Mims is a rock-solid guard who exhibited his outstanding value to the Seminoles with seven starting Ralph assignments at the point guard position during the 2006–07 season and has displayed his abilities in both backcourt positions to be a guard of significance in the Seminoles' rotation during his senior season. His versatility allows him to play both the lead and off guard positions while his experience of having played in 94 games through the first three seasons of his career allows him to have the confidence of the coaching staff to insert him into any situation in any arena against any team in the nation. Mims enters his senior season ranked fifth in school history with his career free throw shooting percentage of .788 (123 of 156). He set the all-time school record for consecutive free throws made, 33, from December of 2004 through December of 2005. He broke Jim Oler's record of 31 consecutive free throws made in the Seminoles' victory over Campbell on Dec. 22, 2005 in the Donald L. Tucker Center. The streak began on Dec. 21, 2004 in a victory at home against Jacksonville.

AS A JUNIOR (2006-07)

- Averaged a career-high 4.9 points (seventh on the team), a careerhigh 2.1 assists (third), a career-high 2.1 rebounds (seventh) and a career-high 19.4 minutes played per game.
- Started the first seven games of his career from Feb. 11 against Boston College through March 8 against Clemson for the injured Toney Douglas at the point quard position. He earned starting assignments against Boston College, against Georgia Tech, at Virginia, at Maryland, against NC State, at Miami and against Clemson in the ACC Tournament.
- Earned his first career win as a starter against NC State and had a record of 3-4 as the Seminoles won each of his final three starts.
- Established single-season career highs for games played (35), field goals made (52), field goals attempted (125), 3-point field goals made (25), 3-point field goals attempted (66), 3-point field goal percentage (.379), offensive rebounds (19), defensive rebounds (55), total rebounds (74), rebounds per game (2.1), assists (74), total points scored (171), average points scored per game (4.9), minutes played (680) and average minutes played per game (19.4).
- Tied his single-season career high with three double-figure scoring games — at Stetson (10 points), at home against Saint Peter's (11 points) and against NC State on Senior Day (12 points). His 12 points against NC State ranks as his career scoring best for an ACC game.
- · Played in all 16 of the Seminoles' ACC games while earning six of his seven starts during the conference regular season.
- Scored nine points and had two assists in 33 minutes of play in his first career start for Florida State versus Boston College in
- Scored three points and pulled down two rebounds in 16 minutes played as Florida State defeated NCAA Tournament participant Duke in the only meeting between the two teams during the season. The win for Florida State was the first in school history in the famed Cameron Indoor Stadium.
- · Averaged 8.5 points and 2.0 assists in two games played against Miami, earning the sixth of his seven career starts against the Hurricanes as the Seminoles traveled to Coral Gables to close out the regular season. Played one of his stronger all-around games with eight points, four rebounds, three assists and two steals in 19 minutes as Florida State defeated Miami, 86-67, in Tallahassee.
- Scored his ACC career high of 12 points and dished out a careerhigh-tying five assists in the fifth start of his career against NIT

- participant NC State. His play keyed the Seminoles to the commanding 39-21 lead at the intermission.
- Scored five points and pulled down four rebounds in 21 minutes played in the only meeting of the season between the Seminoles and Wake Forest. Helped Florida State recover from an eight-point deficit in the first half to gain the 74-66 win in Tallahassee.
- Scored five points and pulled down one rebound in 14 minutes of play as the Seminoles defeated NCAA Tournament champion Florida in the only meeting of the season between the two intrastate rivals. All five of his points came in the first half to boost the Seminoles to a 36-31 lead at the intermission. Played a flawless second half with five minutes played and zero turnovers, in the Seminoles' 70-66 victory over No. 4 Florida.
- Averaged 6.0 points and 2.5 rebounds in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Boston College. He earned a 3:1 assist:turnover ratio in 24.0 minutes per game against the Eagles with six assists and only two turnovers in 48 total minutes played.
- Made the first start of his career against Boston College as the Seminoles played host to the Eagles in Tallahassee. He earned the starting assignment at the point guard position in place of Toney Douglas who suffered a wrist injury at Clemson in the Seminoles' previous game. Mims scored nine points and had two assists in 33 minutes of play in his first career start for Florida State against the Eagles - all nine points came in the first half as he jump-started the Seminoles to an early 13-point lead and a 37-33 advantage at halftime.
- Averaged 5.5 points and 2.0 rebounds in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Georgia Tech. He earned the second start of his career at home against the Yellow Jackets, scored five points and was credited with two assists in 38 minutes as Florida State played
- Averaged 5.5 points and 3.0 rebounds in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Maryland. Had a 2:1 assist:turnover ratio against the Terps' ball-hawking defense with six assists and only four turnovers in 48 total minutes played. Totaled two points and three assists as Florida State defeated Maryland in Tallahassee and

 Averaged 2.0 points and 1.7 rebounds against Toledo, Michigan and Mississippi State in three games during the 2007 MasterCard NIT. He finished tied for second on the team with four steals in the Seminoles' three games in the tournament (1.3 spg).

