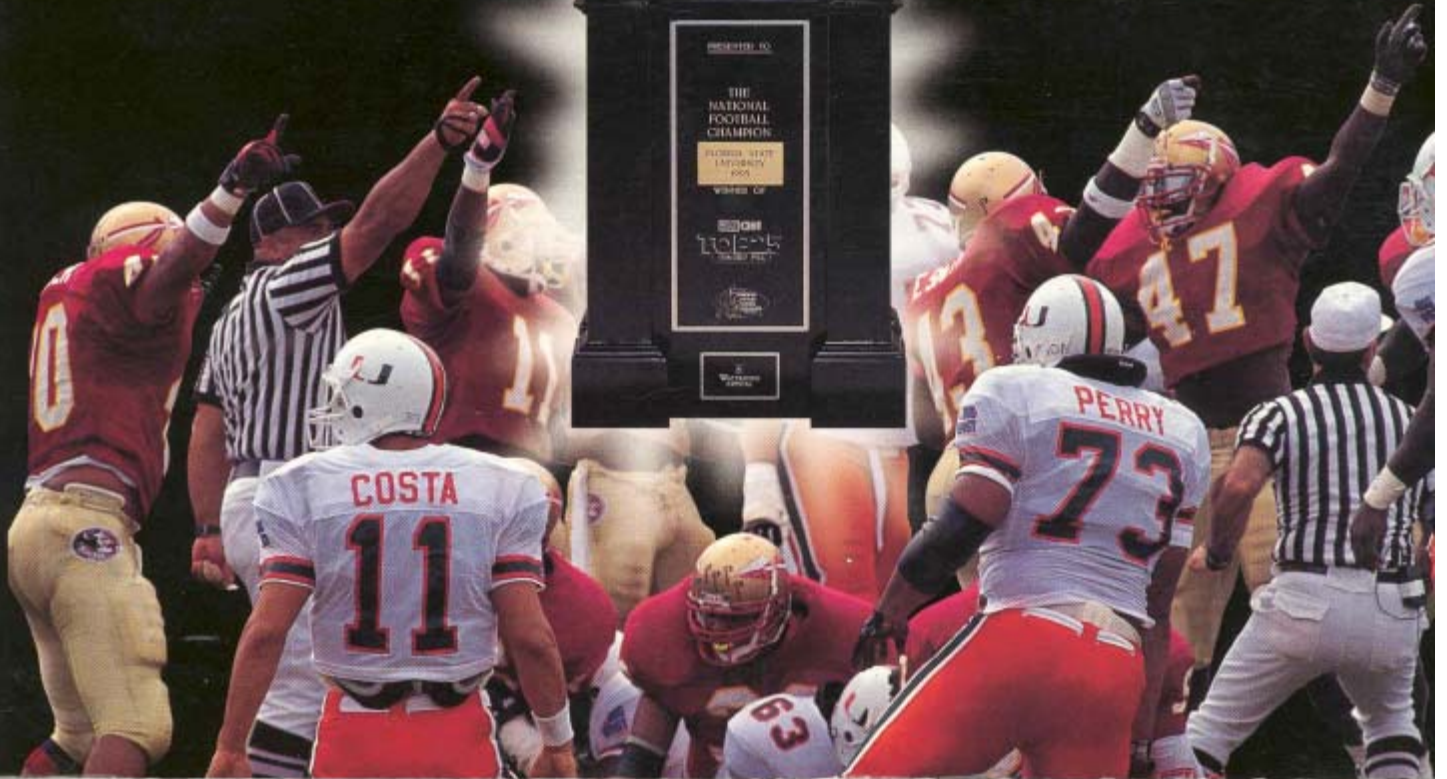

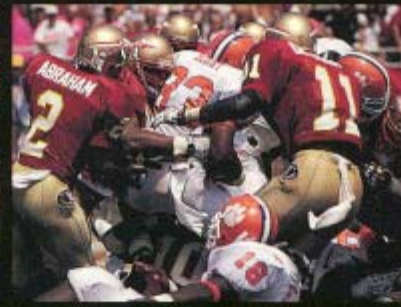

Florida State began the 1993 season constantly reminded that no team since 1985 had started the season number one and finished national champions. Bobby Bowden and his Seminoles had been ranked among the AP Top Four six consecutive years, and were predicting another run at the title. The first steps on the road to a championship came on the blistering turf of the Meadowlands. The excitement, pain and pressure would continue for 13 grueling games. Until, in a steamy Orange Bowl locker room, FSU players and coaches gathered in an exhausted hug with the school's first ever national championship. It was a season of irony that brought FSU faithful their coveted trophy. An inexperienced defense held Kansas out of the endzone on 12 consecutive plays in the Kickoff Classic and would hold four opponents scoreless during the season. For the first

time in three years, college football's most important rivalry would not come down to a kick as the Seminoles topped the Hurricanes in Tallahassee. FSU would fall just one play and 14 yards short of a perfect season. But the loss in the "Game of the Century" at Notre Dame cost the Tribe their top spot for just one week. Once the dust had settled on the regular season, FSU had another perfect ACC record along with its second title and, finally, a chance at a national championship. For the fourth time in six years, Nebraska and Florida State would meet on New Year's Day. It ended, fittingly, with Charlie Ward, deftly guiding his offense on a last minute drive against a splendid Nebraska defense that culminated in a kick that would not sail wide RIGHT, but split the uprights and give the Seminoles their first national championship. Florida State fans have enjoyed great success in their 46-year football history and now they celebrate a National Championship.

noles rank sixth all-time in bowl winning percentage with a



13-7-2 record. 🏆 With nine straight victories, FSU owns the NCAA record for bowl wins in consecutive seasons. Florida State's 12 straight bowl games without a loss is also an NCAA record. 🏆 Florida State Head Coach Bobby Bowden is the first coach



in Division I history to compile seven straight 10-win seasons. 🏆 Four Seminole defensive players have finished in the Top 10 in balloting for the Heisman Trophy. 🏆 Individually, Florida State players have earned consensus All-America recognition 14 times, including eight in the past seven years. 🏆 The Seminole trophy case is getting full, too. Florida State players have earned two Jim Thorpe Awards, two Butkus Awards, two Unitas Golden Arm Awards, a Lombardi, and the



Heisman. Seminole players are regularly named finalists for these honors and others. 🏆 These are just a few examples of FSU's winning tradition, a tradition passed from team to team and player to player that builds with each passing season. 🏆

Florida State University may have one of the shortest traditions in college football, in years. But in terms of quality, success and excellence — in its All-Americans, its many bowl teams, its hall of fame selections and its national award winners — Seminole football boasts a tradition few schools can match.

