## Renn's Run

# 1958

**T**he tension surrounding the very first game of the FSU-Florida rivalry 28 years ago was beyond belief. It was November 22, 1958 and as the teams warmed up at Florida Field that afternoon, the noise was deafening. Seminole backers, including a large student contingent and the FSU band, were clustered in the north endzone.

As intense as this great rivalry has become over the years, perhaps at no time was this much anticipation felt. The kickoff floated to halfback Jack Espenship at the 8-yard line. Espenship started right and then reversed the ball off to Bobby Renn, heading for the east sideline.

Amidst a thunderous crescendo from the sellout crowd, Renn broke through the Gator charge. Suddenly he was running clear at midfield with a blocker out in front. Only one Gator—the smallest on the field—Jimmy Dunn, could stop Renn from returning this very first kickoff for a touchdown.

As Renn streaked inside the Gator 20, Dunn made his move. He slipped past the FSU blocker and hit Renn with an ankle-high tackle and held on until he came down at the 15. The runback had covered 78 yards and, incredibly, has to be remembered as one of the great moments not only of this great rivalry, but in FSU football history.

Five plays later, Fred Pickard scored and FSU had the first lead. Florida went on to win, 21-7.

Stark's senior season ... coaches say Berry has improved hang time every year ... uses a one-step technique ... will take on the role of holder for all PAT and field goal attempts in 1986 ... **1985:** punted 72 times for a 43.1 average, the best season of his career at FSU ... that average ranked 15th in the nation ... named first team All-South Independent and All-Metro Conference as well as honorable mention A.P. All-American ... did not have a punt returned for a touchdown in 1985 but suffered the second block of his career in the Gator Bowl (both blocks have come in bowl games) ... longest punt of his career, a 65-yarder, came vs. Miami in perhaps his best game when he punted nine times for a 47.8 average ... punted seven times vs. North Carolina for a 46.3 average and six times vs. Memphis State for a 45.0 average ... set a Gator Bowl punting record with a 47.5 average on four kicks ... best game of placing punts came against Nebraska when he dropped punts at the 7, 12 and 15 yard lines ... went into the season with the 13th best average among returning punters and the 5th best career average ... **1984:** punted for a 42.3 average on 49 kicks, sending his longest one 60 yards vs. Miami ... named to the All-South Independent first team and second team on the Metro Conference list ... punted eight times vs. Memphis State for a 46.0 average ... did not have a punt blocked or any returned for scores ... put three punts down inside the 10-yard line ... **1983:** averaged 42.2 yards per kick on 37 boots, his longest a 58-yarder ... had one kick partially blocked in the Peach Bowl ... **High School:** booted for a 42.4 average as a senior and earned all-state honors ... played with present FSU teammates Greg Newell and David Schrenker with the three coming to FSU in 1983 ... **Personal:** father was once an assistant coach at Southern Miss while his uncle, John James, punted for the Atlanta Falcons ... an economics major with a minor in business ... born July 21, 1965 .

Does Florida State fare better playing on natural grass, like its home stadium, or has it done equally well on astroturf surfaces? A study of the last five years reveals that on the road FSU has an 8-4 record (.667) on the natural surfaces and an 8-7 record (.533) on the carpets. Add in FSU's home record of 20-8 during that period of time, and the Seminoles have put together a 28-12 mark (.700) while playing on grass. If we adjust the FSU record to eliminate the Tulane loss on astroturf in 1983 (the game was later forfeited), then FSU has a 9-6 (.600) on the turf in five years.

