## COVERING THE 2011-12 SEMINOLES

The 2011-12 Florida State basketball almanac has been produced to assist the media in the coverage of the Seminole men's basketball team. Additional information, including press releases, game notes, photographs, Photo CDs, video footage and recent news clips are available upon request to all members of the media. Any questions not covered in this publication may be directed to the Sports Information Office.

### Before Your Visit

Credentials for Florida State home games are issued to accredited members of the media only. Working space along press row at the Tucker Center is limited and seats are expressly reserved to those working on deadline, with no exceptions. Children and other non-workers are not allowed in the press area. Requests for credentials should be made in writing on letterhead stationary to Chuck Walsh, Deputy Director of Sports Information. If it is convenient to FAX your request, you are welcome to do so. The FAX number in the Sports Information office is (850) 644-3820. If you would rather e-mail your request, please do so. The e-mail address is [cwalsh@fsu.edu](mailto:cwalsh@fsu.edu). These requests are accepted from sports editors and sports directors only. Credential requests are carefully screened to insure proper working conditions in the press area. When time permits, a working press pass and a parking pass will be mailed. When mailing is not possible, they will be left at the Media Will Call entrance near the bottom level at the Elephant Doors located in the southwest corner of the Tucker Center. The Media Will Call is located near the television trucks and directly opposite the Florida State Basketball Training Center. Media Will Call is located at this entrance and is open 90 minutes prior to tip-off.

### Procedures

All media who wish to cover Florida State athletics will be expected to comply with all of the procedures of Florida State University, The NCAA, The ACC and the FSU Sports Information Office in order to be credentialed.

### Photography Credentials

Photographers, too, should make their credential requests at least one week in advance. Strobe lights may be installed in the Tucker Center; arrangements must be made through the Civic Center at least two weeks prior to gameday. Space for strobe lights is available on a first come, first served basis. Arrangements may be made by calling Roger Englert at (850) 487-1691. The NCAA has an established policy to control congestion within photography areas on the basketball court. Only photographers on assignment will be issued photo passes along with members of the working television media. Admission to the court and photo boxes is by photo pass only. Photographers, both still and electronic, must shoot from the baselines at the Northwest (visiting bench press row side) or Southeast (Florida State bench) corners of the court. Photographer's floor access is governed by Atlantic Coast Conference and NCAA policy. Please note, only game photographers, no runners, assistants, or producers will have access to the photography areas. Photographer positions are at the complete discretion of the basketball game officials and the Sports Information office at ALL TIMES.

### Photographers

Florida State reserves the right to admit only those photographers deemed to be on the premises for legitimate media purposes. All photographers working Florida State games should be prepared to show a media ID card and equipment designed to photograph major college basketball. Still photographers will have access to the court only. Any secondary or commercial use of any picture taken by the accredited organization or photographer to whom the credential has been issued (including, but not limited to delayed editorial, advertising sales promotion or merchandise) is prohibited without prior specific, written approval of Florida State University.

### Video Services

Florida State's Sports Information Office has the ability to assist networks and television stations by providing video services through Seminole Productions, Inc. (SPI). Please call general manager Mark Rodin at (850) 644-6275 to arrange for the services.

### Social Media

### Parking

Parking for media covering the Seminoles at the Tucker Center is available on a very limited basis. The media parking lot is located in the main Tucker Center parking lot. Access is via media parking pass only. Vehicles should enter the Tucker Center lot from Pensacola Street. They will then be directed to the appropriate area. Please contact the Sports Information in plenty of time to request a parking pass to be mailed or left at your hotel.

### Media Services

Weekly Interview Schedule: The Sports Information office will, in conjunction with head coach Leonard Hamilton, establish a weekly interview schedule throughout the 2011-12 season. The schedule, which will vary in accordance with the Seminoles' practice and game schedule, is established to assist the media

in their coverage of the Seminoles. The interviews will take place in the Florida State Basketball Training Center and will provide the media with an opportunity to speak with Coach Hamilton as well as various Seminole players. All interview requests must be made in advance and must be made with at least a 24 hours notice. Player's individual phone numbers will not be given to the media and game day interviews will not be granted until the end of each game. Players will return phone calls at a mutually convenient day and time. Media requests for specific players to be made available should be made to Deputy Director of Sports Information Chuck Walsh.

### ACC Coaches' Teleconference

Media members wishing to speak with Head Coach Leonard Hamilton are encouraged to call the Atlantic Coast Conference's weekly coaches' teleconference. Each of the 12 ACC coaches will be featured each Monday from 10:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. beginning January 3 and concluding March 5.

## GAME DAY SERVICES

### Media Room

The media room at the Tucker Center is located beneath the west side of the arena in Meeting Room B.

### Phones

A limited number of phones are available in the Tucker Center press room (calling card or reversed charges required). Members of the media may order their own phone lines for the media room or at court side through Sprint of Tallahassee. Call Sprint at (866) 366-2500 to arrange for service.

### Visiting Radio

Phone lines are reversed for both the Florida State and visiting radio network on the court level of press row. The broadcast rights to the game are granted to visiting radio stations on a reciprocal basis. Phone lines are available through an ACC agreement. Please contact Chuck Walsh of the Sports Information Office for the details.

### Press Meals

A buffet dinner is available in the Seminole Spirit Room to members of the media with a meal ticket attached to their credential. Television crews may be provided with meal tickets to accommodate talent and producers. Any catering needs for television crews should be addressed to Roger Englert of the Tucker Center (850) 487-1691.

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### Postgame Press Conference

Postgame interviews with the respective head coaches are held in the media room at the conclusion of the game. The head coach of the visiting team will be brought to the interview room immediately after the game. He will be followed by Seminole head coach Leonard Hamilton. The Florida State locker room is open to credentialed media for a brief period after Coach Hamilton concludes his comments to the team. This is in accordance with ACC rules. The visiting team's locker room access policy is determined by officials of that school. On the road, the Florida State players will be available in the locker room after Coach Hamilton concludes his remarks to the team and has left for the interview room. No live television shots, except those by the network televising the game live, will be allowed until after Coach Hamilton and the players have fulfilled their usual postgame interview responsibilities.

### Postgame Statistics

Statistical packets, including running play-by-play, first half and final box scores and postgame quotes, are compiled and available to the media at press row and in the press room following each game.

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## FLORIDA STATE BASKETBALL SEASON PREVIEW

### IT WAS SO CLOSE, THEY COULD TASTE IT.

The Florida State men's basketball team was just minutes away from a trip to the Elite Eight of the 2011 NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles had earned big wins over Texas A&M and Notre Dame in Chicago in the days prior and had the year's Cinderella squad, VCU, on the ropes in overtime.

But 7.9 seconds -- as the FSU players found out painfully -- is an eternity in sports. The Rams wound up coming from behind to earn the win and end Florida State's 2010-11 campaign. The loss stung then but Seminoles coach Leonard Hamilton says now that it was a true learning experience for his team as it enters a new season.

"I think they responded in an appropriate manner from the loss to VCU," Hamilton said. "I think that it was a very bitter taste in their mouths as to how we performed in that game. Not necessarily that we didn't play well we just left a very empty feeling in all of our minds that we could have played better. There were a lot of things that we self-inflicted ourselves and then we played a VCU team that played extremely well. They played extremely well and the issues we had were not with one particular player, it was just us as a team making a few mistakes here and a few mistakes there.

"We came away knowing that we came close and we have to come up with a way to make sure that we don't allow ourselves to feel that we could have done better."

For Florida State, improving on last year's performance and building off a current streak of a school re-

cord three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances means dealing with the loss of key players Derwin Kitchen and NBA first-round selection Chris Singleton.

Together, Kitchen and Singleton registered the top-two scoring averages on the team last year at 10.4 and 13.1 points per game, respectively. They both played more minutes on average than any other member of the team and Singleton was one of the top defensive players in the entire nation.

Despite their absence on this year's roster, Hamilton is pleased with what the Seminoles have returning.

"I think we have an experienced group returning -- six seniors and five juniors that we expect to get tremendous leadership from," Hamilton said. "I thought that we made progress last year in a lot of different areas and the biggest area that we made the most improvement was just understanding what we had to do to play at the highest level."

Hamilton will rely on that bevy of upperclassmen to keep the Seminoles at the 22-win clip that the program has averaged the last six seasons.

Luke Loucks, Deividas Dulkys and Xavier Gibson are the longest-tenured Seminoles while fellow seniors Bernard James and Jon Kreft are back for their second and final seasons in the garnet and gold. Hamilton and his coaching staff also added Arkansas transfer Jeff Peterson, who has one final year of eligibility as a graduate student. Junior-college transfer Kiel Turpin -- all 6-foot-11 of him -- joins a junior class that features standout guard Michael Snaer and ever-improving forward Terrance Shannon.

Loucks and Peterson form an interesting duo at the point guard spot -- the position that Kitchen vacated when he graduated. Rising sophomore Ian Miller could also be in the mix when it comes to manning the point position for Florida State. Miller could also factor into the shooting guard rotation where Snaer has averaged 8.8 points per game over the course of his career.

Florida State also signed highly touted freshman guard Terry Whisnant II, who brought instant offense with him from North Carolina to Tallahassee.

The Seminoles may miss Singleton at forward but James is on the verge of becoming a household name throughout the college basketball world after turning himself into a pivotal player in his first season at FSU last year. The forward rotation is bolstered by Shannon, rising star Okaro White and talented freshman Antwan Space. Gibson can play the forward and center positions along with Turpin and Kreft.

"It is very difficult to single out any one particular player because they all have displayed tremendous attitude," Hamilton said. "They have all been in and out of the office and you always see their cars parked in the parking lot, and as you're leaving they're around all the time in the gym working on their games. You know that Bernard's attitude is a reflection of the entire team. That's what we are excited about."

And it's this grouping of players that has the Seminoles excited about what the immediate future holds.

Florida State made it to the Sweet 16 last year for the first time since 1993 not solely because of Kitchen and Singleton but because of depth and talent across

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the board -- most of which is returning for another run. This time around, the Seminoles know what it will take to close out those final 7.9 seconds.

"I think that what we learned from that is that it's the little things when it gets down to those final 16 teams, everyone is capable of winning the Final Four," Hamilton said. "It's the team that does all the things the best, the longest and the hardest that comes out on top."

### SEMINOLES LOOK TO PLAY IN FOURTH CONSECUTIVE NCAA TOURNAMENT

Florida State, which is one of only two teams in the ACC that has finished in the top four of the ACC standings in each of the last three seasons, enters the 2011-12 season looking to play in the NCAA Tournament for the school record fourth consecutive season. The Seminoles advanced to the Sweet 16 of the 2011 NCAA Tournament with victories over No. 20 Texas A&M and No. 5 Notre Dame. It marked the Seminoles' first trip to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament since 1993 and the fourth time in school history they had advanced at least as far as the second week of the three week NCAA Tournament.

### DULKYS, GIBSON, LOUCKS LOOKING TO PLAY IN FOUR NCAA TOURNAMENTS

Seniors Deividas Dulkys, Xavier Gibson and Luke Loucks enter the 2011-12 season looking to become the first three players in school history to play in four consecutive NCAA Tournaments. The three seniors entered Florida State as the class of 2012 and are on track to play in four NCAA Tournaments and earn their college degrees during their four year careers. Loucks has already earned his undergraduate degree in business (August of 2011) and is pursuing a master's degree in sport administration. Dulkys (management) and Gibson (social science) are on track to earn their degrees in May of 2012.

### FLORIDA STATE - THE NATION'S TOP DEFENSIVE TEAM

Florida State, the nation's top defensive team, enters the 2011-12 season looking to become the first team since Georgetown (in 1989, 1990 and 1991) and only the third team in NCAA history (also Wyoming in 1981, 1982 and 1983) to lead the nation in the most telling of all defensive statistics - defensive field goal percentage for the third consecutive year. The Seminoles are already one of only five teams in NCAA history to lead the nation in multiple consecutive seasons and the first since Marquette in 1993 and 1994. Florida State has limited its last 69 opponents in the last two seasons to a combined shooting percentage of .3695 (1,356 of 3,670). The Seminoles combined field goal percentage defense in the last two seasons is the second lowest for a two year period recorded in NCAA

history and is rivaled by only Georgetown during the 1990 and 1991 seasons when the Hoyas limited their opponents to a .3689 mark (1,393 of 3,776).

### SEMINOLES TAKE A LIKING TO NATIONAL RANKINGS

Florida State ended the 2010-11 season ranked No. 19 in the ESPN/USA Coaches' poll and expects to open the 2011-12 season included in both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today national polls. The Seminoles have been included in virtually every preseason poll including coming in at No. 17 by the Blue Ribbon College Basketball Yearbook, No. 20 by FoxSports.com, No. 20 by Rivals.com and No. 21 by Andy Katz of ESPN.com. The Seminoles were most recently ranked in one of the national preseason polls to begin the 1993-94 season when they were ranked No. 25 in the preseason Associated Press poll.

### JAMES IS AN ALL AMERICAN CANDIDATE

Senior Bernard James, whose stock rose higher than any other player in the nation during the 2011 NCAA Tournament, begins his senior season as one of the top candidates for preseason All-American and All-ACC honors.

### SEMINOLES BEST IN THE ACC IN 51 YEARS

Florida State's defensive field goal percentage mark of .363 during the 2010-11 season was the best in the ACC since NC State's mark of .360 in 1960 - a span of 51 years.

### SEMINOLES LEAD THE ACC IN FIELD GOAL PERCENTAGE DEFENSE

Florida State enters the 2011-12 season looking to become the first team in ACC history to lead the league in defensive field goal percentage in four consecutive seasons. The Seminoles have led the league in each of the last three seasons. The Seminoles' .363 defensive field goal percentage mark in 2010-11 was the best in the ACC since the 1960 season when NC State held its opponents to a .360 mark from the field. The all-time ACC record for best defensive field goal percentage is .320 by North Carolina in 1954 - the first year of basketball in the ACC.

### FLORIDA STATE ENTERS THE 2011-12 SEASON LOOKING TO...

...Earn at least 20 wins for the fourth consecutive season. It would mark the first time in school history the Seminoles would have won at least 20 games in four consecutive seasons;

...Earn at least 10 wins in the ACC for the fourth consecutive season. It would mark the school record fourth consecutive season the Seminoles would have won at least 10 ACC games in the same season;

...Finish in the top four of the ACC standings. It would mark the school record fourth consecutive season the Seminoles have finished in the upper four of the ACC standings;

...Advance to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth consecutive season. It would mark the first time in school history that Florida State would have played in four consecutive NCAA Tournaments;

...Finish the season included in the top 25 of the national rankings. It would mark the third time in the last four years and only the second time in school history the Seminoles have been ranked in the final poll of the season in consecutive seasons. The Seminoles were ranked No. 19 in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches' in 2011 and were most recently ranked in consecutive polls following the 1992 (No. 20) and 1993 seasons (No. 11). The Seminoles have been ranked in the final polls of the 2009 (No. 22) and 2011 seasons (No. 19) after being ranked in the final poll only six times in the first 61 years of program history.