1994 MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

All requests for working press, radio, television, photography or scouting credentials should be directed to Football Media Relations Director Rob Wilson no later than one week prior to the game. Requests for season credentials should be made at least two weeks prior to the first game.

Space for the working press, radio and television is allocated by the FSU Sports Information Office.

Florida State's press box is located on the west side of Doak Campbell Stadium with elevator service to all levels. Media representatives should enter through the press gate, located next to the elevator. The Will Call booth, where media can pick up credentials on game days, is located outside the gate at the base of the elevator. Will Call credentials will also be available in the Sports Information Office on Fridays prior to home games.

PRESS POLICIES

Working press will be admitted to Level 5, where approximately 90 seats are available. Credentials are issued by FSU according to the following criteria:

1. State newspapers by circulation, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponents' area, and student newspapers from FSU and opponents' schools.
2. Other daily newspapers with preference to those which regularly cover FSU.
3. Radio and television personnel not broadcasting, but considered report-

ing (seats may be provided in the stands and locker room access granted).

4. Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those which regularly cover FSU.
5. Scouts.

Freelance and/or non-daily writers may be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. In some cases, these materials will be required as verification of the writers' status. Your cooperation and understanding is requested in such instances.

MEDIA HEADQUARTERS

The official FSU media headquarters hotel for the 1994 home football season is the Ramada Inn - North. It is located at North Monroe Street (U.S. 27 North) and I-10. Most media functions, including the Sunday morning "Breakfast with Bobby," will be held there.

The Florida State University Sports Information Office has a number of rooms set aside for accredited media represen-

tatives during home game weekends. Contact Debbie Crews of the Sports Information Office (904/644-1402) to make arrangements for these rooms. Priority is determined in the same manner spelled out above under "Press Policies."

[SPECIAL NOTE — Media reservations for the Ramada Inn - North on home game weekends will require a TWO NIGHT MINIMUM. There will be no exceptions. The 1994 rate is \$85 per night on football weekends. When reserving a room through FSU, it will be necessary to give us a credit card number to guarantee the room.]

Florida State also maintains a minimal number of rooms for the media at the team headquarters for all road games. Check with Crews for information on availability of these rooms.

RADIO-TV

The sixth level of the press box is designated for use by radio and television broadcasting crews and home and visiting coaches. Each booth is fully enclosed and sound proof.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Only accredited photographers and those shooting for the FSU Sports Information Office will be issued working credentials.

Florida State reserves the right to admit only those photographers deemed to be on the premises for legitimate media purposes. All photographers working FSU games should be prepared to show a media ID card and equipment designed to photograph major college football.

Florida State uses a double photo line system on its sidelines. Only those photographers actually shooting the game will be allowed on the "front" line. These shooters will be given photo armbands upon check-in to allow them front line access. All other photo personnel will be required to stay behind a second line so as not to obstruct the view of the shooters. This would include grips, runners and sideline reporters. Violation of the double-line system will result in removal from the sideline. No media personnel are allowed in the team area of the sidelines at any time during a game. They must shoot in designated areas only.

The press box catwalk, or photo

deck, offers an unobstructed view for TV and video cameras. Television crews may be assigned space in that area upon request. Still photographers may have access to the sidelines only. Those holding a still photography credential should report to the gate specified on the pass, where they will be issued an armband, rosters and a pre-game meal. A photographers' lounge area with tables and chairs is available. Late-arriving photographers must check in on the field with a member of the Sports Information staff. The only access to the field is through the gate at the northwest (flagpole) corner of the stadium.

Special requests for photographers whose assignments warrant shooting from the photo deck may be made to Wilson.

VIDEO SERVICES

Florida State's Sports Information Office has the ability to assist networks and television stations by providing video services through Seminole Productions, Inc. The FSU athletic department has a working relationship with SPI and its general manager, Mark Rodin, whose office is located in the Moore Athletic Center. Seminole Productions has editing and studio facilities on site and can produce virtually any material upon request. In most cases, there will be a nominal fee charged for these services. Please call Rodin at 644-0019 to arrange for these services.

PRESS PARKING

Once again, parking is extremely limited in 1994 and passes will be issued on a priority basis within the same guidelines as working credentials.

STATISTICAL SERVICES

Play-by-play, halftime and complete final statistics will be provided. Post-game quotes from FSU Head Coach Bobby Bowden, selected players and the visiting coach will be distributed after the game.

REFRESHMENTS

A pre-game meal will be served on Level 6 of the press box beginning approximately two hours before kickoff. Refreshments will be available throughout the game.

TELEPHONES

Telephone service should be secured directly through the Florida State University Office of Telecommunications at 904/644-2414. Have them contact the Sports Information Office for location. The Telecommunications Office can provide both lines and phones. When contacting them, please specify the type of line you need (i.e. touchtone, etc.).

FAX SERVICE

An independent fax service will be available for each game. Please contact a member of the Sports Information Office staff during the game to secure post-game fax service.

