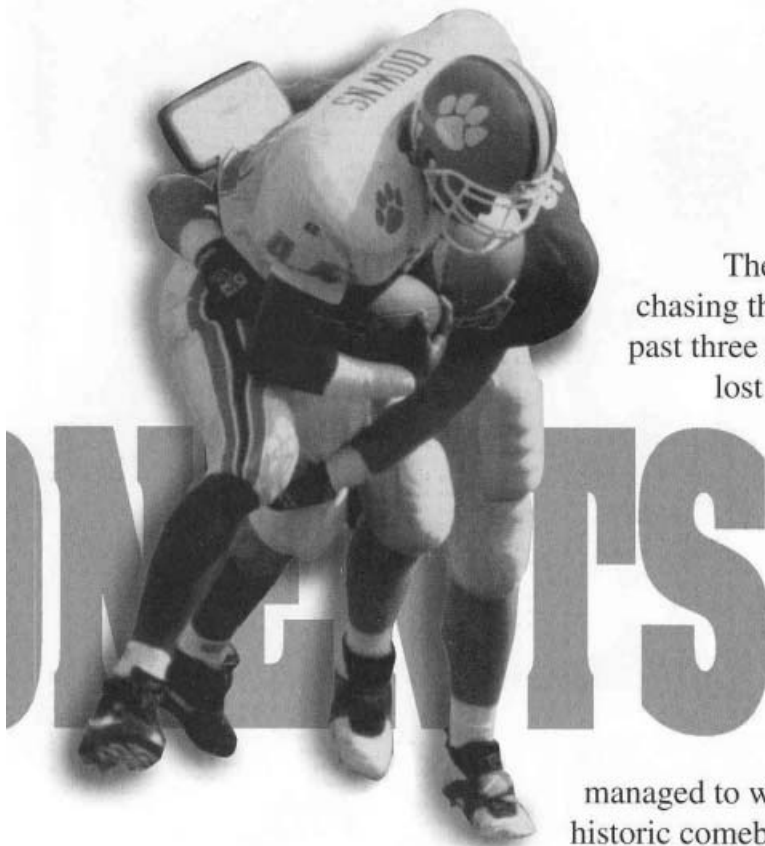
Florida State's non-conference schedule still features the toughest in-state rivals of any school in the country. The Seminoles have dominated Florida winning seven of the last nine games between the two.

OPPO

Throughout the 49-year history of football at Florida State the Seminoles seemed to wander around the country looking for opponents and generally choosing the best in the country to play. However over the last three seasons the Tribe has slipped comfortably into the routine of a consistent Atlantic Coast Conference schedule and will face a schedule with only one change from the previous two years.

Central Florida will make its first trip to Doak Campbell Stadium in school history which is no coincidence as this marks the first season of Division IA football for the Golden Knights. FSU's first football All-American and former Bobby Bowden assistant Gene McDowell coaches UCF, which was a late replacement on the schedule after Auburn unexpectedly bought its way out of the game several years ago.

UCF replaces Notre Dame on the FSU schedule. The split with the Irish over the last two seasons provided what many called the best college game in 25 years two seasons ago and lived up to the billing last year when the Seminoles had to come from behind for the win in Orlando.



The ACC has been chasing the Seminoles for the past three years. FSU has not lost a game in its three seasons in the league posting a 24-0 mark. Georgia Tech has come closest to beating the Tribe and that came in the Seminoles first year in the league.

Charlie Ward managed to wreck Tech with a historic comeback in Bobby Dodd Stadium for a 29-24 win that secured

his place in FSU history. Maryland became the first ACC rival to lead the Seminoles at halftime when they went to the locker room at Byrd Stadium with a 20-17 margin last year, but Florida State cranked up the running game in the second half and buried the Terrapins 52-20. Virginia nearly got FSU on its first trip to Charlottesville but lost 13-3 and FSU had trouble with Clemson in Tallahassee last year but prevailed 17-0.

Florida State's non-conference schedule still features the toughest in-state rivals of any school in the country. The Seminoles have dominated Florida winning seven of the last nine games between the two. Last year's NCAA record comeback from a 31-3 fourth quarter deficit is one of the great moments in college football history and the Tribe used the momentum to hammer the SEC champions in the Sugar Bowl 23-17. Miami, meanwhile, has broken the hearts of the FSU faithful too many times to count. It can be argued that the Hurricanes have cost the Seminoles three national championships and it is guaranteed that the game will be the focus of the nation once again this year.

