2023 FSU SPRING FOOTBALL NOTES

- » Florida State enters year four under head coach Mike Norvell after doubling its win total for a 10-3 final record in 2022. The Seminoles were ranked No. 10 in the final coaches poll and No. 11 in the final AP poll, the program's highest final rank since 2016.
- » FSU, which won its last six games of 2022, will enter the 2023 season boasting the fifth-longest active winning streak in the nation. The Seminoles scored at least 35 points in all six games, the program's longest stretch scoring at least 35 points since the 2013 national championship season.
- » Florida State was the only team to lead its conference in both total offense and total defense in 2022.
- » The Seminoles were one of two teams nationally to average at least 270 passing yards and at least 210 rushing yards per game and, along with Alabama and Georgia, were the only three teams to rank in the top-15 in yards per play on offense and defense. Those three teams were also the only ones ranked in the top-20 in total defense, scoring defense, total offense and scoring offense.
- » FSU led the country with an average of 7.46 plays of at least 20 yards per game and ranked second nationally with an explosive play differential of +7.41.
- » The defense was fourth in the country in passing defense, and FSU was one of six teams nationally to rank in the top-25 in kickoff return and punt return average. Florida State led the ACC in passing defense, third-down offense, yards gained per pass, yards gained per play, yards gained per rush, total offense per game, yards per completion, yards allowed per pass, rushing offense per game, yards allowed per play, total defense per game and scoring offense per game.
- » The Seminoles return 90 members of the 2022 team, including 11 All-ACC selections and the conference's Defensive Rookie of the Year.
- » FSU is returning 99.5 percent of its passing yards, 96.4 percent of its passing touchdowns, 77.7 percent of its rushing yards, 78.8 percent of its rushing touchdowns, 70.2 percent of its receiving yards, 71.4 percent of its receiving touchdowns, 80.8 percent of its scoring, 89.8 percent of its total offense, 72.8 percent of its all-purpose yards, 75.9 percent of its tackles, 87.5 percent of its tackles for loss, 88.8 percent of its sacks, 87.5 percent of its interceptions, 84.4 percent of its pass breakups, 73.3 percent of its quarterback hurries, 75.0 percent of its fumble recoveries, 57.1 percent of its forced fumbles, 100 percent of its blocked kicks, 100 percent of its field goals and PATs, 100 percent of its punting, 74.4 percent of its punt return yards and 59.5 percent of its kickoff return yards from the 2021 season.
- » Florida State welcomed 21 early enrollees in January, a group made up of 11 transfers and nine student-athletes who graduated high school early.
- » Florida State added 11 transfers for the spring semester, bringing impact players with experience and proven performance at the collegiate level. Tight end Jaheim Bell, defensive lineman Dylan Brown, offensive lineman Jeremiah Byers, defensive back Fentrell Cypress II, defensive lineman Gilber Edmond, defensive lineman Braden Fiske, defensive lineman Darrell Jackson Jr., offensive lineman Keiondre Jones, kicker Tyler Keltner, tight end Kyle Morlock and offensive lineman Casey Roddick have appeared in 340 games with 158 starts prior to their time at FSU. Those 11 bring 113 receptions, 1,647 receiving yards, 18 receiving touchdowns, 1,948 all-purpose yards, 335 tackles, 45.0 tackles for loss, 20.5 sacks, 18 pass breakups, one interception, two forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 56 made field goals and 131 made PATs to Tallahassee.

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TEAM NOTES: OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS

- » Florida State returns Heisman Trophy candidate Jordan Travis as its starting quarterback. Travis has played 35 games at FSU and is 426-for-689 passing for 5,888 yards and 45 touchdowns while adding 1,734 rushing yards and 24 rushing touchdowns on 336 carries.
- » Travis was the highest-graded quarterback in the nation and the ACC's highest-graded offensive player in 2022 according to PFF.
- » He placed himself among the best quarterbacks in FSU history and the elite in college football heading into 2023. Last year, Travis accounted for 32 touchdowns, tied for FSU's 3rd-highest single-season total. He became the only player in FSU history with at least 20 touchdown passes and seven rushing touchdowns in a season and the only player in program history to account for at least three touchdowns in six consecutive games.
- » Travis is the fourth FSU player with at least 3,000 total yards and 30 total touchdowns, joining Heisman Trophy winners Charlie Ward in 1993, Chris Weinke in 2000 and Jameis Winston in 2013.
- » He led the ACC and was 3rd nationally with his average of 8.35 yards per play, ranked 1st in the ACC and 5th nationally with an average of 9.10 yards per pass attempt, led the ACC and ranked 8th in the country with his average of 14.22 yards per completion, led the ACC and was 14th nationally with his 160.1 pass efficiency rating and ranked 3rd in the conference with 247.2 passing yards per game, 24 passing touchdowns and a completion percentage of 64.0.
- » Travis was named Cheez-It Bowl MVP after gaining an FSU bowl-record 468 yards of total offense in the 35-32 win vs. Oklahoma. He was 27-of-38 passing for a career-high 418 yards and two touchdowns and added 50 yards on seven rushes while becoming the first player since Joe Burrow in Jan. 14, 2020 CFP National Championship Game to record 400 yards passing and 50 yards rushing in a bowl game and only the fifth in records dating back to 2000. His total offense yardage was the 9th-highest single-game output in program history, while his passing yards was the 2nd-highest individual total in FSU bowl history and 18th on the program's single-game list.
- » Redshirt junior Tate Rodemaker is 36-for-62 passing for 391 yards and two touchdowns in 14 games played so far in his collegiate career.
- » At Louisville last season, Rodemaker relieved an injured Travis and led a come-from-behind win by directing three scoring drives in the second half. Rodemaker finished the game 6-for-10 passing for 109 yards and two touchdowns, including the game-winning score with 7:54 remaining.
- » Redshirt freshman AJ Duffy played three games in 2022 and completed two passes for 26 yards, including a 16 yarder in FSU's 49-17 win vs. Louisiana for his first collegiate touchdown.
- » True freshman Brock Glenn joined the Seminoles in January and will participate in his first spring practice. The Covington, Tennessee, native accounted for more than 4,500 yards of total offense and 68 touchdowns during his high school career and also made the Elite 11 finals.

RUNNING BACKS

- » Returning All-ACC back Trey Benson leads a deep, explosive contingent of running backs on FSU's roster for 2023. Benson, Lawrance Toafili, Rodney Hill and CJ Campbell combined for 2,262 all-purpose yards and 19 total touchdowns in 2022.
- » Benson led the ACC with his average of 6.4 yards per carry and posted five 100-yard rushing games, the most by an FSU running back since 2019. He also was a factor in special teams, returning the opening kickoff in FSU's 44-14 win vs. Boston College 93 yards for the first opening kickoff touchdown in Doak Campbell Stadium's 73-year history.
- » Toafili continued to showcase his versatility impacting the game rushing and receiving. His 725 all-purpose yards were 3rd on the team in 2022, and in the 41-16 win vs. Georgia Tech he became the first FSU player since 2019 with a rushing and receiving touchdown in the same game.
- » Hill rushed for 144 yards on 27 carries, an average of 5.3 yards per carry, with one touchdown while playing in four games and redshirting in 2022.
- » Campbell missed the first seven games of last season due to what was expected to be a season-ending injury but returned to play the final six games and rush for 64 yards on 18 carries with two touchdowns, including his first collegiate score on a seven-yard run in the win vs. Georgia Tech.
- » Caziah Holmes, who transferred from Penn State last August and sat out the 2022 season, is also set to contribute in 2023.

WIDE RECEIVERS/TIGHT ENDS

- » FSU returns nine of the school-record-tying 12 players with at least one touchdown reception last season. Led by second-team All-ACC performer Johnny Wilson, the receiver group also includes Mycah Pittman, Kentron Poitier, Ja'Khi Douglas, Darion Williamson, Deuce Spann as well as tight ends Markeston Douglas, Preston Daniel and Brian Courtney.
- » Wilson made an immediate impact in his first season with the Seminoles, catching 43 passes for 897 yards and five touchdowns. His average of 20.86 yards per reception was fifth nationally, and he broke the FSU bowl record and Cheez-It Bowl record with 202 receiving yards in the win vs. Oklahoma, posting the only 200-yard receiving game in a bowl in 2022.
- » Pittman, an honorable mention All-ACC returner, caught three touchdowns and was 15th nationally with an average of 9.4 yards per punt return.
- » Poitier led FSU in receiving vs. Duquesne and Louisiana, Williamson led the way vs. Boston College and Douglas was the leading receiver at Syracuse.
- » Freshman wide receivers Vandrevius Jacobs and Hykeem Williams and transfer tight ends Jaheim Bell and Kyle Morlock enrolled in January and will participate in spring practice.

OFFENSIVE LINE

- » Florida State continues to add depth and competition while returning three all-conference linemen from 2022. D'Mitri Emmanuel started all 13 games at right guard, while Maurice Smith started all 12 games he played at center and Robert Scott Jr. started all 11 of his appearances at left tackle.
- » Last year, the offensive line blocked for an offense that produced eight 200-yard rushing games, including a school-record-tying seven consecutive, and blocked for the ACC's yards per play, yards per rush and yards per reception leaders.
- » Florida State's returning offensive linemen have combined to appear in 205 college games with 131 starts.
- » The Seminoles also added transfers Jeremiah Byers, Keiondre Jones and Casey Roddick for spring practice. That trio has combined to play in 111 games with 82 starts in college.

TEAM NOTES: DEFENSE/SPECIAL TEAMS

DEFENSIVE LINE

- » Florida State returns first-team All-ACC defensive end Jared Verse, who elected to stay at Florida State despite being projected as a first-round NFL Draft pick, and two-time All-ACC selection Fabien Lovett on the defensive line.
- » Verse led the ACC with his average of 0.75 sacks per game, and his average of 1.4 tackles for loss per game was 10th nationally. He was the only player in the ACC and one of two at a P5 program to have four games of at least 2.5 tackles for loss in 2022.
- » Lovett started all seven games he played and made 10 tackles, 2.0 for loss with 1.0 sack, one forced fumble and one pass breakup. His sack was for a 7-yard loss in the 45-3 victory at Miami.
- » Patrick Payton was the ACC's Defensive Rookie of the Year in 2022 after leading all ACC freshmen with 5.0 sacks and also ranked 6th overall in the ACC with 38 sack yards lost in ACC play.
- » Derrick McLendon II started 12 games at defensive end and made 37 tackles, including 5.0 for loss with 3.5 sacks. He led FSU with eight tackles vs. No. 4 Clemson.
- » Joshua Farmer tied with Payton for the ACC freshman lead with 6.0 tackles for loss.
- » FSU has also added transfers Gilber Edmond, Braden Fiske and Darrell Jackson, Jr.

LINEBACKERS

- » Florida State returns All-ACC linebacker Tatum Bethune and fellow starter Kalen DeLoach, as well as valuable contributors DJ Lundy and Brendan Gant.
- » Bethune ranked 2nd on the team with 84 tackles, and his 9.5 tackles for loss were also 2nd. He made 14 tackles with 2.5 for loss at No. 14 NC State and was one of only two ACC defenders to hit those marks in a single game during the 2022 season.
- » DeLoach posted 65 tackles, including 7.5 for loss with 3.0 sacks, and had a team-best seven pass breakups and a team-high five quarterback hurries. He made a season-high eight tackles in the Cheez-It Bowl vs. Oklahoma and posted seven tackles in three other games in 2022.
- » Lundy made 48 tackles with 5.0 for loss and 1.0 sacks while also showcasing his versatility by scoring two rushing touchdowns and one receiving touchdown.
- » Lundy became only the sixth player nationally since 2000 to record at least 40 tackles, one rushing touchdown and one receiving touchdown in the same season. Lundy was the only one of those six to also record a sack, and in 2022 he produced 40 more tackles than any other player with a rushing and receiving touchdown.
- » Gant added 33 tackles with 1.5 for loss. He led FSU with six tackles vs. Louisiana and also made a career-high 1.5 tackles for loss vs. Boston College.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

- » Florida State's defensive backfield returns starters Akeem Dent, Renardo Green, Jarrian Jones and Kevin Knowles II as well as Shyheim Brown, Omarion Cooper, Azareye'h Thomas and Greedy Vance, Jr., from a group that had the nation's 4th-best pass defense in 2022.
- » Green earned honorable mention All-ACC honors after starting 12 games and recording 58 tackles, 4th on the team, 3.0 tackles for loss and five pass breakups, the 2nd-highest total on the team. He tied his career high with nine tackles at Louisville and vs. No. 22 Wake Forest.
- » Dent started 12 games last season and ranked fifth on the team with 53 tackles, including a career-high 10 at No. 14 NC State. He enters the 2023 season as FSU's active career leader with 15 pass breakups.
- » Knowles started 11 games, and his first collegiate interception sealed FSU's 35-31 win at Louisville, ending the Cardinals' final drive with 0:37 remaining in the game. Knowles also recorded a season-high four tackles, all solo stops, in the 45-38 victory vs. Florida.
- » Jones was a 10-game starter in 2022 and earned FSU's Most Improved Player on defense. He grabbed an interception in the win vs. Florida.
- » Vance played in all 13 games and led Florida State with three interceptions, a total that tied for third in the ACC in 2022.
- » Cooper started four of the 12 games he played and was responsible for two takeaways. He made an interception on Boston College's opening drive, FSU's first takeaway on an opening drive in 12 games, and also forced a fumble in the fourth quarter of FSU's Cheez-It Bowl win vs. Oklahoma.
- » Brown was all over the place in 2022, playing all 13 games with two starts and recording 36 tackles, 2.5 for loss with 1.5 sacks, two pass breakups, one fumble recovery, one quarterback hurry and one blocked kick. His block stopped a game-tying PAT with no time left in FSU's 24-23 win vs. LSU.
- » Thomas played 11 games in his true freshman campaign and made his first collegiate interception during the 45-3 victory at Miami.
- » Fentrell Cypress II was a top-5 rated transfer nationally after leading the country with an average of 1.6 pass breakups per game and earning All-ACC acclaim in 2022. He, along with true freshmen Quindarius Jones and K.J. Kirkland, will participate in spring practice.

