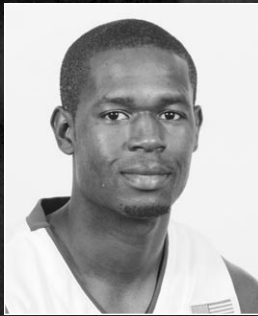

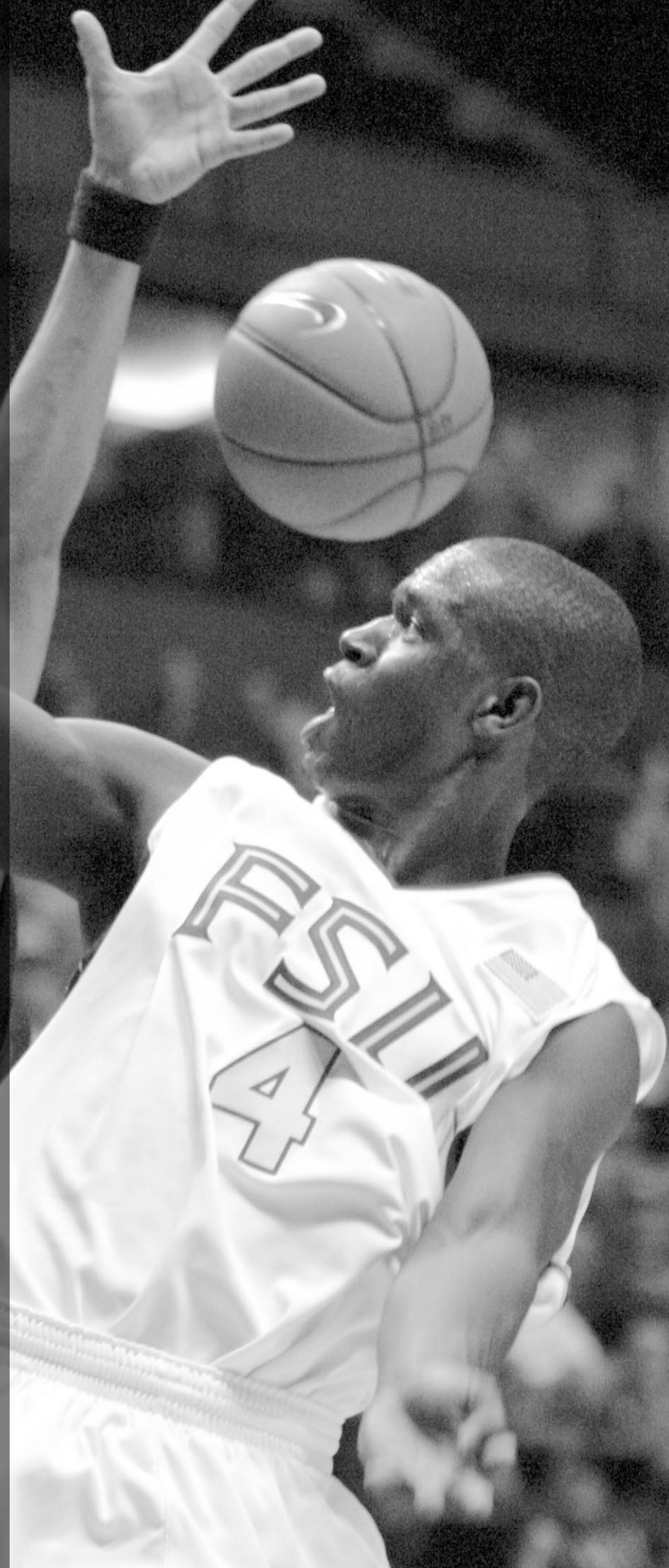

**S**enior point guard Todd Galloway enters his final season as a Seminole poised to become one of Florida State's all-time leaders in assists, steals and 3-point field goal shooting. He will be Florida State's starting point guard for the second consecutive season and is looking to become only the fifth player in school history to lead the Seminoles in assists in three seasons during his career.

