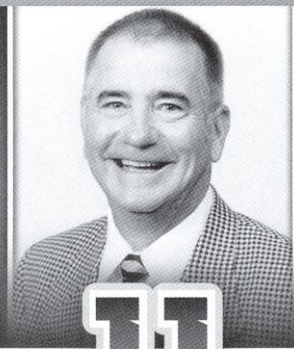




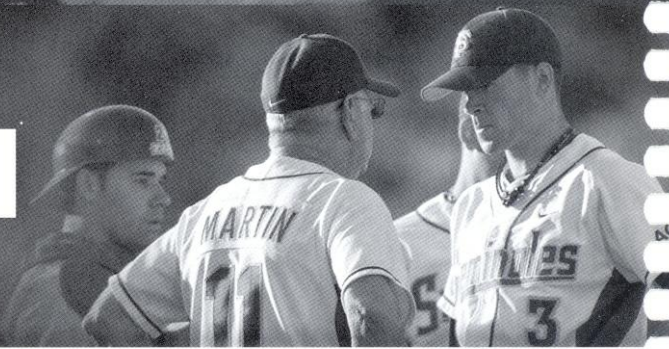

Entering his 31st season as Florida State's head coach, Mike Martin continues to cement his legacy as one of collegiate baseball's most prolific coaches. Over the last three years, the legendary Seminole coach won his 1,500th game and was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame. The Florida State graduate is one of just four baseball coaches in the history of the NCAA to win 1,500 games at the Division I level and is 17 victories shy of becoming only the third coach to reach 1,600 career victories.

Mike Martin has become the face of Florida State baseball having been associated with the Seminoles for 38 of FSU's 63 seasons. He is by far the winningest coach in the history of the program. Of the 3,398 baseball games played in program history, Martin has been involved in 2,505 as a player, assistant coach and head coach. What is even more impressive is Martin's involvement in 1,846 of the 2,479 all-time victories at Florida State. In one way or another Martin has been a part of more than 74.5% of FSU's victories.

Martin has led the Seminoles to the College World Series 13 times and to 32 consecutive NCAA Regional Appearances, including in each of his 30 seasons as head coach. He has won 15 conference championships since taking over as field general in 1980 with 11 from the Metro Conference and four as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference. He is a 12-time Conference Coach of the Year earning such honors from the Metro and the ACC six times each. Seventy-six Florida State players have earned All-America honors under Martin, while 96 players have garnered first and second team All-ACC recognition. He has coached six players, Mike Fuentes, Mike Loynd, J.D. Drew, Shane Robinson, Tony Thomas, Jr. and Buster Posey, who were named National Players of the Year, including three in the last five years.

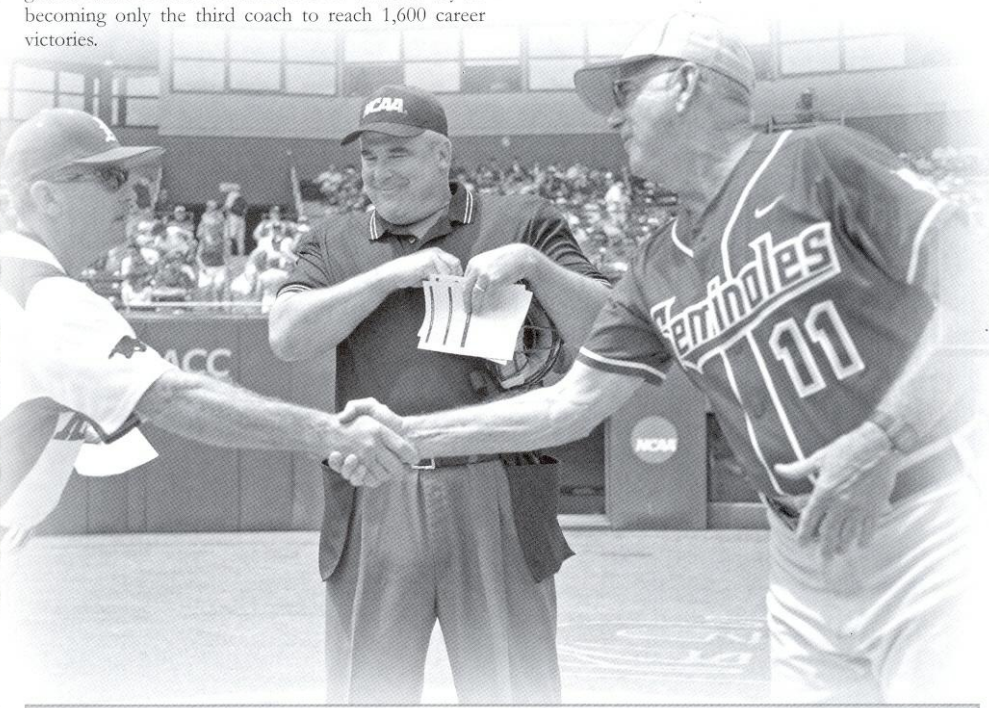
For the past 30 seasons, Martin hasn't just produced great players he has developed great teams. Florida State has grown into one of the most prestigious collegiate baseball programs in the NCAA under Martin's guidance. FSU baseball is the second-winningest program all-time but no school has produced more wins than Martin's Seminoles since 2000. No other Division I school has finished in the top 10 more times, compiled more 50+ win seasons or gone to more NCAA Regionals since 1990 as well. Florida State is also one of just two programs to win 73% of its all-time games and what Martin has done in Tallahassee since 1990 may be one of the most impressive runs of consistent success in all of collegiate sports.

