

#### MEDIA INFORMATION

Florida State University's 1981-82 Baseball Media Guide has been designed for use by the news media and Seminole fans. Any questions not covered in the brochure can be directed to the Florida State Sports Information Office.

All requests for working press, radio, television, photographer or scouting credentials should be made to FSU Sports Information Director Mark Carlson at least one week prior to the playing date.

**WORKING MEDIA** — Working media will be admitted to Seminole Field and seated in the press box. Additional seating will be provided in the stands if necessary. Tickets may be picked up prior to the game or at the Will Call window.

Requests will be evaluated and credentials issued according to the following criteria:

- a. Local metropolitan press; wire services; national publications; opposing metropolitan press; student newspapers.
- b. Other daily newspapers.
- c. Radio and television personnel not actually broadcasting.
- d. Non-daily newspapers.
- e. Scouts.

PARKING — Easy access to Seminole Field through tunnel adjacent to Campbell Stadium.

**PHOTOGRAPHERS** — Accredited photographers, upon presenting press passes, will be allowed to shoot in the proper locations along the foul line. NO freelance photographers will be permitted on the field.

**TELEVISION** — Facilities are available for both network and local broadcast.

**RADIO** — Sections are reserved for both Florida State and opposing radio in the baseball press box. FSU grants broadcast rights to the official radio outlet of the visiting team on a reciprocal basis.

**PHONES** — Telephone service should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Tallahasee, Florida. Call 904/222-2236. Have them contact the Sports Information Office for location.

**SERVICES** — Score cards will be provided along with programs for visiting and home media.

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## Florida State THE BEST IN COLLEGE BASEBALL

Few college baseball teams have had the success the Florida State squads have maintained since 1948.

But this is no surprise to those close to the college baseball scene. Long a dominant force not only in the southeast but coast to coast, the Seminoles year in and year out live up to the reputation of "The Best in College Baseball."

Florida State's most recent trip to the College World Series in 1980 marked the seventh appearance in the NCAA Championship Tournament for the Seminoles. Only five other teams have equaled that mark. FSU's 46 victories in championship play are the third most recorded.

Florida State's baseball excellence is widely recognized around the nation. Many Seminole players are recommended to FSU coaches who have said, "if there is a boy who is determined to get an education before turning pro we enthusiastically recommend Florida State. He is going to get as much or more experience and training there as he will anywhere in the country." High school and junior college coaches are also aware of the Florida State program. It's reflected in a roster that boasts young players from every part of the country.

For the Florida State athlete, baseball truly has a year-round season. The mild Florida winters make it possible for the Seminoles to begin work upon arrival in the fall and continue through June. Following the completion of a 70-game regular season, the players take one week off and return to play a 45-game summer schedule. The year-round schedule gives the varsity baseball players a chance to play in over 140 games. Highlighting Florida State's fall season is the annual 'Oldtimers Game' against the Alumni at Homecoming. Visiting the Seminoles campus last fall were former skipper Dick Howser and major leaguers Terry Kennedy and Danny O'Brien. Although the emphasis is on instruction during all training, a schedule of 30 informal games is played. An extensive conditioning program continues through December.

Following the holiday break, practice resumes early in January as preparations are made for the upcoming spring season. The preseason practice sessions are highlighted by the appearance of many ballplayers who stop by on the way to spring training at major league camps downstate. Many of these players are former Seminoles and offer valuable tips and coaching to current players. Even without this 'bonus' coaching, the Florida State player receives the finest tutoring anywhere.

Once the spring collegiate season is over and final exams are through, the Seminole player may remain in Tallahassee and play with





the Florida State summer team. Other Seminoles head for the summer leagues and independent semi-pro teams throughout the country. Past Florida State players have joined with United States All-Star teams and traveled to South and Central America, Europe and Japan.

