**Mike Martin's Seminoles have won at least 50 games in every one of his previous nine seasons as head coach. Can they make it ten?**

In November of 1979, Mike Martin was right where he has always loved to be. He was on the baseball field at Florida State University working with the players that would make up the 1980 Seminole team.

Martin, an outstanding player at Florida State in 1966 and '67, was in his fifth year as the school's top assistant. The late Dick Howser, Florida State's most illustrious baseball graduate was directing the program and heading into his second year.

Martin picked up a ringing telephone that fall afternoon in the FSU dugout. Although the call wasn't for him, it just may have been the most important phone call of his life. The voice on the other end of the line, you see, was George Steinbrenner. He was calling to ask Howser to become the Manager of the New York Yankees.

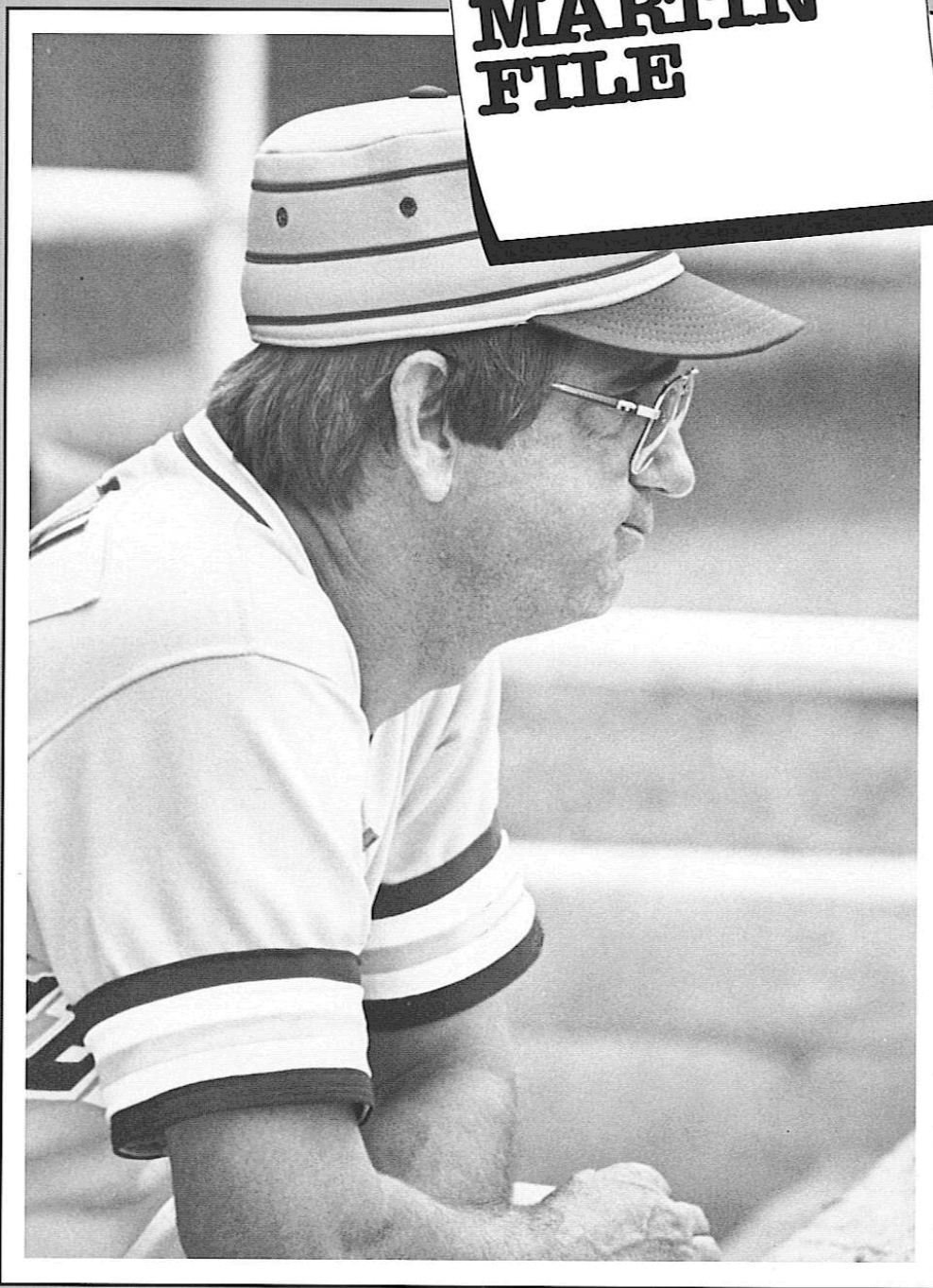
With Howser's exit there was simply no question as to who the next FSU head coach would be. And since that day in 1979 there has never been a doubt that Mike Martin and Seminole baseball are a perfect match.

