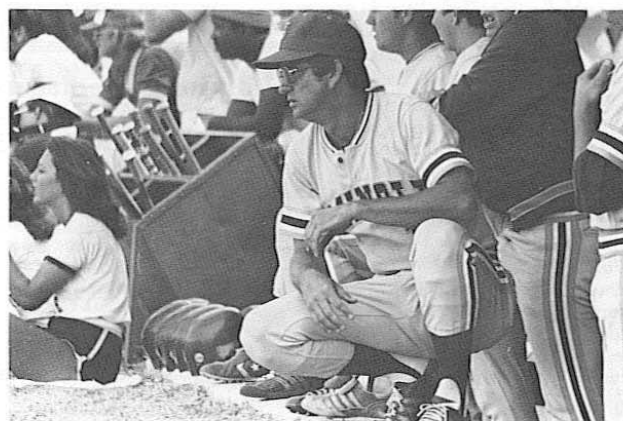
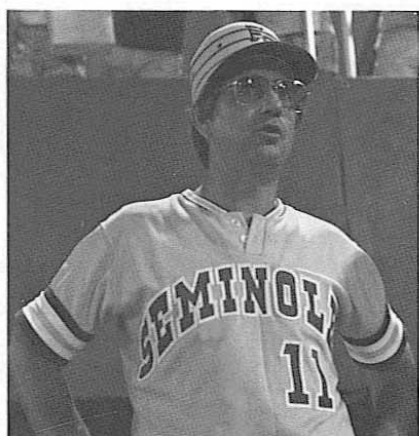
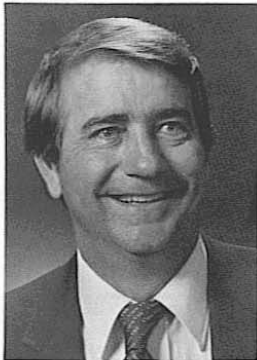

HEAD COACH



Mike Martin
Head Coach

Entering his sixth season as head coach of the Seminoles, Mike Martin has established himself as one of the top young coaches in the nation. Under Martin, Seminole baseball has maintained its status as one of the top college baseball programs in the country.

During the past five seasons, FSU has won 50 or more games five times, has collected four Metro Conference championships, has appeared in five NCAA playoffs and has made one trip to the College World Series.

Martin's career coaching record reads 273 wins, 99 losses and two ties - good for a winning percentage of .7326.

Not only is Martin the winningest coach in the school's history, but one of the top coaches in the country. Martin's winning percentage ranks him ninth nationally among active coaches. His 273 career wins places him 94th on the active list, but first among coaches with six or less years experience. With an average of 54.6 wins a season, only Wichita State's Gene Stephenson (55.0) has averaged more victories in a season.

Martin's work in the coaching field has been recognized several times. In addition to numerous "Coach of the Year" awards from the Metro Conference, Martin was selected for similar honors from the Florida Diamond Club. He also serves on the NCAA Championship Advisory Committee.

When Florida State selected Martin on November 27, 1979, it selected a man who possessed a wealth of baseball experience. For four years prior to being named, Martin served as assistant coach at Florida State under former head coaches Woody Woodward (1975-78) and Dick Howser (1979).

Prior to becoming an assistant at FSU, Martin spent several years coaching two sports at both the collegiate and high school ranks. His tenure included several years as baseball and basketball coach at the junior high level, one season as head basketball coach at Tallahassee Community College, and four years as basketball coach at Amos P. Godby High.

Prior to entering the coaching profession, Martin was a standout baseball player at Wingate Junior College, before finishing his career at Florida State. A two-time junior college All-American at Wingate, Martin went on to earn all-district honors as an outfielder at Florida State. Following three years of professional ball within the New York Met and Detroit Tiger organization, Martin returned to Tallahassee to teach and coach.

A popular speaker, Martin delivered the keynote address at several national and state meetings, including gatherings of the Florida High School Coaches Association, North Carolina Coaches Clinic, Atlanta Braves Instructional Clinics, and Seminole Booster Clubs throughout the Southeast.

