# MEDIA INFO

**CREDENTIAL REQUESTS:** All requests for working press, radio, television, photographer or scouting credentials should be directed to Sports Information Director Wayne Hogan no later than one week prior to the game. Requests for season credentials should be made two weeks prior to the first game.

Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

Florida State's press box is located on the west side of Doak Campbell Stadium with elevator service to all levels. Media representatives and scouts should enter through the press gate, located north of the elevator. The Will Call booth, where media can pick up credentials anytime after 4:00 p.m. on game days, is located outside the gate at the base of the elevator. Will Call credentials will also be available in the Sports Information Office on Fridays prior to games or at the Ramada Inn-West hospitality room from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. on game days.

**PRESS POLICIES:** Working press will be admitted to Level 5, where approximately 90 seats are available. Credentials are issued by FSU according to the following criteria:

- Local newspapers, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponent's area and student newspapers from FSU and opponent's school.
- Other daily newspapers with preference to those which regularly cover FSU.
- Scouts.
- Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those which have regularly covered FSU.
- Radio and television personnel not actually broadcasting, but considered reporting (seats will be provided in the stands).

**RADIO-TV:** The sixth level of the press box is designated for use by radio and television broadcasting crews and home and visiting coaches. Each booth is fully enclosed and sound proof.

**PHOTOGRAPHERS:** Only accredited photographers or freelance photographers shooting for the FSU Sports Information Office will be issued working credentials.

The press box catwalk, or photo deck, offers an unobstructed view for TV and movie cameras. Holders of a photo deck pass will be assigned space in that area. Still photographers will not be admitted to the press box and may have access to the sidelines only. Those holding a still photography credential should report to the gate specified on the pass where they will be issued an armband, a set of rosters and a box lunch. A photographers' lounge area with tables and chairs will be made available.

Special requests for photographers whose assignments warrant shooting from the photo deck may be made to Sports Information Director Wayne Hogan.

**PRESS PARKING:** Parking is limited and passes will be issued on a priority basis within the same guidelines as working credentials. The press lot is located on the southwest corner of Doak Campbell Stadium. Access to the lot should be made from Stadium Drive.

**STATISTICAL SERVICES:** Play-by-play, half-time and complete statistics will be provided. Post-game quotes from FSU head coach Bobby Bowden and the visiting coach will also be available.

**REFRESHMENTS:** A light pre-game meal will be served on Level 6 of the press box at approximately 6:00 p.m. Refreshments will also be made available throughout the game.

**TELEPHONES:** Telephone service for the FSU press box should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Florida in Tallahassee (904/681-6600). Have them contact the Sports Information Office for location. Due to deregulation, media members must bring their own phones. Centel will provide lines only. When contacting Centel, please be specific as to the type of line you need (i.e. touchtone, etc.)

**TELECOPIERS:** An independent telecopier service will be available for each game with a nominal fee being charged. Please contact the Sports Information Office in advance. If you plan to use your own telecopier and

## To the Media and Fans:



**MID-WEEK INTERVIEWS:** Media interviews with all FSU players should be arranged through the Sports Information Office. For phone interviews, the SID office will fill out a card informing the player to return the call. All player calls to the media will be made collect.

Anyone wishing to schedule an interview with head coach Bobby Bowden should contact his secretary, Sue Hall, at (904) 644-1465.

**BREAKFAST WITH BOBBY:** Following each and every Seminole home game, head coach Bobby Bowden will join the media Sunday morning for breakfast at the Ramada Inn-West (press headquarters). Breakfast will be served at 8:30 a.m. with a question and answer session beginning at 8:45 a.m.

**CONFERENCE CALL:** Media members may contact Bowden for follow-up material via a 3:00 p.m. Sunday conference call on road game weekends. Contact a member of the Sports Information Office to be put on the master list.

**ROAD GAME CREDENTIALS:** Writers covering Florida State may make requests for road credentials with the opponent school or with the FSU Sports Information Office by Monday of game week.

## POST-GAME INTERVIEW POLICY

Florida State University's athletic staff is well aware of the importance of media coverage and is briefed continually on the role of the media insofar as it interacts with their respective duties. At no time is this cooperation more important than in our post-game interview and locker room procedures. To insure the most workable situation for members of the media and for the FSU staff the following procedures *must* be observed:

**1** Entrance to the Florida State locker room can be made *only* through the second floor interview room. All members of the media will be directed to this room by the FSU sports information staff immediately at the conclusion of the game. It is most helpful if all media personnel assemble at the tunnel entrance in the north end zone immediately at game's end. You will *not* be allowed access to the locker room through the player's entrance so follow closely.

**2** Florida State coach Bobby Bowden will be brought directly to the interview room as soon as he dismisses the team and declares the locker room open.

**3** When Coach Bowden makes his appearance in the interview room, those media members wishing to go to the locker room will be

instructed as to the proper route. Down one flight of stairs leads directly into the player dressing area.

**4** FLORIDA STATE'S LOCKER ROOM IS OPEN TO ALL MEDIA MEMBERS, MALE AND FEMALE, HOWEVER, IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT FEMALE REPORTERS INFORM FSU INFORMATION PERSONNEL DURING THE GAME THAT THEY WILL NEED LOCKER ROOM ACCESS. (FSU players have been assured that they will be told on a game-by-game basis when there will be female reporters in the locker room—a courtesy we feel must be extended.)

