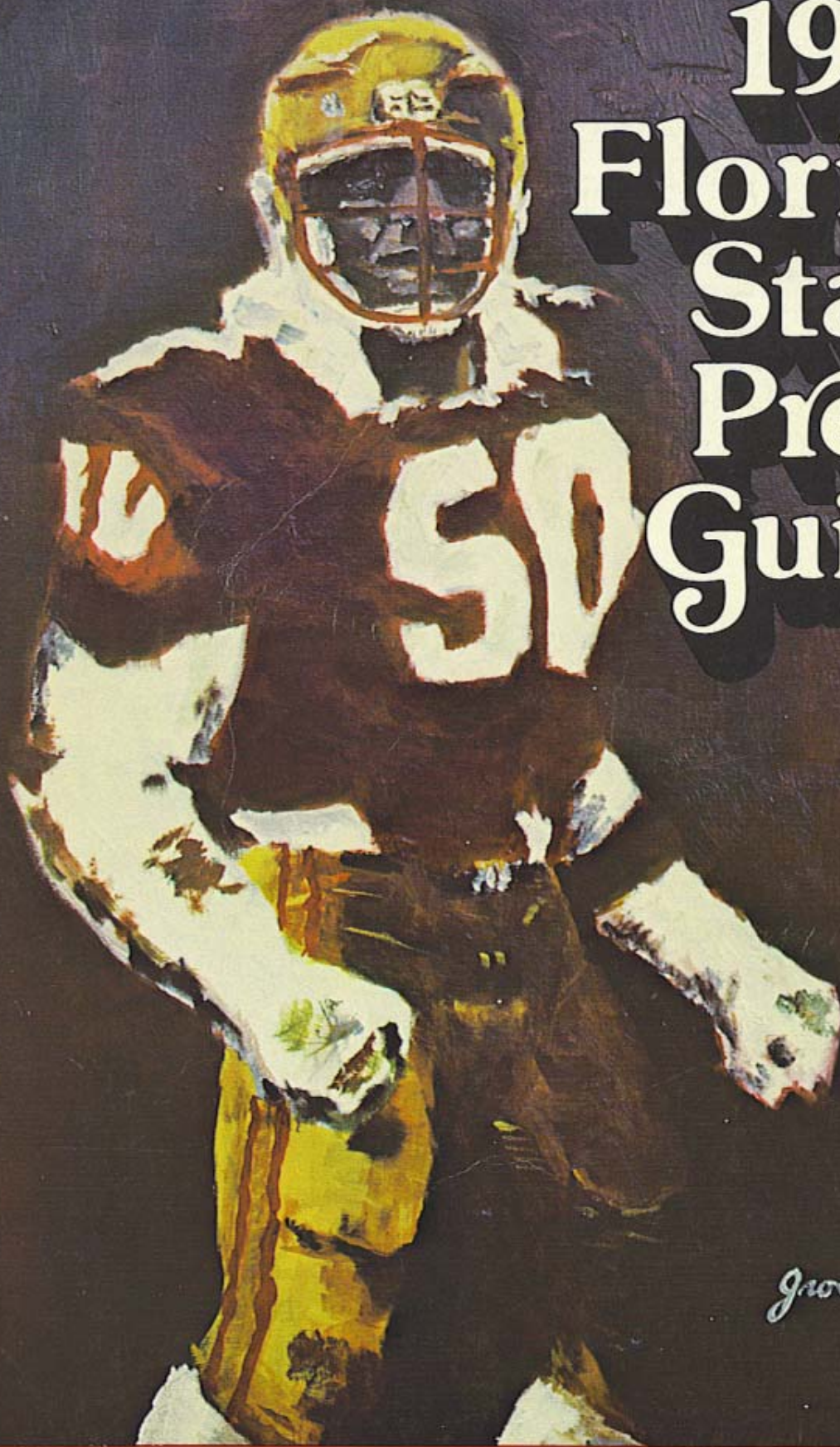

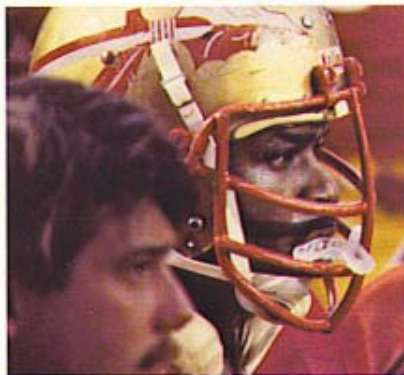


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Media Information

Florida State University's 1980 football press guide has been designed for use by the media and Seminole fans. Any questions not covered in this brochure can be addressed to the FSU Sports Information Office.