SPECIALISTS

- » The Seminoles return their primary kicker, punter and long snapper for the third straight season in 2023.
- » Ryan Fitzgerald scored 93 points, the highest season total of his career, and enters 2023 ranked 19th in program history with 184 points scored.
- » Alex Mastroanno only punted 34 times, the lowest season total in program history, and averaged 41.8 yards per punt with a long of 53.
- » James Rosenberry, Jr., handles long snapper duties for PATs, field goals and punts and returns for his fifth collegiate season in 2022.
- » Two-time All-SoCon kicker Tyler Keltner, a Tallahassee native, returns home for his final season of eligibility after a four-year career at ETSU. He has scored 299 points courtesy of 56 field goals and 131 PATs and left ETSU holding school records with 105 points and 51 made PATs in 2021.

HEAD COACH MIKE NORVELL

4th Season at FSU | 8th Season as a Head Coach | 18th Season as a college coach

Mike Norvell was named Florida State's 11th full-time head football coach on Dec. 8, 2019, and has built the Seminoles back among the nation's elite as he enters his fourth season at the helm.

Norvell's offenses are averaging 37.4 points per game during his seven years as a head coach, which is the third-highest average in the country among head coaches active each year from 2016-22. Norvell and Nick Saban were the only two FBS head coaches to score at least 500 points each season from 2016-19, and Norvell is one of only three head coaches to produce a top-7 rushing offense and top-7 passing offense since 2016. His offense has showcased 58 individual 100-yard rushing games, 37 individual 100-yard receiving games and 23 individual 300-yard passing games. In addition to his high-powered offenses, Norvell's teams have also scored 13 defensive touchdowns and 12 kickoff return touchdowns.

Norvell, a 2019 finalist for the Eddie Robinson and Bear Bryant Coach of the Year awards, has developed an impressive coaching tree in his seven seasons as head coach. For the 2023 season, 43 current Division I coaches, including five head coaches and 11 coordinators, have served on a Norvell staff. He has hired coaches who are now on staffs at Arizona State, Oregon, Memphis, Southern Miss, Northern Arizona, Akron, Arkansas, Auburn, Duke, FAU, Indiana, Miami, Oregon State, Pitt, SMU, South Carolina, TCU, Texas A&M and Virginia Tech, among others.

Eighteen of Norvell's pupils have been selected in the last six NFL Drafts, led by 2022 first-round selection Jermaine Johnson II. Norvell has coached multiple picks each of the last five years. In addition to Johnson, Norvell also guided second-round picks Anthony Miller and Asante Samuel, Jr., as well as third-round selections Darrell Henderson, Antonio Gibson and Dylan Parham. In his career, Norvell has coached 24 NFL Draft picks, eight All-Americans, including six first-team selections, four conference Players of the Year and 83 all-conference recognitions.

In his first three seasons at the helm of FSU's program, he has re-established the foundation and championship standards while building a program around explosive playmakers in all three phases. The Seminoles have utilized a unique blend of high school prospects and transfer portal players to maximum impact, evidenced by a 10-win season in 2022 that doubled the previous year's win total and led to a No. 10 finish in the final Coaches Poll and a No. 11 final ranking in the Associated Press poll.

Statistically, the 2022 team was among the nation's best in multiple categories in all three phases. FSU was the only team to lead its conference in both total offense and total defense in 2022. Florida State was one of two teams nationally to average at least 270 passing yards and at least 210 rushing yards per game. The Seminoles, along with Alabama and Georgia, were the only three teams to rank in the top-15 in yards per play on offense and defense. Those three teams were also the only ones ranked in the top-20 in total defense, scoring defense, total offense and scoring offense.

Florida State led the country with an average of 7.46 plays of at least 20 yards per game and ranked second nationally with an explosive play differential of +7.41. The defense was fourth in the country in passing defense, and FSU was one of six teams nationally to rank in the top-25 in kickoff return and punt return average. Florida State led the ACC in passing defense, third-down offense, yards gained per pass, yards gained per play, yards gained per rush, total offense per game, yards per completion, yards allowed per pass, rushing offense per game, yards allowed per play, total defense per game and scoring offense per game.

The Seminoles were led by quarterback Jordan Travis, who was PFF's highest-graded quarterback and the highest-graded offensive player in the ACC. Travis continued to showcase his development under Norvell, ranking first in the ACC in yards per play, yards per pass attempt, yards per completion and pass efficiency rating. He had a school-record six straight games accounting for at least three touchdowns and became the first player in program history with at least 20 passing touchdowns and seven rushing touchdowns in one season. The redshirt junior saved his best performance for last, accounting for an FSU bowl-record 468 yards of total offense in the Cheez-It Bowl victory over Oklahoma that included a career-high 418 passing yards and 50 rushing yards, making him only the fifth player nationally with at least 400 passing yards and 50 rushing yards in a bowl game since 2000.

The defense was led by first-team All-Americans Jared Verse and Jammie Robinson. Verse was the ACC's Newcomer of the Year after he dominated in his first season at Florida State following a transfer from Albany, leading the conference with an average of 0.75 sacks per game and ranking second in the ACC and 10th nationally with an average of 1.4 tackles for loss per game. Robinson, FSU's first back-to-back first-team All-ACC defender since Jalen Ramsey in 2014-15, was the Seminoles' leading tackler for the second straight season. He registered 99 stops, including a game-high 13 in the Cheez-It Bowl victory, and recorded 5.0 tackles for loss, 1.0 sack, five pass breakups, one interception and one fumble recovery.

Offensive lineman Dillan Gibbons became the first FSU player to win the prestigious Wuerffel Trophy, given to the FBS player who best combines exemplary community service with leadership achievement on and off the field. Along with the Wuerffel, Gibbons, who started all 13 games at left guard, was voted captain of the Good Works Team, named the winner of the ACC's Jim Tatum Award given to the ACC's top football senior scholar-athlete and was selected as a first-team All-ACC performer.

The 2021 season was highlighted by first-team All-American and ACC Defensive Player of the Year Jermaine Johnson II, who elevated his game into a first-round NFL Draft pick in his one season at Florida State. Johnson, the only athlete to win a Player of the Year award in his first season with an ACC program, and first-team All-ACC defensive back Jammie Robinson led FSU's contingent of eight all-conference recognitions for the program's most All-ACC honorees since 2016.

Florida State ended the 2021 season converting 32 consecutive red zone trips, the longest active streak in America and the second-longest streak at any point in 2021, scoring an average of 6.1 points per red zone trip during the streak. The Seminoles also grabbed at least one interception in each of the last eight games of 2021, tied for the longest streak in the country in 2021 and the longest active streak nationally entering 2022.

Florida State ranked second in the ACC and seventh nationally in red zone defense, allowing points on only 70.6 percent of red zone drives. The Seminoles also ranked third in the ACC with 20 total takeaways and 7.2 tackles for loss per game, while their 14 interceptions were fourth overall in the conference. The tackles-for-loss average ranked 12th nationally and was FSU's highest for a season since 2016.

In his first season at Florida State, Norvell led the youngest team in the nation as freshmen and sophomores made up 75 percent of FSU's roster and 34 players made their first appearance for the Seminoles. While navigating through a global pandemic that ended spring practice after only three sessions and impacted summer workouts and the regular season, Norvell became the only coach in ACC history to defeat a top-five team in his first season when FSU earned a 31-28 victory over No. 5 North Carolina. In the season finale, a 56-35 win over Duke, Florida State scored six rushing touchdowns, matching the program record for rushing touchdowns in an ACC game.



The Seminoles averaged 199.9 rushing yards per game, the program's highest since 2016 and 20th nationally among teams that played at least nine games in 2020, and 5.11 yards per rush, 16th in the nation among teams with at least 350 carries and FSU's most in a season since 2015. Florida State topped 400 yards of total offense in five of the last seven games, including more than 500 yards of total offense twice, and produced FSU's first game with at least 250 yards rushing and passing since 2016.

Norvell's teams are known for elite special teams play, and that was on display in his first season with the Seminoles. Florida State tied for second in the NCAA with five blocked kicks, including two blocked field goals, two blocked punts and one blocked PAT. FSU was one of only two teams in the country to block multiple field goals and multiple punts in 2020. Additionally, the Seminoles ranked 16th in the nation in net punting average.

The team posted a program-record 3.127 grade-point average in the spring 2020 semester, an immediate indication of the importance Norvell places on academics in his program, and Florida State produced a program-record 10 Academic All-ACC selections after the 2022 season. As another public signal, 182 players have earned a Seminole Scholar patch on their uniform as part of a program Norvell introduced to recognize academic achievement.

Norvell spent the previous four seasons as the head coach at Memphis, compiling a record of 38-15, including the 2019 American Athletic Conference championship and a spot in the New Year's Six Cotton Bowl. His 71.7 winning percentage was the highest in Memphis history, and included wins over Power Five opponents Ole Miss, 25th-ranked UCLA and Kansas. Memphis was the first school to appear in

three straight American Athletic Conference Championship Games, and Norvell is one of 16 head coaches in any conference to appear in three straight conference championship games. He is also one of only eight to make three conference championship game appearances in their first four years as a head coach.

Memphis was one of three FBS teams to rank in the top-15 nationally in scoring offense every year from 2016-19, along with Ohio State and Oklahoma. As an FBS coordinator or head coach, Norvell and Lincoln Riley were the only individuals to coach a 1,000-yard receiver each season from 2013-19.

Memphis shined on special teams under Norvell as the Tigers were one of only two schools with at least one kickoff return touchdown each year from 2016-19, and their 11 kickoff return touchdowns over that span were the most in the nation. The 2019 team ranked second in the country in special teams efficiency by ESPN, trailing only Penn State which hired Norvell's special teams coordinator prior to the 2019 season.

The Tigers' defense wreaked havoc on opponents, forcing 99 total turnovers and averaging 6.8 tackles for loss per game. Memphis scored 10 total defensive touchdowns under Norvell's direction and was one of only six FBS teams with multiple defensive touchdowns every year from 2016-19.

In 2019, Norvell led Memphis to a school-record 12 wins and the program's first outright conference championship since 1969. Norvell, who is the only coach in Memphis history with two 10-win seasons, produced two of the four 10-win seasons at the school and holds program records with eight wins in his first season, 18 over his first two, 26 in his first three and 38 in his first four seasons. He also holds the school record for the most wins over a three-year span with 30 victories from 2017-19 to bypass his 26 wins from 2016-18.

The Tigers ranked eighth in the nation with an average of 40.5 points per game and with an average of 6.90 yards per play. Their team passing efficiency of 167.41 and average of 14.91 yards per completion were both 10th in the country, while their third-down conversion percentage of 46.3 was 21st. Memphis ranked 20th with a team passing efficiency defense rating of 115.36, averaged 7.0 tackles for loss per game, the 25th-best average in America, and ranked in the top-six in kickoff returns, blocked punts and blocked kicks. ESPN ranked Memphis 10th in offensive efficiency and 20th in team efficiency.

The 2019 Tigers produced a program-record 14 all-conference selections, including co-Special Teams Player of the Year Antonio Gibson and Rookie of the Year Kenneth Gainwell, in addition to Mortell Award winner Preston Brady as the national holder of the year. Gibson's average of 28.8 yards per kickoff return ranked sixth in the country, while Gainwell ranked ninth with 150.54 all-purpose yards per game and 12th with an average of 6.42 yards per rush. Brady White, named a finalist for the Manning Award and Johnny Unitas Award, ranked in the top-20 in FBS in passing yards per completion, yards per attempt, passing efficiency, passing touchdowns, passing yards per game and points responsibility. He had a streak of 11 straight games with at least two passing touchdowns, tied for the longest streak in AAC history, and was one of five quarterbacks in the nation with at least 11 multiple-touchdown games.

In 2018, Norvell's team boasted the fourth-best rushing attack in the nation, averaging 279.9 yards per game with a school-record 3,919 total rushing yards and 48 touchdowns on the ground. He produced the first season in Memphis history with two 1,000-yard rushers, led by Doak Walker Award finalist and unanimous All-American Darrell Henderson. Henderson broke the NCAA record with an average of 8.22 yards per carry, and his 2018 average of 8.92 yards per carry was the highest for a season with a minimum of 200 carries in records dating back to 2000. The Tigers ranked fourth in the country with an average of 523.1 yards per game and 7.12 yards per play while also ranking seventh with an average of 42.9 points per game.

The 2017 team averaged 45.5 points per game, the second-highest average in the country, and ranked fourth in the NCAA with 523.1 yards per game

and 7.35 yards per play. The team passing efficiency rating of 160.15 was sixth in the nation with a passing offense of 335.0 yards per game that was seventh. That year, Memphis forced 31 takeaways, good for third in the country, and ranked third with a turnover margin of plus-1.15 per game. The team's average of 26.02 yards per kickoff return also ranked fourth. Anthony Miller earned consensus All-America honors after leading the NCAA with 18 receiving touchdowns and ranking third in the country with 96 receptions and 1,462 yards.