**5** Exit from the locker room and access back to the press box can be made through the player's entrance to the stadium.

It is our desire at Florida State to make the post-game procedures as painless as possible for both the media and our staff. Remember, both groups have important tasks and are under extreme pressure.

The Florida State Athletic Department cannot and will not be responsible for problems incurred by any media member not following the above procedure. Security personnel will facilitate only those following the proper guidelines. If, however, you encounter a problem while following this procedure from any member of our staff or security, please inform a sports information staff member immediately.

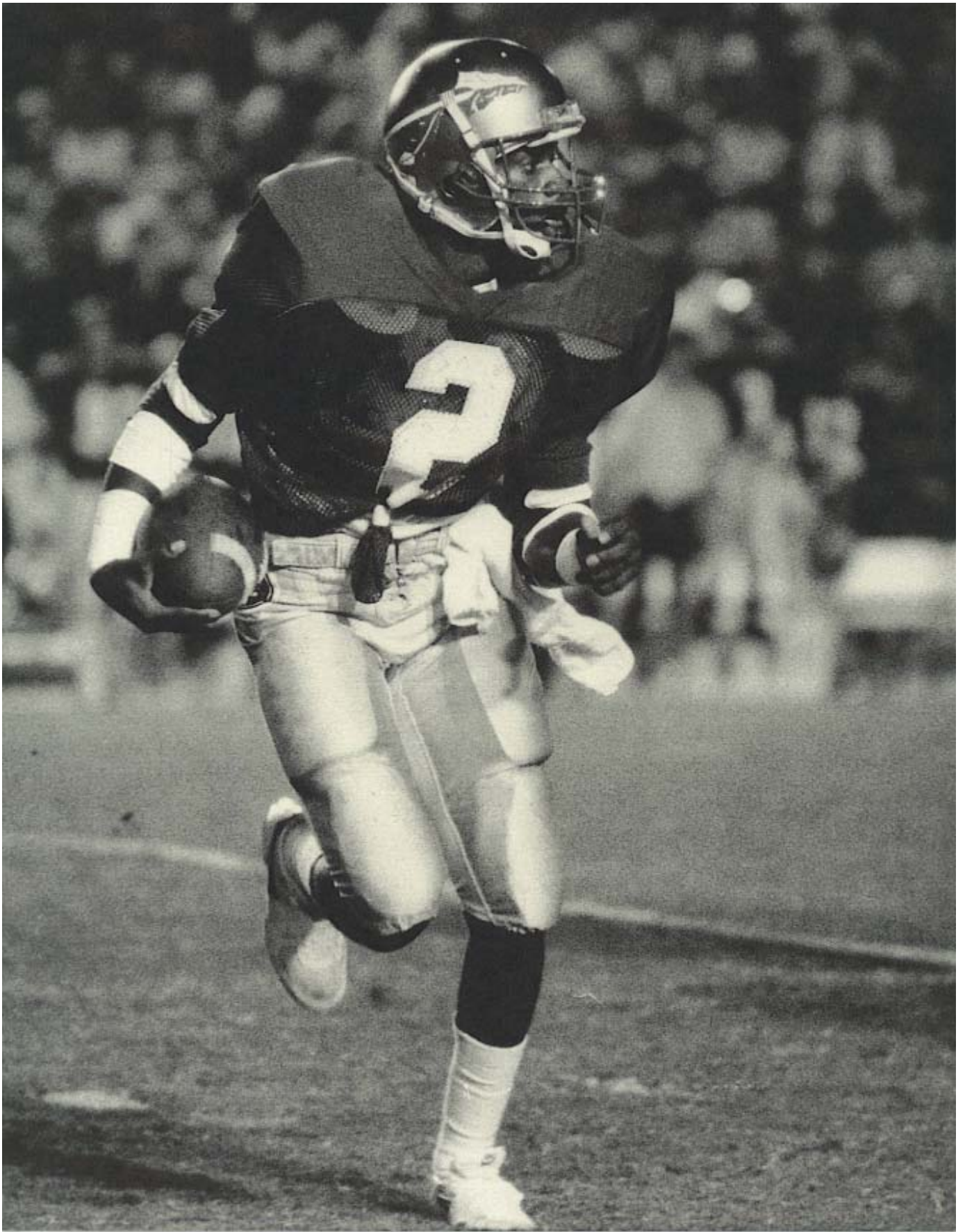

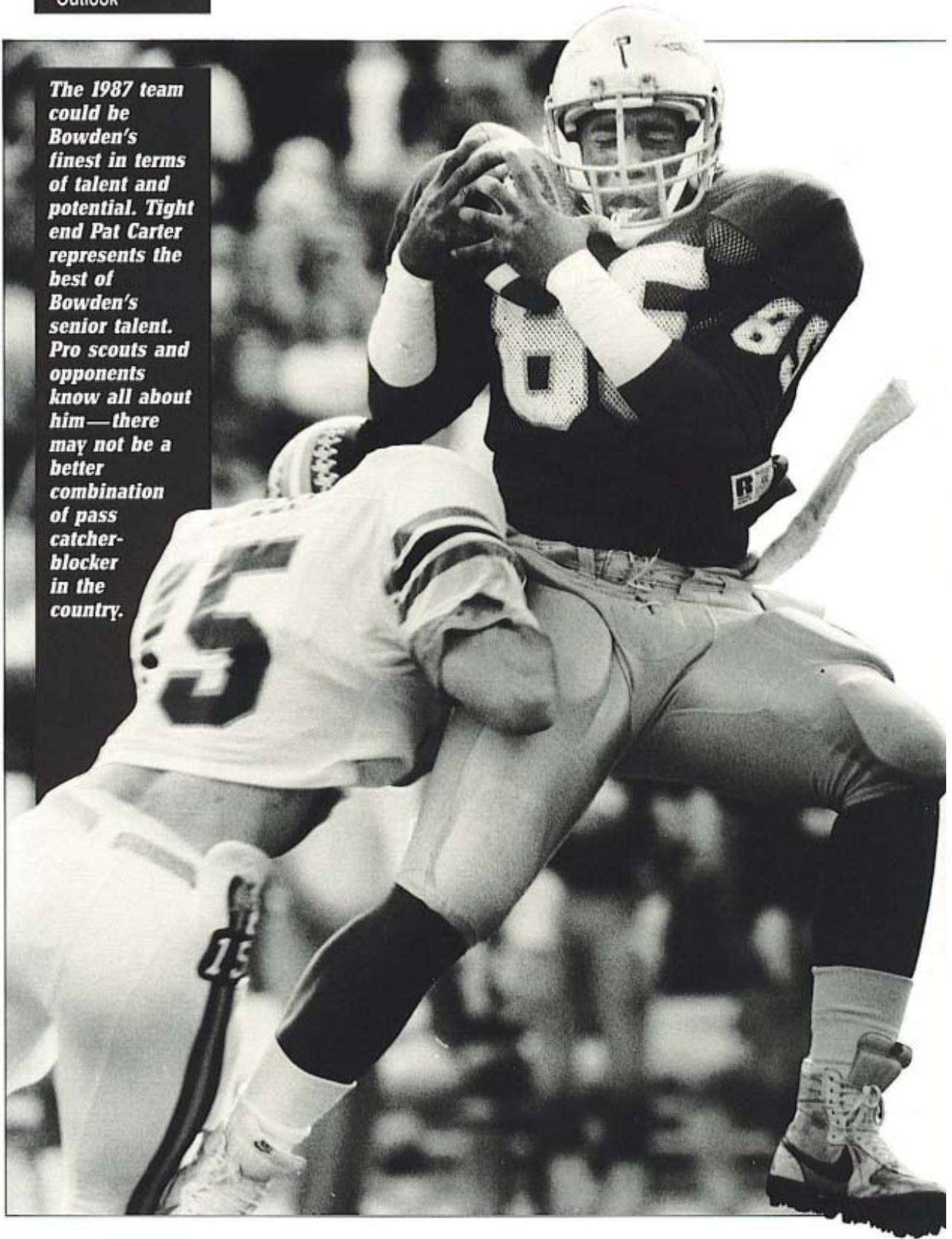

# OUTLOOK: LOOK OUT!

**Po-ten-tial** (adj. fr. L. power, fr. potent-, potens) 1: existing in possibility; capable of developing into actuality. 2: expressing possibility.

**Op-ti-mism** (n, F optimism, fr. L optimum) 1: a doctrine that this world is the best possible world. 2: an inclination to put the most favorable construction upon actions and happenings and to anticipate the best possible outcome.

Webster gives us a little assistance in defining those two words that are so often used by those of us in the world of sports. Perhaps at no time in Bobby Bowden's 11 previous seasons at Florida State have those two words been as meaningful as they are heading into the 1987 football season.

Bowden has never been one to pull a lot of punches. He always tells it just as it is.

"We have the potential to challenge for a national championship here at Florida State," said the 57-year-old coach, whose win-loss record alone puts him among the best in the business. "Listen carefully," he warns. "I said we have the P-O-T-E-N-T-I-A-L. That's a long way from having a lock on it."