AS A SOPHOMORE (2005-06)

- Averaged 3.8 points (eighth on the team), 1.5 rebounds (eighth) and 1.7 assists (third) while shooting .788 (52-of-66) from the free throw line.
- Led the Seminoles for the second time in two seasons with a team-high .788 mark from the free throw line as he made 52 of his 66 attempts from the free throw line
- Top game of his career came against Butler in the NIT as he played 28 minutes for the injured Todd Galloway and recorded six assists and zero turnovers. His performance in running the point allowed the Seminoles to defeat the Bulldogs, 67–63, and advance to the second round of the NIT for the second time in three seasons.
- Scored in double figures in a career-high three different games with more double figures as a sophomore (three) than as a freshman or junior (two).
- Scored 10 points and added two assists, one rebound and one steal in the Seminoles' victory over Texas Southern
- Totaled 11 points and earned three assists, two rebounds and two steals in the Seminoles' victory over Campbell.
- Scored his ACC season high of 11 points to go along with two rebounds, one assist and one steal in 18 minutes in Florida State's only game against NCAA Tournament participant NC State. He was one of three Seminoles to score in double figures as Florida Sate traveled to play at Raleigh. During the game he was a perfect four-of-four from the field and a perfect three-

- Averaged 6.5 points and 1.5 rebounds in two games against NCAA participant Duke. He played one of the best ACC games of his career with nine points, four assists, two rebounds and one steal as the Seminoles nearly won in Durham. His nine points against the Blue Devils ranks as his second-highest scoring total in an ACC game during his career.
- Scored four points to go along with one rebound and one steal in the Seminoles' tremendous victory over No. 1-ranked Duke in Tallahassee. 

All-ACC Candidate

Jason Rich is an All-ACC candidate as a four-year returning starter and the Seminoles' leading returning career scorer. The many abilities he has displayed during the first three years of his career on both the offensive and defensive ends of the court place him in a special class as one of the most talented all-around players in the nation's best conference for the 2007–08 season. Rich has averaged in double-figure scoring in each of the last two seasons and is the Seminoles' leading scorer with 823 total points in 95 career games beginning his senior season and is averaging 10.2 points per game in the last two seasons. He is also one of the ACC's top free throw shooters who ranked eighth in the league statistics for conference games only with a .816 free throw shooting percentage as a junior. Rich enters the 2007–08 season with 823 career points and needs only 177 points to become the 39th player in school history with 1,000 or more career points scored.

AS A JUNIOR (2006-07)

- Averaged 10.3 points (tied for third on the team), 3.5 rebounds (third) and 1.1 steals (third) while shooting a career-high .805 (first) from the free throw line.
- Played in a career-high 35 games while earning a career-high 34 starting assignments and averaging a career-high 29.9 minutes played per game.
- Established career-best statistics for games played (35), games started (34), field goals made (138), field goal percentage (.525), 3-point field goals made (14), 3-point field goal percentage (.389), free throws made (70), free throws attempted (87), free throw shooting percentage (.788), offensive rebounds (40), defensive rebounds (81), total rebounds (121), rebounds per game (3.5), assists (60), minutes played (1,047), minutes played per game (29.9) while tying his career high for steals (36).
- Scored his career high of 24 points in the Seminoles' victory over Maryland in Tallahassee and scored his career-high total of 360 points as he earned double-figure scoring a career-high 21 times including during eight ACC games, one of two games in the ACC Tournament and two of three games in the 2007 MasterCard NIT.
- His career-high 21 double-figure scoring games ranked second on the team to only All-America Al Thornton's 35-consecutive doublefigure scoring streak. He led the Seminoles in scoring three times as a junior — in victories over Southeastern Louisiana (16 points), vs. Providence (17 points) and against Miami (16 points).
- Named to the All-Tournament team at the Colonial Classic in leading the Seminoles past McNeese State, Illinois State and SMU. He was joined on the team by All-America Al Thornton and 2008 All-ACC candidate Toney Douglas.
- Averaged 15.5 points and 4.0 rebounds in two games against NCAA
 Tournament participant Boston College. He scored 15 points, pulled
 down four rebounds and earned three steals as the Seminoles
 traveled to Chestnut Hill to play at Boston College, and totaled 16
 points, four rebounds, two assists and three steals as the Seminoles
 played host to the Eagles in Tallahassee.
- Averaged 10.0 points and 3.7 rebounds in three games against NIT participant Clemson. He shot .900 from the free throw line (9-of-10) in the three meetings between the Seminoles and the Tigers and averaged 1.7 steals per game with five steals in three games against Clemson.