In addition, hundreds of aspiring ball players from around the state attend the Mike Martin baseball school during the summer months.

A 1966 graduate of Florida State, Martin earned his masters' degree from Florida A&M in 1971. Mike and his wife Carol have three children, Mary Beth (15), Mike Jr. (12), and Melanie (9).

ASSISTANT COACHES



Rod Delmonico
Assistant Coach

After serving one year as part-time assistant, Rod Delmonico is in his first season as full-time assistant to Seminole head coach Mike Martin. As assistant coach, Delmonico coaches the outfielders, serves as firstbase coach, and handles travel arrangements for the Tribe. Rod is also head coach for Jerry's Caterers, Florida State's summer team.

In addition, Delmonico heads up the Florida State recruiting efforts - which were rated number one in the nation this year by Collegiate Baseball magazine.

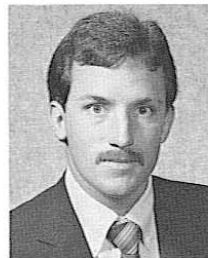
Delmonico came to Florida State from Clemson University, where he served as a graduate assistant coach for two seasons.

Prior to that, Delmonico was a standout athlete at Liberty Baptist College. While at Liberty Baptist, Rod lettered twice in both soccer and baseball.

A 1981 graduate of Liberty Baptist, Delmonico earned his degree in physical education before moving on to Clemson where he completed work on a master's degree in administration and supervision.

In addition to coaching, Delmonico is a noted author of several articles geared towards high school athletics. He is a featured writer in Scholastic Magazine.

The 27-year-old Delmonico is married to the former Barbara Vanaman.



Chip Baker
Assistant Coach

Chip Baker, a former assistant coach at Georgia Tech and Virginia Tech, is in his first year on the Florida State staff.

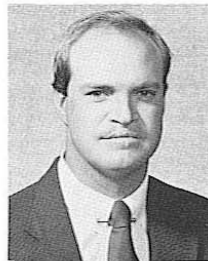
As assistant coach, Baker works mainly with the catchers; as well as supervising an off season conditioning program. He also handles several administrative duties as assigned by the head coach. Chip serves as director of Mike Martin's Invitational Baseball School.

Baker came to Florida State after working one year at Georgia Tech under former Seminole assistant coach Jim Morris. In addition to baseball duties, Baker was assistant academic counselor at the school.

Prior to that, Baker was an assistant coach at Virginia Tech for three seasons. In addition to those coaching stops, Baker has served on the staff of several summer baseball schools.

Baker lettered four years at High Point College, earning a degree in physical education in 1980. He later completed a master's degree at Virginia Tech in education, specializing in motor behavior.

Baker, 27, is single.



Mike McLeod
Assistant Coach

A former FSU standout, Mike McLeod begins his fourth year on the Florida State staff. An outstanding pitcher for the Seminoles in the mid 70s, McLeod brings a wealth of playing and coaching experience to his position.

McLeod, who graduated in 1977, is in charge of the Seminole pitching staff and serves as bullpen coach during Florida State games.

In addition to his coaching experience with Florida State, McLeod worked four summers as pitching instructor for the New York Yankee farm team in Paintsville, Kentucky.

McLeod earned All-American honors at Middle Georgia Junior College in 1974, before transferring to Florida State. As a Seminole, McLeod compiled a record of 13-4. Among his college accomplishments are three no-hitters, including the last by a Seminole pitcher - a 23-0 win over Olivet in 1977.

Following graduation, McLeod pitched three years of minor league baseball in the Yankee organization. Mike and his wife Rose have two children, Garrett (3) and Jenny (1).

1985 OUTLOOK

Aiming For The Top - Over the last two seasons, Florida State baseball teams have won 110 games, captured two prestigious Metro Conference Championships, made two appearances in NCAA regional tournaments and have had numerous players named to all-conference, all-district and All-American teams.