But a coach with a team filled with that kind of potential can have only one feeling—optimism. That word, in fact, would sum up nicely the feeling running rampant around the entire Seminole camp in 1987.

Things seem a bit different this year than in previous seasons. For one thing, you don't necessarily need the proverbial program to tell the players this year. Eighteen—count 'em—18 starters return off last year's squad. And taking it a step further, 42 of the top 50 players from a year ago are back in uniform.

That adds up to a whole heap of experience around the teepee. Oh you know that word:

**Ex-pe-ri-ence** (n, fr. L experientia, fr. experient-, experire) 1: knowledge, skill of practice derived from direct observation of or participation in events.

"We are an experienced team," said Bowden. "That doesn't automatically make you a great team. There's still a lot of room for improvement. What it means is that you can spend time on other things rather than having to start from the ground floor."

One of the things it allowed the Seminole coaches to do was to spend much of their time last spring evaluating the young reserves. Bowden, in fact, excused some nine fifth-year seniors from spring drills. Also excused were tailbacks Sammie Smith (track) and Victor Floyd (baseball), defensive back Deion Sanders (baseball), and wide receiver Ronald Lewis (baseball).

Bowden says he got the idea of excusing the five-year people from Penn State's Joe Paterno.

"I've thought about doing it for a long time but I didn't have the guts," said the FSU coach. "When I saw that Paterno had done it I figured he's not a bad guy to follow.

"Seriously," he went on, "there's not a whole lot more those guys are gonna get by going through another spring. Secondly, it gives you a chance to get those young guys a lot more reps. They're the ones who we really needed to look at. We feel we accomplished a great deal last spring."

