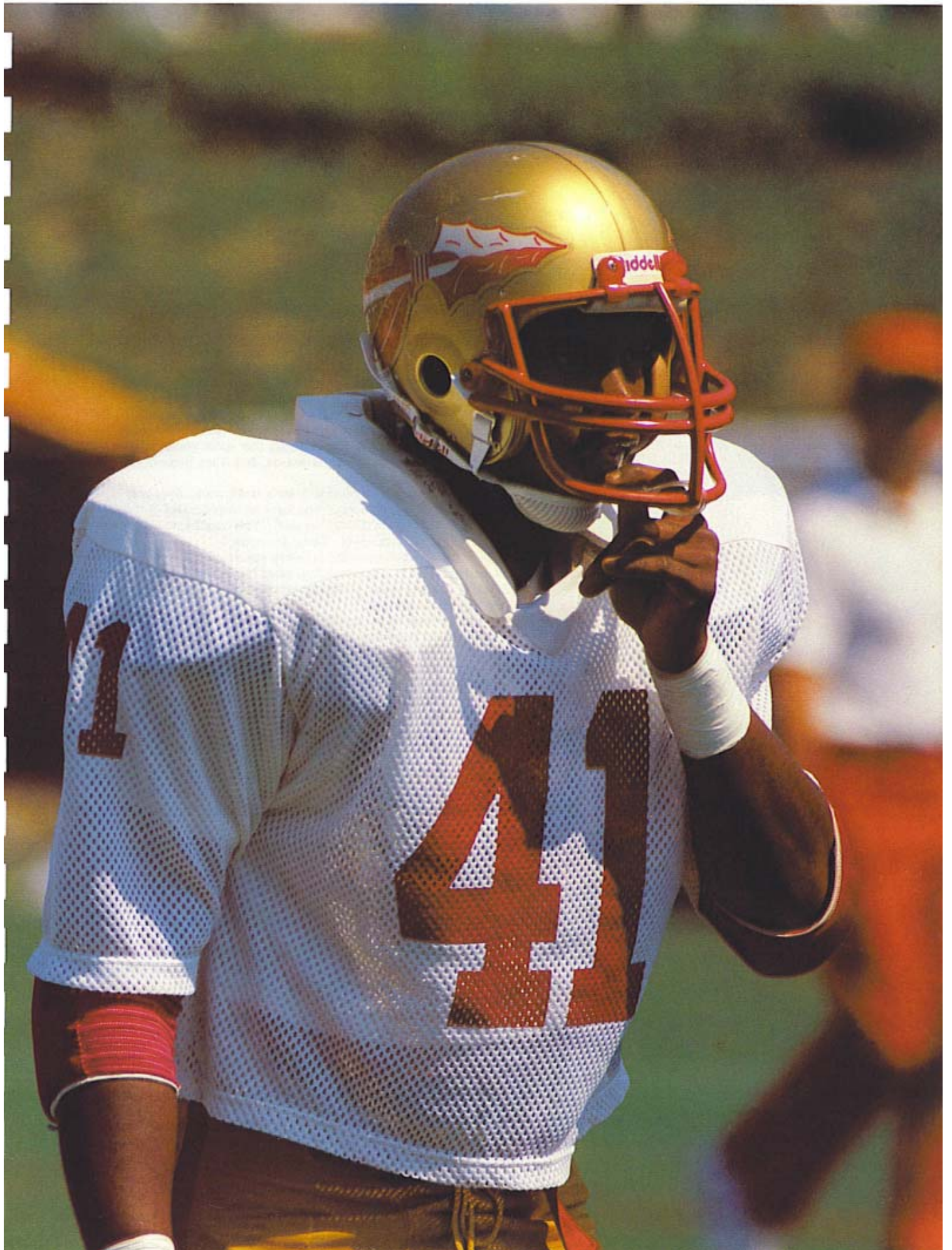

As the accolades continue to mount, one thing becomes increasingly clear...he's

"FLAT-OUT DANGEROUS"

Two springs ago two stopwatches caught him in the 40-yard dash at 4.28 seconds. Greg Allen was getting it on.

Some pro scout once said that only Bob Hayes ran a true 4.3 in the 40, and that when one heard of clockings in the same range they should be considered somewhat more than suspect.

Certainly this Florida State tailback is one of the fastest runners in the college game, and certainly that speed could help gain him the Heisman Trophy in this, his senior season. But Allen himself smilingly questions his time that spring day.

Dick Roberts, coach of Florida State's track team, does not.

"First of all," says Roberts, "you have to consider that it is very difficult to nail down credibility in the 40," he said. "You would have to establish nationwide standards for credibility. There are none.

"The wind was negligible that day Greg was timed at 4.28. He had on shorts, and running shoes. In all probability, when Hayes ran it, he did it on the football field in football shoes. Under the procedures of today, I would guess Hayes would run about a 4-flat."

"If you are looking for credibility, well, that is what Greg did on this particular day under particular circumstances. If you are looking for a comparison of 40 times, that is very difficult."

An even 6 feet, a compact 200 pounds, Allen thinks the talk about speed and 40 times is much ado about not so much.

"You can't do anything until you read your block," he says. "Nothing, until that hole opens. And then it is just a matter of your getting there."

With Allen that often seems to be a matter of pure instinct. He not only reads the block but also the defenders, and has a knack for running where they are not.