**AS A JUNIOR (2005)**

- Averaged 6.1 points (sixth on the team), 2.0 rebounds (tied for eighth) and 3.0 assists (first) as the only Seminole to start all 31 games.
- Led Florida State in assists for the second time in his career with 92 and a 3.0 assists per game average.
- Enjoyed the best game of his career as he established career-high statistics with 21 points, eight field goals made, seven defensive rebounds and eight total rebounds as the Seminoles defeated No. 3 Wake Forest. Scored his career high of 21 points against the Deacons with 12 coming after halftime and nine coming in the overtime period.
- Stood out in the final five minutes of the Seminoles' victory over the Gophers as he scored seven points in the final five minutes in helping Florida State rally from as much as a 14-point deficit in the second half to win the game.

**AS A SOPHOMORE (2004)**

- Averaged 3.2 points (ninth on the team), 1.4 rebounds (tied for ninth), 2.2 assists (second) and 0.6 steals (eighth) while playing in all 33 games.
- Committed zero turnovers in 19 minutes during two NIT games – zero in nine minutes in Florida State's victory over Wichita State and zero in 10 minutes against Iowa State.

- Scored seven points, pulled down four rebounds, had four assists and two steals in Florida State's incredible victory over North Carolina in Tallahassee (Jan. 22).
- Hit one of the biggest shots during the college basketball season as he swished a 3-point shot to tie the game at 78 with eight seconds remaining in regulation. He lost Raymond Felton, his defender, and calmly sank a nothing-but-the-bottom-of-the-net 3-point shot to bring the Seminoles all the way back from 24 points down in the first half and 14 points down at halftime.
- Scored two points and added two assists and one rebound as Florida State defeated the No. 24-ranked Terps in Tallahassee (Dec. 28). Both points came on free throws with under one minute remaining in the game.
- Scored two points and had two rebounds as the Seminoles defeated No. 10-ranked Wake Forest in Tallahassee (Jan. 25). The win over the highly ranked Deacons marked the second consecutive win (and second in four days) over a team ranked in the nation's top 10 after hosting and defeating No. 7-ranked North Carolina earlier that week.

**AS A FRESHMAN (2003)**

- Averaged 6.9 points (fifth on the team), 2.1 rebounds (seventh), 3.3 assists (first) and 0.9 steals (tied for fifth) while making 23 3-point shots (fourth) and finishing with a 1.4:1 assist:turnover ratio (second).

- Ranked 10th in the ACC in assists (97) and assists per game average (3.3).
- His 97 assists during the 2002-03 season rank as the third highest single season total by a Florida State freshman in school history.
- Scored in double figures nine times including five ACC games. His ACC season high of 13 points against Duke and NC State with both games in Tallahassee.
- Scored 13 points as the Seminoles defeated No. 5-ranked Duke in Tallahassee (Feb. 2). Was three-of-four from the field and made a season-high tying seven-of-eight free throws as the Seminoles defeated the Blue Devils, 75-70. He made six second half free throws including two with 57 seconds remaining in the game to put the Seminoles up 69-65.
- Scored 10 points and pulled down two rebounds as Florida State nearly upset the 12th-ranked Terps in Tallahassee (Feb. 12). Committed only one turnover in 27 minutes (zero turnovers in 15 minutes played during the second half) against Maryland's trapping, pressure defense.

**AT NOTRE DAME ACADEMY**

- Graduated from Notre Dame Academy in 2002.
- Led Notre Dame to 55 victories during his two seasons there.
- Rated as high as No. 28 among the nation's prep seniors in 2002 by ESPN.com as he averaged 16.5 points and 7.5 assists.