on his coverage reading as well as his ball handling and timing ... in the fall, he'll be challenged mostly by Danny McManus who looks as if he's ready to play again ... **1985:** it was a storybook season for Ferguson, who came from a 4th team position to lead the Seminoles to the Gator Bowl championship ... in that game, he was named the MVP after completing 20 of 43 passes for 338 yards and two TDs ... he did that despite having his top two wide receivers out of action ... it was later learned that Ferguson had cracked a collarbone in the first quarter ... during the regular season he completed 70 of 130 passes for 990 yards, a 53.8 completion percentage, and 11 TDs ... named freshman All-America by *Football News* ... first was called upon in a pressure situation in the Kansas game—the 4th game of the season—with FSU behind 20-10 in the 4th quarter ... got the Seminoles quickly on the board with a 68-yard TD bomb to Phillip Bryant and then on the next series, directed a 62-yard drive to get the winning TD ... came off the bench again in the North Carolina game in the 3rd quarter to complete 15 of 23 passes for 124 yards and a TD while FSU once again came from behind ... got his first start against Miami and took over the controls for the rest of the season ... probably his most "freshman-like" performance came against Auburn early in the season when he was intercepted and fumbled on his first two series, both leading to Tiger scores ... his first snaps as a collegian came in the Tulane game where he relieved starter McManus once the Seminoles had a lead ... not unexpectedly, Ferguson was named the Seminole most improved offensive player ... **High School:** played in South Carolina-North Carolina Shrine Bowl and threw for 125 yards and a TD ... set school single-season passing records for touchdowns (21) and total offensive yards (2,557), breaking Steve Fuller's (Clemson and Chicago Bears) marks ... also ran for 10 TDs ... passed for 1,400 yards as a junior ... **Personal:** enrolled in undergraduate studies ... born March 16, 1967 .