### FLORIDA STATE RETURNS EXPERIENCED TEAM

With three starters and 11 letterwinners returning to its line-up, Florida State returns one of the most experienced teams in the ACC for the 2011-12 season. The Seminoles return nearly 70 percent of their scoring and 3-point field goals made on the offensive end of the court and nearly 80 percent of their blocked shots on the defensive end of the court. Overall, the Seminoles return a roster that has played in a cumulative total of 467 overall games, 252 ACC games and in 33 total NCAA Tournament games. Add in transfer student Jeff Peterson and those numbers balloon to 550 total career games and 295 career conference games played.

**L**eonard Hamilton, the only person to be named the Coach of the Year in the ACC and the Big East, has guided Florida State to a school record tying three consecutive NCAA Tournaments and has led the Seminoles to a school record six consecutive post-season tournament appearances. He was named the ACC Coach of the Year in 2009 when he led the Seminoles to one of the top seasons in school history with 25 wins, 10 wins in ACC play, a third place finish in the ACC standings, an appearance in the ACC Tournament championship game for the first time in school history, and a No. 5 seed in the NCAA Tournament. Hamilton's coaching and recruiting has produced eight NBA Draft selections since 2004 and three of the four all-time All-ACC First Team selections in school history.

The Seminoles are the nation's top defensive team under Hamilton. They led the nation in field goal percentage defense in both 2010 and 2011 and produced three ACC Defensive Player of the Year selections - Toney Douglas in 2009 and Chris Singleton in both 2010 and 2011. Hamilton recruited and coached Al Thornton - the runner up for ACC Player of the Year honors in 2008 and Douglas who earned All-ACC First Team honors, was named the 2009 ACC Defensive Player of the Year and was the first round pick of the Los Angeles Lakers in the 2009 NBA Draft.

Hamilton is the 19th all-time winningest coach in ACC history, has led the Seminoles to the NCAA Tournament in each of the last three seasons and to the ACC Championship game in 2009 for the first time in school history. He was named the National Coach of the Year by Basketball Times, the ACC Coach of the Year by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association in 2009, and the Big East Coach of the Year in 1995 and 1999.

Florida State finished the 2010-11 season with a 23-11 overall record, an 11-5 record and a third place finish in ACC play, advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1993 and was ranked 19th nationally in the final USA Today/ESPN Poll of the season. It marked the third consecutive season the Seminoles have won at least 22 games, tied a school record third consecutive season winning at least 10 ACC games and finished top four of the ACC standings. Florida State is one of only two teams in the ACC (they are joined by only Duke) that has won at least 22 overall games, at least 10 ACC games and has finished in the top four of the ACC standings in each of the last three seasons.

Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last six years (since the start of the 2005-06 season) in total ACC regular season and ACC Tournament games. The Seminoles have won 58 games against ACC

competition in that span. In addition, Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last three seasons (since the start of the 2008-09 season) in total games won with 70 wins. The Seminoles averaged 23.3 wins per season with records of 25-10 (2008-09) and 22-10 (2009-10) in the last two seasons and 23-10 during the 2010-11 season.

Hamilton's coaching and recruiting has produced three of Florida State's four All-ACC First Team selections, including two in the last five years. One of those pupils, Al Thornton, was the 14th overall selection in the 2007 NBA Draft - just the second Draft Lottery pick in school history. In 2009, Toney Douglas earned All-ACC First Team honors, was the runner-up for ACC Player of the Year honors, was named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year and was selected in the first round of the NBA Draft by the Los Angeles Lakers. Chris Singleton, who was named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in both 2010 (media) and 2011 (coaches) was the first round pick of the Washington Wizards in 2011.

With 20 or more wins in five of the last six seasons, Hamilton is the 19th winningest coach in ACC history in overall victories and ACC wins. He enters the 2011-12 season as the second longest tenured coach in the ACC.

Hamilton is in his 10th season as Florida State's head coach in 2012. He has a career record of 354-327 (22 seasons as a collegiate head coach) and a 154-117 record at Florida State.

He is the first coach to lead Florida State to six consecutive post-season appearances as the Seminoles have participated in the 2009, 2010 and 2011 NCAA Tournaments and played in the NIT in 2006, 2007 and 2008. Hamilton has guided seven of his first nine Seminole teams into postseason play as he continues to return Florida State to a program of significance both nationally and in the ACC.

Now in his 10th season as the Seminoles' head coach, he has elevated the program in every way possible.

The Seminoles have also earned great success against ranked teams under Hamilton. The Seminoles defeated No. 1 ranked Duke in Tallahassee on Jan. 12, 2011 to mark the third time under Hamilton that Florida State has defeated the nation's top ranked team. In guiding Florida State to its 66-61 victory over No. 1 ranked Duke in 2011, Hamilton continued to put himself in a very select company as one of the nation's top coaches. He is currently tied for the national lead among coaches with the most victories over the No. 1 ranked team in the nation since the start of the 2003-04 season. Hamilton has guided Florida State to wins over No. 1 ranked Duke twice (Jan. 12, 2011 and March 1, 2006) as well as No. 1 North Carolina on March 14, 2009, in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament).

Florida State defeated four nationally ranked teams during the 2010-11 season (No. 15 Baylor on Dec. 25, 68-61, No. 1 Duke on Jan. 16, 66-61, No. 20 Texas A&M on March 18, 57-50 and No. 5 Notre Dame on March 20, 71-57). It marked the ninth consecutive season under Hamilton that Florida State has defeated at least one ranked opponent and the first time since the 2008-09 season that it has defeated at least four ranked teams in the same season. The Seminoles have now defeated 21 ranked teams during the first nine years of the Hamilton era at Florida State.

As he continues to build his program into one of the nation's best, he annually attracts the nation's top talent to Tallahassee and helps those players reach their goals of not only playing at the next level, but of excelling academically and earning their degrees.

With eight NBA Draft selections under Hamilton since 2004, the Seminoles are ranked third in the ACC for the most draft picks. Three Seminoles have been selected in the first round (Al Thornton in 2007, Toney Douglas in 2009 and Chris Singleton in 2011) and one (Thornton) was only the second draft lottery selection in school history and the third highest overall pick in school history.

Hamilton was at the 2007 NBA Draft to watch as Thornton became only the second Draft Lottery selection in school history as he was picked with the 14th overall selection by the Los Angeles Clippers. He was with Douglas when his name was called by the Los Angeles Lakers.





Hamilton watched as Solomon Alabi and Ryan Reid were selected in the second round of the 2010 NBA Draft and revealed when Singleton became the first round pick of the Washington Wizards in 2011.

Florida State has had at least one player selected in seven of the last eight NBA Drafts. All-ACC guard Tim Pickett was a second round selection of the New Orleans Hornets in 2004, guard Von Wafer was a second round selection of the Los Angeles Lakers in 2005, forward Alexander Johnson was the second round selection of the Indianapolis Pacers in 2006, Thornton was the first round pick of the Los Angeles Clippers in 2007, Douglas was the first round pick of the Los Angeles Lakers in 2009, Alabi (Dallas Mavericks) and Reid (Indianapolis Pacers) were chosen in the second round of the 2010 NBA Draft and Singleton in the first round in 2011.

Florida State is one of only three teams in the ACC with at least eight players selected in the last eight NBA Drafts. Only North Carolina (with 12 selections) and Duke (with 11 selections) have more NBA Draft picks since 2004 than Florida State among the current 12 ACC teams.

Florida State has also become a fixture in the national statistics since Hamilton's arrival.

Florida State finished the 2010-11 season as the field goal percentage defense national statistical champion with a .363 mark – the second consecutive season they have led the nation in the most telling defensive statistic kept by the NCAA. The Seminoles were the first team to repeat as the field goal percentage national champions since Marquette in the 1993 and 1994 seasons. Florida State's .363 mark ranks as the fourth lowest mark by a leader in the category since the NCAA began compiling the statistic in 1977 and lowest in the ACC since 1960 – a span of 51 years. The Seminoles became only the sixth team in NCAA history to repeat as the field goal percentage defensive national champions in 2010 and 2011. It marked the third time in the last 14 seasons that a Leonard Hamilton coached team led the nation in field goal percentage defense. Hamilton's 1998 Miami Hurricanes led the nation with a .379 mark as he took the team to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1960. Hamilton guided the Hurricanes to the NCAA Tournament in three consecutive seasons (1998-2000). In 2011, Florida State proved to have the nation's toughest defense as it ranked not only first nationally in field goal percentage defense (.363), but fifth in blocked shots (6.0 bpg), 15th in 3-point field goal percentage defense (.306), 24th in steals per game (8.3 spg) and 27th in rebound margin (+4.9 rpg). The Seminoles were the only team in the nation to finish the season ranked in the top 30 in each of those five statistical categories.

Florida State finished first nationally in the field goal percentage defense category in 2010 and 2011, ninth in the nation in field goal percentage defense in 2009 and fifth in the nation (and as the ACC leader) in free throw shooting percentage during the 2007-08 season after ranking ninth in the same category during the 2006-07 season. The Seminoles ranked eighth in the nation in 3-point field goals made per game in 2003-04 and in the nation's top 25 in field goal shooting percentage during the 2005-06 season and in field goal percentage defense during the

2003-04 season.

Hamilton was hired on March 19, 2002 to return the Seminole men's basketball program to the glory it had earned when it played for the 1972 national championship and regularly competed for, and won conference championships during the 1980's and early 1990's.

Hamilton was the Washington Wizards' head coach in 2001 and the head coach at the University of Miami for from 1991-2000 before he became the seventh head coach in Florida State men's basketball history.

In his final season at Miami, Hamilton guided the Hurricanes to their second straight 20-win season, a share of the Big East regular season championship and the school's first trip to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Hurricanes finished 23-11, including a 13-3 conference record, and were ranked 23rd in the nation in the final Associated Press poll and 20th in the final USA Today/ESPN poll. Miami's 23 wins matched the team's 1998-99 total and, at the time, tied the school record for victories in a season.

Under Hamilton's leadership, Miami became one of the nation's top programs, advancing to postseason play five times in his final six seasons including three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances from 1998-2000. Miami's winning records in his final six seasons meant the Hurricanes joined Syracuse and Connecticut as the only Big East schools to have an overall winning record from 1995-2000. The Hurricanes' 48-22 Big East mark over his last four seasons tied Connecticut for the best conference record over that period. Over his last two seasons, Miami registered a league-best 28-6 overall record for an .824 winning percentage.

In his final season with Miami, Hamilton's Hurricanes recorded three wins over ranked teams including a 74-70 home win over No. 18 St. John's, marking the sixth straight season Miami had defeated a ranked opponent in the Miami Arena.

In the 40 seasons prior to Hamilton's arrival, the Hurricanes reached the post-season just four times including one NCAA tournament appearance (1960). In his ten seasons at Miami, Hamilton led the Hurricanes to five postseason appearances.

Along with the rise of the Hurricanes' program, Hamilton's players also continued to develop and win individual awards. In 1999-2000, guard Johnny Hemsley earned All-Big East Second-Team honors while center Mario Bland earned all-conference third-team honors

In 1998-99, Hemsley and forward Tim James earned All-Big East First-Team honors. The Hurricanes joined Syracuse (eight times), Georgetown (twice), Pittsburgh, St. John's and Villanova as the only schools to have two players earn All-Big East First-Team honors in the same season. In ten seasons under Hamilton, the Hurricanes had 13 All-Conference selections.

In 1998-99, Tim James was named Big East Co-Player of the Year, along with Connecticut's Richard Hamilton, and Johnny Hemsley was selected as the league's Most Improved Player.

Miami's rise began in 1994-95 when Hamilton led the Hurricanes to the greatest single season turn-around in Big East history. Picked to finish at the bottom of the Big East

Conference standings, Hamilton guided the Hurricanes to a fifth-place finish and a berth in the National Invitational Tournament – Miami's first postseason appearance in 31 years.

Miami set a Big East record in 1995 for the greatest single-season improvement in league history. The Hurricanes' nine-win conference win increase tied Louisiana Tech for the best in the nation. Miami's eight-win overall improvement tied for the third best single season increase in school history.

At the conclusion of the 1995 season, Hamilton was named the United Press International National Coach of the Year. Peers also recognized Hamilton as the league's coaches named him Big East Conference Coach of the Year for the first time.

Hamilton took home even more hardware at the end of the 1999 season. He was named Big East Coach of the Year for the second time joining Jim Calhoun, Lou Carnesecca, Jim Boeheim, John Thompson, P.J. Carlesimo and Al Skinner as the only coaches to win the award more than once. Hamilton was later honored as the Eastern Basketball Coach of the Year. In 2000, he was named the Black Coaches Association (BCA) Coach of the Year.

For his work both on and off the court, Hamilton was honored as one of four finalists for the 2000 Coach Wooden "Keys to Life" Award. The award is given annually to a coach who best exemplifies Coach John Wooden's philosophy of emphasizing the fact that impacting the life of a student is more significant than any winning percentage. He was named one of Tallahassee's Top 33 citizens in 2004 by the Tallahassee Democrat and inducted into the Gaston County (N.C.) Hall of Fame in 2007.

The induction into the Gaston County Hall of Fame marked a monumental occasion for Hamilton who earned induction into his fourth collegiate Hall of Fame. In addition to being honored by his hometown in 2007, he is also a member of the athletic Hall of Fame at the University of Miami, the University of Tennessee-Martin where he received his bachelor's degree and served as the captain of the basketball team as an undergraduate player, and at Austin Peay State University.

Hamilton arrived at Miami from Oklahoma State where he spent four years rebuilding the Cowboys' program. He led them to consecutive appearances in the NIT, the first back-to-back postseason appearances for OSU since 1953-54. While at Oklahoma State, he recruited and coached current

Florida State assistant coach Corey Williams.

Prior to his tenure at Oklahoma State, Hamilton was on the staff at the University of Kentucky where he spent 12 seasons with one of the top programs in the country. From 1974-80, he served as an assistant coach, and in 1980 he was honored by being named the first associate head coach in Kentucky basketball history.

During his 12 seasons at Kentucky, the Wildcats registered a 296-83 (.781) record, won eight SEC regular season championships, two SEC tournament titles, went to three Final Fours and won the national title in 1978.

Hamilton's coaching career began at Austin Peay State University where he served as a graduate assistant from 1971-73 and then as a full-time assistant from 1973-74. The Governors won back-to-back Ohio Valley Championships in Hamilton's last two seasons at the school. Hamilton recruited and coached James "Fly" Williams, the 1974 conference Player of the Year and two-time all-conference selection. Williams was a two-time consensus All-America in 1973 and 1974, the only two-time All-America in school history. The Governors won the OVC Championship and played in the NCAA Tournament in 1973.