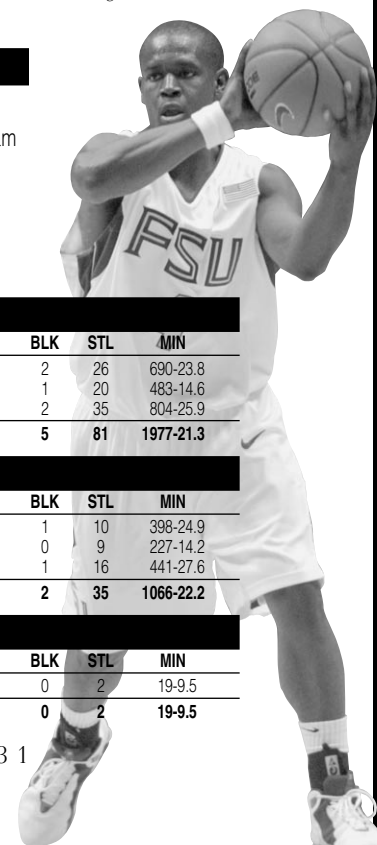

**A**ndrew Wilson returns as a starter for the Seminoles for the third consecutive season of his six-year career. He will become the first player in the history of Atlantic Coast Conference basketball to play in six different seasons in 2006. Wilson has played in three complete seasons (2000-01, 2003-04, 2004-05) and received medical redshirt exceptions during two seasons. He is a graduate student majoring in sports administration who earned his bachelor's degree during the summer of 2004 and is set to earn his master's degree at the conclusion of the spring 2006 semester.

**AS A SOPHOMORE (2002)**

- A redshirt season as he suffered a sprained MCL in his right knee against Florida in the season opener (Nov. 16).
- Played seven minutes against Florida and did not play the remainder of the season. He was injured when teammate Adam Waleskowski was pushed into Wilson and caused his knee to buckle awkwardly.

**AS A FRESHMAN (2001)**

- Averaged 4.3 points (eighth on the team) and 1.7 rebounds (eighth on the team) while playing in all 30 games.
- Ranked first on the team with a .808 free throw percentage mark.
- Scored in double figures four times to rank second among all Seminole freshmen. He scored 11 points against South Florida (Dec. 7), 11 points against Duke (Feb. 4.), 10 against Minnesota in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge (Nov. 29) and 10 against Wake Forest (Feb. 10).

**AS A REDSHIRT JUNIOR (2005)**

- Averaged 3.5 points (10th on the team), 2.3 rebounds (seventh), and 0.9 assists (fifth).
- Established career bests for games started (28), 3-point field goals attempted (76), offensive rebounds (29), defensive rebounds (42), total rebounds (71) and rebounds per game (2.3) while tying his single-season career highs for assists (27), minutes played (652) and minutes played per game (21.0).
- One of only five Seminoles (also Adam Waleskowski, Todd Galloway, Isaiah Swann and Diego Romero) who played in all 31 games during the season.

- A starter and averaged 9.0 points in two games as the Seminoles advanced to the second round of the NIT with victories over Wichita State and Iowa State to mark the Seminoles' first appearance in the postseason and first victory in the postseason since 1998.

- Started 17 games in 2003-04 – more than three times as many starts as he had earned during the first three injury-plagued years of his career.

- Made a single-season career-high 28 3-point shots during the season including a career-high seven at North Carolina during the season.

**AS A REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2004)**

- Scored three points and pulled down two rebounds in helping Florida State past Florida in the only game of the season between the in-state archrivals.
- Averaged 4.1 points (eighth on the team), 2.0 rebounds (seventh) and 0.8 assists (tied for seventh) while shooting .394 from the 3-point line (fourth) and making 28 3-point shots (fourth).