- Led Florida State with a career-high 24 points as it hosted Maryland in Tallahassee and took the 96–79 conference victory. The Seminoles benefited from Rich's 10 first-half points to lead virtually the entire game and evened their conference record
- Averaged 13.0 points and 5.0 rebounds while shooting nearly 70 percent from the field in two games against Miami. Rich led Florida State with 16 points as the Seminoles defeated the Hurricanes in Tallahassee 86–67 and scored 10 points and pulled down six rebounds in 35 minutes of play as the Seminoles closed out the regular season with a 98–90 victory over Miami in overtime in Coral Gables.
- Scored nine points and pulled down four rebounds in the Seminoles'
 only game against NCAA Tournament participant Virginia Tech as he
 helped lead the Seminoles early with seven first-half points as the
 Seminoles sprinted to a 39–23 lead at the intermission. In the last
 seven minutes of the victory, Rich was responsible for two points
 on a steal and five points on two baskets as the Seminoles won the
 game, going away 82–73.
- Averaged 9.3 points and 4.0 rebounds in three games as the Seminoles advanced to the quarterfinals of the NIT. He shot 61 percent from the field (11-of-18) and .857 from the free throw line (six-of-seven), averaging 30.3 minutes per game as Florida State earned a 2-1 record in advancing to the quarterfinals of the event. Rich scored 10 points and pulled down a game-high seven rebounds to lead Florida State over Toledo, 77–61, in the first round of the 2007 MasterCard NIT and was one of six Florida State players in double figures with 11 as the Seminoles defeated Michigan, 87–66, in the second round of the NIT in Tallahassee.
- Scored eight points and pulled down three rebounds in the Seminoles' victory over NCAA Tournament participant Duke in the only game between the Seminoles and the Blue Devils during the 2006–07 season. He scored four second-half points and helped the Seminoles recover from a halftime deficit and win for the first time in school history in Cameron Indoor Stadium with their 68–67 win in Durham. Rich tied the game at 49–49 with a jumper at the 11:48 mark and gave the Seminoles a one-point lead at 53–52 with 8:55 left in the game.

- Earned his career breakout game with 20 points, three rebounds and two steals in a career-high 39 minutes of play as Florida State took No. 2 ranked Duke to the limit before falling in overtime, 97–96, in one of the most memorable games of the 2005–06 college basketball season. Rich was nearly unstoppable as he made 10-of-18 field goal attempts, combining with teammate Al Thornton for 57 points in a truly amazing performance by the entire Seminole team.



 Averaged 13.5 points, 2.0 rebounds and 2.0 assists in two games against NIT participant Miami. He scored 20 points on eight-of-11 shooting from the field against Miami in Tallahassee. It marked the first time in his career that he had scored 20 or more points in a single game and the first of three times he scored at least 20 points during the 2005–06 season.

Swann, an All-ACC candidate who is one of the nation's top shooters and most athletically gifted players. returns for his third consecutive season as a member of the Seminoles' starting lineup. He finished tied for sixth in the ACC in total 3-point field goals made (68) and seventh in the ACC in 3-point field goals made (1.94) per game as a junior. Swann made an NIT and near-school-record nine 3-point field goals against Mississippi State in the guarterfinal round of the 2007 MasterCard NIT; his performance from beyond the arc allowed him to score a career-high 31 points. He averaged a career-high 10.3 points per game as a junior and allows the Seminoles to return a trio of double-figure scorers for the 2007-08 season. He enters his senior season with 118 career 3-point field goals made (eighth in school history with James Collins holding the school record at 255) and shooting .372 from the 3-point line for his career. Swann is only the 14th player in school history to make 100 or more 3-point field goals in a career, and he enters his senior season looking to become only the fifth player in school history to make 150 or more long-range shots during his career.

AS A JUNIOR (2006-07)

- Averaged a career-high 10.3 points (tied for third on the team), a career-high 3.1 assists (first) and 1.2 steals (second).
- Made a career-high 68 3-point field goals (first), shot a career-high .410 from the 3-point arc (second) while averaging a career-high 27.9 minutes played per game and playing in a career-high 35
- His 68 3-point field goals made ranks as the 11th-highest singleseason total in Florida State history.

- Led Florida State in scoring three times against Georgia Tech and against Michigan and Mississippi State in the NIT. He scored or averaged double figures against eight of the 11 ACC opponents during his junior season including 14.0 points per game average in two games against Georgia Tech.