For Martin it is a dream-come-true. He would be the first to tell you that his current position is his ultimate thrill. After 23 years of association with Florida State baseball, Mike Martin bleeds Garnet and Gold. And perhaps no one has meant more to a program than has Martin to the Seminoles.

It's almost hard to believe that this one-time centerfielder is already heading into his 10th season at the Florida State helm. He'll turn 45 on February 12 and even at that young age he is on his way to immortality in college baseball circles. Even in the deep tradition of FSU baseball, no Seminole team had ever

won 50 or more games in a single season before Martin took the club. His teams have incredibly won 50 or more in every one of his nine years. The last three seasons are most significant since the NCAA has imposed a maximum of 60 regular season games.

The FSU coach is just two victories away from 500 career wins. He will become the fastest coach to reach that milestone when he does it very early in his 10th season. No coach has ever reached that plateau in less than 10 seasons. By comparison, college baseball's second-winningest all-time coach, reached number 500 in his 16th year. In 25 years, he now has more than 1,000 career wins. On his present pace, Martin would reach 1,000 career wins in his 20th collegiate season.

With a sparkling 498-171-3 record and a winning percentage of .743, he ranks as the nation's fifth-winningest active coach. He is Florida State's winningest coach ever by a mile. He now has more than twice as many victories as Jack Stallings' 248, and he's well past Danny Litwhiler's 189, Woody Woodward's 170 and Fred Hatfield's 161. Only Woodward's .749 winning percentage was better among eight previous FSU coaches.

Every year under Martin the Seminoles have participated in NCAA post-season play – nine straight years.

That run, on the heels of appearances in 1978 and '79, give Florida State baseball 11 consecutive tournament trips. By comparison, the longest previous string at FSU was four – ironically during Martin's playing tenure (1965-68). Only one other team in America, Miami, has a longer string of consecutive appearances.

Only seven teams in college baseball have topped FSU's nine College World

Series trips. Martin has been involved in better than half of those, with five trips to Omaha as a player, assistant coach and head coach.

It's no wonder Martin has been able to truly grasp the great FSU baseball tradition. He learned it from the masters. Playing under Hatfield, Martin worked as an assistant to Woodward and Howser. Hatfield certainly is one of the more

respected coaches in FSU history. Woodward, an FSU All-American and former major leaguer, is now the General Manager of the Seattle Mariners. Martin served under him from 1975-78. Then came Dick Howser in 1979. He was the New York Yankees' third base coach for 11 seasons prior to succeeding Woodward. As a true testimony to the respect Martin carries in baseball circles, Howser immediately retained him as his number one assistant.

Martin says his years around these men and the FSU program in general has instilled the desire to produce winners on and off the playing field. Stepping out of their shadow, Martin has now built his own legacy at Florida State.

During his tenure, 15 different players have earned All-America, 39 have been named to the All-Conference team and an incredible 41 players have signed professional contracts. Two of Martin's Seminoles – Mike Fuentes and Mike Loynd – have won the Golden Spike Award, emblematic of the nation's best amateur player.