In his sophomore season, Allen led the nation with 21 touchdowns, 20 of them rushing. And the startling thing about that was Allen did not start that year. He alternated at tailback with Ricky Williams, a senior and the starter.

Few freshman in history ever had a start comparable to Allen. Florida State gave him his first starting role in the seventh game of 1981, when Williams was hurt. That night at LSU, he stacked up 202 rushing yards. Two seasons later, he ran for 201 against LSU—and no back in history ever had two 200-yard running days against the Bayou Bengals, much less in their own stadium.

The week after his first start in '81, Allen ran for 322 against Western Carolina. That total was a national record for a freshman, and so was the 417 all-purpose yards he had that night.

What had Coach Bobby Bowden been doing with this guy on the bench? "Let's just talk about how well he's running," retorted a grinning Bowden, "and not about the dumb aspects of this thing."

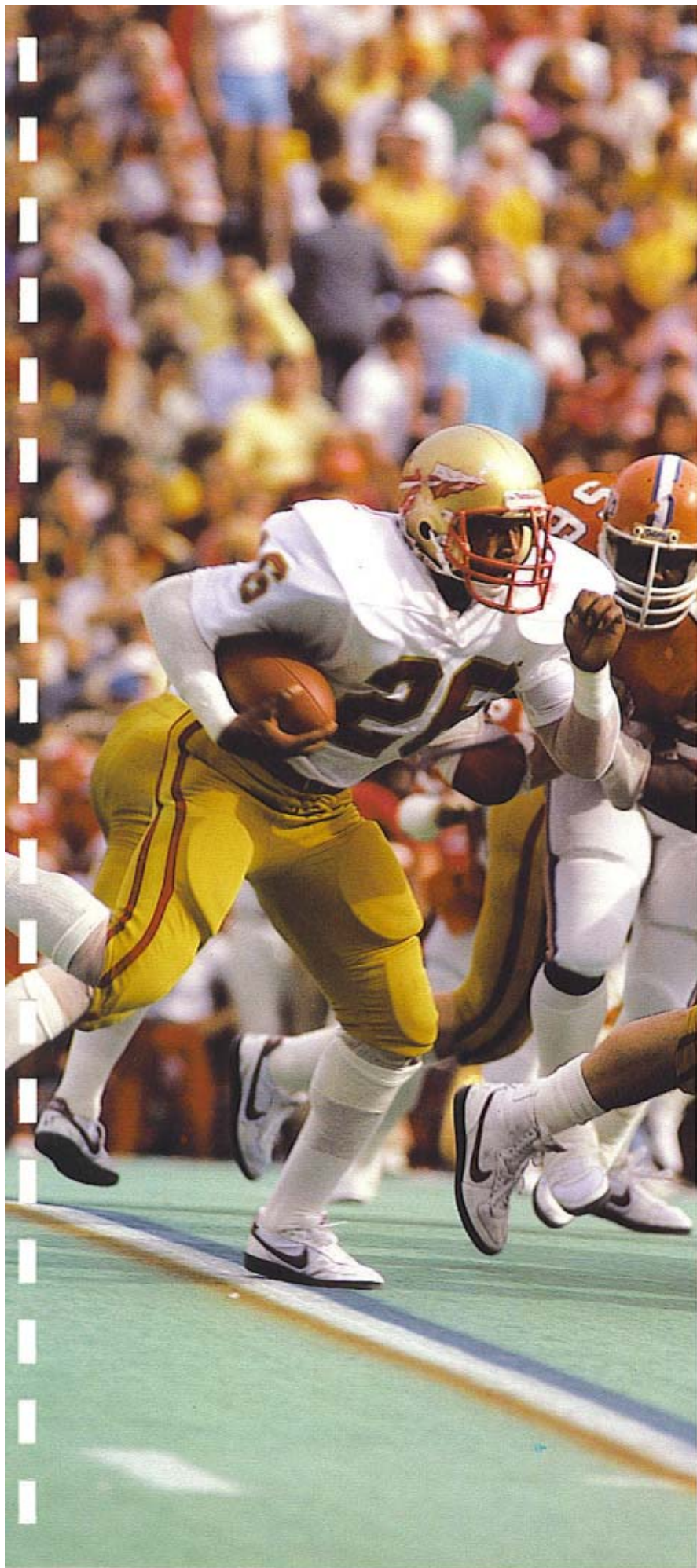
One fact is Florida State has been loaded with tailbacks of high quality during Allen's time. Some think that for this season of '84 Allen heads the best corps of FSU tailbacks yet—a group that includes hot junior Roosevelt Snipes, plus heralded freshmen Wayne Denson and Darrin Holloman. While Allen skipped spring practice this year for track, Snipes drilled sensationally, raising the possibility of his grabbing a starting spot from a Heisman candidate.

"Greg will have his work cut out for him," says Bowden, looking forward to the competition at the spot.

But Jamie Dukes, the Seminoles' giant (275) junior guard, is sure the one Florida State calls its "Secretary of Transportation" will be transporting better than ever, and as a starter.

"Sometimes all I think I have to do is stand in front of my man, and he'll run around me and score," said Dukes. "He is just amazing."

