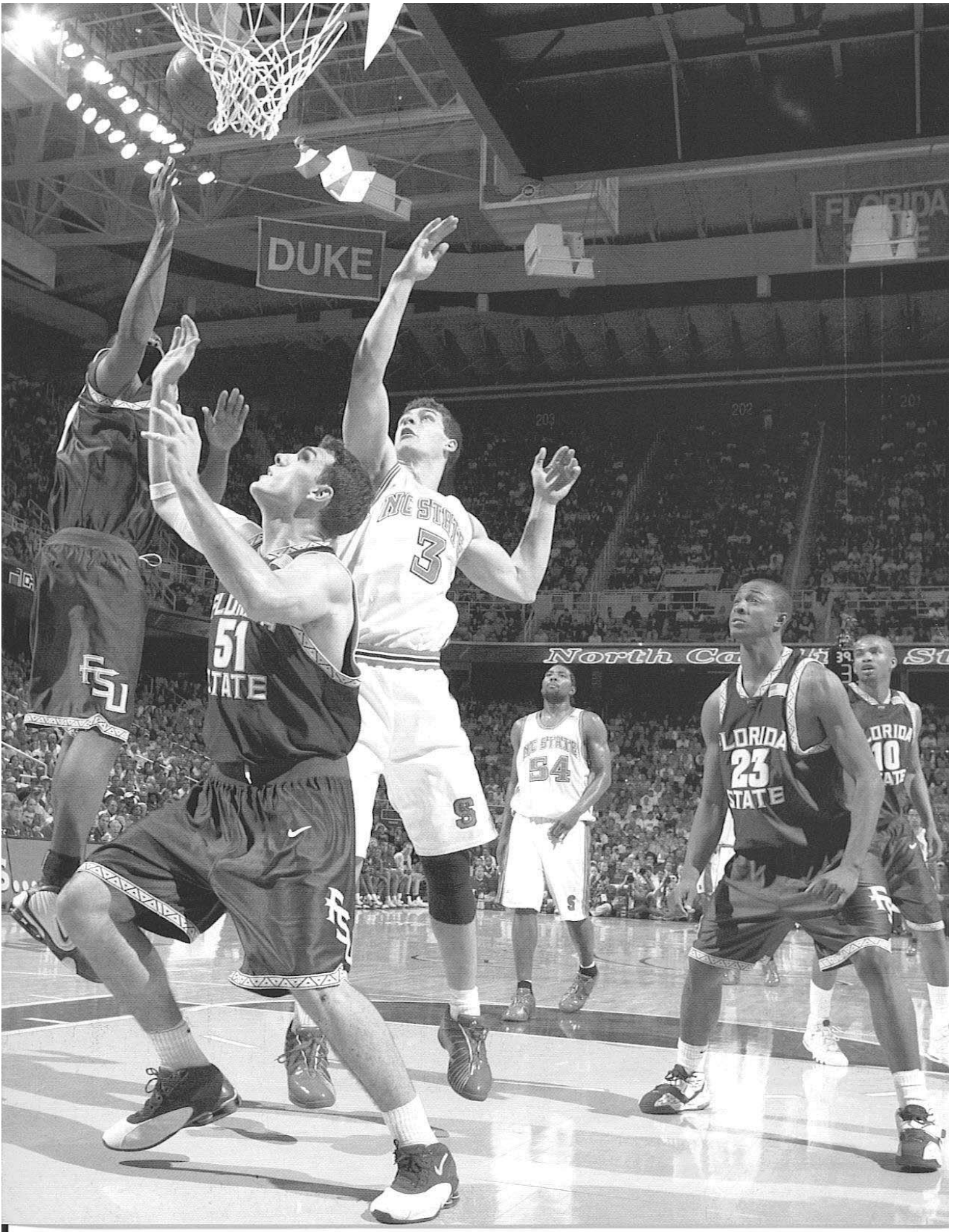
The Florida State University men's basketball team, which defeated four ranked teams and advanced to the second round of the NIT in 2004, enters the third season of the Leonard Hamilton era as one of the hottest teams in the nation. Not only have the Seminoles improved their win total by seven in the last two years, but they have displayed the talent

on the court which will allow Hamilton and his staff to continue building the program into one of significance both in the Atlantic Coast Conference and nationally.

The Seminoles have improved their victory total in two straight years, brought in two of the top recruiting classes in the country (including the No. 1 class in 2003) and defeated five nationally ranked teams since Hamilton's arrival in 2002. With four of its five leading scorers and three of its top five rebounders back in uniform, the Seminoles will look to continue their climb up the college basketball ladder this season.

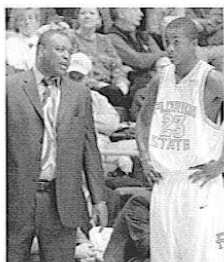

Under Hamilton, the Seminoles will persist with their remarkable climb into the nation's elite as they continue their maturation as a team on the court. The talent that helped the Seminoles make their first postseason appearance in six years continues to improve along with their depth and increased basketball knowledge. Hamilton will count on a solid group of upperclassmen, several young players who displayed their ability to lift Florida State into the national spotlight last season, and a group of four recruits recognized as one of the nation's best entering the collegiate ranks this season.

"We had a lot of close defeats last year," said Hamilton who led the Seminoles to 19 wins in 2004. "We talked at the end of the season about improving ourselves in every way. We felt that with a free throw here and a little better conditioning there we could have won more games and reached more of our goals. The little things you need to concentrate on that determine whether you win or lose a basketball game are the things we need to work on as we approach the upcoming season. We are also going to develop the right mental approach that we feel is necessary for us to have in order to eliminate those mistakes that cost us to lose those close games."