Additional information, such as feature material and photos, will be made available to any accredited member of the media upon request.

All requests for working press, radio, television, photographer, or scouting credentials should be made to Florida State Sports Information Director Mark Carlson at least one week prior to the game.

CREDENTIALS: Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office. All requests for working credentials should be directed to this office in writing at least one week prior to the game. Florida State's press box is located on the west side of Doak Campbell Stadium with elevator service to all three levels. Media representatives and scouts should enter through the Press Gate, located north of the elevator.

POLICIES: Working press will be admitted to the press deck, where approximately 90 seats are available. Credentials are issued by FSU according to the following criteria:

A.) Local newspapers, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponent's area and student newspapers from FSU and opponent's school.

B.) Other daily newspapers with preference to those which regularly cover FSU.

C.) Scouts.

D.) Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those which have regularly covered FSU.

E.) Radio and television personnel not actually broadcasting, but considered reporting (seats will be provided in the stands).

RADIO-TV: The first level of the press box is designated for use by radio and television broadcasting crews, home and visiting coaches and stadium operations. Each booth is fully enclosed and sound-proof.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Only accredited photographers will be issued credentials. The photo deck, or roof, of the press box offers an unobstructed view for TV, movie and still cameras. Dark room space is also available in the stadium. Photographers will be allowed on the sidelines only after checking in at the press box and obtaining a special field photo pass.

SERVICES: Play-by-play, halftime and complete statistics will be provided. When possible post game comments from the coaches and players will be available. Refreshments are available on all decks.

TELECOPIERS: An independent telecopier service will be available for each game with a nominal fee being charged. Please contact the sports information office in advance. If you plan to use your own telecopier and phone, please have them placed in the telecopier area of the press deck.

TELEPHONE: Telephone service should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Florida, Tallahassee (904/222-2236). Have them contact the sports information office for location.