All this opportunity to play does not mean that there is not an emphasis on academics. Florida State's athletic program includes an outstanding academic advisement office that is prepared to meet any need the student-athlete may have. Academic counselors are not only interested in that the athlete remains eligible to play, but that he is making genuine progress towards a degree.

Facilities are another big factor in the Seminole's program. Few colleges can boast the on-campus facilities of Florida State. Seminole Field is the site of all Seminole home games. Night games, which became popular in the mid-1960's are a special part of the schedule. The implementation of permanent concrete lights, the best anywhere, make night games an exciting event for the FSU campus and the entire Tallahassee community. The familiar pro scoreboard still remains in operation. In June 1982, a one million dollar renovation program will begin, featuring the addition of over 2,000 covered chair back seats, 3,000 additional aluminum seats and a new press box. During the 1981 Metro Tournament, Seminole Field was viewed and admired by thousands throughout the country via cable television. There are also two pro-style batting circles that make Seminole Field equivalent to many of the finest major league parks. It is kept in condition year-round by the FSU Department of Grounds under the supervision of Bruce Nelson and Robert Barrett. In addition to the main field, the Seminoles also have at their disposal two full diamonds, several batting cages, a jugs speed gun, pitching mounds and pitching machines.

One of the finest Nautilus facilities in collegiate ball is also available for the year-round conditioning program. A highly experienced group of FSU trainers assist the player with any medical needs.

Seminole coaches in all sports call Florida State fans, "the finest anywhere" and that is certainly true in baseball. The Tribe is supported by large enthusiastic groups of campus and community fans at every game. The average home attendance is 2,000 and often the 4,000 seat bleachers are filled to capacity. Fan support does not stop with home game attendance. Many follow the squad to away games as well. A Seminole Dugout Club has been formed by one group of long time followers and the enthusiastic student fans have formed their own bleacher burn section to go along with the famous 'Animals' who haunt opposing coaches and players.

An added bonus are visits by a major league ballclub. The visit last season by the Atlanta Braves marked the third by a pro team in the last four seasons.





#### Season In Review

After a record setting 51 wins in his rookie year as skipper of the Florida State baseball team, onlookers wondered what head coach Mike Martin could possibly do for an encore. Not only did the Martin led squad equal the 1980 mark, but they added five games to the total.


The final ledger read 56-23—a fitting tribute to a mostly senior team. Again, FSU came back from the losers bracket to win its second consecutive Metro Conference crown and earn a trip to Miami for the NCAA South Regional—its second in two years.

The squad performed well during the regular season, sweeping a pair of series with Clemson and Metro rival Memphis State, taking three of five from World Series entrant South Carolina and defeating another CWS team Miami.

The team even beat the Atlanta Braves 5-1 in a special exhibition game played in Tallahassee.

While no individuals alone guaranteed success, several players were outstanding. Mike Fuentes broke Bob Horner's NCAA career homerun mark with 64 and rewrote many other FSU records. Jeff Ledbetter became the FSU single season RBI record holder with 95, and Jay Keeler also placed himself in the record book with 32 appearances—29 in relief. There was also the senior leadership provided by graduated players Don DeLoach, Craig Ramsey and Lionel Martinez, and the play of sophomore Mike Yastrzemski who reminded many people of his father. There was Mark Lacy's 19 game hitting streak—tying an FSU record, and Jamey Shouppe's 29 relief appearances—tying Keeler for all-time honors.

There were two consecutive victories in the NCAA South Regional, one a 5-1 complete game victory over Florida by Rick Hatcher, who joins Fuentes in AA minor league ball this season.



### Season Outlook

When you lose 10 of 16 regular players, five who were starters, you would expect it to be a rebuilding year. Not so fast says Florida State head coach Mike Martin, and with a talented group of recruits and a strong nucleus, the third year coach may be right.

"We're young and inexperienced, but we have potential, Martin said. "In my rookie year as manager we were in a similar situation. We had some juniors, but no senior experience and a bunch of freshmen. That year we won 51 games—a Florida State record until last year. I'm hoping our players will mature quickly and continue the great tradition we've established at FSU."

