Step-By-Step **Head Coach Leonard Hamilton – Year V:** **SUCCESS**



He's been there before.

He knows how to get there.

Now he's doing it again ... one step at a time.

Leonard Hamilton knows what it takes to build a winning program. He knows the steps he must take and the directions he needs to follow. He knows which roads to turn down and which paths will take him where he needs to go. He knows when he is about to reach his destination and he knows how to make the right moves in order to achieve his goals.

Now in his fifth season at Florida State, he is on course to achieve the goals he established for the program when he arrived in Tallahassee. As he continues to put the many features of his Florida State program solidly into place, he has the Seminoles positioned to break into the national spotlight and to develop into the elite program he knew they would when he became the seventh head coach in school history in 2002.

Hamilton has guided Florida State to the postseason in two of the last three seasons and led the team to a fifth place finish in the ACC in 2006. The Seminoles won 20 games and earned the third best ACC record in school history in advancing to the second round of the NIT. Hamilton guided Florida State to a victory over No. 1 ranked Duke on March 1, 2006 to mark the second time in school history the Seminoles had defeated the nation's No. 1 ranked team.

Hamilton continued to realize the maturation of his program as Alexander Johnson was selected in the second round of the 2006 NBA Draft – the third of his recruits to be selected in the draft in the last three seasons. In addition to Johnson, Tim Pickett was a second

round draft choice of the New Orleans Hornets in 2004 and Von Wafer a second round pick by the Los Angeles Lakers in 2005.

Hamilton was hired on March 19, 2002 to return the Seminole men's basketball program to the glory it had earned when it played for the 1972 national championship and regularly competed for, and won, conference championships during the 1980's and early 1990's.

Hamilton was the Washington Wizards' head coach in 2001 and the head coach at the University of Miami for ten years prior to that (1991-00) when he became the seventh head coach in Florida State men's basketball history.

In his final season at Miami, Hamilton guided the Hurricanes to their second straight 20-win season, a share of the Big East regular season championship and the school's first trip to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Hurricanes finished 23-11, including a 13-3 conference record, and were ranked 23rd in the nation in the final Associated Press poll and 20th in the final *USA Today/ESPN* poll. Miami's 23 wins matched the team's 1998-99 total and, at the time, tied the school record for victories in a season.

Under Hamilton's leadership, Miami became one of the nation's top programs, advancing to postseason play five times in his final six seasons including three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances from 1998-2000. Miami's winning records in his final six seasons meant the Hurricanes joined Syracuse and Connecticut as the only Big East schools to have an overall winning record from 1995-2000. The Hurricanes' 48-22 Big East mark over his last four seasons tied Connecticut for the best conference record over that period. Over

his last two seasons, Miami registered a league-best 28-6 conference record for a .824 winning percentage.

In his final season with Miami, Hamilton's Hurricanes recorded three wins over ranked teams including a 74-70 home win over No. 18 St. John's, marking the sixth straight season Miami had defeated a ranked opponent in Miami Arena.

In the 40 seasons prior to Hamilton's arrival, the Hurricanes reached the postseason just four times including one NCAA tournament appearance (1960). In his ten seasons at Miami, Hamilton led the Hurricanes to five postseason appearances.

Along with the rise of the Hurricanes' program, Hamilton's players also continued to develop and win individual awards. In 1999-2000, guard Johnny Hemsley earned All-Big East Second-Team honors while center Mario Bland earned All-Conference Third-Team honors.

In 1998-99, Hemsley and forward Tim James earned All-Big East First-Team honors. The Hurricanes joined Syracuse (eight times), Georgetown (twice), Pittsburgh, St. John's and Villanova as the only schools to have two players earn All-Big East First-Team honors in the same season. In ten seasons under Hamilton, the Hurricanes had 13 All-Conference selections.

In 1998-99, Tim James was named Big East Co-Player of the Year, along with Connecticut's Richard Hamilton, and Johnny Hemsley was selected as the league's Most Improved Player.