GAME NOTES

Florida State began their undefeated streak in the ACC against Duke in the season-opener of the 1992 season with a 48-21 win in Tallahassee...the Seminoles have averaged 50.6 points in their three wins over the Blue Devils amassing 1,742 yards, including 620 last year...Duke's 20 points ties for the third most scored by an ACC opponent against the Seminoles (Georgia Tech's 24 in 1992 were the most)...former fullback Zack Crockett scored three of FSU's seven touchdowns vs. Duke last year...the season-opener in Orlando will be FSU's fourth regular season game in the Citrus Bowl in the past five years and their first since defeating Notre Dame 23-16 there last year...Florida State has won its last 11 neutral site games, including bowls...Thad Busby scored his first career TD on a one-yard plunge in last year's game...Bobby Bowden finally moved to a winning record against Duke with a 3-2 mark (both losses came while at West Virginia)...second year Duke coach Fred Goldsmith has many ties to the state of Florida...a native of Coral Gables, Goldsmith graduated from Florida...he spent time in coaching at five Florida high schools, served as a graduate assistant at Florida ('71) and was the defensive coordinator at Florida A&M in Tallahassee for five seasons...10 Blue Devils hail from Florida...Ol. Tim Johnson (Fayetteville) is the lone Seminole from North Carolina.

GAME NOTES

ACC schools had to juggle their schedules considerably to accommodate FSU's entry three years ago and as a result the Seminoles will be making their first visit to Clemson in three years...the Tigers held FSU to its lowest offensive output (17 points) since the Seminoles won the national championship in the 1994 Orange Bowl over Nebraska 18-16...Florida State's defense has held Clemson scoreless in each of the last two meetings...in 1993, the Tigers suffered their worst defeat in 62 years when the Seminoles won 57-0 in Doak Campbell...Clemson handed Florida State only their second home loss in the last 35 games with a 34-23 win in 1989...FSU needed a late TD pass from Charlie Ward for a come-from-behind 24-20 win over the Tigers on the Seminoles' last visit to Memorial Stadium...Clemson was also the sight of one of the most historic games in FSU history when the Tribe hit a field goal to win the 1988 game that was set up by the infamous "puntooskie" play...Florida State leads the all-time series between the two teams, 6-2...Bowden is 4-2 vs. Clemson...Tiger assistant coach Rick Stockstill was FSU's starting quarterback in 1980 and 1981...FSU defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews held the same post at Clemson from 1977-80...assistant athletic trainer Andy Barker is a Clemson graduate...Clemson's roster shows 16 players from Florida second only to North Carolina among league foes...the Seminoles have five players from South Carolina — the most from any other state other than Florida and Georgia.

N.C. State is one of seven teams on FSU's 1995 schedule that played in bowl games last year...FSU's 34-3 win at Raleigh last year gave the Seminoles their third straight ACC crown...the N.C. State game begins a five-game home stand for the Seminoles — the longest for FSU since Bobby Bowden's second season in 1977...Warrick Dunn rushed for 122 yards against the Wolfpack, his third straight 100+ rushing game...the N.C. The Golden Knights are playing their first season at the Division I-A level and this will be the first meeting between UCF and Florida State...UCF head coach Gene McDowell was the first football All-America ever at Florida State earning third team Associated Press honors in 1962...McDowell also coached at Florida State for a total of 16 years, including 11 straight from 1974-85 when he left for UCF...former FSU running back and USA Today high school player of the year Marquette Smith lettered for the Seminoles in 1991 and 1993 before transferring to his hometown school...the match-up with UCF replaces a contest originally scheduled against Auburn that the Tigers unexpectedly cancelled four years ago...UCF is the only team on the 1995 FSU schedule that was not an opponent in 1994 and they replace Notre Dame...the game is one of seven that FSU will play within the state of Florida and one of three against opponents from its home state...former FSU defensive end Willie Jones coaches the defensive line for the Golden Knights.