Hamilton and his staff have worked tirelessly since their arrival on improving Florida State's program in every way possible and will continue to see the fruits of their labor in 2004-05. The Seminoles enter the season with two senior leaders who understand Hamilton's system and appear ready to sustain the winning feeling they have come to know; a skilled group of players who tasted

success as both starters and reserves last season and a recruiting class that has the potential to be one of the best in the history of the program.

Hamilton must find a way to make up for the loss of All-ACC First-Team selection Tim Pickett who led the Seminoles in nearly every statistical category last season. Pickett, who led the Seminoles in scoring and 3-point shots made among many other statistics, has taken his game to the NBA's New Orleans Hornets.

"We are excited about the upcoming season because I think our best basketball is ahead of us," said Hamilton. "We think we are heading in the direction we need to be in order to become a good program."

As with every team he has coached, Hamilton will lean upon his senior class to provide leadership. His senior class consists of forwards Anthony Richardson and Adam Waleskowski - two players who have grown

accustomed to the Seminoles' system.

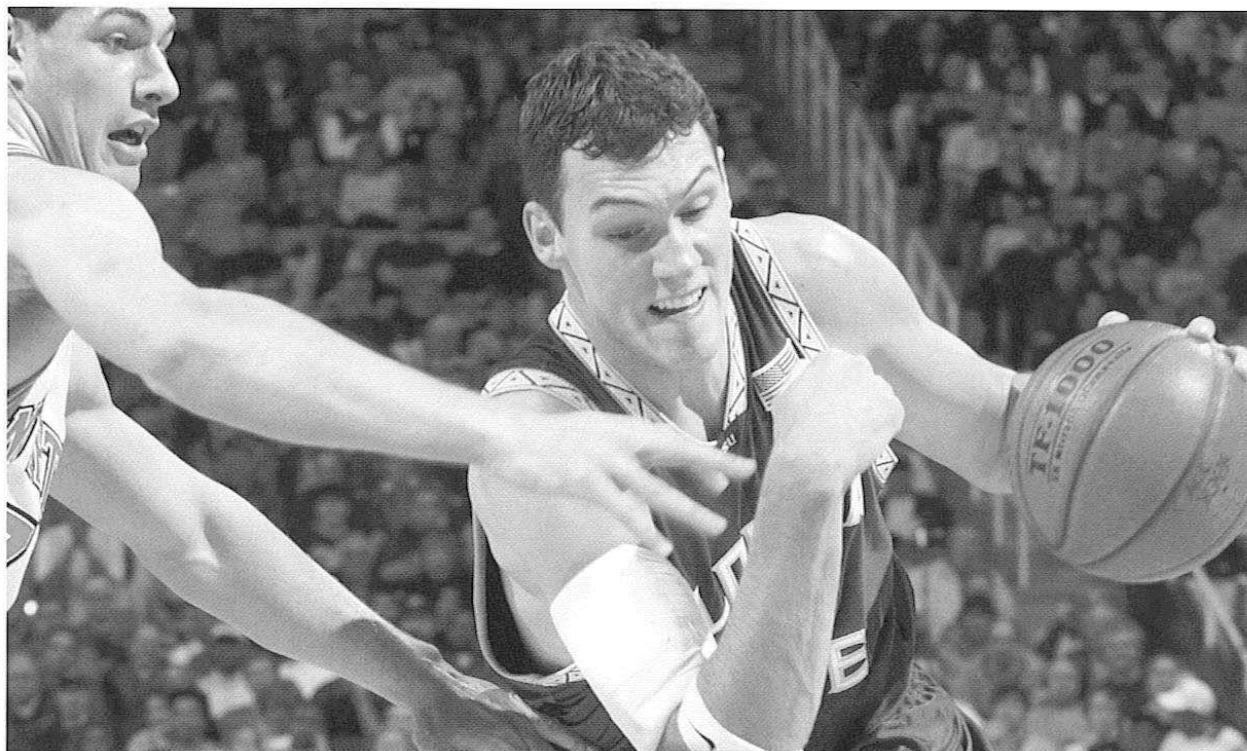
Richardson and Waleskowski will be two of the most experienced players in the ACC during the season. The pair of forwards has combined to play in 181 games (90 by Richardson and 91 by Waleskowski), score 1,234 points (605/429), pull down 717 rebounds (382/335), block 109 shots (68/41), earn 140 steals (81/59) and make 76 3-point shots (49/27). The duo has been a part of seven victories over ranked teams including wins against No. 1-ranked Duke (77-76, Jan. 6, 2002), No. 7-ranked North Carolina (90-81, Jan. 22, 2004) and No. 10-ranked Georgia Tech (81-65, Feb. 3, 2004).

Richardson, a high-flying, 6-7 forward from Raleigh, N.C., has displayed consistent improvement in the two years since Hamilton's arrival. His continued development as a dependable scorer and rebounder will help him earn increased playing time throughout the season. Richardson's

experience, explosive athletic ability and steadily increasing basketball knowledge will make him a dangerous player for Florida State as a senior.

Richardson enters his senior season with 805 points and needs 195 points to become only the 38th player in school history to score 1,000 or more career points. He averages 8.9 points per game for his 90-game career and is ranked 13th all-time in school history with 68 blocked shots.