While it seems miniscule up against most off-seasons, Bowden did spend a good deal of his time looking to fill the four vacated spots. On defense, two veterans—linebacker Fred Jones and defensive tackle Gerald Nichols—have departed. Nichols was a seventh-round draft pick of the New York Jets and Jones will certainly make a run at somebody's roster going the free agency route.

"You don't forget those guys overnight," said Bowden. "I don't care what you've got coming in to replace them. You're looking at three years worth of starts at those two positions."

On offense, center Jim Hendley is gone and junior wide receiver Darrin Holloman opted to forego his senior season to pursue a career in the Air Force.

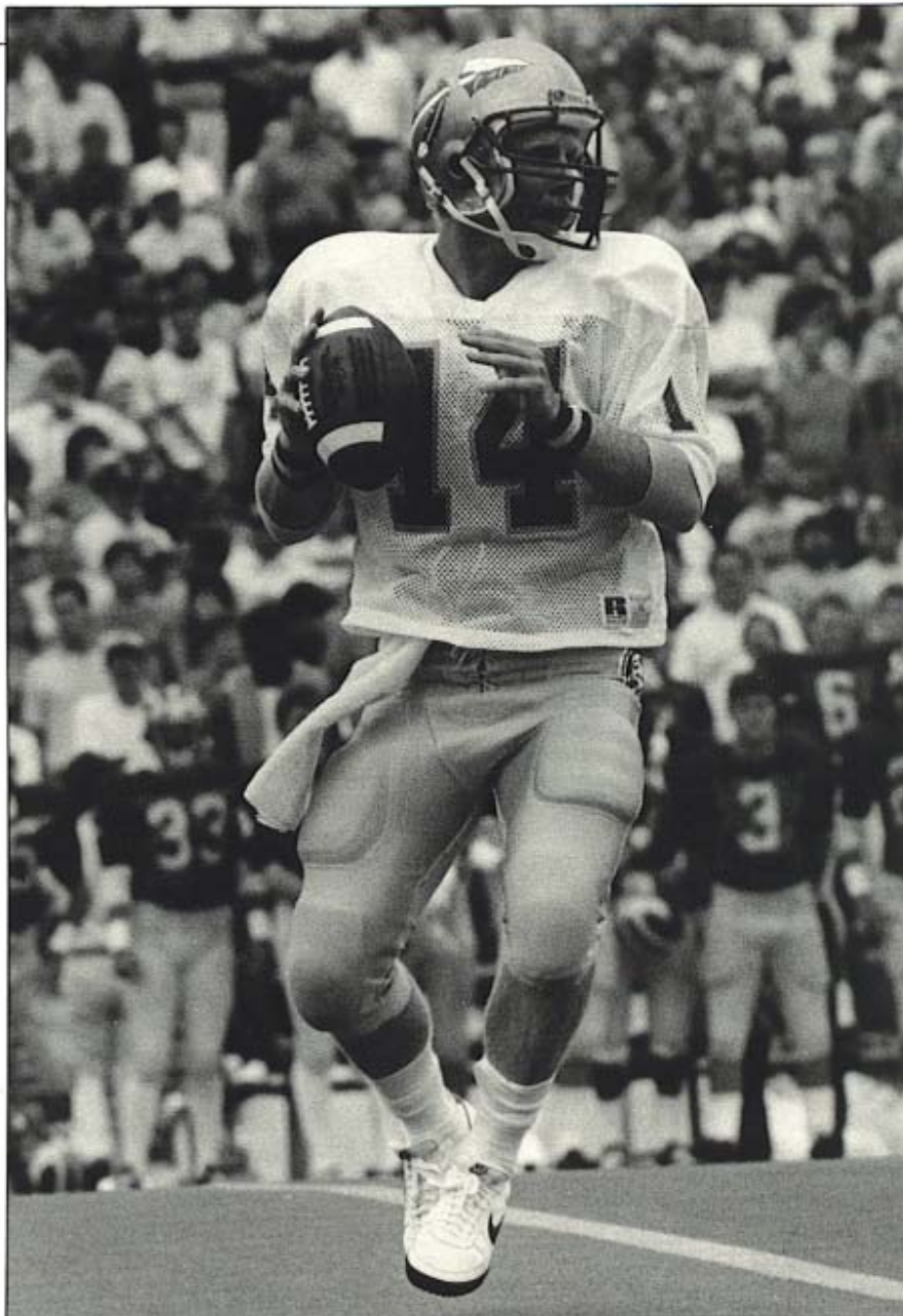
While those players, too, will be missed, Bowden has several options at center and Holloman may not have left had the receiving corps not been loaded with returning talent. In short, the offense really shouldn't miss a beat.

High hopes have been heaped on the shoulders of Smith, a sophomore in '87, who has been much ballyhooed since signing with FSU in 1985. Injuries and adjustment problems slowed him for the better part of his two seasons, but near the end of 1986, Smith suddenly emerged. He capped his freshman year with

a brilliant 205-yard performance and the MVP trophy in the All-American Bowl. The Seminoles are a solid four-deep at tailback as if Sammie's not enough. Returning starter Dayne Williams and a host of competitors at fullback have coaches so comfortable that they moved steady back-up David Palmer to defense for 1987.