In his first year at the helm, Norvell immediately put his stamp on the program. Memphis ranked second in kickoff return defense, allowing only 16.04 yards per return, while boasting the nation's fifth-best kickoff return average of 26.57 yards per return. The Tigers were the only team to rank in the top-17 of both categories in 2016. Memphis also forced 29 takeaways, the fifth-highest total in the country, and ranked in the top-15 in scoring offense, averaging 38.8 points per game, and passing offense at 304.4 yards per game.

The Tigers flourished academically under Norvell as well, posting single-year APR scores of 991 in 2018-19, 988 in 2017-18 and 976 in 2016-17. Under his guidance, the football team earned its highest grade-point average in program history in the fall of 2017. Through his first three years, 55 players earned their bachelor's degree, including eight on the 2019 team.

Norvell took over at Memphis after four years as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Arizona State. The Sun Devils averaged 38.1 points per game and scored nearly 2,000 points in his four seasons. His 2014 offense gained 5,750 yards, 3,556 of those through the air, and ranked 13th in the nation with 34 touchdown passes. The 2013 team's average of 39.7 points per game ranked 10th nationally.

Norvell spent one year as Pitt's co-offensive coordinator, wide receivers coach and director of recruiting. From 2007-10 he coached wide receivers at Tulsa, adding passing game coordinator duties in 2009 and director of recruiting responsibilities in 2010. The Golden Hurricane had five 1,000-yard receivers under Norvell's leadership, led by All-American Damaris Johnson. Johnson broke the NCAA record for career all-purpose yards with 7,796 and is one of four players in NCAA history with three seasons of at least 2,000 all-purpose yards.

Norvell was a four-year letterwinner at Central Arkansas and was inducted into the UCA Sports Hall of Fame in 2015. He broke the school record with 213 career receptions and was second on the program's all-time list with 2,611 receiving yards and an average of 4.6 catches per game. He helped lead the Bears to 33 wins in his four years, including an 11-3 mark in 2005. The next year, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater.

Norvell earned two degrees from Central Arkansas, completing his bachelor's degree in social science in 2005 and his master's degree in training systems in 2007. Norvell and his wife, Maria, have a daughter, Mila.

4th Season at FSU | 17th Season as a college coach

Alex Atkins enters his second season as Florida State's offensive coordinator and fourth on staff in 2023.

Atkins, who also served as offensive coordinator at Charlotte in 2019, was the offensive line coach on Mike Norvell's first Florida State staff in 2020 and has continued coaching that position group with his elevation to the Seminoles' offensive coordinator. His FSU offensive line has featured 18 different starting combinations in 34 games, but has blocked for 18 games with at least 200 rushing yards, including a school-record-tying seven consecutive 200-yard rushing games in 2022. The group has produced six all-conference performers and two Freshman All-Americans under Atkins.

In 2022, Atkins coordinated one of the most explosive offenses in the nation while helping lead FSU to a 10-3 record and a final ranking of No. 10 in the Coaches Poll and No. 11 in the AP poll. Florida State led the nation with its average of 7.46 plays of 20-plus yards per game, the program's highest season average since the 2013 national championship, and was third in the country with an explosive play rate of 17.15 percent. The Seminoles were one of two teams nationally to average at least 270 passing yards and at least 210 rushing yards per game in 2022. FSU also tied for the national lead with eight touchdown drives of 90-plus yards, and its 16 touchdown drives of 80-plus yards were third-most in the country.

The Seminoles led the ACC in third-down offense, yards gained per pass, yards gained per play, yards gained per rush, total offense per game, yards per completion, rushing offense per game and scoring offense per game. Florida State was the first team to lead the ACC in scoring offense and total in the same season since 2019 and was one of two teams nationally to lead its conference in yards per rush, yards per pass and yards per play in 2022.

In Atkins' first season coordinating FSU's offense, the Seminoles showed remarkable improvement in all areas. Florida State's 36.1 points per game average was an increase of 8.5 points per game from 2021, while the 270.2 passing yards were an increase of 68.6 yards per game and the 214.1 rushing yards increased 36.4 yards per game for a total offense increase of 104.9 yards per game to an average of 484.2. FSU also increased its third-down percentage by 16.6 percent to 51.2, a mark that ranked fourth in the country. The Seminoles' ranked 10th nationally in total offense and yards per completion.

He oversaw the development of eight All-ACC honorees on offense in 2022, including first-team offensive lineman Dillan Gibbons and second-team selections quarterback Jordan Travis, offensive lineman Robert Scott Jr., running back Trey Benson and wide receiver Johnny Wilson. Florida State was the only school in the conference with at least one first- or second-team selection at quarterback, running back, wide receiver and offensive line. Gibbons also became the ACC's first winner of the Wuerffel Trophy, was chosen as captain of the AFCA Good Works Team and earned the Jim Tatum Award as the ACC's top senior scholar-athlete.

Florida State was led by Travis, who was PFF's highest-graded quarterback and the highest-graded offensive player in the ACC. Travis continued to showcase his development under Norvell, ranking first in the ACC in yards per play, yards per pass attempt, yards per completion and pass efficiency rating. He had a school-record six straight games accounting for at least three touchdowns and became the first player in program history with at least 20 passing touchdowns and seven rushing touchdowns in one season. The redshirt junior saved his best performance for last, accounting for an FSU bowl-record 468 yards of total offense in the Cheez-It Bowl victory over Oklahoma that included a career-high 418 passing yards and 50 rushing yards, making him only the fifth player nationally with at least 400 passing yards and 50 rushing yards in a bowl game since 2000.

Benson led the ACC with his average of 6.43 yards per carry and broke PFF College's single-season record by forcing 0.51 missed tackles per rush. Wilson led the ACC and ranked third nationally with 22 catches of at least 20 yards, and his average of 20.86 yards per catch was second in the conference and fifth in the country.

Atkins' 2021 line was highlighted by honorable mention All-ACC guards Gibbons and Devontay Love-Taylor. The duo helped lead an offensive line that blocked as FSU converted 32 consecutive red zone trips into points, the longest active streak in the nation entering the 2022 season, while leading the ACC and ranking seventh nationally by scoring touchdowns on 73.8 percent of red zone trips in 2021.

In his first season with the Seminoles, Atkins led a young group that blocked for a top-20 rushing offense while featuring nine different starters making up six different starting lineups in nine games. Robert Scott, Jr., and Maurice Smith were both recognized among the best freshmen in the country as Scott earned True Freshman All-America honors from 247Sports and Smith was named a Freshman All-American by Rivals.

Florida State averaged 199.9 rushing yards per game, the program's highest since 2016 and 20th nationally among teams that played at least nine games in 2020, and 5.11 yards per rush, 16th in the nation among teams with at least 350 carries and FSU's most in a season since 2015. The Seminoles topped 400 yards of total offense in five of the last seven games, including more than 500 yards of total offense twice, and produced FSU's first game with at least 250 yards rushing and passing since 2016.



In the season finale, a 56-35 win over Duke, Florida State rushed for six touchdowns, the most in the ACC and tied for the seventh-highest single-game total nationally in 2020. That also was only the second time in FSU history the Seminoles rushed for six touchdowns in a conference game. At North Carolina State, Florida State started four freshmen offensive linemen for the first time since 2011. That group blocked as FSU had five successful fourth-down conversions, which was the second-highest single-game total in program history, the most by an ACC program in 2020 and the second-highest total nationally in 2020.

Atkins served as Charlotte's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach in 2019 after three years as assistant head coach and offensive line coach at Tulane. He also has Division I experience at Georgia Southern, Chattanooga, Marshall and UT-Martin.

In 2019, Atkins coordinated an offense that led Charlotte to its first bowl game in program history as the team won seven games and was selected for the Bahamas Bowl. The 49ers allowed 1.62 sacks per game, tied for the 32nd-lowest average in the country, had their conference's top rushing attack and ranked 32nd in FBS with an average of 203.0 yards per game, scored on 88.4 percent of their Red Zone possessions to tie for 35th in the nation, ranked 17th with an average of 14.10 yards per completion and ranked 24th with a time of possession average of 31:59 per game.

Atkins, whose offensive line was one of 24 to be included on the Joe Moore Award Midseason Honor Roll, tutored first-team all-conference performers Cam Clark and Benny LeMay as well as all-freshman offensive lineman Dejan Rasuo. Clark, a fourth-round selection by the New York Jets in the 2020 NFL Draft, anchored an offensive line that produced 10 100-yard rushing games compiled by three different athletes in 2019. LeMay led the way with a school-record seven 100-yard rushing games, ranking 23rd in the nation with his average of 98.4 rushing yards per game while his 120.4 all-purpose yards per game ranked 34th in the nation.

From 2016-18, Atkins was Tulane's assistant head coach and offensive line coach. He also added running game coordinator responsibilities his final season in New Orleans. In his first season with the Green Wave, he helped direct a remarkable turnaround from the 118th rushing team in the country in 2015 at 115.8 yards per game to the NCAA's 26th-best rushing attack in 2016 with an average of 228.1 yards per game. The improvement continued in 2017 as Tulane averaged 231.5 rushing yards per game, 20th in FBS. In his last year at Tulane, the Green Wave won seven games and the Cure Bowl behind an offense that posted the 23rd-highest rushing average in the country at 218.2 yards per game.

Prior to Tulane, Atkins coached the offensive line at Georgia Southern for two seasons and helped lead the Eagles to back-to-back nine-win seasons. In 2014, as Georgia Southern was transitioning into FBS, the team finished 9-3 and averaged a Division I-best 381.1 rushing yards per game. The next season, the Eagles finished 9-4 after winning the first bowl appearance in program history and led all FBS schools with an average of 363.0 rushing yards per game.

Atkins arrived at Georgia Southern following two years as offensive line coach at Chattanooga. In 2012, with FSU defensive coordinator Adam Fuller serving the same role for the Mocs, Chattanooga won six games behind an effective offense that ranked second in FCS with only nine turnovers and converted 61.5 percent of its fourth-down attempts. The next season, the Mocs finished 8-4 including a program-record six conference victories.

Atkins began his coaching career at UT-Martin, his alma mater, serving as a graduate assistant in 2007 and coaching tight ends in 2008. He was then a graduate assistant at Marshall in 2009. His first full-time coaching stop was at Itawamba Community College in Mississippi. As the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator, he helped produce an offense that was top-25 in the country in both 2010 and 2011.

A four-year starter at offensive guard for UT-Martin, Atkins twice earned all-conference honors. His senior year he helped lead the Skyhawks to an OVC championship and the program's first FCS playoff appearance. He blocked for two 1,000-yard rushers that season as the Skyhawks finished 9-3 and ranked 12th in the country.

Atkins, a native of Chicago, earned his bachelor's degree in history from UT-Martin in 2007. He is married to the former Brittany Mitchell.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR ADAM FULLER

4th Season at FSU | 26th Season as a college coach

Adam Fuller was named Florida State's defensive coordinator on Dec. 12, 2019, and enters his fourth season in charge of FSU's defense in 2023.

Fuller has an impressive track record of developing talent, evidenced by his players earning 24 All-America recognitions and 72 all-conference honors. Jermaine Johnson II, selected 26th overall by the New York Jets in the 2022 NFL Draft, developed into a first-round pick after being named the 2021 ACC Defensive Player of the Year, a first-team All-American and first-team all-conference performer in Fuller's defense. Two of his former defensive backs were among the four FSU defenders selected in the 2021 NFL Draft, marking the second straight year and third time multiple defensive backs coached by Fuller were taken in the same draft.

In 2022, Fuller orchestrated one of the nation's best defenses to help lead Florida State to a 10-3 record and a final ranking of No. 10 in the Coaches Poll and No. 11 in the AP poll. The Seminoles led the ACC and ranked in the top-15 nationally in both passing defense, yards per pass attempt allowed and total defense. FSU's average of 165.4 passing yards allowed per game ranked fourth in the country, its average of 6.2 yards per pass attempt allowed was 12th nationally, and its 321.8 total yards allowed per game was 15th in the country. The Seminoles also ranked 12th nationally with an average of 3.08 sacks per game, 14th with an average of 4.85 yards per play allowed, 20th in scoring defense holding opponents to an average of 20.6 points per game and 22nd in passing efficiency defense with opposing quarterbacks having a 120.63 rating.

Fuller's defense showed improvement across the board as the 2022 defense allowed nearly a touchdown fewer points per game, dropped its passing defense average by 67.8 yards per game, allowed 56 fewer total yards per game, improved third-down defense by 5.4 percent and recorded an increase of 0.33 sacks per game from 2021. In a remarkable stretch toward the end of the season, FSU held four straight opponents out of the end zone in the first half, went 32 straight drives without allowing a touchdown and became the first FBS team to hold consecutive opponents to 65 or fewer passing yards. In a 45-3 win at Miami, the Hurricanes gained only 62 yards through the air and the next week Syracuse was held to 65 passing yards in a 38-3 FSU victory as Florida State accounted for the two lowest passing totals for an ACC team in 2022.

The defense featured All-Americans Jammie Robinson and Jared Verse, as well as ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year Patrick Payton. Robinson and Verse were first-team All-ACC performers, with Verse earning the most votes among defensive players after leading the conference in sacks per game and ranking second in the ACC and 10th nationally in tackles for loss per game. Robinson once again led FSU in tackles and became the first Seminole defender to earn first-team All-ACC honors in back-to-back seasons since Jalen Ramsey in 2014-15.