FSU's regular season success has translated into postseason success under Martin as well. Since 1990, the Seminoles are tied for fourth in College World Series appearances with nine, while Martin has led his teams to Omaha 13 times in his career including nine trips in the last 19 seasons. Florida State extended its streak of consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances to 32 in 2009 as Martin once again led his Seminole squad to the postseason. Also in 2009, FSU was selected as a regional host for the 27th time in school history, while serving as host to an NCAA Super Regional for the sixth time.

But the 2009 season was not without a few bumps in the road. With a very young squad that comprised of 23 sophomores and freshmen and the departure of several key players that led FSU back to the College World Series in 2008, Martin went into the season with several questions to answer. After a 10-8 start, Martin got the Seminoles on track winning 30 of their last 36 regular season games to finish atop the ACC Atlantic Division for the third consecutive season. Even more impressive was the fact that FSU finished with the best record in the league to capture the top seed in the ACC Tournament for the eighth time in school history. For his efforts, Martin was named the ACC Coach of the Year for the sixth time in his career.

Despite falling to Virginia in the championship game of the ACC Tournament in Durham, N.C., Florida State was rewarded for its strong performance during the regular season by earning an at-large bid into the postseason tournament and serving as host to an NCAA Regional. The Seminoles went a perfect 3-0

in the Tallahassee Regional closing out the tournament with a record-breaking 37-6 victory over Ohio State en route to setting four school records and five NCAA Tournament records in the win. By seasons end, four Seminoles earned All-America honors, while five were named All-ACC. Sean Gilmartin was honored as the National Freshman Pitcher of the Year by the NCBWA becoming the second rookie at FSU to earn such an honor.

In 2008, the Garnet and Gold returned to the College World Series for the 19th time in school history and first since 2000 but not before overcoming adversity by going a combined 6-0 in elimination games in the Tallahassee Regional and Super Regional. Florida State scored 116 runs in the NCAA Tournament including 74 runs over five games in regional action, the second most in school history.

Florida State went on to win its second straight ACC Atlantic Division title that same year and in the process tied the ACC record for the most wins in league history by replicating the 24-6 record set by the Seminoles in 2007 and Clemson in 2006. Since the league's move to division play in 2006, FSU Baseball is 83-34 in league play including 67-21 in the three seasons the Seminoles have captured the divisional crown.

Under the tutelage of Martin, the 2008 Seminoles were the best hitting team in the nation while setting the single-season team record in the ACC and at FSU for the highest batting average at .355. The Garnet and Gold offense showed a little more pop than in years past registering 103 home runs in 68 games, the most hit since blasting 111 in 1999 and the sixth most long balls recorded in a single-season in school history. Five Seminoles earned All-ACC recognition, while Buster Posey was named ACC Player of the Year. Seminole players garnered six All-America honors while Martin saw Posey become the sixth player to earn National Player of the Year honors and the seventh consensus All-American in school history.

For the second straight year, Florida State started a season undefeated at 12-0. It marked just the third time in the Mike Martin era that a Seminole team opened a season winning their first 12 games. This came off the heels of the 2007 squad that set the record for the best start in school history at 23-0, eight games better than the previous school record of 15-0 established by Woody Woodward's 1975 team. All this followed the 2006 season which saw Martin's squad set a new school record with 32 consecutive home wins.

Finally in 2008, Martin added yet another milestone to his already illustrious career as the Hall of Fame coach registered career win No. 1,500 following a 17-8 victory over Georgia Tech. He is just one of four coaches with 1,500 career victories at the Division I level. Martin's career winning percentage of .746 ranks third in the NCAA among active Division I coaches.

In 2007, Martin led Florida State to the number one overall seed in the ACC Tournament after claiming its first conference divisional title. The Seminoles turned in impressive performances both offensively and defensively batting .350 as a team while posting a .975 fielding percentage, a single-season record. FSU Baseball was recognized for its outstanding season as seven Seminoles earned All-ACC recognition including a school record six student-athletes named to the first team. FSU also captured three of the four individual accolades including Tony Thomas, Jr. as ACC Player of the Year, Bryan Henry as ACC Pitcher of the Year and Martin as ACC Coach of the Year. Thomas went on to become the fifth player to earn National Player of the Year honors and sixth consensus All-American in school history.

Along with the team's success in 2007, Martin continued to etch his name among college baseball's greats. With a 14-6 victory over Florida on February 20, Martin moved passed former High Point and Virginia

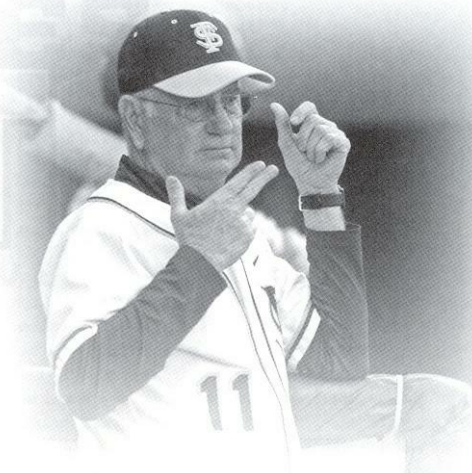

Tech head skipper Chuck Hartman and into sole possession of fifth place on the NCAA all-time wins list.

The 2005 season was a special one for Martin as he was not only inducted into the Florida Sports Hall of Fame but he also had his alma mater name their baseball diamond in his honor. Mike Martin Field at Dick Howser Stadium was officially dedicated April 2 in typical Martin fashion as he picked up his 1,366th win with a 3-1 victory over Clemson. In 2005, Martin set yet another career milestone. With the Seminoles victory over VMI on February 6, Martin recorded his 1,344th win passing Southern California legend Rod Dedeaux and moving into sixth place all-time for wins by a Division I coach.

