18th Season as a Collegiate Head Coach (245-258, .487) eonard Hamilton is a winner who displays his incredible range of abilities with each task he faces during a given day. Those tasks range from coaching his players to

recruiting future All-Americans to overseeing his players' academic progress. He works to ensure that each of his players is achieving at his highest level and encourages them to reach greater heights than even they thought could be achieved.

He has approached his job the same way since becoming a collegiate coach more than 30 years ago and continues to achieve incredible success with every challenge he accepts.

Now in his fourth season as the head coach at Florida State and 18th as a collegiate head coach, Hamilton relies on the knowledge he has gained as a coach in the nation's top three conferences and continues to work tirelessly to build the Seminoles into a program of significance both in the Atlantic Coast Conference and across the nation.

With improvements to every aspect of Florida State's program – talent, depth, recruiting and commitment to the overall excellence of the team and its players – coming under his leadership, the Seminoles have become one of the most talked about teams in the nation.


Hamilton led the Seminoles to the second round of the NIT in 2004, improved the team's victory total in two of his first three seasons, recruited and coached only the second All-ACC First-Team selection in school history, landed three of the nation's top recruiting classes (including the consensus No. 1-ranked class in the nation in 2003) and defeated six nationally ranked teams since his arrival at Florida State. Hamilton has made Seminole basketball an event in Tallahassee and returned the pride to Florida State alumni and fans across the nation.

Hamilton was hired on March 19, 2002 to return the Seminole men's basketball program to the glory it had earned when it played for the 1972 national championship and regularly competed for, and won, conference championships during the 1980's and early 1990's.

Hamilton was the Washington Wizards' head coach in 2001 and the head coach at the University of Miami for 10 years prior to that (1991-00) when he became the eighth head coach in Florida State men's basketball history.

In his final season at Miami, Hamilton guided the Hurricanes to their second straight 20-win season, a share of the Big East regular season championship and the school's first trip to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Hurricanes finished 23-11, including a 13-3 conference record, and were ranked 23rd in the nation in the final Associated Press poll and 20th in the final USA Today/ESPN poll. Miami's 23 wins matched the team's 1998-99 total and, at the time, tied the school record for victories in a season.

Under Hamilton's leadership, Miami became one of the nation's top programs, advancing to postseason play five times in his final six seasons including three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances from 1998-2000. Miami's winning records in his final six seasons meant the Hurricanes joined Syracuse and Connecticut as the only Big

East schools to have an overall winning record from 1995-2000. The Hurricanes' 48-22 Big East mark over his last four seasons tied Connecticut for the best conference record over that period. Over his last two seasons, Miami registered a league-best 28-6 conference record for a .824 winning percentage.

In his final season with Miami, Hamilton's Hurricanes recorded three wins over ranked teams including a 74-70 home win over No. 18 St. John's, marking the sixth straight season Miami had defeated a ranked opponent in Miami Arena.

In the 40 seasons prior to Hamilton's arrival, the Hurricanes reached the postseason just four times including one NCAA tournament appearance (1960). In his 10 seasons at Miami, Hamilton led the Hurricanes to five postseason appearances.

Along with the rise of the Hurricanes' program, Hamilton's players also continued to develop and win individual awards. In 1999-2000, guard Johnny Hemsley earned Second-

Team All-Big East honors while center Mario Bland was named to All-Conference Third-Team.

In 1998-99,

Hemsley and forward Tim James were named All-Big East First-Team. The Hurricanes joined Syracuse (eight times), Georgetown (twice), Pittsburgh, St. John's and Villanova as the only schools to have two players named All-Big East First-Team in the same season. In 10 seasons under Hamilton, the Hurricanes had 13 All-Conference selections.

In 1998-99, Tim James was named Big East Co-Player of the Year, along with Connecticut's Richard Hamilton, and Johnny Hemsley was selected as the league's Most Improved Player.

The Hurricanes' nine-win conference increase tied Louisiana Tech for the best in the nation. Miami's eight-win overall improvement tied for the third best single season increase in school history.

At the conclusion of the 1995 season, Hamilton was named the United Press International National Coach of the Year.