#### **OUTFIELD**

Old familiar No. 29 Mike Fuentes will not be patrolling centerfield this season, but the outfield still appears strong. The top returning player should be right fielder Mike Yastrzemski. A starter since arriving in Tallahassee two years ago, Yaz has produced nearly identical statistics in two seasons. His lifetime .303 average combined with his 53 extra base hits—19 for homeruns—makes him a vital cog in the Seminole machine. A 'big game' player like his famous father, his top performances have come in post season competition. Already to his credit are two consecutive All-Metro tournament honors, a berth on the 1980 and 1981 NCAA all-regional teams and an MVP selection in the 1980 South Regional. Yastrzemski's bat, glove and leadership will be very important in the young Florida State outfield.

Battling for the remaining two positions are Chris Cawthon, Steve Givens and David Rhino. Cawthon, the lone senior and the only one among the trio to have played with FSU last season, split his playing duty between left field and first base in 1981. In 64 games he batted .257 with 10 round-trippers. Prior to joining the Tribe last season he played ball for DeKalb South Junior College in Atlanta where he set the school mark for homeruns and was selected to the all-state junior college tournament team.

A second year Seminole without playing an inning is converted catcher Steve Givens. A former transfer gaining eligibility this season, Givens topped the FSU summer team in hitting with a .427 average. Possibly the most improved hitter on the team, he demonstrated power hitting a homerun against the alumni in the final game of fall practice to give the active players a ninth inning come from behind win. The lone freshman vying for an outfield spot is Atlanta native David Rhino. And, while only a rookie, Rhino has the credentials to look like a veteran. He was used primarily as a pitcher at Henderson High School, throwing a one-hitter and a non hitter his senior season while batting a .470. His talents were so impressive he was a draft selection of the San Francisco Giants.

Also in the outfield if needed are Jeff S. Ledbetter and Hal Cohen.

#### INFIELD

The lone area where the Tribe returns players to key positions is the infield. At first base will be returnees Mark Lacy and Jeff S. Ledbetter. Lacy, one of the best pure hitters in the Seminole lineup, played in only 54 games for the Tribe last year after gaining eligibility near midseason. During that time he hit a blistering .348, with 14 doubles, 12 homeruns and 46 runs batted in. Lacy also hit safely in 19 straight games tying an FSU mark and during that span kept his average above .400. Ledbetter, like Lacy, must have his bat in the Seminole lineup. The all-time FSU single season RBI king (95), he refused a fourth round selection by the Montreal Expos to earn his degree. In three seasons Ledbetter's accomplishments look like a shopping list. He was selected Sporting News All-America, All-Metro and All-Metro Tournament and to the All-Alaska Tournament team. The top returning hitter on the Tribe, he batted .333 last season with 19 doubles and 23 homeruns. His 55 career homeruns place him ten away from surpassing Fuentes for the all-time NCAA career homerun crown.





Also back with playing experience is shortstop Mark Barineau. While playing a reserve role behind graduated senior Don DeLoach last season, Barineau still appeared in 40 games batting .244. His top attributes are his speed—15 stolen bases without being caught—and his ability to get on base—25 walks, seven hit by the pitch. Barineau also improved in the field and at the plate as the season continued and batted .362 for the Florida State summer team to nail down the starting shortstop spot. Also returning in the infield is third baseman Rick Figueredo. Like Yastrzemski, Figueredo has started since arriving in Tallahassee and has played well. As a freshman he batted .352 and his career average is a healthy .307 with 63 runs batted in. One of the top fielders on the team, Figueredo handles the hot corner like a veteran.