"Anthony Richardson has come back for his senior year with a rejuvenated spirit and a determined focus which has excited every member of the coaching staff," said Hamilton. "He has a tremendous opportunity as a senior. When he plays as well as we know he is capable of playing he will make a major contribution to our team."

Waleskowski, who has played alongside Richardson since the two arrived as freshmen, has played in 91 consecutive

games and has never missed a game during his collegiate career. The 6-8 forward from Kettering, Ohio, will join Richardson in the Seminoles' frontcourt.

Waleskowski is one of the top inside-outside forwards in the ACC who returns as the Seminoles' leading career rebounder (335 rebounds/3.7 rpg) and second leading returning scorer (429 points/4.7 ppg). He led the Seminoles in rebounding with a career-high 5.4 rebounds per game average as a junior and was the only player in the ACC during the 2003-04 season to lead his team in rebounds while coming off the bench. Waleskowski is one of the top defensive forwards in the ACC and can take his game on the offensive as he averaged a career-high 6.8 points per game as a junior.

"Adam Waleskowski was probably our most consistent player last year," said Hamilton. "His effort on the boards was tremendous all season and he did an out-

standing job on the defensive end. He is getting better as his career progresses. We expect him to have a good year and be one of our team leaders."

Sophomore Alexander Johnson, a Freshman All-America and All-ACC Freshman Team selection in 2004, returns for his second season in the Seminoles' lineup. He is one of the top post players in the conference. Johnson became only the third Seminole in history to be named to the All-ACC Freshman Team – he joined Seminole greats Corey Louis (1995) and Michael Joiner (2001) as he finished second on the team in scoring. Johnson averaged 9.5 points per game as a freshman and is Florida State's leading returning scorer this season. He started each of the final 16 games of the season after being inserted into the starting lineup Jan. 22, 2004 against North Carolina.

Johnson ranked among the league's top





newcomers and only he and Luol Deng of Duke ranked in the top three among the ACC freshman class in both scoring and rebounding. He led the Seminoles in scoring five times and in rebounding six times during his inaugural collegiate season.

"Alexander Johnson had a tremendous year as a freshman and contributed to our success in just about every way imaginable," said Hamilton. "We are looking for him to have an outstanding season as a sophomore. He worked very hard in the off-season and is determined to be a better all-around player this season than he was last season. Alexander gives us a physical presence on the floor which teams need in order to compete at the highest level in the ACC."

Andrew Wilson, who started 17 games last season, returns healthy for the second consecutive season and should be one of the Seminoles' most productive players in 2005. He is in his fifth season in the Seminoles' program but begins the year with two years of eligibility remaining.

Wilson averaged 4.1 points and 2.0 rebounds last season and, because he is healthier this season, should realize an increase in his overall statistics. He finished among the Seminole leaders with a career-high 28 3-point field goals made including seven against North Carolina in February. When hot, Wilson is one of the straightest shooters on the team.

"Andrew Wilson appears to be on his way to a full recovery from those nagging injuries that have plagued him during the last two years of his career," said Hamilton. "A healthy Andrew Wilson will be a difference maker on our team."

An exciting addition to the Seminoles' frontcourt is junior Diego Romero. He missed the entire 2004 season after he was declared ineligible by the NCAA after transferring from Lon Morris Junior College in Texas. Romero fought to have that ruling reversed, earned a positive ruling, and was reinstated in January. He then made the

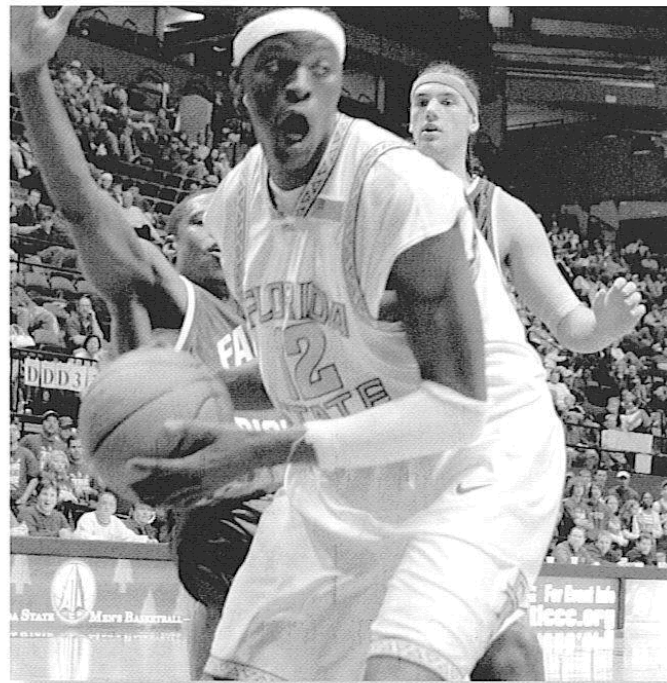
decision to redshirt the entire season and begins the 2005 season with two years of eligibility remaining.

Romero is a 6-10 forward from Comodoro, Rivadavia, Argentina. He led Lon Morris Junior College to the JUCO National Tournament twice in two years and could emerge as one of the top big men in the ACC. Romero's ability to play effectively in Florida State's up-tempo system will be a key to the team's success. He has the ability to play inside and the skill to move outside and outplay his defender in addition to shooting and passing the ball well for a player of his size. Romero sets himself apart from other big men with his outstanding ability to shoot from the outside.