GAME NOTES

Over the past seven years, Florida State and Miami have boasted the two most successful programs in the country... since 1987, Miami is 86-10 (.896) while Florida State is 86-11-1 (.888)...six of FSU's 11 losses since 1987 have come against Miami, including a pair of one-point decisions and the only loss in last year's 10-1-1 season... Florida State has played Miami more than any other team — 38 times since 1951...there have been six one-point contests in the history of the series... 11 games have been decided by three points or less, including five since 1980... in those games, FSU stands at 3-8 with its last "close" win in 1971...the last two match-ups have not followed the trend, however, as FSU won 28-10 at home and last 34-20 at the Orange Bowl last year...the Hurricanes have won 13 of 19 games played since Bowden was at FSU, including eight of the last 10...overall, Bowden is 7-14 against Miami...UM is the only team to shutout the Seminoles in the past 18 seasons, holding FSU scoreless in 1976 and again in 1988...ESPN's telecast marks the 10th consecutive time the game will be nationally televised and the second in a row for ESPN...Seminole offensive coordinator Mark Richt is a former Hurricane quarterback.

GAME NOTES

Florida State has posted a 7-1-1 record against Florida in the last nine meetings between the arch-rivals...both teams entered the 1994 season ranked in the top 10 for the fifth straight season...FSU will return to Gainesville for the first time since snapping UF's 23-game home winning streak with a 33-21 win in 1993...the Seminoles tied an NCAA record with a 28-point comeback in the fourth quarter of last year's 31-31 tie in Tallahassee...the Tribe's 23-17 Sugar Bowl win over Florida kept in fact FSU's NCAA record for consecutive bowl wins and AP top four finishes...FSU quarterbacks have set the school record for completions in each of the last two regular season games against UF...Charlie Ward completed 38 passes in 1993 and Kanell completed 40 last year...the series has been dominated by a number of streaks since Bobby Bowden came to Florida State...after losing to UF in 1976, Bowden ran off four straight wins...the Gators then won the next six straight, but have managed just one win in the last nine tries...Bowden upped his record against UF to 11-8-1 with last year's tie and win...FSU still trails the overall series by a lopsided 13-23-1 margin...Florida State is 6-14-1 in games played in Gainesville, while Bowden coached teams are 50-4 at Florida Field including wins in three of their last four visits...Miami, not Florida, is FSU's oldest rival...Florida State is the only school to play both its in-state rivals...FSU defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews spent two seasons on the Florida staff...the game has been nationally televised in 13 of the last 18 regular season meetings...Bowden's record against the Southeastern Conference is 13-2-1 over the past seven seasons and 23-15-2 in 19 years at Florida State.

