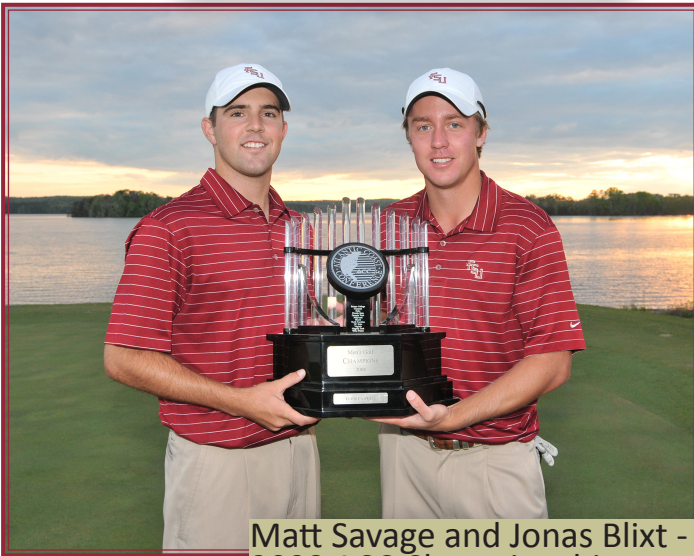




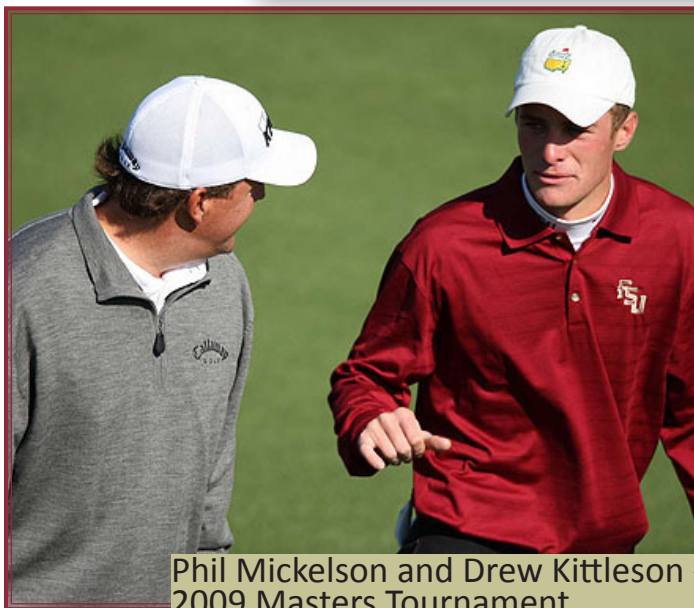

QUALITY LEADERSHIP

When head coach Trey Jones took over Florida State's men's golf program in 2004, the Seminoles were eighth in the ACC and had not made the NCAA tournament since 1998. Under his leadership, Jones morphed the Seminoles into a winning program, leading the team to seven NCAA Tournament appearances, the most ever in Seminole lore. Jones' coaching expertise led the men's golf team to be recognized as a top contender in the conference and across the nation revamping the perception of the program. The evidence can be found in the 2008 ACC Championship trophy he brought to Tallahassee. In 2012, Florida State finished in a tie for eighth place at the NCAA Championship Finals marking the second time in the last three seasons the Seminoles finished in the top eight of the national tournament standings.

PRESTIGIOUS PROGRAM

Florida State is known for developing elite talent and that reputation was further sustained when the men's golf team was invited to compete in the NCAA Tournament for their seventh consecutive season in 2012. This would not have been possible without assistance from the Seminoles' superb athletes such as Brooks Koepka, Kyle Cobb and Wesley Graham. The Seminoles have been successful in the ACC with Koepka being named the 2010 and 2012 ACC Player of the Year and Jonas Blixt winning the 2008 ACC Championship. The team has had 12 All-ACC Team Selections since 2007 and 6 PING All-Americans. Cobb was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team in 2012.



SEMINOLES GOLF COURSE



The Dave Middleton Golf Complex and the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course are home to the PGA Golf Management Program, which is one of only a few programs in the country that is accredited by the Professional Golfer's Association of America. A 27,000-square-foot clubhouse, the Dave Middleton Golf Complex boasts private technologically advanced Wi-Fi classrooms, study and teaching labs, an internship library, a fully equipped club repair room, a pro shop, locker rooms and the Renegade Grill. The \$7 million facility is a two-building complex, which also includes a multi-directional driving range, a video analysis instructional center with hitting bays for inclement weather, chipping and putting greens, as well as locker rooms, team lounge, auditorium and fitness facility.



The golf course was renovated in 2004 with the reconstruction of all 18 greens, complexes, tee boxes and the state-of-the-art TiffEagle Turf was installed on all the putting surfaces. Each year the facility hosts over 60,000 rounds of golf. The golf course was recently recognized as one of the top 10 golf courses in the country by the National Golf Foundation for customer loyalty and satisfaction.