Miami's rise began in 1994-95 when Hamilton led the Hurricanes to the greatest single season turnaround in Big East history. Picked to finish at the bottom of the Big East Conference standings, Hamilton guided the Hurricanes to a fifth-place finish and a berth in the National Invitational Tournament – Miami's first postseason appearance in 31 years.

Miami set a Big East record in 1995 for the greatest single-season improvement in league history. The Hurricanes' nine-win conference increase tied Louisiana Tech for the best in the nation. Miami's eight-win overall improvement tied for the third best single season increase in school history.

At the conclusion of the 1995 season, Hamilton was named the United Press International National Coach of the Year.

His peers also recognized Hamilton as the league coaches tabbed him Big East Conference Coach of the Year for the first time.

Hamilton took home even more hardware at the end of the 1999 season. He was named Big East Coach of the Year for the

second time, joining Jim Calhoun, Lou Carnesecca, Jim Boeheim, John Thompson and P.J. Carlesimo as the only coaches to win the award more than once. Hamilton was later honored as the Eastern Basketball Coach of the Year. In 2000, he was named the Black Coaches Association (BCA) Coach of the Year.

Hamilton understands that defense wins championships. Under his tutelage the Hurricanes became one of the nation's top defensive teams. Miami ranked nationally in field goal percentage in each of his last four seasons including a No. 1 national ranking in 1997-98. In his final season, the Hurricanes ranked 22nd in the nation in field goal percentage defense holding teams to 39.4 percent shooting. In 1998-99, the Hurricanes ranked 13th in the nation holding teams to 38.4 percent shooting.

The 1997-98 Hurricanes ranked No. 1 in the nation in field goal percentage defense holding opponents to 37.9 percent shooting from the floor. The 1996-97 Hurricanes ranked No. 6 in the nation in field goal percentage defense holding opponents to just 38.0 percent shooting.

Hamilton has continued that tradition since coming to Florida State. The Seminoles ranked seventh in the nation in field goal percentage defense and 16th nationally in steals per game in 2002-03. Tim Pickett, a Hamilton recruit and All-ACC First-Team selection, led the conference in steals with 82 during the 2003 season. He became only the third player in school history to lead the ACC in steals. During the 2003-04 season, the Seminoles finished eighth nationally in 3-point field goals made per game and 21st in field goal percentage defense. In addition, Pickett finished tenth in 3-point field goals made per game and 18th nationally in steals per game.

Despite all his success on the court, Hamilton never lost sight of his No. 1 priority: the student-athlete. His number one goal is to help prepare his players for the challenges they will encounter in life. In his ten seasons at Miami, 28 of Hamilton's 31 seniors received their degrees. In four seasons at Florida State, he has helped 19 of 19 seniors earn their degrees including Pickett, a 2004 NBA second round draft selection of the New Orleans Hornets.

For his work both on and off the court, Coach Hamilton was honored as one of four finalists for the 2000 Coach Wooden "Keys to Life" Award. The award is given annually to a coach who best exemplifies Coach John Wooden's philosophy of emphasizing the fact that impacting the life of a student is more

significant than any winning percentage. He was named one of Tallahassee's Top 33 citizens in 2004 by the *Tallahassee Democrat*. Hamilton was inducted into the University of Miami Hall of Fame in 2006.

The induction marked a monumental occasion for Hamilton who earned induction into his third collegiate Hall of Fame. He was already a Hall of Fame inductee at the University of Tennessee at Martin where he received his bachelor's degree and served as the captain of the basketball team as an undergraduate player. Additionally, he is a member of the Hall of Fame at Austin Peay State University where he began his coaching career and served as an assistant coach for the Governors.

Hamilton arrived at Miami from Oklahoma State where he spent four years rebuilding the Cowboys' program. He led them to consecutive appearances in the NIT, the first back-to-back postseason appearances for OSU since 1953-54.

Prior to his tenure at Oklahoma State, Hamilton was on the staff at the University of Kentucky where he spent 12 seasons with one of the top programs in the country. From 1974-80, he served as an assistant coach, and in 1980 he was honored by being named the first associate head coach in Kentucky basketball history.