Martin not only led his squad to team success in 2005, he once again proved he is one of the top shapers of talent in the game. Shane Robinson's selection as Collegiate Baseball's National Player of the Year marked the fourth time one of Martin's players was named collegiate baseball's top player. Robinson was also the fifth consensus first team All-American to play for Martin. In the last five seasons alone, Martin has coached two sophomores (Eddy Martinez-Estevé and

Robinson) who have garnered consensus first team All-America honors. With Robinson's inclusion on the Team USA roster in 2005 and Tyler Holt in 2009, the Seminole coach has now tutored 13 players that have gone on to wear the Red, White & Blue.

In 2004, FSU captured its fourth ACC Championship under Martin in what is widely considered the best baseball conference in America. Martin also saw five more of his players drafted including the 14th first round pick of his career as FSU's head coach when Stephen Drew was taken 15th by the Arizona Diamondbacks. Consensus All-American Martinez-Esteve was a second round pick of the San Francisco Giants as well and he also garnered the 27th first team All-American honor under Martin's watch.

Martin's 2003 Seminoles added another 50-win season to the record books and advanced to NCAA Super Regional play before falling to defending national champion Texas. The team featured eight players that were selected in the MLB Draft, including All-American catcher Tony Richie who was a fourth round pick of the Chicago Cubs. The squad also extended FSU's streak of top 10 finishes to 10 seasons, the longest current run in the nation. The Seminoles finished as the ACC regular season champs for the third straight year.

Despite losing in the final game of the Super Regional to Notre Dame, Martin's 2002 squad will always be one of his all-time favorites. Led by All-American Ryan Barthelemy, that team put together a list of accomplishments that had never before been reached. The Seminoles swept three games at Miami and did the same later in the year at Clemson. Both sweeps were firsts for the FSU program. The three-game sweep over then-No. 1 Clemson at the end of the regular season gave the Seminoles the ACC regular season title and the top seed in the ACC Tournament. The 2002 club did not stop there, winning all five games in St. Petersburg to take home the ACC Tournament Championship. The school record winning streak would reach 25 games as the team swept through NCAA Regional play.

The 2001 squad finished the year one game short of a fourth straight College World Series appearance. Martin was named ACC Coach of the Year for the fourth time

since FSU joined the league in 1992 after leading the team to the regular season title. Slugging outfielder John-Ford Griffin was a Golden Spikes Award finalist, a consensus All-American, the ACC Player of the Year and Martin's 11th first round draft pick.

Martin seems to out do his accomplishments every season. His 2000 club was the 19th to reach the 50-win plateau in his 22nd season. After defeating Miami in the NCAA Super Regional to earn a College World Series berth, the 2000 Seminoles rallied from an opening round loss to advance to the final four in Omaha before losing to eventual national champion LSU.

Martin was named ACC Coach of the Year in 1999 after his team won the ACC regular season with a 22-2 mark, the best regular season record in conference history. The Seminoles went on to finish second in the

country with an impressive CWS showing. Marshall McDougall, who earlier in the season set the NCAA record with six home runs in a single game, was named the CWS Most Outstanding Player.

The Seminole skipper earned his 1,000th victory in a 4-3 decision over Jacksonville on April 9th, 1998. He became the second-fastest head coach to reach the 1,000-win mark in NCAA Division I baseball history. Former FSU players, friends and Bullpen Club members honored Martin for his 1,000th win with a special ceremony and diamond-studded gold Rolex watch. Martin also garnered ACC Coach of the Year distinction from his peers for his efforts that season. Martin guided his 1997 squad to the Seminoles' second Atlantic Coast Conference Championship. That team was led by a pitching staff that hurled four complete games in a five-game ACC Tournament sweep.

BASEBALL



In 1996, FSU's 19-5 ACC record and first-ever first place conference finish in the regular season earned Martin his first ACC Coach of the Year honor. His squad made history as they put together a then-FSU record 22-game winning streak and traveled to the College World Series for the third consecutive season, the first three-year streak in school history.

Martin's brilliant career has meant more than just wins on the baseball diamond. The 2001 team got a first-hand reminder of that prior to a series at Stanford. Leaving the San Francisco airport, Martin and then-assistant coach Chip Baker gained control of the team's charter bus after the driver suffered a fatal heart attack and safely guided the bus to the side of a busy highway. Martin and Baker were presented with the university's prestigious Westcott Award for their bravery in saving the lives of players and staff. There's no question that the Seminoles' outstanding character in the most difficult of times stems directly from their head coach. When Martin transferred to FSU from Wingate Junior College in 1965 to play centerfield for the Seminoles, it was the beginning of a love affair that has never ended. His love for the game of baseball is matched only by the success he has had teaching it to aspiring players. He teaches the game with a fire and drive that has given Florida State perhaps the nation's very best all-around college baseball program.

From the new facilities to the coaching staff to the unequalled community support, Martin has improved an already strong Seminole baseball tradition with every season. Just when it seems that the program can reach no higher plane, something bigger and better comes along. When Martin took over in 1980, it was taboo to mention the word Omaha around the ball club. No one wanted to jinx an FSU team that had made it to the College World Series only three times in the previous 16 seasons. After taking the Seminoles to that hallowed ground in his very first season, Martin would eventually make Omaha not only a household word, but a second home to the Seminoles. Martin has led the Tribe to the CWS 13 times in his career.

Martin won 50 or more games his first 12 seasons at the helm, interrupted by 49 and 46-win seasons in 1992 and 1993. He has added 11 more 50-win seasons since to bring the total to 23, including a 60-win season in 2002 that tied the ACC single-season victory record. The numbers Martin and his FSU teams have posted are monumental.

Martin's succeeding of Dick Howser as FSU head coach seemed a perfectly logical step in 1979. As a player in 1965-66, Martin hit .354 in two seasons as the starting centerfielder for the Seminoles. He was a part of the 1965 College World Series team and earned All-District honors in his senior season. Martin then went on to play professionally in the New York Mets and Detroit Tigers organizations for three years prior to embarking on his career as a coach.

