# NO PLACE

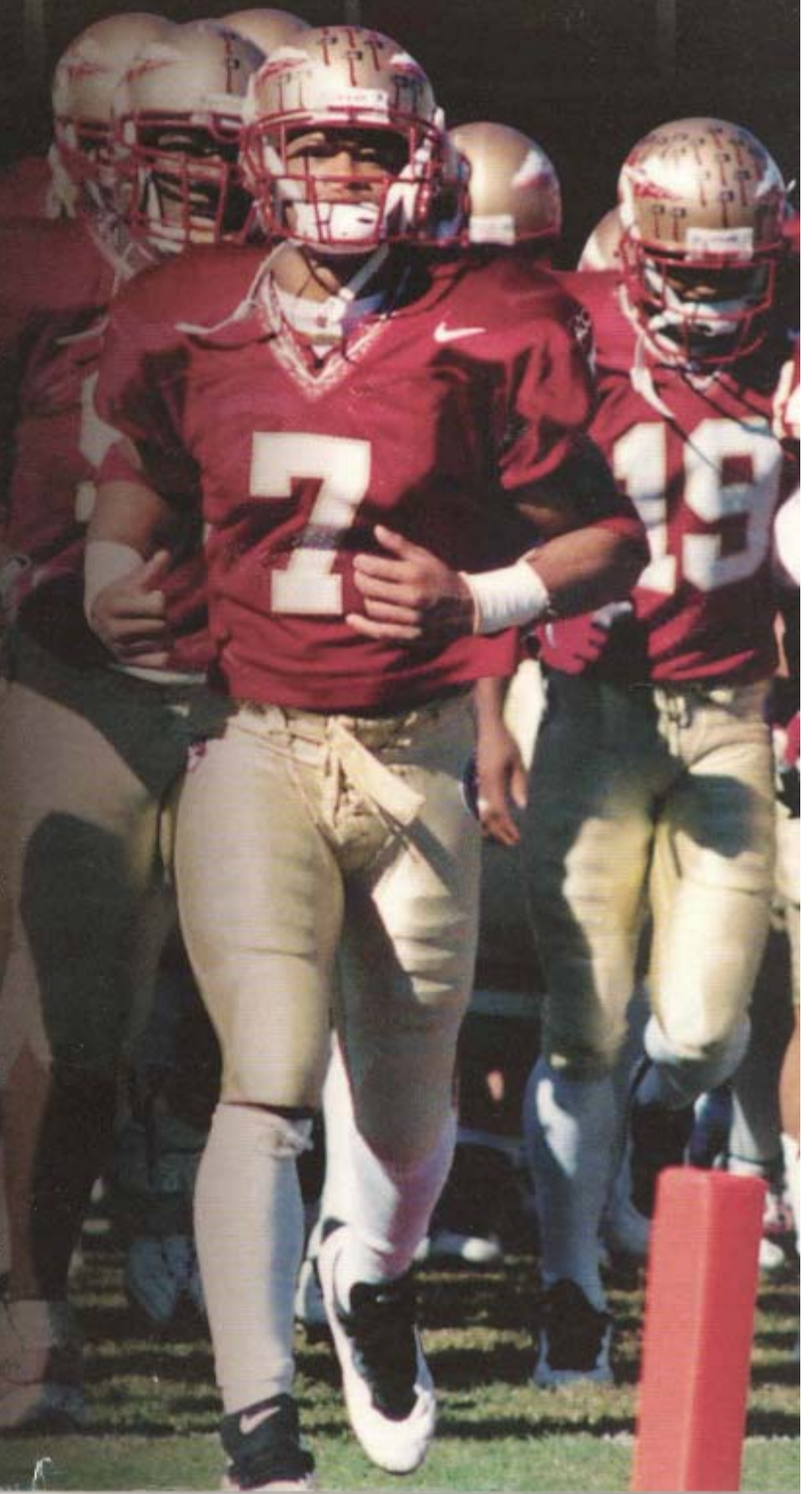
Imagine a college basketball program making 11 consecutive trips to the Final Four. That's about the closest analogy one can make to what Bobby Bowden and his Florida State football program have accomplished since 1987. You've got to use another sport for comparison as there is simply nothing close in the history of college football.

Travis Minor was just a seven-year-old second grader the last time Florida State finished outside the nation's Top Four. He along with legions of high school players today have grown up with the Florida State Seminoles as a dynasty in college football.

Consider that since 1987, the Seminoles have:

- Finished among the Associated Press' Top four each season, an NCAA record 11 straight years
- Become the only program in college history to win 10 or more games for the same 11 year span
- Compiled a 118-15-1 record
- Won 61 games, lost only three, and set an NCAA record with a 28-point comeback tie at Doak Campbell Stadium.
- Not been beaten at home in their last 34 games dating back to 1991
- Been ranked #1 by the Associated Press 41 times, and have been in the Top 10 in 160 of 170 weekly AP polls.
- Set another NCAA record with an incredible streak of 11 consecutive bowl wins and 14 straight without a loss
- Celebrated six consecutive ACC championships losing only one game in their six years in the league
- Seen 31 players earn first team All-America status and 70 picked in the NFL Draft

Florida State's starting lineup in 1998 will likely have just six seniors, but a host of talented young players will battle throughout the season for playing time. The goal remains the same as the Seminoles hope to contend for yet another national championship.

## AP Celebrates 150 Years

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS, the world's oldest and largest news gathering organization, celebrates its 150th anniversary in 1998.

For his performance in the 1964 season, wide receiver Fred Biletnikoff was the first of 18 Seminoles to earn the prestigious AP All America designation earned only by selection to the first team. Three Florida State players — Ron Sellers, Deion Sanders and Marvin Jones — are the only two-time selections.

Beginning with nose guard Ron Simmons in 1979, FSU has placed 13 defensive players on the AP team and five offensive players.

The Associated Press has been ranking America's collegiate football teams since 1936 and Florida State finished in the AP Top 20 for the first time in 1977 when they were ranked 11th.

FSU broke into the AP's Top 10 after the 1979 and 1980 seasons, and have been ranked no lower than fourth in the AP's final poll since the 1987 season.

Florida's AP correspondents include Brent Kallestad, who has been in charge of the Tallahassee bureau since 1986, Steve Wine and Fred Goodall.



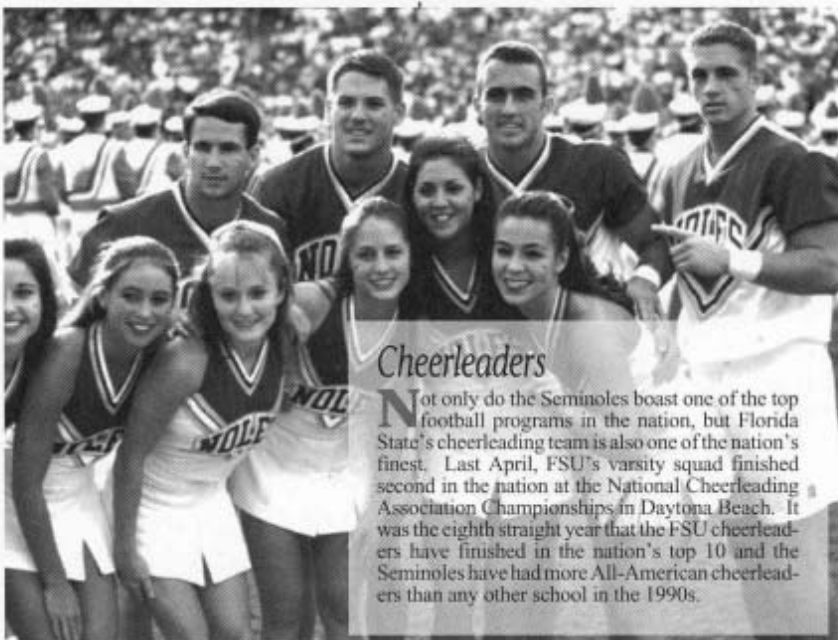
## Kickoff Classic — Texas A&M Not New to FSU

FLORIDA STATE will be making its second appearance in the Kickoff Classic when the Seminoles take on Texas A&M on August 31 in Giants Stadium. FSU began its 13-game march to the 1993 national championship with a 42-0 whipping of Kansas in that year's Kickoff Classic. Florida State has also faced Texas A&M this decade, defeating the Aggies 10-2 in the 1992 Cotton Bowl.



## Chief Osceola & Renegade

PERHAPS THE MOST spectacular tradition in all of college football occurs in Doak Campbell Stadium when Chief Osceola charges down the field riding an Appaloosa horse named Renegade and plants a flaming spear at midfield to begin every home game. The tradition was born on September 16, 1978 against Oklahoma State when a student, wearing Native-American clothing, led



## Cheerleaders

Not only do the Seminoles boast one of the top football programs in the nation, but Florida State's cheerleading team is also one of the nation's finest. Last April, FSU's varsity squad finished second in the nation at the National Cheerleading Association Championships in Daytona Beach. It was the eighth straight year that the FSU cheerleaders have finished in the nation's top 10 and the Seminoles have had more All-American cheerleaders than any other school in the 1990s.

the team from the tunnel riding a horse. Since the beginning of the FSU tradition, there have been three different horses and 10 different riders that have actually appeared at a game. However, there have been a total of 16 horses trained in the Renegade program, including Tonka and Spiderman, who are the understudies to current Chief Osceola mount, Sharky. The original Chief Osceola and Renegade were Jim Kidder and Reo. The original horse was donated by Tallahassee veterinarian Dr. Jerry Deloney. For the last 17 years, the horses have been trained by their owner, local businessman Bill Durham, who also trains the riders. The clothing and rigging that Chief Osceola and Renegade wear were designed and approved by the Seminole Indian Tribe of Florida.



## Coaching Continuity

FLORIDA STATE'S COACHING STAFF boasts a remarkable 145 years of collegiate coaching experience. The staff has

three coaches who have been at FSU for 10 years or more including two that have been with the Seminoles for over 20 years. Jeff Bowden, Odell Haggins, Jimmy Heggins and Billy Sexton all played for the Seminoles. Chuck Amato was a standout linebacker at NC State and Mickey Andrews was an all-star defensive back and baseball player at Alabama. Jim Gladden played at William Jewell while Mark Richt was a quarterback at Miami. Strength coach Dave Halanger played offensive tackle for Bobby Bowden at West Virginia. John Lilly, who is in his first year as a full-time assistant after taking over as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator, was a two-way star at Guilford.

## Garnet & Gold

FLORIDA STATE'S SCHOOL COLORS of garnet and gold date back to the Florida State College championship football teams of 1904 and 1905. In those championship seasons, FSC donned purple and gold uniforms. When Florida State College became Florida Female College in 1905, the football

team was forced to attend the University of Florida. The following year the FFC student body selected crimson as the official school color of 1905. The administration in 1905 took crimson and combined it with the recognizable purple of the championship football teams to achieve the color garnet. The now-famous garnet and gold colors were first used on an FSU uniform in a 14-6 loss to Stetson on October 18, 1947.



## Florida State University Is Born

ON JAN. 24, 1851, a legislative act called for the establishment of two seminaries of higher learning, thus West Florida Seminary began in Tallahassee in 1857.

In 1865, the school was known briefly as Florida Military and Collegiate Institute and during that year the cadets were called into emergency action. They successfully defended the city at the Battle of Natural Bridge, leaving Tallahassee as the only Confederate capital east of the Mississippi never captured in the Civil War.

In 1901, the school became Florida State College and played football for three seasons (1902-1904). But in 1905 the Buckman Act abolished Florida State College and established the Florida Female College for women (changed to Florida State College for Women the next year) in Tallahassee, and the University of the State of Florida for men in Gainesville.

