

Mike Martin Head Coach

Now in his eighth year as head coach at Florida State, Mike Martin has established himself as one of the winningest coaches in all of college baseball. Under Martin, FSU has maintained its status as one of the top programs in the nation.

Under Martin's leadership, FSU has won 50 or more games seven times and collected six Metro Conference Championships. In all seven of Martin's previous years the Tribe has earned a spot in the NCAA Tournament. In addition, Martin coached Florida State to the College World Series on two occasions, with the most recent trip in 1986 resulting in a second place finish.

During Martin's tenure, 13 different players earned All-America status, 26 were named to the All-Metro team, 30 signed professional contracts and two won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award—including 1986 recipient Mike Loynd.

Martin's career record stands at 393 wins, 135 losses and two ties—good for a career winning percentage of .7433. Among division one coaches with five or more years experience, Martin's winning percentage is seventh best in the nation. His 393 career wins ranks 66th nationally, but is first among coaches with seven years of experience or less. Martin's average of 56.1 wins per season tops all division one coaches.

After the 1986 season, Martin was named Florida Diamond Club Coach of the Year; as well as Atlantic District Coach of the Year. Those two honors add to a long list of other awards—including numerous Metro Conference Coach of the Year Awards. He also serves on the NCAA Championship Advisory Committee and is a voting member of several polls.

When FSU selected Martin on November 27, 1979 to become the eighth Florida State head coach, it selected a man that possessed a wealth of baseball experience. For four years prior to taking the head job, Martin was an assistant to former head coaches Woody Woodward (1975-78) and Dick Howser (1979).


Prior to becoming an assistant at FSU, Martin spent several years coaching the prep and college ranks. His tenure included several years as baseball and basketball coach at the junior high level, one season as head basketball coach at Tallahassee Community College and four years as basketball coach at Amos P. Godby High.

Prior to entering the coaching profession, Martin was a standout baseball player at Wingate Junior College, before finishing his college career at Florida State. A two-time junior college All-American at Wingate, Martin went on to earn All-District honors as an outfielder at FSU. Following three years

of professional ball in the New York Met and Detroit Tiger organizations, Martin returned to coach and teach in Tallahassee.

A popular speaker, Martin has delivered keynote addresses at several state and national meetings, including gatherings of the Florida High School Coaches Association, Atlanta Braves Instructional Clinics, and Seminole Booster Clubs throughout the Southeast.

A 1966 graduate of Florida State, Martin earned his master's degree from Florida A&M in 1971. Mike and his wife Carol have three children, Mary Beth (17), Mike Jr. (14), and Melanie (11).

ASSISTANT COACHES



Rod Delmonico ● Assistant Coach =

Rod Delmonico begins his fourth season on the Florida State staff and his third as full time assistant to Seminole head coach Mike Martin. As assistant coach, Delmonico coaches the outfielders, serves as first base coach, and handles travel arrangements for the Tribe.

Delmonico also heads up the Florida State recruiting efforts, which has resulted in a top 10 ranking in each of the last three years—including a number one ranking in 1984 and number 2 ranking in 1986.

Delmonico came to FSU from Clemson University, where he served as a graduate assistant coach for two years. Prior to that, Delmonico was a standout athlete at Liberty Baptist College, where he lettered in soccer.

A 1981 graduate of Liberty Baptist, Delmonico earned a degree in physical education before completing a masters' degree in administration and supervision at Clemson.

In addition to his coaching duties, Delmonico is a noted author of several articles geared toward high school athletics. He is a regular columnist in Scholastic Magazine and has been published in numerous other magazines.

The 29-year-old Delmonico is married to the former Barbara Vanaman. They are expecting their first child in May.



Chip Baker ● Assistant Coach =

In his third year at Florida State is assistant coach Chip Baker. In addition to instructing the catchers, Baker handles third base coaching duties and serves as head coach of Jerry's Caterers—FSU's summer team.

A former assistant at Georgia Tech and Virginia Tech, Baker also coordinates an extensive off season conditioning program, which includes aerobic workouts. He is also the laison between FSU players and their academic advisors.

Baker works closely with FSU's summer camps and serves as director of the highly successful Seminole Select School. He has served on the staffs of many camps throughout the Southeast.

A 1980 graduate of High Point College, Baker led the Panthers to four conference championships. He participated in the 1979 NAIA World Series. After completing his degree in physical education at High Point, Baker went on to earn a master's at Virginia Tech in motor behavior.

Baker, 29, is single.



Mike McLeod ● Assistant Coach ==

A former FSU standout, Mike McLeod begins his sixth year on the Seminole coaching staff. A former player with both college and professional experience, McLeod brings a wealth of experience to his position as both a student and teacher of the game.