During his 12 seasons at Kentucky, the Wildcats registered a 296-83 (.781) record, won eight SEC regular season championships, two SEC tournament titles, went to three Final Fours and won the national title in 1978.

Hamilton's coaching career began at Austin Peay State University where he served as a graduate assistant from 1971-73 and then as a full-time assistant from 1973-74. The Governors won back-to-back Ohio Valley Championships in Hamilton's last two seasons at the school. Hamilton recruited and coached James "Fly" Williams, the 1974 conference Player of the Year and two-time all-conference selection. Williams was a two-time consensus All-America in 1973 and 1974, the only two-time All-America in

school history. The Governors won the OVC Championship and played in the NCAA Tournament in 1973.

Hamilton's legacy extends across the nation as seven of his former assistant coaches have moved on to become head coaches at the Division I level.

He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Tennessee-Martin in 1971 and received a master's degree in physical and health education from Austin Peay State in 1973.

Fifth Season at FSU



Stan Jones is one of the most accomplished coaches in college basketball.

Stan Jones is in his fifth season as the associate head coach at Florida State and in his 11th season as a coach on the collegiate level. He has helped guide seven teams into the postseason and coached nine all-conference players in his first 10 years at the collegiate level. Jones helped Florida

State advance to the second round of the NIT in both 2004 and 2006, has attracted four consecutive top-15 recruiting classes to Tallahassee and coached only the second All-ACC First-Team selection in school history during his first four years at Florida State.

Jones was instrumental in attracting the nation's No. 1 recruiting class to Florida State in 2003. Four different college basketball outlets – Rivals.com, the Official College Sports Network, Hoopmasters.com and the *Louisville Courier Journal* – ranked the Seminoles' recruiting class as the nation's best. It marked the first time in Florida

State men's basketball history that the Seminoles had recruited the nation's top class. He was named one of college basketball's top-25 recruiters in 2004.

Not only has Jones been influential in attracting some of the nation's top talent to play basketball at Florida State, but his coaching ability has helped develop those

talented players on the court. With Jones on the staff, the Seminoles won 20 games, finished fifth in the ACC and advanced to the second round of the NIT in 2006. Florida State advanced to the second round of the NIT and won 19 games in 2004. The Seminoles' appearance in the 2004 NIT marked the first time Florida State earned a postseason berth since 1998 and its win total was the Seminoles' highest since the 1997 season.

The Seminoles have defeated seven top-10 ranked teams in his first four years at Florida State including No. 1 ranked Duke in 2006, No. 3 ranked Wake Forest in 2005 and No. 7 ranked North Carolina in 2004. The Seminoles' victory over No. 1 ranked Duke in 2006 marked the second time in school history Florida State had defeated the nation's top ranked team.

Jones has coached three NBA draft selections in his first four years at Florida State and eight NBA selections in his 10 years as a college coach. Tim Pickett, who earned All-America Honorable Mention and All-ACC First-Team selection during his two-year career at Florida State, was a second round pick of the New Orleans Hornets in 2004 while Von Wafer was a second round pick of the Los Angeles Lakers in 2005. Alexander Johnson was an All-ACC pick and selected in the first round of the 2006 NBA Draft by the Indiana Pacers. The Seminoles are one of only two ACC teams who have had at least one player drafted in each of the last three seasons.

Jones has coached four teams in the NCAA Tournament in his first 10 years as a coach on the collegiate level. He helped coach Miami into the NCAA Tournament during three consecutive seasons (1998-2000) and coached Mississippi State into the NCAA Tournament during the 2002 season. In both instances, at Miami and Mississippi State, Jones helped both programs return to the NCAA Tournament after lengthy absences. In 1998, the Hurricanes made their first tournament appearance since reviving the program in 1985. Mississippi State, which also won the Southeastern Conference Tournament championship in 2002, had not been to the NCAA Tournament since 1996, a span of six years.