MID-WEEK INTERVIEWS

Media interviews with all FSU players should be arranged through the Sports Information Office. For phone interviews, a staff member will fill out a card asking the player to return the call. Please give one day advance notice when requesting players for mid-week interviews. All player calls to the media will be made collect.

Seminole players are available to the media on a daily basis during the lunch hours in the atrium area of the Moore Athletic Center. Contact the Sports Information staff member working lunch with your request. Advance notice is helpful in setting up face-to-face interviews to ensure that the player requested will be present that day.

Anyone wishing to schedule an interview with Head Coach Bobby Bowden should contact his assistant, Sue Hall, at 904/644-0097.

ACC FAXBACK

Florida State no longer mails its football releases each week. Instead, all Florida State football releases, including the daily practice trainer, are available on the ACC Faxback.

The Faxback gives media the capability to request and receive the releases from the conference office or any Atlantic Coast Conference school, including Florida State, simply by dialing a phone number from a fax machine. The ACC Faxback gives the media 24-hour access to the latest press releases and information.

Use of the Faxback is limited to members of the media ONLY. To get the

Faxback phone and code numbers, contact the ACC Media Relations Office (910/854-8787) or the Florida State Sports Information Office.

ACC TELECONFERENCE

Each Wednesday during the 1994 football season, Bowden will be available to the media on the ACC football teleconference call, along with all eight other league coaches. Bowden will be on the call from 12:00-12:10 p.m. every Wednesday from Aug. 31 through Nov. 23. Contact the FSU Sports Information Office or the Atlantic Coast Conference Office to get the number for the call, as well as a complete listing of the coaches and times. This is the only weekly conference call Coach Bowden will conduct in 1994.

ACC SATELLITE FEED

Video highlights and taped interviews with Florida State players and coaches can be obtained each week via an ACC satellite feed put up by JP Sports. The feed, which will contain at least six minutes of Florida State information, will

run weekly beginning the first week in September. Contact FSU or the ACC to get the coordinates and time for the feed.

BREAKFAST WITH BOBBY

Following each Seminole home game, Head Coach Bobby Bowden will join the media Sunday morning at 8:30 a.m. for a continental breakfast, followed by a question and answer session. Breakfast with Bobby will be held at the Ramada Inn North, FSU's media hotel.

CONFERENCE CALL

On road game weekends, media may talk to Bowden via a Sunday conference call. Contact a member of the Sports Information Office during the previous day's game for further information.

ROAD GAME CREDENTIALS

Writers covering Florida State on a regular basis may make requests for road credentials with the opponent school or with the FSU Sports Information Office by Monday of game week.

HOW TO USE THE ACC FAXBACK

ACC standings and statistics will be updated by no later than 5 p.m. each Monday during the course of the 1994 season. Each school will also update its respective release by 5 p.m.

Simply dial the Faxback phone number from your fax phone. You will be instructed on how to retrieve the information. Connect your fax at the tone, and the requested information will start transmitting to your machine. The ACC will not release this phone number except to certified media sources. Contact the ACC Media Relations Department at 910/854-8787, or fax in your request to 910/854-8797.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

Florida State University's athletic staff is well aware of the importance of media coverage and is briefed continually on the role of the media insofar as it interacts with their respective duties. At no time is this cooperation more important than in the post-game interview and locker room procedures. To ensure the most workable situation for members of the media and for the FSU staff, the following procedures *must* be observed:

1 Entrance to the Florida State locker room can be made only through the second floor interview room. All members of the media will be directed to this room by the FSU Sports Information staff *immediately* at the conclusion of the game. It is helpful if all media personnel assemble at the tunnel entrance in the north end zone following the conclusion of the game. You will *not* be allowed access to the locker room through the player entrance, so follow closely.

Elevators will begin leaving for the field with approximately eight minutes left in the fourth quarter. Getting to the field becomes much more difficult if reporters wait until after the game has ended to attempt to reach the field. The only entrance to the field is at the northwest (flagpole) corner of the end zone, where a member of the Sports Information staff will let those holding press passes in the gate.

2 Florida State Coach Bobby Bowden will be brought directly to the interview room as soon as he dismisses the team and declares the locker room open.

3 When Coach Bowden makes his appearance in the interview room, members of the media who wish to go to the locker room will be shown the proper route. Down one flight of stairs leads directly into the player dressing area.

4 FLORIDA STATE'S LOCKER ROOM IS OPEN TO ALL MEDIA, MALE AND FEMALE. HOWEVER, IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT FEMALE REPORTERS IN-

FORM FSU SPORTS INFORMATION PERSONNEL DURING THE GAME THAT THEY WILL NEED LOCKER ROOM ACCESS. (FSU players have been assured they will be told on a game-by-game basis whether there will be female reporters in the locker room — a courtesy we feel must be extended.)

5 Exit from the locker room and access back to the press box can be made through the player entrance to the stadium.

Each visiting team will set its own post-game interview policy, which will be announced on the inside public address system in the fourth quarter. Check with the opposing team's sports information personnel in the press box if you have any other questions.

There is an interview room outside the visitors locker room, where the visiting head coach and/or players may be brought for interviews following the game. The visiting team locker room and interview area is located through the gate at the southeast corner of the field.

It is our desire at Florida State to make the post-game procedure as painless as possible for both the media and our staff. Remember, both groups have important tasks and are under extreme pressure.

The Florida State Athletic Department cannot and will not be responsible for problems incurred by any member of the media not following the above procedures. Security personnel will facilitate only those following the proper guidelines. However, if you encounter a problem while following this procedure, please inform a Sports Information staff member immediately.

In addition to a strong presence throughout Florida, Georgia and Alabama, stations from North and South Carolina will carry the Seminole football broadcast in 1994.

The Seminole Sports Network is owned and operated by Host Communications, Inc., one of the nation's leaders in collegiate sports broadcasting. Florida State joined forces with the Lexington, Ky. based company to establish a comprehensive marketing opportunity which includes radio, television, print and corporate sponsorship components.