All-ACC Candidate

Toney Douglas is an All-ACC candidate and one of the top guards in the conference who returns as the Seminoles' front man from the lead guard position for the second consecutive season. He enjoyed one of the top scoring and assist seasons of any recent Seminole point guard as he ranked second on the team in scoring (12.7 ppg) and assists (2.7 apg) in running the Seminoles' offense during the 2006–07 season for the first time. Douglas will play his second season as a starter for the Seminoles and his third as a collegian after starting at Auburn during his freshman season in 2004–05. He averaged 16.9 points and earned Freshman All-America Third-Team honors during the 2004–05 season.

AS A SOPHOMORE (2006-07)

Echefu is one of the most rapidly improving players in the ACC who will challenge for a starter position for the second consecutive season at Florida State. He saw his playing time and statistics soar during his sophomore season, and should he realize that same type of improvement during his junior season, he will be well on his way to achieving elite status among the players in the ACC and in the nation. Ecehfu's improved statistics as a sophomore began to show what his immense potential will be during his final two seasons as a Seminole.

Reid emerged as the surprise player of the year for the Seminoles during the 2006–07 season. With a high rate of continued improvement, he will develop into one of the top big men in the ACC. He displayed his abilities as a future important player for the Seminoles as he earned playing time early and often during his first season at Florida State. Reid proved to be one of the solid members of head coach Leonard Hamilton's rotation with his no-nonsense rebounding efforts and selfless play on the court. He was the only player on the team who averaged more rebounds (3.2) than he did points scored (2.9) in 2006–07.

AS A FRESHMAN (2006-07)

- Averaged 2.9 points (ninth on the team) and 3.2 rebounds (fourth) while shooting .562 from the field, averaging 16.1 minutes played per game (eighth) during his first season at Florida State.
- Was one of only seven players on the roster who played in all 35 games and one of only eight players on the team who played in all 16 ACC games.





NOTES

Florida State averages 21.0 wins and has played in the postseason in each of the last two seasons...the Seminoles defeated three ranked teams during the 2006-07 season and return four starters and four of their top five scorers from the 2006-07 season...included in Florida State's list of returning starters are senior guards Jason Rich (10.3 ppg, .805 FT %) and Isaiah Swann (10.3 ppg, 68 3FGM) who have started a combined 174 games during their careers... Rich is an All-ACC candidate as a four-year returning starter and the Seminoles' leading returning scorer...the many abilities he has displayed during the first three years of his career on both the offensive and defensive ends of the court place him in the special class as one of the most talented all-around players in the nation's best conference for the 2007-08 season...averaged in double figures scoring in each of the last two seasons and is the Seminoles' leading scorer with 823 total points in 95 career games beginning his senior season...averaged 10.2 points per game in the last two seasons...Swann is an All-ACC candidate as one of the nation's top shooters and most athletically gifted players who returns for his third consecutive season as a member of the Seminoles' starting line-up...he finished tied for sixth in the ACC in total 3-point field goals made (68) and seventh in the ACC in 3-point field goals made (1.94) per game as a junior...made an NIT and near-school-record nine 3-point field goals against Mississippi State in the quarterfinal round of the 2007 MasterCard NIT...his performance from beyond the arc allowed him to score a career-high 31 points...

averaged a career-high 10.3 points per game as a junior and allows the Seminoles to return a trio of double-figure scores for the 2007-08 season...also a returning starter is junior point guard Toney Douglas (12.7 ppg, 2.9 apg) who played in 30 of Florida State's 35 games but missed five games during the month of February with a broken right wrist...in the five games Douglas missed (Feb. 11 through Feb. 24) the Seminoles averaged 65.4 points per game on the offensive end...in the final six games of the season upon his return, the Seminoles were 4-2 and averaged 77.4 points per game...a fourth returning starter is Uche Echefu who is one of the most rapidly improving players in the ACC...saw his playing time and statistics soar during his sophomore season, and should he realize that same type of improvement during his junior season, he will be well on his way to achieving elite status among the players in the ACC and in the nation...his improved statistics as a sophomore began to show what his immense potential will be during his final two seasons as a Seminole...he scored nearly four times as many points as a sophomore (243/6.9 ppg) than he did as a freshman (68/2.3)...he pulled down 110 rebounds more as a sophomore (151/4.3) this season than he did as a freshman (41/1.4)...all four of Florida State's recruits led their high school teams to top national finishes: Julian Vaughn (Oak Hill, #1), Solomon Alabi (Montverde Academy, #4), Jordan Demercy (Norcross, #14), Chris Blake (LeFlore,