Jones was also an assistant head coach to Leonard Hamilton with the Washington Wizards in 2001.

Jones, who will turn 47 during the 2006-07 season, is married to the former Olga Campos. The couple has a daughter, Shannon (24), and a son, Adam (22).

First Season at FSU

Tim Carter, the all-time winningest head coach in University of Texas-San Antonio basketball history, is in his first season as an assistant coach at Florida State. Carter comes to the Seminoles after winning 160 games and leading the Roadrunners into the NCAA Tournament twice during his 11-year tenure at UTSA. Carter is nationally recognized as an outstanding evaluator of talent and an outstanding bench coach who has coached in the Big Ten at Northwestern, the Big Eight at Oklahoma State and the Southwestern Conference at Houston.

Carter, 50, was named the Southland Conference Coach of the Year in 1999 when he led UTSA to an 18-11 record and to only the second NCAA Tournament appearance in school history. He led the Roadrunners to the NCAA Tournament in both 1999 and 2004 to mark two of the three postseason tournament appearances in school history. Carter led UTSA to the Southland Conference Tournament championship in 1999 and 2004 – the first two conference championships in men's basketball in school history.

In 11 years (1996-2006) as the head coach at UTSA, Carter compiled a 160-152

record. Including one season as the head coach at the University of Nebraska at Omaha (1995) he has a record of 171-168.

In 26 seasons on the collegiate level as a head, assistant and graduate assistant coach, Carter has helped lead five different schools into the postseason including Oklahoma (1983 NCAA), Houston (1987 NCAA), Oklahoma State (1989 and 1990 NIT), Northwestern (1994 NIT) and UTSA (1999 and 2004 NCAA).

During his tenure at UTSA, Carter recruited and coached the top players in school history. He coached five of the six Roadrunner players who have earned Southland Conference First-Team honors including Devin Brown – the only three-time SLC First-Team selection in school history. Brown is still one of only 17 players in SLC history to have earned All-Conference honors three or more times. Two of the most noted players in NBA history – Joe Dumars (Detroit Pistons) of McNeese State (four-time All-SLC honoree) and Karl Malone (Utah Jazz) of Louisiana Tech (three-time All-SLC honoree) are among those players. Carter also recruited and coached Steve Meyer (1999) and Leroy Hurd (2004) – the Most Valuable Players of the Roadrunners two most recent conference championship teams.

Carter helped in the development of Hurd who was named the 2004 Southland Conference Player of the Year as he led the conference in scoring with a 19.4 points per game average. He also averaged 8.0 rebounds in leading UTSA to the conference regular season and tournament championships and into the NCAA tournament.

Carter began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Oklahoma from 1982-83 and was an assistant coach at Midwestern State University from 1984-86. He helped lead Houston to the NCAA Tournament in 1987 and then joined Hamilton's staff at Oklahoma State from 1987-90. While at Oklahoma State, Hamilton and Carter teamed to lead the Cowboys to the NIT in 1989 and 1990 – the first time the program had played in the postseason since the 1953 and 1954 seasons.

Carter earned an associate's degree from Hutchinson (Kan.) Community College in 1976, his bachelor's degree in education from Kansas in 1979 and a Master's in education from Oklahoma in 1984. Carter and his wife, Sheila, have two daughters, Kiara and Kortney, and a son, Wynton.

Andy Enfield

Assistant Coach

First Season at FSU



In his first season at Florida State, Andy Enfield is the most sought after shooting specialist in college and professional basketball.

Andy Enfield, a former assistant coach with the Boston Celtics and the Milwaukee Bucks, is in his first season as an assistant coach at Florida State. Enfield has worked at the highest level of basketball and with many

of the games' stars and is the nation's most sought after shooting instructor by both professional and college coaches and players.

Enfield was an assistant coach with the Boston Celtics of the NBA from 1998-2000 – a time during which he worked with head coach Rick Pitino in building the franchise into a play-off contending team. While in Boston, Enfield worked closely with five-time All-Star Paul Pierce, the Celtics first round draft choice in 1998. Pierce was named to the NBA All-Rookie team as he averaged 16.5 points and 6.4 rebounds. The Celtics continued to improve in his second season with the club as they finished with 35 victories – 16 more than they had earned the previous season.