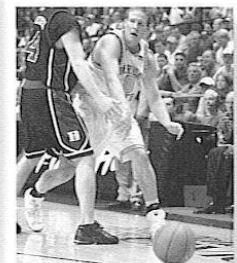
Romero averaged 14.5 points and 6.5 rebounds while shooting .554 from the field during the 2002-03 season as a sophomore at Lon Morris. He was an All-Region Second-Team selection in 2003 and a Region XIV All-Tournament Team selection as a freshman in 2002.



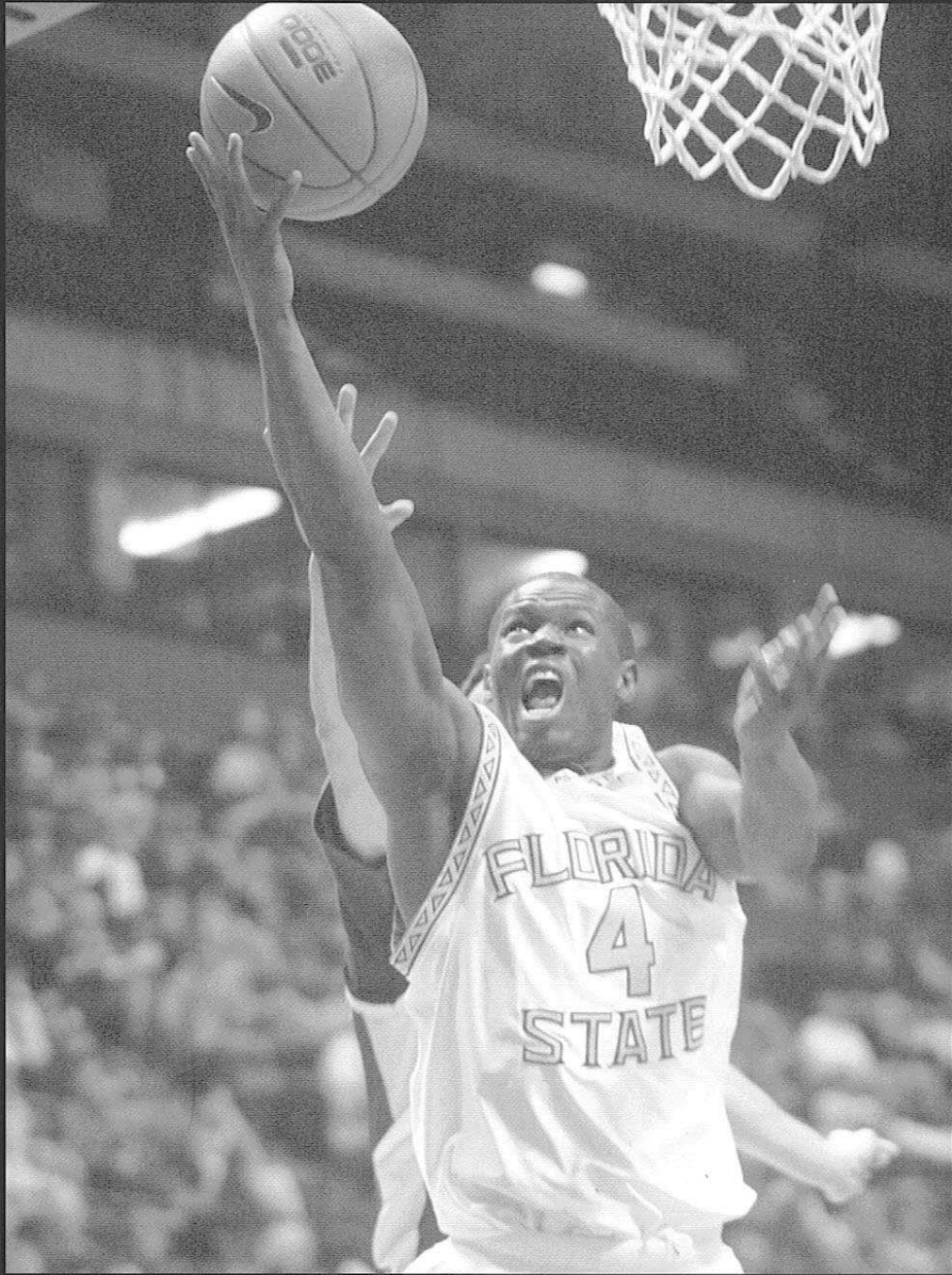
Von Wafer earned ACC Rookie of the Week honors twice during his freshman season.

"Diego Romero brings a different dimension to our basketball team this year," said Hamilton. "He is tremendously unselfish and seems to see the game in slow motion which allows him to make great decisions. Those decisions make his teammates better players when they are on the court. He is a hardnosed, tough and competitive player whose enthusiasm and tremendous attitude is contagious. His attitude is something every team needs."

Another forward who earned meaningful playing time in 2004 and is expected to be a major contributor for the Seminoles this season is Al Thornton. The athletic 6-7 forward, who is a native of Perry, Ga., played in 30 games and showed his ability to play a number of positions, including the power and small forward spots during his freshman year. He is a tremendous leaper and a dead-eye shooter.

Thornton was among the top freshmen

in the ACC in 2004 and finished among the league's best first-year players in numerous categories including field goal percentage (.517, fifth), rebounding (1.8 rpg, 13th) and scoring (2.8 ppg, 15th). Hamilton utilized his skills on both the offensive and defensive ends of the court last season.

"Al Thornton is a player for whom the sky is the limit," said Hamilton. "He has only scratched the surface of his potential. He is an extremely versatile player, who we think by the time he leaves Florida State, will be able to play three positions on the floor effectively. We are very excited about what Al Thornton brings to the table."