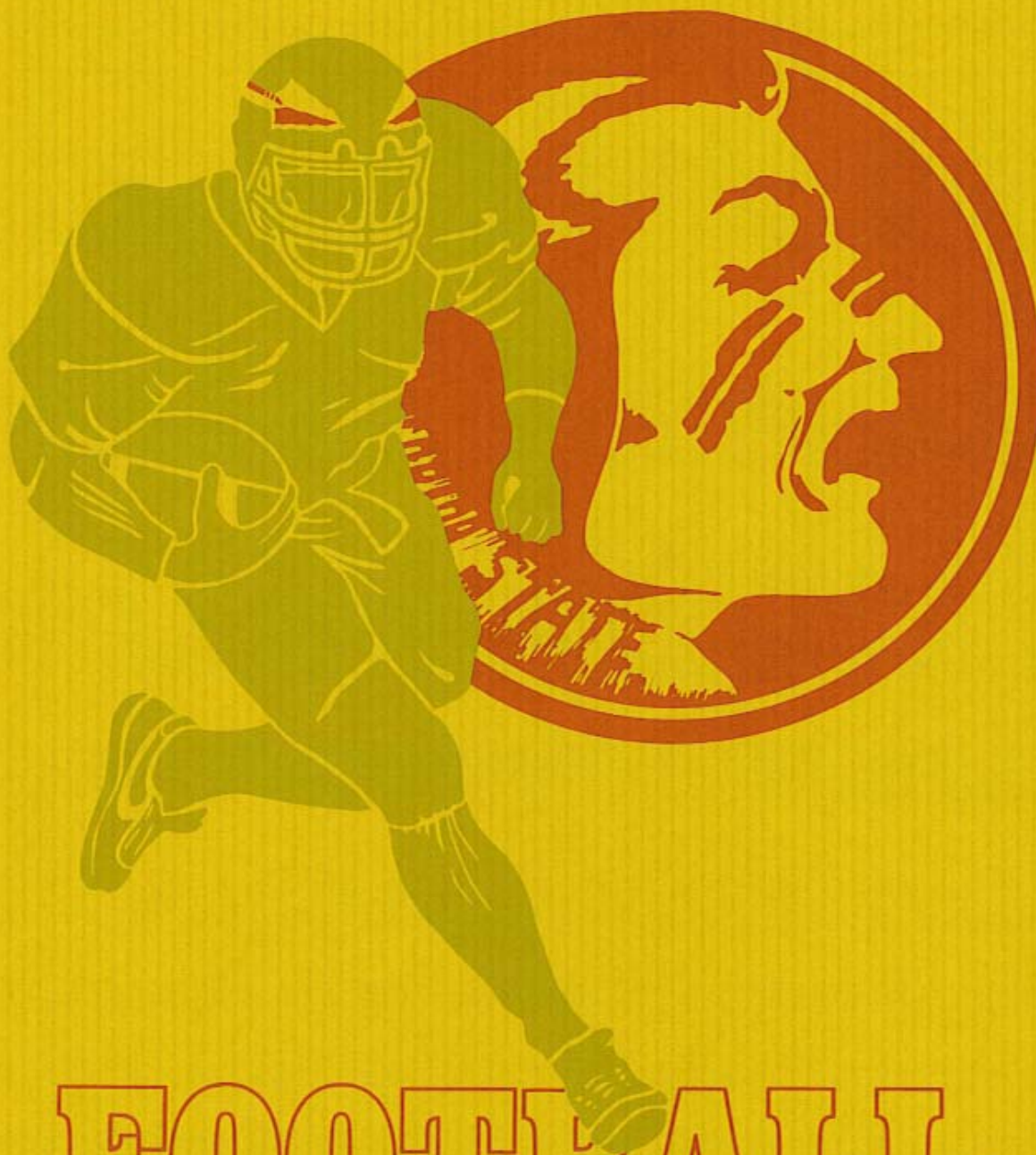

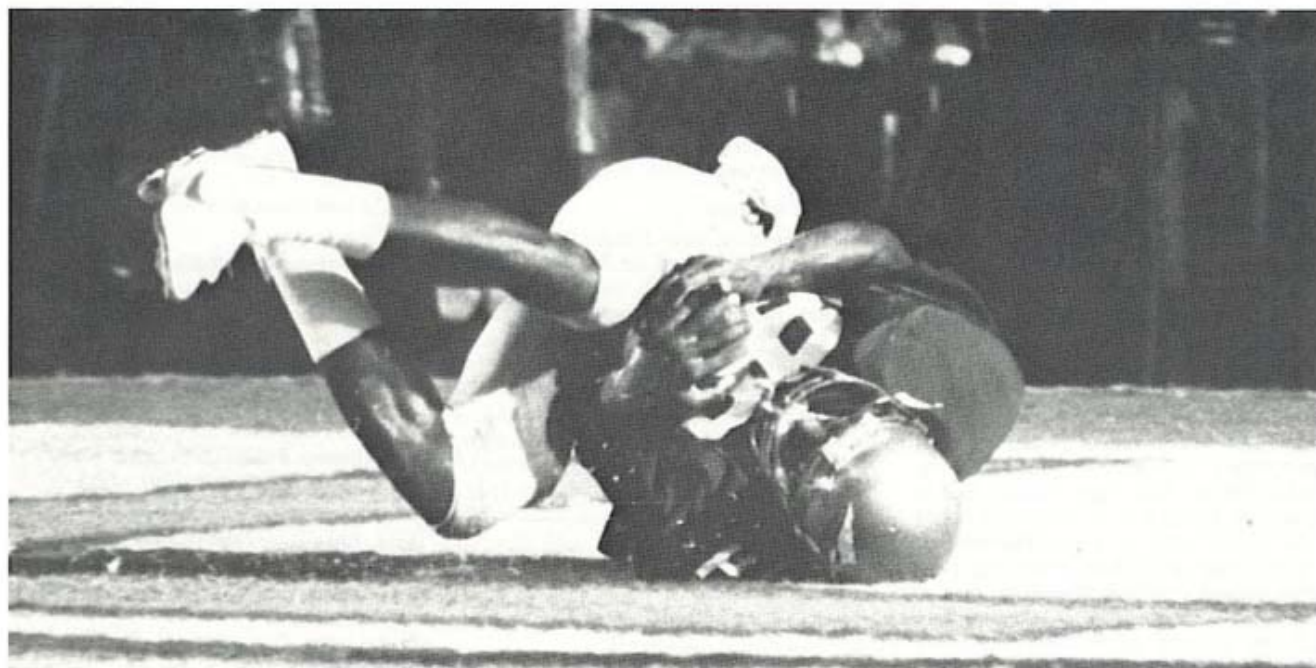

# Is FSU Becoming a Pipeline to the Pros?

With 17 active players in the NFL, Florida State certainly has its share of alums in the pros. Though the contingent of "Pro Seminoles" is larger now than ever, it's nothing new; FSU players have been making their mark in the NFL for years, including four who earned Super Bowl rings.