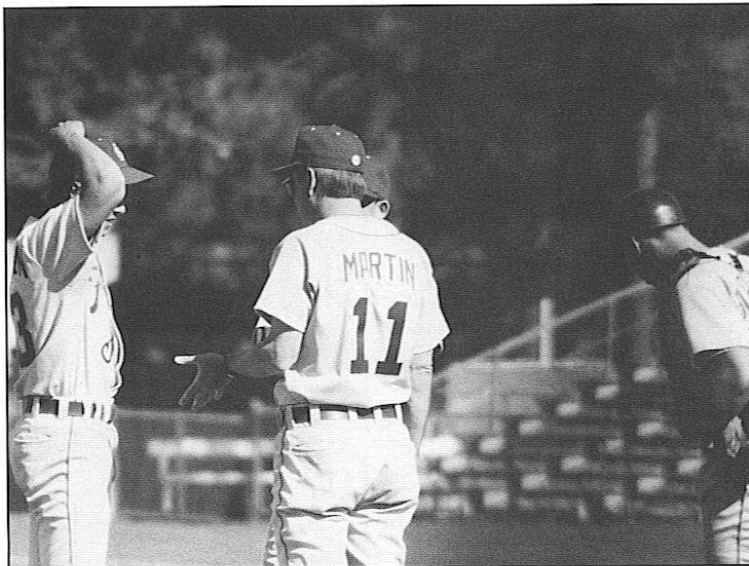
Martin's love affair with FSU baseball began in 1966 when he first set foot in Tallahassee after a two-year playing career at Wingate Junior College in North Carolina. The Charlotte native still clings to his tobacco road roots, but North Florida is now his true home.

Prior to becoming an assistant at FSU, Martin spent several years coaching the prep and college ranks. His tenure included several years as baseball and basketball coach at the junior high level, one season as head basketball coach at Tallahassee Community College and four years as basketball coach at Amos P. Godby High.

Prior to entering the coaching profession, Martin was a standout baseball player at Wingate Junior College, before finishing his college career at Florida State. A two-time junior college All-American at Wingate, Martin went on to earn All-District honors as an outfielder at FSU. Following three years of professional ball in the New York Met and Detroit Tiger organizations, Martin returned to coach and teach in Tallahassee.

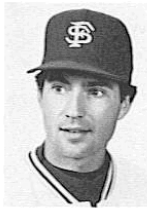
A popular speaker, Martin has delivered keynote addresses at several state and national meetings, including gatherings of the Florida High School Coaches Association, Atlanta Braves Instructional Clinics, and Seminole Booster Clubs throughout the southeast.

A 1966 graduate of Florida State, Martin earned his master's degree from Florida A&M in 1971. Mike and his wife Carol have three children, Mary Beth (19), Mike Jr. (16), and Melanie (13).

# ASSISTANT COACHES



## Rod Delmonico

Assistant Coach

As he enters his sixth season on the Seminole coaching staff, Rod Delmonico has quickly gained the reputation as one of the top recruiters in collegiate baseball. During the last five seasons as the head of FSU's recruiting efforts, Delmonico has personally signed a number of top draft choices who elected to bypass their professional opportunities to further their baseball careers at Florida State. Delmonico's list of signees includes former FSU All-Americans Barry Blackwell, Richie Lewis and current star Ricky Kimball.

Through his efforts, Florida State's recruiting classes from each of the past five seasons have been selected among the 10 best in the nation, including his 1984 class which ranked number one, as well as his 1986 and '87 classes which finished second.

In addition to his recruiting duties, Delmonico coaches the outfielders, serves as first base coach and handles travel arrangements for FSU on the road.

The 31-year-old Delmonico came to FSU from Clemson, where he served as graduate assistant coach for two years. Prior to that, Delmonico was a standout athlete at Liberty Baptist College where he lettered in baseball and soccer.

A 1981 graduate of Liberty Baptist, Delmonico earned a degree in physical education before completing a master's degree in administration at Clemson.

Delmonico is also a noted author of several articles geared to high school athletics. He is a regular columnist in Scholastic Magazine and has been published in numerous other magazines.

Delmonico is currently completing work on a book entitled, "Offensive Baseball." The book is scheduled to go to press early in 1989. He also teamed in 1986 with the later manager of the K.C. Royals in the instructional video, "The Dick Howser Workout."

Delmonico is married to the former Barbara Vanaman and are parents of one son, Anthony.



## Chip Baker

Assistant Coach

Chip Baker is entering his fifth year on the Florida State staff. As an assistant, Baker serves as the Seminoles' third base coach.

A former assistant at Georgia Tech, Baker is one of college baseball's premier catching instructors. During his tenure at Florida State, he has coached All-Americans Ed Fulton and Barry Blackwell, both of whom have gone on to careers in professional baseball. Baker also handles the administrative tasks of purchasing equipment to put the Seminoles on the field. When FSU is on the road, Baker serves as travel coordinator.