Junior Antonio Griffin, a transfer from Scottsdale Community College, is another forward the Seminoles' coaching staff is very excited about. He originally signed with Hamilton and Florida State in 2003 and resigned with the Seminoles in 2004. He has two years of eligibility remaining as the 2005

season begins. Griffin completed his degree requirements at Scottsdale Community College in Arizona and did not play basketball during the 2004 season.

Griffin is an outstanding athlete who is a clever slasher who can get to the basket. Among his best attributes are his abilities to shoot off the dribble, make mid-range jumpers and get to the boards to rebound well.

"Antonio Griffin brings a level of maturity to the team which will be important to a young developing team like we have," said Hamilton. "He is a very solid player who is anxious to get back on the court after a year layoff and contribute to the team."

Despite having to replace both Pickett and point guard Nate Johnson in the backcourt, the Seminoles enter the 2005 season with the strongest group of guards they have had in recent memory. Sophomore Von Wafer and junior Todd Galloway are solid returning veterans and will team with a trio of freshmen guards – Ralph Mims, Jason Rich and Isaiah Swann – who could all be listed among the top newcomers in the ACC.

Wafer, a 6-5 native of Homer, La., displayed his all-star abilities last season as he averaged 7.9 points in 32 games and twice earned ACC Rookie of the Week honors. He ranked 15th among the ACC leaders with a 1.34 3-point field goals made per game average in 2004 and was one of only three freshmen to rank in the top 15 among all conference players in that category. Wafer's 43 3-point shots made rank as the second highest total by a freshman in school history.

Wafer ranked among the freshmen class in the ACC in numerous statistical cat-

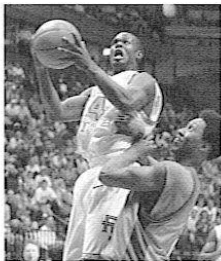

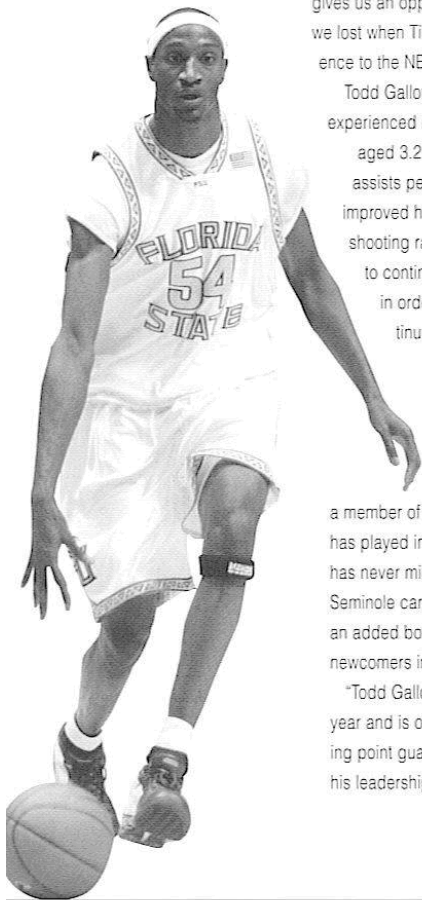

egories. He finished third among all conference freshmen with 43 3-point field goals made and ranked sixth among all conference freshmen in scoring. Wafer played well against ranked teams in his first season with a 7.7 points per game scoring average against the 15 ranked teams on Florida State's schedule.

"Von Wafer demonstrated that he has the ability to be a tremendous offensive player during his freshman season," said Hamilton. "Since the end of last season, he has made tremendous improvements in his overall understanding of the game and with his ability to play defense. He is very explosive on the offensive end and hopefully gives us an opportunity to make up for what we lost when Tim Pickett took his experience to the NBA."

Todd Galloway, the Seminoles' most experienced returning point guard, averaged 3.2 points and nearly two assists per game off the bench. He improved his ball handling skills and shooting range last season and needs to continue his overall improvement in order for the Seminoles to continue to improve as a team.

Galloway is one of the top returning point guards in the ACC who has recorded 171 assists (2.8 apg) during his first two years as a member of the Seminoles' rotation. He has played in 62 consecutive games and has never missed a game during his Seminole career. His experience will be an added bonus as he works with the newcomers in the Seminoles' lineup.

"Todd Galloway has improved each year and is our most experienced returning point guard," said Hamilton. "We need his leadership to give direction to our

younger point guards who have joined our team this season. Todd has a real good grasp now of what we expect of him."

Hamilton sees an extremely bright future for the three newcomers in the backcourt. All three played at a very high level in high school, excelled against that tough competition and will all be impact players for the Seminoles in 2005.

Mims averaged 28.9 points, 11.4 rebounds, 5.5 assists and 4.5 steals as a senior and was named Mr. Basketball in the state of Maine his senior season in addition to earning All-State First-Team honors three times during his career. With Mims as a four-year starter, Brunswick won 95 percent of their games with an 81-4 record while he averaged 22.5 points per game. Mims is comfortable playing both the point and shooting guard positions and will be asked to play both during his Seminole career.

Rich averaged 21.5 points, 4.5 assists, 2.9 steals and shot .550 from the field as a senior in 2004 and was his team's leading scorer in all but two games as a senior. He earned All-State First-Team honors and was a *Parade Magazine* All-America selection as a senior. Rich is one of only four 2004 Parade All-Americans who will play in the ACC in 2005. He was rated as the 28th best high school player in the nation as a senior by Rivals.com.