In addition to Florida State, Host owns the rights to the networks of other outstanding schools like Texas, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, South Carolina and Mississippi State. Host has a long-term broadcast and print relationship with the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

The Seminole Sports Football Network will reach into nearly 60 markets in 1994, including some of the largest markets

in the country like Atlanta, Miami and Orlando. In Tallahassee, all the Seminole football action can be heard on flagship station WTNT-FM (94.9).

Florida State's professional broadcast crew is known as one of the nation's best as they provide insight and entertainment, as well as detailed and expert play-by-play.

The broadcast team features award-winning play-by-play announcer Gene Deckerhoff, a 16-year veteran of the FSU radio network, and color analyst Vic Prinzi, who begins his 13th year in that role in 1994. They are joined for portions of the pre- and post-game shows by Tallahassee television sportscaster John Peterson. After the game, Florida State Assistant Athletic Director for Communications Wayne Hagan takes over to host the popular "Seminole Calls" show, when listeners call in with their questions and opinions on the just-completed game.

Deckerhoff is nationally known as one of the finest football and basketball announcers in the South. The "Voice of the Seminoles" for the past 16 years, he is a seven-time Florida Sportscaster of the Year. In 13 of the past 15 years, Deckerhoff has been named the best college and pro football play-by-play announcer in the state by the Florida Sportscasters Association.

A native of Jacksonville, Fla., Deckerhoff also serves as the play-by-play announcer for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers of the NFL, making for some very busy fall weekends. Deckerhoff is also the producer and co-host of "The Bobby Bowden Show", and co-host of Bowden's weekly call-in radio show. He runs Gene Deckerhoff Productions, a firm specializing in sports broadcasting and the production of radio and television commercials.

Prinzi, a resident of Tampa, Fla., played quarterback for the Seminoles from 1954-57. Following graduation from FSU, he went on to a brief professional football career with the New York Giants and Denver Broncos before going into coaching. After a 12-year coaching career in the high school and college ranks, Prinzi joined Dulin Brokerage in Tampa, where he is vice president of the wholesale division.

Florida State's game-day broadcasts begin 90 minutes prior to every kickoff on the stations listed.

FLORIDA STATE SEMINOLES

SEMINOLES ARE HEROIC SYMBOL AT FLORIDA STATE

The history of the Seminole Indians in Florida is the story of a noble, brave, courteous, strong and determined people who, against great odds, struggled successfully to preserve their heritage and live their lives according to their traditions and preferences.

From its earliest days as a university, Florida State has proudly identified its athletic teams with these heroic people because they represent the traits we want our athletes to have. Other athletic teams are called Patriots or Volunteers in the same way — they use a symbol that represents qualities they admire.

Recent critics have complained that the use of Indian symbolism is derogatory. Any symbol can be misused and become derogatory. This, however, has never been the intention at Florida State.

Over the years, we have worked closely with the Seminole Tribe of Florida to ensure the dignity and propriety of the various Seminole symbols we use. Chief Osceola, astride his Appaloosa when he plants a flaming spear on the 50-yard line, ignites a furious enthusiasm and loyalty in thousands of football fans, but also salutes a people who have proven that perseverance with integrity prevails.

Some traditions we cannot control. For instance, in the early 1980s, when our band, the Marching Chiefs, began the now-famous arm motion while singing the "war chant," who knew that a few years later the gesture would be picked up by other team's fans and named the "tomahawk chop?" It's a term we did not choose and officially do not use.

Our university's goal is to be a model community that treats all cultures with dignity while celebrating diversity.

I have appointed a task force to review our use of Seminole Indian symbols and traditions. This study group will identify what might be offensive and determine what needs to be done.

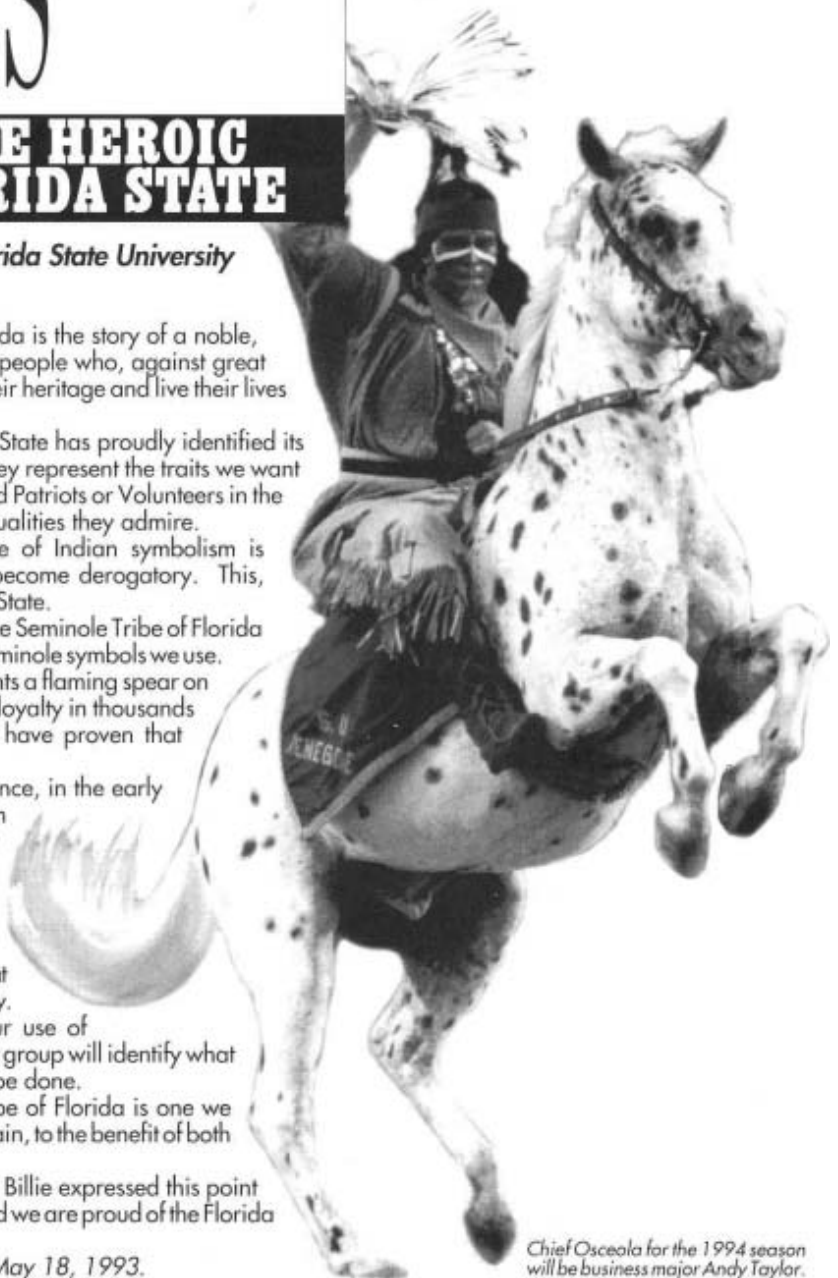
Our good relationship with the Seminole Tribe of Florida is one we have cultivated carefully and one we hope to maintain, to the benefit of both the Seminoles of our state and university.