Hamilton's legacy extends across the nation as seven of his former assistant coaches have moved on to become head coaches at the Division I level. Included on the list are Tim Carter (South Carolina State), Dwight Freeman (Norfolk State), Randy Lee (Maine Machias), Dickey Nutt (Arkansas State), John Phillips (Tulsa) and Bill Self (Kansas).

He played at Gaston (NC) Community College where he set a school record by scoring 54 points in a game, and later at the University of Tennessee-Martin where he is a charter member of the school's Hall of Fame. At both schools, he served as a team captain. Additionally, while at Tennessee-Martin, Hamilton received both the team's Most Valuable Player Award and the Best Defensive Player award his senior season.

He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Tennessee-Martin in 1971 and received a master's degree in physical and health education from Austin Peay State in 1973.

SEMINOLES

**W**ith Stan Jones as Florida State's associate head coach, Florida State has played in a school record tying three consecutive NCAA Tournaments, reached the Sweet 16 of the 2011 NCAA Tournament, been ranked in the final national top 20 in two of the last three seasons and developed into one of the top three programs in the Atlantic Coast Conference. In his 10th season as the associate head coach at Florida State, Jones has helped the Seminoles build a solid program by doing what he does as well as any coach in the country: recruit outstanding talent and develop those signees into NBA level players. A total of eight Seminoles have become NBA Draft choices during his tenure at Florida State. Jones is one of the most respected coaches in all of college basketball who has an incredible ability to help young players develop into fundamentally sound basketball stars.

Jones has led Florida State to the third best record in the ACC in the last three seasons, and in 2009 he led the Seminoles to the ACC tournament championship game for the first time in school history. Along the way, the Seminoles have defeated three No. 1 ranked teams, 21 teams ranked in the national polls and he has led Florida State to three consecutive top four ACC finishes. His teaching philosophies have helped Florida State become the nation's top defensive team and his ability to teach the game of basketball has allowed the Seminoles to become one of the most fundamentally sound teams in the nation.

### TEAM SINCE JOINING

Since joining the Florida State coaching staff in 2002, Jones has helped produce results on the court that haven't been realized in years. In his tenure, the Seminoles have played in a school record three consecutive NCAA appearances for the first time since the 1991, 1992 and 1993 seasons, made a school record six consecutive postseason appearances, played in the ACC championship game for the first time in school history in 2009, won at least 19 games in seven of his nine seasons and at least 20 games in five of nine seasons, and have won 26 more conference games than the eight years prior to him coming to Florida State. Since joining the team in 2002, the Seminoles have averaged nearly 20 wins per season and have advanced to postseason play in all but two of his seasons in Tallahassee. The Seminoles advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in 2011 – the first time Florida State had advanced to the Sweet 16 since 1993.

### FLORIDA STATE IN THE ACC

With Jones as an integral part of its operation, Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last six years (since the start of the 2005-06 season) in total ACC regular season and ACC Tournament games. The Seminoles have won 58 games against ACC competition. Florida State is one of only two teams in the ACC (they are joined by Duke) who has finished with double digit wins and in the top four of the final ACC standings in each of the last three seasons. Including their 11 wins in the ACC during the 2010-11 season, the Seminoles aver-

age nearly 10 conference wins per year (9.7) since the start of the 2005-06 season. Additionally, the Seminoles are the third winningest program in the ACC in the last three years (since the start of the 2008-09 season) in total games played with 70 wins. The Seminoles average 23.3 wins per season with records of 25-10 (2008-09), 22-10 (2009-10) 23-10 (2010-11 season).

### NATIONAL RECOGNITION

As one of the top coaches in all of college basketball, Jones has been recognized several times for his achievements. As recently as 2009, he was selected as part of the elite group of assistant coaches from the input of more than 450 head and assistant coaches from around the nation. In 2008, FoxSports.com named Jones one of the top 20 assistant basketball coaches in the country. In 2004, he was recognized as one of the top coaches in the country by Rivals.com.

### POSTSEASON AND NBA DRAFT

In his 15 years as a coach at the collegiate level, Jones has helped 12 different teams into postseason play including seven into the NCAA tournament. He has also recruited and coached 13 different NBA Draft selections, including five first round picks.

### TOP RECRUITING CLASSES

In his first nine years at Florida State, Jones has helped the Seminoles on the court through recruiting. His ability to recruit players has helped the Seminoles attract 18 nationally ranked top 100 recruits, three McDonald's All-Americans and eight NBA Draft selections. Florida State's stellar recruiting classes have become the foundation of the Seminoles' success. Jones has helped bring seven top 25 recruiting classes to Tallahassee including the nation's No. 1 ranked class in 2003. Four different recruiting services – Rivals.com, CBS – The Official College Sports Network, Hoopmasters.com and the Louisville Courier Journal – all ranked the Seminoles' 2003 recruiting class as the nation's best. It marked the first time in school history that the Seminoles' recruiting class has been ranked as the No. 1 class in the nation.

### ALL SELECTIONS

Since joining the ACC, Florida State has produced four first team all-conference selections, and Jones has helped coach three of them – Tim Pickett, Al Thornton and Toney Douglas. In total, he has coached seven all-conference selections, with two second team All-ACC selections and two third team All-ACC selection on top of the three first team selections. In helping the Seminoles become the nation's most dominant defensive team, Jones has played an integral role in coaching the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in each of the last three seasons. All-American Toney Douglas was named the league's top defender in 2009 while Chris Singleton earned the honor in both 2010 and 2011. In 2011, Singleton was named the Defensive Player of the Year by the ACC's 12 head coaches.

### DRAFT PICKS

With eight NBA Draft selections in the last eight years, including three first round selections, Jones has helped Florida State become one of the top producers of NBA talent since his arrival at Florida State in 2002. Florida State's three first round selections in the NBA Draft in the last five seasons are almost as many as Florida State produced during the decade of the 1990's (four) and nearly as many as were produced in the first 50 years of the program (six). Chris Singleton was selected as the 18th overall selection in the 2011 NBA Draft and joined Al Thornton (14th overall selection in 2007) and Toney Douglas (29th overall selection in 2009) as recent first round draft picks. Singleton was a two-time ACC Defensive Player of the Year, Thornton was only the second NBA Draft Lottery selection in school history and Douglas was an All-ACC First Team selection as a senior. In the 2010 NBA Draft Solomon Alabi and Ryan Reid became the first Seminole duo to be drafted in the same year since Doug Edwards and Sam Cassell were both chosen as first round selections in 1993. Tim Pickett, who earned All-America Honorable mention and All-ACC First-Team selection during his two-year career at Florida State, was a second round pick of the New Orleans Hornets in 2004, while Von Wafer was a second round pick of the Los Angeles Lakers in 2005. Alexander Johnson was an All-ACC pick and was selected in the second round of the 2006 NBA draft by the Indiana Pacers. With eight draft selections since 2004, Florida State is ranked third in the ACC for total draft selections and total first round picks. The Seminoles were one of only two ACC teams to have at least one player drafted each year from 2004-07, and in 2010 were one of two ACC teams (Georgia Tech) to have two players selected in the same draft.

### NBA DRAFT CHOICE SOLOMON ALABI

In 2009, Jones helped sophomore center Solomon Alabi

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achieve all conference and All-ACC defensive honors as a third team selection, after earning Freshman All-America Honorable Mention and All-ACC Freshman honors the previous year. Jones was largely responsible for the development of Alabi who led the ACC in blocked shot in both 2008 and 2009. The 7-footer came to Tallahassee with seemingly limitless potential and Jones helped Alabi reach that potential. Alabi earned All-ACC defensive team honors and became only the seventh freshman in league history to lead the conference in blocked shots with 73. In his second full season of action, Jones helped the center reach even greater heights as he improved in nearly every category including rebounds per game (5.6 to 6.2), points per game (8.4 to 11.7), blocked shots (73 to 75), and free throw percentage (.680 to .794). Alabi led the team in points and blocked shots per game as well as free throw percentage. Alabi's development allowed him to become the second round draft choice of the Dallas Mavericks in 2009.

#### NBA DRAFT PICKS AL THORNTON AND TIM PICKETT

Jones is also largely credited with the development of 2007 NBA Lottery Draft pick Al Thornton, who came to Florida State as a little known freshman in 2004 and finished his career as one of the top players in school history. After averaging just 2.8 points and 7.9 minutes played as a freshman, Thornton left Florida State for the NBA as an All-America Third Team and All-ACC First Team selection, the runner-up ACC Player of the Year and the eighth-leading all-time scorer in Seminole basketball history. Thornton was named to the NBA All-Rookie Team in his first professional season. Jones's coaching talents have also been extolled for his work with Tim Pickett, who came to Florida State as a junior college transfer and left as a First Team All-ACC selection and an NBA Draft pick.

#### FSU YEAR RECORD IMPROVEMENT

Jones became an assistant coach at Florida State for the 2002-03 season and the Seminoles have realized a marked improvement in their overall play which is clearly illustrated in its record improvement on an annual basis. From the 2006 to 2011 seasons, the Seminoles experienced more 20-win seasons (five) than in the previous 16 seasons (four). The Seminoles' 20 wins in 2006 marked the first time in a decade that a Florida State team had reached that milestone. The Seminoles 25 wins in 2009 represented the first time since 1993 the team had won that many games, and became only the third time in school history (1972, 1993) the team had won 25 games. The Seminoles' current streak of 20 or more wins in three consecutive seasons marks the first time since the 1991, 1992 and 1993 seasons that Florida State has won 20 or more games in three straight years.

#### FSU TEAM STATISTICAL IMPROVEMENT

Not only has Jones helped the Seminoles improve their win-loss record, but he has also helped the team become the nation's top defensive team and nationally renowned in multiple statistical categories. Jones helped Florida State finished the 2010-11 season as the field goal percentage defense national statistical champion with a .363 mark – the second consecutive season they have led the nation in the most telling defensive statistic kept by the NCAA. The Seminoles are the first team to repeat as the field goal percentage national champions since Marquette in the 1993 and 1994 seasons. Florida State's .363 mark ranks as the fourth lowest mark by a leader in the category since the NCAA began compiling the statistic in 1977. It also marks the lowest field goal percentage defensive mark by an ACC team since 1960 – a span of 51 years – and was the seventh lowest mark in ACC history. The Seminoles became only the sixth team in NCAA history to repeat as the field goal per-

centage defensive national champions. In addition to ranking first nationally in the field goal percentage defense category, the Seminoles ranked fifth in blocked shots (6.0 bpg), 15th in 3-point field goal percentage defense (.306), 24th in steals per game (8.3 spg) and 27th in rebound margin (+4.9 rpg) and were the only team in the nation to finish the season ranked in the top 30 in each of those five statistical categories during the 2010-11 season.

#### WINS OVER RANKED TEAMS

With Jones coaching the Seminoles, the team has been able to produce on the biggest of stages. In his time at Florida State, Jones has led the team to 21 wins against teams ranked in the AP Poll, for an average of more than two wins per season versus teams in the top 25 of the national polls. Florida State defeated four nationally ranked teams during the 2010-11 season (No. 15 Baylor on Dec. 25, 68-61, No. 1 Duke on Jan. 16, 66-61, No. 20 Texas A&M on March 18, 57-50 and No. 5 Notre Dame on March 20, 71-57). Florida State has defeated at least one ranked team in each of Jones' nine seasons on Florida State's bench. The Seminoles' four wins over ranked teams in 2010-11 marked the second time since the start of the 2002-03 season that Florida State has defeated as many as four ranked teams in the same season. With two wins over nationally ranked opponents in the 2011 NCAA Tournament (No. 5 ranked Notre Dame and No. 20 ranked Texas A&M), the Seminoles are the third winningest team in the ACC against ranked teams in the ACC and NCAA Tournaments since the beginning of the 2009 ACC Tournament. The Seminoles have three wins over ranked teams in postseason play including two over top ranked opponents (No. 1 North Carolina in the semifinals of the 2009 ACC Tournament and No. 5 ranked Notre Dame in the 2011 NCAA Tournament).

#### FSU CONFERENCE

In Jones' tenure at Florida State, the Seminoles have experienced great success in one of the most competitive conferences in all of college basketball. In his nine seasons at Florida State, Jones has helped coach the team to 68 ACC wins (7.6 per season), which is a stark improvement over the 47 conference wins recorded in the previous nine seasons (5.2 per season). In the past three seasons, the Seminoles have recorded double digit ACC wins for the first time in school history. After finishing fourth in the ACC in 2009 – the teams' best finish since 1993, when they finished second – Jones helped build upon that success by coaching the Seminoles to third place league finishes in both 2010 and 2011. Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the least six years in terms of ACC regular season and ACC Tournament wins (58) and is the third winningest team in the ACC in terms overall wins since the start of the 2008-09 season (70).

#### FSU POSTSEASON

Florida State has played in a school record tying three NCAA Tournaments and a school record six consecutive postseason tournaments. In 2009, Jones helped the Seminoles return to the NCAA tournament – a position the team had not been in for over a decade. The Seminoles earned a No. 5 seed in the tournament -- the highest seed earned by Florida State since the 1992-93 season, when the Seminoles earned a No. 3 seed. In 2010, Jones helped the team reach the NCAA tournament, marking the first time since the 1992 and 1993 seasons that the Seminoles had played in two consecutive NCAA Tournaments. Florida State advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in 2011 marking the first time since 1993 and the fourth time in school history the Seminoles advanced to the Sweet 16.

Jones has also coached the team to four NIT appearances. He also helped Florida State reach the ACC Tournament championship game in 2009 for the first time in school history after defeating the No. 1 ranked and eventual National Champion, North Carolina in the semifinal game.

#### CAREER NCAA TOURNAMENT

Jones has coached seven teams and three programs into the NCAA tournament in his 15 years as a coach in the collegiate ranks. Jones has led Florida State to the NCAA tournament in a school record three consecutive seasons (2009, 2010 and 2011), helped coach Miami into the NCAA Tournament during three consecutive seasons (1998, 1999 and 2000) and coached Mississippi State into the NCAA Tournament during the 2002 season. In all three instances, Jones helped the three programs return to the NCAA tournament after lengthy absences. Florida State earned a No. 5 seed in 2009 marking the first time the Seminoles reached the NCAA Tournament in ten years. In 1998, the Hurricanes made their first tournament appearance since reviving the program in 1985 and had not been to the Tournament since 1960. Mississippi State, which also won the Southeastern Conference Tournament championship in 2002, had not been to the NCAA Tournament since 1996, a span of six years.