**AS A REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2003)**

- Averaged 7.8 points, 3.6 rebounds and 1.2 assists while averaging 27.2 minutes per game in five games played.
- Played in five games as a sophomore after suffering a torn ligament in his right wrist against Miami (Dec. 8) and underwent surgery Dec. 13. Injured his wrist diving for a loose ball in the first half of the Seminoles' victory over the Hurricanes. Had his wrist casted

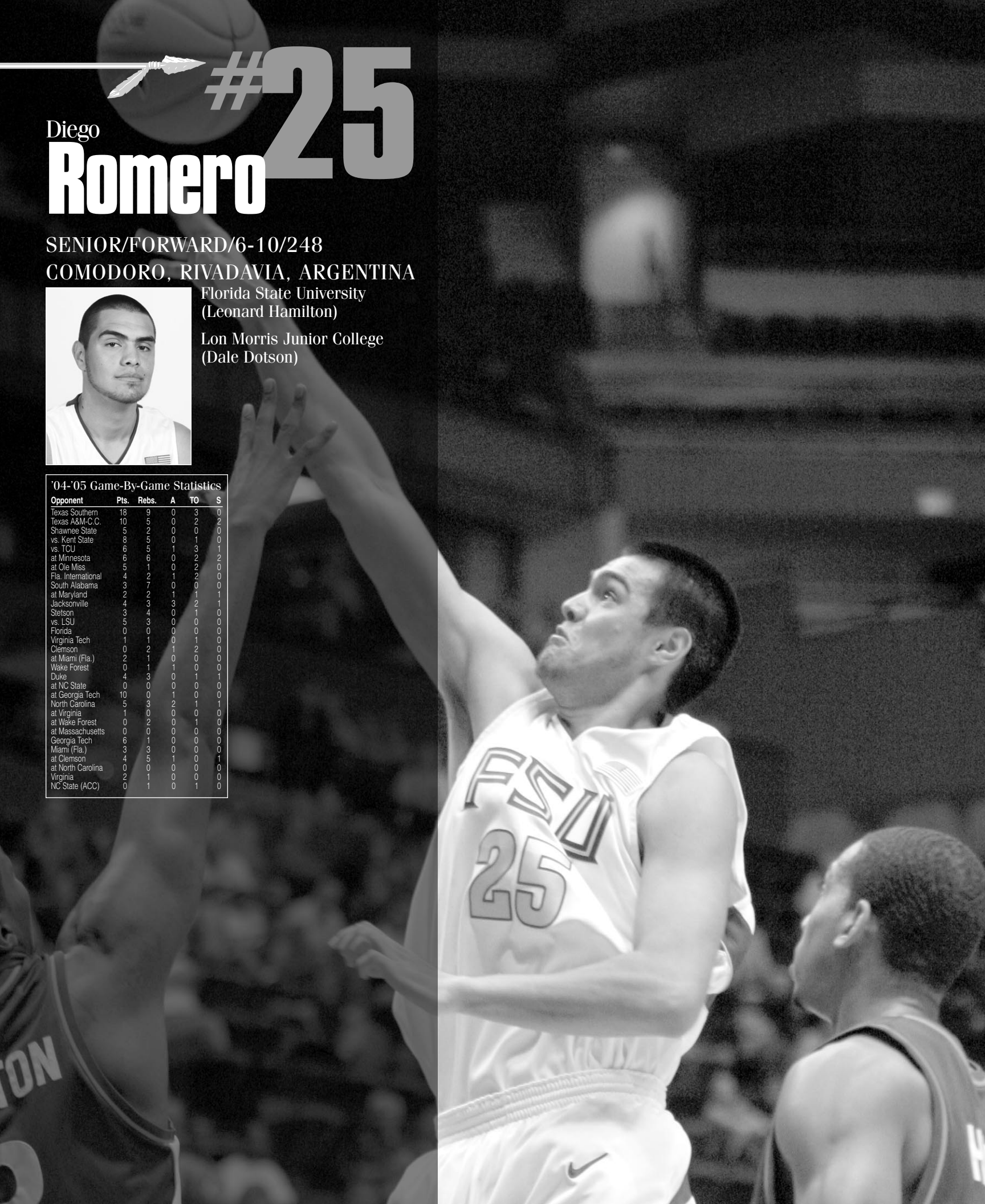

He began to display the athletic and basketball abilities known to the Seminole coaching staff when they made him their first recruit of the Leonard Hamilton era last season.