Seminole Tribe of Florida Chairman James E. Billie expressed this point in these words: "We are proud to be Seminoles, and we are proud of the Florida State University Seminoles. We are all winners."

SIDELINES

Why Seminoles? After the Florida State football team played its first game on October 18, 1947 without a symbol, FSU students were invited to submit ideas for potential names, on which the entire student body would vote. A week after the first game, the list was narrowed to six - Golden Falcons, Statesmen, Crackers, Senators, Indians, and Seminoles. After the final ballot, "Seminoles" won out over "Statesmen" by 110 votes.

OUTLOOK





Wasn't it just yesterday that Florida State won the National Championship? That Charlie Ward drove the Seminoles downfield and Scott Bentley booted the field goal to win the Orange Bowl game against Nebraska on January 1st? So it seems.

In reality, it was a season ago, and it might as well have been forever. The day after the game, Bobby Bowden and his coaching staff were already on the road, working on signing what would be one of the top recruiting classes in the country. A month later, the players began the off-season conditioning program. Now, after a summer of hard work, both in the weight room and in the classroom, the coaches and players are back together, focused on just one goal — to repeat.

As for Florida State Head Coach Bobby Bowden, he's not discouraging those goals. Even though his Seminoles must replace 12 starters, including Heisman Trophy Winner and unanimous All-America choice Charlie Ward, leading tackler Ken Alexander, three of

its top four wide receivers and the entire starting backfield.

"The big thing is that our players don't let up from the work ethic of last year," Bowden said. "We have to maintain the same intensity and work habits of that '93 team. We've got to have excellent leadership out of our seniors."

As usual, spring practice was spent teaching and evaluating, working on new things, perfecting the fundamentals and seeing what young players could do when put into first or second team positions for the first time.

"It was a good spring in that respect," Bowden said. "Of course, nothing can compare to the game situations.

We think we have some good young talent ready to step in and step up. We'll be counting on them to play at the same high level as last year's starters."

OFFENSE

While the question of who will replace Charlie Ward at quarterback reigned supreme in everyone's mind during the spring, Bowden and his offensive coaching staff saw a resurgence in the running game, and welcomed that development with open arms.

"We did much more running this spring, and I still want to do a little bit more in the fall," Bowden said. "Anytime we break in a new quarterback, you can bet your life we're gonna try to improve our running game because I don't want to put too much pressure on him."

A quartet of talented tailbacks, along with a pair of fullbacks, should do a lot toward taking the pressure off FSU's new starting signal-caller. Sophomore Warrick Dunn is the projected starter at tailback, despite spending the spring running track, while redshirt freshman Ricardo "Rock" Preston and sophomore Jermaine Green, a cornerback in 1993, wowed the Seminole coaches with their speed and moves this spring. Add

senior tailback Tiger McMillon, who is coming back from a torn patellar tendon suffered last August, to the mix, and the four — none of whom stands over 5-9 or weighs more than 190 pounds — create a huge burden indeed — for Florida State opponents.

As a freshman, Dunn was one of the biggest surprises of the year with his team-leading 10 touchdowns and a propensity for the big play. In Florida State's biggest games of the year — vs. Miami, at Florida and in the Orange Bowl — the Baton Rouge native made some of the biggest plays of the year.

At fullback, senior Zack Crockett, a 6-2, 245-pounder who redshirted in 1993, inherits the starting position vacated by William Floyd, who opted for an early jump to the NFL. But Crockett is also quick enough to play tailback on occasion. If so, he could line up behind his back up, 6-1, 246-pound Pooh Bear Williams, giving Florida State a "heavy" backfield to counter its speedy one.

"Green and Preston are both good runners, they showed that this spring. They will need to show they can get the job done in the games, like Dunn did last year," Bowden said. "At fullback, we have good quality and size. They just need to play."

Now, back to that big question. Who will replace Charlie Ward?

Going into the spring Bowden said, "The job is up for grabs. It should be an interesting battle between (Danny) Kanell, (Jon) Stark and (Thad) Busby. All three are excellent passers. It's gonna get down to which one can run the ball club the best."