The lone spot up for grabs is second base. Lost to graduation was Lionel Martinez, but hoping to fill his shoes are a trio of young players with limitless potential. The oldest player in the group, Matt Robinson joins the team after playing two seasons at George Wallace Community College. A former walk-on, Robinson played his high school ball at Tallahassee Godby. One of two freshmen, Danny Griffin comes to FSU from Niceville HS. The all-time Florida prep homerun king (27) Griffin had a .434 lifetime average at Niceville and earned MVP honors in 1980 and 1981. Also vying for the position is Tallahassee Lincoln product Bart Mitchell. Batting .367 his senior season, Mitchell swipped 24 consecutive bases and led the team in runs with 34. An all-Big Bend selection, he was honored with the Stephen Hillard Memorial Award presented to the player with the most leadership and competitive spirit. All three players are expected to provide immediate help.

#### PITCHING

If pitching is the key to a successful baseball team, FSU should be very potent in 1982. On the mound for the Seminoles are two of the top relievers in the nation and a blend a proven veterans and very promising newcomers.

The Rich Gossage and Ron Davis of collegiate baseball are right-hander Jay Keeler and southpaw Jamey Shouppe. Opting to complete his degree instead of joining the New York Mets, Keeler returns for his senior season with excellent credentials. Last season he was the ace in the Tribe bullpen, but this year he will return to the mound as a starter. In 32 appearances—a Florida State record—Keeler was 6-5 with a 3.45 ERA striking out 51 batters and recording seven saves. On the other side, Shouppe will remain in the pen where he tied Keeler in relief appearances (29) and struck out 47 batters in just 44 innings. The senior also earned a 3-1 mark and six saves.

On the right side of the mound returning starters Tim Phillips and Jeff Gray are joined by David Ledbetter, Jeff A. Ledbetter, and Bruce





Tanner, Phillips, one of the most pleasant surprises in 1981, led the staff in earned run average with a 2.83 mark in 73.2 innings while recording a 5-2 record compared to his 1-0 record in 19.0 innings the previous year. Only a sophomore, Gray hurled 36 innings with a 3-1 record, and tore up the Florida State summer league with a 9-1 record and a 1.57 ERA in 63 innings. Joining the two veterans is junior college transfer David Ledbetter. At Chipola Ledbetter he earned all-division honors, had a 2-1 mark with a 1.80 earned run average and was a fourth round selection by the Baltimore Orioles, Originally signing a football scholarship at FSU, leff A. Ledbetter earned all-state honors in football, baseball and basketball at the prep level. With the Florida State summer squad he appeared seven times for a 2-1 mark. A freshman in eligibility, Tanner returns to FSU after recovering from a painful knee injury that forced his transition from catcher to the mound. A fine athlete, he has developed a excellent sinker and should see immediate action. The son of Pittsburgh Pirate manager Chuck Tanner, he was a draft selection out of high school by the Chicago Cubs.

While experience dots the right side of the mound, freshmen account for half of the southpaws on the team. At FSU for their rookie year are Steve Gelmine, Robert Alexander and Todd Morgan. A 13th round selection by the Cleveland Indians, Gelmine received nearly every accolade at the prep level where he recorded a 7-1 record and a 0.83 ERA while striking out 93 batters in 56 innings. A Maryland all-state selection, Alexander won seven games his senior year, but recorded an 11-1 mark with Johnny's, one of the top summer league teams in the nation. The No. 1 prospect in Virginia, Morgan relied on a 90 plus mile an hour fastball to fan 123 batters in 72 innings including a 21 strikeout performance in a seven inning game. Along with Shouppe, the returning lefthanders are senior Allen Swindle and junior David Smalley. Swindle was 5-2 last season and 3-1 with the FSU summer league team with a 1.48 earned run average. He increased his work from one inning pitched in 1980 to 40 in 1981. The top middle distance reliever on the staff, Smalley returns to the team with seven career wins vs. only one loss. He has been the winning pitcher in the last two Metro Conference Championship games.