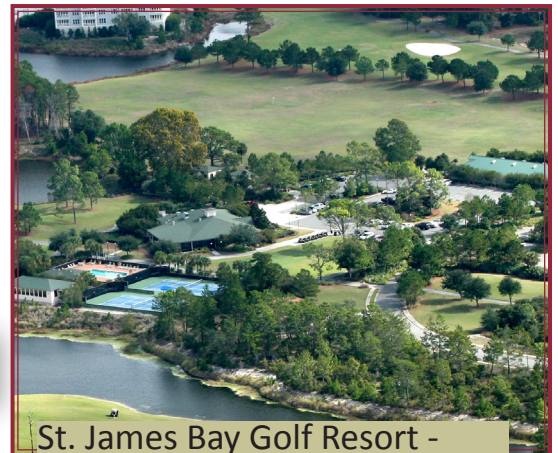

NOLES IN THE PROS



Paul Azinger - 13 PGA Victories including the 1993 PGA Championship

Including the 1993 PGA Championship won by Paul Azinger, former Florida State golfers have won nearly 50 PGA Tour events. Since Hubert Green won the 1971 Houston Champions Invitational, nearly one dozen former Seminoles have earned overwhelming success on the PGA, Senior PGA (Champions Tour), Nationwide, and Buy.com Tours. The members of this fraternity have won more than \$50 million in prize money since finishing their Seminole careers. While representing Florida State and the Seminole golf program, the tournaments where they were victorious include U.S. Open (Hubert Green), the PGA Championship (Paul Azinger and Jeff Sluman), and the Buick Southern Open (Kenny Knox). Most recently, 2008 graduate Jonas Blixt won his first PGA Tournament at the 2012 Frys.com Open.



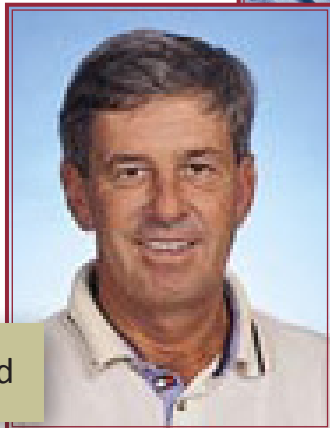

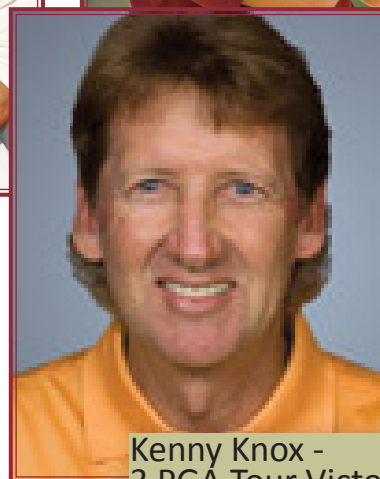

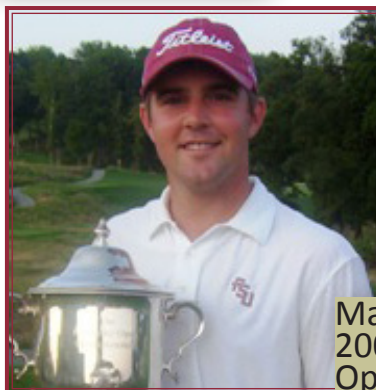

Hubert Green

Seminole golf legend Hubert Green, who won 22 events while playing on the PGA Tour, was inducted into World Golf Hall of Fame in 2007 and was honored at the Induction Ceremony on Nov. 12, 2007 at the World Golf Village in St. Augustine, Fla.

Green came to Florida State in 1965 and served as the captain of the golf team in 1968. He led Florida State to a 10th place finish in the NCAA Championship tournament in 1968 and guided the Seminoles to several impressive dual meet victories over many teams in the southeastern United States including Florida during his collegiate career. Green was inducted in the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame in 1977. He graduated from Florida State and turned professional in 1969.

Green is one of the most successful professional golfers in the history of the sport. He won 19 events while playing on the PGA Tour including the U.S. Open Championship in 1977 and the PGA Championship in 1985. He played on the 1977, 1979 and 1985 U.S. Ryder Cup Teams and is currently playing on the Champions Tour. Green has earned four titles while playing on the Champions Tour with his most recent championship coming in 2002 at the Lightpath Long Island Classic.

“On my golfing journey, I had no idea how high I could climb,” said Green on being told of his election to the Hall of Fame. “To be inducted in to the Hall of Fame is reaching the summit; best of all is being a member of the club that hosts the greats of the game.”

SEASON OUTLOOK

With three members of its line-up from the 2012 NCAA Championship finals on its roster, Florida State has the firepower and the depth to make even more noise on the national level this season. The Seminoles have made a school record seven consecutive NCAA Championship appearances under 10th year head coach Trey Jones and will look to solidify their place among the nation's elite teams in 2013.

With four-time All-American Brooks Koepka now playing professionally, Jones will rely on a core group of four players who are the backbone of the Seminoles for both leadership and low scores in 2013. Seniors Chase Seiffert and Doug Letson along with junior Joaquin Lolas and sophomore Daniel Berger all return after enjoying successful campaigns in 2012. Seiffert, Berger and Lolas helped lead Florida State to the cusp of the match play portion of the 2012 Championship finals before the Seminoles fell to Kent State in the playoff.

Seiffert is Florida State's top returning golfer after earning All-ACC honors for the first time in his career in 2012. He is one of eight returning All-ACC performers for the 2013 season and is the Seminoles' leader after averaging 72.50 strokes in eight events in 2012. He earned two top three individual finishes (second at the Seminole Intercollegiate and tied for third at the Gator Invitational) and finished in a tie for 12th place in his first career ACC Championship appearance. Seiffert's 72.50 stroke average makes him the Seminoles' returning leader with the lowest stroke average.

"Chase has made such huge strides improving as a golfer in his first season at Florida State," said Jones. "For him to earn All-ACC honors as a first year player was a bonus for us and exciting for him. He continued to improve throughout the spring and enters his senior season playing the best golf of his career."

Another Seminole who played his best golf of the season late, was sophomore Daniel Berger who finished in third place in the individual standings at the NCAA Southwest Regional Championship and in a tie for seventh place in his first career ACC Championship. Berger finished in the top 20 of the individual standings in five of his final six events and finished in a tie for 21st place in the NCAA Championship Finals.