World War II brought about the change to coeducational status when millions of veterans had priority to pursue college educations. The University of Florida bitterly battled the state legislature not to grant FSCW coeducational status, but then Sen. LeRoy Collins (later Governor) pushed it through and in May of 1947 Florida State University was born.



## Hollywood 'Noles

IN 1964 AND '65, ROBERT URICH was a dashing offensive lineman for the Seminoles before leaving for the

bright lights of Hollywood and TV starring roles that included "Vegas", "Spencer For Hire", and most recently "The Lazarus Man."

FSU football has produced a celebrated history of television and movie actors including Burt Reynolds, for whom the former athletic dorm was named. Buddy to his teammates at FSU, Reynolds was a highly regarded running back from West Palm Beach. He gained 134 yards as a freshman in 1954, including a 54-yard run against Auburn. Reynolds tried a comeback at FSU in 1957 after an auto accident left him with a bad knee, and was starting in the secondary until an NC State receiver ran behind their bench and back on the field for an incredible touchdown that sent Buddy packing for Hollywood.

Paul Gleason, a teammate of Reynolds, is also a very successful actor who has played a number of memorable roles including that of Clarence Beaks, the maligned courier of crop reports, in "Trading Places."

Danny Green played at FSU from 1971-73 and starred on the big screen in "Elvira — Princess of Darkness" and "King Pin" among other films.



## Home Sweet Home

WHILE BOBBY BOWDEN has not felt the need to tag a nickname on Doak Campbell Stadium, the Seminoles home field has proven an impossible place, literally, for opponents to win. Florida State enters 1998 with a 34-game home unbeaten streak that dates back to Miami's dramatic 17-16 win in Tallahassee in 1991. Bowden has a sparkling 115-15-2 record at Doak Campbell Stadium and is 59-2-1 at home since the middle of the 1987 season.

FSU's 31-31 tie against Florida in 1995 set an NCAA record for the biggest comeback (28 points) in NCAA history, and its the only home game FSU has not won since 1991.



## Jefferson-Eppes

THOMAS JEFFERSON, former U.S. president and the founder of the University of Virginia, was the grandfather of Francis Eppes VII.

Eppes, three-time mayor of Tallahassee, was a long-time president of the Board of Education of the Seminary West of the Suwannee, the institutional forerunner of what is today Florida State University. To commemorate this bond, the two schools play each year in football for the Jefferson-Eppes Trophy. Inaugurated in 1995 when UVa handed the Seminoles their first ACC loss in football, the trophy has resided in Tallahassee each of the last two seasons. The trophy comprises a silver pitcher, presented to Eppes in 1842, set atop a wooden base crafted from the remains of UVa's massive McGuffey Ash.

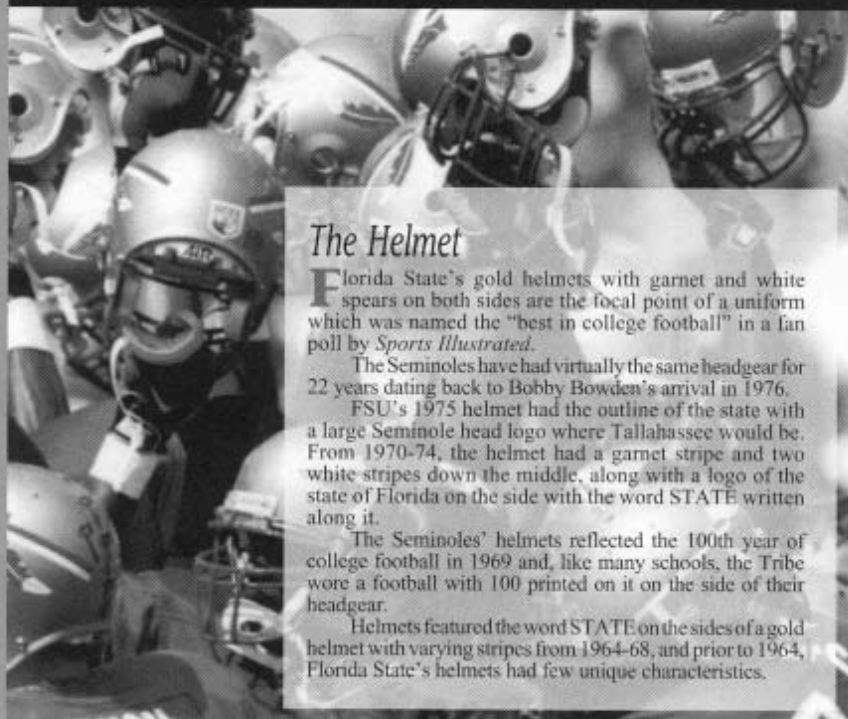


## The Symbol — Seminoles

Florida State would play two football games in 1947 before students demanded the school acquire a symbol. While details conflict, most believe the account of a poll of the student body is accurate. *The Florida Flambeau* reported that "Seminoles" had won by 110 votes over "Statesmen." The rest of the top contenders in order were "Rebels," "Tarpons," "Fighting Warriors" and "Crackers." In the 1950s, a pair of students dressed in "Indian" costumes and joined the cheerleaders on the field which eventually evolved into the majestic symbol of Osceola and Renegade that FSU enjoys today. Today, the Seminole Indian Tribe is invited to participate in many campus activities, including Homecoming (photo).

Florida State University is proud of its longstanding cooperative relationship with the Seminole Tribe of Florida. The Seminole people have suffered many hardships and injustices but they have remained brave, dignified and proud. They are unconquered. They symbolize what we hope will be the traits of all of our graduates, including our student athletes.

We know you cannot win all of the time on the playing field or in life, but we want our students to be unconquered and always ready to try again.



## The Helmet

Florida State's gold helmets with garnet and white spears on both sides are the focal point of a uniform which was named the "best in college football" in a fan poll by *Sports Illustrated*.

The Seminoles have had virtually the same headgear for 22 years dating back to Bobby Bowden's arrival in 1976.

FSU's 1975 helmet had the outline of the state with a large Seminole head logo where Tallahassee would be. From 1970-74, the helmet had a garnet stripe and two white stripes down the middle, along with a logo of the state of Florida on the side with the word STATE written along it.

The Seminoles' helmets reflected the 100th year of college football in 1969 and, like many schools, the Tribe wore a football with 100 printed on it on the side of their headgear.

Helmets featured the word STATE on the sides of a gold helmet with varying stripes from 1964-68, and prior to 1964, Florida State's helmets had few unique characteristics.

to have its football team win a bowl game, its men's basketball team win a game in the NCAA Tournament and have its baseball program advance to the College World Series during the 1997-98 athletic year. Bobby Bowden's team beat Ohio State 31-14 in the Sugar Bowl, Steve Robinson's troops advanced to the second round of the NCAA Midwest Regional and Mike Martin's club won the NCAA Atlantic II Regional before tying for seventh place at the College World Series. Washington, North Carolina and Clemson were the only other schools nationally to earn a football bowl bid and advance to the NCAA Tournament in men's hoops and baseball.



## The Marching Chiefs

THE WORLD-RENOWNED Florida State University Marching Chiefs consists of 420 young men and women from virtu-

ally all disciplines and majors available at the Florida State University. In addition to providing halftime pageantry for Seminole home football games, they regularly travel to away games and an annual post season bowl game. The band started out nearly 60 years ago with 15-20 members from the Florida State College for Women. With quite an addition to it's membership throughout the decades and the school's change to "The Florida State University," a newspaper contest resulted in the band's name change to the "Marching Chiefs" in 1950. In 1953, then-Director Dr. Manley Whitcomb hired Charles Carter as the Chiefs' arranger. Over 40 years later, Dr. Carter is still arranging the spirited sounds of The Marching Chiefs. FSU's marching band is the only one ever to be featured in *Sports Illustrated*, while also having traveled overseas to play in Syria

in the mid 1970s, thus earning the title of "world-renowned".



## 'Noles Go Pro

FLORIDA STATE'S TRADITION for churning out National Football League talent continued with the 1998 Draft last April. Two Seminoles were selected among the

first 11 picks of the draft, four were taken in the first two rounds and six were selected among the first three. Defensive end Andre Wadsworth became the highest Florida State player ever taken in the draft when he was selected with the third pick by the Arizona Cardinals. Offensive tackle Tra Thomas (pictured with his new head coach) was FSU's other first rounder, picked 11th by the Philadelphia Eagles. All totaled, nine Seminoles were selected in the seven-round event, the second most of any school. Florida State has had nine players selected in the first round of the NFL Draft over the last four years and 30 Seminoles have been picked during that span.



## No More No. 2

SAMARI ROLLE, an All-ACC cornerback and a second round NFL pick of the Tennessee Oilers last April was the last Seminole player to ever wear the jersey No. 2.

The number has been a favorite of Florida State All-American cornerbacks, dating back to the FSU days of Deion Sanders. Sanders wore No. 2 from 1985-88 and had his number retired prior to Florida State's 1995 game with Miami. Sanders allowed Rolle to wear the number through the conclusion of his career.



## Number Changes

SEVEN DIFFERENT Seminoles have changed jersey numbers following the 1997 season. They are: Ronald Boldin

(from 72) to 51; Char-ron Dorsey (from 91) to 75; Abdual Howard (from 46) to 12; Bradley Jennings (from 94) to 44; Billy Rhodes (from 75) to 43; and Clevan Thomas (from 41) to 8. Boldin (from offensive line to defensive tackle), Dorsey (from defensive tackle to offensive tackle) and Rhodes (from offensive guard and noseguard to fullback) all switched due to position changes.



## Recruiting Coup

FLORIDA STATE'S 1997 recruiting class was considered the consensus No. 1 with the late addition of USA

*Today's* offensive player of the year Travis Minor swinging the vote. The Seminoles also signed the nation's top ranked class in 1989 and '93. FSU's recruiting class has finished no lower than fifth every year since 1988. With Minor's signing and that of USA *Today's* defensive player of the year David Warren also in 1997, FSU's class became only the second in college football history to have both of that publication's offensive and defensive players of the year. The other was Florida State's '93 class that had linebacker Derrick Brooks and running back Marquette Smith.



## Sealed Lockers

THE RETIREMENT (or permanent sealing) of lockers in the Florida State locker room began after Deion Sanders' senior season in 1988.

Long-time equipment manager Jimmie Callaway came up with the idea to add more tradition to the area.

Former FSU Athletic Director Bob Goin established the criteria for locker retirement that allows only the dressing area of two-time consensus All-Americans to be retired. To date, three players, Ron Simmons (1979-80), Deion Sanders (1987-88) and Marvin Jones (1991-92), have had their lockers sealed. Charlie Ward, FSU's first Heisman Trophy winner, also has his locker retired.

The lockers are encased in glass with the player's final home uniform gear intact — right down to the sweat bands!



## The Sod Cemetery

IN 1962, the team captains of the Seminole football team returned to Tallahassee with a piece of sod from San-

ford Stadium as a trophy from the team's 18-0



victory over the University of Georgia. The turf was presented to Dean Coyle E. Moore, who founded the continuing tradition of the sod game.

The sod cemetery began when that first piece of sod was buried in the corner of the Florida State practice field and a monument was placed to commemorate the road victory.

In the early years, FSU only snipped grass when it won by upset on the road. But as the Seminoles became more successful, the criteria changed. Sod games still represent road games that the Tribe wins when they are significant underdogs, however, all bowl games are now considered sod games as well as landmark road wins no matter who is favored.

Each piece of sod is buried in the cemetery next to the practice field and a tombstone is placed above it with the score and date of the game.



### Tomahawks

MANY FANS around the country wonder what the Tomahawks on the back of Florida State's helmets stand for. Seminoles players receive the stickers for big plays on

the field and big plays off them as well. Last season, FSU started awarding the Tomahawks for excellence in the classroom. The Tomahawks look the same but the scholastic decals read "ACADEMICS" down the side.