In addition to Johnson's 2021 accolades, Fuller oversaw the development of Robinson, a first-team All-ACC selection, and third-team defensive end Keir Thomas. Johnson authored one of the best seasons in recent memory as the defensive end ranked first in the ACC with 12.0 sacks and 18.0 tackles for loss, which were both the highest totals for an FSU defender since 2016, and led all defensive linemen nationally with 70 tackles. Johnson and Thomas, who recorded 12.0 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks with 15 quarterback hurries, were the only teammates in the ACC, and one of only three pairs in the country, to average at least 1.3 tackles for loss per game in conference play.

Robinson, who ranked first in the ACC and 14th nationally in interceptions, led a group on defense that featured eight different defenders who grabbed at least one interception and forced 20 total takeaways. FSU made at least one interception in eight straight games to end the season, the longest active streak in America entering the 2022 season and tied for the longest streak in the country at any point during the 2021 season.

The 2021 defense ranked second in the ACC and seventh nationally in red zone defense, allowing a score on 70.6 percent of drives that reached the red zone. The Seminoles' average of 7.2 tackles for loss per game ranked 12th in the nation, and the defense had four games with at least 9.0 tackles for loss, the program's highest total since 2017. FSU also ranked in the top-five in the ACC in sacks per game, total takeaways, pass efficiency defense, total interceptions and fewest first downs allowed.

The 2020 season was his second coordinating defense for head coach Mike Norvell. Fuller's defense had nine first-time starters at FSU and 12 who made their Florida State debut. Linebacker Stephen Dix Jr. earned Freshman All-America honors while cornerback Asante Samuel Jr. was named first-team All-ACC before becoming a second-round NFL Draft pick by the Los Angeles Chargers and defensive tackle Marvin Wilson was a second-team all-conference selection.

Samuel continued his development into one of the top defensive backs in the nation as he finished the season leading all active ACC defenders with 29 career pass breakups. He became only the second FBS defender to grab three interceptions and have two fumble recoveries in his team's first four games of a season in records dating back to 2000. Samuel also became the first FSU defender since 2016 with at least one takeaway in four straight games and only the third Seminole since 2000 with three interceptions and two fumble recoveries in a season.

Florida State's defense held opponents to 46.2 percent on fourth-down attempts, which ranked as the fifth-best rate in the ACC and 31st nationally. The Seminoles posted three of their four lowest total yards allowed games over the final three weeks of the season and recorded 19.0 tackles for loss, four interceptions and six quarterback hurries in that span.



Fuller spent the 2019 season as Norvell's defensive coordinator at Memphis, helping lead the Tigers to a program-record 12 wins, including the school's first outright conference championship since 1969, and a berth in the New Year's Six Cotton Bowl. His defense, which featured five all-conference performers, ranked 20th in FBS with a team passing efficiency defense rating of 115.36 and ranked 25th in the nation with an average of 7.0 tackles for loss per game. The Tigers forced 18 takeaways and returned two for touchdowns as Memphis became one of only six teams in the country with multiple defensive touchdowns each season from 2016-19.

In the regular season finale that clinched a third straight berth in the American Athletic Conference Championship Game, Memphis recorded 15 tackles for loss, the fifth-highest single-game total in the nation in 2019 and one shy of the program record. One week earlier the Tigers held USF to five first downs and forced five straight three-and-outs to close out a 49-10 victory.

Fuller arrived in Memphis following six years on the defensive staff at Marshall, including serving as defensive coordinator in 2018. That year, the Thundering Herd ranked seventh in FBS with an average of 3.23 sacks per game and eighth in rushing defense, allowing 104.2 yards per game. Fuller coordinated one of only three defenses in the country that did not allow a 100-yard rusher that season. The defense allowed a third-down conversion rate of only .317, 13th-lowest in the nation, and also ranked 12th with 12 fumble recoveries, 17th with three defensive touchdowns and 20th with 24 total takeaways.

From 2013-17, Fuller served as Marshall's assistant head coach and linebackers coach along with overseeing special teams. In his first season with the Thundering Herd, the defense allowed 22.9 points per game one season after giving up 43.1 points per game, a turnaround that helped win the division crown and the Military Bowl.

In 2014, the improvement continued as Marshall finished 13-1 with a victory in the Boca Raton Bowl and was ranked No. 22 in the final AP poll. All three of Fuller's specialists earned first-team all-conference honors, and linebacker Neville Hewitt was the conference's Defensive Player of the Year. Fuller made it two straight Defensive Player of the Year honors courtesy of linebacker Evan McKelvey, and the Thundering Herd finished the 2015 season 10-3 after a victory in the St. Petersburg Bowl. In 2017, Marshall ranked 17th in the country with a scoring defense average of 19.9 points per game and ranked 10th in red zone defense, allowing points on only 73.2 percent of opponents' drives into the red zone. The Thundering Herd also had the conference's top rushing defense, ranking 19th in the nation with an average of 121.2 yards allowed per game.

Prior to his time at Marshall, Fuller was the defensive coordinator at Chattanooga from 2009-12. In his first season, his defense was the most improved in FCS. The Mocs allowed 25.7 points per game and 307.7 yards of total offense one season after giving up 37.9 points and 442.5 yards per game. The defensive strides helped Chattanooga go from one win in 2008 to six victories in 2009.

Fuller spent the 2008 season as the head coach at Assumption College, a Division II program in Worcester, Massachusetts. He was hired to the head chair after three seasons at Richmond, where he helped the Spiders win two conference championships and advance to the national semifinal round of the FCS playoffs in 2007 and the quarterfinals in 2005. He helped develop three NFL Draft picks at Richmond.

From 1999-2004 Fuller coached at Wagner, starting as linebackers coach for two seasons before taking over the defensive backs and adding special teams coordinator duties. His final season he was the co-defensive coordinator. His first coaching job was overseeing linebackers at Worcester Polytechnic Institute.

Fuller was a four-year letterwinner at Sacred Heart University, where he earned All-America honors from his linebacker position in 1996 and served as a team captain in 1997. He earned his bachelor's degree in criminal justice with a minor in sociology from Sacred Heart in 1998 and a master's degree in secondary education from Wagner in 2001.

Fuller and his wife, Hope, have two sons, Jack and Aidan.

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR/DEs JOHN PAPUCHIS

4th Season at FSU | 23rd Season as a college coach

John Papuchis was named Florida State's special teams coordinator and defensive ends coach on Dec. 24, 2019 and is in his fourth season with the program in 2023.

Papuchis' players have earned 47 all-conference recognitions, four conference Player of the Year awards and one Rookie of the Year. He has coached 15 NFL Draft picks and four All-Americans, including the first defensive player to earn Associated Press Player of the Year honors. Papuchis won the 2007 national championship as part of the staff at LSU and has coached in six conference title games.

Papuchis continued his development of one of the most productive defensive ends groups in the country in 2022, helping lead Florida State to a 10-3 record and a final ranking of No. 10 in the Coaches Poll and No. 11 in the AP poll. The Seminoles led the ACC and ranked in the top-15 nationally in passing defense, yards per pass attempt allowed and total defense. FSU's average of 165.4 passing yards allowed per game ranked fourth in the country, its average of 6.2 yards per pass attempt allowed was 12th nationally, and its 321.8 total yards allowed per game was 15th in the country. The Seminoles also ranked 12th nationally with an average of 3.08 sacks per game, 14th with an average of 4.85 yards per play allowed, 20th in scoring defense holding opponents to an average of 20.6 points per game and 22nd in passing efficiency defense with opposing quarterbacks having a 120.63 rating.

Entering 2022, Papuchis had to replace two NFL defensive ends and he guided a first-team All-American in Jared Verse and the ACC's Defensive Rookie of the Year in Patrick Payton. The 2022 defensive ends were responsible for an increase of 0.33 sacks per game from the 2021 season, led by Verse's ACC-best average of 0.75 sacks per game. Verse, who as a first-team All-ACC selection garnered the most votes among defensive players, also ranked 10th nationally with an average of 1.4 tackles for loss per game and blocked a field goal in FSU's 24-23 win vs. LSU. Peyton led all ACC freshmen with 5.0 sacks while becoming Florida State's third ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year and first since 2012. Junior Derrick McLendon II became a starter and posted career-high season totals in tackles, tackles for loss and sacks.

In 2021, Papuchis guided the development of first-team All-American and ACC Defensive Player of the Year Jermaine Johnson II as well as third-team all-conference defensive end Keir Thomas. Johnson authored one of the best seasons in recent memory as the defensive end ranked first in the ACC with 12.0 sacks and 18.0 tackles for loss, which were both the highest totals for an FSU defender since 2016, and led all defensive linemen nationally with 70 tackles.

Johnson was picked 26th overall in the first round of the NFL Draft by the New York Jets following his impressive senior season, marking the 11th straight year at least one player coached by Papuchis was selected. In his career, Papuchis has developed 15 NFL Draft picks, and his players have combined to earn 46 all-conference selections.

Johnson and Thomas, who recorded 12.0 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks with 15 quarterback hurries, were the only teammates in the ACC, and one of only three pairs in the country, to average at least 1.3 tackles for loss per game in conference play. Additionally, redshirt freshman Derrick McLendon II recorded 4.5 tackles for loss with 3.5 sacks.

Florida State's special teams featured redshirt freshman punter Alex Mastromanno and redshirt freshman kicker Ryan Fitzgerald continuing their ascent as primary contributors for the Seminoles. Mastromanno averaged 42.7 yards per punt, the sixth-highest average in the ACC, and landed 18 punts inside the 20-yard line with none of his 61 punts resulting in a touchback. Fitzgerald scored 67 points in his first season as FSU's primary kicker, including a career-high 11 points in the 31-28 victory vs. Miami and the 59-3 win vs. UMass.

Papuchis made an immediate impact on special teams his first season on staff, vaulting FSU back into the realm of the nation's elite in 2020. The Seminoles tied for second in the NCAA with five blocked kicks, including two blocked field goals, two blocked punts and one blocked PAT. FSU was one of only two teams in the country to block multiple field goals and multiple punts in 2020. Additionally, the Seminoles ranked 16th in the nation with a net punting average of 41.34 yards per punt.

Florida State tied multiple single-game school records in 2020. The Seminoles had a school-record-tying three blocked kicks, including tying the single-game record of two blocked field goals, in the season opener against Georgia Tech. In FSU's 31-28 victory over No. 5 North Carolina, the Seminoles tied a single-game school record with two blocked punts, both of which came in the first quarter. Florida State's punt coverage unit registered three takeaways in 2020 by recovering fumbles on punt returns.

His defensive ends made an impact in 2020 as well, led by Janarius Robinson and Joshua Kaindoh. Kaindoh gave FSU a 24-0 lead in the win over UNC with a 25-yard interception return for a touchdown, which was the first pick-six by a Seminole defensive lineman since 2009, and Robinson had 3.0 tackles for loss with a career-high 2.0 sacks against the Tar Heels. The 2021 NFL Draft featured both Robinson and Kaindoh being taken in the fourth round.

Papuchis came to Tallahassee after coordinating Maryland's special teams and coaching inside linebackers in 2019. He has been a defensive coordinator at North Carolina and Nebraska and also served as special teams coordinator at Nebraska.

In 2019, Maryland had a special teams efficiency rating of 67.4 to rank 11th in ESPN's efficiency rankings. The Terrapins were one of only four Power 5 teams with at least one kickoff return



touchdown and punt return touchdown. Maryland led the Big Ten and ranked 11th in the country with an average of 13.67 yards per punt return, and the Terrapins allowed only 4.00 yards per punt return to rank 17th nationally. Maryland's kickoff return average of 22.73 yards per return was fourth in the Big Ten.

Javon Leake was the 2019 Rodgers-Dwight Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year and a first-team All-Big Ten return specialist. He led the conference and ranked third in the nation with 804 kickoff return yards, while his school-record-tying two kickoff return touchdowns were the most in the Big Ten and fifth nationally and his Big Ten-leading average of 26.8 yards per kickoff return was 13th in the country.

Papuchis spent the 2015-18 seasons at North Carolina, serving as linebackers coach his first two seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator for 2017 and 2018. He made an immediate impact in 2015 as the Tar Heels posted the most improved Power 5 defense in the country. North Carolina allowed 14.5 fewer points per game than the season before and also had the highest jump in pass efficiency defense and yards allowed per pass attempt. The Tar Heels led the ACC in interceptions, total takeaways, turnover margin and passes defended while tying the single-season school record with 11 victories, breaking the program record with an 8-0 ACC mark, advancing to the ACC Championship Game for the first time and ranking 15th in the final national polls.



The 2016 UNC defense led the ACC in passing touchdowns allowed and passing yards allowed per game, while allowing the fewest touchdowns by receivers in the country. The Tar Heels held their opponents to only 11 passing touchdowns, tied for fourth-best in the nation, and ranked 12th in FBS with an average of 180.8 passing yards allowed per game.

In his first season as defensive coordinator, Papuchis helped direct M.J. Stewart, a second-team All-ACC performer and second-round pick by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, and Jacksonville native Andre Smith who was taken in the seventh round by the Carolina Panthers. Stewart ended his career with a school-record 41 pass breakups.

Papuchis spent seven seasons at Nebraska and was the Huskers' defensive coordinator for the last three. He was the youngest solo defensive coordinator in the country when he was promoted to the post in 2012. In his three seasons coordinating the defense, Nebraska held 11 opponents to 14 or fewer points. In 2014, his defense ranked second in the country by allowing a completion percentage of just 48.5 while also ranking fourth nationally in pass efficiency defense at 104.83 and fifth in third-down percentage at 30.1.