"Daniel played well for us and learned so much as a freshman," said Jones. "His potential is limitless and I am really looking forward to working with him during the remainder of his career. Daniel's approach to the game of golf and desire to take care of his responsibilities has already made him a leader on our team in only his second season."

Letson, who joins Seiffert in forming the Seminoles' two-member senior class, also played the best golf of his career during his junior season. He averaged a career best 72.81

strokes in nine events and earned four top 10 individual finishes. Letson finished in third place at the FAU Spring Break Invitational and in a tie for ninth at the Florida State hosted Seminole Intercollegiate.

"We certainly missed Doug's presence in the line-up during the NCAA Finals," said Jones. "But his play during the spring showed us how good he can be. Doug was very consistent in the spring and gives us another golfer with the ability to go low each round. He is completely healthy and is looking forward to competing this spring more than any of the players on the roster."

Lolas performed as well under pressure as any Seminole in 2012 when he earned his way into Florida State's line-up for the NCAA Championship Finals after playing in only three of eight events during the spring season. Lolas played a sensational round of even par 71 in the first round of the NCAA Finals to tie for the team lead and help the Seminoles into a five-way tie for sixth place in the team standings after the first round of the event.

Bjorn Hellgren, a junior, will look to work his way back into the line-up after playing in only two events in 2012. During the first two years of his career he played in the 2011 ACC and NCAA Indiana Regional Championships and has posted an average of 73.90 strokes in 30 career rounds.

Jones added an outstanding four-member recruiting class to the Seminoles' roster for 2013 – one that he feels is as much about quality as it is quantity.

"Each one of the four newcomers to our team is going to make his presence known this year," said Jones. "All four players are freshmen who are experienced, mature and advanced golfers who have the ability to fill in the holes that we have entering the season."

The Seminoles' group of four newcomers includes two of the top prep players from the state of Florida in the class of 2012 (Collin Engelhardt and Hank Lebioda) and two of the top international players entering the collegiate ranks this season (Rowin Caron and Cristobal Del Solar).

Engelhardt and Lebioda come to Florida State from the golf powerhouse of Trinity Prep in Winter Park, Fla. The pair combined to help lead the Saints to a pair of top five state tournament finishes.

Engelhardt has displayed the ability to compete at the highest levels and loves to compete under pressure. His consistency will be one of his strengths. He also possesses a very high level of determination and has an extremely competitive spirit.

Lebioda is a strong ball striker which allows him to make a great deal of birdies. Coming off a top ten finish in the Florida State Amateur and winning the state junior two of the last three years, Hank should enter collegiate play with confidence.

Caron and Del Solar have earned success at the highest levels of international junior golf throughout their careers – an aspect of their games that will benefit both of them during their careers as Seminoles.

Caron has many strengths, chief among them is his ball control. His international experience will benefit him as he plays in the ACC and against the Seminoles' schedule which is ranked as one of the toughest in the nation.

Del Solar is a strong player who has the physical abilities to compete for a spot in the Seminoles' line-up as a freshman. He has developed an ability to play tough courses well because he drives the ball extremely well.

The 2012-13 schedule will once again see the Seminoles work their way through a challenging slate of tournaments that is comprised not only of formidable opponents, but some of the nation's premier venues.

Three straight tournaments in the state of Florida – the Gator Invitational, the USF Invitational and the Seminole Intercollegiate open the spring season. Florida State will then make its first trip to Williamsburg, Va., for the C&F Bank Invitational before its annual stop at the Gary Koch Intercollegiate at Old Memorial in Tampa, Fla. The ACC Championship will once again be held at the Old North State Club at Uwharrie Pont in Greensboro, N.C.

For the first time the Seminoles will play host to the NCAA Southeast Regional at Golden Eagle Country Club in Tallahassee, May 16-18.

"Our goals don't change from year to year – we expect to compete for the ACC and National Championships every season," said Jones. "We want to solidify our place among the nation's best teams and put ourselves in position to do that at the end of the year. Our guys got a taste of success last season and are eager to step up to the tee and play during the final weekend of the National Finals."

On Seiffert: Florida State's returning All-ACC selection who will be one of the Seminoles' leaders as a senior... member

of Florida State's starting line-up in his first season in 2012 after transferring from Central Alabama Community College...played in all eight of Florida State's events during the spring of 2012 in helping lead the Seminoles to a ninth place finish in the NCAA Championship Finals, third place in the NCAA Southwest Regional and a third place finish in the ACC Championship... Seiffert was one of only three ACC newcomers to earn All-ACC honors and is one of only eight returning All-ACC selections from the 2012 season...led Central Alabama to a runner-up finish at the 2011 National Junior College Athletic Association Division I National Championship...earned two individual championships as a sophomore at Central Alabama in 2011 – at the Liz Kling Invitational and the Region XII Championship...won the individual title at the 95th Annual Florida State Amateur Championship in 2012...won the individual title at the 66th Florida Open Championship in 2012...coupled with his win at the Florida State Amateur, Seiffert became only the second player in history to win the State Amateur and the State Open in the same year...he became the first golfer since Don Bisplinghoff in 1955 to win both...earned individual medalist honors at the 2012 Oglethorpe Invitational at the Wilmington Island Country Club in Savannah, Ga...won the championship of the 2012 Florida Amateur Match Play Championship with a victory in the championship round over freshman teammate Hank Lebioda at the Country Club of Orlando...his stroke average of 72.50 during his first season at Florida State is the 11th best single season scoring average in school history.

Fall 2011: A member of the team but did not play in any tournaments after transferring from Central Alabama Community College.