#### CATCHING

Splitting the catcher duty are juniors Danny Dowell and Billy Ashford. After sharing catching duties with departed senior Craig Ramsey last year, Dowell is penciled in for the starting role. In 40 games he batted .247 and gunned down 10 opposing base runners. Ashford was an all-region junior college selection, a mideast all-star catcher and all-county and all-state at the prep level.







## MIKE MARTIN Head Coach

On February 10, 1981 Florida State head coach Mike Martin accomplished a feat that his seven predecessors were unable to match. In less than two years at the Seminole helm Martin had already recorded his 100th FSU win—a 5-3 victory over Valdosta State. Prior to Martin's record, no Florida State coach was



able to earn win No. 100 before three sesons. Now, with two consecutive record setting winning seasons 'No. 1' is ready to begin his third campaign wearing the managers cap.

In just two seasons Martin has already:

- -recorded 107 wins against 35 losses
- —set the Florida State record for wins in a single season, capturing 56 games last year.
- —taken FSU to the College World Series in 1980
- —led the squad to two consecutive Metro Conference Championships
- —participated in two NCAA Regional Tournaments, winning the South Regional in 1980.

No wonder Tallahassee is having a love affair with the very popular coach. Seminole fans are not the only ones that have acknowledged Martin's hard work. Again in 1981 he was named Metro Conference Coach of the Year for the second consecutive season, and in 1980 he was voted the Diamond Club Coach of the Year.

An assistant under Woody Woodward and present Kansas City manager Dick Howser, Martin joined the Seminole staff in 1975 as an assistant to Woodward. Showing his skill in both on the field coaching and recruiting, Martin was named full time assistant in 1978. Following the departure of Woodward, Howser immediately asked the talented coach to remain on the staff. When Howser returned to professional baseball, Martin was named head baseball coach November 27, 1979.

Martin enjoyed a two year career at Florida State starting in 1965 after coming from Wingate Junior college where he earned All-America honors two consecutive years. At FSU, he established himself as an outstanding outfielder and twice was selected to the all-district team.

Following his collegiate career, the Charlotte, N.C. native had a three year professional stint with the New York Mets and Detroit Tigers organizations before returning to the Tallahassee area to teach and coach.

His coaching record includes several years as baseball and basketball coach at the junior high school level, then a year as head basketball coach at Tallahassee Community College and finally a four year stay as basketball coach of Tallahassee Godby High School.

A popular speaker as well as coach, Martin has spoken at national meetings including the Florida High School Coaches Clinic, the Charlotte, N.C. Coaches Clinic and the Atlanta Braves Instructional Service. Martin has also spoken at numerous Florida State Booster meetings with gatherings in Jacksonville, Tallahassee and Ft. Lauderdale.

Known as '11' to those who watch him coach third base, Martin will handle all the on-field responsibilities and new assistant coach Randy Gailey will work with Martin from the dugout.

A 1966 graduate of Florida State, Martin earned his master's degree in 1971 from Florida A&M. Mike and Carol are the parents of three children, Mary Beth 12, Mike Jr. 9 and Melanie 6.

### RANDY GAILEY Assistant Coach

When former Florida State assistant coach Jim Morris resigned to accept the head coaching position at Georgia Tech last season, he became the second top notch assistant to leave the post in as many years. First, head coach Mike Martin was elevated to this current position, then Morris departed. The tradition of



excellence continued when Martin named former FSU outfielder Randy Gailey as his assistant July 16, 1981.

Gailey joined the Tribe from South Georgia Junior College, where he served as head coach for the last two seasons. He was credited with rebuilding the school's program leading the Tigers to a two year record of 59-27.


"We are happy that Randy has come home," Martin said. "He is a true Seminole and he's excited about returning to FSU. Having a person like Randy join my staff is very good for the program. He brings with him a great knowledge of the game."

A 1973 graduate of Florida State, Gailey was the Seminoles' starting left fielder from 1971-73. Following graduation he was head baseball coach and assistant football coach at Fernandina Beach High School and was named Coach of the Year in 1976 and 1977. While at the school he tutored graduated Seminole quarterback Rick Stockstill in football and baseball.