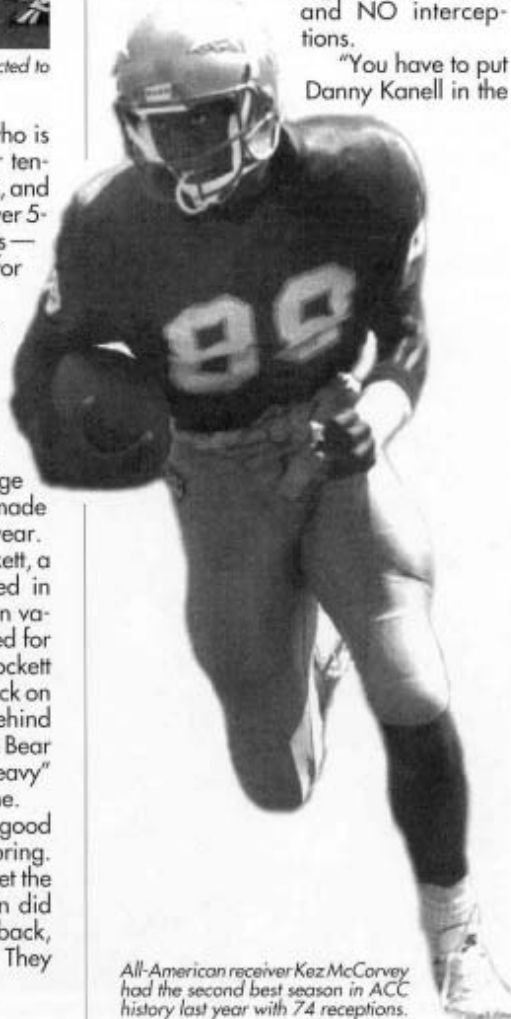
Following 15 days of spring practice, Bowden sounded a similar note.

"It's (the quarterback race) still too darn close to be settled. If we had a game today, Danny would be the starter. I didn't see Kanell losing any ground."

A junior, Kanell backed up Ward in each of the past two seasons and is the only one of the three to start a game at Florida State. He has completed 45-of-69 passes during his career for a .652 completion percentage, 634 yards,

eight touchdowns and NO interceptions.

"You have to put Danny Kanell in the

driver's seat and list him as number one because of the superb game he had at Maryland last year," Bowden said. "He played almost a flawless game."

In that game, a 49-20 Florida State victory, Kanell completed 28-of-38 passes for 341 yards and five touchdowns to earn ACC Offensive Back of the Week honors.

Stark, who transferred two years ago from Liberty University, shared second team duties with Kanell last year and completed 25-of-35 passes for 328 yards (.714) with three touchdowns and two interceptions.

Busby was one of the most highly-recruited quarterbacks in the country two years ago, and spent the last year learning the system.

"None of them have Charlie's mobility. Busby is probably the most talented as far as mobility is concerned. However, the leadership, poise and consistency that Charlie had can be learned. We'll see who can get there."

By the end of spring drills, Kanell was still the closest.

But whoever wins the No. 1 job will be working behind one of the best offensive lines Florida State has ever had. FSU returns six of its top seven linemen, including four starters and two part-time starters.

Center Clay Shiver, a junior, is the best of the bunch. An All-Conference choice and Sophomore All-American in 1993, Shiver played over 700 snaps and allowed only 1/2 sack on the year. He calls the line blocking assignments and can execute the shotgun and the "direct" snap consistently.

Patrick McNeil, the only senior among the top six linemen, and fellow guard Lewis Tyre, another two-year starter and the MVP of spring '94 practices, flank Shiver to give the Seminoles strength and experience up the middle. The three have six years of starting experience between them.

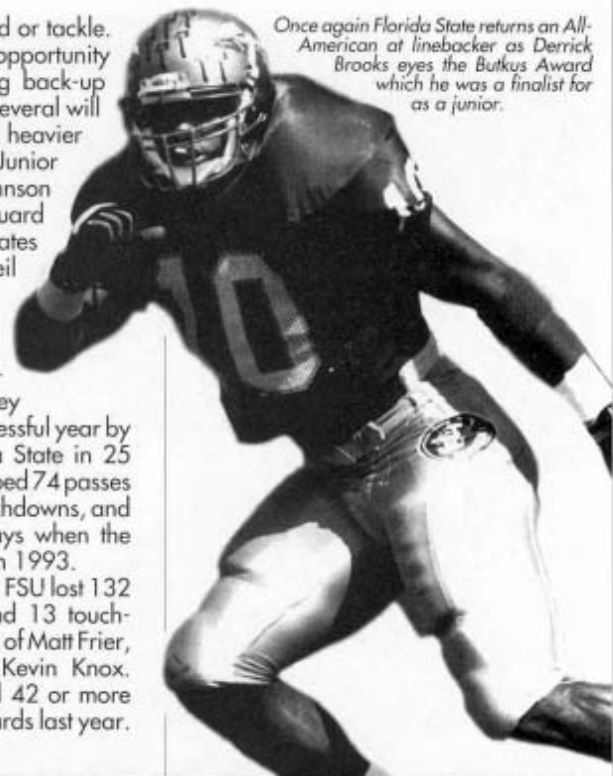
The returning tackles are Juan Laureano and Jesus Hernandez on the split side and Forrest Conoly at tight tackle. Conoly, a 6-6, 315-pounder who became a force for the first time in 1993, missed spring drills, but is expected back at full strength when August practices open. Laureano was one of Florida State's top linemen during the latter portions of the '93 campaign, while Hernandez is a versatile battler

who can play either guard or tackle.