## These Seminoles Had Super Seasons

**Fred Biletnikoff, Oakland Raiders (1968)**—Biletnikoff caught 61 passes for 1,037 yards, a 17.0 average, and six TDs . . . he had five 100-yard receiving games, including 144 yards vs. Kansas City and 137 vs. Cincinnati. Fred had three touchdown catches in a playoff game with Kansas City and seven catches for 190 yards, a 27.1 average, in a playoff game with the Jets. The Raiders went all the way to the Super Bowl.

**Fred Biletnikoff, Oakland Raiders (1969)**—There are many outstanding years to pick from when looking at Fred Biletnikoff's career, but in 1969 he made All-Pro for the first time. He had the best year of his career in terms of touchdown catches (12) and put together 54 catches for 837 yards, a 15.3 average. He had three 100-yard receiving games, two of those vs. Miami where he totaled 251 yards.

**Fred Biletnikoff, Oakland Raiders (1971)**—He equalled his career high in catches—61—and averaged 15.2 per reception while making the Pro Bowl team. He had two 100-yard receiving games, including 148 yards vs. Philadelphia and 128 vs. Kansas City.

**Alphonso Carreker, Green Bay Packers (1984)**—After his first season in the NFL where he was the runnerup in tackles on the Green Bay team (32), Carreker was named a Consensus All-Rookie selection. The 6-6 defensive lineman also had four sacks.

**Bobby Jackson, New York Jets (1982)**—Jackson tied for the AFC lead in interceptions with five and then grabbed another interception in a playoff game with the Rams. He also tied for his team's lead in broken up passes with 10 along with his 31 solo tackles and 10 assists. Jackson was awarded both the offensive and defensive game balls in a game at Minnesota when he ran 80 yards with a blocked field goal for a TD and returned another interception 77 yards for a score.



**Zeke Mowatt, New York Giants (1984)**—In his second pro football season, former free agent Zeke Mowatt shared the club lead in receptions (48) during the regular season. He also had six TD catches and a 14.5 per-catch-average while being named to the 2nd team All-NFL team picked by *College and Pro Football Weekly*. Mowatt's big game came against Kansas City in a comeback win as he caught seven passes for 126 yards and the winning TD in the game's final minutes. The tight end went on to catch 12 passes for 122 yards as the Giants made the playoffs.

## He Had a Career

Fred Biletnikoff, more than any Florida State graduate, made a mark on the NFL and pro football. In 14 seasons with the Oakland Raiders, Biletnikoff grabbed 589 receptions for 8,974 yards and 76 TDs, all Raider records. In addition to leading his club in receiving from 1968–73, Biletnikoff had 21 100-yard games and made the All-Pro team in 1969, 1970 and 1972. He played in the Pro Bowl game in 1970, 1971, 1973 and 1974 as well as two Super Bowls in 1968 and 1977.

Biletnikoff was MVP of Super Bowl XI in 1977 as a member of the winning team. He caught four passes for 79 yards, with three of those receptions setting up Raider touchdowns.

## He's Making a Career

He's not a household name yet, but the man who will soon become the "Ray Guy" of NFL punting is none other than 1982 Florida State graduate Rohn Stark. After four years in the NFL with the Indianapolis Colts, Stark can boast of a 45.2 career punting average and his latest honor, selection to the Pro Bowl in 1985 for the first time. Stark has now led the NFL in punting average twice—in 1983 (45.3) and 1985 (45.9). He has never had a punt blocked at the collegiate or pro level.