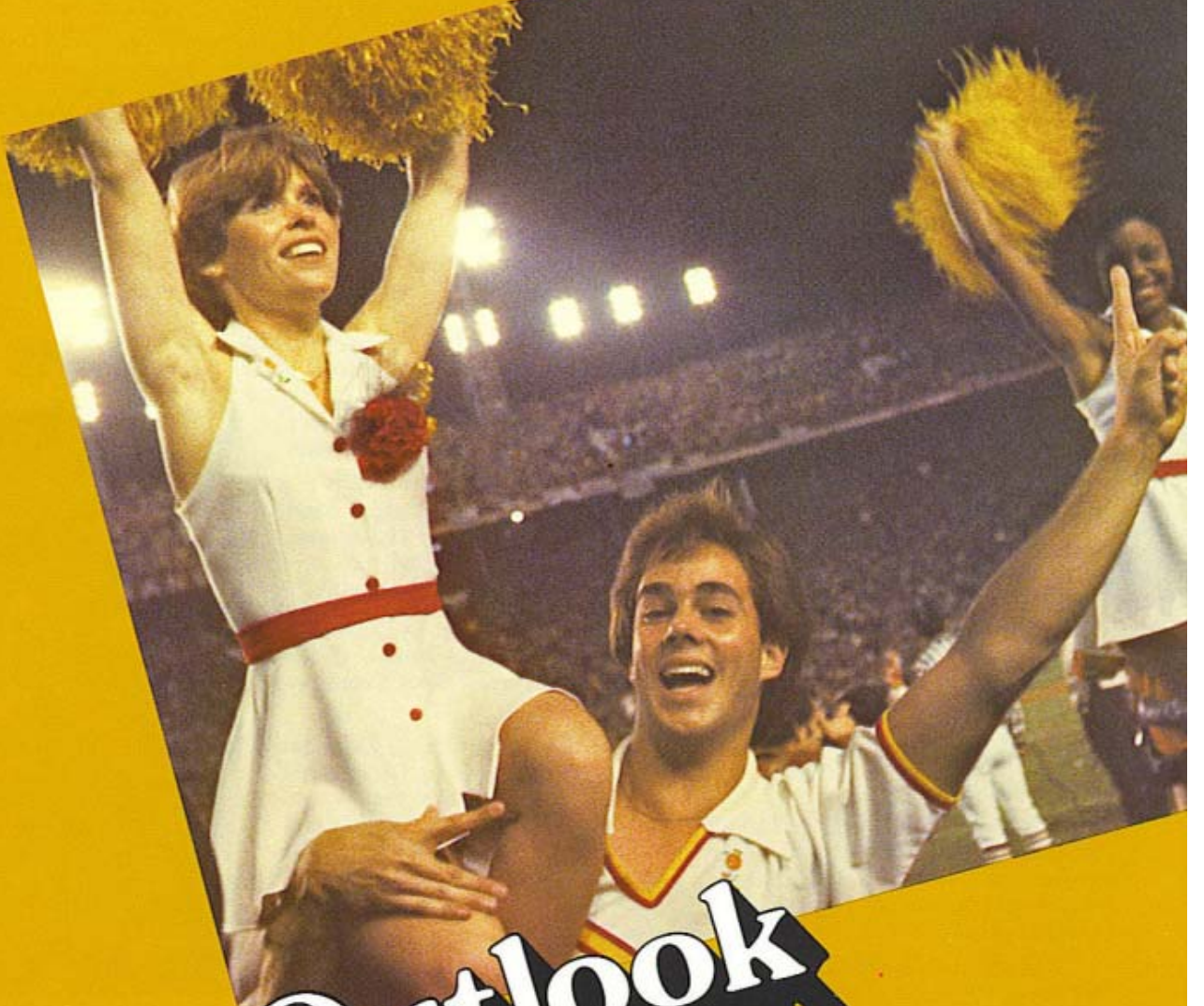

Great Expectations...

. . .but it's a tough act to follow

Simply stated—1979 was Florida State's best football year ever. Never before have the Seminoles . . .

- (1) finished a regular season major college schedule undefeated;
- (2) been invited to participate in a New Year's Day Bowl;
- (3) advanced as high as fourth in the nation's wire service polls;
- (4) finished a season (regular and post) ranked as high as sixth (Associated Press).

Thus, the Tribe begins the 1980 campaign with the hopes of their fans higher than ever before. Ordinarily that would bother the head football coach, but not FSU's Bobby Bowden.

"Our expectations will be higher after last year's record," says Bowden. "There will be more pressure, but that's the way it's gotta be. That's the way I want it.

"The pressure is obvious because people always expect more when

you're successful. But that's okay. It's like growing old—it ain't so bad when you consider the other alternative.

"If you win, you're going to have pressure. And if you don't have pressure, you don't have a job."

Everyone knows now that the Seminoles fell 24-7 to Oklahoma in the New Year's Eve Orange Bowl outing. But, Bowden doesn't consider that all bad either.

"The trip to the Orange Bowl far outweighed the loss to Oklahoma," Bowden says. "You just don't go to the Orange Bowl for the first time and act like an Orange Bowler. We had to learn what life was like—what we could do and what we couldn't do."

Yet, the undefeated season, national rankings and Orange Bowl appearance will mean nothing when the Tribe visits LSU on September 6 and then plays the other 10 opponents on the '80 menu.

What's ahead for Bowden's fifth Seminole edition at FSU?



Obviously there is a void at quarterback where the tandem of Jimmy Jordan and Wally Woodham have completed their collegiate ability. Four other offensive starters have also departed. And, on defense three starters have played their final collegiate game.