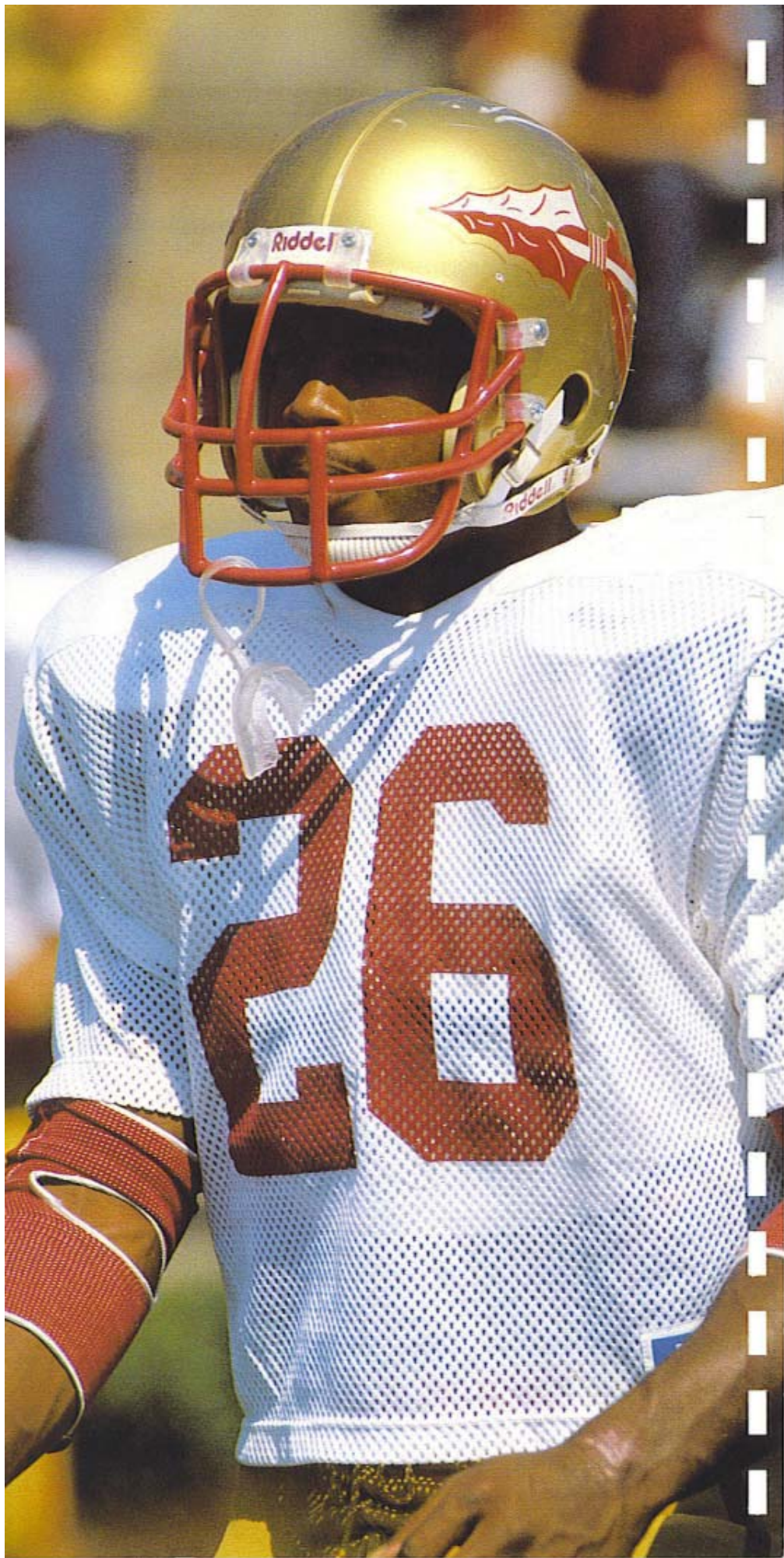

Bowden refers to Allen's running style as "hunting and pecking." The coach elaborates: "He makes good decisions. He knows when to go outside, when to cut back—so much that is instinctive."

But Allen can alter his style. One team sort of "laid back" defensively, to better contain his hunt-and-peck style, and checked Allen in the first half. After intermission, he altered his style—started slashing, as he phrased it—and scored three touchdowns.

Averaging 6.4 yards for 139 freshman runs, 5.1 for 152 when a sophomore and 5.7 for 200 as a junior, Allen has netted 2,798 yards during his Florida State time. He holds 19 school records, with several more in sight.

The youngest of four Allen brothers, Greg grew up on a farm off Persimmon Hollow Road near the west Florida town of Milton. In high school, he was a linebacker—until one day they had him return a kickoff. From that 9th-grade day on, he was a runner.

In his freshman year, Allen fumbled a kickoff against Nebraska, paving a quick Cornhuskers touchdown. And fumbles have been one reason Allen has not been turned loose as much as he might have been. Last season he was still plagued by untimely bobbles.

"I think it is just a lack of concentration," says Allen. "But sometimes there are good hits on the ball."

"It hurts. It is like you have let the team down. But I am trying to get that extra yard."

Last year against LSU, Allen fumbled around the LSU 10 with no one near him when headed for an apparent touchdown. It was one of two early fumbles. Then he came back and ripped for 201 yards.

"Whatever the problem is, whatever it takes, I'm going to do something about that fumbling," said Allen.

In track he has run the 100 meters in 10.82 and turned in 24-foot-11½ inches for the long jump. "I enjoy track," he says, "but I think I'm better at football and it has a slight edge as my favorite."

He talks about speed, and the way it comes into play on the football field. "My speed is best over the short distances," he said. "Sometimes I think in football, strength has a little bit of an edge over speed."