Enfield also worked as an assistant with the Milwaukee Bucks from 1994-96 as they, too, drafted well and began a growth period that helped the franchise return to the play-offs. During his first season in Milwaukee, the team showed a 14-game improvement from the previous season and found itself in the hunt for a spot in the play-offs until late in the season. Enfield tutored Glenn Robinson (the No. 1 overall selection in the 1994 NBA Draft) and four-time All-

Star forward Vin Baker. Robinson averaged 21.9 points and Baker 17.7 as they formed one of the highest scoring and best shooting duos in the league that season.

Enfield comes to Florida State after building his company, All Net Basketball, into one of the top basketball instructional programs in the United States. He has coached over 100 NBA players on perfecting the art of shooting. His long list of success stories includes Pierce, Grant Hill of the Orlando Magic, Jason Kidd of the New Jersey Nets and Dwayne Wade of the Miami Heat.

He was a guest clinician on the topic of shooting at the NABC Coaches' Clinic at the 2005 NCAA Final Four. He has been hired as a coaching consultant for NBA teams such as the Chicago Bulls and Washington Wizards as well as numerous college basketball programs across the country. He has also been an invited clinician for basketball programs overseas and professional teams as far away as China.

Enfield is the all-time NCAA career free-throw percentage leader with a mark of 92.5% (431 of 466). He still holds nine career records at Johns Hopkins and was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2001. His 2,025 career points are nearly 500 more than any other player has scored for the Blue Jays.

Enfield's accomplishments in the classroom were just as impressive as his exploits on the basketball court at Hopkins as he earned First Team GTE Academic All-America honors as a senior and second team honors as a junior. He was also the first of four Johns Hopkins men's basketball players to earn an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship between 1991 and 1998. No other men's basketball program in the nation produced more NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients during the 1990s than Hopkins' four.

Enfield relied on his educational and business background to help develop TractManager, Inc. into the most successful document imaging and contract management company within the Healthcare and Real Estate markets. As part of the initial investment group and one of three key executives in the start up company, Enfield helped transform TractManager, Inc. into a very successful and profitable company.

Enfield earned his bachelor's degree in economics from Johns Hopkins in 1991 and a master in business administration from the University of Maryland in 1994. He earned a 3.5 grade point average as an undergraduate. Enfield and his wife Amanda, have a daughter named Aila (1).

Sam Lunt is in his 23rd season as a member of the Florida State University athletic staff and is in his 18th as the head trainer for the men's basketball team. He is the associate director of sports medicine and teaches classes in the athletic training curriculum. Lunt handles all of the medical needs for the men's basketball and Olympic sports teams throughout the year.

Lunt began working with the men's basketball team in 1988 and is the longest tenured member of the Florida State basketball staff. The Seminoles have appeared in five NCAA Tournaments, the 2004 and 2006 NIT tournaments and won the 1991 Metro Conference tournament with Lunt on the sidelines.

Lunt came to Florida State in 1983 after receiving his bachelor's degree in athletic training from the University of Miami. While at Miami, he worked as a student trainer in the Hurricane athletic department and served as an assistant trainer with the Miami Dolphins of the NFL during the summer of 1985. As a graduate assistant at Florida State, Lunt worked with the Seminole football team while earning his master's degree in sports psychology. During the 1995 spring football season, he worked for the Jacksonville Bulls of the USFL.

Lunt was a member of the training staff at the 1989 World University Games in Duisburg, Germany, the 1987 U.S. Olympic Festival and 1991 AAU Junior Olympics that were held in Tallahassee.

Lunt was named the Professional Outreach Athletic Trainer of the Year by the Athletic Trainers' Association of Florida in 2004. He became the first recipient of the award given by the ATAF to the trainer who has done their best to advance the profession and the association.