Those people will line up behind three seasoned quarterbacks. Danny McManus begins his fifth year at FSU and Chip Ferguson and Peter Tom Willis have both been to war. Not in recent memory has Florida

State been as comfortable at this spot. A healthy McManus for 12 games could be a real key, though, as the offense has a history of hitting on all cylinders with him in the game.

The Seminole offensive line, shocked early last year by the death of starter Pablo Lopez, struggled for half a season to find itself. By year's end, though, it became a very good front. Except for Hendley, the line returns intact. It'll be anchored by 300-pound giant Pat Tomberlin at one tackle.

Tomberlin will line up right next to one of the best

tight ends in the college game. Senior Pat Carter will be on everybody's draft list next spring. Carter can catch the football, but his expertise as a blocker has become widely respected. The Sammie Smiths of the world can find plenty of places to hide running behind that tandem.

Florida State's defensive front may be the biggest question mark. The nose position is totally up in the air. Returning starter Thomas Harp may not make his grades, and three players without a minute of game experience are listed at the position. Lamar Williams and Magdi El Shahawy did go through spring practice, but Greg Rinehart, a Proposition 48 sophomore and a natural tackle, hasn't put on an FSU uniform yet. The Seminoles may need to draw from the defensive tackle position to fill the void. Left tackle Steve Gabbard returns as the only starter. However, a group including 6-4 sophomore letterman Eric Hayes is talented. While Hayes is trying to recover from a broken ankle that he suffered in the spring, senior Bart Schuets and junior Eric Krohn will get a look.

Experience is not a problem on the rest of the defensive unit. Paul McGowan is one of the best linebackers in Florida State history. A top candidate for the Dick Butkus Award (he finished 7th as a junior), McGowan will likely lead the team in tackles for the third year in a row. Bowden could go with any of four other linebackers at any given time. One of those four will get the nod as Jones' replacement.

Both starters return at outside linebacker and competition is so strong at this spot that they will have one heck of a battle just to hold their jobs.

All of Florida State's defensive backs return en masse. Deion Sanders is a pre-season All-American as a junior and he's destined to be everybody's first team pick before he's finished. You could even go one more down on the depth chart at each position in this secondary and find a player with some game experience.

Derek Schmidt will be the Seminole place kicker for the fourth year in a row. He'll more than likely own every FSU kicking record by the end of the season.

Rick Tuten, who punted the 1983 Miami Hurricanes to a national championship, will try to do the same at FSU. Tuten transferred and has waited in the wings behind Louis Berry to get to punt in garnet and gold in his final college campaign.

Blocking punts and returning punts have both been on the FSU agenda of late. Two years ago, the Seminoles led the world in the first category and are always a threat to smother an opponent's punt. Since Sanders stepped on the campus, a word "return" has also sneaked back into the vocabulary. The junior's dazzling runbacks have contributed to his All-American look.

Keith Ross and Dexter Carter should handle kick returns. It was that tandem that surprised the nation with a razzle-dazzle lateral touchdown return vs. Miami on national television in 1986. Both are capable of busting loose at any time.

"We have the foundation," says Bowden. "There's no question we've got the horses. But there are always those intangibles. You've got to keep your key people healthy, you've got to have the ball bounce your way. It takes a certain amount of luck."

A look to the 1987 schedule shows four major showdowns that will separate a good year from a great one. An early-season match-up at Michigan State against Heisman hopeful Lorenzo White and company will be a true test. Miami visits Tallahassee at mid-season and late road dates at Auburn and Florida could derail any team not playing 100 percent.

If everything falls into place as Bowden hopes it could spell just one thing for 1987 . . . S-U-C-C-E-S-S.

**Suc-cess** (n, L. *successus*, fr. *successus*, pp. of *succedere*) 1: a favorable termination of a venture, specifically: the attainment of wealth, favor or eminence.

Only one team will reach the ultimate attainment at the end of the 1987 season. If nothing else, the '87 Seminoles should at least be in the running.

Senior Herb Gainer (right) led the 1986 team in receptions and could join three other Seminole wide receivers in the NFL following the season. Coaches believe that fellow senior Randy White will have his best season at the flanker position. They also expect to get the ball to sophomore Ronald Lewis, who missed the spring workouts while playing on the baseball team. All the wideouts will surely see some of Chip Ferguson at quarterback since Fergy actually has more game experience than starter Danny McManus.

**QUARTERBACK** Head coach Bobby Bowden feels good about this position and with good reason. Back are three quarterbacks with game experience—all have starts under their belts. Senior Danny McManus has all the tools and he also has that intangible leadership quality that sets him out front of junior Chip Ferguson and sophomore Peter Tom Willis. Keeping McManus healthy will be on Bowden's wish list; not since the 1981 season has the 12th-year head man been able to go through an entire season with the same starting quarterback in every game. McManus has impressive numbers for half seasons, but he has yet to put together a full one. Ferguson actually has more game experience than McManus, and Willis is still finding himself. Big smiles for Bowden at quarterback.