Although these accomplishments have come against some of the best competition in the nation, many Seminole fans, coaches and players have not been satisfied. In short, the Seminoles have not measured up to the standards expected of Florida State teams.

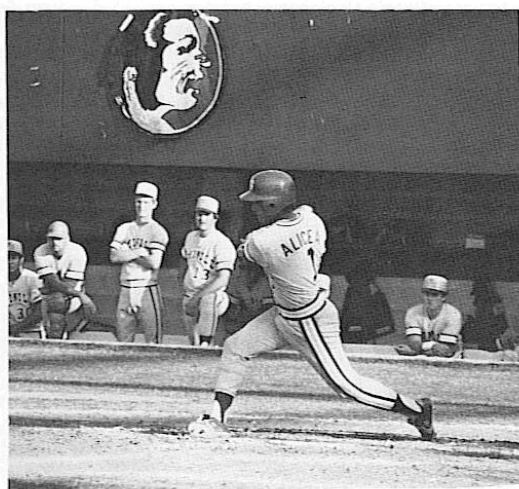
"It's really ironic," FSU head coach Mike Martin says. "By comparison of almost any program in the country we have had two pretty good seasons over the past two years. But because of our great tradition and because we have several outstanding teams in the state and region, a good season is not good enough. I think Seminole fans expect us to make the College World Series every year, so that's the goal we have to shoot for."

Coming off of two rebuilding years, Martin believes his Seminoles are ready to rejoin the nation's elite at the College World Series. His optimism stems from the fact that Florida State will return six regulars (excluding pitchers) in 1985. In addition, the Tribe is coming off its best recruiting year ever, in which its signees were rated the number one recruiting class in the nation by Collegiate Baseball Magazine.

These two circumstances, combined with the fact that Florida State returns its top three starters from a season ago should give the Seminoles a solid base to work from in 1985.

"Quite frankly I'm excited about the possibilities," Martin says. "We only had a few gaps to fill from last season and I believe our new kids can come in and do the job. If we can stay healthy, we should be able to stay on the field with any team in the country."

A position by position analysis allows a closer look at the 1985 Seminoles.



CATCHER - Two outstanding prospects will battle for this position. Ed Fulton from Dry Fork, Virginia turned down a sizeable signing bonus from the Atlanta Braves to enroll at Florida State. He will be challenged by another freshman, Barry Blackwell from New Providence, New Jersey. Although both players have good arms, Blackwell is described by Martin as the better defensive catcher; while Fulton becomes FSU's first power hitting catcher in six years. Look for these two players to platoon unless one player establishes himself as a number one. Junior Craig Saxner will provide depth at this position, as well as seeing action as a designated hitter.

FIRSTBASE - Another position that was to be platooned last year was taken over by Jimmy Jones when Tommy Zoeller suffered a hand injury that kept him out for almost all of 1984. Jones turned in an excellent season both offensively (14 HR, 63 RBIs) and defensively. "Jimmy established that he could hit lefthanders last year," Martin said. "He's proven himself as a team leader and will be our firstbaseman on opening day." Totally recovered from the broken hand, Zoeller will be used as a backup and as a designated hitter.

SECONDBASE - No mystery here, Luis Alicea will be the Tribe's second sacker. A freshman All-America (first team) pick in 1984, Alicea collected 103 hits and drove in 55 runs last year; while hitting .315. Martin notes that Alicea is the one player on this year's team who would be "hardest to replace." Should he remain healthy, look for Alicea to start showing up on a lot of All-American teams by the time his career at Florida State ends. Joe Pacetti will backup Alicea at second.