He moved on to Georgia Southern where he worked on a master's degree and was an assistant baseball coach for two years before leaving in 1979 to accept the head coaching job at South Georgia.

"I'm very familiar with the Florida State baseball program and with Mike Martin," Gailey said. "I feel that the job is a step up for me because of the national success of the FSU program. My goal has always been to end up back here."

Gailey, who began his career coaching the FSU summer league baseball team, will concentrate on the outfield and will be splitting the offensive duties with Martin. He is married and the father of two children.




### **Coaching Assistants**

Joining head coach Mike Martin and assistant Randy Gailey are three of the most talented coaching assistants in baseball—David Fannin, Mike McLeod and Joe 'Max' McFarland. The combination of Martin, Gailey, Fannin, McLeod and McFarland provides Florida State with one of the top coaching staffs in the nation.

Fannin returns to the Tribe for his second season and will patrol the first base coaching box wearing his familiar No. 24. A valuable assistant to Martin, he played two seasons at Chipola Junior College prior to coaching four years of American Legion ball. At the American Legion level, he has tutored many current Seminole players helping them develop their talents at a young age. Fannin also served as assistant baseball coach at Tallahassee's Leon High School, his alma mater.

McLeod, a pitcher for Florida State from 1975-77 will be charged with instructing the pitchers. He held a similar position for the New York Yankee rookie ball team in Paintsville, Kentucky the past two seasons. McLeod is a Tallahassee native who played high school ball at Godby before moving on to Middle Georgia Junior College where he earned All-America honors in 1974. Following graduation from FSU, McLeod played three seasons in the Yankee organization before accepting the Paintsville position. He is the father of a newborn baby son.

Also assisting the pitchers is McFarland who comes to FSU after serving as a graduate assistant pitching coach at Appalachian State University the past four years. He is a 1976 graduate of Wright State (Dayton, OH.) where he competed in baseball.





### Seminole Field



Located in the heart of the Florida State campus, Seminole Field is one of the south's outstanding baseball parks. With seating capacity of over 4,000, the park features medal hyliade 1500 watt lights, a major league scoreboard and an eight foot wall surrounding the stadium. The outfield wall measures 321 feet to right, 411 to center and 340 to left. There are two eight foot batting circles and a new cardinal 180' x 180' tarp. For additional games and practice, two diamonds are adjacent to Seminole Field along with a batting cage.



At the conclusion of the 1982 season one million dollars of renovations will begin on Seminole Field making it one of the top parks, collegiate or otherwise, in the entire nation. Improvements include construction of locker room facilities for home and visiting teams, and a lounge for guests. Additional storage, improved restroom and concession facilities, upgrading the right field bleachers and a 2,000 seat covered grandstand with an enclosed press box are also slated for completion prior to the 1983 season.

### **Metro Conference**

Seven years ago the Metropolitan Athletic Conference was the new kid on the collegiate sports block. Now, simply known as the Metro to its fans and boasting the 1980 NCAA basketball champion Louisville Cardinals, it is recognized as one of the nation's top athletic conferences.

The Metro Conference was formed in 1975 under the direction of Commissioner Larry Albus, with Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, Louisville, Memphis State, St. Louis and Tulane as charter members. Florida State joined the Conference in 1976, and when Georgia Tech resigned its Metro membership in 1978, the league wasted no time adding Virginia Tech as its seventh member.

The Conference was formed primarily as a basketball league but is also recognized for its baseball excellence. Metro member Florida State advanced to the 1980 College World Series, and this season the Seminoles will face Metro foes Tulane, Virginia Tech and Memphis State during the regular season to give the Conference a unique national appeal. In 1978 the Metro received an automatic bid to the NCAA South Regional and that practice has continued since.