# How FSU's NFLers Fared in 1985



**Greg Allen** (Cleveland Browns)—Allen, in his rookie season after being taken in the second round of the draft, played in just seven games. He spent most of the season on the injured reserve list after undergoing some surgery on his knee that had bothered him most of his senior season at FSU. Allen did rush eight times for 32 yards.



**Ken Lanier** (Denver Broncos)—A full-time starter for the fourth year in 1985, Lanier gave Bronco quarterback John Elway good protection in 1985. The coaching staff notes that Lanier "is a physically strong player." His club is looking for more fine years from him in the future.



**Leon Bright** (Tampa Bay Buccaneers)—One of the most exciting return men in the game, Leon appeared in games solely as a kick and punt returner. He returned 11 kickoffs for a 22.4 average and 12 punts for a 10.3 average. The latter is a Bucs' record for punt return average with a minimum of 10 returns. Bright hurt a knee after eight games and was unable to return.



**Dennis McKinnon** (Chicago Bears)—McKinnon, of course, was one of the spark plugs in the Bears' Super Bowl Championship team. He had 31 catches for 555 yards, a 17.9 average, and seven touchdowns. His coach calls him "the best blocking receiver in the game." Unfortunately, McKinnon will miss the entire 1986 season while rehabilitating a knee that required surgery following the Super Bowl.



**Bobby Butler** (Atlanta Falcons)—A starter at cornerback, Butler recorded 43 solo tackles and 25 assists for a total of 68 tackles. He also was the Falcon leader in interceptions with five and broke up 21 passes.



**Zeke Mowatt** (New York Giants)—After a big year in 1984, third year man Mowatt spent the entire season on the injured reserve list.



**Alphonso Carreker** (Green Bay Packers)—Second year man Carreker, who attended FSU in the offseason to complete his degree, was a starter for the Packers at defensive tackle. He picked up 15 tackles and 16 assists for a total of 31 on the season. His eight sacks were the second best figure on the Green Bay defense and he also broke up three passes.



**Lee Nelson** (St. Louis Cardinals)—Following four seasons as a starter, Nelson, a nine-year veteran, was a reserve player with the Cardinal secondary.



**Harvey Clayton** (Pittsburgh Steelers)—Harvey was an off-and-on starter for the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1985, picking up 37 solo tackles and 13 assists for a total of 50.



**Rohn Stark** (Indianapolis Colts)—Florida State's all-time leading punter made the Pro Bowl team in his fourth season after leading the NFL with a 45.9 average on 78 punts. Stark's average was tops in the NFL by over two yards and set his club's single season mark. His longest punt was a 68-yarder and he downed 12 punts inside the 20-yard line.



**Jessie Hester** (Los Angeles Raiders)—The rookie wide receiver for the Raiders grabbed future Hall of Famer Cliff Branch's starting position and turned in a fabulous season. He caught 32 passes for 665 yards, a 20.8 average, and four touchdowns, scored one touchdown rushing and had the Raiders' long gain of the year with a 59-yard reception. Hester is attending FSU in the offseason to obtain his degree.



**Weegie Thompson** (Pittsburgh Steelers)—Second year man Weegie, playing the third and fourth receiver positions for the Black and Gold, picked up eight catches for 138 yards, a 17.3 average, and one TD.



**Bobby Jackson** (New York Jets)—A starter in the Jets' secondary, Jackson had 26 solo tackles and 11 assists for a total of 37 in 1985. He also tied for the team lead in interceptions with four and broke up nine passes.

Florida State University is seeing many more of its athletes participating on the pro level and succeeding on that level. Last year was a banner year for the Seminoles, who had former athlete and coach Dick Howser win baseball's World Series as head coach of the Kansas City Royals; wide receiver Dennis McKinnon as a starter for the Super Bowl champion Chicago Bears; and sixth-man Mitchell Wiggins competing in the NBA finals for the Houston Rockets.