A 1977 FSU graduate, McLeod is in charge of the Seminole pitching staff and serves as bullpen coach during all Florida State games.

In addition to his FSU experience, McLeod was an instructor for the New York Yankee farm team in Paintsville, KY for four summers and worked in the Montreal organization in 1986.

McLeod earned All-American honors at Middle Georgia Junior College in 1974, before transferring to Florida State. In two years with the Seminoles, McLeod won 13 games. Among his college achievements are three no-hitters, including the last by a Florida State pitcher—a 23-0 decision over Olivet in 1977.

Following graduation, McLeod played three years of baseball in the Yankee organization. Mike and his wife Rose have two children, Garett (5) and Jenny (3).



Steve Winterling ● Graduate Assistant Coach =

Steve Winterling is in his second year on the FSU baseball staff. As assistant coach, Winterling handles several on-the-field coaching duties, as well as several administrative tasks assigned by head coach Mike Martin.

A native of Jacksonville, Winterling comes to FSU from Edgewood Senior High School where he was an assistant coach for the last three years. Prior to that he was an assistant at Florida Junior College.

A 1981 graduate of South Florida with a degree in physical education, Winterling also coached four seasons at Florida College, where he was an assistant for three years and the head coach for one.

Winterling lettered two years in baseball at Florida College before moving on to South Florida to complete his studies. A member of the American Baseball Coaches Association for eight years, Winterling also scouted for the New York Yankees in 1984. Winterling has worked on the staff of several prestigious summer camps.

The 28-year-old Winterling is single.

Ion McFatter • Graduate Assistant Coach

A native of Panama City, Florida, Jon McFatter is the newest member of the Florida State baseball staff and will fill the role of graduate assistant coach. McFatter, 22, will help coach the Seminole infielders with special attention to the middle infielders. In addition, McFatter will handle several practice and office duties assigned by head coach Mike Martin.

McFatter lettered two years at Gulf Coast Community College, where he played second base. He then transferred to Auburn, where he played two additional years lettering as a shortstop. McFatter graduated from Auburn with a bachelor's degree in physical education in June of 1986. While at Florida State, McFatter will pursue a master's degree in athletic education.

McFatter is single.



John Sheffield • Ticket Coordinator

In his fourth season at Florida State, John Sheffield serves as FSU's ticket coordinator. Sheffield directs the FSU season ticket campaigns for football, basketball and baseball and also organizes special event programs for the athletic department. He is currently computerizing FSU's ticket operation and oversees a staff of six ticket personnel.

Prior to his arrival in Tallahassee, Sheffield was director of ticket operations for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1977 to 1982.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Sheffield worked in the FSU athletic department for a few months following graduation. He then moved on to the Atlanta Braves organization and later moved to Miami where he was assistant ticket director for the Miami Dolphins. Before gaining the ticket director post in Tampa, Sheffield served as business manager for the North American Soccer League's Ft. Lauderdale Strikers.

He maintains his ties with the NFL, coordinating ticket distribution for the Super Bowl.



Wayne Hogan • Sports Information Director

Tallahassee native Wayne Hogan is in his fifth year as Florida State sports information director. Hogan is responsible for all publicity and public relations matters concerning the FSU athletic department. The SID office handles all information on 16 intercollegiate sports, encompassing both men and women's

athletics.

A 1979 Florida State graduate, Hogan returned to his alma mater in 1982 after serving as assistant sports information director at New Mexico for two years. Prior to that move, he worked as director of public relations and broadcasting for two minor league baseball teams, the Charles Charlies and the Albuquerque Dukes.

Hogan began his career in the public relations and broadcasting fields while a student at Florida State. From 1975-79, he performed a variety of duties for the Seminole athletic program, including working in the sports information office, engineering the Seminole Sports Network for football and basketball broadcasts and play-by-play announcing for baseball.

In addition to his duties as sports information director, Hogan handled color commentary for the Florida

State basketball radio network from 1982 to '84 and assumed those duties in 1985.




Dan Pearson • Assistant SID

Dan Pearson, a 1979 West Virginia University graduate, is in his sixth year on the Seminole athletic staff as assistant sports information director. Pearson handles several areas of publicity and media relations for the FSU football team as well as handling all the public relations for FSU's nationally-ranked baseball program.

He also oversees the non-revenue sports handling assignments for student assistants in those areas. Pearson came to FSU in 1981 as a part-time assistant before being named assistant SID in October of 1982. Previously, he worked three years in West Virginia's sports information office as a student assistant and then graduate assistant. He earned his degree from WVU in journalism in 1979.