In the 1981 post season tournament, Florida State captured its second consecutive crown defeating Tulane 15-5 in the championship game. It was the second time FSU had come out of the losers bracket to claim the title and the third Seminole crown in six seasons. The final games were viewed throughout the country on ESPN television.

Previous conference champions have been Florida State (1980), Tulane (1979), Memphis State (1978), Florida State (1977) and Memphis State (1976).

Two teams from the Metro advanced to the NCAA tournament—Florida State with its automatic bid to the South Regional and Memphis State which was invited to Columbia, South Carolina for the East Regional.

Head coach Mike Martin will again have a chance to show off the fine Florida State facilities this spring when the Seminoles host the 1982 Spring Sports Championship. Athletes from all seven league schools will gather in Tallahassee in May to compete in golf, track and field and baseball. Also included in the gala weekend are hot air balloon races and a frisbee toss.

### A Pipeline To The Pros

Perhaps no institution in America has provided a pipeline to professional baseball like Florida State. A total of 73 Seminoles have inked procontracts in 14 seasons. In 1981, seven Seminoles were selected in the professional draft with five electing to sign. Already former FSU players Mike Fuentes and Rick Hatcher have advanced to AA ball. Sixteen FSU players have played in the major leagues since 1958.

Over 20 players are still active in the professional ranks and six finished last season in the major leagues. San Diego Padre catcher and former FSU All-America Terry Kennedy was the key player in a 10-man deal involving San Diego and St. Louis. Former FSU mentor Dick Howser rejoined the professional ranks and quickly took Kansas City to the American League Western Division crown. Other active players are John Grubb, Rick Langford, Craig Skok, Juan Bonilla and Woody Woodward.

In 1981, Clem Freeman, Fuentes, Hatcher, Joe Licata and Ed Schneider all signed major league contracts. Current Seminoles Bob Alexander, Steve Gelmine, Danny Griffin, Jay Keeler, David Ledbetter, Jeff Ledbetter, Todd Morgan and David Rhino were all drafted professionally but elected to sign with FSU.

Florida State's biggest year for signees was 1977 when 11 Seminoles inked pro contracts. Florida State has long been known as a hotbed for aspiring talent and pro scouts recommend the Tallahasee campus as an excellent place for additional seasoning. A large contingent of scouts see every Florida State game.





Howser was Florida State's first major leaguer when he broke in with Kansas City in 1961. He made an immediate impression winning the American League Rookie of the Year Award that season. Howser, Grubb and Kennedy have all played in a major league All-Star Game—Howser in 1961, Grubb in 1974 and Kennedy in 1981. Woodward, a 1964 graduate and former skipper is the Assistant General Manager of the Cincinnati Reds organization, and has played along with 1973 graduate Rick Langford in a World Series.

### This Is Florida State


Florida State University—the home of more than 20,000 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

From the Gothic towers of Wescott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a centry as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options, offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theatre and visual arts programs.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that exceeds \$50 million.

Today, his openness, accessibility, easygoing manner and loyality to all aspects of Florida State University have made Dr. Bernard F. Sliger one of the most popular presidents in University history.

"Bernie," as he is known to his friends

believes a great university such as Florida State should be a source of the education of the total person—providing the best academic facilities and faculty possible and having the best athletic facilities, staff and players available.

"Although studying is the most important factor in students' lives, they need an outlet for their energies. Athletics provides that outlet," Dr. Sliger said. "The athletic program at Florida State University is a means of identification for Florida State and a rallying point for anyone connected in any way with the University, in addition to being an important source of outside giving."

Whereas some universities earmark all athletic funds for strictly athletic purposes, President Sliger holds different views for Florida State. In recent years, Dr. Sliger has channeled a portion of the scholarship funds received through athletics directly into the fund used to attract National Merit Scholars to Florida State. Also under his leadership, the Athletic Department has contributed \$200,000 in the past two years to a special fund for academic emphasis.