Swann averaged 23.8 points, nine assists and seven rebounds in leading Hargrave Military Academy to the mythical national prep championship with a 25-1 record in 2004. He played the true point guard position at Hargrave in 2004 after playing the combo guard position during the majority of his prep career. Swann was ranked as the nation's 34th best high school player in 2004 by Rivals.com.

"We need our freshmen to contribute early in order for us to be successful," said Hamilton. "They are a group we feel fit into our system very well and we are confident that they will be successful players at Florida State. They need to gain experience early because we are going to need them to mature quickly as we get into conference play."

The entire squad must gain experience early and mature quickly as the Seminoles are scheduled to face six teams who played in the 2004 NCAA Tournament, two who played in the NIT, and six teams who won at least 20 games in 2005. The Seminoles are scheduled to play 16 games at the Donald L. Tucker Center including games against national finalist Georgia Tech, national semi-finalist Duke and intra-state rival Florida as they attempt to advance to the postseason for the second consecutive season.

Florida State will play a 16-game ACC schedule – the same as it has since joining the league for the 1991-92 season. The Seminoles will play eight conference games at home including Duke, North Carolina and new conference members Virginia Tech and Miami. The Seminoles will also play eight conference games on the road including at Maryland, at NC State and at North Carolina.

"I like the chemistry that seems to be developing with this team," said Hamilton. "They are growing closer together as a family. They spend an awful lot of time together. You get the sense that they enjoy spending time with each other. That makes a big difference in the mindset of an unselfish basketball team on and off the court."

## With Four Of Its Five Leading Scorers And Three Of Its Top Five Rebounders Back, The Seminoles Look To Continue Their Climb.

### Florida State Stealing Ways To Continue

Florida State finished third in the ACC and came within 32 steals of establishing the all-time single season school record for steals with 291 during the 2003-04 season. With the exception of All-ACC First-Team and All-ACC Defensive Team selection Tim Pickett, many of those fast hands return to the Seminoles' roster for the 2004-05 season. Led by senior Adam Waleskowski (30 steals) and sophomore Alexander Johnson (27 steals) the Seminoles return five players who had 20 or more steals last season.

### Seminole Among ACC Steals Leaders

Florida State enters the 2004-05 season as one of five ACC teams with five or more returning players who earned 20 or more steals last season. Senior Adam Waleskowski is the Seminoles' leading returner - he recorded a career-high 30 steals as a junior.

A total of six current Seminoles - seniors Anthony Richardson and Adam Waleskowski, sophomores Von Wafer and Alexander Johnson and freshmen Jason Rich and

Isaiah Swann - all played in the prestigious Jordan Capital Classic following the conclusions of their high school careers.

Richardson and Waleskowski played in the event in 2001, Johnson in 2002, Wafer in 2003 and Rich and Swann in 2004.

Swann, a guard, scored 10 points to lead all current Seminoles in the game while five of the six current Florida State players earned starting assignments in their particular game.

### Seminole Current ACC Leader With Six Capital Classic Players

Florida State enters the 2004-05 season as the ACC leader with six Jordan Capital Classic alumni on its roster. The Seminoles have twice as many players who have played in the Capital Classic in the last four years (six) than any other ACC team including Maryland (three), Wake Forest (three), North Carolina (three) and Duke (two).

### Seminole Ironmen

A trio of Florida State players - senior Adam Waleskowski, junior Todd Galloway and sophomore Alexander Johnson - have never missed a game during their Seminole careers. Waleskowski has played in 91 consecutive games during the first three years of his career while Galloway has played in all 62 games during the last two years and Johnson is the only Seminole returner who played in all 33 games during the 2003-04 season. Waleskowski enters his senior season looking to become only the 28th player in school history to play in 100 or more games during his career. The school record for games played is 122 by Rodney Dobard from 1990-93. Dobard missed only eight games during his career and led Florida State to the NCAA Tournament in 1991, 1992 and 1993. Florida State had nearly twice as many wins (84) as losses (46) and recorded a winning percentage of .646 while Dobard was a member of the team.

### Hamilton Earns Extension Of Contract Through 2009-10

Florida State Director of Athletics Dave Hart announced May 19, 2004 that the contract of Seminole head men's basketball coach Leonard Hamilton has been extended by three years taking him through the 2009-2010 season.



In two seasons as Seminole head coach, Leonard Hamilton has seen a dramatic turnaround in the Seminole fortunes.

"In extending and transforming Coach Hamilton's contract to a six-year agreement, we are rewarding him for the outstanding leadership he continues to provide," said Hart. "We are also reinforcing the message that we view him as the right person to lead our men's basketball program to a level of excellence within a 12-team Atlantic Coast Conference and nationally as well."

"I believe we are very fortunate to have Leonard and his staff providing the leadership it takes to reach the goals we all have for Seminole Basketball," Hart added.

Hamilton's base pay increased from \$144,599 to \$152,144 in the new contract.

"I appreciate the confidence that the Florida State administration has shown in our staff," said Hamilton. "The university and athletics department have made a strong commitment which shows that having a successful basketball program is important. We appreciate the opportunity to continue to move our program forward. We believe FSU can achieve at the very highest level of college basketball and we are glad to have ample time to continue to reach our goals."

The Seminoles finished 19-14 and advanced to the second round of the NIT Tournament during the 2003-04 season. Florida State was 14-15 in Hamilton's first season in 2002-2003. Florida State's Tim Pickett earned First-Team All-ACC honors this past season.

