SEASON IN REVIEW

1991 - A Season of Achievement

In the space of three days in February was a successful season made.

Sure, 1991 was a year of "ups" for the Florida State baseball team. The squad spent nine weeks at number one. They established a school record for consecutive victories by reeling off a 22-game streak in March. Florida State swept a three-game series from rival Miami in Tallahassee and won five of six games from UM on the season. FSU shared the Metro Conference Championship for its ninth straight Metro title and won 50 games for the 12th straight time under Head Coach Mike Martin. And the Tribe trounced the competition in the NCAA Atlantic Regional to win its fourth trip to the College World Series in the past six years.

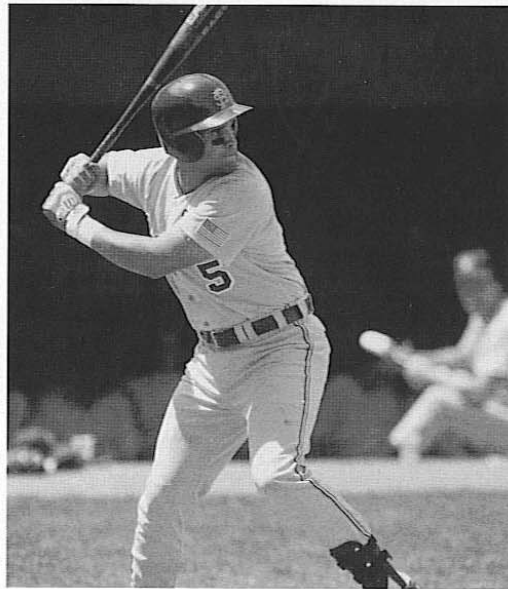
The stage for all that success was set during a three-game series with then top-ranked Arizona State in February. The Sun Devils came into Tallahassee with a reputation as a powerful offensive machine, riding a seven-game win streak and sporting that lofty ranking. The Seminoles, 3-0 after a season-opening sweep of Duke, were still testing a young pitching staff that included only four returnees.

Then, twice in three days, the Seminoles came from behind to win. Friday, FSU fell behind ASU 4-3 entering the bottom of the ninth, but scratched out a run to tie the game. The Sun Devils scored one in the 10th, and after the first two FSU batters struck out to open their half of the frame, light-hitting Chris Brock walked and pinch-hitter Marc Dunbar singled to give FSU a glimmer of hope. When back-up shortstop Tony Liebsack lined a 1-2 pitch off the rightfield wall and both runners came around to score, the Tribe had a huge, confidence-building win.

After Florida State blew out ASU 21-5 Saturday, Friday's scene was nearly replayed on Sunday. The Seminoles got a great pitching performance from Chris Roberts, who struck out 10 and allowed only two solo home runs in nine innings. FSU scratched out a run in the bottom of the ninth to tie the game at two. Arizona State regained the lead in the top of the 10th, but the home team scored two in the bottom of the inning to claim the sweep. Freshman Link Jarrett played hero with a sacrifice fly to plate the winning run.

Those victories vaulted FSU 10 spaces in the polls, to number two, and earned the respect of the nation. More importantly, the previously "untested" Seminoles had aced the toughest exam of all, with contributions from the entire line-up, solid pitching from starters and relievers, and some unlikely candidates providing late heroics.

Even after losing two of three games at Arizona, the Semi-

noles' confidence was undiminished. FSU came back to Tallahassee to sweep a three-game set from Minnesota before heading to New Orleans for the Busch Challenge.

FSU's two victories in the Challenge both came by shutout. Jimmy Lewis blanked Tulane on two hits and struck out a season-high 13. The next day, surprise starter Ricky Kimball matched Lewis with an 8-0 shutout of number one Louisiana State. Kimball struck out 11 and allowed only five hits while Pedro Grifol hit his third home run in two games to earn tournament MVP honors.

That honor was the first of many for Florida State individuals in 1991. Grifol became FSU's first first-team All-American since 1987. With a final batting average of .344, as well as team-leading marks in home runs (16) and RBI (80), Grifol's offensive skills matched his defensive prowess. Behind the plate, he took

charge of a young pitching staff, committed only one error and was charged with only one passed ball in 69 games at catcher. He also threw out nearly 60 percent of the runners who tried to steal on FSU.

Grifol was joined on the All-America lists by first baseman Eduardo Perez. FSU's top hitter with a .370 batting average, Perez led the Seminoles in every offensive category Grifol didn't with 87 runs, 105 hits and 30 stolen bases. He was a second-team All-America selection and a first-round pick of the California Angels in the major league baseball draft.

