## FIFTY YEARS OF FLORIDA STATE FOOTBALL 1978

Punter Rohn Stark came on to the scene in 1978 from Fifty Lakes, Minn. Stark would garner All-America honors in 1980 and 1981, setting the record for highest punting average in a game (54.8), season (46.0) and career (42.7). Stark, who plays for the Steelers, spent most of his career playing for the Indianapolis Colts after being drafted in the second round of the 1982 draft.

## FIFTY YEARS OF FLORIDA STATE FOOTBALL 1979

Coach Bobby Bowden, and his wife Ann, are being interviewed by the media at the 1979 Orange Bowl, the Seminoles' first ever New Year's Day bowl appearance. The 1979 season was a year of several firsts for the Seminoles, including FSU's only unbeaten regular season and Florida State's highest Associated Press ranking (No. 4 entering the Orange Bowl). Seminole fans came out in record numbers and FSU football received over \$2 million in bowl, TV and radio revenue.



# 1996 Football Bowl Alliance

The Bowl Alliance was formed in 1995 to create a mechanism for providing college football fans with the best possible bowl games, including a game between the two top-ranked college football teams, when possible, and to maximize the number of opportunities for a variety of high quality bowl game matchups. The FedEx Orange, Nokia Sugar and Tostitos Fiesta bowls have joined with the Atlantic Coast, The Big East Football, Big 12, Big Ten, Pacific 10, and Southeastern conferences and the University of Notre Dame to form the Alliance.

The champions of the Atlantic Coast, Big East Football, Big 12, and Southeastern conferences will appear in one of the aforementioned bowl games following the 1996 regular season. The remaining two At-Large positions may be filled by any Division I-A college football team eligible for postseason competition, excluding the Big Ten and Pacific-10 Champions, that meets any one of the following requirements:

- 1) has won at least eight college football games during the most recently completed regular season; not to include wins in either the Pigskin and/or Kickoff Classic;
- 2) is ranked among the Top 12 bowl eligible teams in either the AP or the CNN/USA Today final regular season polls; or
- 3) is ranked no lower in either the AP or the CNN/USA Today poll than the lowest ranked team selected by a Bowl from the Conference Champions.

In the event that two or more teams tie for the championship of

the Atlantic Coast or The Big East Football conferences and remain tied for the championship after all tie-breaking procedures employed by such Conference have been exhausted, the tied team with the highest ranking in both the AP poll and the CNN/USA Today polls shall be included in the Conference Champions Pool. If the tied teams have the same ranking or should the Polls disagree as to the highest-ranked team, then all such tied teams will be eligible and the selecting bowl shall have the right to select which team it desires.

Team selection shall occur no later than Sunday, December 8, 1996. The selection order shall be as follows:

Selections 1 & 2 .....	Nokia Sugar Bowl
Selections 3 & 5 .....	Tostitos Fiesta Bowl
Selections 4 & 5 .....	FedEx Orange Bowl

## Mandatory 1 vs. 2 Pairing

The Nokia Sugar Bowl shall select any team ranked number 1 in the AP poll and any team ranked number 1 in the CNN/USA Today Poll if the teams so ranked are different and two such teams are available. In any other case, the Nokia Sugar Bowl shall select any team ranked number 1 in either the AP poll or the CNN/USA Today Poll and any team ranked number 2 in either the AP Poll or the CNN/USA Today Poll if two teams so ranked are available.

All other team selections shall come from the pool of teams specified above and will be at the discretion of the participating bowls.

Tom McEwen, Tampa Tribune sports editor, wrote this description of All-America noseguard Ron Simmons in 1979: "Simmons wasn't born. He was chiseled of brown Georgia granite, had the wings of Mercury attached to his ankles and had life breathed into him by whatever saint is assigned to Bobby Bowden. He is 6-foot-1 and 235, has bench-pressed 525 pounds and could tomorrow win a position as stand-in for the Incredible Hulk." Simmons, the FSU career sack leader with 25, was a consensus All-American and was the first Seminole defender to have his number retired.