Spring 2012: Earned All-ACC Honors for the first time in his career and helped lead Florida State to eighth place in the final team standings at the NCAA Championship Finals at the Riviera Country Club in Pacific Palisades, Calif....finished as Florida State's second highest ranking golfer with a 72.50 stroke average

in his first season in the Seminoles' line-up... an incredible four match roll at the Seminole Intercollegiate (eight strokes under par), at the FAU Spring Break Invitational (one stroke over par), at the Gary Koch Invitational (seven strokes over par) and in his first career ACC Championship (three strokes under par) when he was a cumulative total of minus three strokes in those four tournaments...was a total of one stroke over par in five events during the months of March and April... tied for a third place finish in the Gator Invitational – the first event of his Florida State career...was Florida State's leading golfer as he carded scores of 68-71-74 for a three round total of 213...his score of 68 (minus two under par) came in the first round of his Division I career and was tied for the 11th best round of the season by a Seminole...his score of 68 was his second best of the year... was at his Seminole best as he finished in second place at the Florida State hosted Seminole Intercollegiate with a career best 36 hole score of 134 (67-67), a career best tournament score vs. par of minus eight and a career best 205 three round tournament score...Seiffert finished in second place in the individual standings with a three round total of 205 – he finished only one stroke behind teammate Brooks Koepka who carded a 66 in the final round to overtake Seiffert and win the individual title...both Seiffert and Koepka helped the Seminoles to a first place finish in the team standings as they overtook No. 8 Georgia Tech in the final round to win the title...Florida State's third leading golfer with a three under par score of 213 and scores of 77-66-75 in his first career ACC Championships appearance...his score of 66 in the second round ranks as his career high and moved him into a tie for eighth place in the individual standings after two rounds... averaged a career low 72.50 strokes in 24 rounds during eight events.

Before Florida State: Graduated From Mosley High School in Panama City in 2009...earned his Associates Degree from Central Alabama Community College in 2011 before enrolling in Florida State for the fall semester of 2011... finished tied for second or better in four of the eight spring season events he played in as a sophomore...finished in a tie for eighth place at the 2011 NJCAA Division I national Championship with scores of 74-71-71-75=291... finished tied for second or better in four of the eight events he played in as a sophomore...finished in a tie for eighth place at the 2011 NJCAA Division I National Championship with scores of 74-71-71-75=291...finished his second season at Central Alabama with a 73.79 scoring average.

On Letson: A returner to the Seminoles' line-up who will compete as one of the nation's top senior golfers...a member of three NCAA Tournament teams who has played in one career NCAA Regional Championship (2012) and two ACC Championships (2010 and 2012)... helped Florida State to a pair of top 10 national finishes at the NCAA Championship Finals with a third place finish during his freshman season (2010) and a tied for eighth place finish during his junior season (2012)... played in 24 career events...career-low score of 68 in the second round of the 2010 ACC Championship...tied his career low score with a 68 in the third round of the 2012 FAU Spring Break Invitational...best 36 hole score (139) came at the Florida State hosted Seminole Intercollegiate during the spring of 2012... averages 72.55 strokes and has earned two top 10 finishes (tied for fifth in 2010 and tied for ninth in 2012) in three Seminole Intercollegiate appearances...runner-up finisher at the Florida State Boy's Junior Championship and the runner-up for the Florida Junior Tour Player of the Year award in 2008...named to the 2012 All-ACC Academic team for the first time in his career...named to the 2011 and 2012 ACC Academic Honor Roll... averages 74.23 strokes in 70 rounds during 24 tournaments entering his senior season.

the nations toughest on an annual basis and creating one of the most functional player development facilities in all of college golf on one of the Seminoles' six home golf courses. Jones continues annually to build on the Seminoles' success in developing the nation's top talent into national contenders and collegiate golf's elite players. Named the 2008 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year as he led the Seminoles to the first conference championship in the sport of golf in school history, Jones is no stranger to competing with the nation's best in one of the top conferences for college golf.

Building championship teams and elevating those teams onto the national stage is nothing new to Jones who has earned four conference

coach of the year awards and led 11 of his 16 teams at the Division I level to the NCAA Championship tournament during his career. His teams consistently hold prominent places in the national rankings, are adept at winning conference championships and are annually among the top producers of All-American and all-conference performers.

Jones has become one of the winningest coaches in school history in his first nine years at Florida State. He is the only coach in school history to lead the Seminoles to seven NCAA Tournament appearances (no other coach has led Florida State to more than five appearances) and he is ranked second in school history with seven tournament championships (the school record is nine by Don Veller). The Seminoles have appeared in a school record seven consecutive NCAA Tournaments entering the 2012-13 season.

2012 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State earned an eighth place national finish at the 2012 NCAA Championship Finals to mark the second time in the last three seasons the Seminoles finished in the top eight of the standings at the national tournament. The Seminoles entered the championship ranked No. 19 in the nation by GolfStat and finished as one of only two teams ranked outside of the top eight to finish in the top eight of the final standings.

2010 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State finished in a tie for third place at the 2010 NCAA Championship Finals to earn the best national finish in school history. The Seminoles fell to Augusta State (the 2010 National Champion) in the semifinals of the championship tournament after defeating Texas Tech in the first round of match play. The Seminoles led the stroke play portion of the tournament and finished in second place to earn the No. 2 seed in the match play portion of the event. The third place finish at the NCAA Championship marked the best finish in school history - one better than the Seminoles fourth place national finish in 1957 and tied for fourth place finish in 1958.

2008 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State, which was led by All-Americans

Jonas Blixt and Matt Savage, won its first ever Atlantic Coast Conference championship as it defeated Duke by three strokes at the 2008

ACC Championship at the Old North State Club at Uwharrie Point. The Seminoles defeated Duke as they rallied from a one stroke deficit after two rounds to claim the ACC Championship. Each of the five team members contributed to the victory as the Seminoles closed the 54-hole tournament with four players under par. Blixt and Savage led the way with eight-under par 208 scores as they both finished in a tie for third in the individual standings.