Pearson was chosen as the public relations director for the 1986 United States Baseball Federation's junior national team that traveled to Canada during the summer.



5-10, 176, Junior, P Muncie, Indiana

1987: Enters junior season as top pitcher on Seminole staff ... was selected to pre-season All-American team by several publications, including Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America ... possess 90+ fastball and devestating curve ... expected to be selected in first round of June draft. 1986: Was first team All-American as selected by Baseball America magazine after turning in 14-2 record with four saves ... led nation in strikeouts per nine innings with 14.24 average . . . total of 202 strikeouts was second in nation last season behind teammate Mike Loynd's 223 ... 14 wins last season was fourth highest total in nation ... named to alltournament team at College World Series after picking up victories against Miami and Oklahoma State and saves against Indiana State and Miami . . . in first four appearances at CWS, Lewis was 2-0 with two saves and 22 strikeouts in 15.1 innings ... struckout nine of 11 batters faced in NCAA South II Regional, going 1-0 with one save to make All-Region Tournament team ... clinched Metro Conference championship by beating South Carolina, 7-2 ... struckout 13 batters while allowing just six hits and two walks in that game . . . struckout 10 or more batters in single game 10 times, including a career high 20 against Jacksonville University (4/8) ... that total was second highest in school history ... outstanding season earned Lewis a spot on the All-Metro Conference team ... in 15 appearances against NCAA Tournament teams, Lewis was 6-1 with three saves and 97 strikeouts in 59 innings . . . led team in appearances (28) and complete games (8). 1985: Went 9-6 as a freshman with five saves ... named MVP of Metro Conference Tournament when he picked up three saves in final three games of tournament, all within a 24-hour period ... pitched 8.1 innings in that tournament, striking out 13 and allowing just two hits ... averaged 10.5 strikeouts per nine innings pitched ... 35 appearances as a freshman was third highest in school's history ... began the season as starter before being moved to bullpen halfway through season ... was named to freshman All-American team by Baseball America at conculsion of season ... allowed just four earned runs in first 25 innings of work to start career ... had 10 or more strikeouts in three different games. CAREER: Has had 13 games at FSU with 10 or more strikeouts ... 324 career strikeouts average out to 12.53 per nine innings pitches ... needs 93 strikeouts to break Mike Loynd's school record of 417. HIGH SCHOOL: Selected to all-state teams in both football and baseball at Muncie High School ... also lettered in basketball. PERSONAL: Majoring in physical education ... 21-years-old ... born 1/25/66 ... lists coaching as career goal.

1987: Currently listed as Florida State's number one receiver ... enters junior season as pre-season All-American selection by Collegiate Baseball magazine ... earned second team pre-season All-American honors from Baseball America ... left handed hitting catcher with a strong arm, Fulton should be high draft pick in June. 1986: Appeared in all 74 games, starting mainly at catcher ... second on team in both home runs (16) and RBIs (78); as well as walks (55) ... threw out 26 runners on attempted steals, in addition to picking six runners off base ... 623 putouts set Florida State record ... has 22 games with two or more hits, including three hit games against Texas A&M (South II Region), Jacksonville (4/8), Southern Miss (3/23), Pitt (3/19) and Georgia Tech (2/22) ... also had 19 games with two or more RBIs, including a career high 6 against Jacksonville (4/8)—a game in which he had two home runs ... longest hitting streak of season was five games, starts 1987 season on four game streak ... seven game winning RBIs was fourth highest on squad . . . hit .364 in NCAA South II Regional (4 for 11) with one home run and four RBIs ... also went 5 for 16 (.313) in Metro Conference Tournament with one home run and seven RBIs ... came on strong defensively in last part of season, making just one error in last 231 chances . . . selected to US Senior National team, where he was starting catcher for most of summer ... hit .351 as a member of US squad with six home runs and 35 RBIs in 39 games. 1985: Hit .285 with 10 home runs and 42 RBIs as freshman, when he split time with Barry Blackwell behind the plate . . . threw out 16 potential base stealers, while committing just four errors ... had two or more RBIs in single game 12 times . . . missed nine games with split finger at beginning of season ... had grandslam against South Florida and three-runs shots against Miami and South Alabama . . . struck out just 13 times in 172 plate appearances. 
1987: Enters season as number one second baseman on Florida State depth chart ... excellent defensive player with some power in bat ... transfers to FSU from Chipola Junior College, and will have three seasons of eligibility left ... will be one of two switch hitters in Florida State lineup this season. 1986: Hit .312 for Chipola last season with five home runs and 32 RBIs in 44 games ... excellent base runner, Alicea stole 18 bases ... had a total of 15 extra-base hits ... played summer ball with Jerry's Caterers ... drafted in 8th round by California Angels in January draft. HIGH SCHOOL: Played in American Legion World Series ... was an All-American at Roesler High School in Puerto Rico. PERSONAL: Brother of former Florida State All-American Luis Alicea ... majoring in physical education ... 19-years-old ... will turn 20 on March 9.