Jordan and Woodham are the main losses. They were household names in Florida the last three years guiding the Tribe to a 29-6 record. They were best known for their passing which baffled opposition defenses.

So, what sort of offense will the Tribe have this fall since the two-armed quarterback has departed? Who will be the quarterback?

"We will be running the ball a little bit more, but we will still drop back and throw as we have in the past."



"Contrary to what a lot of people think, our offense will be basically the same as last year," Bowden says. "We will add another dimension to it, but that's because we will be able to get more movement out of our quarterback."

Who, will be the field general?

Unless there is a major surprise in the first three weeks of fall practice the starting assignment will fall to junior Rick Stockstill, who has been waiting in the wings for three years. Bowden announced last November Stockstill would be his No. 1 quarterback at the start of spring practice and it would be up to the other QB candidates to beat him out.

Nobody did.

There will be other changes in the lineup, too. Two key position changes were initiated in the spring. Sam Platt, a wide receiver for three seasons, has

been moved to tailback and Mike Whiting, a starter in the last six games of '79 at tailback, has been moved to fullback to replace the departed Mark Lyles. Another switch comes in the offensive line where Greg Futch has been moved from tight guard to split guard. A host of players are battling for Futch's vacated slot.


Defensively the Tribe will sport some familiar faces. Only three of last year's starters—end Scott Warren, tackle(s) Jeremy Mindlin and Walter Carter and cornerback Ivory Joe Hunter—have departed. That leaves eight starters returning and a host of players who received experience last season in backup roles.

Most prominent of those defensive returnees is noseguard Ron Simmons, the most honored player in the history of FSU football. He was named to five of the six major All-American

teams last winter, finished ninth in the Heisman Trophy voting and was a semifinalist for the Lombardi Award.

Thus there are plenty of signs the Seminoles could be again headed to another fine season. A major stumbling block, however, is going to be an improved schedule that finds Nebraska and Pittsburgh as new faces.

But, Bowden seems to be enjoying the challenge of tackling the improved menu that does have the advantage of seven home games in expanded (51,094) Doak Campbell Stadium.

"The improved schedule is exciting and it doesn't scare me a bit," says Bowden, who begins the season with a 34-12 FSU ledger. "You've got to play these kind of people to get the ranking we want. If we have the same kind of year this year as we did last, there's no way we can be denied a high ranking."

The Offense . . .

WIDE RECEIVERS—This is an area where the Seminoles are rich with talent. The starters will come from a group of four, but it really won't matter who starts because everyone will play. Heading the group is sophomore Hardis Johnson, who last season caught 14 for 253 yards and three touchdowns. His 18.0 yards per catch was best on the club. Also catching 14 last year was Academic All-American Phil Williams. He picked up 211 yards, but is still looking for his first college TD. If he is healthy, Kurt Unglaub can be the best. Since a freshman season when he caught 33 passes, Unglaub's performances have been hampered by injuries. He caught just nine balls as a sophomore and 15 as a junior. He was scheduled to be a senior last fall but suffered a broken foot in pre-season and played just one game—catching two passes—before receiving a medical red shirt. Still to be heard from is sophomore Dennis McKinnon, who many consider the most dangerous of the four. He caught three passes last season while playing with the varsity, but showed in junior varsity competition that he could be the most exciting player for the Tribe since Larry Key with some spectacular catches and sparkling kick returns.

TIGHT ENDS—Graduated is the veteran Grady King, who was the team's third leading receiver last fall with 23 catches for 246 yards and two scores. The job now falls to Tallahassee junior Sam Childers, another product of Leon High School. Childers shared the starting job much of last season with King, but caught just six for 23 yards. Two of the catches went for scores, however. Childers is considered an outstanding blocker. His backup help now is scheduled to come from sophomore Zeke Mowatt, who caught one last fall for 10 yards. Mowatt was shuffled between offense and defense much of last season but now apparently has found a home.