Working closely with FSU's summer camps and serving as director of the highly successful Seminole select camp, Baker's summers are busy. Besides these duties, he also finds time to direct Florida State's summer team - Jerry's Caterers. A popular speaker, Baker has spoken to numerous Seminole Booster Clubs and various civic organizations around the State.

A 1980 graduate of High Point College, Baker led the Panthers to four conference championships on the diamond. He also participated in the 1979 NAIA World Series. After completing his degree in physical education at High Point College, Baker went on to earn a master's at Virginia Tech in Motor Behavior.

At FSU, Baker is also an assistant professor in the Movement Science and Physical Education Department. The 31-year-old Baker is single.



## Steve Winterling

Assistant Coach

Steve Winterling is in his fourth year on the FSU baseball staff. As an assistant coach, Winterling handles several on-the-field coaching duties, as well as serving as coordinator for baseball team academics. Last year, the baseball team finished second only to swimming among Florida State's athletic teams on the basis of grade point average. Part of Winterling's duties also included the direct supervision of Dick Howser Field's playing surface which perennially is among the nation's finest fields.

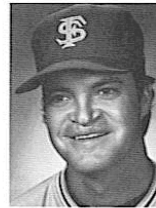
A native of Jacksonville, Winterling came to FSU from Englewood Senior High School where he was an assistant coach for three years. Prior to that, he coached four seasons at Florida College, where he was an assistant for three years and head coach for one.

A 1981 graduate of South Florida with a degree in physical education, Winterling later came to Florida State and completed his master's degree in physical education in 1986.

Winterling lettered two years in baseball at Florida College before moving on to South Florida to complete his studies. A member of the American Baseball Coaches Association

for nine years, Winterling also scouted for the New York Yankees in 1984. Winterling has worked on the staff of several prestigious summer camps, including the successful Seminole Select Camp.

The 30-year-old Winterling is single.



## Mike McLeod

Assistant Coach

Former FSU standout Mike McLeod begins his eighth year on the Seminole coaching staff. A coach with both college and professional experience, McLeod brings a wealth of knowledge to his position as both a student and teacher of the game.

A 1977 FSU graduate, McLeod is in charge of the Seminole pitching staff and serves as bullpen coach during all Florida State games. Last season, McLeod directed FSU's young staff to a 3.35 ERA which ranked among the nation's top 10 teams. He is also credited with the development of a number of former Seminole pitchers, including Richie Lewis and former Golden Spikes recipient Mike Loynd.

In addition to his FSU experience, McLeod was an instructor for the New York Yankee farm team in Paintsville, KY for four summers and worked with the Montreal organization in 1986 and '87.

McLeod earned All-American honors at Middle Georgia Junior College in 1974, before transferring to Florida State. In two years with the Seminoles, McLeod won 13 games. Among his college achievements are three no-hitters.

Following graduation, McLeod played three years of baseball in the Yankee organization. Mike and his wife Rose have two children, Garrett (7) and Jenny (4).

## Dr. Bernard Sliger

University President

Dr. Bernard Sliger has served as the 10th president of

Florida State University since February 7, 1977, following a six-month stint as the University's interim president. In 1987 he celebrated the end of his first decade of leadership.

After he joined the administration in 1972 as executive vice president, he assumed the additional duties of chief academic officer, and further served as director of the University's London Study Center during the fall quarter, 1975.

Sliger, a native of Trout Creek, MI, was born Sept. 30, 1924. He holds three degrees, the B.A. ('49), M.A. ('50) and Ph.D. ('55), from Michigan State University, all in economics. He also has done post-doctoral study in mathematical economics at the University of Minnesota. Sliger has taught at Florida State, Michigan State, Louisiana State and at Southern University in Baton Rouge, LA.

Sliger holds memberships in a number of professional, scholastic and honor societies, including Omicron Delta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi and Alpha Kappa Psi. Since 1983, he has been a member of the board of directors of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta and presently serves as chairman of the Board of Trustees of the American College Testing Corporation in Iowa City, Iowa.

As president at Florida State, Sliger is involved in athletics. He is a member of the NCAA's Presidents Commission and is one of 22 chief executive officers elected to that body from Division I schools. He began his four-year term in January of last year.

Sliger and his wife, Greta, have two sons, Paul and Sten, and two daughters, Nan and Greta.