### Streaks Aiming for 12

FLORIDA STATE BEGINS the 1998 season with several records on the line, but perhaps the most impressive are the

string of consecutive 10-win seasons and the Associated Press Top Four finishes. FSU is the only program in college football history which has finished among the Top Four in the AP poll for 11 consecutive years. In fact, the next longest streak was Miami's seven-year run among the Top Four from 1986-92. Currently, FSU's 11-year streak's closest challenger is just a three-year appearance by Florida. The Seminoles also own an NCAA record 10 or more wins in 11 straight seasons. The achievements have made Florida State the most successful program in the '90s, as well as the most successful over the last decade.



### Strength of Schedule

FLORIDA STATE TACKLES another very difficult schedule in 1998 and, in what is a fairly infrequent occurrence,

the Seminoles will play the same teams as they did in 1997 (with one addition) with the locations reversed.

Last year saw the Seminoles play USC,

Clemson, Virginia, North Carolina, Florida and Duke on the road. This year those same six teams will visit Tallahassee. The one addition finds the Seminoles playing in the Kickoff Classic in the Meadowlands against Texas A&M on August 31. FSU's 1998 non-conference opponents combined for a 30-17 record last season. Playing a challenging schedule is nothing new to Bobby Bowden. In 1981, Florida State played a football schedule that is considered one of the hardest schedules in college football history. Bobby Bowden led his Seminoles into five straight road games at Nebraska, at Ohio State, at Notre Dame, at Pittsburgh and at LSU, before finishing at Florida. The incredible schedule won Bowden and his Seminoles a national fan base and his nickname as "King of the Road." The head coach himself has said that last year's schedule was the toughest since that time for FSU. The Tribe played at USC, Clemson, Virginia, North Carolina and Florida. Florida State's future schedules include non-conference state rivals Miami and Florida, their ACC opponents and ... 1999 Auburn, 2000 at Auburn, 2001 Alabama-Birmingham, 2002 Notre Dame, 2003 at Notre Dame, 2005 at Texas A&M and 2006 Texas A&M. The Seminoles still have an opening on their 2004 slate.



### Trick Plays

FLORIDA STATE'S BOBBY BOWDEN was likened to a Riverboat gambler early in his career for his penchant for pulling trick plays at the most unpredictable

times. Bowden shifted his offense to the now famous Fast Break during Charlie Ward's junior year and utilized the direct snap to Warrick Dunn, but some of his most outstanding tricks have been one-play wonders. ABC analyst Beano Cook called Bowden's fake punt at Clemson in 1988 (The Puntrooskie) "the greatest play since My Fair Lady."



### Walk-Ons Rewarded

TWO OF FLORIDA STATE'S defensive stars last year came to the program as walk-ons. Defensive end Andre

Wadsworth left FSU as a consensus All-American and the third pick in last year's NFL Draft while rover Shevin Smith was a sixth round selection by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Both came to FSU in the fall of 1993 overlooked by other schools, but recruited to walk-on at Florida State. Five (Atreus Bell, Clay Ingram, Billy Rhodes, Bobby Rhodes and Ryan Sprague) current scholarship Seminoles came to school as walk-ons.



### The War Chant

FLORIDA STATE'S "WAR CHANT" might appear to have begun

with a random occurrence that took place during a 1984 game against Auburn, but most Seminole historians suggest it to be a tradition that has been over 30 years in it's evolution. In the 1960s, the Marching Chiefs band would chant the melody of a popular FSU cheer called "massacre." In a sense, "massacre" was the long-version of FSU's current "war chant". During a thrilling game with Auburn in 1984, the Marching Chiefs began to perform the dormant cheer. Some students behind the band joined in and continued the "war chant" portion after the band had ceased. The result, which was not very melodic at the time, sounded more like chants attributed to American Indians in Western movies. Most agree the chant came from the fraternity section, but many spirited Seminole fans added the hand motion to symbolize the brandishing of a tomahawk. The chant continued among the student body during the 1985 season, and by the 1986 season, it was a stadium-wide phenomenon. Of course, the Marching Chiefs refined the chant, plus put their own special brand of accompaniment to the "war chant", for the sound we here today.

By the time the Atlanta Braves started with it, the chant and the arm motion generally were associated with Florida State's rising football program. The Kansas City Chiefs first heard it when the Northwest Missouri State band, directed by 1969 FSU graduate Al Sergel, performed the chant while the players were warming up for a game against San Diego.



### Weinke

QUARTERBACK CHRIS WEINKE is not your typical college sophomore. Weinke, in his second year at Florida State, turned 26 in

July. He was the nation's top prep signal caller during the fall of 1989 and signed with FSU the following February. He went through four days of preseason workouts as a Seminole in August of 1990 before signing a professional baseball contract with the Toronto Blue Jays. After climbing as high as Class AAA and spending two weeks in the major leagues in six seasons in the Blue Jays' organization, Weinke got the itch to play college football again. While with Toronto's Knoxville, TN farm club, Weinke talked to former Tennessee quarterback Peyton Manning, the No. 1 pick in last year's NFL Draft, and Manning suggested that he give college football a try again. Weinke contacted Seminole coaches in the fall of 1996 about a possible return and took FSU head coach Bobby Bowden up on his open offer to return to Florida State at any time. Weinke enrolled in January of 1997, was the third string quarterback last fall and will likely be the starter in the season-opener against Texas A&M if Dan Kendra is not fully rehabilitated from spring knee surgery.

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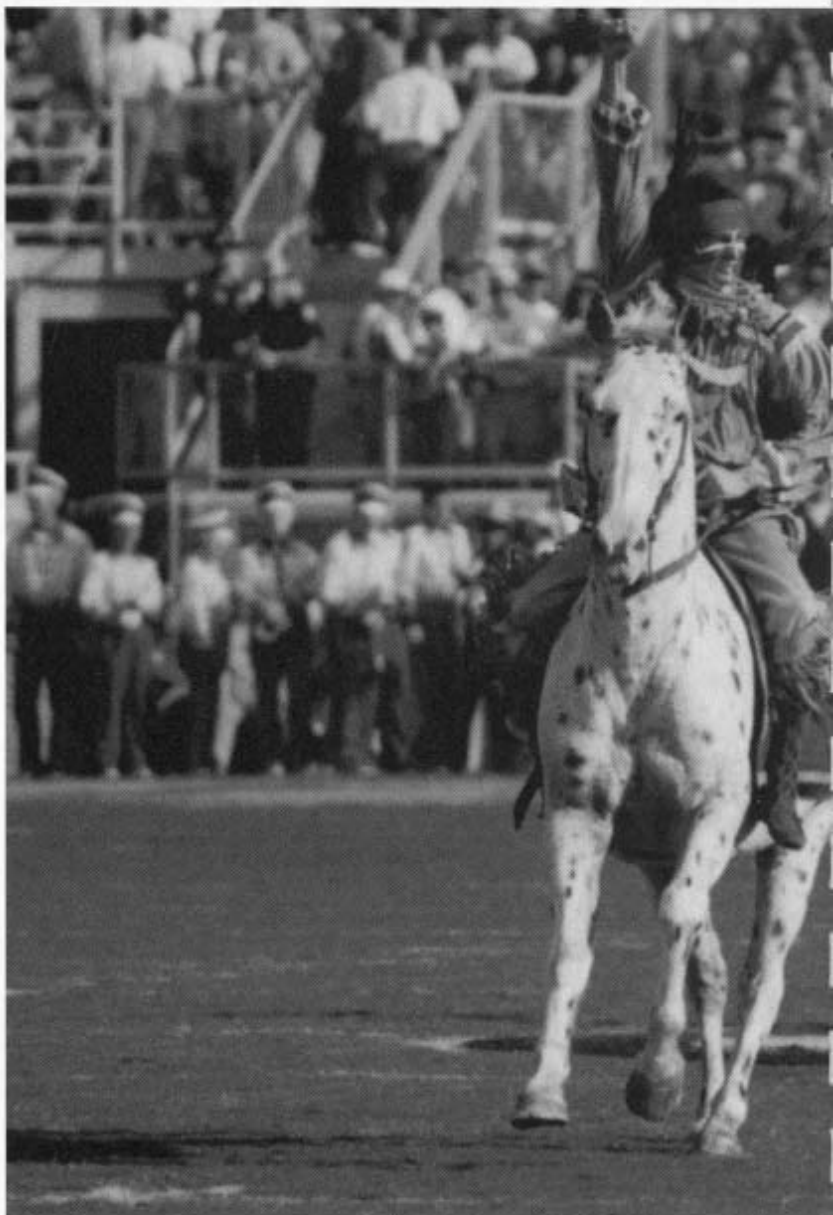

# MEDIA INFORMATION

All media, with the exception of the live network telecast crew, will work from the 9th level of the press box. Media can access the press box only through the designated elevator in the northwest tower of the University Center. Media should proceed down Stadium Drive after parking and move towards the first gate (Gate B) in the northwest corner of the endzone. Do not enter the stadium, however, as you must proceed to the right and enter through the external doors marked "Press Entrance."

## Credential Requests

All requests for working press, radio, television, photography or scouting credentials should be directed to Sports Information Director Rob Wilson no later than one week prior to the game. Requests for season credentials should be made at least two weeks prior to the first game.

Space for the working press, radio and television is allocated by the FSU Sports Information Office.

## Press Policies

Working press only will be admitted to the press box where seats will be credentialed by FSU according to the following criteria:

1. State newspapers by circulation, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponents' area and student newspapers from FSU and opponents' schools.
2. Other daily newspapers with preference to those which regularly cover FSU.
3. Radio and television personnel not broadcasting, but considered reporting (seats may be provided in the stands and locker room access granted).
4. Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those which regularly cover FSU.
5. Scouts.

Freelance and/or non-daily writers may be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. In some cases, these materials will be required as verification of the writers' status. Your cooperation and understanding is requested in such instances.

## Media Headquarters

The media headquarters hotel for Florida State football and basketball will be the new DoubleTree Hotel located at 101 South Adams Street in downtown Tallahassee. The DoubleTree is just a block from the state capitol building and within walking distance of the Leon County Civic Center. Most media functions, including the Sunday morning "Break-

fast with Bobby," will be held at the DoubleTree. The FSU sports information office has a limited number of rooms set aside for accredited media during home football weekends. Contact Lynn Hobby of the SID office at (850/644-2016) to make reservations for these rooms. Priority will be determined in the same manner spelled out under "press policies."

**SPECIAL NOTE** — Media reservations for the DoubleTree will require a TWO NIGHT MINIMUM. There will be no exceptions. When reserving a room through FSU, it will be necessary to give a credit card number to guarantee the room. Florida State may have a limited number of rooms available at the team hotel for road games. Media should contact Hobby for information on availability of these rooms.

## Radio-TV

Florida State will host network television and both home and visiting radio in booths in the press box. Network television (or the network broadcasting live) will be working from a mid-field booth on the 8th Level (one below working press). Both home and visiting radio will broadcast from booths at the south end of the 9th Level.

## Photographers

Only accredited photographers and those shooting for the FSU Sports Information Office will be issued working credentials.

Florida State reserves the right to admit only those photographers deemed to be on the premises for legitimate media purposes. All photographers working FSU games should be prepared to show a media ID card and equipment designed to photograph major college football.

Florida State uses a double photo line system on its sidelines. Only those photographers actually shooting the game will be allowed on the "front" line. These shooters will be given photo armbands upon check-in to allow them front line access. All other photo personnel will be required to stay behind a second line so as not to obstruct the view of the shooters. This would include grips, runners and sideline reporters. Violation of the double-line system will result in removal from the sideline. No media personnel are allowed in the team area of the sidelines at any time during a game.