His peers also recognized Hamilton as the league coaches tabbed him Big East Conference Coach of the Year for the first time.

Hamilton took home even more hardware at the end of the 1999 season. He was named Big East Coach of the Year for the second time joining Jim Calhoun, Lou Carnesecca, Jim Boeheim, John Thompson and P.J. Carleisimo as the only coaches to win the award more than once. Hamilton was later honored as the *Eastern Basketball* Coach of the Year. In 2000, he was named the Black Coaches Association (BCA) Coach of the Year.

Hamilton understands that defense wins championships. Under his tutelage the Hurricanes became one of the nation's top defensive teams. Miami ranked nationally in field goal percentage defense in each of his last four seasons including a No. 1 national ranking in 1997-98. In his final season, the Hurricanes ranked 22nd in the nation in field goal percentage defense holding teams to 39.4 percent shooting. In 1998-99, the Hurricanes ranked 13th in the nation holding teams to 38.4 percent shooting. Since his arrival at Florida State, the Seminoles have become the toughest team to score against in the ACC and led the league in scoring defense in 2003.

Hamilton has continued that tradition since coming to Florida State. The Seminoles ranked seventh in the nation in field goal percentage defense and 16th nationally in steals per game in 2002-03. Tim Pickett, a Hamilton recruit and All-ACC First-Team selection, led the conference in steals with 82 during the 2003 season. He became only the third player in school history to lead the ACC in steals. During the 2003-04 season, the Seminoles finished eighth nationally in 3-point field goals made per game and 21st in field goal percentage defense. In addition, Pickett finished 10th in 3-point field goals made per game and 18th nationally in steals per game.

Despite all his success on the court, Hamilton never lost sight of his No. 1 priority: the student-athlete. His number one goal is to help prepare his players for the challenges they will encounter in life. In his 10 seasons at Miami, 28 of Hamilton's 31 seniors received their degrees. In three seasons at Florida State, he has helped 12 of 12 seniors earn their degrees including Pickett, a 2004 NBA second round draft selection of the New Orleans Hornets.

For his work both on and off the court, Coach Hamilton was honored as one of four finalists for the 2000 Coach Wooden "Keys to Life" Award. The award is given annually to a coach who best exemplifies Coach John Wooden's philosophy of emphasizing the fact that impacting the life of a student is more significant than any winning percentage. He was named one of Tallahassee's Top 33 citizens in 2004 by the *Tallahassee Democrat*.

Hamilton arrived at Miami from Oklahoma State where he spent four years rebuilding the Cowboys' program. He led them to consecutive appearances in the NIT, the first back-to-back postseason appearances for OSU since 1953-54.

Prior to his tenure at Oklahoma State,
Hamilton was on the staff at the University of
Kentucky where he spent 12 seasons with one
of the top programs in the country. From
1974-80, he served as an assistant coach,
and in 1980 he was honored by being named
the first associate head coach in Kentucky
basketball history.

During his 12 seasons at Kentucky, the Wildcats registered a 296-83 (.781) record, won eight SEC regular season championships, two SEC tournament titles, went to three Final Fours and won the national title in 1978.

Hamilton's coaching career began at Austin Peay State University where he served as a graduate assistant from 1971-73 and then as a full-time assistant from 1973-74. The Governors won back-to-back Ohio Valley Championships in Hamilton's last two seasons at the school. Hamilton recruited and

coached James "Fly" Williams, the 1974 conference Player of the Year and two-time all-conference selection. Williams was a two-time consensus All-America in 1973 and 1974, the only two-time All-America in school history. The Governors won the OVC Championship and played in the NCAA Tournament in 1973.

He played at Gaston (NC) Community
College where he set a school record by scoring 54 points in a game, and later at the
University of Tennessee-Martin where he is a
charter member of the school's hall of fame.
At both schools he served as a team captain.
Additionally, while at Tennessee-Martin,
Hamilton received both the team Most

Valuable Player Award and the Best Defensive Player Award his senior season.