"The start of a play is such a big factor. There are a lot of quick plays, but some are designed to open more slowly. I try to combine all I have—speed, quickness, strength. But I hardly ever juke. It's more like a slash."

He likes to run wide.

"I guess the pitchout would be my favorite play," he said. "Any around-end type of thing."

But Allen also runs extremely well inside. "Very seldom in football are you really going to get to your top speed," says Allen. "You are just not going to be wide-open as much as people think."

He approaches the game with high confidence.

"You have to think that you are the best," he said. "A runner has to think that way. And he has to keep that positive attitude toward himself. But it is very doubtful you could get one of us to say outright he is better than the other."

For awhile, journalists that follow Florida State had difficulty getting Allen to say anything outright. He was notoriously quiet.

"My mother taught me a long time ago to think twice, and speak once," said Allen when he said anything.

There is the story of a writer who visited Allen in his apartment. A parakeet was there, squawking in his cage. So was Allen's roommate, outside linebacker Darryl Gray.

The writer wanted to know if the bird could talk.

"Are you kidding?" retorted Gray. "That's Greg's bird."

Gradually, Allen has opened up and become more comfortable with the media.

On the football field, that quiet, smiling personality seems to undergo a change. Greg Allen abruptly turns aggressive, lets it all go.

"When you go into a game, it is a different story," says Allen. "You have a different attitude."

"I'm not afraid to take anybody on. But I'm not crazy either. If I can avoid the lick, I will."

In Bowden's view, Allen has everything a back should have.

"He's got the greatest thing there is, and that's instinct," said Bowden.

"In our offense, we have a lot of plays where we don't tell the runners where to go or what hole he's supposed to hit. Great runners don't think. They react."

"And, buddy, let me tell you, Greg's got the stuff the great ones do. Speed, quickness, agility, balance and desire. And he's no 150-pounder."

"When he's got the ball, he's flat-out dangerous."

Allen is also an excellent blocker—a fact most pro scouts have already picked up on.

Though Florida State is apt to deal Allen the ball most anywhere on the field, he's far more likely to get it inside the 10. At least, that was the distinct pattern in 1982 when Allen came off the bench and led the nation in scoring. Last year, with Allen on the field and footed frequently *Looking* for him to carry the ball down close, the Seminoles used him as a decoy.

Against Auburn last year, Allen, nursing a tender knee, got in for only one play—as a decoy. He never touched the ball. At the time, the token appearance cost Allen the national lead in rushing—based on average yards gained per game played. Though he did not run the ball, the one play counted as a game played.

Allen, the good team man, never complained.

Inside that 10, Allen sometimes seems simply uncanny, as he did against South Carolina two years ago when he scored four touchdowns—each from within the 10—*Standing Up*.

If taunts come on the field, Allen ignores them.

"If they hit me hard and then point fingers and say things,"

Allen says, "I have nothing to say to them."

"I'll just smile and go back to the huddle."

Allen also smiles over the notion that he might not carry the football as much in his senior season as most people think.

"Any running back would like to carry the ball 30 times a game," he said, "but the situation we have here helps us all get some rest. We are fresh when we get in. It works out OK."

Allen may like things as they are for other reasons. He has spoken of the pressure that was on him following his freshman season.

"I was afraid people would expect so much from me," he said. "They kept talking about all those records and all. I was worried."

Worry or not, that was the year he led the country in scoring.

From the start, Bowden has had an eye for easing the pressure. Early in his freshman time, Bowden was not running that well. Then, suddenly, one day he was.

Bowden called the squad together, and asked Allen why he thought he was not running that well. Allen didn't know. "It's because you ran today like you did in high school," said Bowden. "You were loose, and you ran like your old self."

Steadily, Allen became more loose—and better.

"When he lines up for you, you've got to root for him," says Bowden. "His folks did a magnificent job of training him for life"

"All that sudden success and fame—he has handled it in a gentlemanly manner. He's always been the same."

The dramatic difference comes when they hand him the ball inside the 10.

—of course, he's FSU's 1984 Heisman Trophy candidate...1984 Pre-Season Playboy All-American...1983 (and career)...reaped All-American honors that included Walter Camp, UPI (1st team), Football News (2nd team), AP (3rd team), and All-South Independent (1st team)...rushed for 1,134 yards, a 5.7 average, and scored 13 touchdowns...his rushing average of 103.1 yards per game, 14th in NCAA stats, would have actually been higher had he not been used as a decoy for one play vs. Auburn when he was nursing a sprained knee...also caught 11 passes for 96 yards...while his 1983 rushing total is already the best in FSU history, he needs just to add 155 yards to his 2,798 career total to set FSU's all-time mark...had five 100-yards-or-better games in 1983 and a total of 11 in his career...his top 1983 games were LSU (201), Cincinnati (125), Louisville (145), East Carolina (154) and Tulane (115)...his 202 vs. LSU made him the first back to ever rush for 200 yards twice against the Tigers...97 yards vs. North Carolina in the Peach Bowl...his only weakness seems to be fumbling, which he did 10 times during 1983, losing eight to the opponent...already owns 19 school rushing and scoring records...has 38 career touchdowns...if he could repeat his sophomore season where he scored 21 TDs, he would tie Pitt's Tony Dorsett as the all-time NCAA scoring leader...1982: nation's leading scorer with 21 TDs...had a net 776 rushing yards from the line of scrimmage although he never started a game and split time with Ricky Williams...with kickoff return yardage (515) and reception yardage (233), Allen's 1,524 all-purpose yardage was 11th in the country...top rushing game was Louisville (173) but best game may have been in Ohio State upset (104)...scored four TDs against both Louisville and South Carolina...ran for 138 yards in Gator Bowl win over West Virginia and grabbed MVP trophy...also picked up AP honorable mention All-America honors...All-South Independent honors and WTBS-Chevrolet MVP award vs. Louisville...1981: burst upon the college scene with a 202 yard rushing performance vs. LSU in his first collegiate start...came back the next week to shatter NCAA records for most yards by a freshman (322) and most all-purpose yards (417)...finished the season with 888 yards and three TDs...honors for the year included AP