Florida State's appearance in the NIT was its first postseason appearance since the 1998 season - a span of six seasons.

Hamilton came to Florida State after coaching the NBA's Washington Wizards in 2000-01. Prior to his NBA stint, Hamilton was head coach at Miami (Fla.) from 1990-2000 and Oklahoma State from 1986-1990. He was Big East Coach of the Year in both 1994-95 and 1998-99.

## Leading The Seminoles In Field Goal Shooting

Sophomore Alexander Johnson became the third freshman in school history to lead Florida State in field goal percentage shooting when he led the Seminoles with a .551 mark last season. Johnson became the first freshman since the 1993-94 season to lead the team in shooting from the field. Of the three freshmen who were team field goal percentage leaders, Johnson averaged 9.5 points per game – tops among the three players.



In addition to his offensive prowess, Johnson was an anchor of the defense as well, tallying 20 blocked shots and 27 steals in 2003-04.

## The Emergence Of Alexander Johnson In 2003-04 Will Provide A Boost For 2004-05 Hopes.

### Johnson Makes His Mark As A Starter

Sophomore center Alexander Johnson, who became the third Seminole in

school history to earn All-ACC Freshmen Team honors in 2004, was a starter in Florida State's final 16 games of his inaugural season. He averaged more points, more rebounds and more minutes played per game while averaging fewer fouls and a better free throw percentage as a starter as compared to the first 17 games of the season when he came off the bench.

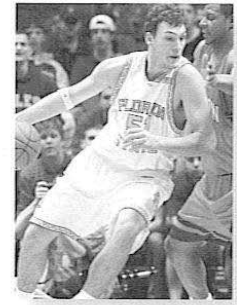

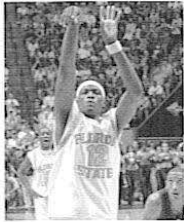

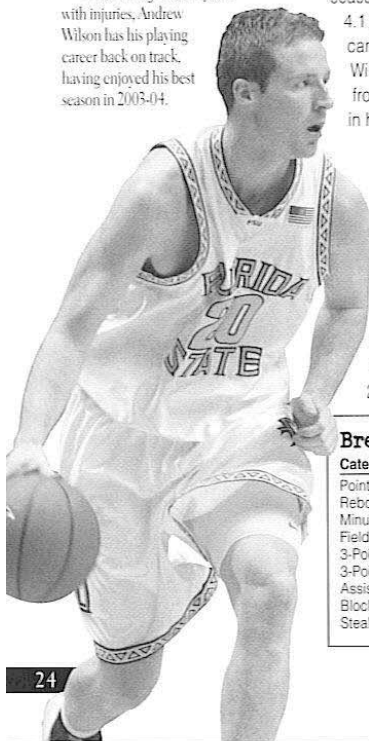

Forward Al Thornton attempted 42 free throws in his 30 games played during the 2003-04 season as he found a way to get himself to the line throughout the season. He made his final four attempts of the season and was 11-of-16 (.688) from the line against Seminole opponents who played in the NCAA Tournament.

After sitting out two years with injuries, Andrew Wilson has his playing career back on track, having enjoyed his best season in 2003-04.

inflammation of the Achilles' tendon in his right heel in order to decrease pain in that region of his foot. He has been rehabilitating under the direction of team trainer Sam Lunt since the surgery and will continue working on strengthening the tendon throughout the offseason. ### Keeping Wilson On The Court

A key to Florida State's continued improvement on the court is the continued improvement of junior forward Andrew Wilson. After enduring two consecutive medical redshirt seasons in 2001-02 and 2002-03, Wilson enjoyed the best year of his career during the 2003-04 season. He averaged a near career-high 4.1 points per game as he played in a career-high 32 games last season. Wilson nearly matched his statistics from his first 36 games (three years) in his 32 games played last season.

### Wilson In Seventh Heaven

Junior Andrew Wilson became only the seventh player in school history to make seven or more 3-point field goals in a single game when he made seven from long range against North Carolina Feb. 21, 2004. His seven 3-point field

goals against the Tar Heels allowed Wilson to establish a single game school record for ACC games only in scoring his career high of 24 points.

### Galloway Among Career 3-Point Shooting Leaders

Junior guard Todd Galloway enters the 2004-05 season ranked 16th in school history with a .340 shooting percentage from 3-point range. Galloway is ranked just behind former Seminole Antwan Dixon (1999-02) who finished his four-year career with a .342 shooting percentage from long range. Galloway will long be remembered for hitting one of the most memorable shots in school history – a 3-pointer – with eight seconds remaining in regulation against North Carolina Jan. 22, 2004 to tie the game at 78. The shot brought the Seminoles even after trailing by as many as 24 points in the first half and by 14 at halftime. Florida State won the game, 91-80, in overtime in a comeback widely regarded as the greatest in school history.

### Galloway From The Free-Throw Line

Junior guard Todd Galloway shot a career-high .686 from the free-throw line as a sophomore and enters his third season as a Seminole with a career .661 mark. The two biggest free throws of his career came in Florida State's 75-70 victory over No. 10-ranked Wake Forest Jan. 25, 2004 in the Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center. He scored what proved to be the

game-winning points as he sank two free throws with 45 seconds remaining in the game after he was fouled by Wake Forest's Kyle Visser on a rebound. His two free throws brought the Seminoles from a 70-69 deficit to a 71-70 lead. Galloway and his teammates held the Deacons scoreless over the final 2:18 of the game to gain the monumental win and even Florida State's ACC record at 3-3.