Martin began his career as a baseball and basketball coach at the junior high level. He served as head basketball coach at Tallahassee Community College before spending four seasons as basketball coach at Tallahassee's Godby High.

When Woody Woodward became FSU head baseball coach in 1975, he quickly called on Martin to assist him. He served as the No. 1 assistant under Woodward for four years and one under Dick Howser. When former New York Yankees boss George Steinbrenner called Howser in November of 1979, Martin was the obvious replacement. Since that day in 1979, there has been no doubt that Mike Martin and Seminole baseball has been a perfect match.

For Martin, it was a dream come true. He would be the first to tell you his current position is his ultimate thrill. Martin has won more games than all of Florida State's former head baseball coaches combined. Seminole baseball teams have participated in the NCAA

Tournament every year under Martin. That run, on the heels of appearances in 1978 and 1979, gives FSU 32 consecutive tournament trips, the second longest streak in the country. Martin has been involved in 15 of the 19 College World Series trips that Florida State has made all-time, as a player, assistant coach and head coach.

Martin says his years around FSU coaches like Fred Hatfield, whom he played for in 1965-66, Woodward and Howser (both of whom he coached under) instilled in him the desire to produce winners on and off the playing field. Stepping out of their shadows, Martin has built his own legacy in Tallahassee.

During his tenure, an incredible 157 players have been selected in the MLB Draft. In 2008, Martin coached his seventh consensus first team All-American in Buster Posey who was also the sixth National Player of the Year coached by the FSU legend. Posey is the most recent in a long line of award winners developed by Martin. The junior catcher won every major Player of the Year award in 2008 including the Golden Spikes Award, Dick Howser Trophy, Brooks Wallace Award and the Johnny Bench Award, given to the top collegiate catcher in the nation. In 2007, Tony Thomas, Jr., was a consensus All-American and Collegiate Baseball's Player of the Year. Second baseman Marshall McDougall was a consensus All-American, a finalist for the Golden Spikes and Dick Howser Awards, and the ACC Player of the Year after winning the conference's triple crown in 1999. Centerfielder J.D. Drew took home consensus All-American honors in 1997, as well as player of the year awards from Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball. Drew also became the first Seminole to win the Dick Howser Award, named after FSU's former All-American and head coach. Four of Martin's Seminoles (Mike Fuentes, Mike Loynd, Drew and Posey) have won the Golden Spikes Award, honoring the nation's best amateur baseball player. No school has produced more Golden Spikes Award winners than Florida State.

Martin does not just produce winning teams, All-Americans and major league prospects, he believes in developing a true student-athlete. The most important thing about Mike Martin's teams is that they have won with class, a direct reflection of the man who leads Seminole baseball. In six seasons of presenting the ACC Sportsmanship Award, Martin's Seminoles have won it twice. His team has been in the top three in the ACC for overall GPA and a league-high seven Seminoles were named to the All-ACC Academic Team in 2007 posting a GPA of at least a 3.0. FSU followed a season later placing a league-best six student-athletes on the 2008 ACC Academic Team. Since the inception of the academic team in 2006, a total of 21 Seminole student-athletes have been honored. In 2008, Buster Posey was honored as the CoSIDA Academic Player of the Year and ACC Baseball Scholar Athlete of the Year. He became just the seventh Seminole baseball



player to earn Academic All-America honors and fourth under Martin. In two of the last three academic years, the Seminole baseball team has been honored with the Golden Torch Award (2007 & 2008) for the highest overall GPA of any other men's team at FSU.

A popular speaker, Martin has delivered keynote addresses at several state and national meetings, including gatherings of the Florida High School Coaches Association, Atlanta Braves instructional clinics and Seminole booster clubs throughout the Southeast. He is also in demand as a speaker at churches and is active in national and local Fellowship of Christian Athletes activities.

Martin's success on and off the field have led to the coach being honored by his two former schools in 2004. The legendary FSU baseball coach was named a Distinguished Alumnus at Wingate University where he went to school for two years before coming to Florida State and earning his degree in 1966. Florida State also bestowed an honor on the coach when he was named a recipient of the Bernard F. Sliger Award for Service. The Sliger Award, named for the eleventh president of the University, is the single highest honor accorded by the Alumni Association. It recognizes a member of the University community who has, through their efforts, made a major contribution toward the fulfillment of the mission of the University.

A 1966 graduate of Florida State, Martin earned his master's degree in 1971. He and wife Carol have three children, Mary Beth, Melanie and Mike, Jr., a former starting catcher and current assistant coach at Florida State. Mary Beth and husband Tom Buchanan are the parents of Martin's first grandchild Hannah Elizabeth (11). Mike, Jr. and his wife Litzie are the parents of Martin's second and third grandchildren Tyler (8) and T.J. (6).

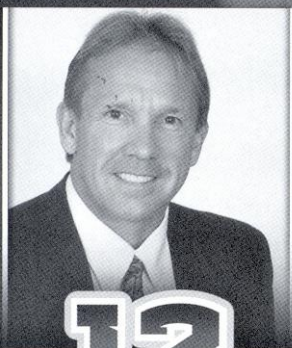

JAMEY SHOUPPE

Jamey Shouppe embarks on his 20th season as a member of the Florida State coaching staff and his eighth year as associate head coach. Shouppe continues to serve as one of the nation's premier recruiting coordinators and pitching coaches as his success has been proven year after year with top-ranked recruiting classes and staff ERA's consistently among the nation's best.