THIRDBASE - This position is totally up for grabs with Jose Marzan and Vince Calandra being the main two candidates. Calandra played the outfield and served as a designated hitter last year, hitting .287 with 48 RBIs. Marzan spent 1984 as a catcher-centerfielder, hitting .261 but driving in 51 runs. Marzan is coming off an outstanding summer, leading his Guaynabo American Legion team to a World Series championship and has a slight edge in the competition. But Martin notes both will play somewhere. "Vince Calandra is as gutty a kid as I've ever coached. Anything I've asked of him he's done. He's a winner. Marzan is a great talent and is starting to come into his own. If we are to meet our goals, we need outstanding years from both players and I believe we are going to get it."

SHORTSTOP - This was FSU's biggest hole to fill in 1985. With the graduation of two-time MVP Jody Reed, Florida State was in desperate need of a quality shortstop. Fortunately, the Noles were able to sign highly recruited Bien Figueroa out of Canada Junior College in California. Described by coaches as having "big league" defensive capabilities, Figueroa had an outstanding summer in the Alaska Summer League - hitting .342. Marzan will backup this position.

LEFTFIELD - Frank Fazzini has this position locked up. The third team All-America selection hit .325 last season with 29 homers and 89 RBIs. He was selected to the second unit pre-season All-America team by Baseball America this year and should he improve his range in the outfield, Fazzini could be named to practically everyone's All-America team. Sophomore Dru Kosco (.306, 1 HR, 13 RBIs) will backup Fazzini in left.

CENTERFIELD - Two outstanding athletes will compete for playing time in center. Former FSU football recruit Eric Mangham hit .275 last year while learning to play baseball. Eastern Kentucky transfer Keith Kidd is the competition. Mangham has the better arm; while Kidd is the more productive offensive player. Both possess excellent speed. Martin rates this battle a toss up, but notes that he will use both players in the 1985 Seminole offense that will feature more aggressive base running.

RIGHTFIELD - Paul Sorrento, the surprise of the 1984 season, will again assume full-time duties in right. Only a sophomore, Sorrento was selected to the first unit of Baseball America's Freshman All-America team when he hit .349 with 17 homeruns and 68 RBIs. Martin noted that although Sorrento had an excellent year in 1984, he wants more run production from him in 1985. "Paul took too many pitches last year. He walked 75 times. I would like to see him become more of a free swinger this year. If he strikes out a few more times but drives in 20 or 30 more runs, it will be an acceptable trade off." Look for Roy Eppley to provide depth at this position.

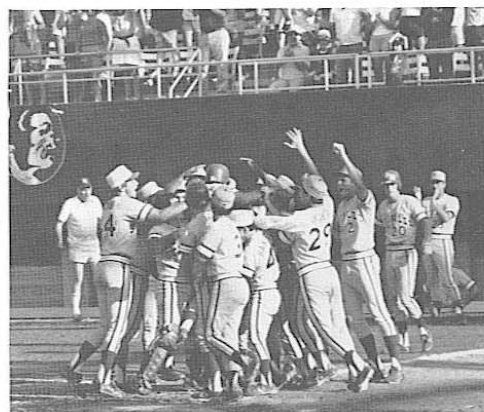
DESIGNATED HITTER - No one will own this job, at least not at the beginning. Eppley, Saxner, Zoeller, Kosco, Blackwell and Fulton will all be used; as well as Calandra and Marzan. In short, whomever is swinging the hot bat will play.

STARTING PITCHERS - Doug Little, Mike Loynd and sophomore Ray Revak all won 12 games last season. All are underclassmen this year and this is the main reason for the optimism in the Seminole camp. Martin will use all three in the main rotation and will decide on two more starters from seniors Jeff Ledbetter and Steve Gelmine and freshman Al Ashmont. Gelmine is coming off an outstanding fall camp and appears to be close to locking up the number four or five spot in the rotation. Ashmont was a seventh round pick of the Chicago Cubs last June and was a *USA Today* top 20 All-American. Ledbetter provides solid depth as a starter or reliever.

RELIEF PITCHING - All-state selection Richie Lewis, walkons Pete Brown and Kevin Smith; as well as redshirt Frank Thomas will form the nucleus of the FSU bullpen in 1985. Lewis had an outstanding summer for Jerry's Caterers; while Smith played for the 1982 Miami Hurricane national champion team. Ashmont may also see action as a short reliever as Martin's main concern here is finding a stopper.