#### SUCCESS AT MISSISSIPPI STATE

Jones helped lead Mississippi State to a school-best No. 3 seed in the 2002 NCAA tournament. The Bulldogs also captured the school's second SEC tournament championship with victories over No. 11-ranked Florida and No. 8-ranked Alabama in the title game of the SEC Tournament. Mississippi State also recorded the school record for most wins in a single season with 27 in his only season in Starkville.

#### IN THE NBA WITH THE WASHINGTON WIZARDS

Jones was also an assistant coach to Leonard Hamilton with the Washington Wizards in 2001.

#### MIAMI

Jones began his collegiate assistant coaching career at Miami under Hamilton in 1996. During his career at Miami, he helped guide the Hurricanes to a 95-54 record for a .638 winning percentage and three NCAA Tournament appearances. The 95 wins (19.0 wins per season) were the most in a five-year period for the program since the 1959 through 1964 seasons. Miami won 23 games in both 1999 and 2000 to mark only the third time in program history (and first time since 1964) that the program had won at least 20 games in consecutive seasons.

#### MIAMI POSTSEASON

In his final four seasons at Miami, Jones helped guide the Hurricanes to four postseason tournament appearances, a regular season Big East championship and the school's first ever NCAA Tournament "Sweet 16" appearance in 2000. Miami won a then school record 23 games in 1999 on its way to the school's first ever top-10 national ranking. The Hurricanes were ranked No. 10 in the season ending Associated Press poll.

#### PERSONAL

The 51 year-old Jones is married to the former Olga Campos. The couple has a daughter, Shannon (29), a son, Adam (27) and a son-in-law Kass Botini. Shannon and Kass welcomed the family's first grandchild, Kaleb, into the world right after the Seminoles' run in the ACC Tournament championship game and the NCAA Tournament in March of 2009 as well as a second grandchild, Jacob, just after the Final Four in 2011.





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## COREY WILLIAMS

**ASSISTANT COACH**  
Oklahoma State, 1992  
Fifth Season at Florida State



In four seasons as an assistant coach at Florida State, Corey Williams has helped the Seminoles earn a school-record tying three consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament, helped the Seminoles become the third winningest program in the ACC, helped coach the Seminoles to the first appearance in school history in the ACC Tournament championship game and tutored five NBA Draft picks including two who were picked in the first round. His extensive recruiting roots, which he has developed throughout his 11-year coaching career, have allowed him to assist in bringing the current group of Seminoles to Tallahassee – a group that has Florida State poised to enjoy one of the best seasons in school history.

The Seminoles average nearly 23 victories per season with Williams on the bench as an assistant coach – the best four year average in school history. During that span of four years, the Seminoles have defeated 10 teams ranked in nation's top 25 -- including two teams ranked No. 1 -- have won the championships of the Global Sports Classic (2008) and the Old Spice Classic (2009) and been ranked in the nation's top 20 in the final poll in two of his four years.

### A PLAYERS COACH

An NBA champion as a player, Williams helped Florida State to the Sweet 16 of the 2011 NCAA Tournament and to a school record tying three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances after helping lead Oral Roberts to a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances as a coach and Oklahoma State to consecutive NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 appearances as a player.

### TEAM SUCCESS

Florida State has played in a school record three consecutive NCAA Tournaments and four postseason tournaments during Williams' four years at Florida State. The Seminoles advanced to the Sweet 16 of the 2011 NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1993 and played in the ACC Tournament championship game for the first time in school history in 2009. The Seminoles have won at least 10 ACC games in three consecutive seasons for the first time in school history and have won 31 ACC games in the last three seasons – a school record for any three year period since joining the ACC. The Seminoles' winning percentage of nearly 70 percent in the last three seasons (.693, 70-31) is the best in any three-year period in school history and surpassed the Seminoles' winning mark of .686 during the 1991, 1992 and 1993 seasons.

### SUCCESS IN THE ACC

With Williams on its bench, Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC the last three years (since the start of the 2008-09 season) in total games played with 70 wins. The Seminoles average 23.3 wins per season with records of 25-10 (2008-09), 22-10 (2009-10) and 23-10 during the 2010-11 season. The Seminoles have won 70 percent of their games and 31 of their 48 ACC games since the start of the 2008-09 season. Florida State is one of only two teams in the ACC in the last three years to win at least 10 games and finish in the top four of the league standings. The top four teams in the league standings earns a bye in the first round of the ACC Tournament.

### FSU SUCCESS IN THE POSTSEASON

With victories over No. 5 ranked Notre Dame and No. 20 ranked Texas A&M in the 2011 NCAA Tournament, Williams helped the Seminoles advance to within one win of the Elite Eight for only the third time in school history. The Seminoles' wins over Notre Dame and Texas A&M marked only the second time in school history that Florida State had defeated ranked teams in consecutive games during the NCAA Tournament. Additionally, Florida State's win over Notre Dame marked the Seminoles' first win over a top five ranked team in the NCAA Tournament since they defeated No. 2 ranked North Carolina to advance to the NCAA Tournament national championship game in 1972. The Seminoles win over Texas A&M in the second round of the 2011 NCAA Tournament marked the first win over a ranked team in the NCAA Tournament since 1998.

### RECRUITING SUCCESS

Nationally renowned as an outstanding recruiter,

Williams' tireless work in attracting top flight players to Florida State has helped the Seminoles become one of the elite teams in all of college basketball. Each of Florida State's recruiting classes, since he hit the road for the Seminoles in 2008, have been ranked among the nation's top 25. His recruiting roots once again proved fruitful in 2011 as the Seminoles' class ranked within the nation's top 20 and includes three players ranked among the top 100 recruits nationally. Florida State's class ranked 16th nationally in 2010 and in 2009 he helped recruit McDonald's All-American Michael Snaer to Florida State. Williams helped assemble the Seminoles' 2008 recruiting class, which is considered to be one of the best in school history and are the cornerstones of the Seminoles' highly rated 2012 team. That season, Williams helped the Seminoles land one of the top groups that was ranked as high as No. 8 in the nation and No. 3 in the ACC. Florida State's 2008 recruiting class contained two top 75 players and two more who were rated in the top 15 in the nation at their positions.

### GIANT KILLERS

With 10 wins over ranked teams in Williams' first four seasons as an assistant on Florida State's staff, the Seminoles are the third winningest team in ACC for victories over nationally ranked teams. Included in the Seminoles' wins are two wins over the nation's No. 1 ranked teams (North Carolina in 2009 and Duke in 2011), No. 5 Notre Dame (in the 2011 NCAA Tournament) and No. 10 Clemson (during the 2009 regular season). The win over No. 10 ranked Clemson on the road helped Florida State earn a No. 5 seed in the NCAA Tournament. Florida State was one of seven teams in the 2011 NCAA Tournament that earned wins over multiple ranked teams and with wins over No. 1 ranked Duke and No. 5 ranked Notre Dame in 2011, the Seminoles defeated multiple top five ranked teams for only the second time in school history.

### FSU TEAM STATISTICAL IMPROVEMENT

Williams has helped Florida State become the nation's top defensive team and nationally renowned in multiple statistical categories. Williams' defensive

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background helped Florida State finish the 2010-11 season as the field goal percentage defense national statistical champion with a .363 mark – the second consecutive season it has led the nation in the most telling defensive statistic kept by the NCAA. The Seminoles are the first team to repeat as the field goal percentage national champions since Marquette in the 1993 and 1994 seasons. Florida State's .363 mark ranks as the fourth lowest mark by a leader in the category since the NCAA began compiling the statistic in 1977. It also marks the lowest field goal percentage defensive mark by an ACC team since 1960 – a span of 51 years – and was the seventh lowest mark in ACC history. The Seminoles became only the sixth team in NCAA history to repeat as the field goal percentage defensive national champions. In addition to ranking first nationally in the field goal percentage defense category, the Seminoles ranked first nationally in field goal percentage defense (.363), fifth in blocked shots (6.0 bpg), 15th in 3-point field goal percentage defense (.306), 24th in steals per game (8.3 spg) and 27th in rebound margin (+4.9 rpg) and were the only team in the nation to finish the season ranked in the top 30 in each of those five statistical categories during the 2010-11 season.

#### FSU TEAM IMPROVEMENT

In Williams' four seasons at Florida State, the Seminoles' win total has increased by an average of four wins per season. In the four years prior to his arrival, Florida State averaged 18.3 victories and won at least 20 games only twice. In the four years since his arrival, Florida State averages 22.3 wins and has won at least 22 games three times with a near school record 25 victories coming during the 2008-09 season. In addition, Florida State averages nearly 10 ACC wins per season in his four years at Florida State after averaging just over six conference wins the four seasons prior to his arrival. Florida State has more ACC regular season games with Williams on the staff (40) than they did in the seven years before his arrival (38). Statistically, the Seminoles have become one of the top teams in the nation since Williams' arrival as an assistant coach. In 2011, the Seminoles became only the sixth team in NCAA history to repeat as the field goal percentage defensive national champions.

#### A BACKCOURT WIZARD

A former teammate of Michael Jordan with the Chicago Bulls, Williams has utilized his basketball knowledge and helped develop the Seminoles' backcourt during his four seasons in Tallahassee. Under Williams' tutelage, Florida State point guards have improved dramatically. Derwin Kitchen, who is now playing professionally in Israel, was the most improved guard in the ACC as a senior in 2011. Kitchen ranked fifth in the ACC in steals and sixth in the ACC in assists in 2011 while leading the Seminoles to their third consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. On top of the point guard play, Williams helped McDon-



ald's All-American Michael Snaer earn All-ACC freshman honors in 2010 and has helped him develop into one of the most well-rounded players in the ACC. He also worked closely with All-American, ACC Defensive Player of the Year and All-ACC First Team selection Toney Douglas. Douglas graduated Florida State as one of the ACC's most decorated guards, leading the conference in steals in 2008, in scoring in 2009 and earning ACC Defensive Player of the Year honors as a senior. Douglas was the ACC Player of the Year runner-up in 2009. Douglas was drafted in the first round of the 2009 NBA Draft by the Los Angeles Lakers and has enjoyed two standout seasons playing with the New York Knicks.

#### ORAL ROBERTS

Williams was an assistant coach for eight seasons at Oral Roberts where he helped lead the Golden Eagles to an average of 18 wins per season, including 20 or more wins in each of his last three seasons, and appearances in the NCAA Tournament in each of his last two seasons. Oral Roberts finished with a 23-11 record and won the Mid-Continent Conference Tournament championship in 2007. Among its 23 wins during the 2007 season was a victory over No. 3 Kansas on the road at Allen Fieldhouse in Lawrence, Kan.

#### ORAL ROBERTS RECRUITING

As Oral Roberts' chief recruiter during his tenure there, Williams is credited with assembling the recruiting classes that allowed the Golden Eagles to become one of the top teams in the nation. Among the players he is credited with recruiting are Caleb Green, a two-time All-American and the first three-time Player of the Year in the Mid-Continent Conference and 2006 Mid-Continent Tournament Most Valuable Player Ken Tutt. Williams helped attract a majority of the players that dotted the Golden Eagle's roster and the Mid-Continent All-League teams.

#### WILLIAMS AT OKLAHOMA STATE

Williams played collegiately at Oklahoma State from 1989-1992. He is the 15th all-time leading scorer in

school history with 1,320 career points. Williams played two seasons under his future boss, Leonard Hamilton, at Oklahoma State and helped lead the Cowboys to consecutive NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 appearances under Eddie Sutton in 1991 and 1992. The Cowboys were ranked 14th in the final Associated Press poll of the 1991 season and 10th in the final coaches' poll following the 1992 season.

#### WILLIAMS PLAY DURING CAREER

With Williams in Oklahoma State's line-up for 128 games during his four-year varsity career, the Cowboys ranked as one of the top teams statistically in the nation. The Cowboys ranked fourth nationally in scoring defense in 1992, 12th in the nation in average margin of victory in both 1991 and 1992 and 20th in the nation in winning percentage in 1992. He scored 1,320 career points and averaged 10.3 points and 3.2 rebounds in leading his team to winning records in his final two seasons.

#### OKLAHOMA STATE PLAY DURING CAREER

Oklahoma State went to four consecutive post-season tournaments (two NIT and two NCAA tournaments) and averaged 21.5 victories per season during his career. The Cowboys finished 24-8 and 10-4 in the Big 8 in 1991 and 28-8 and 8-6 in conference play in 1992. Oklahoma State was ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation and defeated five nationally ranked teams during the 1992 season. They earned victories over No. 3 Missouri and No. 2 Kansas on their way to the Sweet 16 in 1992.

#### NFL DRAFT

Williams was drafted by both the Chicago Bulls of the NBA and the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL. He was drafted by the Chiefs despite the fact that he had not played football since junior high.

#### PLAYING CAREER

Williams chose basketball over football and spent two very productive years with the Chicago Bulls in the NBA. While a member of the Bulls in 1993, Williams helped Chicago win its third straight NBA Championship. He also played with the Minnesota Timberwolves during his NBA career. Williams spent the majority of the 1994 season with the Oklahoma City Cavalry of the Continental Basketball Association. He returned to Oklahoma State as a student assistant in 1994 and was a member of the Cowboys' staff during their 1994 Final Four season. Williams played professionally overseas in Taiwan, from 1995-98.

#### PERSONAL

Williams, 41, earned his bachelor's degree in education from Oklahoma State in 1992. He and his wife Nicole have two children: Jourdan (12) and Corey, Jr. (8).



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## DENNIS GATES

ASSISTANT COACH

Cal, 2002

First Season at Florida State



**D**ennis Gates began his coaching career in the NBA and is one of four coaches on the Florida State staff who has coached and developed professional basketball players. In the first nine years of his coaching career Gates has certainly put his knowledge of the game of basketball to great use as he has coached at four outstanding Division I institutions and helped each one of them gain outstanding success. Gates will immerse himself in every aspect of the Seminole program as he continues the tradition of outstanding recruiting and competitive excellence under head coach Leonard Hamilton.

### SECOND TIME AROUND

Gates was a graduate assistant at Florida State under Hamilton during the 2004-05 season – a year that the foundation for the current Seminole program began to take shape. The Seminoles counted a victory over No. 3 ranked Wake Forest in their win total with their win over the Deacons marking the third victory over a top five ranked team under Hamilton. Gates was also responsible for the development of future pros Al Thornton, Alexander Johnson and Von Wafer during his first season in Tallahassee with Thornton becoming only the second NBA Draft Lottery selection in Florida State history in 2007.

### PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

Gates began his career as a coaching assistant with the Los Angeles Clippers as a skill development coach during the 2002-03 season. He worked with a strong collection of players that included 10 prospects with three years or fewer years of experience including future All-Stars Elton Brand and Lamar Odom. Brand finished the season as the Clippers' leading scorer with an 18.5 points per game average while Odom ranked third on the team with a 14.6 points per game average. Brand and Odom formed one of the NBA's highest scoring and best shooting front court duos in the NBA with Gates on the Clippers' staff. The Clippers finished in the top 10 in the NBA statistics for blocked shots, free throws made and free throws attempted.