RECRUITING

Known as one of the nation's most dynamic recruiters, Jones is nationally recognized as one of the top talent scouts in all of collegiate golf. His ability to recruit talented players, which in turn helps him build solid teams, is one of the aspects of coaching that has made Jones a top Division I coach. Florida State's recruiting class ranked fourth best in the nation in 2007, fifth best in 2008, sixth best in 2005 and among the nation's top 15 in 2006, 2010 and 2012.

BROOKS KOEPKA

Jones coached Brooks Koepka – the school record holder for lowest stroke average in a single season (71.09) and for a career (71.85) – the ACC Golfer of the Year in 2010 and 2012 and a three-time All-ACC selection. Koepka was named the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2009 and earned All-American twice in his career in leading the Seminoles to four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and two top-10 NCAA Championship Finals finishes. As a senior, Koepka tied the school record with a nine under par score of 63 in the third round of the FAU Spring Break Invitational and set the school record with his 199 total for three rounds of the event. Koepka won three events as a senior – the Brickyard Collegiate Championship, the Seminole Intercollegiate and the FAU Spring Break Invitational.

JONAS BLIXT

Jones coached one of Florida State's all-time best players - Jonas Blixt - to All-American honors and the first individual ACC Champion-

ship in school history. Blixt earned Ping/Division I All-American First Team honors in 2008 and Ping/Division I All-American Second Team honors in 2007. He is one of only three players in school history to earn All-American First and Second Team honors during his career. Blixt won the ACC individual championship in 2007 to become the first Seminole to win ACC medalist honors. He helped lead Florida State to the 2008 ACC Championship - the first ACC golf championship in school history - and earned All-ACC honors twice during his career. Blixt is currently playing on the PGA Tour.

DREW KITTLESON

Jones also coached Drew Kittleson, who will long be remembered as one of the top golfers in school history. Kittleson played in the Masters Championship at Augusta in 2009, the U.S. Open at Bethpage Black in 2009, four NCAA Championships and four ACC Championships during his standout career as a Seminole. He earned All-American Honorable Mention honors from Ping/Golf Coaches' Association of America in 2010 and Southeast Regional All-American honors in 2011. Kittleson helped lead Florida State to the 2008 ACC Championship and to a third place finish at the NCAA Division I Championship finals in 2010 - the highest national finish in school history. After a second place finish at the 2009 U.S. Amateur, he earned exemptions to play in both the 2009 Masters and U.S. Open Championships. Kittleson is currently playing on the Nationwide Tour.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Committed to the academic and athletic success of his student-athletes, Jones has coached 28 members of the ACC Academic Honor Roll, five members of the ACC Academic Golf Team and two members of the Golf Coaches' Association of America All-American Scholar team. His team was also nationally recognized in 2010 as one of the few schools in the NCAA to achieve a perfect APR score of 1000 since

the inception of the Academic Progress Rate program in 2003. During his tenure at Georgia State, he coached 10 members of the Atlantic Sun All-Academic team and 20 members of the TAAC All-Academic team.

JONES NATIONALLY

Jones has been an active member of the Golf Coaches Association of America since 1993. He is currently a member of the steering committee for the Collegiate Golf Hall of Fame. Jones served the board as the Division I Director for the East Region and served as the chair of the District 3 South Regional NCAA Selection Committee. He was also a representative in the District 3 South NCAA Selection Committee from 1999-2002.

GEORGIA STATE

Trey Jones was named the head coach at Georgia State in 1995 and immediately began to assemble one of the dominant men's golf programs in the southeastern United States. He led the Panthers onto the national scene for the first time in school history including their first appearance in the NCAA Championship tournament (2003), first conference championship (1998, Trans America Athletic Conference) and highest national ranking (20th during the 2000 season). Jones was responsible for the program in its entirety including recruiting, coaching, fundraising, public relations, strength and conditioning, scheduling and all budgetary matters. Under Jones' leadership, Georgia State amassed 91 wins over SEC teams and 33 wins over ACC opponents from 1997-2003. During that period, the Panthers earned 23 victories over top 25 opponents.

PERSONAL

Jones is married to the former Cathy McVeigh, who is the coordinator of financial aid for student-athletes at Florida State. They are the proud parents of a daughter, Jordan (11) and a son, Lawrence Andrew (7). Jones earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education with a minor in business administration from North Alabama in 1991. Jones is a 22-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks. He was the head men's coach and Director of Golf Operations at Georgia State for eight years (1996-2003) before becoming only the fifth coach in the history of the Seminole program in 2004. Pri-

or to his career at Georgia State, Jones was an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College (1992-95) and his alma mater North Alabama (1991). Jones developed his teaching, coaching and recruiting philosophies as he helped hone those programs into national contenders.

ASSISTANT COACH ROBERT DUCK

AUGUSTA STATE '01 - 2ND SEASON AT FSU

Robert Duck, who helped coach both the Florida State men's and women's golf teams to their respective NCAA Tournaments in 2012, is in his second season as an assistant coach under Trey Jones. He works directly with each of the players on both teams and has been a sensational addition to the Seminoles' coaching staff. Duck's affable personality allows him to relate to the players on a one-on-one and team basis, his strong teaching skills and his ability to help each golfer with his course management skills allowed him to quickly become an important member of Florida States coaching staff in his first season in Tallahassee.

Duck works with both programs at Florida State in the areas of player development, recruiting and daily team and individual coaching responsibilities.