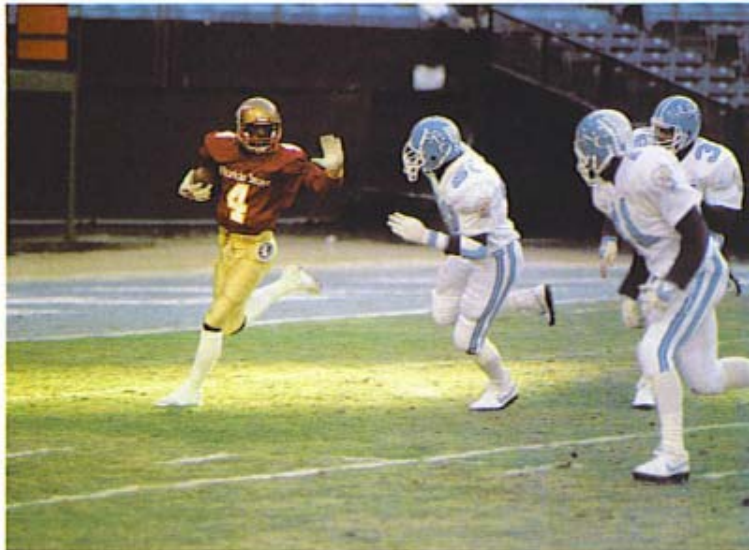

—will be one of the outstanding receivers the country this year and is already one of the top receivers in Florida State history...although the honors haven't come in his first three years, it's because of FSU's four rotating receiver system that has been implemented since his arrival as a freshman...three of the receivers who have shared in that system are now on the rosters of NFL teams and Hester is a certain first rounder himself...can catch the short pass but his skill is in the long threat...says receiver coach John Eason "any pass he touches could go all the way"...Eason goes on "Jessie Hester has more ability than any receiver we've had. He has developed consistency and is now a great receiver. Over the last two years, he's also been the best blocker we've had"...tied for the team lead in catches last year with 31...his 18.2 average per catch was tops...was the most consistent receiver in terms of receptions per game...had six TD catches which was good enough to tie him for ninth place on the all-time FSU chart...named the CBS-Chevrolet MVP for his three catches, 63 yards and one touchdown performance vs. Florida in '83...top game was five catches for 126 yards and a score vs. Tulane...also picked up 56 yards in '83 on seven carries, mostly on reverse plays...caught the game winning TD pass, a 10-yarder, vs. Arizona State to win in closing moments...65 career receptions are just nine short of moving into 10th place on the FSU career list...already seventh on yardage reception list with 1,268 yards (19.5 average) and is less than 200 away from passing Fred Biletnikoff...12 career touchdown catches is tied for sixth place on the career chart...was second on team in 1982 with 25 catches but averaged a whopping 21.6 per catch...that figure would have been the top average for a season in FSU history but he need-

ed a minimum of 30 catches and fell five short...began his college career with a TD catch in his first game but a pulled hamstring later limited his first year to just nine receptions...an outstanding talent, he has been timed in the 40 from 4.44 to 4.54, and has the team's best vertical jump at 35 inches...nicknamed "the Jet"...former Parade All-American...majoring in leisure services...born January 21, 1963...

—offensive coordinator Wayne McDuffie, a man of few words, puts this tag on Dukes: "I've been fortunate to coach five All-Americans who were offensive linemen and at this point in his career, Jamie is as good as any of them"...named the outstanding offensive lineman for the 1983 spring and also received FSU's Hinesman Award for the most outstanding team player in the FSU program during spring workouts...since stepping on the FSU campus, has started all 22 regular season games as well as the 1982 Gator Bowl and 1983 Peach Bowl...has been picked to the 1982 Freshman All-American team by the Sporting News and made second team All-South Independent in 1983...after a freshman season where his weight (295) grabbed the headlines, he improved his technique as a sophomore while reducing to around 270 pounds...maybe the best description of Dukes came from *St. Pete Independent* sportswriter Glenn Miller when Dukes first stepped on campus: "Jamie Dukes wears T-shirts the size of pup tents. His shoulders could be used to park a helicopter. His legs look like they're pilings on loan from the Sunshine Skyway. Jamie Dukes is, as you might have guessed by now, large"...quickness is his trademark and is an excellent pulling guard...Dukes is only the se-

cond offensive lineman in Florida State history to start every game as a freshman—the other was Ken Lanier, a member of the Denver Broncos NFL team...has bench pressed 250 pounds...wears a size 56 sports jacket...major is undecided...born June 15, 1964...