Michael Bradley, an integral part of Head Coach Leonard Hamilton's coaching staff, is in his fifth season at Florida State. Bradley is considered to be one of the top strength and conditioning coaches in Division I basketball and is credited by the Seminole players with helping them achieve extraordinary levels of performance in the weight room during his first two seasons in Tallahassee.

Bradley designed and equipped the state-of-the-art weight room in the Seminoles' Basketball Training Facility that opened in 2002. The weight room is considered to be one of the best and most complete in all of Division I sports.

Bradley also worked at the University of Miami under Hamilton from 1995-98 where he worked with eight teams, which included one NCAA Tournament and one NIT appearance by the men's basketball team.

Bradley came to Florida State from Stanford where the athletes he worked with achieved tremendous success in the weight room and on the field. At Stanford, Bradley worked directly with the men's basketball, men's swimming and field hockey teams. In addition, he assisted with the strength and conditioning efforts for the national ranked football, women's basketball, women's swimming and softball teams. During his four-year tenure at Stanford, the Cardinal won the Sears' Directors' Cup as the nation's top overall program in Division I athletics four times.

Stanford played in the NCAA Tournament each of the four years Bradley worked with the men's basketball team. In 2002, the Cardinal was 31-3 and led the nation in victories. He has also worked at the U.S. Military Academy (1994-95), South Carolina (1993-94), and Southern Methodist (1990-93) and was an assistant football coach at UC Santa Barbara (1989-90).

Bradley earned a bachelor's degree in chemistry from San Diego State in 1989 and a master's in chemistry from UC Santa Barbara in 1990.

Shaun Downey is in his fifth season as the equipment manager for the men's basketball team at Florida State. He joined the equipment staff in 2002 and works with both the men's and women's basketball teams. He was instrumental in helping to open the equipment room in the \$10 million Florida State Basketball Training Facility.

Downey works with the entire equipment staff at Florida State and has developed the policies and procedures manual for the equipment room in the basketball facility. He succeeded long-time equipment manager Gene Granger, who retired in May of 2003 after serving the Seminoles for 23 years.

player improvement through the use of expert video management.

Glick will administrate Florida State's ultra-modern digital system that allows Seminole players and coaches to instantaneously study game and practice film in order to utilize that information as a learning tool to improve their individual play and better prepare themselves for upcoming opponents. He will manage the Seminoles multi-million dollar video production unit that is housed in the Florida State Basketball Training Facility.

Glick comes to Tallahassee from Florida International University where he served as the Director of Operations for two seasons. In that position, he assisted Head Coach Sergio Rouco with on-campus recruiting visits, the Panther players' academic progress and the team budget. He also coordinated all team travel and film exchange and assisted with game scheduling. Goldsmith joined the basketball program after spending four years with the Florida Department of Corrections.

Goldsmith is a former student-athlete who earned four varsity letters as a member of the Seminole men's track and field team. In his role as the director of operations, he brings knowledge of the position after working for the Auburn University men's team in the same capacity from 2000-2004.

Ridenhour was Director of Basketball Operations at Auburn University from 1996-2004. At Auburn, he created and administered a \$2.5 million travel, salary and scholarship budget. At Florida State, his responsibilities include management of the office and team fiscal matters, team travel, academic development, dining and housing contracts and team community service projects. During the summer of 2006, Ridenhour created and instituted a team camp with 75 teams participating including multiple state champions from the southeast – the largest of its kind at Florida State.

He served as the administrative assistant for Cliff Ellis, the former head coach at Auburn and Clemson, where he was in charge of all administrative duties pertaining to the basketball team as well as overseeing the player's academic progress. Ridenhour was the director of the highly successful Cliff Ellis Basketball Camp program from 1996-04.

Ridenhour received his bachelor's degree in education from Auburn in 1995. He will complete the requirements for his Master's Degree in sport administration in Dec. of 2006.

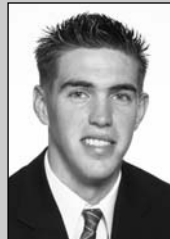