Duck was an instrumental part of the coaching staff as both the Seminole men's and women's teams advanced to their respective NCAA Tournaments for a school record seventh consecutive season. The Seminole men finished in ninth place in the NCAA Championship Finals, in a tie for third place at the NCAA Southwest Regional Championship and in third place in the ACC Championship in 2012. Duck helped Florida State earn tournament championships at the 2012 Seminole Intercollegiate and the 2012 FAU Spring Break Invitational as the Seminoles earned seven top five team finishes during his first season in Tallahassee. His teaching abilities and coaching philosophies also translated well with the Seminole women as they finished in 10th place in the

NCAA Central Regional and in fourth place in the ACC Championship.

Duck also coached two of the top golfers in school history – Brooks Koepka and Maria Salinas -- during their senior seasons. Koepka enjoyed the best season of his career as he won three individual titles, earned ACC Golfer of the Year and All-American honors and played in his first U.S. Open. Salinas earned All-America and All-ACC honors and participated in the NCAA Championship finals for the third time in her career.

The Seminoles – both the men and the women – were ranked among the nation's top 25 teams throughout his first season at Florida State. The men were ranked as high as No. 13 while the women were ranked as high as No. 22 nationally in 2012.

championship appearances (1998, 1999, 2001). He is one of the top golfers in the storied history of the Augusta State program and remains listed prominently in the record book more than 10 years after his playing career ended. Duck owns the school record for lowest stroke average by a freshman (73.22) in 1998 - an average that still ranks as the seventh-best single season stroke average in school history. His career stroke average of 73.86 is ranked ninth in school history. During his career he earned 12 top 10 and 28 top 20 individual finishes.



NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY AS A PLAYER
Duck led Augusta State to three NCAA Championship tournament appearances and helped the Jaguars to a seventh place finish as a senior. The seventh place finish was the best in program history at the time. With the foundation put in place by Duck and his teammates, the Jaguars won NCAA Titles in 2010 and 2011.

SUCCESS IN PROFESSIONAL WORLD
Duck enjoyed a successful career as a manager of professional golfers for the Hambric Sports Group (2003-2012) before accepting his current assistant coaching position at Florida State. Based in London, Duck was the supervisor of the European Division of Hambric Stellar Golf. He was a player manager who oversaw public relations and marketing for seven clients including 1988 Masters champion Sandy Lyle, 2005 European Tour Rookie of the Year Gonzalo Fernandez-Castano, former Augusta State All-American Oliver Wilson and Francesco Molinari.

PERSONAL
Duck is married to the former Michelle Digsby. He earned his bachelor's degree in marketing from Augusta State in 2001. A native of Northampton, England, he represented Great Britain-Ireland as a member of the 1998 Palmer Cup team. He played in the 1997 European Amateur Championship and finished tied as the runner-up with Sergio Garcia and Luke Donald.



COACHING EXPERIENCE
Duck, a rising star in the collegiate coaching ranks, was the acting head coach at Augusta State in 2002 and served the Jaguars as a volunteer assistant coach during the 2001-02 season and as an assistant coach during the 2002-2003 season. During his tenure as the acting coach at Augusta State, the Jaguars were ranked as high as No. 9 nationally.

COLLEGIATE PLAYING EXPERIENCE
Duck enjoyed a standout career at Augusta State (1998-01) where he earned All-America honors as a sophomore (1999) and led the Jaguars to three NCAA Cham-

WOMEN'S HEAD COACH AMY BOND

FLORIDA STATE '99 - 3RD SEASON AT FSU



Amy Bond, who is in her third season as Florida State's women's golf head coach, is one of the cornerstones of the Semi-

nole women's golf program. First as a player, then an assistant coach and now as its head coach, Bond's commitment to the success of the program at her alma mater is unmatched. As a player she earned a spot on the ACC's 50th Anniversary team, as an assistant coach she helped the Seminoles to three NCAA Tournament appearances and now, as the fifth head coach in the history of the program, she has led Florida State to two NCAA Tournament appearances in two years.

Throughout her career at Florida State, she was one of the Seminoles top players (she was named Florida State's team MVP in 1999),

played with a number of touring professionals (including two-time LPGA major winner Karen Stupples) and coached many of Florida State's recent greats including the only four-time golf All-American in school history (Caroline Westrup). While achieving success during her career as a player and a coach, Bond has never lost sight of her ultimate goal: the success and achievements of her student-athletes.

In the first seven seasons as a Seminole coach (five as an assistant, two as the head coach), every student-athlete who has played golf at Florida State has earned her bachelor's degree and every one played on at least two NCAA Tournament teams during their careers.

In Bond's first two seasons as Florida State's head coach, the Seminoles have played in two NCAA Regional Championships, have had two players (Jessica Negron in 2011 and Maria Salinas in 2012) play in the NCAA Championship Finals, finished in the top five of two consecutive ACC Tournaments, earned two NCAA Regional All-American selections, two

All-ACC selections and had five players earn their degrees from Florida State.

An Ocala, Fla., native, Bond earned a bachelor's degree in sport management from Florida State in 1997 before earning her master's degree in sport administration from Florida State in 1999. Bond's twin brother, Tommy, is the Director of Athletics and head baseball coach at Trinity Catholic in Tampa, Fla.



ASSISTANT COACH MATT SAVAGE

FLORIDA STATE '09 - 1ST SEASON AT FSU



Matt Savage, one of the top golfers in Seminole history, is in his first season as an assistant coach for the men's and women's

golf programs at Florida State. He earned All-America honors in 2007, was the first player in school history to earn All-ACC honors three times, played on one NCAA Championship final and four NCAA Regional Championship teams and led the Seminoles to the first ACC Championship in school history in 2008. Savage closed his career in 2009 with a 73.09 scoring average in 44 career tournaments – the fifth best average in school history.