### COACHING TREE

Gates has learned the game from some of basketball's all-time greatest coaches including Hamilton who is one of the top 20 all-time winningest coaches in ACC history. He played and coached under Ben Braun at Cal (the 2003 Naismith National Coach of the Year), coached under Tom Crean at Marquette,

Ricardo Patton at Northern Illinois and David Carter at Nevada. Braun, currently the head coach at Rice, has taken eight teams to the NCAA Tournament while Crean, the current head coach at Indiana, has guided five teams to the NCAA Tournament including his 2003 Marquette team which advanced to the Final Four of the NCAA Tournament. Gates also worked under Alvin Gentry and the late Dennis Johnson while a coaching assistant with the Los Angeles Clippers.

### POSTSEASON EXPERIENCE

As a player, Gates was a three-year team captain at Cal and helped the Bears to NCAA Tournament appearances in 2001 and 2002 and to the 1999 NIT title and the 2000 NIT Final Eight. As a coach, Gates helped coach Nevada to the 2010 NIT and Cal to the 2006 NCAA Tournament.

### STATISTICAL IMPROVEMENT

In each of his stops as an assistant coach, Gates has played a significant role in helping his teams improve statistically. Northern Illinois finished his first season (2008-09) ranked among the top five in six different statistical categories in the Mid American Conference including third in scoring (66.2 ppg), third in three-point field goal percentage (34.7) and fourth in assists (12.4 apg). All were significant improvements from the 2007-08 campaign. The 2008-09 season saw the Huskies go 7-5 at home, their first winning record since the 2005-06 season. Overall, Northern Illinois improved its win total by four wins in Gates' first season as the Huskies associate head coach. During his second season at Nevada, the Wolf Pack finished third in the league statistics in rebounding (36.8 rpg), fourth in blocked shots (3.7 bpg) and fourth in field goal percentage defense (.426). The Wolf Pack also ranked in the top 15 in the nation in

scoring and field goal percentage and broke school single-season marks for scoring and field goals made and attempted in 2009. In his three seasons as an assistant coach at Cal, the Bears averaged nearly 17 wins a season and won 20 games in advancing to the NCAA Tournament in 2006.

### QUICKLY GAINING EXPERIENCE

One of the sharpest young minds in college basketball, Gates' hard work was rewarded when he was hired at Northern Illinois and elevated to associate head coach after just one season with the Huskies. At age 28, he became one of the youngest associate head coaches in all of college basketball in 2008. He was Northern Illinois' lead recruiter, coached the Huskie guards and helped numerous players earn All-Mid American Conference and MAC All-Freshman honors during his two years while in Normal, Ill.

### RECRUITING WELL CONSISTENTLY

Gates has developed a reputation as a top flight national recruiter and has done so by assembling top ranked recruiting classes at each of his first three stops: Cal, Northern Illinois and Nevada. His 2006 class at Cal included four top-150 recruits; including Taylor Harrison, All Pac-10 guards Patrick Christopher and Jerome Randle, and All Pac-10 power forward and 2008 NBA first-round draft pick Ryan Anderson. Following the 2006-07 season, Anderson was selected to the Pac-10 All-Freshman team.

### PLAYER DEVELOPMENT SUCCESS

In his first season as an assistant coach at Cal the Golden Bears saw their win total increase from 13 (2004-05) to 20 (2005-06). He helped Cal earn a trip back to the NCAA Tournament after a two year absence and helped sophomore power forward Leon Powe earn All-American Second Team honors by the Associated Press, the U.S. Basketball Writers and ESPN.com. Powe was chosen to the 2006 All-Pac 10 team and selected by the Denver Nuggets in the second round (49th overall pick) of the 2006 NBA Draft. While at Marquette, Gates worked with NBA Draft picks Travis Diener and Steve Novak.

### PLAYING CAREER

During his playing career at Cal the Golden Bears compiled an 83-46 record, winning 20 games in a season three times. In 2002, the Bears reached the semifinals of the Pac-10 Tournament and the second round of the NCAA Tournament. In addition, Gates was named to the all-tournament team at the Golden Bear Classic in '01-02 after hitting a three-pointer in the closing seconds to beat Penn State, 76-73, in the championship game. He played in 114 career games, making 34 starts and finished his career with an average of 3.8 points per game, as well as 100 steals and 148 assists.

### SPECIAL HONORS

Gates was a two-time Pac 10 First Team All-Academic Team selection, was named Cal's Most Inspirational Player (2001) and was twice named the Bears' Outstanding Student-Athlete (1999 and 2001). In addition, he was awarded the 2002 Pac-10 Medal of Honor (given to the Pac-10 Universities Top Graduating Student-Athlete).

### EDUCATION

Gates earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from Cal in just three years and competed as a master's candidate in education during his senior campaign. He completed his Master of Science degree in adult education & human resource development at Florida State University in 2005.

Sam Lunt, the Head Trainer of the men's basketball team, responsibilities revolve around the athletic department's sports medicine and medical operations. This year marks his 28th season with the Seminoles and throughout these seasons he has been the associate director of sports medicine. Lunt oversees the team's medical

needs, maintains all emergency action plans and is in charge of purchasing for the sports medicine department, as well as continues to teach courses in sports medicine curriculum.

Lunt began working with the men's basketball team in 1988 and is the longest tenured member of the Florida State basketball staff. The Seminoles have appeared in seven NCAA Tournaments, four NIT tournaments and won the 1991 Metro Conference tournament with Lunt on the sidelines. He has been the trainer for both of Florida State's NBA Draft Lottery selections: Al Thornton in 2007 and George McClellan in 1989 and worked extensively with Toney Douglas who was selected in the first round of the 2009 NBA Draft and Chris Singleton who was selected in the first round of the 2011 NBA Draft.

Lunt came to Florida State in 1983 after receiving his bachelor's degree in athletic training from the University of Miami. While at Miami, he worked as a student trainer in the Hurricane athletic department and served as an assistant trainer with the Miami Dolphins of the NFL during the summer of 1982. As a graduate assistant at Florida State, Lunt worked with the Seminole football team while earning his master's degree in sports psychology. During the 1985 spring football season, he worked for the Jacksonville Bulls of the USFL.

Lunt was a member of the training staff at the 1989 World University Games in Duisburg, Germany, the 1987 U.S. Olympic Festival and 1991 AAU Junior Olympics that were held in Tallahassee.

Lunt was named the Professional Outreach Athletic Trainer of the Year by the Athletic Trainers' Association of Florida in 2004. He became the first recipient of the award given by the ATAF to the trainer who has done their best to advance the profession and the association.

Lunt, 50, is married to the former Agnes Bundick. The couple has three children: Ryan, (13) and 11-year old twins, Sean and Erin. He is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers Association

### MICHAEL BRADLEY

Michael Bradley's position with Florida State's Basketball team includes creating rigorous schedules and strength and conditioning endurance regimes. Along with Head Coach Leonard Hamilton, Bradley brings knowledge and immense energy in maintaining high performance levels in the weight room. He has

commitment and dedication with the basketball team in the Basketball Training Facility which keeps the Seminoles as an elite Division I Program.

Bradley helped the Seminoles play in a school record trying three consecutive NCAA Championships (2009, 2010, 2011) and the championship game of the ACC Tournament for the first time in school history (2009).

Bradley designed and equipped the state-of-the-art weight room in the Seminoles' Basketball Training Facility that opened in 2002. The weight room is considered to be one of the best and most complete in all of Division I sports.

Bradley also worked at the University of Miami under Hamilton from 1995-98 where he worked with eight teams, which included one NCAA Tournament and one NIT appearance by the men's basketball team.

Bradley came to Florida State from Stanford where the athletes he worked with achieved tremendous success in the weight room and on the field. At Stanford, Bradley worked directly with the men's basketball, men's swimming and field hockey teams. In addition, he assisted with the strength and conditioning efforts for the nationally ranked football, women's basketball, women's swimming and softball teams. During his four-year tenure at Stanford, the Cardinal won the Sears' Directors' Cup as the nation's top overall program in Division I athletics four times.

Stanford played in the NCAA Tournament each of the four years Bradley worked with the men's basketball team. In 2002, the Cardinal was 31-3 and led the nation in victories. He has also worked at the U.S. Military Academy (1994-95), South Carolina (1993-94) and Southern Methodist (1990-93) and was an assistant football coach at UC Santa Barbara (1989-90).

Bradley has worked with eight postseason tournament teams in his first 10 seasons and eight NBA Draft selections (Tim Pickett, Von Wafer, Alexander Johnson, Al Thornton, Toney Douglas, Solomon Alabi, Ryan Reid and Chris Singleton) during his first nine years at Florida State.

Bradley earned a bachelor's degree in chemistry from San Diego State in 1989 and a master's in chemistry from UC Santa Barbara in 1990.

### JACOB RIDENHOUR

Jacob Ridenhour, who has been a member of fifteen postseason teams, including five NCAA Tournaments and three NCAA Sweet Sixteen teams at Florida State and Auburn, is in his seventh season as Florida State's director of basketball operations. His knowledge of the game of basketball and his proven ability as an athletic administrator makes him one of the most valuable members of the head coach Leonard Hamilton's coaching

staff. Ridenhour has an incredible ability to quickly realize big picture issues, assess challenges and develop successful ideas on how to move Florida State's program to the next level.

As Florida State's director of operations, Ridenhour brings a tremendous wealth of knowledge, including coaching experience at high school, AAU and college, along with 17 years at two successful, high profile BCS conference schools - Florida State in the ACC and Auburn in the SEC - where he has also gained an incredible amount of knowledge and experience in athletic administration.

At Florida State, Ridenhour responsibilities include management of the program, office and team fiscal matters, all aspects of travel, academic development and contracts. He is the primary liaison with University and Athletic Administration, educators, fan groups and opposing schools. Ridenhour is also director of the Florida State Basketball Camps; his responsibilities include organizing, marketing, and operating the camps. Ridenhour has created and instituted the highly successful Florida State Team Camp with teams from throughout the southeast and numerous international teams - the largest of its kind at Florida State, and brought in annual sessions of the prestigious Five-Star Basketball Camp to Tallahassee, both providing significant economic and financial impact to the Tallahassee community.

Ridenhour has been integrally involved in the inner workings of two major Division I athletic departments for 17 years. He began his collegiate career at Auburn as a team manager in 1993, for the late Tommy Joe Eagles. Later joining the staff at Auburn University for Cliff Ellis, the former Head Coach at Auburn and Clemson, where he created and administered the programs budget and was primary contact to University Administration pertaining to the basketball team as well as overseeing player development. Ridenhour was the director of the highly successful Auburn Basketball Camp program.

While at Auburn, Ridenhour was instrumental in taking the Auburn program to unprecedented heights, reaching post season play six out of his eight years and two trips to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen including an SEC Championship. He was involved in the fundraising, marketing and management of the Auburn Basketball brand. He was also responsible for the design and development of the Auburn Basketball Museum and was instrumental in the redesign of the office and locker room renovations.

Ridenhour has tremendous International experience with teams and programs involving tournaments, traveling, games and all aspects related to legal documents and requirements. Ridenhour has been with teams on three continents including Canada, the Caribbean, Europe and Africa.

Prior to joining the Seminoles in the fall of 2005, Ridenhour participated in the NBA's Basketball Without Borders and traveled with the NBA to Dakar, Senegal and Johannesburg, South Africa. He co-directed the Island Shootout in Nassau, Bahamas in 2004 and 2005.

A native of Salisbury, North Carolina, Ridenhour received his Bachelor's degree in education from Auburn in 1995 and his Master's degree in Sport Administration from Florida State in 2007.

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## ERICK CASTO

Erick Casto, has a deep commitment to the men's and women's basketball team; and as equipment manager, he oversees the operations of the team with Coach Leonard Hamilton. Now in his fifth season, Casto has been involved with the Seminoles basketball teams since 2004. His understanding of Sport's management makes him a vital member to the Florida State Athletics Academic Support Department.

Casto performs numerous tasks that range from distribution of all team equipment to the Seminole players and coaches to set-up and organization of the highly successful Leonard Hamilton Boy's Basketball camps during the summer.

Before coming to Florida State in 2004 Casto was the head basketball manager at Mississippi State University. Casto's responsibilities included overseeing the managerial staff and completing tasks for the coaching staff and members of the department of athletics. During his career at Mississippi State, Casto helped the Bulldogs earn the SEC Western Division Championship in 2003 and the SEC Championship in 2004. Mississippi State advanced to the NCAA Tournament in both seasons.

Kyle Cregan is in his first season as the video coordinator for the Florida State men's basketball team after two years on Leonard Hamilton's staff as a graduate manager. He is responsible for managing the Seminoles' multi-million dollar video unit in the Florida State Basketball Training Center. The unit was designed specifically for the Seminole men's basketball program and allows the coaching staff to provide the best teaching and development information to each of the players in the program. The system allows for the instantaneous study of practice and game video which helps each player improve his skills and abilities on a daily basis. The extensive work done by the Florida State staff in the area of player development has seen eight Seminoles drafted by seven different NBA teams in the last eight years.

In his role as a graduate manager at Florida State in 2011, Cregan helped the Seminoles reach the Sweet 16 in the NCAA tournament and finished in third place in the ACC standings with an 11-5 record. Florida State has finished in the top four of the ACC standings and has won 48 games and has played in consecutive NCAA Tournaments for the first time since the 1992 and 1993 seasons with Cregan on Hamilton's staff. Cregan was instrumental in assisting the coaching staff in practice and individual workouts where he gained valuable on the court experience working with 2010 NBA draft picks Solomon Alabi and Ryan Reid and 2011 NBA lottery pick and two-time ACC Defensive Player of the Year Chris Singleton.

Before joining Hamilton's staff at Florida State in 2009, he was an assistant men's basketball coach at Flagler College. He evaluated and recruited high school and junior college athletes throughout the United States. Cregan prepared and presented detailed scouting reports, and was responsible for all basketball operations and fundraising. Cregan was responsible for the recruitment and signing of three student-athletes in his one year as an assistant coach at Flagler. Two of his signees became two-year starters for the Saints since joining the program in 2009.

Cregan was a four-year letter winner for the Flagler College men's basketball team and helped the Saints advance to the NAIA Division II Sweet 16 in both 2004 and 2005. The Saints won both the Florida Sun Conference regular season and tournament championships during his freshman season. He then helped the Saints make the transition from an NAIA institution to an NCAA Division II school during his junior and senior seasons.

Cregan was the head boys' junior varsity basketball coach and assistant boys' varsity coach at River Ridge High School in New Port Richey, Fla., in 2008. He designed a year-long practice schedule that encompassed individual skill training, strength and speed training and was responsible for monitoring his players' academic progress. His team finished with a 17-1 record.