## Charles W. Ehrhardt

Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman

A Professor of Law at Florida State University since 1967, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his fifth year as Chairman of the FSU Athletic Committee.

Ehrhardt served on the committee from 1969 to 71, and was reappointed to the board in 1983. He succeeded Dr. James Jones as chairman in 1984, and became Florida State's representative to the NCAA with the appointment.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received a bachelor's degree from Iowa State University in 1962. Two years later he earned his law degree from the University of Iowa and went on to become an Assistant United States Attorney in that state before coming to Tallahassee.

A widely-respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt holds the Florida State position as the Ladd Professor Evidence. He wrote the Florida Evidence Code, passed by the state legislature in 1976, which deals with the admissibility of evidence in court trials.

Ehrhardt and his wife, the former Judy Sutton, have three children.



## C.W. "Hootie" Ingram

Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to his friends and associates as "Hootie," has headed Florida State's athletic department for the past eight years. He came to FSU in January of 1981 after eight years with the Southeastern Conference.

Upon arriving in Tallahassee, Ingram initiated a \$10 million-dollar building program for athletic facilities. Moore Athletic Center, which houses administrative, coaching and ticket personnel, was planned, built and completed under Ingram's leadership.

Dick Howser Stadium, second to none in the South, was completed during Ingram's second year at FSU, while Doak Campbell Stadium, the Bim Stults Aquatic Center and Mike Long Track were all renovated.

Ingram is in his second year of a four-year term on the prestigious NCAA Council. As an elected member of that body, he is one of 22 representatives from Division I schools.

A native of Tuscaloosa, AL, Ingram played football for the hometown Crimson Tide from

1951 to 1954. He was named all-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. He was a member of both the 1953 Orange and 1954 Cotton Bowl squads, and also lettered for the Alabama baseball team as an infielder.

Ingram moved into the college coaching arena in 1960 as an assistant at Wake Forest. He also made coaching stops at Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas before accepting the head coach's job at Clemson in 1970, the only collegiate head coaching job he held. Three years after taking the position, Ingram left Clemson to join the SEC as an assistant commissioner.

Ingram and his wife, Toni, have a son and two daughters.



## Bob Goins

Associate Athletic Director

Bob Goins has been the associate athletic director at Florida State since July of 1981. Several sports programs report to Goins, and he also assists athletic director Hootie Ingram with day-to-day operations of the athletic department. Goins is also responsible for organizing and implementing game day operations for the football, basketball and baseball teams.

Goins has served as tournament director for the NCAA South, Atlantic and East Regionals, which have been held in Tallahassee every year since 1983.

Goins came to Florida State with experience as both an administrator and a coach. He arrived at FSU after two years as athletic director of California (PA) State College, where he was credited with expanding the athletic department. He formed the Cal State Athletic Scholarship Fund and Athletic Booster Club and established the Cal State radio network.

Between 1960 and 1976, he held a variety of positions at Bethany (W. Va.) College including coaching assignments in football, basketball and baseball.

Goins received a bachelor's degree from Bethany in 1959 and his master's from West Virginia in 1962.

He and his wife, Nancy have four children.

FSU coaches hope he can overcome shoulder problems that plagued him since the start of fall drills ... played his high school baseball in the shadow of Dick Howser Stadium at nearby Florida High ... culminated his career with a superb senior season, when he hit .573 ... recipient of the Tallahassee Democrat's Player-of-the-Year award in 1988 ... **PREP:** Fits into FSU's scheme nicely with his speed on the base paths, as he swiped 79 bases in his career, including a season best 39 in '88 ... a three year letterman at Florida High, he played in a total of 86 games in his prep career ... also selected to play in the North/South All-Star Game ... **PERSONAL:** Enrolled in Florida State's undergraduate studies program ... born June 25, 1970.

One of the most dedicated workers on the team, Brady might help the staff in a number of ways ... although winning a spot in the starting rotation is not out of the question, he most likely will work out of the bullpen in middle relief ... FSU pitching coach Mike McLeod said Brady, "isn't the most physically talented pitcher on the team, but he's probably improved as much as any pitcher during his career who I've coached" ... made headlines in state papers, when he was struck on his left cheek by a line-drive in the eighth inning of the Louisville game (5/18) that required 27 stitches ... missed the remainder of the post season competition, but has shown no long lasting effects