Shouppe has been the catalyst in attracting top caliber talent to Florida State since taking over as the recruiting coordinator in 1990. The former FSU player has had a top 25 ranked class every year he has been at FSU and 13 of his 19 classes have been ranked in the top 10 with six of those classes ranked in the top

five. Baseball America ranked his 1992 class No. 1 in the country. More recently, the 2002 group headlined by Eddy Martinez-Estevé and Mark Sauls garnered a No. 4 national ranking, while the 2008 squad which included fifth round draft pick John Gast and University of Tennessee transfer Tony Delmonico, was ranked second by Collegiate Baseball. Shouppe followed with a second straight top 10 recruiting class in 2009 as that class received a national ranking of No. 8 courtesy of Collegiate Baseball.

Shouppe's eye for talent is evidenced by the awards won by his recruits. Since taking over the role as FSU's recruiting coordinator, Seminole players have been named first team All-Americans on 23 occasions and garnered All-America honors 149 times.

In 1992, the former Seminole hurler added the role of pitching coach to his duties with equal success. Under Shouppe's tutelage, the Florida State pitching staff has been among the nation's best. FSU's ERA has been ranked among the top four in the country in three of the last 10 years in the final NCAA statistics. The Seminoles have also won the ACC's team ERA title 10 times in the last 18 seasons, which is second behind only North Carolina, who has led the league in pitching 11 times. All this despite the fact FSU has been in the conference for just 18 seasons. The Tar Heels won their first ACC pitching title almost 40 years before Florida State ever joined the ACC.

Florida State finished the 2008 season with a pair of pitchers who tallied double-digit victories in Matt Fairesl (12-2) and Ryan Strauss (10-1). It marked the second consecutive season that at least two Seminole pitchers won at least 10 games in a season and the 10th time since 1993, all under the tutelage of Shouppe, that at least two Seminole pitchers have reached the 10-win plateau. In 2007, Bryan Henry, Michael Hyde and Ryan Strauss all amassed 10-wins. Henry led the way with 14 victories including an undefeated regular season en route to earning ACC Pitcher of the Year accolades. The last time FSU had three pitchers with 10 or more wins was in 2003 when Matt Lynch (13), Trent Peterson (10) and Daniel Davidson (10) all posted 10 wins or more. Since 1992, FSU has had a trio of pitchers with 10 or more wins five times.

This past year Sean Gilmartin emerged as the leader of the Seminole pitching staff assuming the role as the Friday night starter just three weeks into the season. The freshman embraced the challenge as he led the team with 12 wins, 83 strikeouts and an ERA of 3.49. For his efforts, Gilmartin earned first team All-ACC honors and was named Freshman Pitcher of the Year by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association.

Gilmartin became the second Seminole in school history to be recognized as a national Rookie of the Year joining Blair Varnes who received the honor from Collegiate Baseball in 1999. Both awards came with Shouppe as the pitching coach at FSU.

The longtime coach has also shown he can develop Major League caliber pitchers. Seventeen of Shouppe's pitchers have been selected in the MLB Draft in the last six seasons and 56 Seminole pitchers have been selected in the MLB Draft since Shouppe became the team's pitching coach.

A former Seminole pitcher, Shouppe played for Mike Martin in 1981-82. The southpaw compiled a 10-4 record in two seasons with the Seminoles. During his career, Shouppe took the mound in 60 games and posted a 3.78 ERA. He fanned a total of 122 batters in 126 innings of work and was named to the Metro Conference All-Tournament team his senior year.

A native of Chattahoochee, Fla., Shouppe came to FSU via George Wallace Junior College in Dothan, Ala. At Wallace, he earned All-Conference, All-State and All-Region honors in each of his two seasons while playing in the outfield and pitching.

The Houston Astros drafted Shouppe in the eighth round following his senior season at FSU. The left-hander played three years in the Astros organization at the single-A and double-A levels and was invited to Major League camp in 1984, before retiring from baseball in 1985. Shouppe received his bachelor's degree in physical education from FSU and a master's degree from Nova University in Fort Lauderdale. He held various coaching and teaching positions in Florida before returning to FSU in 1990.

Shouppe taught classes in the physical education department before giving up that responsibility prior to the 2000 season. He has worked as director of the Mike Martin Baseball School, 6-10 age division, for the past 23 years.

Shouppe and his wife, former FSU cheerleader Karen Hall, have three children 22-year-old son Jake, 18-year-old daughter Kasey and 16-year-old son Jared.

Now in his 13th season as an assistant coach, Mike Martin Jr. continues to carve out his own identity as one of the college game's top young coaches. A former Seminole All-American, Martin Jr. serves as the squad's third base coach and continues to work with Florida State's hitters and catchers while continuing to assist Associate Head Coach Jamey Shoupe in the recruiting process. Under his direction the Seminoles have batted .317, slugged .500 and are averaging 8.31 runs per game. On top of the impressive offensive statistics, FSU baseball has played in four College World Series, nine Super Regionals, 12 consecutive NCAA Tournaments and won over 75 percent of its games with Martin, Jr. on staff. As the academic liaison, the Seminoles captured the Golden Torch Award in 2007 and 2008 posting the highest GPA among all men's teams at Florida State.

Martin Jr. has coached 10 Major Leaguers, 10 Freshman All-Americans, 13 first team All-Americans and 24 student-athletes who either earned first, second or third team All-American accolades, 44 All-ACC selections and have seen 36 hitters drafted in his tenure at Florida State. He has also coached three National Players of the Year in the last five years.

Martin Jr.'s biggest influence has come through his work with the FSU offense. He has served as FSU's hitting coach over the last 12 years and since then 10 of FSU's teams have batted .300 or better. Of the top 11 hitting teams of all-time at FSU, six have come since Martin became the squad's hitting coach.