Sideline passes for local television will be severely curtailed for televised games and each station will be restricted to two passes. Still photographers may have access to the sidelines only. Those holding a still photography credential should report to the gate specified on the pass, where they will be issued an armband, rosters and a pre-game meal. The only access to the field is through the gate at the northwest corner of the stadium near Gate A.

## Media Information

### Video Services

Florida State's Sports Information Office has the ability to assist networks and television stations by providing video services through Seminole Productions, Inc. (SPI). The FSU athletic department has a working relationship with SPI and its general manager, Mark Rodin, whose office is located in the Moore Athletic Center. Seminole Productions has editing and studio facilities on site and can produce material upon request. In most cases, there will be a nominal fee charged for these services. ### Press Parking

Once again, parking is extremely limited in 1998 and passes will be issued on a priority basis within the same guidelines as working credentials.

The Telecommunications Office can provide both lines and phones. Please specify the type of line needed (i.e. touchtone, etc.).

### Fax Service

An independent fax service will be available for each game. Please contact a member of the Sports Information Office staff during the game to secure post-game fax service.

### Interviews

Media interviews with all FSU players should be arranged through the Sports Information Office. For phone interviews, a staff member will fill out a card asking the player to return the call. Please give one day advance notice when requesting players for mid-week interviews. All player calls to the media will be made collect.

Seminole players are available to the media on a daily basis during the lunch hours in the atrium area of the Moore Athletic Center. Contact the Sports Information staff member working lunch with your request. Advance notice is helpful in setting up face-to-face interviews to ensure that the player requested will be present that day.

Anyone wishing to schedule an interview with Head Coach Bobby Bowden should contact his assistant, Sue Hall, at 850/644-0097.

### ACC Faxback

Florida State no longer mails its football releases each week. Instead, all Florida State football releases, including the daily practice trainer, are available on the ACC Faxback.

The Faxback gives media the capability to request and receive the releases from the conference office or any Atlantic Coast Conference school, including Florida State, simply by dialing a phone number from a fax machine. The ACC Faxback gives the media 24-hour access to the latest press releases and information.

Use of the Faxback is limited to members of the media ONLY. To get the Faxback phone and code numbers, contact the ACC Media Relations Office (336/851-6062) or the Florida State Sports Information Office.

### ACC Teleconference

Each Wednesday during the 1998 football season, Coach Bowden will be available to the media on the ACC football teleconference call, along with the other eight league coaches. Bowden will be on the call from 11:20-11:30 p.m. every Wednesday from Aug. 26 through Nov. 18. Contact the FSU Sports Information Office or the Atlantic Coast Conference Office to get the number for the call, as well as a complete listing of the coaches and times. This is the only weekly conference call Coach Bowden will conduct in 1998.

### ACC Satellite Feed

Video highlights and taped interviews with Florida State players and coaches can be obtained each week via an ACC satellite feed put up by JP Sports. The feed, which will contain at least six minutes of Florida State information, will run weekly beginning the first week in September. Contact FSU or the ACC to get the coordinates and time for the feed.

### Breakfast With Bobby

Following each Seminole home game, Head Coach Bobby Bowden will join the media Sunday morning at 8:30 a.m., for a continental breakfast, followed by a question and answer session. Breakfast with Bobby will be held at the DoubleTree Hotel, FSU's media hotel.

### Conference Call

On road game weekends, media may talk to Bowden via a Sunday conference call. Contact a member of the Sports Information Office during the previous day's game for further information.

### Road Game Credentials

Writers covering Florida State on a regular basis may make requests for road credentials with the opponent school or with the FSU Sports Information Office by Monday of game week.

# POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

Florida State University's athletic staff is well aware of the importance of media coverage and is briefed continually on the role of the media insofar as it interacts with their respective duties. At no time is this cooperation more important than in the post-game interview and locker room procedures. To ensure the most workable situation for members of the media and for the FSU staff, the following procedures *must* be observed:

1. Entrance to the Florida State locker room can be made *only* through the second floor interview room. All members of the media will be directed to this room by the FSU Sports Information staff *immediately* at the conclusion of the game. It is helpful if all media personnel assemble at the tunnel entrance in the north end zone following the conclusion of the game. You will *not* be allowed access to the locker room through the player entrance, so follow closely.
2. Florida State Coach Bobby Bowden will be brought directly to the interview room as soon as he dismisses the team and declares the locker room open.
3. When Coach Bowden makes his appearance in the interview room, members of the media who wish to go to the locker room will be shown the proper route. Down one flight of stairs leads directly into the player dressing area.
4. FLORIDA STATE'S LOCKER ROOM IS OPEN TO ALL MEDIA. HOWEVER, IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT FEMALE REPORTERS INFORM FSU SPORTS INFORMATION PERSONNEL DURING THE GAME THAT THEY WILL NEED LOCKER ROOM ACCESS. (FSU players have been assured they will be told on a

5. Exit from the locker room and access back to the press box can be made through the player entrance to the stadium.

Each visiting team will set its own post-game interview policy, which will be announced on the inside public address system in the fourth quarter. Check with the opposing team's sports information personnel in the press box if you have any other questions.

There is an interview room outside the visitors' locker room, where the visiting head coach and/or players may be brought for interviews following the game. The visiting team locker room and interview area is located through the gate at the southeast corner of the field.

It is our desire at Florida State to make the post-game procedure as effective as possible for both the media and our staff. Remember, both groups have important tasks and are under extreme pressure.

The Florida State Athletic Department cannot and will not be responsible for problems incurred by any member of the media not following the above procedures. Security personnel will facilitate only those following the proper guidelines. However, if you encounter a problem while following this procedure, please inform a Sports Information staff member immediately.

# SEMINOLES ON TELEVISION

**C**ouple Florida State's Atlantic Coast Conference lineup with annual games against non-conference foes Miami and Florida, and it's hard to imagine a more difficult college football slate. Every fall, FSU's schedule catches the attention of television sports executives. Lately, the Seminoles have become a cornerstone of the networks' weekly TV lineups.

That fact was evident once again last year when all of FSU's 12 contests were broadcast through regional syndication (JP Sports) or on one of the national networks. Florida State did not disappoint as its games earned high ratings, again!

Indeed, Florida State football and Bobby Bowden have developed a following that stretches from coast to coast. The speed, excitement and unpredictability of the Seminoles make FSU football a fan favorite across the nation.

Since Bowden became Florida State head coach in 1976, his Seminole teams have been featured on one of the six major networks 112 times on 85 national broadcasts. In 22 years, that averages out to four network TV appearances a year. But over the past 10 seasons, that number has increased to more than eight showings a year. More often than not, Bowden's teams have starred under the television lights with a record of 89-26-3 on network TV.

In each of the past 11 years, Florida State's contests with Miami and Florida have been picked up for national television airing. Since 1968, 34 of FSU's games with its intrastate rivals were televised nationally. Now that the Tribe annually battles for the Atlantic Coast Conference crown, league games with Clemson, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, N.C. State and Virginia pose attractive matchups for national and regional audiences.

All-time, the Seminoles' record on television is 105-33-4 since the first appearance in the 1958 Bluegrass Bowl against Oklahoma State, aired by ABC. FSU has appeared on that network more than any other, with 63 showings. CBS has televised 14 Tribe contests, WTBS nine and ESPN 28, including five games in 1989.

Florida State's membership in the Atlantic Coast Conference ensures that FSU football will be seen up and down the

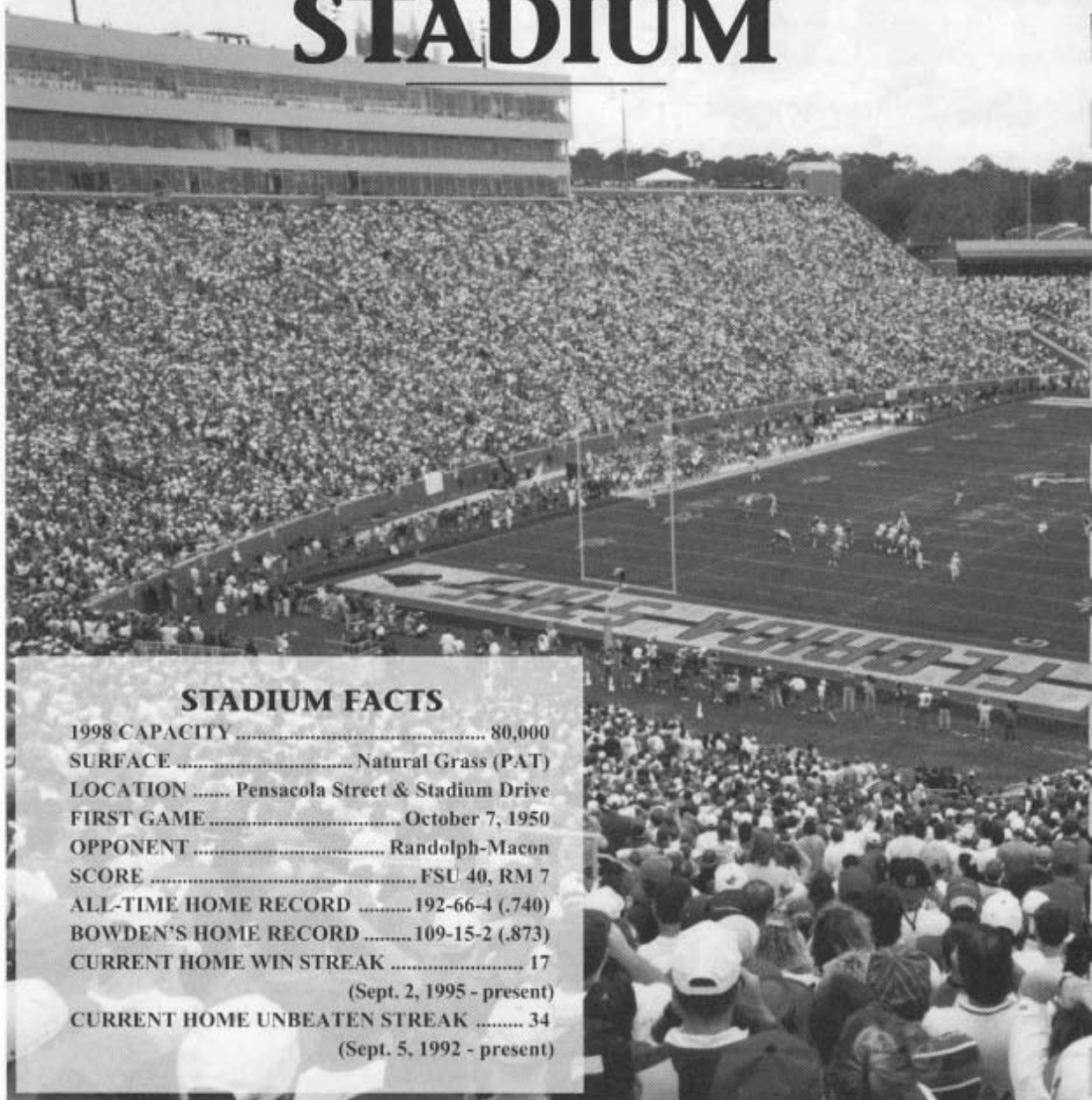

**F**rom a maximum capacity of 15,000 in 1953 to a record crowd of 80,932 against Florida in 1996, Doak S. Campbell Stadium has risen alongside the Florida State football program to the top of the college football ladder. With final phases of construction completed, Seminole fans will be welcomed with state-of-the-art additions.

The newest portion of the stadium is the south end zone, where the last bricks have been placed on the exterior of the stadium wall and the interior received its final finishing touches. The south end zone houses the Florida State school of hospitality education where students in the program receive hands-on experience in various aspects of the food and bev-

erage industry. The multi-level facility includes a food court, a restaurant and a sports grill on the top floor that gives a panoramic view of Doak Campbell Stadium.