**TAILBACK** Things only get better at this position. The Seminoles certainly have had their share of outstanding tailbacks in the '80s. The 1987 group is no different. The headliner is Sammie Smith, the 6-2, 220-pound Freshman All-American from a year ago. Already he has rushed for close to 850 yards in his career, including two 100+ yard games. His durability has been a question mark because of the pounding he takes but a look at his backups put the concerns to rest. Consider for a moment that SECOND teamer Victor Floyd was the leading rusher of 1986 and that he is just 112 yards shy of becoming the 10th most productive back in FSU history. Floyd will see plenty of playing time. The other two fellas aren't bad themselves—junior Keith Ross is one of the nation's outstanding kick return men and he has rushed for a 100-yard game in his career. Sophomore Dexter Carter got all the reps in the spring and he looks like he'll be a dandy in the future. Keeping four young men happy may be Bowden's biggest concern here—but the head man has even come up with a solution to that problem. Don't count out the Seminoles' running two tailbacks out of the split back formation every now and then.

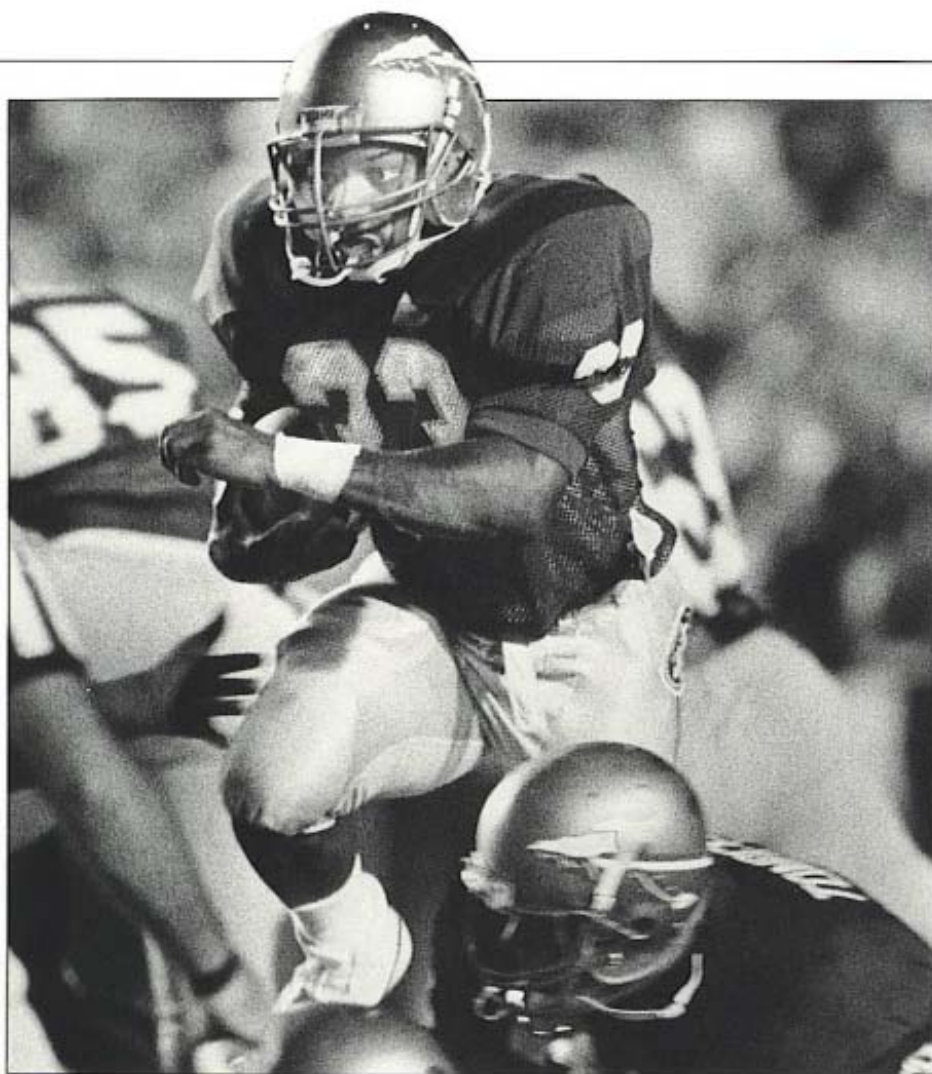
**FULLBACK** This position will be one that coaches will monitor closely in the fall. Dayne Williams, who got four starts a year ago, is the starter. His backup is Stanley Hall, a redshirt freshman with no game experience. If the outlook seems gray, hold on a minute. The coaching staff is counting on 6-1, 240-pound j.c. transfer Marion Butts to graduate this

summer and head to Seminole territory. Butts is reputed to be the bruiser that FSU is looking for. A bright freshman class includes three fullbacks who come with outstanding credentials—coaches could ask Chris Parker, Edgar Bennett or Paul Moore to contribute in their freshman seasons. A few question marks with regards to depth and experience, but the position looks solid.

**WIDE RECEIVER** One of the two starters, Darrin Holloman, elected to pass up his fifth year at FSU. But looking past Holloman are a fleet of nine returning receivers. Senior Herb Gainer returns as 1986's leading receiver (27 catches) at the split end position. Fellow senior Randy White has won the flanker job. Sophomores Terry Anthony and Ronald Lewis both played as true freshmen last year and will undoubtedly rotate with Gainer and White during games. A pair of third-year sophomores—Scott DiMare and Pat White—have seen game action. After this group of six, three more receivers figure. Redshirt freshman Lawrence Dawsey had a good spring and worked himself up to a second-team flanker spot ahead of Lewis, who played baseball. A pair of Proposition 48 sophomores—Felton Cook and Bruce LaSane—have promising credentials. The coaching staff shouldn't even have to dip into the freshman ranks where they came up with speedster Ed Smith this year.