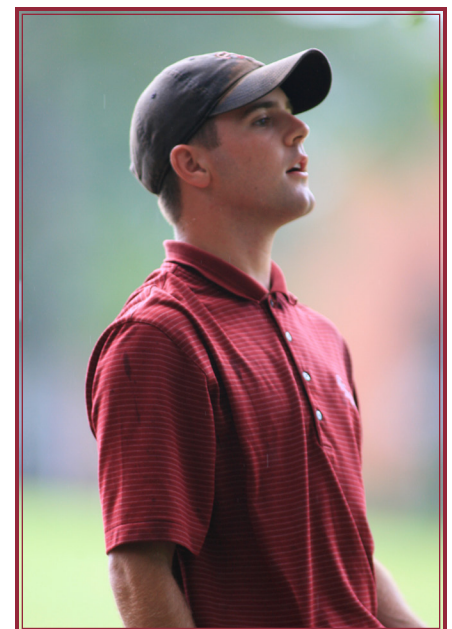
Savage works with both the nationally ranked Seminole men's and women's programs in the areas of skill development, recruiting, practice planning and match coaching. He has a unique ability to relate his experiences as both an accomplished player on the collegiate level and as a professional golfer to teach the game of golf to the next generation of Seminole golfers.

Savage was one of the building blocks of the Seminole men's program under Director of Golf Trey Jones from 2006 through his graduation from Florida State in 2009. The Seminoles were nationally ranked during each of his four seasons and finished the 2008 season ranked 11th after winning the ACC Championship for the first time in school history. The Seminoles were ranked as high as No. 7 nationally and earned a No. 3 seed in the NCAA West Regional Championship in 2008.

Savage earned first place honors at the 2008 North and South Amateur Championship at Pinehurst, advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2006 U.S. Amateur Public Link Championship and played in the 2006 U.S. Amateur Championship.

Savage was an academic standout during his collegiate career at Florida State as he was named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll in 2006, 2007 and 2009 and earned his degree in communication studies in 2009. He is one of only three players to earn All-Academic honors at least three times under Seminole men's coach Trey Jones.

Savage began his professional career on the NGA Hooters Tour soon after his graduation from Florida State and enjoyed three prosperous years on golf's third largest tour. He won his first event as a professional – the 2009 Kentucky Open – and was among the top money winners on the tour during his three seasons.

Chad Smith, who played an integral role in helping the Seminole men's and women's golf teams both advance to their

respective NCAA Tournaments in 2012, is in his second season as the Golf Operations Manager at Florida State. Smith works directly with Director of Golf and Head Men's Golf Coach Trey Jones and Head Women's Coach Amy Bond and each of the golf student-athletes on the

day-to-day management of the teams.

Smith was the manager of player services at the American Junior Golf Association prior to his appointment at Florida State. His primary role was mentoring junior golfers in their quest to earn college scholarships. In his position with the AJGA he handled all contact and benefits programs more than 5,000 member golfers. As an undergraduate student at Florida State, he was an intern in both the Seminole Athletics Marketing office and the FSU Licensing Office in Seminole Boosters.

As a member of the golf staff, Smith's responsibilities include managing the business affairs for both teams, arranging all aspects of

team travel and overseeing the improvement and maintenance of Florida State's nationally renowned facilities at the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course. He also serves as the Co-Tournament Director for the annual Seminole Intercollegiate Golf Tournament and will play an integral role in the tournament operations when Florida State plays host to the 2013 NCAA East Regional championship at Golden Eagle Country Club.

Smith, who graduated from Florida State with a bachelor's degree in sport management in 2005, returned to his alma mater in 2011.

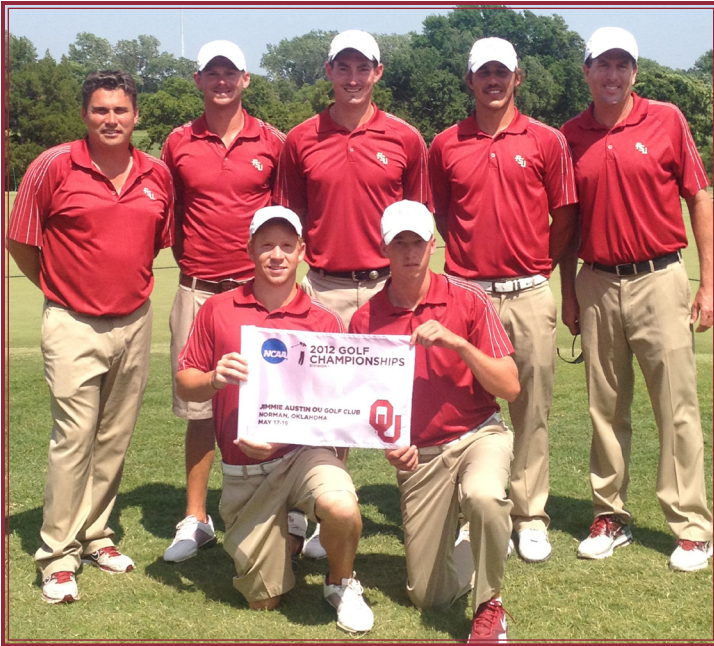

2011-12 SEASON IN REVIEW



SEMINOLES ENJOY SECOND TOP 10 NATIONAL FINISH IN LAST THREE YEARS

The Florida State Men's Golf team finished in a tie for eighth place in the final standings at the NCAA Championship Finals, ranked 16th in the final national poll by GolfStat, 18th in the final national rankings by GolfWeek, in a tie for third place at the NCAA Southwest Regional Championship, in third place in the ACC Championship, won two tournament championships (the Seminole Intercollegiate and the FAU Spring Break Invitational) and in the top five in the team standings in seven of its 11 tournaments as it enjoyed one of the top seasons in school history. The Seminoles earned their second top 10 national finish in the last three seasons as they finished in a tie for eighth in the final standings of the NCAA Championship finals after finishing in a tie for third place in the final national standings in 2010. Florida State was led by senior Brooks Koepka, who earned All-America Third Team honors from GolfWeek, was named the ACC Golfer of the Year and earned All-ACC honors for the third time in his career.