The north endzone, which consisted of wooden bleachers until the 1994 season kicked off, is topped by the offices of the football coaches. The offices, which also overlook the field, are just part of the Daisy Parker Flory wing of the Moore Athletic Center which include a number of new amenities for the football staff. In addition, the new wing allowed athletic offices housed in Tully Gym to move over to the Moore Athletic Center and be under one roof for the first time in school history.





Towering above college football action below from the east side are skyboxes which stretch from goal line to goal line. Newly added skyboxes are located above the west stands on the eighth floor. The new west addition also houses the president's level on the seventh floor (which includes an open air terrace in the northwest corner) and one of the largest press boxes in college football that seats over 200 members of the media.

A brick facade surrounds the stadium, matching the architectural design of many of Florida State's campus buildings. The University Center surrounds Doak Campbell Stadium and houses numerous offices that were formerly located

on the interior of the FSU campus.

Inside Doak Campbell, the lowest tier of field level seats has been removed, providing increased sideline space and better viewing lines for the first few rows of fans. A matching brick wall has been constructed along the east and west sidelines, limiting field access, increasing safety and giving the inside of the stadium a whole new look.

The increased seating capacity of Doak Campbell Stadium, up to 80,000 in 1997, means more fans, and no place for all the noise they make to go. That means an even louder stadium. As if Bobby Bowden and his team needed any more home field advantage!

The Seminoles currently own a 17-game home winning streak and have not been beaten in their last 34. In its last 53 home games, FSU is 49-2-1. In 68 contests at Doak Campbell since 1986, the Seminoles stand at 62-4-2. Bobby Bowden's Florida State teams have lost only 16 games at home in 22 years, giving the coach an impressive 110-16-2 record and .867 winning percentage in Tallahassee. A milestone was reached on September 28, 1996 when Bowden won his 100th game in Doak Campbell Stadium as Florida State's head coach with a 13-0 victory over North Carolina.

But the winning feeling of Doak Campbell Stadium goes back before Bowden. All-time, Florida State is 192-66-4 in 262 home games for a winning percentage of .740.

Since the stadium first opened on Oct. 7, 1950 with Florida State taking a 40-7 victory over the Randolph-Macon Yellowjackets, millions of fans have packed Doak Campbell to see the finest in college football action. In 1996, Florida State set a single season attendance mark by drawing 465,200 fans in six home games.

The latest expansion is the ninth in the history of the stadium. The current capacity of 80,000 reflects an increase of 19,481 since the end of the 1991 season.

Florida State first began play at Centennial Field for the inaugural 1947 season. In the three seasons that the Seminoles called Centennial Field their home, FSU had an overall home record of 8-4, including Coach Don Veller's undefeated

8-0 home mark in the 1948 and '49 seasons, respectively.

It's hard to imagine the first Doak Campbell Stadium, with a capacity of 15,000 back in 1950. In 1954, the stadium

grew to a capacity of 19,000. Six thousand more seats were added in 1961. During the Bill Peterson era (1960-70), the stadium was expanded to 40,500 seats, and it remained at that capacity for the next 14 years. Between 1978 and 1982, there were three more additions.

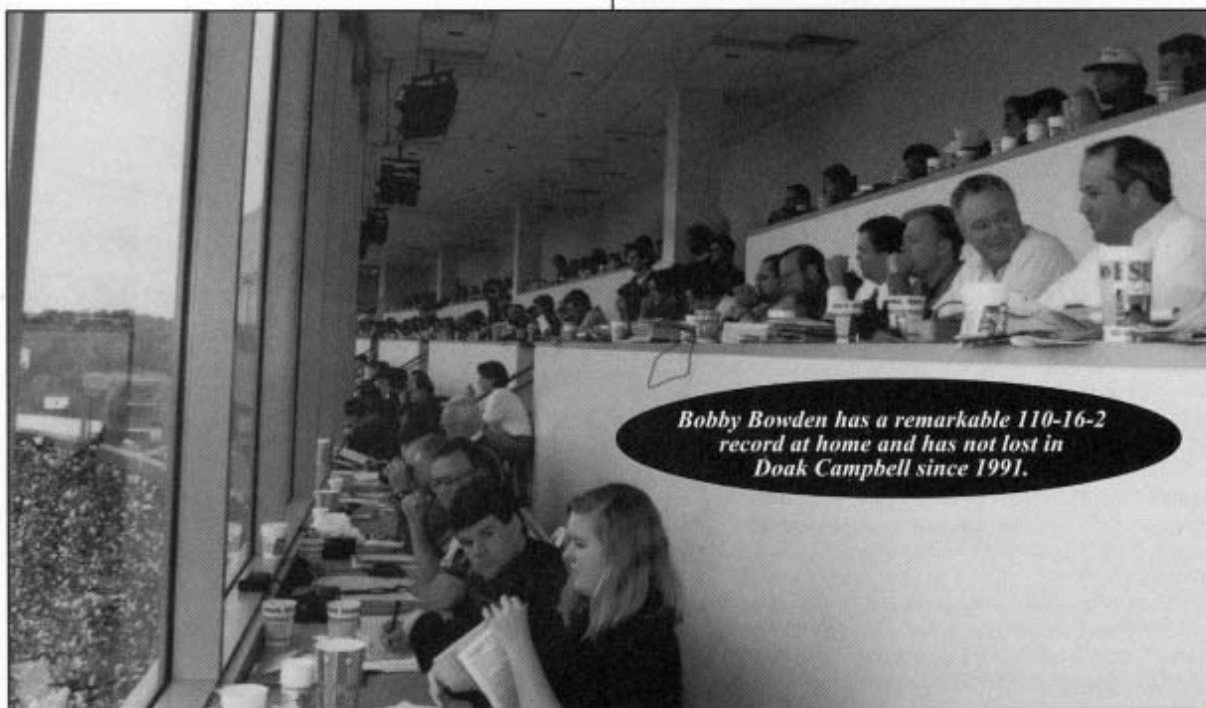
Named for Doak S. Campbell, the first president of Florida State University, the stadium sits adjacent to the Moore Athletic Center on the edge of the main campus. The stadium seats, each one offering an unrestricted view, rise out of a Bermuda grass turf enclosing the field. Fans enjoy all the modern conveniences with spacious aisles, numerous concession areas and plenty of rest room facilities. A professional public address system, first aid booths and effective security system operate at every Seminole home game.

The field itself is one of the finest in college football, carefully managed and manicured year-round. A prescription athletic turf (PAT) system installed in 1988 and completely resodded over the summer, quickly alleviates drainage problems through a series of underground pumps. The field can go from seemingly flooded to merely wet in a matter of minutes, thanks to the pumps, which allow a deeper root system in the natural turf.

Both stadium scoreboards are new. The large scoreboard made its debut in 1992 and features the most technologically advanced scoreboard computer animation system in existence. Entertaining graphics, as well as factual information, make the board a valuable addition to FSU home games.

The 160-foot wide structure was raised to sit on top of the new wing of the Moore Athletic Center in the north end zone following the '93 season. The newest scoreboard is above the south end zone and clearly and conveniently provides all basic information.

With the changes already made since last season, Doak Campbell is growing and improving faster than ever before. Like its residents, the most successful college football program over the past decade, Doak Campbell Stadium has become a fitting showcase for Florida State University.

The regional network brings all the excitement and action of FSU football, as well as pre-game predictions and post-game analysis, to fans, alumni and college football enthusiasts across a five state area. In addition to a strong presence throughout Florida, Georgia and Alabama, stations from North and South Carolina will carry the Seminole football broadcast in 1997.

The Seminole Sports Network is owned and operated by Host/USA Sports, one of the nation's leaders in collegiate sports broadcasting. Florida State joined forces with the Lexington, Ky., based company to establish a comprehensive marketing opportunity which includes radio, television, print and corporate sponsorship components.

In addition to Florida State, Host owns the rights to the networks of other outstanding schools like Texas, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, South Carolina and Mississippi State. Host has a long-term broadcast and print relationship with the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

The Seminole Sports Football Network will reach into nearly 60 markets in 1998, including some of the largest markets in the country. In Tallahassee, all the Seminole football action can be heard on flagship station WTNT-FM (94.9).

Florida State's professional broadcast crew is known as

one of the nation's best as they provide insight and entertainment, as well as detailed and expert play-by-play.

The broadcast features award-winning play-by-play announcer Gene Deckerhoff, a 20-year veteran of the FSU radio network. He is joined for portions of the pre- and post-game shows by Tallahassee television sportscaster Tom Block. After the game, the popular "Seminole Calls" show allows listeners to call in with their questions and opinions on the just-completed game.

Deckerhoff is nationally known as one of the finest announcers in the South. The "Voice of the Seminoles" for the past 19 years, he is an eight-time Florida Sportscaster of the Year. For 16 of the past 18 years, Deckerhoff has been named the best college and pro football play-by-play announcer in the state by the Florida Sportscasters Association.

A native of Jacksonville, Fla., Deckerhoff also serves as the play-by-play announcer for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers of the NFL for the past 10 years, making for some very busy fall weekends. Deckerhoff is also the producer and co-host of "The Bobby Bowden Show," and co-host of Bowden's weekly call-in radio show. He runs Gene Deckerhoff Productions, a firm specializing in sports broadcasting and the production of radio and television commercials.