Grifol and Perez, along with sophomore outfielder Roberts and third baseman Nandy Serrano, powered the Seminole offense. Roberts, by virtue of his success both at the plate and on the mound, was named the Most Valuable Player in the Metro Conference in addition to earning All-America honors. With his .321 batting average, 14 home runs and 77 RBI, 7-2 pitching record and 3.52 earned run average, number 14 garnered national attention. Following the season, he was named to the USA National Team and represented both Florida State and the United States around the world over the summer.

Little did the Seminoles know that Lewis' and Kimball's shutouts in the Busch Challenge were the start of something big as the team began an 18-game homestand with a three-game sweep of Ball State. Then rival Florida came to town, only to fall twice, 8-3 and 5-3. Three wins over Richmond extended FSU's win streak to 10 games, with Michigan on the horizon. After an 11-6 win over UM in the opener, Roberts pitched an absolute masterpiece, retiring the first 18 Michigan batters he faced and striking out 13. When it was over, he had allowed only an infield single and faced only 28 batters.

The streak continued. FSU swept Northern Iowa before Seminole pitchers overpowered Metro rival Southern Miss. Roberts pitched his second straight shutout in the second game against USM, and Florida State swept the Golden Eagles. A two-game sweep of Mercer extended the win streak to 20.

The Seminoles would have to break the record on the road, though. And to do it, they would need a doubleheader sweep of Memphis State on a freezing day in Memphis. In the first game, Roger Bailey scattered five hits through seven innings and Florida State held on to take a 6-5 victory for its 21st straight win.

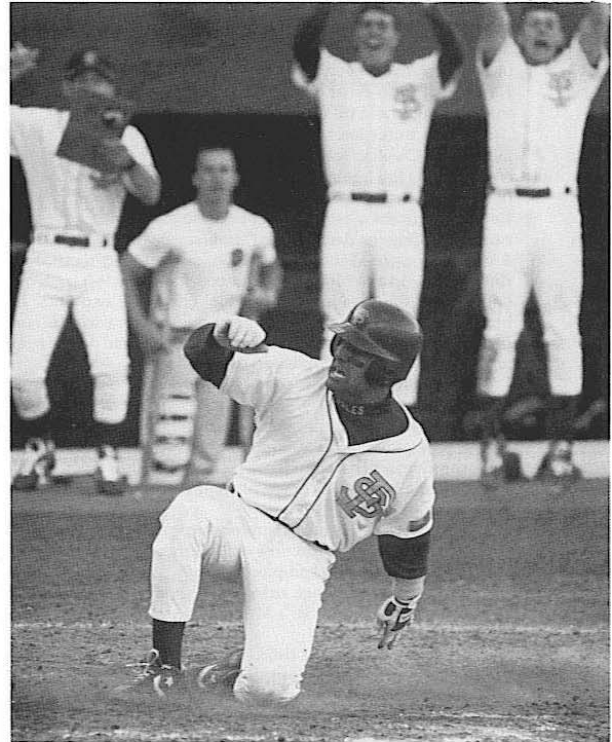
Florida State was forced into extra frames to get the record-breaker. The two teams were supposed to play only seven innings in the nightcap, but the pitchers had other ideas. The Seminoles narrowly averted a loss in the 10th when the winning run stood 90 feet away with no outs. But Kimball wriggled out of the jam after a pair of strikeouts and a big pickoff by FSU catcher Grifol. Grifol's solo home run over the centerfield wall to lead off the 11th gave the 1991 Seminoles the school record.

The next day, MSU broke the streak with an 8-7 win. South Alabama then out-lasted Florida State 6-5 in a 15-inning marathon in Mobile. Still on the road, FSU responded with two wins over South Carolina in Columbia before falling in the finale of that three-game series. The 2-2 week saw Florida State drop to second in the polls after four straight weeks at number one.

FSU quickly rebounded, riding the pitching arms of Bailey, Tim Davis and Roberts to sweep third-ranked Miami in Tallahassee. After a split of two games against the University of Florida in Gainesville, the Seminoles swept Metro foe Louisville at home, although they were later forced to forfeit the final game due to use of an illegal player.

A doubleheader in New Orleans resulted in two one-run losses at Tulane, and a 7-4 loss to Jacksonville in Tallahassee broke FSU's 37-game home win streak. The loss was Florida State's first at home in over a year, since April 21, 1990, and the three-game losing streak was FSU's longest skid since 1989.

As April turned into May, Florida State got back on the winning track. The Seminoles proved their Tallahassee sweep

was no fluke by beating the Hurricanes twice in Miami. Friday, Bailey defeated the Hurricanes for the second time, this time with a complete-game, eight-strikeout, six-hitter. The next day, Kenny Robinson allowed only one run over eight innings in a 4-1 FSU win. In that game, Florida State senior reliever Kimball claimed the FSU career record for saves with his fifth of the season and 31st of his career.