In addition, private funds contributed to the "Presidents Club," previously used solely for the president, now are used exclusively for academics.

President Sliger earned his B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. in economics at Michigan State.

He is the author of a text on "Public Finance," presently used in a number of colleges and universities.

Dr. Sliger was executive director of the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education and, Administrator at Louisiana State University. He joined the administrative team at Florida State in 1972 as executive vice president.

On June 10, 1977, Dr. Bernard F. Sliger officially became Florida State University's 10th president.

Dr. Sliger and his wife, Greta, have two sons and two daughters, Paul, Sten, Nan and Greta.

#### C.W. "Hootie" Ingram

Athletic Director

C.W. "Hootie" Ingram is in his second year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post on January 16, 1981, after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Ingram brought to the position an outstanding reputation as an athletic administrator.



Ingram's former boss, SEC Commissioner Boyd McWhorter, praised the appointment.

"While I regret the fact that he is leaving, I am most pleased and proud for him to have been appointed to this new, prestigious position," McWhorter said. "He has performed all his duties as a member of the commissioner's staff in an outstanding manner and he has gained a national reputation for being one of the most knowledgeable and dedicated administrators in intercollegiate athletics."

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., the home of the University of Alabama, Ingram played football for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954. He was All-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. The '53 Alabama team played in the Orange Bowl and the '54 squad in the Cotton Bowl. Ingram also lettered for the Tide in baseball as an infielder.

After an Army stint, Ingram turned to coaching. He started as an assistant at Bradenton (Fla.) Manatee High School and was later head coach at Tuscaloosa High School for three years.

He later moved into college coaching and had stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas as an assistant. His only college football head coaching assignment began in 1970 when he succeeded the veteran Frank Howard as head coach at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.

During his tenure with the SEC, his duties included supervising football and basketball officials, rules interpretations and eligibility.

Ingram and his wife, Toni, have two daughters, Robin and Lane and a son Cecil.



#### **Bob Goin**

Assistant Athletic Director

Bob Goin is the newest member of the Florida State athletic staff. He took over as assistant athletic director on July 1, after serving as athletic director at California (Pa.) State College since 1979.

Goin comes to FSU with a background in both coaching and athletic administration.

Prior to taking the California State post, he was assistant director of athletics at West Virginia. Between 1960 and 1976 he served in various capacities at Bethany (W. Va.) College. Included among his Bethany duties were coaching responsibilities in football, basketball and baseball.

Immediately prior to moving to West Virginia, Goin served Bethany as associate professor and chairman of physical education and athletics. That assignment lasted for four years (1972-76). Goin was Bethany's head football coach between 1963 and 1972.

Goin, who received a bachelor's degree from Bethany (1959) and master's at West Virginia (1962), is married and the father of four children.



#### **Claude Thigpen**

Assistant to the Director

Claude Thigpen has been a member of the Florida State athletic department staff for 26 years. He has been in his present position as assistant to the athletic director since 1978.

Prior to taking his present role in the athletic department, Thigpen served as ath-

letic business manager, accountant and ticket manager for the Seminoles.

He currently supervises the entire ticket operation in all sports and is responsible for game day operations of all sports. He coordinates season ticket drives for football, basketball and baseball, in addition, Thigpen is responsible for the athletic department courtesy car program.

In the fall, Thigpen took on the added duties of supervising the travel for the Florida State football team and its official party. This includes making hotel and airplane reservations for the group of 100 traveling with the Tribe.

Thigpen, a native of Greenville, Fla., is married to the former Carleen Lindley.



#### **Larry Pendleton**

Assistant to the Director

Larry Pendleton, a member of the Seminole athletic family since 1973, is serving as assistant to the athletic director. He had previously been the academic advisor.

Pendleton's present role covers many areas within the athletic department. He is responsible for maintaining and scheduling


of all the facilities in the athletic complex. Any building projects will be coordinated and supervised by Pendleton.