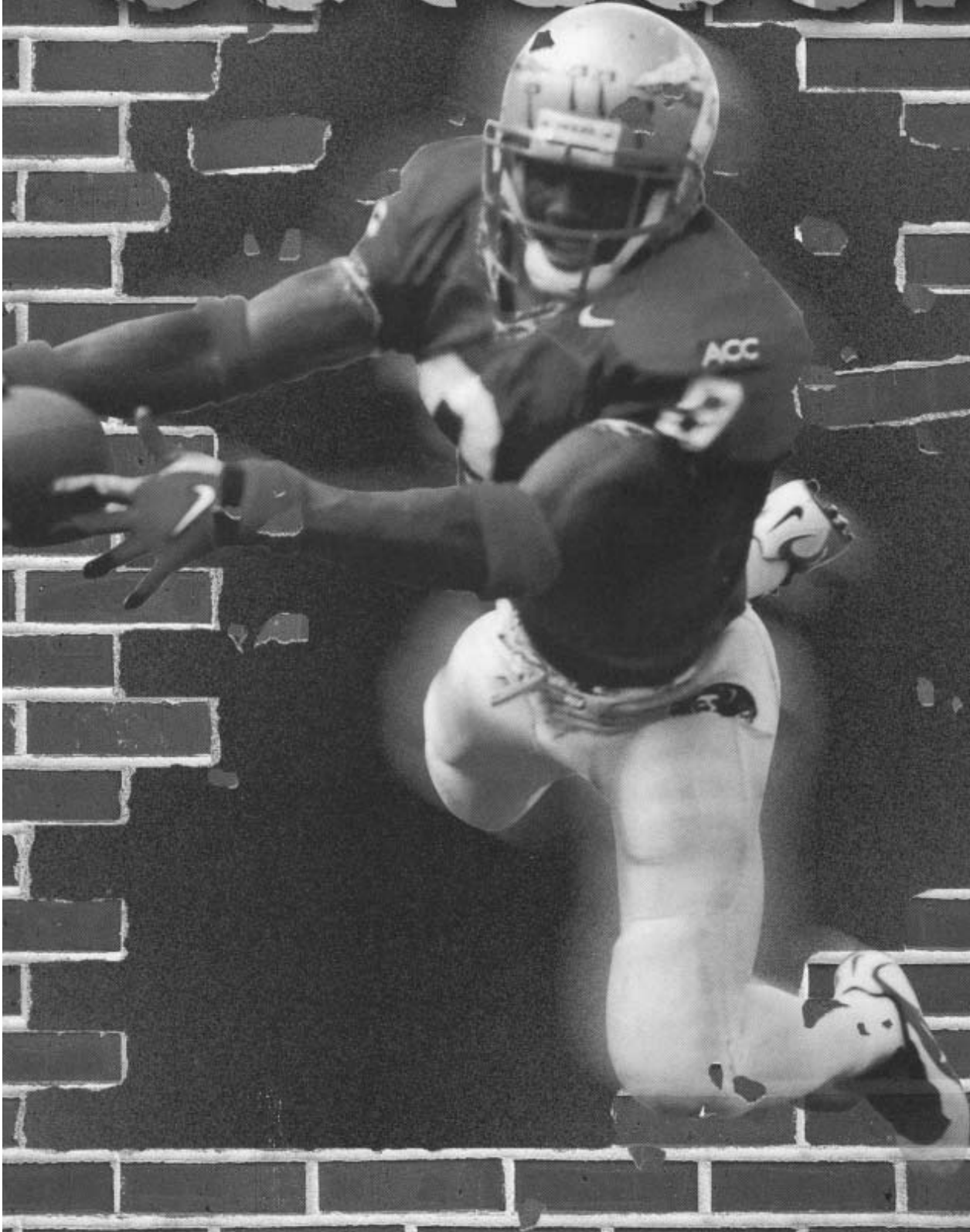

# 1998 PRESEASON OUTLOOK

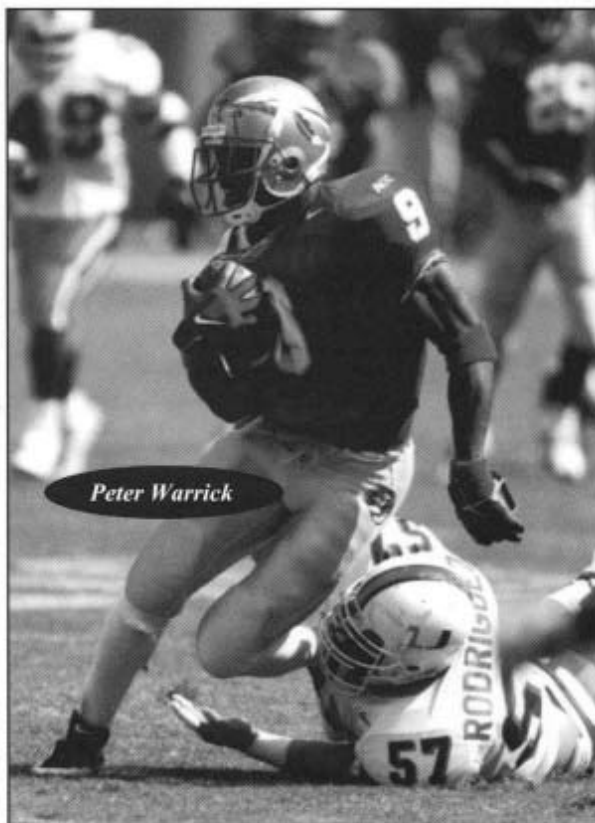
**F**lorida State will begin the 1998 season with the same goal as 1997—to win the national title. That lofty goal seems somewhat reachable when one considers the fact that the Seminoles return 14 starters and all of their primary special team players from last year's squad that finished 11-1 and ranked third in both the Associated Press and ESPN/*USA Today* polls. The finish extended a pair of incredible NCAA records as FSU continued to be the only program in the history of college football to finish among the Top Four in the AP poll for 11 straight years and kept alive a record of 11 consecutive seasons with 10 or more wins. To put the streak into perspective consider the current list of consecutive AP Top Four finishes: Florida State 11, Florida 3, Michigan 1,

Nebraska 1.

To finish among the nation's best again in 1998, FSU must once again replace talented players who will get a shot at the NFL this year, but there is one position opening that has had fans in the Sunshine State talking since the moment the Seminoles left the Superdome field with a win over Ohio State in last year's Sugar Bowl. Florida State's starting quarterback position is open and there is nothing like a good quarterback battle to fuel preseason practice.

More on the race for that position later as FSU offensive coaches have some other concerns before they are ready to travel to the Meadowlands for an August 31st, prime-time showdown with Texas A&M. The Tribe must find new

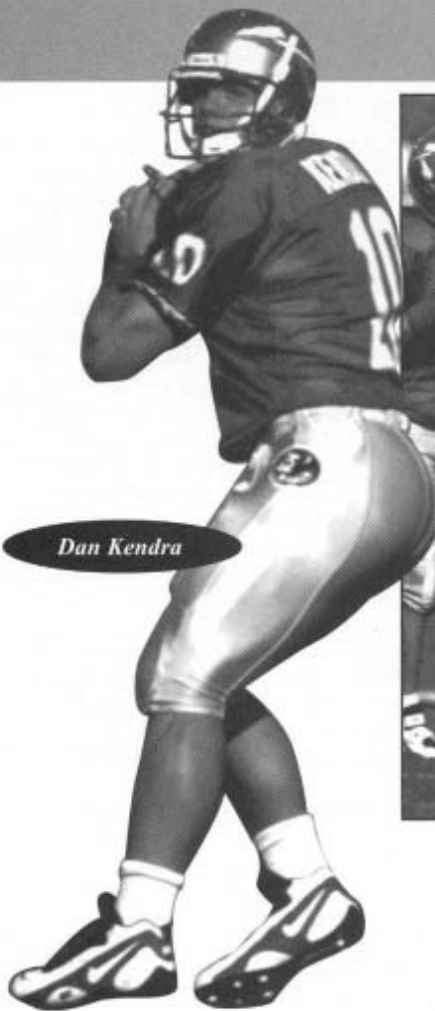

starters at center, tight end and tight tackle along with a new signal caller. And while **Thad Busby** left big shoes to fill, the 'Noles may actually have a tougher time replacing wide receiver **E.G. Green** whose 29 career touchdown receptions set a new school record.

The good news for the Seminoles on the offensive front is that a battery of outstanding young offensive linemen return along with a stable of exceptional talent at wide receiver, and a running back who might be as good as any in the country.

"We are excited about the potential of our offense this year," said Bobby Bowden. "We've got a whole lot of work to do, but we do have a lot of players who have the talent to get it done. Naturally, the quarterback battle will be the key in the fall. I was very confident with **Dan Kendra's** ability last year and I would not have hesitated to play him in any situation. He had a fine spring and was our number one guy going into the fall. Whether he can get his knee rehabilitated in time for the season will be something we just will not know until August. I hate it (the injury) for him. He has worked so hard and been so patient. I liked what I saw out of all three of our quarterbacks in the spring. I think if Dan's injury allows him to play he will be ready and he'll play well, but he's going to have to perform to stay ahead of **Chris Weinke** and **Marcus Outzen**. Weinke's a proto-type, pro-style quarterback. He's got a very strong arm and great size. He's just got to learn the system and I think he showed during spring that he's very close. Outzen's got a lot of ability as well. I think he probably made the most progress in the spring and was challenging before his injury (separated shoulder) cut things short."

"We've got a lot of work to do along the offensive line this fall as well, but we've probably got better depth there than we have had in a long time. We really had problems at times last year running the football. We lost our power running game and that starts with the line. We'll try and re-establish our ability to move the football on the ground early this fall.

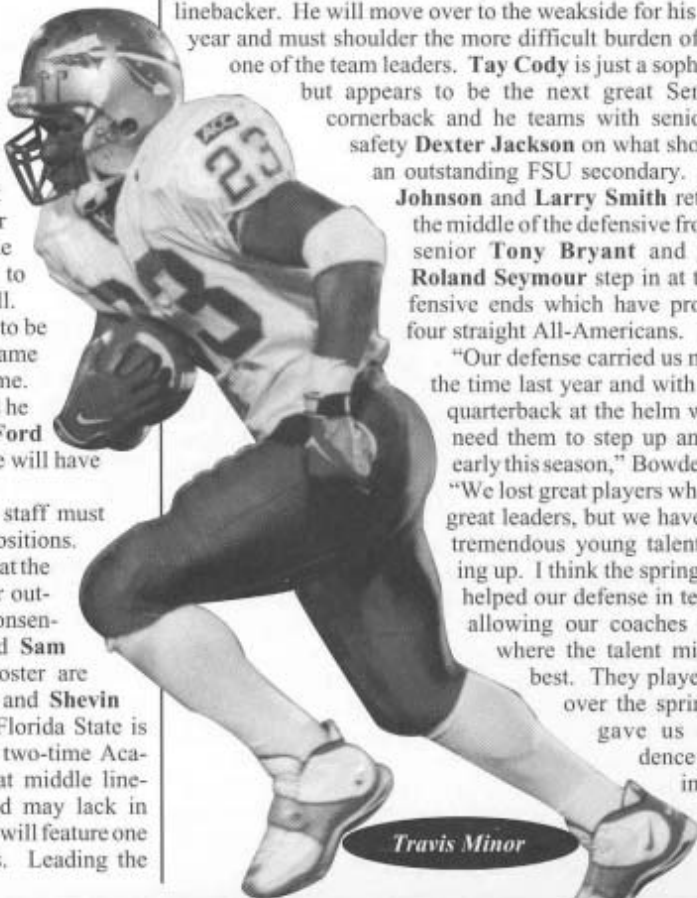
"Our skill positions on offense are going to be very young, but very good. **Peter Warrick** came on last year and he must anchor our passing game. **Travis Minor** played better than I ever hoped he would as a freshman at running back. **Davy Ford** was exceptional as well, but we're not sure he will have recovered from knee surgery by the fall."

Defensively, Mickey Andrews and his staff must once again replace All-Americans at several positions. History, however, would lead one to believe that the Seminoles are well equipped to field another outstanding defensive unit. Gone for 1998 are consensus All-Americans **Andre Wadsworth** and **Sam Cowart**. Also missing from the spring roster are familiar stars **Greg Spires**, **Samari Rolle** and **Shevin Smith**. But the man, and the quality, that Florida State is likely to have the most trouble replacing is two-time Academic All-American and four-year starter at middle linebacker **Daryl Bush**. What the 1998 squad may lack in experience they may make up in talent as 1998 will feature one of the Tribe's most athletic defensive units. Leading the

charge will be five returning starters — all of whom had fine seasons last year. **Lamont Green** has proven he can get the job done on the field as he started all of last year at strongside linebacker. He will move over to the weakside for his senior year and must shoulder the more difficult burden of being one of the team leaders. **Tay Cody** is just a sophomore

but appears to be the next great Seminole cornerback and he teams with senior free safety **Dexter Jackson** on what should be an outstanding FSU secondary. **Jerry Johnson** and **Larry Smith** return in the middle of the defensive front and senior **Tony Bryant** and junior **Roland Seymour** step in at the defensive ends which have produced four straight All-Americans.