INTERIOR LINE—One starter—guard Mike Good—is missing from the group that started in the Orange Bowl. That means center John Madden, guard Greg Futch and tackles Ken Lanier and Tom Brannon are back. Thus the fact that this group boasts tremendous experience must be considered a plus. Madden was the starter in the final five regular season games, replacing Gil Wesley, who went down with a knee injury against Mississippi State. The first start of Madden's career came against LSU in a regional television game that covered 85 percent of the country. Futch is one of the real success stories on the Seminole roster. He came here as a walk-on and last year started every game. Last year he played the guard slot on the tight end side of the ball, but this year he will move to the guard slot on the split end side. Lanier is considered one of the finest linemen to ever play for the Garnet and Gold. He has been a starter since his freshman year—the second

game. Brannon was probably the most overlooked of the interior starters last fall, picking up a starting role for the first time in his career. He was the only new face in the starting lineup at the start of the '79 season. The Good replacement will be determined in the three weeks of practice leading up to the season opener, but it's likely Lee Adams or Brent Brock will get the call.

TAILBACK—The major experiment of the spring took place here and the early results are positive. Sam Platt, a wide receiver since coming to Florida State, has been switched to the backfield and worked his way into a starting spot for fall practice. Sam, who has better-than-average speed, had four TD runs of better than 50 yards in spring scrimmages. Last season the Tribe had just one run of 50 yards. The tailback slot also has depth this fall because junior Homes Johnson, who resigned from the squad last summer has returned. As a sophomore Homes had led the team in rushing with 817 yards in 183 carries. It was the first time in FSU history a sophomore had led the team in rushing. Johnson, like Platt, also has the ability to catch the ball, grabbing 23 for 213 yards in that brilliant sophomore season.

FULLBACK—Gone is the powerful Mark Lyles, who rushed for 1,011 yards last year. His replacement is scheduled to be last year's starting tailback for the final five games, Mike Whiting, who finished the season with 537 yards and picked up another 161 with 20 receptions. Whiting is not the powerful runner that Lyles was but uses his quickness to get through the hole. Whiting's backup will be the spring's outstanding rookie, freshman Larry Harris, who had several brilliant scrimmages, including one where he scored five touchdowns—three rushes and two more on pass receptions.

QUARTERBACK—Rick Stockstill has known since last November that he would get the starting assignment for the '80 season. Stockstill completed six of seven passes for 103 yards in a fourth quarter performance vs. Memphis State last November 17 and the following day head coach Bobby Bowden announced that Rick would be his No. 1 quarterback the next year and everyone else would have to beat him out. Stockstill has been around for three years, but is a junior where eligibility is concerned. His playing time behind the center is limited, but to give Rick some game experience the Tribe coaching staff last year employed him as the holder on PATs and field goals and he was also a member of the kickoff team. Kelley Lowrey, who had a knee injury last season as a freshman, worked his way into a backup QB role during spring practice, but two other members of last season's frosh class, Blair Williams and Weegie Thompson are also in the picture.



. . . The Defense

ENDS—Arthur Scott, one of the Tribe's most unheralded players last fall, returns at one terminal, but there is a vacancy sign at the other where Scott Warren has graduated. Scott, after being shuffled between a number of positions in his first two seasons, settled in at end in '79 and did a more than capable job, finishing the season with 68 total tackles—fifth best on the team. Underclassman Brad Fojtik is slated to be Scott's backup. Two players who have both previously earned varsity letters but have never started will contest for the starting slot at the other end. Juniors Scott McLean, who will have a brother John as a freshman on the team this fall, and Jarvis Coursey, who played linebacker last season, have both done plenty of work with the speciality units in their first two years. Also expected to see plenty of playing time on both sides is transfer Mark Rodrique.

TACKLES—Mark Macek, who has a reputation for making big plays, returns on one side. Last season he had three quarterback sacks, a fumble recovery and two caused fumbles. His relief help will come from James Gilbert, who can also play noseguard. Junior Garry Futch, who has played behind Ron Simmons at noseguard, was switched here during spring drills and made a good enough impression that he will probably be the starter when the campaign begins at LSU. A pair of talented sophomores, Chris Nickrenz and Herbert Harp, will make themselves known during the season.