In summing up 1985, Martin noted that this year's Seminoles should provide fans with an exciting offensive team with a much improved pitching staff. His main concern is that each member of the team realizes his role on the club. Martin added that, "I think everyone realizes that we have a chance to be pretty good. I just hope that doesn't lead to overconfidence on anyone's part. We are going to be playing some teams that will have some great talent. But there are a lot of other teams on our schedule that could also whip us if we take them lightly. Hopefully we'll keep our heads and play each game one at a time."

FSU's first step to the College World Series will come with the start of Metro Conference play. One of the toughest conferences from top to bottom, Martin believes five teams will have a chance to win the tournament - earning an automatic bid into the NCAA regional tournament. A new regular season round robin format will insure better seedings for this year's tournament, as each team will play six games with every Metro team in its division. "I always felt the Metro was one of the best college baseball conferences in the country and with the addition of South Carolina last year I am sure of it." Martin said.

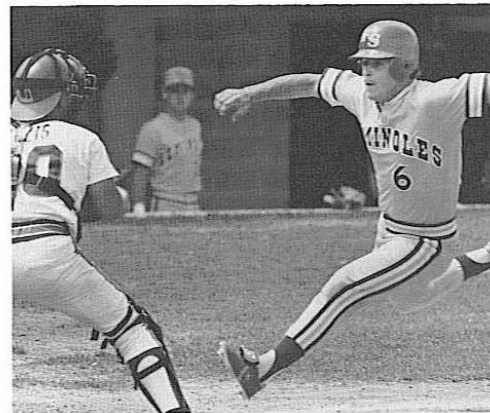
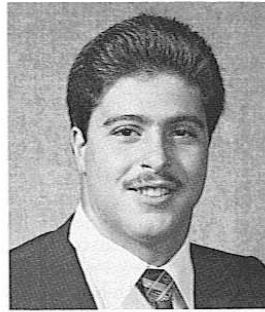

LAST SEASON - Led Florida State in practically every offensive category, including runs, hits, home runs, RBIs, slugging percentage and total bases; while earning All-America honors (third team) from Baseball America magazine . . . 29 home runs last season was second highest total in nation and third highest total in NCAA history . . . Fazzini also ranked sixth nationally in RBIs (89), fifth in runs scored (87) and sixth in hits (103); while ranking fourth in total bases . . . had three multiple home run games including a three home run, five RBI performance against Southern Miss on May 3 . . . went 11 for 26 in Metro Tournament, including a five for six outing in championship game, in being named to the all-tournament team for second year in a row . . . was also voted all-conference for the regular season . . . 10 game winning RBIs tied Paul Sorrento for team leadership in that category . . . smart base runner, successful on 18 of 24 steal attempts last year . . . had 13 assists, most by an FSU outfielder.

CAREER - Earned first team Freshman All-America honors in 1983 with a .366 batting average and an FSU freshman record 17 home runs . . . 46 career home runs places Fazzini just five behind Jeff Ledbetter's NCAA record pace of 97 in a four year career . . . will place high in practically every category in FSU record book by time 1985 season is concluded . . . two-time all-conference and all-conference tournament selection; as well as all-tournament NCAA South Region in 1983 . . . played in prestigious Cape Cod League in 1983 - driving in 40 runs in 42 games . . . all-state in football and baseball at Belleville High . . . rushed for over 1,000 yards as a senior and also led the state of New Jersey in hitting as a junior with a .560 average . . . had 12 home runs in the fall season.

GENERAL - Nicknamed "Bear" by teammates . . . majoring in criminology . . . birthdate 7/27/64 . . . age 20 . . . son of Gerald and Theresa Fazzini of Belleville, New Jersey . . . scholar athlete in high school, carrying solid "A" average in college prep courses . . . team captain for 1985.