He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education from Tennessee-Martin in 1971, and received a master's degree in physical and health education from Austin Peay State in 1973.

tan Jones is in his fourth season as the associate head coach at Florida State and in his 10th season as a coach on the collegiate level. He

has helped guide six teams into the post-season and coached eight all-conference players in his first nine years at the collegiate level. Considered to be one of the preeminent coaches and recruiters in the nation, Jones helped Florida State advance to the second round of the NIT in 2004, has attracted three consecutive top-15 recruiting classes to Tallahassee and coached only the second All-ACC First-Team selection in school history during his first three years at Florida State.

Jones was instrumental in attracting the nation's No. 1 recruiting class to Florida
State in 2003. Four different college basket-ball outlets – Rivals.com, the Official College
Sports Network, Hoopmasters.com and the

Louisville Courier Journal –
ranked the Seminoles' recruiting
class as the nation's best. It
marked the first time in Florida
State men's basketball history that

the Seminoles had recruited the nation's top class. He was named one of college basket-ball's top 25 recruiters in 2004.

The Seminoles ranked seventh nationally and second in the ACC in field goal percentage defense in 2003, first in the ACC in scoring defense in 2003 and first in the ACC and third in the nation in 3-point shots made in 2004.

Jones was also instrumental in the development of Pickett during the 2003 and 2004 seasons. Pickett earned All-America Honorable Mention and All-ACC First-Team selection dur-

ing his two-year career at Florida
State. In 2004, Pickett became only
the second player in school history to
earn All-Conference First-Team honors.

Jones has coached four teams in the NCAA Tournament in his first nine years as a coach on the collegiate level. Jones helped coach Miami into the NCAA Tournament during three consecutive seasons (1998-2000) and coached Mississippi State into the NCAA Tournament during the 2002 season. In both instances, at Miami and

Mississippi, Jones helped both programs return to the NCAA Tournament after lengthy absences. In 1998, the Hurricanes made their first tournament appearance since reviving the program in 1985. Mississippi State, which also won the Southeastern Conference Tournament championship in 2002, had not been to the NCAA Tournament since 1996, a span of six years.

Jones was also an assistant coach to Leonard Hamilton with the Washington Wizards in 2001.

Jones began his collegiate assistant coaching career at Miami under Hamilton in 1996. During his career at Miami, he helped guide the Hurricanes to a 95-54 record for a .638 winning percentage. The 95 wins (19.0 wins per season) were the most in a five-year period for the program since the 1959 through 1964 seasons. Miami won 23

> games in both 1999 and 2000 to mark only the third time in program history (and first time since 1964) the program had won at least 20 games in consecutive seasons.

Jones, who will turn 46 during the 2005-06 season, is married to the former Olga Campos. The couple has a daughter, Shannon (23), and a son, Adam (21).

ike Jaskulski is in his fourth season as a member of Leonard Hamilton's staff at Florida State. He brings nearly 30 years of collegiate

coaching experience and knowledge of the game to the Seminoles' staff. Jaskulski is a winning coach who has recruited and developed winning basketball players throughout his career. In his seven years as a coach in the Big East (at Miami) and the ACC (at Florida State) – two of the nation's most highly rated conferences on an annual basis – he has consistently recruited the nation's most talented players and helped mold them into winners on collegiate basketball's biggest stages.

Since arriving at Florida State in 2002, Jaskulski has had his recruiting and coaching talents put to the test and has responded brilliantly. His teaching abilities helped the Seminoles advance to the second round of the NIT and win 19 games in 2004 while his recruiting expertise and coaching roots have helped the Seminoles attract three top-15 ranked recruiting classes. Florida State's recruiting class was ranked as the nation's best for the first time in the history of the program in 2003.

Jaskulski's expertise has helped the Seminoles become one of the nation's most improved defensive teams in the last three years. The Seminoles finished seventh in the nation and second in the ACC in field goal percentage defense and 16th in the nation and second in the ACC in steals per game in 2003. In 2004, the Seminoles were 21st nationally and second in the ACC in field goal percentage defense. The Seminoles were unranked nationally and in the bottom half of the ACC statistics prior to Jaskulski's arrival.

Jaskulski was a member of Hamilton's staff at Miami from 1994-97 when the Hurricanes made two postseason NIT appearances and played in the quarterfinal round of the Big East Tournament three times. Miami's

invitation to the NIT in 1995 was the school's first postseason tournament invitation in 31 years. In addition, Miami ranked among the nation's leaders in numerous statistical categories and increased their victory total by nine over the four-season span.