**A**lexander Johnson is an athletic and agile big man who is working on all phases of his game with the intent of becoming one of the top post players in the ACC. He begins his junior season as one of the top defenders in the ACC and is among the league's returning leaders in scoring, rebounding and blocked shots. Johnson has scored 517 points (8.2 points per game average) and pulled down 266 rebounds (4.2 rebounds per game) and is more than halfway to reaching the magical goals of 1,000 career points and 500 career rebounds with two full years of collegiate eligibility remaining.

**J**ason Rich earned All-ACC Freshman Team Honorable Mention honors by the ACC Area Sports Journal after a strong first season at Florida State. He displayed the talent and poise as a freshman which will make him a starter in the ACC during the remainder of his career. Rich will accept a leadership role for the Seminoles as a sophomore and for the remainder of his career after starting 11 of 30 games including six during ACC regular season play and the Seminoles' game against NC State in the ACC Tournament.

**AS A FRESHMAN (2005)**

- Averaged 5.4 points (seventh on the team), 2.0 rebounds (tied for eighth), 0.7 steals (fifth) and shot .707 from the free-throw line (sixth) while playing in 30 games and starting 11. His 11 starts were the sixth most on the team and the highest amount among the Seminoles' freshmen.

- Played 584 minutes and averaged 19.5 minutes played per game in his first season – the fifth highest minutes played total and fifth highest average number of minutes played of the 13 Florida State players and averaged 6.7 points and 2.4 rebounds in his 11 starts.

- Scored his career-high 12 points in his sixth career game to lead the Seminoles over Ole Miss on the road. His most important basket was his final score of the game as he earned a steal and scored on a driving, spinning layup to increase Florida State's lead to five points and make the game a two possession game. Rich's basket put the Seminoles up 69-64 with only nine seconds remaining in the game.

- Totaled 22 steals in his 30 games played with five multiple steal games including his career high of four steals against LSU.

- Scored eight points and one steal as a starter when Florida State traveled to play at Clemson (Feb. 27). All eight points came in the second half as the Seminoles attempted a furious comeback. His 3-point shot with 6:46 left in the game pulled the Seminoles to within 52-51.

- Scored five points and added three rebounds as Florida State traveled to play Georgia Tech in Atlanta (Feb. 2). His biggest shot of the game, a 3-pointer with two seconds remaining in the first half, gave the Seminoles a 33-27 lead and momentum heading into the halftime break.

Made his first career ACC start and played his career high of 31 minutes as the Seminoles opened their conference schedule. - Helped the Seminoles to a 70-64 win in Raleigh against NC State (Jan. 26) which gave the Seminoles their first ACC road win since March 3, 2001 and broke a 26-game ACC road losing streak. He scored four points including a perfect two-of-two from the free-throw line in the second half to help lead the Seminoles to the much needed victory.

- Best combination of points (10) and rebounds (five) in the Seminoles' regular season finale against Virginia in Tallahassee (March 6) as he helped the Seminoles take the 68-63 victory.