Kimball, a four-year letterwinner, left Florida State with the career records for saves (32), appearances (113) and relief appearances (92).

The Hurricanes avoided an FSU sweep of the season series by winning the final game in Miami, 8-6. Florida State returned to Dick Howser Stadium and swept Virginia Tech in three games. A controversy-filled, three-game sweep of Cincinnati in Cincinnati followed before the Seminoles arrived in Salem, Virginia to defend their Metro Conference title.

In its final appearance at the Metro Tournament, FSU got strong pitching performances from Bailey and Robinson in the first two games to claim easy 9-3 and 17-0 wins over Cincinnati and South Carolina, respectively. Robinson blanked USC on three hits for his fifth win of the year. In the winner's bracket game against Southern Miss the next day, USM pitcher David Christianberry bested Bryan Harris and FSU, 3-1, to put the Golden Eagles in the driver's seat.

On a rainy day in Virginia, the Seminoles wouldn't die, even when an elimination game with Cincinnati turned into a shootout. FSU took a 7-4 lead after six innings, but the Bearcats scored eight times in the seventh to take a 12-7 lead. Kenny Felder's two-run homer after a Roberts double started the FSU

seventh. After an out, a hit batsman and a walk, Allen Bevis doubled to drive in two more and the Seminoles trailed by one. Serrano singled to score Bevis and the game was tied again. One inning later, Felder settled the matter with a solo home run and Kimball, despite getting roughed up for seven hits in less than three innings, held off UC for the win.

Just minutes later, Florida State was back on the field to face South Carolina for the right to play Southern Miss for the crown. FSU fell behind 3-0 in the fourth, before Ty Mueller's two-out, two-run triple put the Seminoles on the scoreboard. Behind 4-2 in the sixth, Mueller tied the game with a two-out, two-run home run. After South Carolina went ahead by four, 8-4, in the seventh, Mueller halved the lead with a two-out, two-run double. In the ninth, the Gamecocks took a 9-6 lead, but once again, they couldn't stop Mueller. With two outs, he blasted a two-run homer to bring the Seminoles within one. Florida State had scored eight runs and Mueller had driven in all eight with a double, a triple and two homers.

Now, it was time for some other heroes. One out from elimination and trailing 9-8, Liebsack coaxed a walk. Jarrett calmly stepped up and lined a double just inside the rightfield line. Liebsack was safe at home and the score was tied again. After the Gamecocks went down 1-2-3 in the 10th, Bevis led off the Seminole 10th with a home run and Florida State was in the championship game.

There would be no championship game, though. Rain wiped out the next day's action and Southern Miss and Florida State were declared co-champions as Florida State won its ninth straight Metro Conference title and 12th championship in 15 seasons in the league. FSU's Mueller was named Metro Tournament MVP.

For the 14th straight time, FSU advanced to NCAA Regional play, and for the 11th time, that regional would be played in Tallahassee. The Seminoles opened with a 6-0 shutout of Coastal Carolina as Bailey scattered six hits and struck out seven. The next day, Florida State got a strong pitching performance from Harris against Florida International. He no-hit the Golden Panthers through six innings while FSU built a 3-0 lead. Felder's two-run single gave the Seminoles a 5-0 lead which would prove insurmountable.

Florida State faced Alabama for the right to advance to the championship game. The FSU offense was stifled by Alabama pitcher Al Drumheller as the Seminoles managed only three hits through the first seven innings before scoring four runs in the eighth to take a 4-2 lead. The big hit was a two-out, bases-loaded double by Roberts off the wall in right center. Mueller added a solo homer in the ninth and Florida State had a spot in the Atlantic Regional championship game.

The game was a rematch between the Crimson Tide and Seminoles. Alabama scored first before FSU got back-to-back home runs by Grifol and Roberts to take a 2-1 lead. Alabama scored three runs in the fourth to knock Tribe starter Robinson out of the game. Reliever John Nedeau gave up a solo home run in the fifth as FSU fell behind 5-2.

In their half of the fifth, Florida State responded. After a single and two walks loaded the bases, Grifol's sacrifice fly plated one run. A hit batter loaded the bases again, setting the stage for pinch-hitter Brock, who entered the game hitting .188. He flared a hit into right to score two and the game was tied at five. With Nedeau suddenly mowing down Alabama batters, Florida State took the lead in the seventh. Brock walked, stole second and scored on Garrett Blanton's two-out double to give FSU a 6-5 lead.

Nedeau struck out the side in the eighth, but tired in the ninth. With one out and one on, he left in favor of Kimball. Kimball, making his final appearance ever at Dick Howser Stadium, gave the crowd what it wanted with a pair of strikeouts to end the game, sending the Seminoles to the College World Series for the fourth time in six years.