His first four seasons in Lincoln were spent coordinating special teams and coaching the defensive line. He was one of four finalists for the 2010 Football Scoop Special Teams Coordinator of the Year. On defense, he coached back-to-back Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year winners in Ndamukong Suh and Prince Amukamara. In 2009, Suh won the Outland Trophy, Bronko Nagurski Trophy, Lombardi Award and Bednarik Award while also being a Heisman finalist. Suh, the first defensive player to earn AP Player of the Year honors, was picked second overall in the 2010 NFL Draft. Papuchis also helped Amukamara become a unanimous All-American and the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year in 2010 before being drafted 19th overall by the New York Giants.

From 2004-07 Papuchis was on staff at LSU assisting in every aspect of the defensive gameplan and scouting reports. He helped the Tigers rank among the nation's top defenses, placing in the top three in total defense each season from 2005 through 2007.

The 2007 team won the SEC and national championships, defeating Ohio State 38-24 in the BCS National Championship Game. The 2006 Tigers allowed only 242.8 yards per game, the lowest average at LSU since 1976, and led the SEC in six defensive categories while ranking in the top-five nationally in points allowed, total defense, pass defense and pass efficiency defense. LSU had the nation's third-best total defense, third-best scoring defense and sixth-best rushing defense in 2005.

Papuchis also coached the punters at LSU. In 2007, Patrick Fisher led the SEC with an average of 44.5 yards per punt and was a first-team All-SEC selection. Papuchis' first year on Nick Saban's staff was 2004, and he helped the Tigers reach the Capital One Bowl.

Papuchis began his career as a graduate assistant at Kansas from 2001-03. In 2001, he worked with the secondary and assisted coaching the linebackers. In 2003, Kansas earned a berth in the Tangerine Bowl.

Papuchis graduated from Virginia Tech in 2001 with a bachelor's degree in business management and earned his master's degree in sports administration from Kansas in 2003.

Papuchis and his wife, Billie, have three daughters, Addyson, Sophia and Rylee, and two sons, John and Jack.

CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/LBs RANDY SHANNON

3rd Season at FSU | 29th Season as a college coach

Three-time national champion Randy Shannon is in his third season at FSU and second as co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach in 2023.

Shannon, who was a senior defensive analyst on FSU's staff for the 2021 season, has 31 years of coaching experience and has directly coached nine first-team All-Americans, 79 all-conference performers and 74 NFL Draft picks, including 21 first-round selections. He was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at UCF from 2018-20 and also has served as head coach at the University of Miami and defensive coordinator at Miami and Florida, as well as linebackers coach at Arkansas, TCU and the Miami Dolphins.

Shannon directed an FSU linebacker unit that was a crucial piece to Florida State's 10-3 record and final ranking of No. 10 in the Coaches Poll and No. 11 in the AP poll. The Seminoles led the ACC and ranked in the top-15 nationally in passing defense, yards per pass attempt allowed and total defense. FSU's average of 165.4 passing yards allowed per game ranked fourth in the country, its average of 6.2 yards per pass attempt allowed was 12th nationally, and its 321.8 total yards allowed per game was 15th in the country. The Seminoles also ranked 12th nationally with an average of 3.08 sacks per game, 14th with an average of 4.85 yards per play allowed, 20th in scoring defense holding opponents to an average of 20.6 points per game and 22nd in passing efficiency defense with opposing quarterbacks having a 120.63 rating.

The linebackers were led by all-conference performer Tatum Bethune and Kalen DeLoach. Bethune ranked second on the team with 84 tackles and added 9.5 tackles for loss, while DeLoach was third on FSU's defense with his 65 tackles and had 7.5 tackles for loss. Bethune made a season-high 14 tackles, including 2.5 for loss at No. 14 NC State and was one of two defenders in the ACC to hit both those totals in the same game in 2022. DeLoach, who made a season-best eight tackles in the Cheez-It Bowl victory vs. Oklahoma and had three other seven-tackle games, also led the team with seven pass breakups in 2022.

Sophomore DJ Lundy made 48 tackles with 5.0 for loss and junior Brendan Gant added 33 tackles with 1.5 for loss. Lundy also showcased his versatility by scoring two rushing touchdowns and one receiving touchdown, scoring vs. LSU, vs. No. 4 Clemson and at Miami to become only the sixth player nationally since 2000 to record at least 40 tackles, one rushing touchdown and one receiving touchdown in the same season. Lundy was the only one of those six to also record a sack, and in 2022 he produced 40 more tackles than any other player with a rushing and receiving touchdown.

In his three years coordinating the UCF defense, Shannon developed 15 all-conference honorees while helping the Knights to a 28-8 overall record, including the 2018 AAC championship and a berth in the 2019 Fiesta Bowl. Safety Richie Grant was a three-time All-AAC selection and 2020 Jim Thorpe Award finalist. Grant, a second-round selection by the Atlanta Falcons in the 2021 NFL Draft, was one of four NFL Draft picks coached by Shannon in Orlando, joining 2019 second-round pick Trysten Hill, 2021 third-round selection Aaron Robinson and 2021 sixth-round pick Tay Gowan.

The 2018 UCF defense ranked fifth in the nation with an average of 8.2 tackles for loss per game and was sixth nationally with 28 takeaways. In 2019, the Knights led the country with 9.0 tackles for loss per game and also ranked third in passing efficiency defense and fifth in third-down defense. In 2020, their 13 fumble recoveries were tops nationally while their 22 total takeaways ranked sixth.

Shannon went to UCF following three seasons at Florida, where he helped the Gators win 33 games and two SEC Eastern Division titles. In 2016, he coached a defense that ranked second in the country in pass defense and fifth nationally in total defense. Linebacker Jarrad Davis was a finalist for the Butkus Award and the Lott IMPACT Trophy before being picked 21st overall in the first round of the 2017 NFL Draft. The 2015 defense ranked fourth in the SEC in yards-per-carry defense and fifth in rushing defense while producing three players with more than 95 tackles, the first time UF had three 95-tackle performers since 2002. The 2017 team ranked third in the SEC in third-down defense, fourth in red zone defense and second in interceptions, led by CJ Henderson's four that were the most among SEC true freshmen, while ranking sixth in the nation in interception return touchdowns with Henderson being one of only two true freshmen in the country to record two pick-sixes that season.



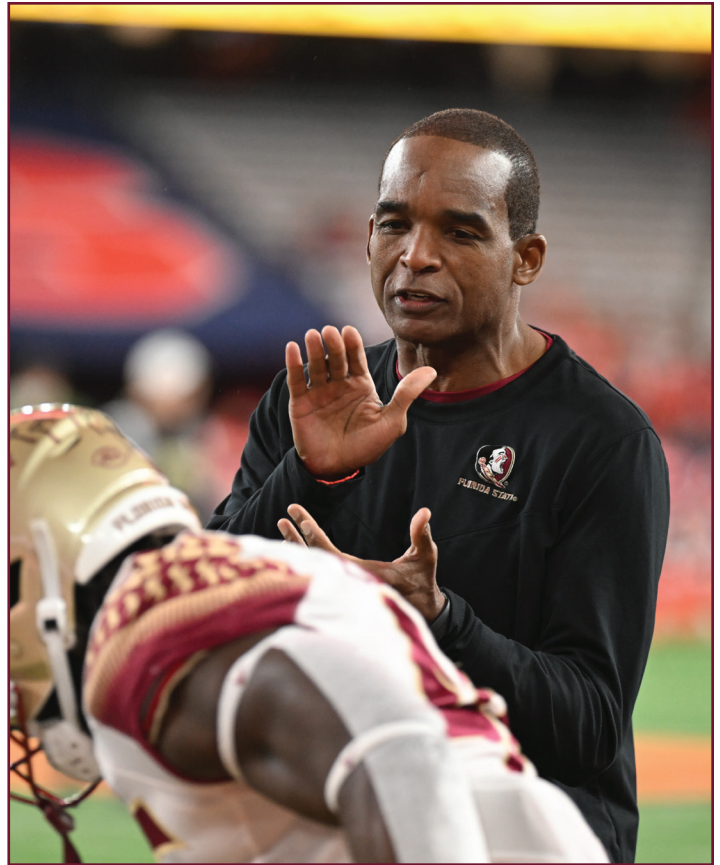
In the only three seasons he has coached outside the state of Florida, Shannon coached linebackers at TCU in 2012 before coaching linebackers at Arkansas for the 2013 and 2014 seasons. The 2014 Arkansas defense featured first-team All-SEC linebacker and 2015 fifth-round NFL Draft selection Martrell Spaight, who led the SEC with 123 tackles while helping the Razorbacks rank second in the SEC and 12th nationally in rushing defense. In 2012, he mentored All-Big 12 linebacker Kenny Cain on a defense that led the Big 12 in total defense, rushing defense and takeaways.

Shannon spent 20 years coaching in Miami, beginning his career as a graduate assistant at the University of Miami for the 1991 national champions before coaching the defensive line in 1992 and linebackers from 1993-97. After three seasons on staff with the Miami Dolphins, Shannon returned to the University of Miami as defensive coordinator for six seasons and head coach for four.

As head coach, he led the Hurricanes to 28 wins and three bowl appearances while also ranking in the top 10 nationally in Academic Progress Rate each season. His 2009 team won nine games and had nine all-conference performers after the 2008 team produced the ACC's Defensive Rookie of the Year and four Freshman All-Americans. He guided the Hurricanes to appearances in the Sun Bowl, Champs Sports Bowl and Emerald Bowl in his final three seasons as head coach.

In five of his six seasons as defensive coordinator, Miami ranked in the top-10 nationally in total defense, including the 2001 national championship team that led the NCAA in scoring defense, turnover margin and passing efficiency defense. The 2001 squad allowed only 12 touchdowns while scoring seven defensive touchdowns. His defenses produced 25 players drafted from 2002-07, including 12 first-round picks. In 2005, his defense led the country in pass defense and pass efficiency defense while also ranking fourth nationally in total defense and scoring defense. Shannon also coordinated the nation's best passing defense in 2002 and 2003, with the 2003 defense ranking second nationally in total defense and fourth in scoring defense.

The 2001 Broyles Award winner as the best assistant coach in the country, Shannon was a four-year letterman at linebacker for the University of Miami and a starter on the 1987 national championship team. He was drafted by the Dallas Cowboys in 1989 and became the first rookie to start at outside linebacker for Dallas since 1963. Shannon earned his bachelor's degree in liberal arts from Miami in 1989.

DEPUTY HEAD COACH/TIGHT ENDS CHRIS THOMSEN

4th Season at FSU | 27th Season as a college coach

Chris Thomsen was named Florida State's deputy head coach and tight ends coach on Dec. 19, 2019. He enters his fourth season in Tallahassee in 2023.

Thomsen has coached 116 different all-conference players who have combined for 184 all-conference recognitions as well as 25 individual All-Americans who have earned 38 All-American certificates, including 13 first-team selections.

During his first three seasons, Thomsen has elevated the tight end position into a play-making group contributing valuable receptions and powerful blocking. In 2022, his group helped lead FSU to a 10-3 record and a final ranking of No. 10 in the Coaches Poll and No. 11 in the AP poll. Florida State led the nation with its average of 7.46 plays of 20-plus yards per game, the program's highest season average since the 2013 national championship, and was third in the country with an explosive play rate of 17.15 percent. The Seminoles were one of two teams nationally to average at least 270 passing yards and at least 210 rushing yards per game in 2022. FSU also tied for the national lead with eight touchdown drives of 90-plus yards, and its 16 touchdown drives of 80-plus yards were third-most in the country.

The Seminoles led the ACC in third-down offense, yards gained per pass, yards gained per play, yards gained per rush, total offense per game, yards per completion, rushing offense per game and scoring offense per game. Florida State was the first team to lead the ACC in scoring offense and total in the same season since 2019 and was one of two teams nationally to lead its conference in yards per rush, yards per pass and yards per play in 2022. Three different tight ends caught a touchdown pass in 2022, including two scoring their first collegiate touchdown, and two tight ends made receptions for two-point conversions. The group combined for 39 catches for 529 yards and four touchdowns.

In 2021, Camren McDonald was named to the 2021 Allstate Good Works Team and to the Mackey Award Watch List. He caught 24 passes for 243 yards and two touchdowns and provided the highest production for an FSU tight end since 2018 NFL Draft pick Ryan Izzo. Redshirt senior Jordan Wilson returned from an injury to make 11 receptions for 132 yards. The tight ends also blocked for a running game that featured six 200-yard rushing games and seven individual 100-yard performances in 2021.

In his first year at Florida State, Thomsen developed a versatile tight end group led by McDonald, who started all nine games and made 23 catches for 263 yards and two touchdowns. McDonald's first career score came at No. 12 Miami and his second proved to be the winning points in FSU's 31-28 victory over No. 5 North Carolina. Additionally, freshman walk-on Preston Daniel had a 36-yard catch in the win over the Tar Heels and sophomore Wyatt Rector scored a rushing touchdown against Pitt after the former quarterback took a snap under center and scored from the one-yard line.

The tight end group also helped blocked for a vastly improved rushing attack in 2020. The Seminoles averaged 199.9 rushing yards per game, the program's highest since 2016 and 20th nationally among teams that played at least nine games in 2020, and 5.11 yards per rush, 16th in the nation among teams with at least 350 carries and FSU's most in a season since 2015. Florida State topped 400 yards of total offense in five of the last seven games, including more than 500 yards of total offense twice, and produced FSU's first game with at least 250 yards rushing and passing since 2016.