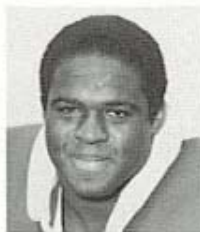

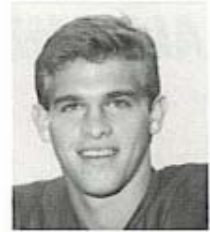

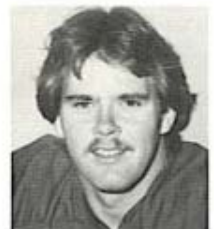

FRESHMEN



PHILLIP BRYANT, Wide Receiver/Defensive Back, 5-10, 175, Bainbridge, Georgia (Bainbridge)...late season knee surgery prevented him from becoming a household word in recruiting circles...he did reap first team 3A all-state honors from the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*...rushed for 872 yards on 97 carries as a running back his senior season... was the state's 100 yard dash champion as a junior...made 1983 honorable mention Adidas All-American list both as an offensive back and a defensive back...look for him to be placed at wide receiver first in August...

PAT CARTER, Tight End, 6-4, 230, Sarasota, Florida (River-view)...he's one that could come in and play early, according to FSU coaches... it may be even more realistic to say that they need Carter to perform like they think he can to strengthen the tight end position...caught 21 passes for 303 yards and three TDs as a senior...it's his blocking that has FSU coaches most excited though...has 4.6 speed in the 40 and benches 300 pounds...teammate of placekicker Derek Schmidt at Sarasota High School...

BRIAN K. DAVIS, Linebacker, 6-0, 195, Tallahassee, Florida (Lincoln)...one of three Tallahassee linebackers to sign with FSU...he and fellow FSU-recruit Mike Hittinger played side-by-side at Lincoln High...named to the first team 3A all-state squad and also named Big Bend Player of the Year by the *Tallahassee Democrat*...also picked up *USA Today* All-American honors...139 tackles as a senior and 349 in his career...high school coach Steve Harden calls him "a Willie Lanier type—a destroyer"...has 4.6 speed...

WAYNE DENSON, Running Back, 6-1, 220 Norristown, Pennsylvania (Norristown)...heads the list of the blue chip running backs in the nation...named to the Parade and Adidas All-America teams although he missed three games with an injury...rushed for 1,200 yards in nine games...in the first game of his senior season he rushed for 235 yards in 21 carries and added five touchdowns...has 9.6 speed in the 100-yards...was the most coveted back in the nation on Nebraska's recruiting list as well as many other schools...has been promised that he will get a shot at tailback at FSU although he has fullback size...according to Chuck Amato, who recruited him, "most people who saw him on film think he's a franchise"...

JOHN EAFORD, Linebacker, 6-2, 205, Miami, Florida (Norland)...although his name doesn't appear on many state or regional lists, he did make the Parade All-American team as well as the *USA Today* All-American team...has 4.6 speed in the 40 and has bench pressed 380 pounds...coaches expect him to round out at about 220 pounds once he gets in the program...best game of his senior year came against Killian High School when he recovered three fumbles and intercepted a pass...a good student with a 3+ grade point average...

DAVID ETHERIDGE, Wide Receiver/Punter, 6-2, 170, Winter Haven, Florida (Winter Haven)...third team 4A all-state as a punter...with a redshirt year, he'll have two years after current punter Louis Berry graduates...punted for a 40.5 average as a senior but his preferred technique—minus shoes—is not allowed in Florida high school football...signed at FSU as a two-sport athlete and has permission to miss spring football to participate in track and field...high jumped 7-0 as a junior and 6-9 as a senior...father played basketball at the University of Florida...

VICTOR FLOYD, Running Back, 5-11, 180, Pensacola, Florida (Pensacola)...the best natural athlete I've ever signed and that includes eight players off of Georgia's 1980 national championship team that

I recruited" says offensive coordinator Wayne McDuffie...first team 3A all-state as well as honorable mention Adidas All-American and Orlando's Sweet 16 list...rushed for 1,500 yards in 176 carries as a senior, including games of 230 and 298 yards...that was his first year in football as his debut as a junior was set back with a dislocated shoulder...runs a 9.6 100 yards and a 21.6 220 yards...a .450 hitter in baseball...

STEVE GABBARD, Defensive Tackle, 6-5, 260, Concord, North Carolina (Independence)...has a lot of room to grow once he joins the FSU program...has great leg strength (515 pound squat press), good speed for a big man (4.8) and good jumping ability (28-29 inches)...was overshadowed by highly recruited Chuck Tabor, his partner on the line at defensive tackle, who chose Missouri...originally from Dayton, Ohio...wants to major in accounting with a law career in mind...

TERRY GRIGGLEY, Defensive Back, 5-11, 180, Clearwater, Florida (Clearwater)...a Parade All-American at running back although FSU coaches have indicated he'll be a defensive back...also made the *Orlando Sentinel-Star's* Sweet 16 list...had somewhat of a disappointing senior season after a super junior season...broke his thumb in the pre-season...Griggley's first decision was not what college to attend, but what sport to play...was the starting point guard on the Team Florida AAU team that won the national title in the 1983 summer...he can dunk a basketball easily although he's only 5-11...was named to the Sweet 16 basketball list also...has great speed (4.5)...one of his best friends is FSU receiver Hassan Jones, who played with him two years at Clearwater...