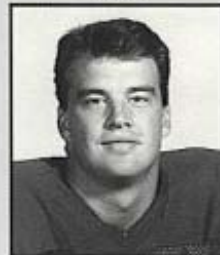

**TIGHT END**

Deep and experienced once again. Leading the way is 6-4, 258-pound All-American candidate Pat Carter, who doesn't have all-star statistics but could be the best combination of catcher/blocker in the country. The pro scouts know about him and certainly FSU opponents do too. Backup Tom O'Malley totaled the same 16 catches as Carter and he'll see plenty of playing time. Third teamer Gaylon White broke his ankle vs. Miami a year ago, ending his season early. It has been said that O'Malley or White would start at any other Division I school. That's not all the good news, however. A pair

of redshirt freshmen have shown great promise—dependable Dave Roberts and speedster Reggie Johnson, who most likely will be used in third and long situations. The tight end position gets five stars.

**OFFENSIVE TACKLE**

Two starters return here, but it's backup help that has offensive coordinator Wayne McDuffie worried. At tight tackle is huge 300-pound Pat Tomberlin, an All-American candidate. At the split tackle is Joe Ionata, a starter for eight games last year. Backing up Tomberlin are sophomore John Brown and junior Anthony Johnson. Brown has limited game experience and Johnson is learning the position after three years on the defense. Behind Ionata at the split side are a pair of freshman redshirt candidates—Eric Luallen and Jack Allen—both have no game experience. This position will need some attention in the fall.

Huge Pat Tomberlin (right, inset) at 6-3, 300 pounds, anchors the offensive line. Guard Jason Kuipers secured a starting position in 1986 and steady senior Mark Salva has moved over to center. On the defensive side of the ball, only eight players in FSU history have more interceptions than cornerback Eric Williams (right). Fellow fifth-year senior Terry Warren led last year's squad in quarterback sacks with five.

**OFFENSIVE GUARD** Jason Kuipers returns as a starter at the split guard position while the other position is up for grabs since incumbent starter Mark Salva has been switched to center. Offensive coordinator Wayne McDuffie is expecting freshman redshirt Hayward Haynes to step to the forefront and take the tight guard job in the fall. Should he not respond, Kuipers could be moved over to the position and freshman redshirt Ronnie Byrom, currently Kuipers' backup at split guard, would slide up and start there. Junior Tony Yeomans fits into a backup role here. Come fall, the guard positions will be a major area of concern.



**CENTER** Stability is the key here although starter Jim Hendley graduated. Senior Mark Salva, the line's best athlete, has moved from guard and he's got a firm hold on the starting job. His backup is capable Michael Tanks, who got in some game experience last year at the position. Versatile Tony Yeomans would be the third teamer.

## THE DEFENSE

**OUTSIDE LINEBACKER** Both starters return and both are being pushed to retain their jobs. That can't help but please position coach Jim Gladden. The starters are Terry Warren, the team's leader in quarterback sacks a year ago with five, and Felton Hayes, who tailed off as the season went on. Applying for their jobs are Shelton Thompson and Kevin Grant, a pair of third year sophs. Junior Phil



Carollo provides an able backup on the Hayes-Grant side and freshman redshirt Anthony Moss on the Warren-Thompson side. The position should be improved from 1986.

**DEFENSIVE TACKLE**

Although one starter returns in left tackle—Steve Gabbard—both positions are up for grabs. Departed right tackle starter Gerald Nichols certainly was the line's anchor last year and someone needs to step forward to take the challenge. Gabbard started 10 of the 11 regular season games at the left slot and he had a good spring. However, if 6-4, 292-pound giant Eric Hayes can translate his potential into play, he'll push Gabbard. At right tackle, a smallish (238 pounds) Bart Schucts won the job based on spring performance, but position coach Chuck Amato is waiting for 6-3, 268-pound Eric Krohn, his best athlete, to come to the front. Tall freshman Scott Schilbrack will tutor in 1987 as a backup but Proposition 48 sophomore Greg Rinehart, the biggest Seminole at 6-3, 300+ pounds, may be able to contribute early. Overall, some questions remain, but it could be a solid position for FSU.

**NOSEGUARD**

This is it. The most unstable position on the Seminole team is noseguard. Academic problems have a question mark by the name of 1986 starter Thomas Harp, and Chris Miller, who had won the job in the spring, won't return after getting into trouble with the law. That could leave a pair of redshirt freshmen at the position; neither Magdi El Shahawy or Lamar Williams has played a down of college football. A few possibilities exist here if Harp doesn't make his grades. One is that Williams or El Shahawy will emerge as a surprise. A second is that one of the tackles—probably Gabbard, Hayes or Rinehart—will move over and start. Hayes played some nose in a game last season. Big question marks remain in this critical situation for the defensive staff.

**INSIDE LINEBACKER**

There's good news and potentially good news here. Florida State Butkus candidate Paul McGowan is the good news—he's one of the finest hitters to ever wear the Garnet and Gold and has led the team in tackles and tackles for loss (21 in his career) for two years. But McGowan's partner, Fred Jones, is gone, and with him the experience that FSU has enjoyed for a pair of years. Stepping into his position is John Eaford, a junior, who is long on talent. Eaford is getting plenty of competition from sophomore Odell Haggins, another talented player. The two lack only



game experience. Perhaps the biggest surprise of the spring was senior David Palmer, a fullback for three seasons who was switched over here. Palmer is currently third team behind Eaford and Haggins, but he could find himself moved over behind McGowan. Keith Carter and Brian Davis are backups with limited game experience. If the potential blooms, the inside linebacker position will be a plus for the defense.