Thomsen came to Tallahassee following three years coaching the offensive line at TCU, his alma mater. He was the head coach at Abilene Christian from 2005-11 and also brought experience as an assistant at Arizona State, Texas Tech and Central Arkansas.

During his three years at TCU, Thomsen directed one of the top offensive lines in the country and coached five all-conference performers. The Horned Frogs led the Big 12 in fewest sacks allowed in each of his first two seasons, averaging 1.23 sacks allowed per game in 2018 and 1.29 in 2017 to rank 14th and 19th, respectively, in the country. The 2019 line paved the way for the Horned Frogs to average 204.0 rushing yards per game.

Thomsen made an immediate impact in the 2017 season as the Horned Frogs played in the Big 12 Championship Game and won 11 games behind an offensive line that placed all four seniors into the NFL. Joseph Noteboom was drafted in the third round by the Los Angeles Rams, while Matt Pryor was a sixth-round pick by the Philadelphia Eagles. Additionally, Patrick Morris and Austin Schlottmann signed free-agent contracts and both made the Denver Broncos active roster.

Thomsen mentored Lucas Niang, a 2020 third-round pick by the Kansas City Chiefs, to All-Big 12 honors in 2018 after the junior started all 13 games and did not allow a sack the entire season. Niang was a preseason All-Big 12 selection and had started 27 career games at right tackle before undergoing season-ending surgery in October of 2019. The 2019 season featured an offensive line blocking for the sixth-best red zone offense in the country, led by senior guard Cordel Iwuagwu returning from an injury that cost him most of 2018 to earn All-Big 12 accolades. Iwuagwu and linemate Anthony McKinney were signed by the Houston Texans and Tennessee Titans, respectively.

Thomsen was the assistant head coach and offensive line coach at Arizona State from 2013-16, spending the first three years with Sun Devils' offensive coordinator Mike Norvell and helping lead ASU to the 2013 Pac-12 Championship Game. Their 2014 offense gained 5,750 yards, 3,556 of those through the air, and ranked 13th in the nation with 34 touchdown passes. The 2013 team's average of 39.7 points per game ranked 10th nationally.



Thomsen coached five different Sun Devil linemen to All-Pac 12 recognition. Three of his linemen were drafted as Jamil Douglas was a fourth-round pick by the Miami Dolphins in 2015, Christian Westerman went to the Cincinnati Bengals in the fifth round of the 2016 NFL Draft and Sam Jones was a sixth-round selection by the Denver Broncos in 2018. Additionally, Quinn Bailey was a rookie with the Broncos in 2019 and Cohl Cabral was a 2020 signee by the Los Angeles Rams.

Prior to his time in Tempe, Thomsen spent the 2012 campaign as the offensive line coach at Texas Tech. That year, Texas Tech led the Big 12 and ranked second nationally in passing with an average of 355.9 yards per game. He was named interim head coach for the Meineke Car Care Bowl of Texas and led the Red Raiders to a 34-31 win over Minnesota. He coached Indianapolis Colts third-round pick Le'Raven Clark and free-agent signee LaAdrian Waddle who started as a rookie in 2013 for the Detroit Lions and played seven seasons in the NFL.

During Thomsen's time as the head coach at Abilene Christian, he led the Wildcats to a 51-21 record and six straight trips to the Division II playoffs with the 2008 team advancing to the quarterfinal round. He was a four-time Lone Star Conference Coach of the Year, receiving the honor in 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2010. ACU won Lone Star Conference championships in 2008 and 2010, winning 11 games both seasons. Prior to his arrival, the Wildcats had never played in the Division II playoffs and had not won a conference championship since 1977.

In the second round of the 2008 playoffs, Thomsen led ACU to a win in the highest-scoring game in NCAA history. His team defeated West Texas A&M 93-68 as the teams combined to break 45 Division II records. That year, the Wildcats led the NCAA with 558.8 yards per game and 52.3 points per game. In 2007, Abilene Christian ranked first in Division II with an average of 49.2 points per game and second with 544.8 yards per game.

Thomsen had five draft picks at Abilene Christian. Danieal Manning was picked in the second round of the 2006 NFL Draft by the Chicago Bears, the first non-Division I player taken in 2006 and the highest ACU pick since 1977. Johnny Knox was a fifth-round selection by Chicago in 2009 and Bernard Scott, who earned the Harlon Hill Trophy as Division II's MVP in 2008, was taken in 2009's sixth round by the Cincinnati Bengals. Clyde Gates was a fourth-round pick by the Miami Dolphins in 2011, and Daryl Richardson was taken in the seventh round by the St. Louis Rams in 2012. He also helped develop wide receiver Taylor Gabriel, who had more than 2,000 career receiving yards in six NFL seasons, and running back Charcandrick West, who played five seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs.

Before becoming the head coach at Abilene Christian, Thomsen served as Central Arkansas' offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator in 2003 and 2004. He began his coaching career in 1994 as a graduate assistant at Abilene Christian, before spending two seasons as the offensive line coach and one as the defensive line coach. He was named the Wildcats' offensive coordinator in 1998. After spending one season away from football, he got back into coaching as the offensive coordinator at Wichita Falls High School in 2001 and 2002.

Thomsen played football and baseball at TCU, lettering for the Horned Frogs on the gridiron from 1988-90 and on the diamond in 1991. During his lone season with the baseball team, he earned All-Southwest Conference, All-America and TCU Male Athlete of the Year honors after nearly hitting for the triple crown. He led the SWC with 21 home runs and 70 RBI, while his .373 batting average was second in the conference. Thomsen was selected in the 17th round of the Major League Baseball Draft by the Oakland Athletics and played two seasons in Oakland's minor league system.

After retiring from baseball, he returned to play one season on the football team at Abilene Christian. He was a second-team All-American and first-team All-Lone Star Conference tight end for the Wildcats in 1993.

Thomsen earned his bachelor's degree in criminal justice from TCU in 1993 and completed a master's degree in secondary education from Abilene Christian in 2000.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/DTs ODELL HAGGINS

30th Season at FSU | 30th Season as a college coach

Odell Haggins enters his 30th season on Florida State's coaching staff in 2023, serving as associate head coach and tutoring the Seminoles' defensive tackles.

Haggins, the longest-tenured assistant coach at one institution in the country, has helped FSU post a 264-102-1 (.721) record with 13 ACC titles and two national championships in his time on staff. In recognition of his many accomplishments at Florida State, he was inducted in the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame class of 2018 and the Polk County Sports Hall of Fame in 2022.

Haggins has twice served as interim head coach for the Seminoles and has a career record of 4-2. He has led Florida State to bowl eligibility in both tenures as an interim head coach, taking over for the first time on Dec. 1, 2017, and defeating ULM 42-10 the next day as FSU clinched bowl eligibility for an NCAA-record 36th straight year. He then directed a 42-13 win over Southern Miss in the Independence Bowl to finish FSU's 41st consecutive winning season. He was named interim head coach again on Nov. 3, 2019, and led the Seminoles to wins over Boston College and Alabama State to return FSU to bowl eligibility.

Haggins has repeatedly developed future NFL pros while at Florida State. He has coached 20 defensive linemen that have been selected in the NFL Draft, including first-round selections Brodrick Bunkley in 2006, Travis Johnson in 2005, Corey Simon in 2000 and Andre Wadsworth in 1998. Wadsworth was the No. 3 overall pick and remained the highest-drafted player in FSU history until 2015 when Jameis Winston was selected No. 1 overall. Haggins also coached second-round picks Eddie Goldman and Timmy Jernigan in addition to Pro Bowler Darnell Dockett as well as Larry Smith, Andre Fluellen, Jerry Johnson, Julian Pittman and Letroy Guion.

Haggins has established himself as an outstanding recruiter, developer of talent and a role model to his players. He earned ACC Top Recruiter of the Year honors from ESPN in 2012. In 2014, Haggins was named one of the top 25 recruiters in the nation by Rivals.com for the fourth consecutive year. He captured the same top-25 mention from 247Sports in 2016.

In 2022, Florida State posted a 10-3 record and final ranking of No. 10 in the Coaches Poll and No. 11 in the AP poll. The Seminoles led the ACC and ranked in the top-15 nationally in passing defense, yards per pass attempt allowed and total defense. FSU's average of 165.4 passing yards allowed per game ranked fourth in the country, its average of 6.2 yards per pass attempt allowed was 12th nationally, and its 321.8 total yards allowed per game was 15th in the country. The Seminoles also ranked 12th nationally with an average of 3.08 sacks per game, 14th with an average of 4.85 yards per play allowed, 20th in scoring defense holding opponents to an average of 20.6 points per game and 22nd in passing efficiency defense with opposing quarterbacks having a 120.63 rating.

Robert Cooper and Fabien Lovett earned All-ACC acclaim for the second straight season in 2022 after each started every game they played. The pair combined for 29 tackles, 1.0 sack and one forced fumble while anchoring one of the nation's toughest defenses. His 2021 group was headlined by Cooper and Lovett, who combined for 67 tackles, including 9.0 for loss with 2.5 sacks, and also included redshirt freshman Malcolm Ray's 24 tackles, including 5.5 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks. The interior defensive line contributed to a defense that ranked seventh nationally in red zone defense, 12th in the nation in tackles for loss per game and was top-five in the ACC in sacks per game, total takeaways, pass efficiency defense, total interceptions and fewest first downs allowed.

In 2020, Haggins' group combined for 68 tackles, including 7.0 for loss with 3.5 sacks, and two forced fumbles. He helped guide Marvin Wilson to second-team All-ACC recognition and an opportunity to participate in the Senior Bowl. In 2019, Wilson was a team captain, PFF All-American, first-team All-ACC defensive tackle and Bednarik Award semifinalist. Wilson was so dominant he earned first-team all-conference accolades despite only playing the first nine games of the season before a season-ending injury.

The 2018 season added two more all-conference linemen to his resume as senior Demarcus Christmas and Wilson both earned All-ACC recognition. Wilson's 42 tackles included 3.5 sacks, the second-highest total on the team, while Christmas recorded 28 tackles with 3.0 for loss and two pass breakups before being drafted by the Seattle Seahawks. The duo helped plug the inside of FSU's defense as the Seminoles ranked second in the ACC and 20th in the NCAA holding opponents to only 3.52 yards per rush and only 16 rushing touchdowns, the fourth-lowest total in the conference.



The 2017 version of FSU's defensive line was a dominant force in the middle as senior Derrick Nnadi, who was selected in the third round of the 2018 NFL Draft by the Kansas City Chiefs, and Christmas teamed up to wreak havoc in opponents' backfields. Nnadi was a third-team All-ACC selection after setting career-high marks with 53 tackles and 10.0 tackles for loss, while Christmas also posted career highs of 36 tackles and 4.5 tackles for loss. In 2016, the Seminoles ranked first in the nation in sacks per game and were fifth in the ACC in rushing defense while Nnadi garnered first-team all-conference recognition.

Haggins' defensive line anchored one of the nation's best defenses in 2015. The Seminoles ranked ninth in the country in scoring defense and allowed only 10 rushing touchdowns, fifth-fewest in the country, while improving from 17 sacks in 2014 to 32 in 2015. Two defensive linemen captured all-conference honors as Nile Lawrence-Stample was a first-team selection and Nnadi was on the third team. In 2014, Goldman captured third-team All-America honors from the Associated Press and was a first-team All-ACC selection. The Seminoles advanced to the first-ever College Football Playoff, set an ACC and FSU record with a 29-game winning streak and captured the program's third straight ACC championship that season.

A staunch interior defense played a prominent role in helping Florida State to its third national championship in the 2013 season. Jernigan enjoyed another fine season as he earned All-America nods from several organizations including the Football Writers Association of America, Associated Press and USA TODAY. The high-powered run-stuffer in the trenches led a defensive front that surrendered just seven rushing touchdowns, the fewest in the nation. Florida State's defensive tackles paved the way for the nation's top scoring defense and the third-best total defense. The work of the front four was noticeable on several fronts, including allowing only 124.8 yards per game to opposing rushers. Opponents averaged just 3.3 yards per rush against the stout defensive front of the Seminoles, and FSU continued its strong pass rush, racking up 35 sacks.

The 2012 season saw three Seminole defensive tackles earn All-ACC honors with senior Everett Dawkins and sophomore Jernigan capturing second-team recognition while senior Anthony McCloud picked up honorable-mention accolades. In part due to suffocating pressure up front, the Seminoles ranked second in the nation in total defense in 2012, yielding just 254.14 yards per contest. FSU allowed opposing running backs only 2.75 yards per carry, which tied for fourth in the country. Jernigan was productive in his first season under Haggins' tutelage, becoming a Freshman All-American in 2011 with 30 tackles, including 6.0 for loss. FSU's run defense allowed opposing backs to average just 2.35 yards per carry, which led all 120 FBS programs, and the Seminoles ranked fourth nationally in total defense.

Haggins helped produce one of the best defensive lines in the nation in 2010 as the Seminoles ranked third in FBS in quarterback sacks per game and tied for first nationally in total sacks with 48.

Haggins' 1999 defensive front was instrumental in FSU's 12-0 run to the national championship. The Seminoles boasted the nation's top-ranked defense in 1998 and the No. 1 rushing defense in 1996 and 1997. The 2008 defense ranked first nationally in tackles for loss.

Haggins has won at every level as a player and a coach. He was on the front end of Florida State's dynasty years, starring at nose guard for the Seminoles. FSU posted a 39-8-1 (.823) record with Haggins on the defensive line, and he was part of four bowl-winning teams. He earned Kodak, Walter Camp and UPI All-America honors as a senior in 1989.