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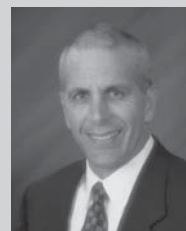
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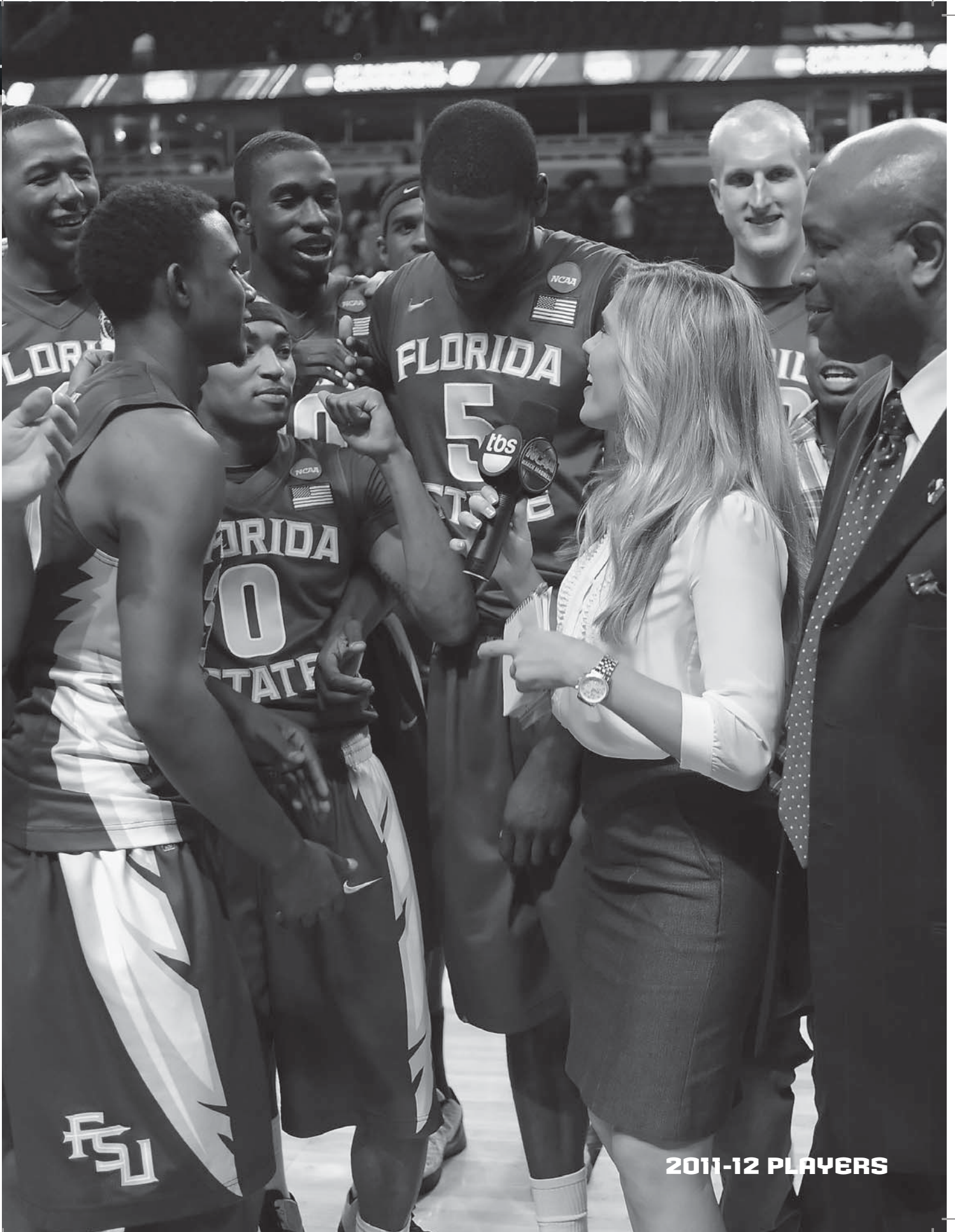

SEMINOLES

**L**uke Loucks has a special opportunity to become not only one of the winningest players in school history but also one of the most efficient point guards to wear the garnet and gold on the basketball court as a senior. He is the most experienced point guard in the ACC entering the 2011-12 season who has played in 101 career games – every game of his career. As a tribute to his ability and his durability, Loucks has played in every game of his career at Florida State including five NCAA Tournament games, the 2009 ACC Tournament Championship game, 10 victories over nationally ranked teams including No. 1 North Carolina (March 14, 2009) and No. 1 Duke (Jan. 12, 2011) and in a total of 70 victories overall. The 70 victories in which he has played are only 12 shy of setting a new school record for victories by a player in a senior class with 81 and victories in a four year period with 88. Florida State has a 70-31 record during the first three seasons on his career. He has helped lead Florida State to a school record tying three con-

secutive NCAA Tournament appearances (2009, 2010 and 2011) and to an appearance in the ACC Tournament championship game (2009) for the first time in school history. Loucks enters his senior season with 239 career assists and needs only 61 to become only the 16th player in school history with 300 or more career assists and begins his senior season with 56 career made 3-point shots and needs only 20 made shots from the bonusphere to move in to the Seminoles' all-time top 25 for career 3-point field goals made. Loucks earned the first-year academic achievement award from the Seminoles' coaching staff at the 2009 Men's Basketball Honors Banquet, was named the Seminoles' outstanding student-athlete at the team award banquet in 2010 and has been named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll in 2009, 2010 and 2011. Loucks earned his undergraduate degree in business management in August of 2011 and is currently pursuing a Master's degree in sport management.

### AS A JUNIOR (2010-11)

\*Averaged 2.9 points (12th on the team), 1.8 rebounds (10th), 2.2 assists (tie for second) and 0.6 steals (seventh) while earning a 1.4:1 assist:turnover ratio and making 16 3-point field goals.

\*Played in all 34 games for the Seminoles and earned his fourth career start against No. 14/15 Florida (Nov. 28)

\*Shot a career high .725 from the free throw line as he earned career high statistics for free throws made (29) and free throws attempted (40) in finishing as one of five Seminoles with a free throw shooting percentage at above .700 percent.

\*Helped Florida State to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since the 1993 season and for only the fourth time in school history. Florida State defeated two higher seeds and two higher ranked teams – No. 20 ranked and No. 7 seeded Texas A&M and No. 5 ranked and No. 2 seeded Notre Dame in advancing in the NCAA Tournament.

\*Was very efficient in the NCAA Tournament with a 2:1 assist:turnover ratio as Florida State defeated both Texas A&M (March 18) and Notre Dame (March 20) to advance to the Sweet 16 before falling to VCU

(March 25). He totaled 20 assists and a 2.5 assists per game average in eight games against ranked teams including four assists against zero turnovers against No. 5 ranked Notre Dame in the third round of the NCAA Tournament. His performance with the basketball in his hands for 22 minutes helped Florida State defeat the second place team in the Big East and advance to the Sweet 16.

\*Ranked sixth on the team with 16 3-point field goals made to give him 56 for his career including two shots from the bonusphere a total of four times including vs. then No. 15 Baylor in the Seminoles victory on Christmas Day in the third round of the Diamond Head Classic at the University of Hawaii. Florida State was 8-4 in games that Loucks made at least one 3-point shot.

\*Scored three points and pulled down two rebounds in Florida State's win over No. 1 ranked Duke in the only game of the season between the ACC's second and third placed teams in the final conference standings. In 12 minutes of play he made an important 3-point field goal and earned a steal that led to the Seminoles' most important regular season victory of the season. Florida State defeated the No. 1 ranked Blue Devils, 66-61, to give Duke its first loss of the season.

\*Averaged 1.7 points, 2.3 rebounds and 2.7 assists in three NCAA Tournament games as Florida State advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1993 and for only the fourth time in school history. Totaled five points, five rebounds and four assists to help lead Florida State past No. 5 ranked and No. 2 seeded Notre Dame, 71-57, in Chicago (March 20).

### AS A SOPHOMORE (2009-2010)

\*Averaged a career-high 4.4 points (ninth on the team), a career-high 2.8 assists (second), 0.8 steals (fourth) while making a career-high 24 3-point shots (third) and playing in all 32 games for the Seminoles during his second season as a member of the team.

\*Was in the Seminoles' starting line-up for their victory over FIU that allowed them to raise their early season record to 7-2. He scored six points and was credited with a career-high seven assists in the victory over the Golden Panthers.

\*Totaled a single-season career-high 90 assists – which were 17 more assists in three fewer games than he accumulated as a freshman and scored in double figures a career-high five times as a sophomore including four ACC games – he scored in double figures only twice as a freshman with one coming in an ACC game.



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\*Ranked third on the team in steals and totaled multiple steals in six different games including his career-high of four steals in the Seminoles' early season win at Mercer and ranked third on the team with a career-high 24 3-point field goals made including three in both games against Miami during the regular season.

\*Averaged 10.0 points, 3.0 rebounds and a team leading 4.0 assists in two games against NCAA Tournament participant Clemson. He was tied for the Seminoles' scoring lead with a 10.0 points per game scoring average with All-ACC honoree Solomon Alabi as he shot .583 from the field (seven of 12), .400 from the 3-point line (two of five) and .800 from the free throw line (four of five).

\*Averaged a team-leading 16.0 points, 3.5 rebounds and 3.5 assists in two games against Miami. He shot .714 from the field (10 of 14), .600 from the 3-point line (six of 10) and .750 from the free throw line (six of eight) while adding seven assists, two steals and one blocked shot as he led Florida State to the regular season sweep of the Hurricanes.

\*Scored his career-high of 19 points in leading the Seminoles to the victory at home and added 13 points as the Seminoles won on the road. His career game of 19 points (on five of seven shooting from the field), five rebounds, three assists, one blocked shot and one steal in the Seminoles' 71-65 victory over Miami in Tallahassee (Feb. 6). Scored what proved to be the game-winning basket with 14:46 left in the game as he scored on a 3-point shot to give Florida State a 40-37 lead. Also scored the game-winning basket to give Florida State the 61-60 victory over Miami in Coral Gables (March 6). His 3-point basket gave Florida State the 61-60 lead with 1:52 and proved to be the last and game-winning basket of the game.

\*Scored seven points, pulled down three rebounds, was credited with four assists and one steal as the Seminoles played Gonzaga in the NCAA Tournament. His four assists ranked as the second highest total in the game behind teammate Derwin Kitchen and all seven of his points came in the second half as the Seminoles outscored Gonzaga, 41-32.

Jeff Peterson is the first student-athlete to play basketball in the ACC (Florida State), the Big Ten (Iowa) and the SEC (Arkansas) as a transfer student-athlete from the University of Arkansas who will play at Florida State during his final season of eligibility. He is immediately eligible at Florida State after graduating from Arkansas with a bachelor's degree in marketing in May of 2011 and transferring to FSU to begin work on a master's degree in marketing. Peterson will take advantage of an NCAA rule allowing players who have finished their undergraduate requirements and graduated at one school to transfer to another school and pursue a master's degree. The starting point guard for the Razorbacks in 2010-11, he elected to transfer in order to pursue his master's degree in marketing at within the nationally renowned College of Business at Florida State. Peterson earned his bachelor's degree in marketing with a 3.4 grade point average from Arkansas' Walton College of Business in May of 2011 and joins a select group of players who have

transferred to become immediately eligible after graduating including Justin Knox (to North Carolina from Alabama) and John Fields (to Tennessee from UNC Wilmington) during the 2010-11 season and Brandon Wood (to Michigan State from Valparaiso) and Andre Walker (to Vanderbilt from Xavier) for the 2011-12 season. Characterized as a pass first point guard who can make open shots, has control of his team from the point guard position, handles the ball well, finishes well in traffic, is very unselfish and has a high basketball IQ. Peterson has played in 83 career games (55 at Iowa and 28 at Arkansas) while earning 59 career starts (26 at Iowa and 23 at Arkansas) and enters his final season of collegiate eligibility as an accomplished point guard who will look to lead a team into the NCAA Tournament for the first time in his career. He enters his final season as a Seminole with 155 career 3-point field goals made and needs 101 made shots from long range to surpass Florida State's all-time leader - James Collins - in the category. With his 155 made 3-point field goals he enters his senior season ranked seventh in school history and needs only 20 to become the sixth player in school history with 175 and needs only 45 to become only the fourth player in school history to make 200 or more from the bonusphere. Dulkys is also ranked seventh in school history with 442 career 3-point field goals attempted -- the school record for 3-point field goals attempted is 686 by Collins. He enters his senior season in a tie for second place among current ACC players with 155 career 3-point field goals made and trails only Andre

Young of Clemson (170) and is tied with Malcolm Grant of Clemson (155) as one of only three current players in the ACC who have made more than 150 career 3-point shots. Dulkys has become part of the Seminoles' winning tradition and has helped change the culture of the Florida State basketball program during his career as he has been a member of three NCAA Tournament teams, helped the Seminoles reach the Sweet 16 of the 2011 NCAA Tournament, played on Florida State's 2009 team that advanced to the ACC Tournament championship for the first time in school history and has helped the Seminoles to the championships of two tournaments - the Global Sports Classic in 2008 and the Old Spice Classic in 2009. In addition, Florida State has defeated 11 nationally ranked teams during his career including No. 1 North Carolina to advance to the 2009 ACC Tournament championship game and No. 1 Duke on Jan. 15, 2011. Florida State is the third winningest team in the ACC since the start of his career in 2008-09.

### AS A JUNIOR (2010-11)

\*Averaged 7.3 points (fifth on the team), a career-high 2.8 rebounds (sixth), 1.2 assists (third) and 1.3 steals (third) while making a team-leading 55 3-point shots in leading the Seminoles to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1993 and for the fourth time in school history.

\*Started a career high 24 games as a junior and has started 46 games in the first three seasons of his career including 46 of 65 during his sophomore and junior seasons. He started the first 15 games of his junior season and the final nine of the season including each of the Seminoles' three games in their NCAA Tournament run to the Sweet 16.

\*Averaged in double figures against three ACC teams: Wake Forest (15.0 ppg), Maryland (14.0 ppg) and Miami (11.5 ppg).

\*Made a team leading 55 3-point shots and made a career-high five in the Seminoles win over Florida International on Nov. 18, 2010.

\*Scored his career-high of 22 points in Florida State's victory over Florida International in Miami as he made a career high eight field goals including a career-high tying five 3-point field goals in the

Seminoles' 89-66 win over the Panthers to raise their record on the season to 4-0.

\*Tied his ACC career high of 17 points in Florida State's wins over Clemson (Dec. 12) and Miami (Feb. 26) in games played in Tallahassee.