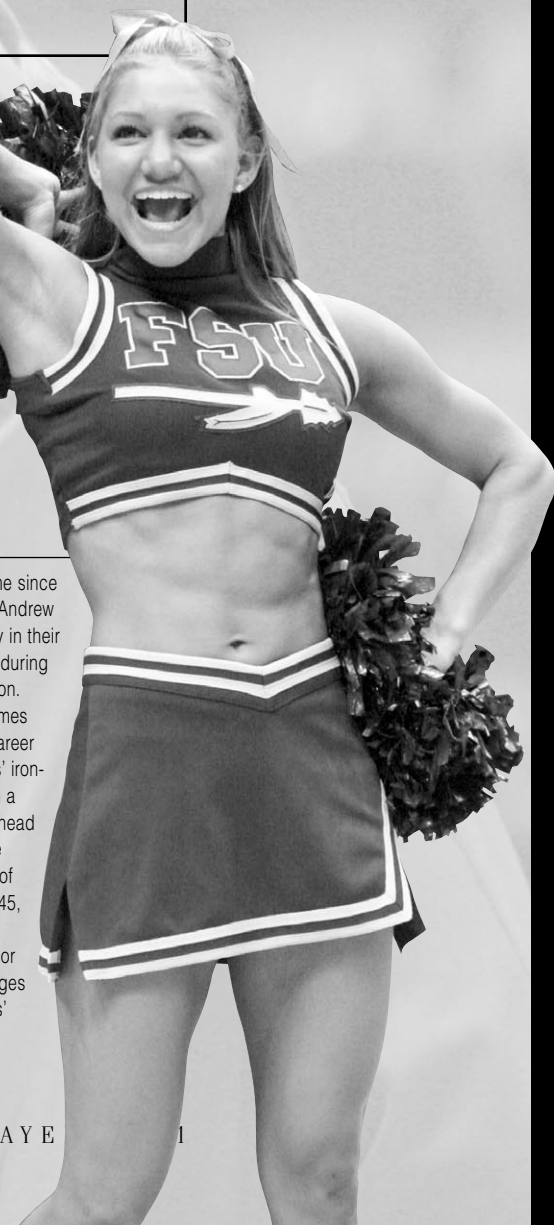


## Notes

Florida State was one of the nation's most dangerous teams during the 2004-05 season and was one of only six teams in the ACC to defeat a team ranked in the nation's top five during the season. The Seminoles defeated No. 3-ranked Wake Forest, 91-83 in overtime, on Jan. 18 in Tallahassee. During the 2004-05 season, the Seminoles defeated four teams which played in the NCAA Tournament -- a No. 2 seed (Wake Forest), a No. 4 seed (Florida), a No. 8 seed (Minnesota) and a No. 10 seed (NC State) and played 20 of their 31 games against teams who played in either the NCAA or NIT Tournaments. Overall, the Seminoles defeated five teams who played in the postseason -- Florida (NCAA), Minnesota (NCAA), NC State (NCAA), Virginia Tech (NIT) and Wake Forest (NCAA) ... Florida State's trio of talented sophomores (Ralph Mims, Jason Rich, Isaiah Swann) combined to shoot .767 from the free-throw line

and .402 percent from the field while averaging a combined 13.4 points per game and scoring in double figures a combined 12 times. All three were integral parts of the Seminole bench which averaged more than 60 percent of Florida State's scoring during the 2004-05 season. The Seminoles' bench scoring ranked first in the ACC marking the third consecutive season Florida State had led the ACC in a statistical category ... Florida State's freshmen class earned 11 starting assignments -- all by guard Jason Rich. Rich played in 30 games, Isaiah Swann played in all 31 and Ralph Mims played in 29. All three freshmen earned significant minutes during the season and all three played in at least 15 games during the ACC season ... junior guard Todd Galloway was the only Seminole to start all 31 games for the Seminoles this past season. Galloway has now started 32 games and played in 93 games during his career. He

has never missed playing in a game since his arrival at Florida State ... Both Andrew Wilson and Todd Galloway will play in their 100th career games as Seminoles during the beginning of the 2005-06 season. Wilson has played in 99 career games while Galloway has played in 93 career games. Galloway is the Seminoles' ironman -- has never missed playing in a game during his career. Seminole head coach Leonard Hamilton won more games during the first three years of his Florida State coaching tenure, 45, than he did during the first three years at Oklahoma State, 39 wins, or at Miami, 27 wins. Hamilton averages 15 wins a season as the Seminoles' head coach.