JOHN HADLEY, Defensive Back, 6-5, 200, Orlando, Florida (Evans)...has speed, terrific range. He can cover twice the ground as the average guy can. And he likes to hit. We've never had a giant back there that can do all those things" says Jim Gladden, who successfully recruited the 6-5 player...was a third team 4A all-state pick and an honorable mention Sweet 16 player...runs a 9.9 100 yards, a 21.9 220 yards and high jumps 6-6...also was named to the Top 20 forwards list in the state...was also Evans' MVP in track...cousin Edmund Nelson plays for Pittsburgh Steelers...former teammate of Jamie Dukes at Evans...originally from New York...

ED HARDEN, Defensive Tackle, 6-2, 265, Milledgeville, Georgia (Milledgeville)...played several defensive positions in high school and may be best suited for noseguard at FSU...named one of the top four defensive linemen in the state of Georgia last year...attended same high school as senior linebacker Henry Taylor...

FELTON HAYES, Linebacker, 6-1, 220, Brandon, Florida (Brandon)...made the third team on the state's 4A list for linebackers...also excelled in wrestling with a 10-2 record as a junior and second team all-state honors as a senior...former teammate of FSU tackle Stanley Scott...nominated for Mr. Brandon High School honor...nickname is "Darth Vader"...he's muscular and will remind you of Henry Taylor" says recruiter Billy Sexton...

MIKE HITTINGER, Linebacker, 6-2, 220, Tallahassee, Florida (Lincoln)...picked Florida State along with fellow Lincoln linebacker Brian Davis...was a first-team all-state selection after picking up 100 tackles...also made the *Orlando Sentinel Star's* Sweet 16 list...strong player with a 460 pound bench press that coaches say remind them of Dick Butkus...fractured a foot in the off-season running the stadium steps at FSU...

JOE IONATA, Offensive Line, 6-2, 245, Dunedin, Florida (Dunedin)...joins his brother John, a starting offensive tackle, at Florida State...can play both offense and defense but coaches will probably try him out on the offense first...has 4.7 speed...named second team 4A all-state as a defenseman...made the all-county team both on offense and defense...

ANTHONY JOHNSON, Defensive Tackle, 6-4, 290, Jacksonville, Florida (Raines)...biggest player inked by the Seminoles this year...although he didn't reap the honors some other offensive linemen did, coaches believe he's a sleeper...they'd like him to lose some weight and report in at 260...moves well for a big man (5.0) and is very strong (420 in the bench press)...if he comes in at a lower weight, some coaches have already said they think he'll be an early contributor...

JASON KUIPERS, Offensive Line, 6-2, 235, Winter Haven, Florida (Winter Haven)...his signing gave FSU four players from Winter Haven on its roster...made third team all-state in the 4A category...will first have a shot at offensive line when he arrives on campus...may have the best fundamentals of all the offensive linemen FSU recruited...has thrown the shot put 56-6½ and was the only junior to place in the 3A state meet his junior year...plans to major in pre-dental curriculum...

PAUL MCGOWAN, Linebacker, 6-1, 215, Winter Park, Florida (Winter Park)...this young man comes to FSU with a trail of honors...named first team all-state, All-South, *USA-Today* honorable mention All-America, Orlando Touchdown Club's Defensive Player of the Year...when he doubled on offense as a wingback, he carried 40 times for 400 yards...runs a 4.7 40-yard dash and ran on Winter Park's sprint relay...also won state championship with a 365 bench press in the 220 pound category...high school coach says he is the strongest player to come out of Winter Park...teammate of fellow FSU signee Mark Salva...

TERRY NETTLES, Defensive Back, 5-10, 185, Deland, Florida (Deland)...after playing running back and quarterback in high school where he picked up 450 yards on the ground as a senior, he was recruited to play defensive back...has outstanding 4.5 speed in the 40...can bench press 340 pounds too...state champion in the 198 pound class of weightlifting competition...is also an honor student...

TOM O'MALLEY, Tight End, 6-3, 225, Darien, Connecticut (Darien)...after playing fullback and linebacker, O'Malley was switched to tight end as a senior...has good speed, running under a 4.7 40-yard dash, and has good hands...with more weight he could warrant a position switch, maybe to the interior line...also an excellent baseball player, he planned to spend the summer in Tallahassee playing semi-pro baseball...

DAVID PALMER, Linebacker, 6-2, 210, Tallahassee, Florida (Florida)...versatile athlete who became the first player ever to win the Tallahassee Quarterback Club's Offensive AND Defensive Player of the Year award in 1983...averaged 18 tackles a game on defense and also ran for 1,083 yards...picked up first team 2A all-state honors as well as All-Big Bend honors and honorable mention Sweet 16...has 4.7 speed...played at Florida High with redshirt freshman Martin Mayhew and is a long-time friend of FSU signee Stan Shiver of Tifton from Little League baseball days...an outstanding 3.9 student...father won the state championship in powerlifting's super heavyweight division in 1971...member of FCA...

MARK SALVA, Noseguard, 6-2, 245, Winter Park, Florida (Winter Park)...teammate of Paul McGowan at Winter Park where he earned second team 4A all-state honors...good speed for a big man and fundamentally sound...could also play offensive line where he would

make a good pulling guard...second in state heavyweight weightlifting competition with a 350 pound press...played in North/South all-star game...heritage includes Phillipine, Brazilian, Russian and Polish...