In 2007 and then again in 2008, Florida State set the school record for the highest team batting average in school history. In 2007, the Seminoles hit .350 in 62 games shattering the previous record of .337 set in 63 games back in 1980. FSU's .350 average ranked second nationally while setting the ACC record breaking the previous mark of .347 set in 2001 by Georgia Tech. But the record would stand for just one season as the 2008 squad crushed both the FSU and ACC record for batting average in a single-season by hitting .355 over a 68-game schedule en route to a trip to the College World Series. The mark would also stand as the highest team batting average in the nation.

FSU collected 869 hits during the 2008 season good for second all-time, while the 12.8 hits per game were the highest per game average in school history. As a team, the Garnet and Gold belted 103 home runs, the most since hitting 111 in 1999, while posting the second highest slugging percentage in school history at .565. The Seminoles also scored 663 runs, recorded 603 RBI and notched 45 sacrifice flies, all marks that rank in the top three all-time at Florida State. On top of the impressive offensive numbers, the Seminoles showed great patience at the plate in 2008 drawing a nation leading 435 walks. The Seminoles were also the only team in the nation to not finish with more strikeouts than walks. In 2007, FSU struck out just 330 times in over 2,200 official at-bats. It was the fewest strikeouts recorded in a season since 1983 (320). Overall, the Garnet and Gold finished the 2008 season as the national leader in hits, runs and walks, while ranking in the top 5 in doubles (2nd), sacrifice flies (2nd), scoring (3rd), slugging percentage (3rd) and home runs (5th).

The 2009 season concluded with the Seminoles hitting over the 320 mark for the third consecutive season as Florida State finished the year second in the ACC with a .321 team batting average. The Seminoles went on to lead the league in on-base percentage, runs, RBI, doubles, total bases, walks and sacrifice flies. When compared with other teams across the nation, FSU ranked in the top 10 in seven offensive categories leading the NCAA with 46 sacrifice flies while ranking second in walks and doubles. Over the last three years, the Seminoles have hit 498 doubles in 193 games good for more than 3.5 doubles per game.

Even more impressive is what the Seminoles have done at the most important time of the year. Since Martin Jr. took over as the Seminoles' hitting coach, Florida State has hit over the .320 mark in postseason play. FSU team's under Martin Jr. are averaging 9.18 runs per game in the postseason, which is just slightly above the team's average for all games despite playing the toughest competition of the year in those tournaments.

Martin Jr.'s philosophy combines an offensive approach that takes discipline and the utilization of the entire field to another level producing impressive results. FSU's hitters are taught an offensive approach that utilizes the entire field. Martin Jr. has also implemented the use of wood bats in practice since taking over as hitting coach.

In 2007, the Seminoles were in search of an everyday catcher and Martin Jr. convinced his father to take a look at Buster Posey from behind the plate despite just a season removed from being named a Freshman All-American at shortstop. The experiment paid off as Posey was named a two-time All-American at catcher. A year after becoming the youngest finalist for the Johnny Bench Award, presented to the nation's top collegiate catcher, Posey captured the Bench Award as a junior in 2008. The Leesburg, Ga., native also was awarded the 2008 Rawlings Gold Glove Award for his outstanding play from behind the plate. Posey posted a .989 career fielding percentage as a catcher, registered 12 pickoffs and held opposing runners at bay throwing out 40.8 percent of attempted base stealers.

Offensively, Martin Jr. helped Shane Robinson and Tony Thomas, Jr. with one of the biggest turn-arounds in their collegiate career. In 2005, Robinson put together a school-record 40-game hit streak en route to posting a .427 batting average. He became the only FSU player to ever record more than 100 hits and 40 stolen bases in one season. Two years later, Thomas hit a career-high .430 while leading the nation in doubles per game (0.53). He became the first Seminole in FSU history to record 30 doubles, 100 hits and 30 stolen bases in a single-season. Both players were named Collegiate Baseball's National Player of the Year and were honored as consensus first team All-Americans. Martin Jr. helped Robinson raise his average 147 points, while guiding Thomas to an average of 165 points above his career mark. In 2008, Posey set a FSU single-season record as he hit .463. Posey would go on to finish the year as the national leader in six offensive categories, while becoming just the fourth student-athlete in ACC history to win the Triple Crown. With Martin, Jr., leading the charge as the Seminole hitting coach, FSU has received national players of the year in three of the last five years from Collegiate Baseball, a feat not matched by any other program in the history of the publication.

As a player, Martin Jr. was the Seminoles' starting catcher from 1993-95 and earned NCAA All-Tournament Team honors in each of his three years at Florida State. He was the Most Valuable Player of the NCAA Atlantic II Regional in 1994 as he led the Seminoles to the College World Series and garnered second team NCBWA All-America honors. He was selected to the 1995 NCAA Atlantic I Regional All-Tournament Team as the Seminoles returned to Omaha for the second straight year. In 1993, Martin Jr. was a member of Team USA.

Martin Jr. was selected by the San Diego Padres in the ninth round of the 1995 MLB Draft following his senior season. After playing for the Padres' organization for two years, he signed with the Seattle Mariners as a free agent in 1996 before retiring from professional baseball in 1997.

In 1992, Martin Jr. was an All-Conference selection at Manatee Community College in his only year of junior college. The Tallahassee native attended Maclay High School where his #10 jersey is retired. He captained the 1991 team that won the state championship his senior season. He was drafted as a shortstop out of high school by the Seattle Mariners in the 31st round.

Along with his coaching duties, the 1995 Florida State graduate speaks to booster clubs as well as high school and college coaching clinics on a regular basis. On November 27, 1999, Martin Jr. married the former Litzie Andrade. They have two sons Tyler (8) and T.J. (6). Martin Jr. also has the honor of coming to work everyday with his Hall of Fame father and FSU Head Baseball Coach Mike Martin.