\*In finishing with a career high 42 steals he totaled four steals twice (against North Florida and at NC State), at least three steals five times and multiple steals in 11 of 34 games.

\*Led Florida State in scoring in four games - 22 at Florida International, 17 vs. Clemson, Dec. 12, 16 vs. Wake Forest, Feb. 1, and 17 vs. Miami, Feb. 26.

\*Pulled down four rebounds in Florida State's only game of the season against NCAA Tournament participant Duke. The Seminoles defeated No. 1 ranked Duke, 66-61, in Tallahassee (Jan. 12) for the fourth ever win in school history over the nation's No. 1 ranked team. Dulkys earned 21 minutes of playing time in the win.

\*Averaged 11.5 points, 3.0 rebounds, 1.5 assists and 1.5 steals in two games against NIT participant Miami. He led the Seminoles with five 3-point field goals made and was a perfect two of two from the free throw line in the Seminoles' two-game regular

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season sweep of the Hurricanes. Scored 17 points and tied for team high honors in Florida State's win over the Hurricanes at home. Tied his ACC career high with four 3-point shots made in the win over Miami at home.

\*Averaged a team leading 15.0 points, 3.5 rebounds and 2.0 steals in two victories over Wake Forest. Scored a team high 16 points (to tie for game high scoring honors) to go along with three steals in 21 minutes of play in the Seminoles 85-61 win over the Deacons in Tallahassee (Feb. 1). Scored 14 points as a starter in Florida State's 84-66 win over Wake Forest in Winston-Salem (Feb. 19).

\*Averaged 4.7 points, 1.3 rebounds and 1.0 steals in three games during the NCAA Tournament. **X**avier Gibson is one of the most skilled and imposing forwards in the ACC who has proven his ability on both the offensive and defensive ends of the court during the first three years of his career and who will anchor one of the deepest and most talented frontlines in all of college basketball as a senior in 2011-12. He is one of the most incredibly talented players in college basketball who as a senior will need to display his talents in every minute of playing time he earns for the Seminoles to continue to be the most dominant defensive team in the ACC and across the country. Gibson enters his senior season ranked 24th in school history with 56 career blocked shots and will team with All-American candidate Bernard James to form one of the top shot blocking tandems in all of college basketball. With Gibson, James, senior Jon Kreft, junior Terrance Shannon and newcomer Keil Turpin patrolling, controlling and defending the basket for Florida State on the defensive end of the court, the Seminoles will

once again be one of the top defensive teams in the nation. Gibson has known nothing but success during his career as a Seminole as he has helped lead Florida State to three NCAA Tournaments including an appearance in the 2011 Sweet 16, the title game of the 2009 ACC Championship game, two regular season tournament championships (the 2008 Global Sports Classic and the 2009 Old Spice Classic) and to 10 victories over ranked teams including No. 1 ranked North Carolina in the semifinals of the 2009 ACC Tournament (March 14, 2009) and No. 1 ranked Duke in Tallahassee (Jan. 12, 2011). Gibson and his senior class teammates enter the 2011-12 season with 70 wins since the beginning of the 2008-09 season and are bidding to become the winningest senior class in school history. The winningest senior classes in school history (81 wins) came in 1975 (1972, 73, 74 and 75), 1992 (1989, 90, 91 and 92) and 1994 (1991, 92, 93 and 94).

Gibson returned to the court against No. 13 ranked North Carolina and played in each of the Seminoles' 12 remaining games of the season including their three games in the NCAA Tournament as they advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time since the 1993 season and for only the fourth time in school history.

\*Helped the Seminoles to their third consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance where Florida State defeated No. 20 Texas A&M and No. 5 Notre Dame to advance to the Sweet 16. Started a career-high 13 games – the first 13 games of the season to give him 16 career starting assignments for his career.

\*Tied his career high with 17 points in the Seminoles' victory in Tallahassee against Mercer (Nov. 23) and scored in double figures in wins over Mercer (17 points) and against Stetson (Dec. 15).

\*Averaged 1.3 points and 3.3 rebounds in three NCAA Tournament games as he helped lead the Seminoles to the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1993 and for only the fourth time in school history. He ranked fourth on the team in rebounds with 10 and was one of only four Florida State players who totaled double figure rebounds as the Seminoles defeated No. 20 Texas A&M and No. 5 Notre Dame in the United Center in Chicago and played VCU in the Sweet 16 at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Tex.

\*Averaged 6.0 points and 4.0 rebounds in two games played during the Diamond Head Classic. Florida State finished in third place in the event with victories over Hawaii and No. 15 Baylor and a close loss against national runner up Butler. Gibson shot .500 percent from the field (five of 10) and averaged 16.0 minutes in two games as a starter against the Rainbow Warriors and the Bulldogs. Was injured in the first half of the Seminoles game against Butler and missed the second half of that game and the next 12 Seminole games because of a broken left hand and a strained MCL in his left knee. Head Coach Leonard Hamilton and his staff along with Gibson's parents

decided against surgery and allowed the injuries to heal with treatment and old fashioned hard work.

\*Scored nine points and added five rebounds in 19 minutes of playing time in Florida State's only game of the season against NCAA Tournament participant Florida. Shot four of eight from the field (.500 percent) and pulled down his career high of five offensive rebounds against the Gators.

### AS A SOPHOMORE (2009-10)

\*Averaged a career-high 5.5 points (seventh on the team), 2.8 rebounds (fifth) and a career-high 0.8 blocked shots per game (third) as he led the team with a career-high .555 field goal shooting percentage.

\*Scored in double figures a career-high seven times including his career-high of 17 points in Florida State's victory over Alabama A&M. He totaled three consecutive double figure scoring games to begin the season against Jacksonville (12 points, Nov. 16), Stetson (11 points, Nov. 18) and Mercer (12 points, Nov. 21) to earn an average of 11.7 points per game as Florida State opened with a 3-0 record. He also earned consecutive double figure scoring games against UT Martin (12 points) and Alabama A&M (career-high 17 points) for a 14.5 points per game



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scoring average as the Seminoles closed out the calendar year with two victories.

\*Averaged 3.0 points and 1.0 rebound in two games against Boston College during the regular season. He shot .600 from the field and blocked two shots in the two victories over the Eagles that allowed the Seminoles to sweep the season series from Boston College for the first time in school history. Additionally, the Seminoles' victory over Boston College in Chestnut Hill marked the first time the Seminoles had defeated the Eagles at the Conte Forum on the BC campus.

\*Totaled six points and four rebounds in 13 minutes of play in the Seminoles' only game of the season against NCAA National Champion Duke. All six of his points came in the first half as the Seminoles' played neck and neck with the Blue Devils for most of the first half. Gibson scored on a jumper at the 13:38 mark of the first half and pulled the Seminoles to within one at 12-11. Scored four points in a span of 1:06 to pull Florida State to within two at 28-26 with 5:21 left before intermission.

## AS A FRESHMAN (2008-09)

\*Averaged 2.3 points (11th on the team), and 1.4 rebounds (eighth) while shooting .528 from the field (second) and blocking 11 shots in 32 games played during his freshman season.

\*Among the Seminoles' three true freshmen, Gibson played in the third highest total number of games (32) behind only Chris Singleton and Luke Loucks who played in all 35 games during the 2008-09 season for the Seminoles.

\*Scored his season-high of 11 points against Charleston Southern (Dec. 18) and scored his ACC career-high of six points at Miami (Jan. 21) and in the Seminoles' win at home against Clemson (Feb. 28).

\*Displayed his scoring abilities early during his freshman season as he totaled his career-high of 11 points in the Seminoles' victory over Charleston Southern.

\* He was nearly perfect from the field (three of four) and from the free throw line (five of six) as he helped Florida State to the 71-48 victory over the Buccaneers.

**B**ernard James is the nation's next rising star, whose magnitude began to sparkle during his junior season as he helped lead Florida State to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in 2011. James burst onto the Division I skyscape after two seasons at Tallahassee Community College and six years defending the honor of our nation as a member of the United States Air Force. He begins his senior season as an All-America and an All-ACC candidate as one of the emerging big men in all of college basketball. When Florida State needed a rebound in advancing to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament, he reached for the sky and pulled it down. When Florida State needed a defensive stop with a blocked shot, he skied above players taller in stature than he was and sent the ball back from where it came. James finished his junior season ranked second in the ACC in total blocked shots with 82, third in the ACC blocked shots per game (2.4), and 16th in the league in rebounds per game (5.9) while his .657 field goal percentage was the second best for a single season in Florida State history and would have led the ACC during the 2011 season but his attempts per game (5.2) fell just short of the ACC and NCAA minimums to be included in the league and national statistics (5.5). His 82 blocked shots are ranked as the second highest single season total in school history and he enters his senior season already ranked 14th in school history with 82 career blocked shots and is looking to become

only the 11th player in school history with 100 or more career blocked shots.

James completed a six-year term in the US Air Force (2003-08) and was stationed in Iraq and Qatar in the Middle East during his deployment. As recently as August 2007, he was stationed in Camp Bucca in southern Iraq as a member of the Air Force Military police that helped the Army keep watch on 22,000 detainees. He completed his military service and enrolled at Tallahassee Community College for the 2008-09 season. James earned his GED in 2002 and enlisted in the Air Force at age 17 - he began basic training just months after his 17th birthday in 100-degree heat in San Antonio, Texas and worked on the Air Force security forces where he developed his leadership skills and toughness. James was volunteered for the Air Force intramural program by his supervisor while at Beale Air Force Base in northern California. He was a member of the United States Armed Forces All-Star team that competed in the 2008 International Military Sports Council Basketball Championship and named the tournament MVP and to the All-Tournament team. James led the USA to the championship of the event with an 84-74 victory over Lithuania. He totaled 12 points, 18 rebounds and six blocked shots in the championship clinching game against Lithuania. James was first seen by Seminole head coach Leonard Hamilton in 2005 in Las Vegas at a U.S. Armed Forces All-Star tournament.

### AS A JUNIOR (2010-11)

\*Averaged 8.6 points (fourth on the team), 5.9 rebounds (second), 2.4 blocked shots (first) and shot a team leading .657 from the field in leading the Seminoles to a 22-13 record, an 11-5 record in ACC play, a third place finish in the ACC standings and to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in his first season as a Seminole. He led the team in total rebounds with 201 and total blocked shots with 82, playing in all 34 games.

\*Started the final 21 games of the season including the Seminoles' final 15 ACC games, their game against Virginia Tech in the ACC Championship tournament and all three games in the NCAA Tournament.

\*Has an amazing touch around the basket as he made more than 65 percent of his field goal attempts in his first season. He was perfect from the field in five different games including an eight of eight performance in the Seminoles' victory over NC State (Jan. 15) and

a five of five performance against Virginia Tech in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament (March 11).

\*Averaged in double figures in scoring against four ACC Teams: NC State (15.0 ppg), Wake Forest (14.0 ppg), Boston College (12.0 ppg) and North Carolina (10.0 ppg) and shot .682 percent (15 of 22) in three NCAA Tournament games, .663 percent (59 of 89) in 18 games against non-ACC opponents, .636 (28 of 44) in seven games against teams that played in the NIT, .615 (32 of 52) in eight games against ranked opponents, 585 (28 of 65) against 11 teams that played in the NCAA Tournament and .500 percent (eight of 16) in three games during the Diamond Head Classic.

\*Was Florida State's leading scorer in seven different games: 15 against North Florida (Nov. 21), 11 against Hartford (Dec. 5), 8 against Clemson (Dec. 12), 16 against NC State (Jan. 15), 16 against Wake Forest (Feb. 1), 11 against Virginia Tech (March 11) and 14 in the NCAA Tournament against Notre Dame (March 20).

\*Scored 12 points and pulled down seven rebounds in Florida State's only game against NIT participant Boston College. Was a perfect three of three from the field and a near perfect six of eight from the free throw line in leading the Seminoles to the 67-51 victory over the Eagles in Tallahassee (Jan. 22). James led Florida State's defensive effort with four blocked shots - the Seminoles blocked seven shots and limited Boston College to .354 shooting from the field in the win.

\*Scored eight points, pulled down five rebounds and blocked one shot in the Seminoles' only game against NCAA Tournament participant Duke. His effort in a starting role helped the Seminoles defeat the No. 1 ranked Blue Devils, 66-61, in Tallahassee (Jan. 12). The win over the nation's No. 1 ranked team was the fourth in school history and first time James had played in a win over the nation's top ranked team.

\*Averaged 8.5 points and a team leading 7.0 rebounds in two games against NIT participant Miami. He also averaged 2.0 blocked shots per game as the

Seminole won both games during the regular season with wins in both Coral Gables and Tallahassee. Totaled eight points and a team high tying eight rebounds in the Seminole tremendous come from behind victory over the Hurricanes in the first games of the regular season series. Scored nine points, pulled down six rebounds and blocked two shots as Florida State defeated Miami, 65-59, in Tallahassee (Feb. 26).

\*Averaged 10.0 points, 3.5 rebounds, 3.0 blocked shots and shot .643 from the field in two games against NCAA Tournament participant North Carolina. Was one of three Seminoles who averaged in double figure points against the Tar Heels. He became the first player in school history to be perfect on at least eight shots in an ACC game and became one of only four players in school history to be perfect on at least eight shots from the field in a single game in school history.

\*Averaged 14.0 points and a team leading 6.5 rebounds in leading Florida State to a pair of wins over Wake Forest. He was incredible from the field with a .786 shooting percentage (11 of 14) in the two Seminole wins. Also shot well from the free throw line as he made six of seven attempts (.857) from the line.

\*Florida State's third leading scorer with a 10.7 points per game average and tied as its leader in rebounds with an 8.3 rebounds per game average as he helped lead the Seminoles to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since the 1993 season and for only the fourth time in school history. **J**on Kreft is an imposing and intimidating force in the post for the Seminoles whose undiscovered talents will help Florida State's front line rank as one of the best and tallest in all of college basketball during the 2011-12 season. He will team with fellow senior Xavier Gibson (6-11), freshman Kiel Turpin (6-11), All-American candidate Bernard James (6-10) and junior Terrance Shannon (6-8) to give Florida State one of the most experienced and talented group of post players in America. The returning quartet of Kreft (25 games played), Gibson (89 games played), James (34 games played) and Shannon (45 games played) gives the Seminoles' attacking front line a total of 194 career games

played. Add in Turpin – an All-American transfer – and Florida State has the makings of one of the most physically dominating groups of players at one position on any team at any level of college basketball. Kreft enters his final season of eligibility at Florida State in 2011-12 with the chance to help lead the Seminoles to a school record fourth consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. He played in 25 games during his first season at Florida State and helped the Seminoles to a 23-11 overall record, an 11-5 mark in ACC play, a third place finish in the ACC standings and a spot in the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament.

