
Seminoles in the Pros

ver 20 former Florida State golfers from the PGA, LPGA and Senior tours joined a list of celebrities who returned to campus to play in the 2001 Seminole Pro-Am sponsored by Arvida and the Seminole Tribe of Florida. PGA Tour star Jeff Sluman, Senior Tour stars Hubert Green and Bob Duval headlined the group of Seminole golfing greats who's play benefited the tournament and celebrated the dedication of the Daye Middleton Golf Center.

"This was truly a great weekend for Florida State golf and the sport itself in our community," said FSU Director of Athletics, Dave Hart. "I think everyone is amazed at the improved facilities at the Don Veller Course

Prior to the start of the Pro-Am, FSU president Sandy D'Alemberte dedicated the Dave Middleton Golf Center. The wonderful new state-of-the-art facility houses the Professional Golf Management Program and the new pro shop. In addition the facility includes a brand new clubhouse, locker rooms and a restaurant and grill. A clinic for junior golfers was held this morning before the kickoff of the football game. The major benefactors of the new Florida State golf facilities include Dave Middleton, Ms. Maggie Allesse, Mr. Buddy Runnels, Mr. Charlie Van Diver and former Seminole football and golf coach Don Veller.

Men's Golf <u>Al</u>l-Americans

Todd Crandall (1974, 1975) – All-America honorable mention in 1974 and 1975 . . . one of five Florida State golfers to earn All-America honors multiple times.

Kenny Knox (1977) – Honorable mention All-America in 1977 . . . earned four varsity letters winners as a player at Florida State from 1975-78.

Grant Turner (1979, 1981) – All-American third team in 1979 and 1981 ... helped Florida State finish 18th at the NCAA Championships in 1979, 14th in 1980 and 15th in 1981 ... earned medallist honors for Florida State at the 1979 Chris Schenkel E-Z-Go Invitational ... one of five Florida State golfers to earn All-America honors multiple times.

Paul Downs (1980) – Honorable mention All-America in 1980 ... played on three NCAA Championship teams (1979, 1980, 1981) and helped the Seminoles to a 14th place finish in 1980.

Steve Keppler (1982) — All-America third team in 1982 a member of Florida State's 1980 and 1981 teams that played in the NCAA Championship.

Keith Kulzer (1983) – Honorable mention All-America in 1983 ... played on Florida State 1981 and 1983 NCAA Championship participating teams.

Greg Fleisher (1983) – Honorable mention All-America in 1983 . . . a member of Florida State's 1983 NCAA Championship participating team.

Brian Kamm (1984) — Honorable mention All-America in 1984 ... played on Four Seminole teams that participated in the NCAA Championship ... attended Florida State from 1980-84.

Nolan Henke (1985, 1986, 1987) — All-America first-team in 1987 ... All-America second team in 1985 and 1986 ... the only three-time All-America in school history ... finished second in the NCAA Championships as a senior in 1987 ... Florida State finished seventh in the NCAA Championship in 1987 ... won seven tournaments as a Seminole ... won the 1986 Porter Cup, 1987 American Amateur and 1987 Monroe Invitational ... attended Florida State from 1984-87.

Roger Winchester (1989, 1990) — Honorable mention All-America in 1989 and 1990 ... was the Seminoles' No. 1 golfer for three consecutive years ... one of five Florida State golfers to earn All-America honors multiple times ... played on Florida State's NCAA Championships team in 1990 as the Seminoles finished in eighth place ... former English Amateur Champion.

Duke Donohue (1989) — Honorable mention All-America in 1989 . . . a member of Florida State's 1987 team that finished seventh at the NCAA Championships.

Andy Purnell (1990) — Honorable mention All-America in 1990 . . . a leader on Florida State's 1990 team which finished in eighth place at the 1990 NCAA Championships.

Bobby Cochran (1993) — Honorable mention All-America in 1993 . . . a senior leader on Florida State's 1994 NCAA Championships team which finished 16th in the event . . . an All-ACC selection in 1994.