CHIP BAKER

26th Season, High Point '80



The senior member of Mike Martin's staff and a Seminole 'fan favorite,' Chip Baker enters his 26th season at Florida State. After 18 years as an assistant coach, Baker has served as the Director of Baseball Administration and Facilities for the last eight years. As he has done for two decades, he will fill many roles for the program.

Baker oversees all aspects of Seminole baseball in his administrative role, including the budget, team travel, game operations, equipment, field and facility maintenance and scheduling. Baker also assists the efforts of the marketing and ticket offices in development of new group and season ticket sale plans. He served as the facilities liaison during stadium construction and will continue to hold that role with any new baseball projects in the future. In addition, Baker communicates with the Bullpen Club and Seminole Boosters on a regular basis. During his tenure at Florida State, Baker has participated in 24 NCAA postseason tournaments and 12 College World Series. He coached two teams that played in the National Championship game (1986 & 1999). As an assistant, Baker coached third base and worked with FSU's catchers. He was also responsible for scouting opposing teams and directing the Seminoles defensively.

A former assistant at Virginia Tech and Georgia Tech, Baker is known as one of college baseball's premier catching instructors. During his tenure, Baker coached seven All-Americans, including Ed Fulton, Barry Blackwell, major-leaguer Marc Ronan and first-team All-American Pedro Grifol. Most recently, Tony Richie was a two-time All-American, current FSU assistant coach Mike Martin, Jr., and 1998 All-American Jeremy Salazar was drafted by the Philadelphia Phillies.

Each summer, Baker is the director of the Mike Martin and Seminole Advanced Baseball Schools. These camps have not only proved to be popular, but beneficial. Over 100 former campers have gone on to wear the Garnet and Gold and several have advanced to the major leagues. Past camps have produced 27 first round draft picks including Buster Posey, John-Ford Griffin, Nick Stocks, Jonathan Johnson, J.D. Drew, Chipper Jones, Alex Rodriguez and Justin and B.J. Upton. The nationally known Super Skills Academy has quickly become one of the nation's top summer camps. Baker is a popular speaker and addresses Seminole Booster clubs and civic organizations around the state. He has also been on the staff of national and regional baseball clinics. Baker works closely with Tallahassee area youth organizations and has put together clinics for the Tallahassee Babe Ruth League and other youth leagues.



The 52-year-old native of North Carolina has written articles for Scholastic Coach and Collegiate Baseball magazines on the subjects of catching, third base coaching and bunting, and has published a Collegiate Level Strength & Speed book. Six years ago, Baker put together a record selling catching video with Championship Videos entitled, 'Expanding the Strike Zone.'

A 1980 graduate of High Point University in North Carolina, Baker was part of four Carolina Conference championship teams. He was a member of the High Point team that finished second at the 1979 NAIA World Series.

After completing his bachelor's degree in physical education, Baker earned a Master of Science degree in motor behavior at Virginia Tech, where he began his collegiate coaching career.

Baker is married to the former Julie Larsen, a record-holding pitcher on FSU's 1985-88 softball teams who was inducted into the Florida State Hall of Fame in 1995. The two were married in 1991 in a most memorable ceremony conducted between a doubleheader at Dick Howser Stadium. The Bakers are the proud parents of a 14 year-old daughter, Katie Nicole, who is a regular at FSU home games and has traveled to the College World Series four times. Baker's older brother, Jim, is the head basketball coach at Catawba College.

Upon FSU's return from a trip to Stanford in 2001, Baker and head coach Mike Martin were presented with the university's prestigious Westcott Award for their bravery in saving the lives of players and staff. Leaving the San Francisco airport, the two coaches gained control of the team's charter bus after the driver suffered a fatal heart attack and safely guided the bus to the side of a busy highway.

Brian Hoop enters his second season at Florida State University as the Seminole volunteer assistant coach. Hoop's primary responsibility will continue to focus on the development of the outfielders while serving as the first base coach for the Seminoles.

In his first year at Florida State, Hoop received solid defensive play from the outfield group led by Rawlings/ABCA Gold Glove award winner Tyler Holt in centerfield. The Seminole outfield finished the season posting a .964 fielding percentage while contributing with 13 assists. Mike McGee and D'Vontrey Richardson led all outfielders with four assists apiece and Ruairi O'Connor got the Seminoles out of a bases loaded jam against Virginia Tech back on May 3 as he recorded the first out on a fly ball to right on what would be the first triple play recorded at FSU since 1997. Seven of the 13 outfield assists came on plays at the plate with three of those recorded by Richardson in right field. Ohmed Danesh finished the year perfect in the outfield converting on all 77 fielding opportunities. As a unit, the outfielders combined to hit .336 in 63 games with 25 home runs, 130 RBI and 54 stolen bases.

Hoop came to FSU from Indiana State University where he served as recruiting coordinator and hitting and catching coach for two seasons. He also assisted with base running and defensive instruction during his time with the Sycamore baseball team. At Indiana State, Hoop was a major reason for the team's hitting success as the Sycamores raised their teaming batting average in each of his two seasons. With Hoop on staff, Indiana State also saw a 40 percent increase in on-base percentage, while the team's fielding percentage improved by 20 points. Hoop helped mentor Chris Schmidt, a two time MVC All-Conference player, who led the team in most offensive categories including average (.374) and stolen bases (20), and Ryan Strausborger, a preseason All-Conference pick and a first team honoree at second base during his sophomore year. In 2007, Indiana State posted a team fielding percentage of .987. Hoop's real impact at ISU was in recruiting as his first class featured 22 players covering five states including two former Major League draft picks. His second recruiting class included 15 players, three of which were drafted by professional organizations.