A ninth-round pick in the 1990 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers, Haggins went on to play for the Buffalo Bills during their 1991 Super Bowl season. Following a three-year NFL career, he returned to Florida State, completed his degree and joined Bobby Bowden's staff following the Seminoles' 1993 national championship season.

Haggins and his wife, Robin, have one daughter, Amelia Grace.

WIDE RECEIVERS COACH RON DUGANS

5th Season at FSU | 19th Season as a college coach

Ron Dugans, a four-year letterman and 1999 national champion at Florida State, enters his fifth season coaching wide receivers at FSU in 2023.

In 2022, Dugans helped lead FSU to a 10-3 record and a final ranking of No. 10 in the Coaches Poll and No. 11 in the AP poll. Florida State led the nation with its average of 7.46 plays of 20-plus yards per game, the program's highest season average since the 2013 national championship, and was third in the country with an explosive play rate of 17.15 percent. The Seminoles were one of two teams nationally to average at least 270 passing yards and at least 210 rushing yards per game in 2022. FSU also tied for the national lead with eight touchdown drives of 90-plus yards, and its 16 touchdown drives of 80-plus yards were third-most in the country.

The Seminoles led the ACC in third-down offense, yards gained per pass, yards gained per play, yards gained per rush, total offense per game, yards per completion, rushing offense per game and scoring offense per game. Florida State was the first team to lead the ACC in scoring offense and total in the same season since 2019 and was one of two teams nationally to lead its conference in yards per rush, yards per pass and yards per play in 2022.

The 2022 receiving corps was led by second-team All-ACC performer Johnny Wilson, whose average of 20.86 yards per reception after totaling 897 yards on 43 catches ranked fifth nationally. Wilson made a career-high eight receptions for a career-high 202 receiving yards in FSU's Cheez-It Bowl victory vs. Oklahoma. His receiving yards output broke the Cheez-It Bowl record, was the most in a bowl game in program history and the highest single-game total by an FSU receiver since 2016 and was the only 200-yard receiving game during the 2022 bowl season. Wilson accounted for an ACC-high 22 catches of at least 20 yards and also had 100-yard receiving games in wins at Louisville and vs. Georgia Tech.

Mycah Pittman, Ontaria Wilson and Kentron Poitier also made strong contributions in 2022, combining for 76 receptions for 1,108 yards and 11 touchdowns. Wilson made two touchdown receptions in the 24-23 win vs. LSU, staying focused through pass interference on both, caught the game-winning score on the third play of Florida State's 45-3 victory at Miami, and added a scoring grab in the Cheez-It Bowl. Poitier also made four touchdown receptions and led the Seminoles in receiving yards twice. Pittman had two touchdown grabs vs. No. 22 Wake Forest as part of a career-high day and also was Florida State's leading punt returner in 2022, ranking 15th nationally with an average of 9.2 yards per return.

His 2021 group featured impact transfer Andrew Parchment as well as key returners Wilson and Keyshawn Helton and true freshman Malik McClain. That quartet combined for 1,170 yards and 11 touchdowns on 82 receptions. Wilson's five touchdowns were the most on the team, and his average of 16.61 yards per reception ranked ninth in the ACC. Parchment, Helton and McClain each had multiple receiving touchdowns as well.

During the 2020 season, Dugans directed the development of a young position group without a senior on the roster. Wilson showcased his explosiveness, leading the team with 30 receptions for 382 yards and grabbing FSU's two longest receptions of the year, including a career-long 69-yard touchdown catch at North Carolina State. Helton returned from a season-ending injury in 2019 to play all nine games in 2020.

In his first season back in Tallahassee, Dugans' group helped the Seminoles tie for 22nd in the nation in completion percentage, their highest ranking since 2014. Dugans had six receivers with at least 15 catches in 2019, including two who missed significant time due to injury. Junior D.J. Matthews made 36 grabs for 355 yards and three touchdowns, while Helton caught 17 passes for 239 yards and three touchdowns before a season-ending injury in the sixth game of the season and Wilson, who missed the final five games of the regular season due to injury, had 21 catches for 227 yards and one touchdown.

Dugans returned to Florida State after three years as wide receivers coach at Miami. In his first two seasons there he also served as passing game coordinator before being promoted to co-offensive coordinator for the 2018 season. Prior to his time in Coral Gables, he coached wide receivers at South Florida in 2014 and 2015 following four years as Louisville's wide receivers coach. Dugans began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at FSU in 2005 and 2006, after which he was a coaching assistant with the Cincinnati Bengals in the NFL and then served as wide receivers coach at Georgia Southern for three seasons.

In 2018, Dugans co-coordinated an offense that converted at least 45 percent of its third-down conversions in seven games after only reaching that benchmark twice the year before. In 2017, he helped direct the Hurricanes to a 10-win season that culminated with an appearance in the Capital One Orange Bowl. Braxton Berrios had career-high totals with 52 receptions, 634 yards



and nine touchdowns while earning All-ACC recognition and the Jim Tatum Award as the ACC's top student-athlete in addition to being a finalist for the Campbell Trophy. In Dugans' first season at Miami, he guided Ahmmon Richards to Freshman All-America and All-ACC honors after breaking UM's freshman receiving record with 934 yards. Senior Stacy Coley also was named All-ACC after becoming only the eighth Hurricane to accumulate 2,000 career receiving yards behind a career-high 754 yards in 2016.

Dugans' receivers broke USF's single-season touchdown record in both of his seasons at South Florida. In 2014, Andre Davis set the Bulls' record with seven receiving scores despite missing four games due to injury. The following year, Dugans tutored Rodney Adams to a career-high 822 yards and a school-record nine receiving touchdowns as USF finished 8-5 and played in the Miami Beach Bowl.

Dugans helped lead a program revitalization in his four seasons at Louisville. The Cardinals were 23-3 over the 2012 and 2013 seasons, including 11-2 with a victory over Florida in the Sugar Bowl in 2012 and a 12-1 mark in 2013 that culminated with a win over Miami in the Russell Athletic Bowl. He guided wide receiver DeVante Parker, the 14th overall pick in the first round of the 2015 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins, to first-team All-AAC honors in 2013 as the junior caught 55 passes for 885 yards and 12 touchdowns. Parker, who was also a 2012 first-team All-BIG EAST selection after posting 10 touchdown receptions, caught 28 touchdowns in his first three seasons. Three Cardinal receivers caught 40 or more passes in 2013, including senior Damian Copeland who had a career-best 58 receptions for 780 yards for his second straight 50-catch season.



Prior to his time at Louisville, Dugans coached the receivers at Georgia Southern. Under Dugans' guidance, Raja Andrews broke numerous single-season school records in 2008, including 64 receptions, 873 yards and five 100-yard receiving games, while finishing the year ranked 15th nationally in receptions per game and 20th in receiving yards. Dugans started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at FSU, working in the strength and conditioning program in 2005 before working with the offense in 2006. He also served as a coaching assistant in the NFL with the Cincinnati Bengals in 2007.

Dugans was a wide receiver at FSU from 1995-99, playing his first two seasons before taking a medical redshirt in 1997. He returned to start in 1998 and 1999, helping the Seminoles reach the BCS National Championship Game in both seasons. He caught six passes for 135 yards in the 1999 Fiesta Bowl against Tennessee and grabbed five receptions for 99 yards and two touchdowns in the 2000 Sugar Bowl win over Virginia Tech that gave FSU its second national championship and completed the first wire-to-wire season as the Associated Press' No. 1-ranked team. In his career, he made 105 receptions for 1,520 yards and seven touchdowns. He was selected by Cincinnati in the third round of the 2000 NFL Draft and played professionally for four seasons, compiling 89 catches for 797 yards and three touchdowns in 46 games.

A Tallahassee native, Dugans was a three-sport standout at Florida A&M University Developmental Research School. He played football, rushing for 730 yards and 10 touchdowns while adding 75 tackles and seven interceptions on defense as a senior, in addition to winning two state championships in basketball and three team track and field state titles, including two individual triple jump state championships.

Dugans and his wife, Yasheka, have four children, Yasmin, Y'Allana, Yanni and Ron, Jr.

RUNNING BACKS COACH/RECRUITING COORD. DAVID JOHNSON

4th Season at FSU | 16th Season as a college coach

David Johnson was named Florida State's running backs coach and recruiting coordinator on Jan. 5, 2020, and is in his fourth season with the Seminoles in 2022.

He has coached 19 all-conference performers who have combined to earn 28 all-conference recognitions, including four Special Teams Player of the Year honors. Johnson has produced an NFL Draft pick in each of the last five years.

In 2022, Johnson's running backs contributed to one of the most explosive offenses in the nation while helping lead FSU to a 10-3 record and a final ranking of No. 10 in the Coaches Poll and No. 11 in the AP poll. Florida State led the nation with its average of 7.46 plays of 20-plus yards per game, the program's highest season average since the 2013 national championship, and was third in the country with an explosive play rate of 17.15 percent. The Seminoles were one of two teams nationally to average at least 270 passing yards and at least 210 rushing yards per game in 2022. FSU also tied for the national lead with eight touchdown drives of 90-plus yards, and its 16 touchdown drives of 80-plus yards were third-most in the country.

The Seminoles led the ACC in third-down offense, yards gained per pass, yards gained per play, yards gained per rush, total offense per game, yards per completion, rushing offense per game and scoring offense per game. Florida State was the first team to lead the ACC in scoring offense and total in the same season since 2019 and was one of two teams nationally to lead its conference in yards per rush, yards per pass and yards per play in 2022.

Florida State's average of 214.1 rushing yards per game was the program's highest since 1995 and was bolstered by eight 200-yard rushing games, including a school-record-tying seven straight to end the regular season. In the season opener, FSU had three 100-yard rushers for the first time in school history and in the regular season finale, a 45-38 win over Florida, the Seminoles' five rushing touchdowns were the most by a Gator opponent since 1997.

Second-team All-ACC performer Trey Benson paced the running backs with his five 100-yard rushing games, including three consecutive career-high totals, and led the ACC with his average of 5.5 yards per carry. Treshaun Ward, who had two 100-yard rushing games, was an honorable mention all-conference selection and semifinalist for the Burlsworth Trophy despite missing four games due to injury. The running back group combined for 2,283 rushing yards and 24 touchdowns.

The 2021 season featured a breakout performance by All-ACC running back Jashaun Corbin. The redshirt sophomore totaled 1,159 all-purpose yards, and his average of 6.2 yards per carry ranked first in the conference and 16th nationally among rushers with at least 10 rushing attempts per game. Corbin showed off his amazing speed with touchdown runs of 89 yards against Notre Dame and 75 yards against Louisville. He was the only rusher in the ACC and one of six nationally with multiple 75-yard runs in the 2021 season and only the fourth player in program history with multiple 75-yard touchdowns runs in a season.

The running back group also received significant contributions from Ward and Toafili in their redshirt freshmen years. Ward rushed for 515 yards and four touchdowns, and his average of 6.36 yards per carry was the highest in the ACC among rushers with at least four attempts per game. Toafili rushed for 163 yards and one touchdown and added 116 yards and two touchdowns receiving. Toafili caught a 75-yard touchdown at Clemson, which made him the fifth player in program history with a receiving and rushing touchdown of at least 70 yards in a career.

In his first year at Florida State, Johnson coached a completely new group as Florida State's running back room featured zero returning scholarship players from the previous season. He utilized the group's youth and versatility to account for 1,855 all-purpose yards, led by Corbin and Toafili, and 13 touchdowns, including Ja'Khi Douglas' two receiving scores. Against Duke, Corbin rushed for a career-high three touchdowns, one shy of the school record, and Toafili posted a career-best 117 yards, including a 73-yard touchdown, on only seven carries. Toafili was one of only 12 rushers in the ACC with a 70-yard run in 2020.

Florida State averaged 199.9 rushing yards per game, the program's highest since 2016 and 20th nationally among teams that played at least nine games in 2020, and 5.11 yards per rush, 16th in the nation among teams with at least 350 carries and FSU's most in a season since 2015. In the season finale, a 56-35 win over Duke, Florida State rushed for six touchdowns, the most in the ACC and tied for the seventh-highest single-game total nationally in 2020. That also was only the second time in FSU history the Seminoles rushed for six touchdowns in a conference game, and the 346 rushing yards against Duke were the most by a Florida State team since 2012.

Johnson spent the 2018 and 2019 seasons at Tennessee after coaching on Mike Norvell's Memphis staff in 2016 and 2017. Johnson also brought Division I experience from Tulane and before that spent 12 years as a high school coach in New Orleans around a four-year stint at Millsaps College.



Tennessee improved from four wins the season before Johnson arrived to eight wins and a Gator Bowl victory in 2019. He coached the Vols' wide receivers in 2018 before moving to running backs in 2019, leading a group that produced five 100-yard rushing games.

Eric Gray broke UT's single-game true freshman rushing record with 246 yards against Vanderbilt, a total that ranked fifth on the Vols' all-time list. Nationally, it was the ninth-highest single-game total, and highest by a true freshman, in 2019. Gray was named Gator Bowl MVP after recovering an onside kick and scoring the game-winning touchdown 30 seconds later. The 2018 team ranked sixth in the SEC with an average of 7.9 yards per catch and had four different receivers average more than 14.0 yards per reception, led by Josh Palmer's 21.04 average.