1987: Went into January workouts as number one shortstop on team ... considered one of top junior college shortstops in country, Bournigal transfers to Florida State from Canada Junior College and will have two seasons of eligibility left ... considered by FSU coaching staff to be potentially the finest fielding shortstop in history of school. 1986: Hit .312 for Canada JC with 22 RBIs and 18 stolen bases in 33 games ... was a two-time selection to all-conference team ... played summer ball in Iowa, where he hit .324 with four home runs and 30 RBIs for Clarinda A's. PERSONAL: majoring in physical education at Florida State ... brother Henry was draft pick of Boston Red Sox ... age 20 ... date of birth was May 22, 1966.



1987: Listed as backup to Fulton at catcher in pre-season, but look for Blackwell to start most games at either catcher, first, third or designated hitter ... described as a "winner" by Florida State coaches, Blackwell needs to be in lineup some place ... excellent defensive catcher, Blackwell has outstanding throwing arm. 1986: Played almost entire season at third base—volunteering for position when need developed . . . charged with 13 errors at third, but none in last 21 games of regular season schedule (including Metro Conference Tournament) . . . had good World Series at plate, colleting seven hits in 19 at-bats (.368), scoring four runs ... started season off slow with just 10 hits in first 46 at-bats, but then went on seven game hitting streak in middle of season to lift average from .215 to .348 . . . had 11 multiple hit games, including four hits against Richmond (3/14) ... excellent bunter, Blackwell led team with seven sacrifices ... played in Cape Cod League. 1985: Split time with Ed Fulton as starting catcher ... hit .327 with 8 home runs and 34 RBIs ... earned Freshman All-American honors, finishing slightly ahead of Fulton in balloting for that award . . . went five for five in game against Jacksonville (4/4/85) collecting three home runs and seven RBIs . . . had three more RBIs in single game on four different occasions ... threw out 23 potential base stealers during that season. 1987: Enters season in battle with Chris Pollack for number two spot in Florida State's starting rotation . . . good fast ball and curve from left side make Byerly strong addition to Seminole staff . . . transfers to Florida State this past January after spending fall semester at Tallahassee Community College . . . pitched first two years of college at Brevard Community College. 1986: Compiled a 14-1 record with 2.46 ERA at Brevard, where he was named to the all-conference and all-state teams . . . was MVP in Regionals and went on to earn spot on all-tournament team at Junior College World Series, where he led his team to second place finish . . . was also named outstanding pitcher in JuCo World Series . . . selected in third round of January draft by Seattle Mariners. 1985: Went 7-2 as a freshman pitcher at Brevard. SEMINOLE STADIUM: HOME OF FLORIDA STATE BASEBALL=

While new homes are often a source of pride for their owners, so is Seminole Stadium a source of pride for Florida State University's baseball team.

At a cost in excess of \$1 million, old Seminole Field underwent extensive renovations at the conclusion of the 1982 season. As a resut of that construction, Seminole Stadium was christened on March 28, 1983.


Florida State now boasts one of the finest natural playing surfaces in the country, surrounded by an ultra modern stadium built with the fans' comfort in mind.

In essence, all that was good with the old playing field remained unchanged. With the exception of a new drainage system and the leveling off of a low spot behind second base, the infield and outfield surface of bermuda grass remained unchanged; as did the metal halide 1500 watt lights that are mounted on concrete standards around the stadium.

What did change was the stands. The old wood bleachers were replaced by a two-tier concrete grandstand that seats 2000 fans. On the lower level of the structure is a box seat style arrangement; while the upper level contains metal bleachers with backs. Additional seating down both lines brings capacity to over 5000; with overflow seating to 6000 fans available. Park design allows for future expansion if necessary.

Stadium dimensions measure 320 to right, 400 to center and 340 to left. A screen was installed prior to the 1986 season on the right field wall that gradually increases the height of the fence on that side from 20 feet in the power alley to 30-feet in right field—giving the Seminoles a unique "green monster" effect similar to the one in Fenway Park. An electronic scoreboard, a high quality public address system, modern concession stands and vendors circulating the stands give Seminole Stadium a big league look.

A large pressbox, with separate booths for press, home radio, visiting radio, television and boosters, make the new facility complete.