NOSEGUARD—All-American Ron Simmons calls this position home. Last season he won practically every All-American honor that was available, missing out only on the team picked by the Football Writers Association. Ron, despite playing much of the campaign with a broken bone in his wrist was still the team's third leading tackler with 81 hits. He was the defensive leader in big plays with six sacks, two fumble recoveries, two blocked kicks, 17 tackles for loss and two caused fumbles. When Simmons is found resting on the bench look for James Gilbert to be his replacement.

LINEBACKER—Both of last year's starters—Reggie Herring and Paul Piurowski—return. This senior duo finished as the team's leaders in tackles last season. Herring, who came to FSU as a defensive back, had 144 hits last season while Piurowski, who was coming off knee surgery the previous season, had 123. Herring, who's one of the most intense players on the squad, was a second

team Associated Press All-South Independent selection. He was selected the AP Lineman of the Week for his play against Florida. Piurowski was "Comeback Player of the Year" for the '80 campaign the way he came off the knee injury. And, he showed during the spring that he wasn't ready to have an easy senior season. His spring work was so impressive to the coaches that they named him the winner of the "Hinesman Trophy" which each year goes to the outstanding player in those drills. Keith Baker, who has seen spot starting duty, will see plenty of playing time here and others expected to make themselves known are Bryan Cobb, Ellis Singletery and Roger Brownlee.

SECONDARY—Plenty of veterans are returning. The only slot that will have a new face is at one of the cornerback positions where Ivory Joe Hunter, the only two-time captain in Seminole history, has graduated. Sophomores James Harris and Harvey Clayton will both wear first team jerseys when fall practice begins. A pair of '80 All-Americans man the safety slots. Weak safety belongs to Monk Bonasorte, who finished fourth in the nation last fall with eight interceptions, and was a third team choice on the Associated Press All-American squad. First team Academic All-American Keith Jones is at strong safety for the second consecutive year. Jones is regarded as the hardest hitter on the Tribe roster—three of his 33 tackles season resulted in an opponent fumble. Cornerback Bobby Butler is considered by many of the pro scouts to be the best athlete on the roster. Butler is a three-year starter and last season ranked right behind Bonasorte in interceptions with six. He has developed an uncanny knack for blocking punts with five in three years. Support help here is expected to come from Gary Henry, the hero of last season's 17-14 victory over Southern Mississippi, and Mike Smith. Henry and Smith have both received starting assignments in their Seminole careers.

KICKING GAME—Missing will be Davey Cappelen, who has handled nearly all of the PAT and field goal chores over the last four years. Bill Capece, who has had kickoff duty for the last three seasons, will be the replacement. Cappelen left FSU with the knowledge that he finished as the leading scorer in the school's history. Junior Rohn Stark is the punter. He has handled that duty since entering school as a freshman and he still has two seasons of eligibility remaining.

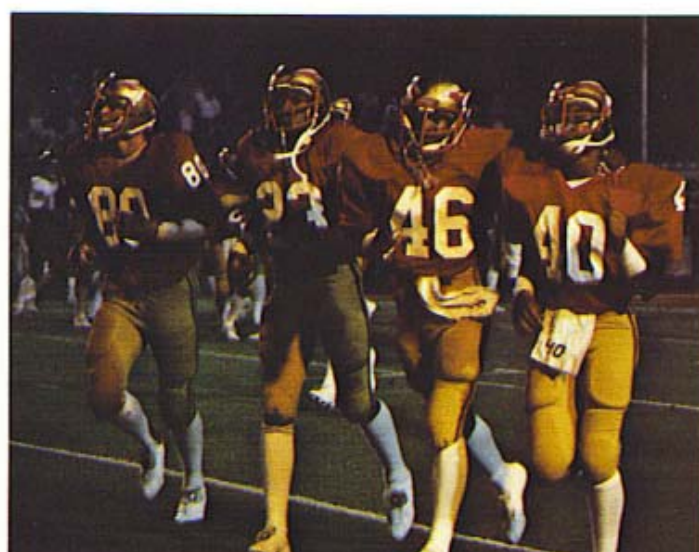