**SAFETY**

Where do you play all of them? Both starters return as do their backups. A host of young players are itching to contribute. At strong safety, two-year starter and junior Stan Shiver is a gem. He's the hardest hitter on the defense. The free safety position is held down by fifth-year senior Greg Newell, a two-year starter. Newell does have some strong competition behind him—four are waiting in the wings. First, there's sophomore Dedrick Dodge, last year's nickel back, who is ready to play. Behind him is John Hadley, a junior-to-be. And still waiting are freshman redshirt Bill Ragans, who made good progress in the spring, and Proposition 48 sophomore LeRoy Butler, probably the best player FSU signed in 1986. Backing up Shiver at strong safety will once again be Alphonso Williams. Redshirt freshman John Wyche is still learning. Count the safety positions as among the strongest on the squad.

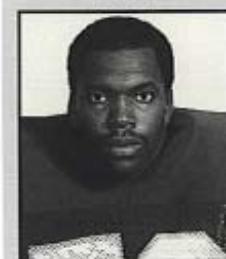

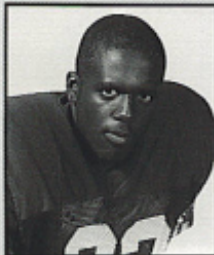
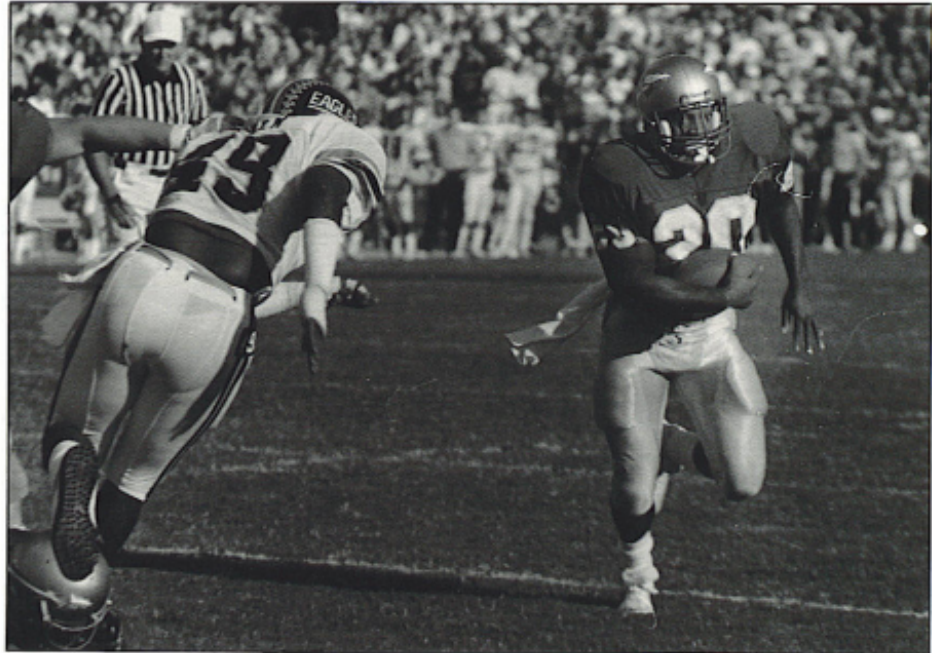

**CORNERBACK** Here's the deepest and most experienced position on the defense. Throw four names into a bag and you can pick two starters, says defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews. Start with All-American Deion Sanders, last year's leader in interceptions with four. Sanders combines his defensive abilities with dazzling punt returns to make a case for All-American honors once again. The second starter would most likely be Eric Williams, a fifth-year senior who has already started for most of two seasons. He has 10 career interceptions that rank 10th on the FSU all-time list. Two other names that could pop out of the bag are fifth-year senior Martin Mayhew, a sometimes starter for two years, and junior Tracy Sanders, a player who has finally found his niche at corner. Four deep only applies to the starting situation. There's more. Junior John Parks switched to corner in the spring and Andrews says he's ready to contribute, too. Redshirt freshman Corian Freeman is still learning the position and senior Curtis Thomas, returning from an illness, has some game experience. Nothing but pleasant problems for Coach Bowden and his staff; the corner position has depth and talent to boot.

## THE KICKING GAME

**THE KICKERS** This part of Bobby Bowden's attack is solid. Returning for his senior year is placement specialist Derek Schmidt,

who was recruited three years ago to do exactly the job he has done. With his first points of the 1987 season, he will become FSU's all-time scoring leader; before the season is over he will own just about every other kicking record. Incoming freshman Richie Andrews would most likely be a redshirt candidate, and his credentials are much like Schmidt's were three years ago. Punter Rick Tuten is in his first year handling the chores of graduated Louis Berry, but he proved in 1983 and 1984 at the University of Miami that he is a capable replacement for FSU's second all-time leading punter. Andrews is also a punter should injuries creep up. If the kicking game is the deciding factor in many games, count a few wins on the FSU side this fall.