In his two seasons at Memphis, Johnson was the Tigers' wide receivers coach and passing game coordinator. He developed former walk-on Anthony Miller to consensus All-America honors in 2017 after Miller led the NCAA with 18 receiving touchdowns and ranked third in the country with 1,462 yards and fifth with 96 receptions. Miller was then selected 51st overall in the 2018 NFL Draft by the Chicago Bears. Memphis concluded the 2017 season ranked second in the country with an average of 45.5 points per game, fourth with 523.1 yards of total offense per game, sixth with a passing efficiency rating of 160.15 and seventh with an average of 335.0 passing yards per game.

The 2016 season was Miller's breakout year as he re-wrote Memphis' single-season records with 95 catches, 1,434 yards and 14 touchdowns. Those numbers would all improve in Johnson's second season working with Miller. The 2016 Tigers ranked 14th in the country with 304.4 passing yards per game, and their 38.8 points-per-game average was 15th.

Johnson joined Memphis after four seasons as Tulane's running backs and tight ends coach. In 2014, he coached a Freshman All-American at each position as running back Sherman Badie led the Green Wave with 688 rushing yards and tight end Charles Jones caught 21 passes for 192 yards and a team-high three touchdowns. The 2013 team advanced to the program's first bowl since 2002 and Orleans Darkwa was named MVP of the New Orleans Bowl after rushing for three touchdowns. Those three scores pushed his season total to 12, tied for the third-highest single-season output in program history, and allowed him to tie former NFL running back Matt Forte for the Tulane record with 39 career rushing scores.

From 2005-08, Johnson coached wide receivers, tight ends and special teams while also serving as the recruiting coordinator at Millsaps College. While there he helped lead the Majors to three consecutive SCAC championships and set the program up for a fourth straight in 2009.

Johnson was the head coach at St. Augustine High School from 2009-11. He led the Purple Knights to district titles in 2010 and 2011, earning the district's Coach of the Year honor in 2011. In his first season he developed defensive back Tyrann Mathieu, who earned consensus All-America honors and was named SEC Defensive Player of the Year and a Heisman finalist in 2011 at LSU. He also coached two-time USA Today High School All-American running back Leonard Fournette at St. Augustine, laying the foundation for a consensus All-America performance in 2015 and two All-SEC selections while at LSU before being drafted fourth overall in 2017 by the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Johnson served as offensive coordinator at John F. Kennedy High School and O. Perry Walker High School. He helped direct O. Perry Walker to three straight district championships and the 2002 state championship game while coaching All-American Craig Davis, a first-round selection by the Chargers in 2007 after winning a national championship at LSU, and Mike Wallace, who was taken in the third round in 2009 out of Ole Miss.

A two-time all-conference player at Nicholls State, Johnson led the Colonels in receiving in 1992 and 1993. He totaled 50 receptions for 990 yards and eight touchdowns in those two seasons and also served as a punt returner for Nicholls.

Johnson graduated from Nicholls State in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in general education. He and his wife, Akeia, have three children, Jermaine, De'Von and Karaaz.

DBs COACH PATRICK SURTAIN SR.

1st Season at FSU | 1st Season as a college coach

Patrick Surtain Sr., an 11-year NFL veteran and long-time South Florida high school coach, was hired as Florida State's defensive backs coach on Jan. 18, 2023.

Surtain joined the Florida State football program after serving as a defensive assistant for the Miami Dolphins in 2022. The Dolphins advanced to the NFL Playoffs for the first time since 2016 and only the third time since 2001. The Dolphins' defense ranked fourth in the league allowing an average of 103.0 rushing yards per game and produced two Pro Bowl selections. In the final three weeks of the regular season, the defense led the NFL in total defense and ranked second in yards per play allowed, rushing defense and yards allowed per rush. The Dolphins held the New York Jets to six points in a final-week victory that clinched the playoff berth. In The AFC Wild Card round at Buffalo, the Dolphins registered a franchise playoff-record seven sacks and grabbed three takeaways.

He spent the previous nine seasons, including six as head coach, at American Heritage High School in Plantation, Florida, and was named the 2020 High School Football America National Coach of the Year. He led the Patriots to three state championships and a 65-10 overall record in his six seasons as head coach while developing numerous Division I players and NFL Draft picks, including Brian Burns who was the 16th overall selection in the 2019 NFL Draft after a three-year career at Florida State.



During the 2021 NFL Draft alone, six former Surtain pupils from American Heritage were selected, the second-highest total ever from one high school in a single draft. Cornerback Patrick Surtain II was the ninth overall pick by the Denver Broncos and earned a selection to the Pro Bowl following the 2022 season. Cornerbacks Tyson Campbell and Marco Wilson were taken in the second and fourth rounds, respectively, wide receiver Anthony Schwartz was a third-round selection, defensive tackle Tedarrell Slaton was taken in the fifth round and running back Khalil Herbert was picked in the sixth round.



Surtain played 11 seasons in the NFL, spending seven years with the Dolphins after they drafted him in the second round of the 1998 NFL Draft and four seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs. He was a two-time All-Pro and was selected to the Pro Bowl after the 2002, 2003 and 2004 seasons. Additionally, he was named the 2002 NFL Alumni Association's Defensive Back of the Year. For his career, he appeared in 163 games with 131 starts and recorded 547 tackles, including 435 solo stops, with 26.0 tackles for loss, 37 interceptions, eight forced fumbles and eight fumble recoveries. His 29 interceptions with the Dolphins are tied for fourth in franchise history.

Surtain, who played four years at Southern Miss, was a second-team All-American and the Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year in 1997 and a first-team all-conference selection in 1996 and 1997. His 16 interceptions and 31 pass breakups rank third and fourth, respectively, on the school's career lists. He was a 2011 inductee into the Southern Miss Hall of Fame, was named to the Senior Bowl Hall of Fame in 2021 and will be inducted into the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame Class of 2023.

Originally from New Orleans, Surtain earned his bachelor's degree in coaching and sports administration from Southern Miss in 1998. He and his wife, Michelle, have three children, Patrick II, Paris and Parker.

QUARTERBACKS COACH TONY TOKARZ

4th Season at FSU | 12th Season as a college coach

Tony Tokarz is in his fourth season on FSU's staff and second as quarterbacks coach in 2023.

In 2022, Tokarz's quarterbacks directed one of the most explosive offenses in the nation while helping lead FSU to a 10-3 record and a final ranking of No. 10 in the Coaches Poll and No. 11 in the AP poll. Florida State led the nation with its average of 7.46 plays of 20-plus yards per game, the program's highest season average since the 2013 national championship, and was third in the country with an explosive play rate of 17.15 percent. The Seminoles were one of two teams nationally to average at least 270 passing yards and at least 210 rushing yards per game in 2022. FSU also tied for the national lead with eight touchdown drives of 90-plus yards, and its 16 touchdown drives of 80-plus yards were third-most in the country.

The Seminoles led the ACC in third-down offense, yards gained per pass, yards gained per play, yards gained per rush, total offense per game, yards per completion, rushing offense per game and scoring offense per game. Florida State was the first team to lead the ACC in scoring offense and total in the same season since 2019 and was one of two teams nationally to lead its conference in yards per rush, yards per pass and yards per play in 2022.

During his first season leading the quarterbacks, Tokarz oversaw the continued development of starter Jordan Travis among the nation's elite while continuing to grow depth in the room. Travis was PFF's highest-graded quarterback in the nation and highest-graded offensive player in the ACC after passing for 3,214 yards with 24 touchdowns and only five interceptions while adding 417 yards and seven touchdowns rushing plus one receiving score. Travis, whose 32 total touchdowns were third-most in a season in FSU history, became the only Florida State player with 20 touchdown passes and seven rushing scores in one season.

Travis, who was named second-team All-ACC, joined Heisman Trophy winners Charlie Ward, Chris Weinke and Jameis Winston as the only FSU players with at least 3,000 total yards and 30 total touchdowns in a season. His 3,631 yards of total offense was the fifth-highest single-season total in FSU history, while his passing yards total was seventh and passing touchdowns were 10th. Travis led the ACC in yards per play, yards per pass attempt, yards per completion and pass efficiency rating. His average of 8.35 yards per play was third in the country, while his 9.10 yards per pass attempt was fifth nationally and his 14.22 yards per completion ranked eighth.

Travis peaked in his final appearance of the season, totaling an FSU bowl-record 468 yards of total offense in the Cheez-It Bowl victory over Oklahoma while garnering MVP honors. He completed a career-best 27 passes for a career-high 418 yards and two touchdowns and added 50 yards on seven rushes. Travis was only the fifth player in records dating back to 2000, and first since LSU's Joe Burrow in the CFP National Championship Game, to have 400 yards passing and 50 yards rushing in a bowl game. Travis also ended the regular season with a program-record streak of six consecutive games accounting for at least three touchdowns.

Redshirt sophomore Tate Rodemaker and true freshman AJ Duffy benefited from Tokarz's tutelage as well. Rodemaker led a second-half comeback at Louisville after Travis was forced from the game due to injury and was 6-for-10 passing for 109 yards and two touchdowns, including the game-winning score in the fourth quarter. In that game, Travis and Rodemaker became the first pair of FSU teammates with at least 100 yards passing and two touchdowns in the same game since 2005. Duffy played in three games and threw his first collegiate touchdown pass during FSU's 49-17 win over Louisiana.

Tokarz, who was FSU's senior analyst on offense for the 2020 and 2021 seasons, has 12 years of collegiate coaching experience. He has been on head coach Mike Norvell's staff for the last six years and, in addition to his time coaching quarterbacks, also has experience coaching wide receivers and tight ends.

Tokarz spent three seasons at Memphis with Norvell, serving as tight ends coach in 2019 after spending the 2017 and 2018 seasons as a graduate assistant. The 2019 team won a school-record 12 games and the program's first outright conference championship since 1969. The Tigers ranked eighth in the nation with an average of 40.5 points per game and with an average of 6.90 yards per play. Their team passing efficiency of 167.41 and average of 14.91 yards per completion were both 10th in the country.

In 2018, Tokarz worked with running backs as Memphis had the country's fourth-best rushing offense with an average of 279.9 yards per game behind a school-record 3,919 total rushing yards and 48 touchdowns. It was the first season in Memphis history with two 1,000-yard rushers, led by Doak Walker Award finalist and unanimous All-American Darrell Henderson. Henderson broke the NCAA record with an average of 8.22 yards per carry, and his 2018 average of 8.92 yards per carry was the highest for a season with a minimum of 200 carries in records dating back to 2000. The Tigers ranked fourth in the country with an average of 523.1 yards per game and 7.12 yards per play while also ranking seventh with an average of 42.9 points per game.



The 2017 team averaged 45.5 points per game, the second-highest average in the country, and ranked fourth in the NCAA with 523.1 yards per game and 7.35 yards per play. The team passing efficiency rating of 160.15 was sixth in the nation, and their average of 335.0 passing yards per game ranked seventh.

Tokarz began his coaching career in 2012 at Anna Maria College, where he coached wide receivers and helped the program tie a single-season wins record that stood until 2021. He tutored Dominique Concepcion to first-team all-conference honors in a season that included breaking single-game school records with 17 receptions, 236 receiving yards and three touchdowns, single-season records with 72 receptions and 848 receiving yards, and the program's all-time career records with 213 receptions, 2,585 receiving yards, 21 receiving touchdowns and an average of 5.46 catches per game.

Tokarz then moved to Stonehill College, where he coached wide receivers and worked with quarterbacks in 2013. That year, the Skyhawks posted their best record since 1996 and earned a share of the regular-season conference championship for the first time in program history. Wide receiver Nate Robitaille broke Stonehill single-season records with 91 receptions, 1,229 receiving yards and an average of 8.3 receptions per game while tying the single-season record with 13 receiving touchdowns.

Tokarz spent the 2014 and 2015 seasons at Memphis, working with the quarterbacks in 2015 and secondary in 2014. In 2015, the Tigers won nine games behind an offense that ranked 11th in the country in scoring and eighth in third-down conversion percentage. Tokarz worked with Paxton Lynch, who was a first-team All-AAC honoree as well as a finalist for the Manning Award and Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award after breaking program records for passing yards, passing touchdowns and 300-yard passing games. He ranked 11th in the nation in passing efficiency, 12th in completion percentage, 16th in passing yards and 19th in passing touchdowns. Lynch went on to be selected 26th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos.

The 2014 team won 10 games, the program's most in a regular season since 1963, and earned a share of the AAC conference championship. The defense ranked third nationally in red zone defense and ranked ninth in the country in total takeaways. Memphis also was third in the conference and top-25 nationally in scoring defense, rushing defense, passing efficiency defense, third-down defense, interceptions and fumble recoveries.

In 2016, he returned to Stonehill College as the passing game coordinator, quarterbacks coach and recruiting coordinator. That season, freshman Andrew Jamiel matched Robitaille's single-season program record with 91 receptions and broke the receptions-per-game record with an NCAA Division II-best 9.1 catches per game. He also twice broke Robitaille's single-game receptions record by posting 16 receptions in week two before breaking his mark with 18 catches for 169 yards and two touchdowns five weeks later in the Division II Football Showcase. Jamiel was named the conference's Rookie of the Year, Stonehill's first offensive player to earn conference rookie of the year honors, and headlined three all-conference selections on offense for the Skyhawks.

Tokarz was a three-year starting quarterback at Worcester State and left as the program's all-time leader in rushing yards by a quarterback while also ranking second in career touchdown passes and fourth in career passing yards. He was a first-team all-conference performer in 2011 when he led the Lancers to an 8-3 record, the program's most wins since 2003, and an appearance in the ECAC Northwest Bowl to cap his senior season.

Tokarz earned his bachelor's degree in history from Worcester State in 2012. He is married to the former Emily Williams, and they have one son.