TRACY SANDERS, Quarterback, 6-1, 175, Bradenton, Florida (Manatee)...may be FSU's quarterback of the future and could step in immediately and play as he fits perfectly into the new "freeze option" offense...high school defensive coordinator Mike Knowles says "he's got great speed, he's strong and can scramble. He's built exactly like Nebraska's Turner Gill"...in fact, he was headed to Nebraska before visiting FSU...gained 1,000 yards rushing and 1,200 passing and accounted for 25 TDs...named MVP of the state championship game...picked up honors that included quarterback of the All-South team, first team 4A all-state, Adidas honorable mention All-America and *USA-Today* honorable mention All-America...runs a 9.7 100-yard dash and can throw the ball 70 yards in the air...led his basketball team to a 23-2 record and the regional championships in 1983 and 1984...

DEREK SCHMIDT, Kicking Specialist, 5-11, 175, Sarasota, Florida (Sarasota)...although he hit just six of 12 field goals his senior year, Florida State wanted him badly...most of those he missed were outside the 50-yard range...hit all of his 28 extra points and has never missed one in his career...named second team 4A all-state...his longest field goal was 49 yards...has reportedly kicked 69 yarders in practice...has had only two field goals blocked in five years of kicking...recruited by Ohio State, Nebraska and Miami...played in the Florida North/South all-star game...member of FCA...

CARLTON SCOTT, Wide Receiver, 5-7, 165, Chiefland, Florida (Chiefland)...a barn-burner, Scott was the fastest man in the state the last two years...state 100 yard champion in 9.6 clocking...was recruited for both football and track and will miss spring practice each year...also has run a 22.1 220 yards and long jumped 24-9½...made the first team 2A all-state team as a utility player...played QB for Chiefland, throwing for 680 yards and rushing for 710...named the *Gainesville Sun's* Player of the Year...

STAN SHIVER, Defensive Back, 6-2, 190, Tifton, Georgia (Tift County)...he's a late bloomer that came on his senior year...Wayne McDuffie, who recruited him, says "he's one of the most vicious tacklers I've seen in high school football"...although he now lives in Georgia, his family lived in Tallahassee for 12 years before moving...it was then that he became close friends with fellow recruit David Palmer while playing Little League baseball...has 4.7 speed in the 40...has two brothers who have played on the college level; one played on last year's Northeast Oklahoma Junior College's national championship team while another plays baseball for Georgia Tech...

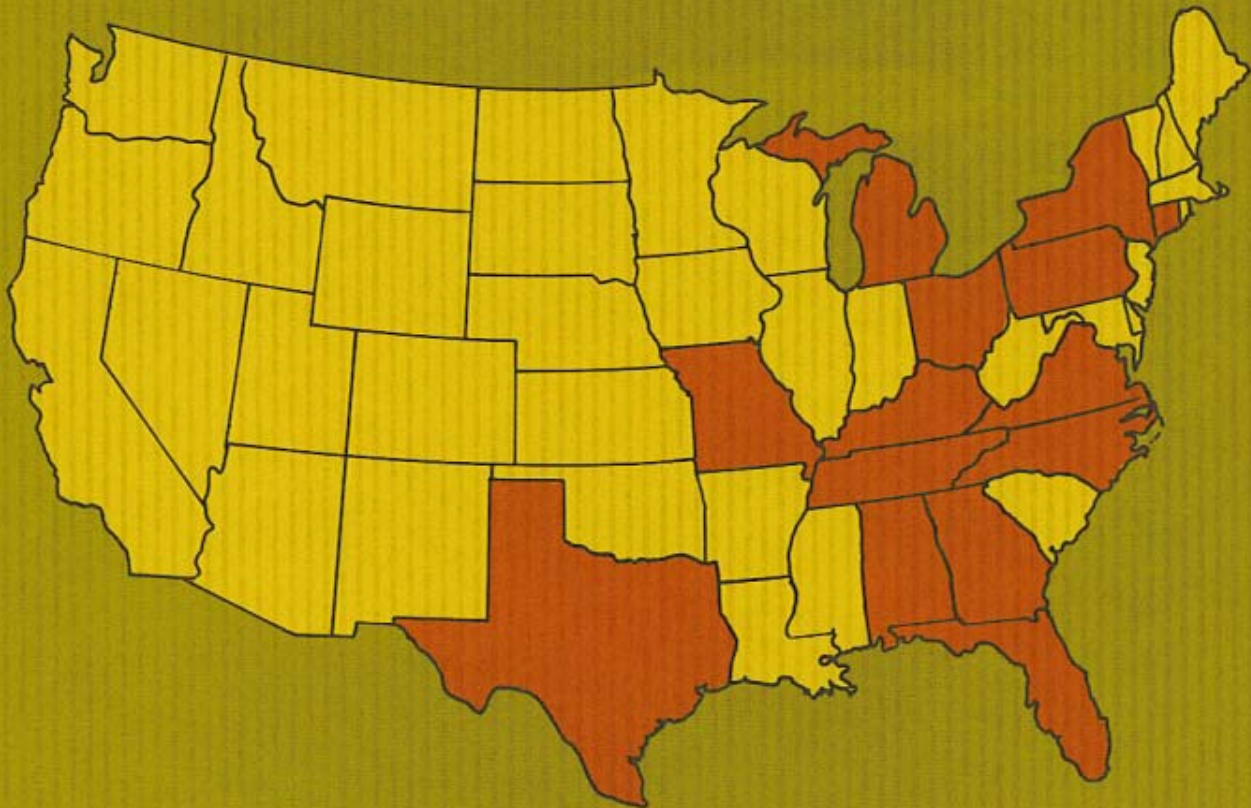