Prior to arriving in Terre Haute, Ind., Hoop spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Charleston Southern University in Charleston, S.C. While at CSU, Hoop help rebuild a struggling Buccaneer program as his first recruiting class featured 28 newcomers. In two years, Hoop guided four players to all-conference accolades, while three players were honored with all-conference academic awards. Hoop's responsibilities at CSU included coordinating all aspects of recruiting, working directly with the catchers as well as assisting with the hitters. He also served as the field maintenance supervisor, assisting in all youth camps and assisting head coach Jason Murray with all travel arrangements.

Hoop arrived at Charleston Southern in December of 2004 after spending a year and a half as an assistant at Porterville College in California. At Porterville, Hoop served as the recruiting coordinator taking on three players who were selected in the Major League Baseball Draft and four student-athletes that went on to sign with Division I schools during the fall signing period. He worked directly with the catchers, infielders and hitters. Hoop also integrated the defensive systems and team conditioning programs at Porterville College, while assisting with all aspects of fund raising for the baseball program.

During his time as an assistant coach, Hoop has coached nine players that have gone on to play professional baseball.

In 2005, Hoop served as manager of the Kelowna Falcons, a collegiate team in the West Coast Collegiate Baseball League, and head coach of the Langley Blaze in 2004, a summer league team in the Pacific International League. In the summer of 2003, Hoop was manager and head coach of the Central Cal Select Baseball club which won the West Coast National Championship in Reno, Nevada. Hoop's success did not stop there as his 2002 Triple Play baseball club team from Seattle, Wash., went on to win the USABA World Series in Carson City, Nevada, while placing fourth at the USABA World Series in 2001.

Hoop lettered as a catcher for Marshalltown Community College, in his hometown of Marshalltown Iowa, where he led the team in batting average, hits and RBI. He was a student assistant at Iowa State University in the fall of 2000.

In December of 2004, Hoop graduated from Fresno State University with a master's degree in kinesiology. He earned his bachelor's degree at Missouri Valley College in Marshall, Mo.

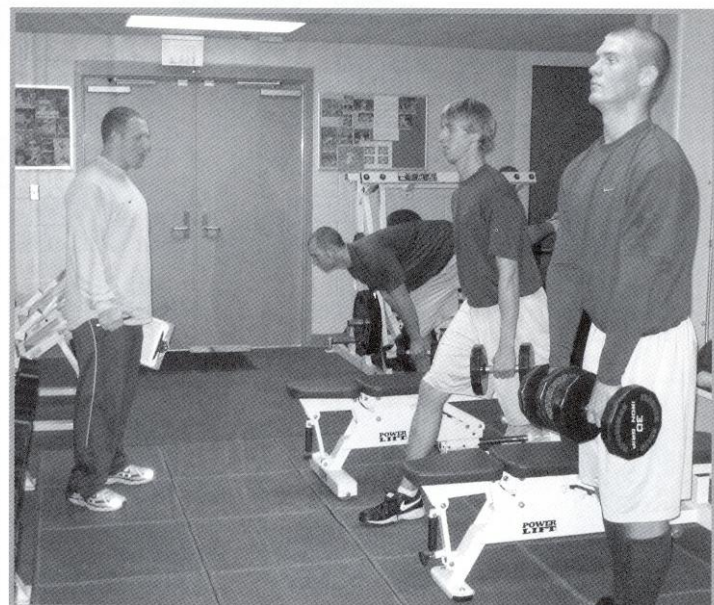
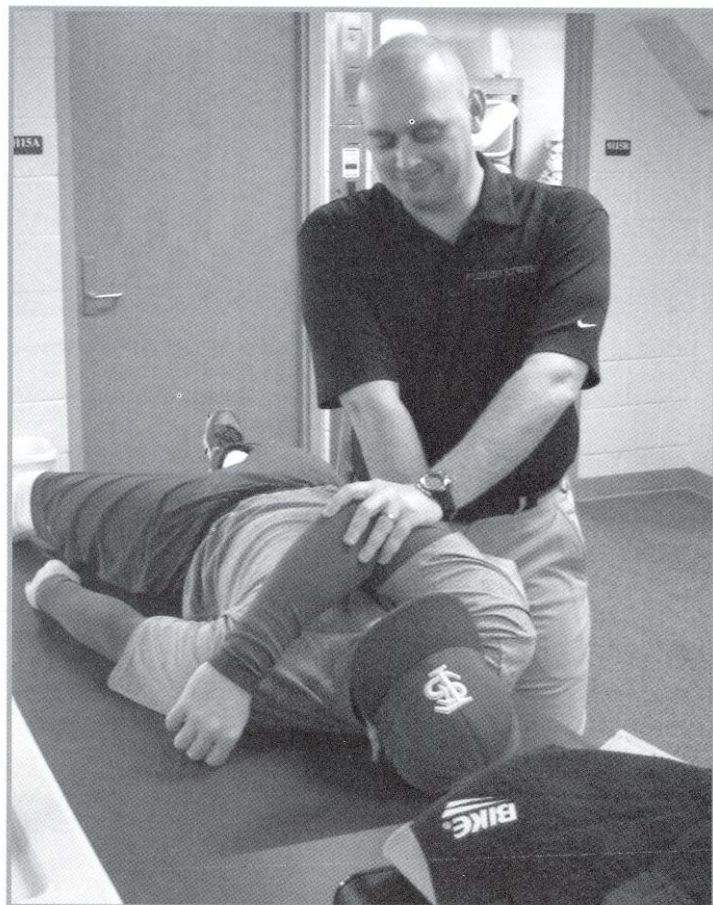

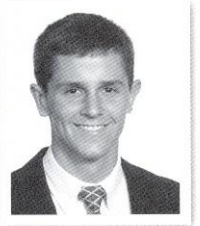