While serving as an assistant to Hamilton at Miami, Jaskulski helped the Hurricanes to the fifth best win-loss record in the Big East Conference. Miami advanced to postseason play in two of his final three years.

During the 1995 season, the Hurricanes engineered the greatest single season winloss turnaround in school history and greatest in the nation during that season. Miami finished with a 15-13 record after finishing with a 7-20 record the year before.

Jaskulski, who will turn 52 during the 2005-06 season, is married to the former Marcia Anne Hendricks, a registered nurse. The couple has two daughters: Katie (14) and Carly (9).



on the collegiate level. He has helped assemble four of the top recruiting classes in school history during his first four years in Tallahassee and has begun helping those talented players develop into a solid foundation for the future of Seminole basketball.

In his first three years as a member of the Leonard Hamilton staff at Florida State, Sheals helped the Seminoles advance to the second round of the NIT in 2004, he increased its victory total in both 2003 and 2004, attracted three top-15 ranked recruiting classes and improved every aspect of the program. Sheals' basketball expertise, recruiting knowledge and ability to communicate with players has helped the Seminoles continue to display the characteristics of becoming one of the finest all-around programs in the nation.



Sheals has been a tireless coach and recruiter since coming to Tallahassee in 2002. His efforts have paid huge dividends for the Seminoles since his arrival.

Florida State advanced to the second round of the NIT in 2004 to mark the first time since 1998 the Seminoles had played in the postseason. The Seminoles' 19 wins in 2004 were the most since 1997 and marked the second consecutive season the team had improved its victory total. The Seminoles have defeated six nationally ranked teams with Sheals on the coaching staff. Sheals helped Florida State defeat No. 3-ranked Wake Forest in 2005, No. 7-ranked North Carolina, No. 10-ranked Wake Forest, No. 10-ranked and NCAA Tournament finalist Georgia Tech, No.

24-ranked Maryland in 2004, and No. 5-ranked Duke in 2003.

His hard work on the recruiting trail has helped the Seminoles attract a pair of top-15 ranked classes including the nation's No. 1-ranked class in 2003. That class included one McDonald's All-American (Von Wafer) and one who earned All-America Honorable Mention Freshman and All-ACC Freshman Team honors (Alexander Johnson). The Seminoles' class of 2004 included two of the top-30 ranked prep players in the nation (Jason Rich and Isaiah Swann) while the program's 2005 class had four extremely talented players who all ranked among the top 40 high school players during their prep careers.

Sheals coached All-America Honorable Mention and All-ACC First-Team selection Tim Pickett during the 2003 and 2004 seasons. In 2003, Pickett became the first Seminole to lead the ACC in steals since Charlie Ward in 1994 and ranked third nationally in 3-point field goals made during the 2004 season. He was the New Orleans Hornets' second round choice in the 2004 NBA Draft.

Sheals, who will turn 48 at the end of the 2005-06 season, and his wife, Marian, have two children: a son, Drew (16), and a daughter, Marissa (10).

Sam Lunt is in his 22nd season as a member of the Florida State University athletic staff and is in his 17th as the head trainer for the men's basketball team. Fourth Season at Florida State

Michael Bradley, an integral part of head coach Leonard Hamilton's coaching staff, is in his fourth season at Florida State. Bradley is considered to be one of the top strength and conditioning coaches in Division I basketball and is credited by the Seminole players with helping them achieve extraordinary levels of performance in the weight room during his first three seasons in Tallahassee.

Bradley designed and equipped the state-of-the-art weight room in the Seminoles' Basketball Training Facility that opened in 2002. The weight room is considered to be one of the best and most complete in all of Division I sports.

Bradley also worked at the University of Miami under Hamilton from 1995-98 where he worked with eight teams, which included one NCAA Tournament and one NIT appearance by the men's basketball team.

Bradley came to Florida State from Stanford where the athletes he worked with achieved tremendous success in the weight room and on the field. At Stanford, Bradley worked directly with the men's basketball, men's swimming and field hockey teams.