Christian Raynor (1994, 1995) — All-America first team in 1995 ... All-America second team in 1994 ... led the Seminoles to a school-best tying seventh place finish at the 1995 NCAA Championships ... earned medallist honors at the 1995 NCAA East Regional Championship ... earned three first place finishes during his senior season ... one of five Florida State golfers to earn All-America honors multiple times ... All-ACC in 1994 and 1995 ... graduated from Florida State in 1995.

Ken Staton (1995) — Honorable mention All-America in 1995 ... led the Seminoles to a seventh place finish at the NCAA Championships ... finished 14th in the individual standings of the event ... his Seminole career was highlighted by being the individual leader after two days of the 1995 NCAA Championships. Florida State finished seventh in the event ... graduated from Florida State in 1995.

George McNeil (1998) — Honorable mention All-America in 1998 . . . also earned All-ACC honors in 1998 . . . earned one tournament title and 23 top-20 individual finishes . . . a member of the three NCAA Tournament teams at Florida State . . . a member of the Florida State's 1995 team that finished seventh in the NCAA Championship . . . finished his career at Florida State in 1998.

<u>Championships</u>

Florida State has earned a great deal of success in the NCAA Men's Golf Championship during the illustrious history of the Seminole program. The Seminoles competed in the event four times during the decade of the 1990's and have finished in the top-10 three times since 1985.

The Seminoles finished in a program best seventh place at the 1987 and 1995 NCAA Championships. The Seminoles' 1995 team finish of seventh place was a mere six strokes behind sixth-place California. Ken Staton, who finished tied for 14th in the individual standings with a four-round total of 289, led Florida State. George McNeil and Richard Fulford finished tied for 29th with respective four round totals of 293. Christian Raynor finished in a tie for 35th which Dennis Tymosko finished 78th. Staton (honorable mention) and Raynor (second-team) both earned All-America honors for the Seminoles.

The Seminoles also finished seventh at the 1987 championships. Nolan Henke, the Seminoles only three-time All-American, finished tied for second in the individual standings. Henke finished six strokes behind the individual medallist, Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. The four-day score for the Seminoles was 1,191 — four strokes behind sixth-place Arkansas.



A Closer Look — The Atlantic Coast Conference

The Atlantic Coast Conference boasts a rich tradition of success in men's golf. Each of the nine teams in the ACC is considered to be among the best in the nation and together form the top men's golf conference in the nation.

Florida State joined the ACC and began competing for the conference championship in 1992. The Seminoles earned their best ACC finish, third, during the 1994 season, finished fourth in 1996 and finished fifth during the 1995 and 1997 seasons.

Florida State finished in sixth place at the 48th annual Atlantic Coast Conference championship tournament at the

Uwharrie Point Country Club in New London, N.C. It was the Seminoles' best team finish since coming in fifth in 1995. Junior Peter Mitchell finished in a tie for ninth place in the individual standings as he finished the event with a career-best 211 score for the 54hole event. The Seminoles finished the tournament with three of their top seven single round team scores during the 2002 season including a season-best 282 in the second round. The Seminoles three-round total of 868 was their best at the ACC Championship since totaling an 866 in 1988 and was 29 strokes better than their team score during the 2001 tournament when they finished in eighth place. In addition, the Seminoles' two-spot improvement in the team standings was the best of any of the nine ACC teams from the 2001 to the 2002 championship

GOETZE NAMED TO ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE 50TH ANNIVERSARY MEN'S GOLF TEAM

Nicky Goetze, Florida State's head coach, has been named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 50th Anniversary men's golf team as announced by commissioner John Swofford. In his third season as the Seminoles' head coach, Goetze has led Florida State to 12 top-10 finishes during his first two years as head coach. Goetze was a three-time All-American during his career as a player at Clemson. He earned second-team honors as a senior, third-team honors as a sophomore and honorable mention All-America honors as a junior. He helped Clemson to a share of the ACC Championship in 1990 and finished second in the individual standings of the ACC championship as a senior in 1993. Goetze earned All-ACC honors in 1991, 1992 and 1993. Goetze is still ranked in Clemson's top-10 in stroke average, rounds under-par and top-10 finishes. He has also played in more tournaments and more rounds than any player in Tiger history. He is also the only two-time winner of the Ping Preview tournament. In addition, Goetze was an Academic All-American for the Tigers in 1992.