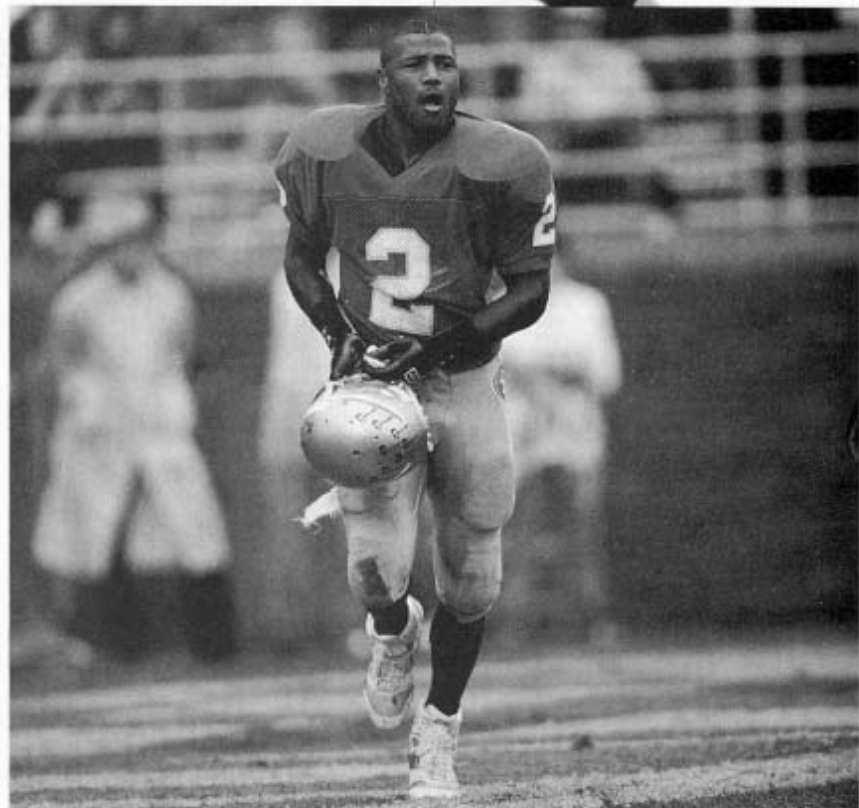
Spring provided an opportunity for some of FSU's young back-up linemen to develop, and several will be expected to handle a heavier offensive load in the fall. Junior college newcomer Tim Johnson showed potential at split guard behind Tyre while Chad Bates ably filled in behind McNeil at tight guard as a true freshman in 1993.

The good news at wide receiver is in that leading receiver Kez McCorvey is back after the most successful year by a pass-catcher at Florida State in 25 seasons. McCorvey grabbed 74 passes for 966 yards and six touchdowns, and like Dunn, made big plays when the Seminoles needed them in 1993.

But behind the senior, FSU lost 132 catches, 1,715 yards and 13 touchdowns with the departures of Matt Frier, Tamarick Vanover and Kevin Knox. Each of the three totalled 42 or more catches for at least 540 yards last year.

After McCorvey, the returning receivers for Florida State — Andre Cooper, Phillip Riley, Wayne Messam, Omar Ellison and Aaron Dely — tallied just 23 catches for 267 yards and two scores last season. That foursome will be joined by freshman E.G. Green, who redshirted in 1993.

"At wide receiver, we have good potential, but we lost a lot of experience," Bowden said. "We will try and work Kez into the offense even more than we did a year ago. We will need some of those younger guys to step up."

At tight end, a position the Seminole offensive coaches expect to utilize more in 1994, senior Billy Glenn, the back-up to Lonnie Johnson last year, is

the incumbent. But redshirt freshmen Melvin Pearsall, a linebacker a year ago, performed well in spring drills and will challenge Glenn for the starting job come August. Sophomores Kamari Charlton and Terry Davis are also in the mix there.

As far as the scheme of the Florida State offense, the "Fast Break" is not dead, says Bowden, but the offense will be tailored to fit the strengths of the returning players. Over the last two years, it had been tailored to fit the talents of Charlie Ward.

"We expect to use the tight end more, because we'll try to build a solid running game," Bowden said. "But we will work with the same formations we

worked with last year, including the shotgun. I imagine we'll feel out the talents of this team and try to utilize those."

For the first time in years, the Seminoles enter 1994 without a question in the kicking game. Punter Sean Liss and kickers Scott Bentley and Dan Mowrey all return. Liss quietly averaged nearly 40 yards per punt in 1993 and brought stability back to the punting game. Bentley overcame a tremendous amount of pressure to hit 13-of-20 field goals and 56-of-64 extra points in his freshman campaign. More importantly, he did not miss a pressure kick all year.

DEFENSE

Any discussion of Florida State's 1994 defense must begin with a pair of Derricks — senior outside linebacker Brooks and junior defensive end Alexander.

Brooks, a 1993 consensus All-American, was slowed only by injury a year ago. When healthy, he simply dominated games, as exhibited by his three touchdowns in the Seminoles' first four contests. Brooks showed speed, hard-hitting tackling and the knack for being in the right place at the right time. He was a finalist for the Butkus, the Rotary-Lombardi and the FWAA Defensive Player of the Year Awards, as well as an Academic All-America choice.

"Derrick Brooks is one of the top linebackers in the country, if not the best," Bowden said. "If he can stay healthy, we look for him to have a dominating season."

Next to Brooks, who starts at the "bandit" outside linebacker spot, competition for the newly-renamed middle linebacker position should be fierce as a host of players vie to replace 1993 leading tackler Ken Alexander. On the other side, junior Todd Rebol is back after starting as a sophomore. Eric Smith backed up Brooks ably last season, while Sam Cowart enters spring

drills behind Rebol on the opposite side.

"Our linebackers should be outstanding," Bowden raved. "We'll have as many good linebackers as we've ever had."

In the fall, that group will get even stronger with the addition of several high school all-stars, including USA Today Defensive Player of the Year Lamont Green and Georgia All-America Demetro Stephens.

Derrick Alexander "might be one of the premiere defensive linemen in the country" according to Bowden, and most of FSU's 1993 opponents would agree. As a sophomore, Alexander was second on the squad in tackles with 100 and tallied five sacks and eight tackles for loss. He played as well along the line as Brooks did at linebacker, and was named a first team All-American by the Football Writer's.