## AS A JUNIOR (2010-11)

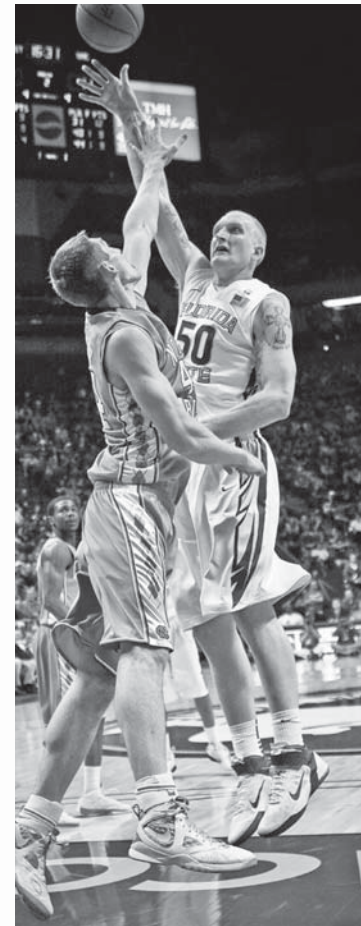

**T**errance Shannon is a powerful player who announced his arrival at Florida State and in the ACC as a sophomore and who will be a presence for the Seminoles during the remaining two years of his collegiate career. He started five games including the Seminoles' victory over No. 1 Duke on Jan. 12, 2011 in helping the Seminoles to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1993 and for only the fourth time in school history during the 2010-11 season. Shannon played in a career high 27 games as a sophomore in helping lead Florida State to a 23-11 overall record, an 11-5 record in ACC play, a third place finish in the ACC standings and an appearance in the school record tying third consecutive NCAA Tournament. Shannon has known nothing but winning during the first two years of his Florida State career -- with Shannon on the roster, the Seminoles have a 45-21 overall record (.681 winning percentage), are 21-9 in the ACC (.700 winning percentage), have finished in the top four of the ACC

standings twice, have played in two NCAA Tournaments, advanced to the Sweet 16 of the 2011 NCAA Tournament and are the third winningest program in the ACC. The Seminoles are statistically also one of the nation's top teams during Shannon's career. The Seminoles are the top defensive team in the nation and have led the nation in field goal percentage defense in both of the last two years with Shannon in the line-up. Florida State led the nation and the ACC with a .363 mark -- the second consecutive season they have led the nation in the most telling defensive statistic kept by the NCAA -- the Seminoles are the first team to repeat as the field goal percentage national champions since Marquette in the 1993 and 1994 seasons. Florida State has defeated six nationally ranked teams with Shannon on the roster including No. 1 Duke during the 2011 regular season as well as No. 20 Texas A&M and No. 5 Notre Dame in the 2011 NCAA Tournament to advance to the Sweet 16.

### AS A SOPHOMORE (2010-11)

\*Averaged a career-high 4.7 points (tied for eighth on the team) and a career high 2.7 rebounds (tied for seventh) while playing in a career-high 27 games. He started a career high five games (Duke, NC State, at Miami, Boston College and at Clemson) before a knee injury kept him out of the line-up for five games. Shannon underwent successful arthroscopic surgery on his left knee on Feb. 4 following the Seminoles' game at Clemson and missed only five games before returning to the line-up on Feb. 19 at Wake Forest.

\*His play helped Florida State play in its school record tying third consecutive NCAA Tournament and reach the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since the 1993 season. Florida State won 23 games, had an 11-5 record in ACC play, finished in third place in the ACC standings and solidified their place as the third winningest program in the ACC in the last six seasons behind only Duke and North Carolina. He played in four wins over nationally ranked teams -- No. 1 Duke, No. 5 Notre Dame in the NCAA Tournament, No. 15 Baylor in the Diamond Head Classic and No. 20 Texas A&M in the NCAA Tournament.

\*Florida State was the best defensive team in the nation and the ACC during Shannon's second season

as a Seminole. The Seminoles led the nation for the second consecutive season in field goal percentage defense, were fifth in blocked shots, 15th in 3-point field goal percentage defense and 24th in steals. The Seminoles ranked first in the ACC field goal percentage defense, first in 3-point field goal percentage defense, first in blocked shots, second in scoring defense and second in steals.

\*Scored in double figures in four different games -- with at least 10 points coming against Stetson (Dec. 15), NC State (Jan. 15), Miami (Jan. 19) and at Maryland (Feb. 23).

\*A near double-double of 15 points and nine rebounds came in Florida State's win over NC State at home.

\*Inserted into the starting line-up during a five game span in January that saw the Seminoles earn a 4-1 record with wins over No. 1 Duke, NC State and Boston College at home and at Miami. He totaled double figure scoring twice as a starter with an ACC career high tying 12 points coming against NC State and 10 more coming at Miami.

\*Scored six points and pulled down four rebounds in Florida State's only game against NCAA Tournament participant Duke during the 2010-11 season. In Shan-

non's first career start the Seminoles defeated the No. 1 ranked Blue Devils, 66-61, in Tallahassee (Jan. 12). Shannon found out he would start five minutes before the game began when Associate Head Coach Stan Jones wrote his name into the starting line-up during the Seminoles' final pre-game team meeting. Tied for the team lead with three offensive rebounds and one blocked shot as Florida State limited Duke to 61 points and .311 shooting from the field.

\*Scored 12 points and pulled down four rebounds to go along with two steals in the Seminoles' only game of the season against Maryland. Was Florida State's third leading scorer as he tied his ACC career high with 12 points on a career high six made field goals.

\*Averaged 9.0 points, 5.5 rebounds and 1.0 steals in two games against NC State. Was a perfect six of six from the free throw line in the two game sweep of NC State. A near double-double of 12 points and nine rebounds to go along with two steals in a career high 29 minutes as a starter in Florida State's victory over NC State, 84-71, in Tallahassee (Jan. 15).

\*Averaged 1.3 points and 1.7 rebounds in three games during the NCAA Tournament as Florida State advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1993 and for only the fourth time in school history. The Seminoles defeated No. 20 ranked and seventh

The Seminoles' victories over the nationally ranked Aggies and the nationally ranked Fighting Irish marked the third and fourth victories of the season over nationally ranked teams

\*Totaled two points and four rebounds in nine minutes of playing time to help lead Florida State past No. 5 ranked and second seeded Notre Dame in the third round of the 2011 NCAA Tournament. **M**ichael Snaer is quickly developing into one of the best and most well rounded players in the ACC who has worked to have a breakout season as a junior as he accepts a leadership role amongst his Seminole teammates for the remaining two seasons of his Florida State career. He has played on two NCAA Tournament teams and helped the Seminoles advance to the Sweet 16 of the 2011 NCAA Tournament to mark the first time since the 1993 season and only the fourth time in school history the Seminoles had advanced to the second weekend of the NCAA Tournament. Snaer is a two-year returning starter and the Seminoles' leading returning scorer entering the 2011-12 season. Florida State has a 45-21 overall record and a 21-11 record in the ACC. The Seminoles have defeated six nationally ranked teams with Snaer in their line-up including No. 1 Duke (Jan. 12, 2011) and No. 5 Notre Dame (March 20, 2011) to mark only the second time in school history the Seminoles have

defeated two top five ranked teams in the same season. Snaer has helped Florida State continue to become a national program of significance during his career. The Seminoles are the third winningest team in the ACC in the last two seasons with Snaer on the roster and the third winningest team in the ACC in the last six seasons. In addition, his commitment to defense has helped Florida State earn the title of the nation's best defensive team during the first two years of his career. The Seminoles have led the nation in field goal percentage defense and ranked fifth nationally in 2011 in blocked shots during Snaer's first two seasons. Snaer became only the fifth freshman in school history to be named to the ACC All Freshmen team joining Corey Louis (1995), Michael Joiner (2001), Alexander Johnson (2004) and Solomon Alabi (2009) -- both Johnson and Alabi were second round NBA Draft choices as early entry candidates after enjoying outstanding career as Seminoles.

## AS A SOPHOMORE (2010-11)

\*Averaged a career high tying 8.8 points (third on the team), 2.7 rebounds (tied for seventh), a career high 2.2 assists (third) and 0.9 steals (fourth) while starting 33 of the Seminoles' 34 games and helping lead them to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1993.

\*Florida State finished the 2010-11 season with a 23-11 record, an 11-5 mark and in third place finish in the ACC standings, a school record tying third consecutive NCAA Tournament berth and a trip to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for only the fourth time in the history of the program.

\*Averaged in double figure scoring against four different ACC teams: Virginia (16.0 ppg), Georgia Tech (15.0 ppg), Boston College (13.0 ppg) and NC State (13.0 ppg).

\*Ranked second on the team with a career-high 43 3-point shots made. His 43 3-point shots made rank as the seventh highest single season total by a Seminole sophomore. Snaer made his career high of five 3-point field goals against nationally ranked Florida and made multiple 3-point field goals in 12 of the Seminoles' 34 games.

\*Finished his junior season with a career high .776 free throw shooting percentage - the fourth highest on the team and third highest among the Seminoles' season long rotation. Shot an incredible .840 percent from the free throw line in 16 ACC games - he made 21 of 25 shots from the line in conference competition.

\*Scored 13 points and was credited with one blocked shot and one steal in Florida State's only game of the season against NIT participant Boston College.

\*Scored six points and pulled down two rebounds in Florida State's only game of the season against NCAA Tournament participant Duke. The Seminoles defeated the No. 1 ranked Blue Devils, 66-61, for the fourth ever win over the nation's top ranked team in school history (Feb. 12).

\*Scored 15 points and was credited with three assists in Florida State's only game of the season against Georgia Tech. He shot the ball well against the Yellow Jackets as he made six of seven shots from the field (.667), one of two shots from 3-point range (.500) and two of three free throw shots (.667). Led the team with his three assists and was second on the team in scoring as Florida State won, 72-63, in Atlanta (Feb. 10).

**I**an Miller displayed flashes of brilliance in his first season as a Seminole and is destined to become one of top players in a golden era of Florida State basketball during his career. He showed his ability to run the Seminoles' offense, his deadly shooting stroke and his ability to generate instant offense in 23 games during his freshman season as he helped lead the Seminoles to the Sweet 16 of the 2011 NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1993 and the fourth time in school history. He is destined to become one of Florida State's all-time top 3-point shooting players as he made 24 shots and shot .358 from the bonusphere as a freshman. Miller played well on the biggest of stages as a freshman for the Seminoles as he averaged 5.5 points and 2.0 rebounds in three NCAA Tournament games and in one ACC Tournament game in 2011. Miller totaled 10 points against Virginia Tech in his first career ACC Tournament game and scored seven points against Texas A&M in his first career NCAA Tournament game. Helped Florida State

defeat four ranked teams during his freshman season including No. 1 ranked Duke (66-61, Jan. 12) for the fourth win in school history over the nation's No. 1 team -- the Seminoles also earned victories over No. 5 ranked Notre Dame in the NCAA Tournament (71-57, March 20), No. 15 ranked Baylor (68-61, Dec. 25) and No. 20 ranked Texas A&M in the NCAA Tournament (57-50, March 18). **O**karo White has worked to make a fabulous freshman season translate into a sensational sophomore season as he started the final 13 games of the 2010-11 season and helped lead the Seminoles to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles' appearance in the Sweet 16 marked the school record tying third consecutive season the Seminoles played in the NCAA Tournament. White led Florida State in free throw shooting as a freshman with a team leading .828 mark from the free throw line and ranked third in the ACC among all freshmen behind only Kyrie Irving of Duke (.901) and Ryan Harrow of NC State (.870) - with White the only one of the three players still playing in the ACC. He was the only Seminole to shoot .900 percent or better (.929, 13 of 14) from the free throw line in the 2011 NCAA Tournament. White also

helped lead Florida State to four wins over ranked teams including No. 1 ranked Duke (Jan. 12) and No. 5 Notre Dame in the NCAA Tournament (March 20) marking the second time in the last three years and the third time in the nine year tenure of head coach Leonard Hamilton that the Seminoles had defeated at least four ranked teams in a single season. He played extraordinarily well as a starter in each of the final 13 games of the season and helped Florida State to an 8-5 record including two wins in the NCAA Tournament and six regular season ACC wins. White's play as a starter in the Seminoles' final nine ACC games of the season helped Florida State to a 6-3 record which allowed them to finish with an 11-5 record in conference play and a third place finish in the ACC standings. White also

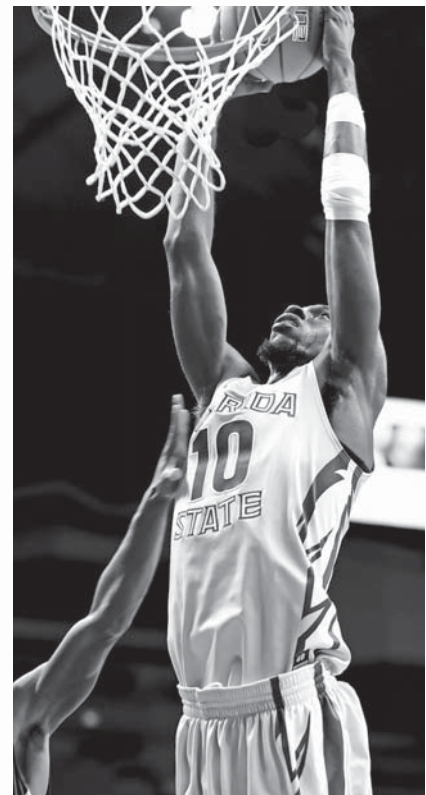

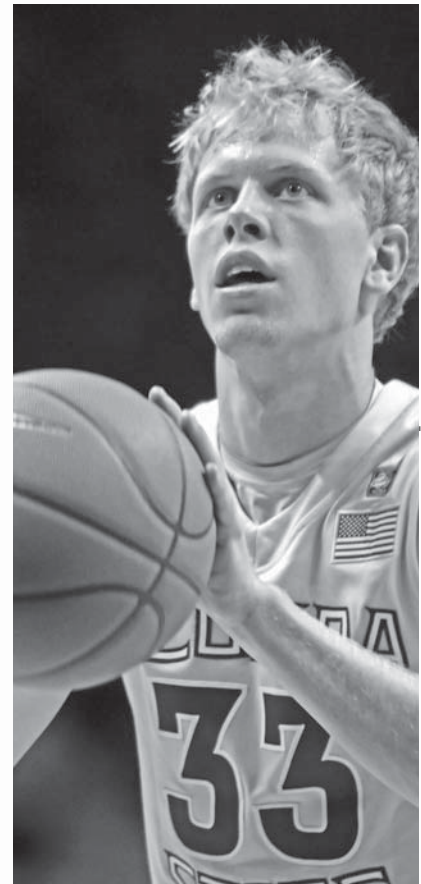