### Galloway's Assist Total Continues To Mount

### Florida State To Play At Minnesota In ACC/Big Ten Challenge

Florida State will travel to play Minnesota in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge Tuesday Nov.

30 at Williams Arena on the University of Minnesota campus. The game is one of nine which matches nine of the 11 Atlantic Coast Conference teams against nine of 11 Big Ten teams in a battle for conference supremacy and the Commissioner's Cup with the ACC looking for its sixth consecutive win in the series.

Florida State and Minnesota have met five times in their histories with the Gophers holding a 3-2 advantage. Florida State won its first ever meeting against the Gophers in the second round of the 1972 NCAA Tournament in a win that helped the Seminoles advance in the tournament where they later met UCLA in the national championship game.

Florida State and Minnesota have met once previously in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge with the Gophers defeating the Seminoles, 76-71, in a game played at the Leon County Civic Center in Tallahassee.

Florida State has a 3-2 record in five appearances in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge and defeated Northwestern, 71-53, during the 2003 challenge. The Seminoles defeated Northwestern during the 1999 challenge

and Iowa during the 2002 challenge. Florida State is undefeated, 2-0, under Head Coach Leonard Hamilton in the challenge.

Led by All-ACC Freshmen Team selection Alexander Johnson, Florida State returns four of its top five scorers and three of its top five rebounders from the winningest Seminole team since 1998. Johnson averaged 9.5 points and 4.2 rebounds and ranked among the top three newcomers in the ACC in both categories. Adam Waleskowski, Florida State's leader in rebounding (5.4 rpg) and blocked shots (0.7 bpg), also returns for the Seminoles along with senior Anthony Richardson and sophomore Von Wafer. Richardson and Wafer ranked third and fourth on the team in scoring during the 2003-04 season.

Since 2000, the ACC and the Big 10 have combined to make 10 Final Four appearances and have captured three of the last five NCAA Championships.

### Trio Of Seminole Freshmen Enjoy Standout Season

Florida State's trio of freshmen - center Alexander Johnson, guard

Von Wafer and forward Al Thornton - enjoyed fine seasons individually and even better seasons collectively. All three of the Seminoles' players of the futures played in at least 30 games with Johnson earning 16 starting assignments. Johnson was named to the ACC All-Rookie Team and Wafer earned ACC Rookie of the Week honors twice during his inaugural season. Johnson

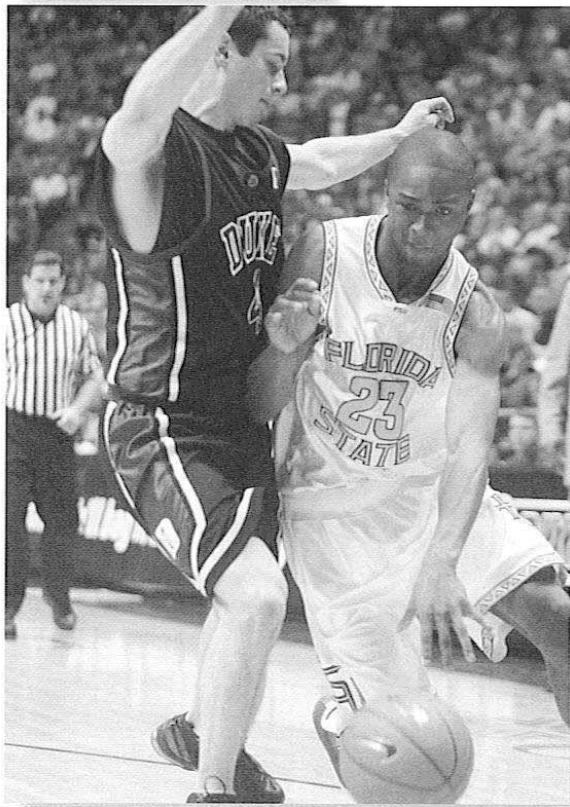

Florida State was 13-4 against non-conference opponents in 2003-04 and 10-3 against non-ACC opponents in 2002-03 for a two-year total of 23-7 and a winning percentage of .767. The Seminoles won their first 10 non-conference games of the 2003-04 season with its only losses coming at Pittsburgh and at Florida. Florida State's only two non-conference losses last season came at Florida and against Boston University in the University of Arizona Tournament. The Seminoles have won 16 of their last 19 games (.842) heading into the 2004-05 season against teams who don't call the ACC home.

Four players who are all ranked among the top newcomers to collegiate basketball – Antonio Griffin (Compton, Calif.), Ralph Mims (Pensacola, Fla.), Jason Rich (Pensacola, Fla.) and Isaiah Swann (Germantown, Md.) – have all signed National Letters of Intent and will join the Seminoles for the 2004-05 season as Seminole head coach Leonard Hamilton and his staff have assembled one of the nation's top recruiting classes for the second consecutive season. Griffin averaged 16.0 points and 7.4 rebounds per game as a sophomore in 2002-03 at Scottsdale (Ariz.) Community College. Mims averaged 28.9 points, 11.4 rebounds, 5.5 assists and 4.5 steals as a senior at Brunswick High School and was named Mr. Basketball in the state of Maine his senior season. Rich averaged 21.5 points, 4.5 assists, 2.9 steals and shot .550 from the field as a senior at Dr. Phillips High School and earned Parade All-American Third Team honors. Swann averaged 23.8 points, nine assists and seven rebounds in leading Hargrave Military Academy to the mythical national prep championship with a 25-1 record in 2003-04.