Senior James Roberson is back to anchor the line on the other side in his second season as a starter. The Lake Wales native made 52 stops in 1993. Four other players — Dulack Guerrier and Tyrant Marion at tackle, and Enzo Armella and Connell Spain at nose guard — saw extensive playing time last season and will battle for starting slots this spring.

Reinard Wilson, Peter Boulware, Julian Pittman and Rhodney Williams, who made the switch from tight end, are all second-year players looking to make bigger contributions in 1994, with Boulware and Wilson leading the charge. The former was named the Top Newcomer of 1994 spring practices while Wilson also showed off his pass rushing skills. In addition, walk-on Andre Wadsworth turned some heads with aggressive play.

"There are some good prospects, really good prospects, on our defensive line," Bowden said. "I feel good about our starting front four and am excited to see what some of those young players can do."

In the secondary, once again a Seminole cornerback will challenge for All-America honors. Senior Clifton Abraham is this year's heir apparent, but already has bona fide all-star credentials. A starter the last two years at the boundary corner, Abraham moves to the opposite side in 1994. He made 61 tackles, broke up six passes and scored a pair of touchdowns off blocked

punts as a starter last year and has 15 career pass break ups.

"Clifton Abraham is one of the top cornerbacks in the country," Bowden said. "When Corey Fuller comes back in the fall, they will form a good pair for us."

Fuller, a senior, missed spring drills while continuing to rehabilitate his knee after reconstructive surgery last fall. Sophomores James Colzie and Byron Capers, who played while learning the position as true freshmen in 1993, and redshirt Rodney Wells, are back a year stronger, older and wiser to provide relief and back-up to the seniors.

The safety situation is nearly identical. At strong safety, Devin Bush played solidly as the only experienced player at that position in '93. He is most remembered for the interception and 40-yard return that sealed FSU's win against Miami, but he also made 68 tackles to rank fifth on the team.

Like Fuller, senior Steve Gilmer had reconstructive knee surgery last fall, but is expected to claim his starting free safety position in August. In the meantime, sophomore Sean Hamlet played well in the spring and showed he could become a dependable defender.

At each secondary position, a freshman could contribute, according to defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews, who listed Samari Rolle (field corner), Deon Humphrey (strong safety), Robert Hammond (free safety) and Troy Saunders (boundary corner) at the third team spot at their respective positions.

If the 1994 schedule looks familiar, it is. Except for the absence of the Kickoff Classic, the Seminoles take on the same foes as it did in going 12-1 last year. This year, the Notre Dame game will be on more familiar ground — the Citrus Bowl in Orlando, while the Seminoles face Florida at home and Miami on the road.

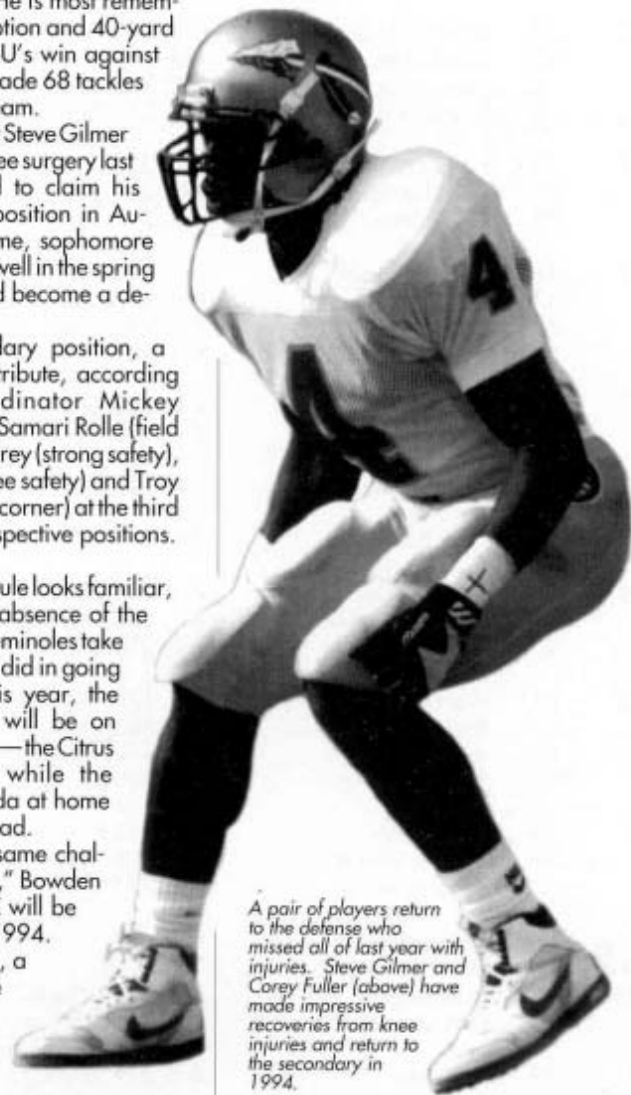
"We'll face the same challenges as a year ago," Bowden said. "I feel the ACC will be much stronger in 1994. Last year in the ACC, a lot of teams were young and their players were gaining experience.

We had a veteran team and took advantage of that.

"We'll have to play at our highest level to defend the national championship," he continued. "It will get tougher and tougher to keep that ACC string alive, too.

"Sometimes, one play sets a team apart. One play can be the difference between No. 1 and number two or three. When you're playing at the level we have been for the past seven years, it can all come back to one play — one missed block, one catch, one throw, one tackle, one anything.

"If this team will keep the same work habits, and can stay healthy, we'll be right there again." 🏈

NEW TERMINOLOGY

In 1994, Florida State's defensive alignment will be called a "4-3" to more accurately reflect the defense the Seminoles play. As a result, some of the names of the defensive positions have changed. For example, the position played by James Roberson, which FSU coaches call the "ed", had been listed as outside linebacker in Florida State releases. It will now be called defensive end.