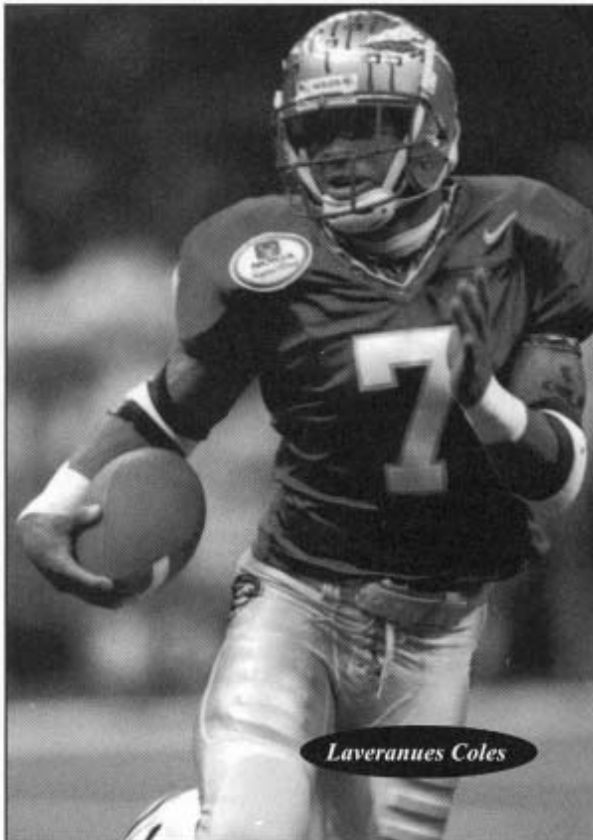
"Our defense carried us most of the time last year and with a new quarterback at the helm we will need them to step up and lead early this season," Bowden said. "We lost great players who were great leaders, but we have some tremendous young talent coming up. I think the spring really helped our defense in terms of allowing our coaches to see where the talent might fit best. They played well over the spring and gave us confidence going into the fall

drills. We have had so many terrific players on defense over the last several seasons that losing them has become less of a traumatic experience. We've got guys with the talent to step up, but the question is whether they can provide the leadership needed."

Providing another measure of security for Bowden and his staff is the fact that every key member of the special teams' units from last year will return, including punter **Keith Cottrell** and sensational place kicker **Sebastian Janikowski**.

"A great kicking game is like holding an extra ace in your hand," said Bowden. "It allows you to take some chances on offense and defense that you might not take if you're unsure of your special teams. Janikowski had a great freshman year and should get better. Cottrell was good on punts and should get stronger. I don't know when I've had everybody return like this year. We've got snappers, returners, holders, the whole package is back. (Peter) Warrick was a game-breaker on punt returns where he had three returns for scores called back by penalties in 1997.

"Overall, we need to be a more productive rushing offense in 1998. We played great defense last year, but we can't give up the big plays as against Florida. The schedule worked against us with all those big games on the road. We still play the great teams, but we've got Southern California at home, Clemson at home, North Carolina, Virginia and Florida at home. Since we open with Texas A&M in the Kickoff Classic, we've got to be awfully good right out of the blocks. Texas A&M is a heck of a football team and August 31st is right around the corner.

## Quarterbacks

The bad news for the Seminoles is that **Thad Busby** is gone. After all, he posted a 21-2 record as the starting quarterback over the last two years and threw for more yards last season than any quarterback in FSU history. His departure turns the glare of media attention into the face of three outstanding prospects.

Junior **Dan Kendra** enters fall drills with an uncertain task. If he's healthy, he will be the Seminoles starting signal caller when the Tribe begins camp. Whether he will be available for the start of the year is a very real question. He suffered a completely torn ACL in his right knee during the spring game and underwent arthroscopic surgery on April 9th. He is on a 20-week recovery plan and if any athlete could make it back he could, but team doctors, trainers and coaches agree that a healthy knee, no matter when, is the top priority. When he does make it back, Kendra brings phenomenal athletic ability to the position with the size of a fullback, the speed of a tailback, the mentality of a linebacker, and, most importantly, the passing ability of a quarterback. Coaches were not able to play him as much as they would have liked last year, but he did complete 20-of-37 passes for 341 yards and three touchdowns. He also ran for 73 yards on 18 carries. Kendra has starting experience as he won the Wake Forest game as a freshman in 1996 when Busby sat out with an injury.

Pushing Kendra all spring were a pair of sophomores. **Chris Weinke** has everyone excited with his big league passing abilities. The number one quarterback in the country as a high school senior in 1989, Weinke played pro baseball with Toronto for six years, but went through the entire 1997 season with the Seminoles. He's big, strong and mature. He showed coaches during spring that he was ready to play "winning football" for the Seminoles.

**Marcus Outzen** has already proven he can handle pressure as the holder for field goals and extra points last year. He brings great size and athletic ability to the position. He played exceptionally well during the spring and, in fact, graded out the best of the quarterbacks over the first two scrimmages of spring before a separated shoulder sent him to the sidelines for the last two weeks.

## Running Backs

**Travis Minor** entered FSU last year as one of its most heralded recruits ever and finished his first collegiate season as the ACC Rookie of the Year. Minor gained 623 yards on 112 carries and scored 11 touchdowns last year establishing himself as one of the nation's top ball carriers. A star on the track as well, Minor did not participate in spring drills while competing on the Seminole sprint team.

FSU running backs coach Billy Sexton was actually without the Tribe's top two running backs during spring and **Davy Ford's** absence may include all of this season. Ford gained 258 yards on 61 carries as a true freshman last year, but underwent reconstructive knee surgery after missing the Sugar Bowl. He may undergo a medical redshirt to give the injury more time to heal.

With their top two guns missing in spring, FSU coaches looked for someone to step up and pair of players did. Sophomore **Jeff Chaney** moved from defensive back to tailback and had an excellent spring. He is 10 pounds lighter than last year and proved he was ready to play. The least known quantity heading in spring drills was West Los Angeles College transfer **Raymont Skaggs**. Skaggs, a junior,

showed great open field running ability and elusive moves. He got a great opportunity during spring and made the best of it, earning playing time at tailback this fall.

The fullback numbers were also thin during spring but confidence in returning starter **Lamarr Glenn** allowed coaches to experiment with his backfield mates. Glenn has had a solid career and enters his senior season with great potential at the position.

Coaches used sophomore **William McCray** at tailback over the first half of spring drills which tells something of his ability as a runner. He has improved as a blocker and will enter his second year at FSU as the second team fullback.

Another successful experiment by the FSU coaches was the move of senior **Billy Rhodes** from defensive line, to offensive line, to fullback over the last four months. His terrific size and ability to clear a hole are what coaches are looking for in the red zone this year. He will be the "road-grader" for the running game in 1998.

## Receivers

**Peter Warrick** returns as one of the nation's top players as he begins his junior season on the heels of a spectacular sophomore year. Warrick has averaged 18.0 yards per reception over his career and last year gained 884 yards on 53 catches. He scored eight touchdowns through the air, averaging over 44 yards per score. He is one of the most exciting players in all of college football and could be the most explosive player the Seminoles have produced in years.

Moving into a starting role at the opposite wide out will be junior **Laveranues Coles** who will be looking for a more consistent season in 1998. With **E.G. Green** gone, Coles will have more room to step up and make plays in the Seminole passing game.

**Ron Dugans** will likely emerge as the third starter when the Seminoles use their three-wide sets. Dugans appeared headed for a great junior season in 1997 until a hand injury suffered just prior to the first game forced him to miss virtually the entire year. Big, physical and competitive, Dugans makes the tough catch over the middle.

Listed behind Coles and Dugans at split end to start the fall will be true freshman **Robert Morgan** and sophomore **Tres Walton**. Morgan originally signed with the Seminoles last fall, but did not enroll until January. He joined the team after the fall semester was over and impressed coaches during Sugar Bowl practices with outstanding speed and precise routes. Walton has battled injuries since he arrived at FSU and needs a healthy preseason to get in the mix for playing time.

Backing up Peter Warrick at flanker will be sophomore **Marvin Minnis** who may prove to be the emotional leader among the re-

ceivers. He made some big catches as a freshman last year and should use the preseason to establish more playing time this fall. Freshman **Atrews Bell** moved over from defensive back during spring and showed very good hands. With a little more experience, Bell will push for playing time in the receiving corps. Junior **Germaine Stringer**, whose blazing speed makes him a threat on every pattern, is likely to return kickoffs this fall.

## Offensive Line

Florida State returns three starters from last year's offensive line, but must find replacements for departing NFL draftees **Tra Thomas** and **Kevin Long**. **Jason Whitaker** earned All-ACC honors at split guard as a sophomore last year and has two years of starting experience under his belt. Sophomore **Donald Heaven** started last year at tight guard and could be outstanding this year, but will have a fight on his hands to keep his position. **Ross Brannon** started all but two games at split tackle as a freshman in 1997 and should benefit from the off-season weight program leading into the year, but he too will be pushed during the fall.

**Jerry Carmichael** will begin the pre-season with a chance to unseat Whitaker at guard. He moves down from tackle where he backed up Ross Brannon most of last year with a pair of starts late in the season. Coaches are confident in Carmichael's ability and if he does not emerge at split guard, his talent may earn him a place somewhere else on the line. Solid reserve **Jeremy Brett** returns at split guard for his junior season, but missed most of spring with a broken foot.

Pushing incumbent starter Donald Heaven at tight guard

in August will be **Justin Amman** who used a good spring to put him in the mix on the two-deep. Nipping at the heels of Brannon at split tackle will be 310-pound sophomore **Tarlos Thomas**.

With those starters returning and solid reserves in place, Coach Jimmy Heggins' attention will be focused on finding the replacements at center and tackle. Junior **Eric Thomas** and sophomore **Jarad Moon** emerged from a heated spring dead even. The battle between the two at center was so good that coaches feel that either could start and both will play a great deal.

The tight tackle position, which has produced back-to-back NFL first round draft picks in **Walter Jones** and **Tra Thomas**, was up for grabs this spring and the winner may be a surprise to some. Sophomore **Char-ron Dorsey** moved from defensive line just prior to spring and his natural skills and tenacious play moved him quickly up the depth chart. While he certainly lacks experience, the 325-pound Dorsey has coaches excited about his potential at the position. Slated for reserve duty at least when camp opens in August is sophomore **Otis Duhart** who also has all the physical tools to be a solid young player this year.

## Tight Ends

John Lilly makes his full-time coaching debut after taking over for Ronnie Cottrell as the Seminoles' tight end coach and recruiting coordinator. His first order of business will be to find a replacement for All-ACC performer **Melvin Pearsall** who set the school record for touchdowns by a tight end last year.

**Myron Jackson** is a senior who enters fall drills as the number one man at tight end. An excellent blocker, Jackson used the spring to establish himself as a reliable receiver. Behind him will be four talented but inexperienced players.

Junior college transfer **Nick Franklin** brings an impressive resume' into his first action at FSU and he begins the fall as the back-up. Sophomore **Carver Donaldson** played sparingly last year and freshman **Stacy Davis** redshirted during his rookie season, but both will be available at the position. Sophomore **Ryan Sprague** saw action on special teams as a freshman.

## Defensive Line

Florida State will rely on a pair of very physical players to lead a young but deep group along the defensive front. Junior **Jerry Johnson** had an excellent 1997 season and gives the Tribe a leader inside. Nose tackle **Larry Smith** came out of nowhere to have an outstanding sophomore year and he kept it up this past spring in earning MVP honors for the spring drills. Both bring tremendous intensity and experience to the inside of the defense. Backing both up, primarily because he missed all of the spring after shoulder surgery, is one of the Seminoles most talented players in junior **Corey Simon**.

Listed behind Johnson and Simon at tackle as spring drills begin will be sophomore **Bryne Malone** and freshman **Ronald Boldin**. Malone has all the tools to become a fine player but needs time. Boldin moved from offensive line during the spring and must work his way into playing time.

Stepping into what has become one of the nation's most glamorous positions, at least at the start of fall drills, will be **Tony Bryant** and **Roland Seymour** who hope to continue FSU's string of four straight All-Americans at defensive end. This year will be Bryant's senior season but only his second year at FSU after transferring from a junior college. He is slated to start at right defensive end where he saw considerable action last year. Just a sophomore, Seymour must step in and play at the left end position vacated by consensus All-American **Andre Wadsworth**.

Pushing Bryant at right end will be sensational sophomore **Jamal Reynolds** who pushed for starting honors all spring and could win them in the fall with his combination of intensity and talent. **Chris Walker** should see time there as well in his junior year.

**David Warren**, the *USA Today* Defensive Player of the Year as a high school senior, begins his second year at FSU as the back-up to Seymour at left end. Warren had a sensational spring capped by a 4.46 clocking in the 40-yard dash in April. **Ed Mitchell** moved from linebacker to the left end to provide depth in the spring and showed he was ready for some playing time.