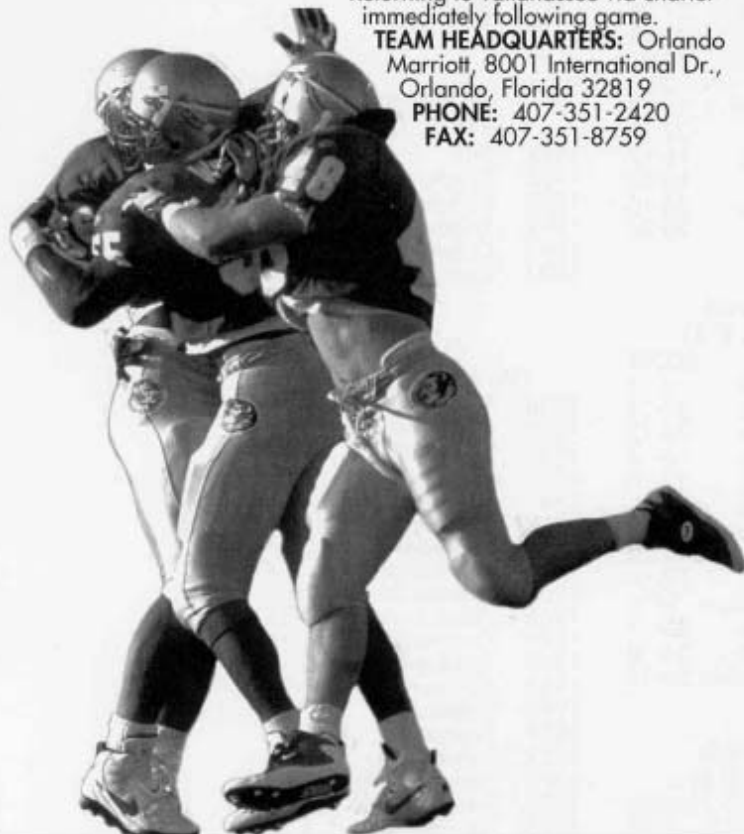

SEMINOLE SIDELINES 

One of the most unique Florida State traditions is the Sod Cemetery. A patch of manicured grass beside one of the Seminole practice fields has been designated as the Sod Cemetery. In it, pieces of turf from "big" Florida State road victories have been buried, just as the Seminoles "buried" their opponents.

Since 1962, certain games have been dubbed "Sod Games." Usually, these are contests in which Florida State goes into an opponent's stadium as the underdog. Through the years, other games have also been designated as Sod Games, such as all bowl games and road games against in-state rivals.

If the Seminoles pull off the upset, or even a tie, a piece of turf is removed by the team captains and taken back to Tallahassee. It is then interred in the cemetery, located just off the practice field, complete with a headstone bearing the score and date of the contest. Last year, Florida State buried sod from the win over Notre Dame and the Sugar Bowl.

CONSISTENCY. IT'S THE MARK OF TRUE EXCELLENCE IN ANY ENDEAVOR.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 42nd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, Atlantic Coast Conference schools have captured 55 NCAA and AIAW championships, including 30 in men's competition and 25 in women's. In addition, 90 men and 22 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

The conference had an immediate impact on the national college football scene in the fall of 1953 when the University of Maryland captured the first of what would eventually be four national football titles for the ACC.

The ACC and the Big Eight are the only two Division I conferences to capture three national football titles since 1980. Clemson laid claim to the league's second national title in 1981, Georgia Tech followed suite in 1990 while Florida State pocketed national title No. 4 a year ago.

The nine schools that take to the field this fall under the ACC banner have produced 304 first or second team gridiron All-Americans and 47 first-team academic All-Americans. ACC Teams have had 1,280 players selected in the annual professional football draft, including 81 first round selections.

If success is best measured in terms of wins and losses, then the ACC has proved itself to be among the elite in Division I-A football. The nine ACC teams are a combined 73-62-5 (.540) in bowl games — a winning percentage second only to the PAC-10's .544 success rate.

The ACC also features three of the winningest teams in bowl annals. Georgia Tech, with a 17-8 (.680) post-season mark, is tops among Division I-A teams in bowl winning percentage while Florida State is second at 15-7-2 (.667). Clemson is seventh at 12-7 (.632).

The ACC also stands at the forefront of intercollegiate athletics in terms of academic accomplishments of its' student athletes. That accomplishment is nowhere better reflected than in the CFA Academic Achievement Award which is awarded to CFA member institution with the highest graduation rate among members of its football team. Nine times over the past 15 years, an ACC member school has claimed the award.

This past year, Duke and Wake Forest tied with Boston College for the coveted award. In addition, North Carolina and Virginia were accorded honorable mention status for having graduation rates of 70 percent or better. Overall, the ACC had four of the 19 CFA members who reported graduation rates of 70 percent or better.

1994-95 IN REVIEW

The 1994-95 academic year will be remembered as one of the best in the 42-year history of the ACC. Conference teams captured three national titles while two other ACC teams participated in national title games. In all, the ACC has won 21 national team crowns in the last five years.

The 1994-95 national champions from the ACC were Virginia in men's soccer, North Carolina in women's soccer and Maryland in women's lacrosse.

The two NCAA runners-up were Maryland in men's lacrosse and North Carolina in field hockey. Overall, ACC teams were 57-39-1 (.592) in NCAA Tournament play.

In addition, four ACC schools — North Carolina, Virginia, Duke and Florida State — were ranked in the top 25 of the Sears Directors' Cup, an all-sports award honoring the Division I school with the best performance by women's and men's athletic teams during the 1994-95 academic year.

Overall the ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 13 of the 23 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1994-95 campaign include 79 teams competing at NCAA Championships, five bowl teams and 24 Top 10 showings.

Eight ACC teams, in seven different sports, representing five of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the 1994-95 academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the ninth-straight year as 1,171 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom. ■