## Linebackers

The linebacking corps was hit hardest by graduation with the departure of it's four-year starter at middle linebacker, **Daryl Bush**, and a consensus All-America, **Sam Cowart**. Coach Chuck Amato experimented all spring with a number of talented players who hoped to fill some mighty big shoes. While the Seminoles entered the spring more concerned about the linebacker position than any other, the fact that the 15 practices turned into a war for starting honors has defensive coaches feeling good going into the fall. The competition has been so close at the positions that Amato will likely keep his depth chart written in pencil right up until the first game.

The best news for FSU at linebacker is that **Lamont Green** returns for his senior season after starting on the strongside last year, however he will play the weakside in 1998. An outstanding performer over the last two years, Green appears anxious to lead this young group and he is



capable of earning a place on All-America squads this year. Backing up Green as the fall drills begin are a pair of talented players who are certain to earn playing time somewhere this fall. **Theon Rackley** is a junior from Tallahassee who will work at all three positions this spring. Junior **Bobby Rhodes** earned a scholarship last year and will line up this fall at several positions and add depth here and at strongside linebacker.

Sophomore sensation **Brian Allen** and senior **Demetro Stephens** will continue their heated battle for starting honors at middle linebacker into pre-season practice with Allen holding a slight edge. The cousin of former FSU All-America defensive end **Reinard Wilson**, Allen has the size and speed to be outstanding. Stephens has gained a lot of experience over his career but still needs to be more consistent. If either of them lets up during August watch for freshman **Bradley Jennings** to come roaring through at middle linebacker.

The hottest name for the Seminoles during spring drills was a sophomore who may have earned starting honors at strongside linebacker. **Tommy Polley** lacks a lot of game experience but showed remarkable ability and natural instincts during the spring. He will be listed number one going into the fall. Right behind him is senior **Deon Humphrey** who, along with Jennings, was named the most improved linebacker during spring. He was timed at under 4.5 in the 40 and seems ready to dominate in FSU's attacking style. Rhodes will back-up here as well.

## Defensive Backs

Defensive Coordinator Mickey Andrews also had a busy spring trying to replace departed starters **Samari Rolle** and **Shevin Smith**, but his practice of playing a lot of people during the course of a season should pay off this year.

Returning to a Seminole defensive backfield with the potential to be one of the best in years are senior free safety **Dexter Jackson** and standout sophomore cornerback **Tay Cody**. Jackson should emerge as one of the overall leaders of this FSU team and his ability to play the run and pass from safety makes him an All-American candidate. Cody, who earned a place on several freshman All-America teams, had as good a freshman season as any FSU cornerback of the Bowden era. Talented and physical, Cody is a superb defender with excellent speed.

Junior **Todd Frier** had a huge sack on a blitz in the Sugar Bowl against Ohio State and will likely back-up Jackson at free safety. **Shawn McCorkel** has played very well on special teams, but needs to show coaches he has the discipline to play as a sophomore.

Behind Cody at the right corner will be sophomore **Clevan Thomas**. Thomas showed great potential last year and had a tremendous spring. He ran at first team left corner in the spring game and should see a lot of playing this fall.

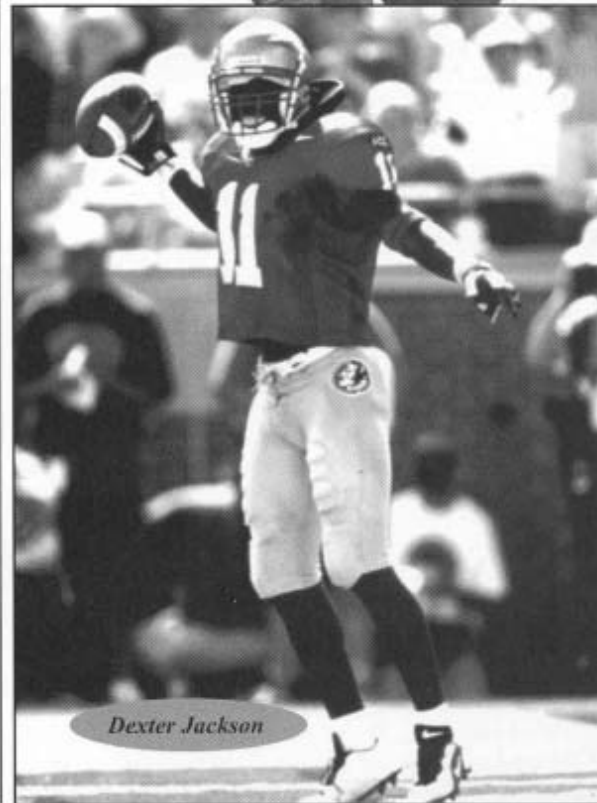
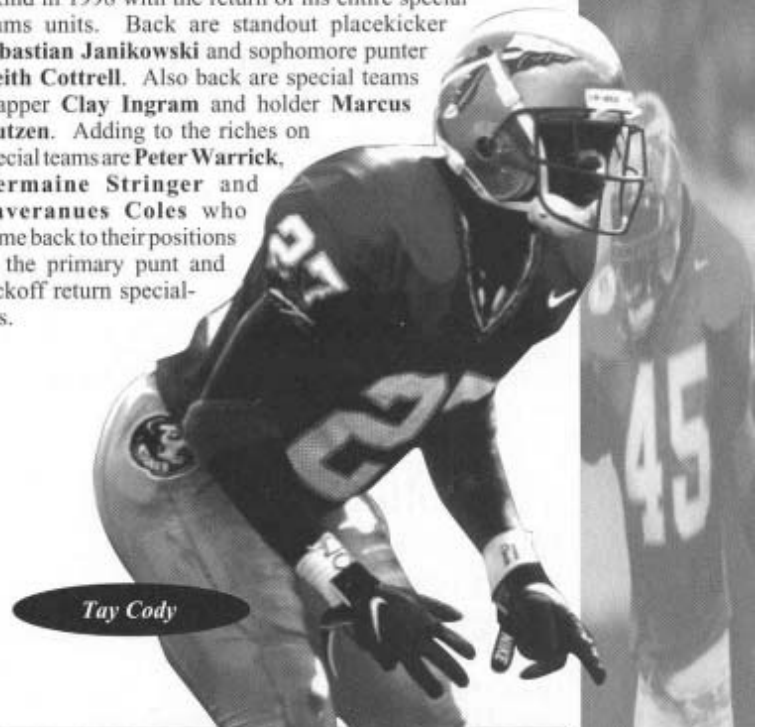
Senior **Troy Saunders** has the edge at left cornerback after playing the nickel-back most of last season. He will be pushed by junior college transfer **Reggie Durden**, who proved over his first spring that he will be hard to keep out of the lineup. Also backing up at cornerback will be sophomore **Abdual Howard** who just needs more scrimmage experience.

Sophomore **Derrick Gibson** will take over for big-play specialist Smith at the rover position after an outstanding spring. He has the talent, but must prove to coaches he can make things happen from the position. Bolstering the entire secondary will be the return of **Sean Key** for his junior season at rover. The likely starter last year, Key was suspended for the 1997 season, but should push for playing time immedi-

ately in 1998. Walk-on **Jean Jeune** has worked his way up the depth chart and is in contention for a spot in the defensive backfield.

## Specialists

If having a good kicking game is like having an ace in your hand as Bowden said, then the coach is holding four of a kind in 1998 with the return of his entire special teams units. Back are standout placekicker **Sebastian Janikowski** and sophomore punter **Keith Cottrell**. Also back are special teams snapper **Clay Ingram** and holder **Marcus Outzen**. Adding to the riches on special teams are **Peter Warrick**, **Germaine Stringer** and **Laveranues Coles** who come back to their positions as the primary punt and kickoff return specialists.

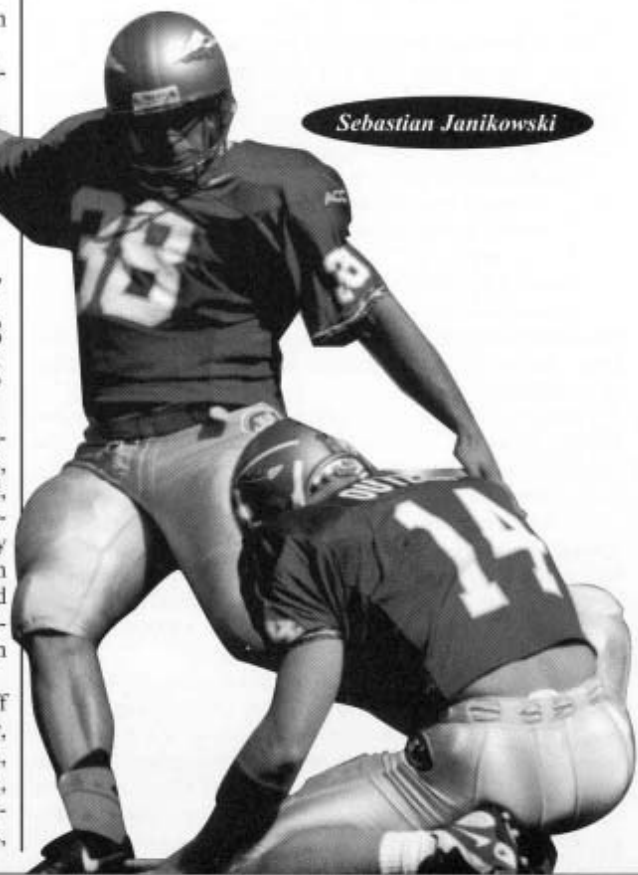

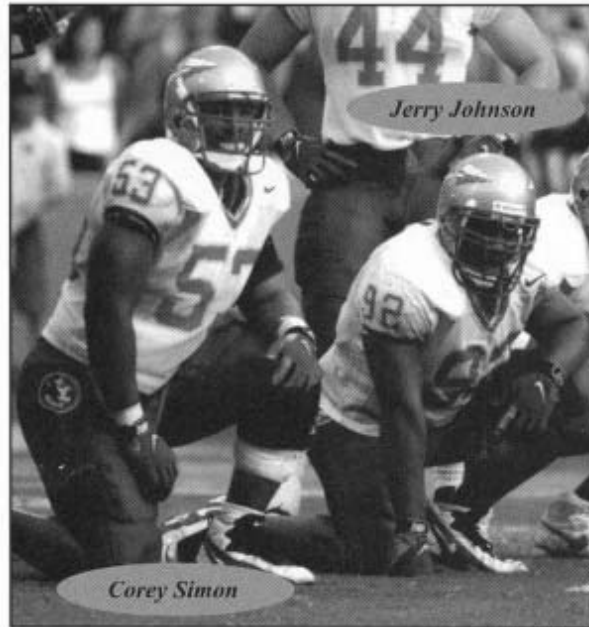

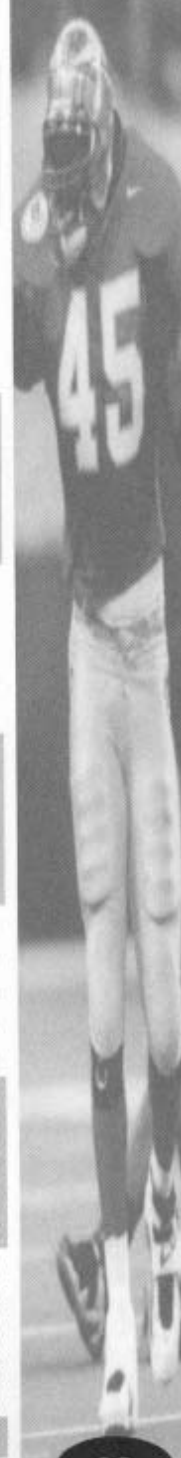