SEMINOLES' KOEPKA NAMED ACC GOLFER OF THE YEAR

Florida State senior Brooks Koepka was named the 2012 ACC Men's Golfer of the Year for the second time in his career as selected by a vote of the league's 11 head coaches. Koepka, who was named the ACC Co-Player of the Year in 2010, is only the sixth player in ACC history to be named the league's Golfer of the Year multiple times and is only the third player in ACC history to earn multiple ACC Golfer of the Year honors and ACC Freshman of the Year honors during his career. He was named the ACC Freshman of the Year in 2009. Koepka

was also named to the All-ACC team for the third time in his career - making him the second player in school history to earn All-ACC honors three times.

KOEPKA, SEIFFERT EARN ALL ACC HONORS

Brooks Koepka and Chase Seiffert were both named to the All-ACC team in a vote by the league's 11 coaches. It marked the school-record tying third time that Koepka has earned All-ACC honors as marked the first

time Seiffert has earned the honor in what is generally considered the best conference in college golf. It marked the school record sixth consecutive time that two Seminoles have earned All-ACC honors in the same season. Koepka is the second player to earn All-ACC honors three times as a Seminole and joins only All-American Matt Savage (2007, 2008 and 2009) as the only two Florida State men's golfers in school history to be three-time ACC selections. Koepka is one of five players in school history to earn All-ACC honors multiple times during his career - he is joined by Savage, Drew Kittleson (2009 and 2011), Jonas Blixt (2007 and 2008) and Christian Raynor (1994 and 1995) on that prestigious Seminole list.

BERGER ENJOYS STANDOUT REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Freshman Daniel Berger set a Seminole record for best finish by a freshman in an NCAA Regional Championship as he finished in third place the 2012 NCAA Southwest Regional Championship. Berger was in a tie for fifth place after the first round and in second place after the second round. He finished with a 3 under par tournament score of 213 as he carded a 3 over par score of 75 in the third and final round. Berger carded his first eagle of the postseason during the regional - a three on the par 5 No. 8 hole - to go along with two birdies and nine holes scored at par in the final round. He was 1 under par over the course of his final 11 holes of the championship.

COBB EARNS ACADEMIC HONOR

Kyle Cobb, who played in four matches as a graduate student in 2011-12, earned 2012 Capital One Academic All-District Men's At-Large Team honors by the College Sports Information Directors of America. He is set to receive his graduate degree in integrated marketing communications.

SEIFFERT PLAYS WELL IN FIRST SEASON

Junior Chase Seiffert, who earned All-ACC honors in his first season as a Seminole in 2012, was Florida State's second-leading golfer during the year with a 72.50 stroke average in 24 rounds during eight events. He enjoyed an incredible four match roll during the spring season at the Seminole Intercollegiate (eight strokes under par), at the FAU Spring Break Invitational (one stroke over par), at the Gary Koch Invitational (seven strokes over par) and in his first career ACC Championship (three strokes under par) when he was a cumulative total of three strokes under par in those four tournaments. Seiffert was Florida State's leading golfer in his first career match as he finished in a tie for third place at the Gator Invitational. His best finish of second place in the Florida State hosted Seminole Intercollegiate.

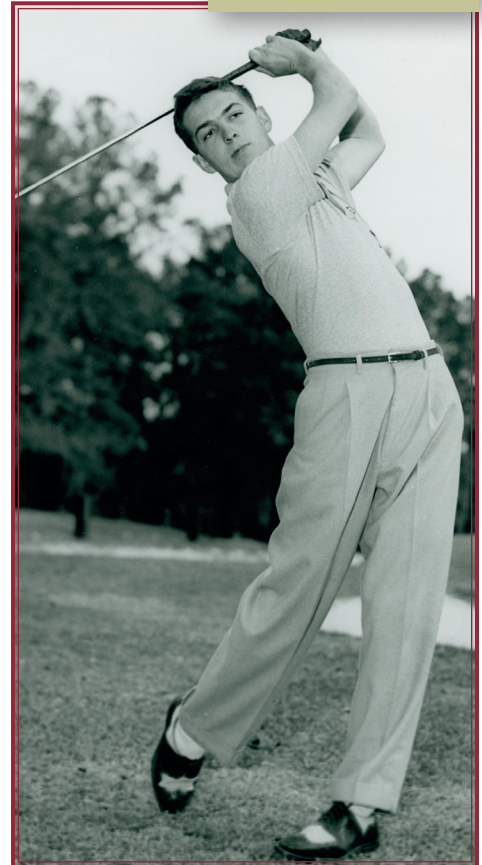

THIS IS THE ACC

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 60th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.



Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured four national golf titles. Clemson captured its first ever ACC and NCAA title in 2003. Wake Forest, with its league-leading 18 ACC championships, captured national titles in 1974, 1975 and 1986.

Georgia Tech is second to the Demon Deacons with 14 league titles, including 12 outright. North Carolina has captured 11 ACC crowns, 10 outright while Clemson has won nine league titles, eight outright. Clemson and NC State were co-champions in 1990, while in 2007 Georgia Tech shared the title with Virginia Tech.

Duke has won the league championship six times while Maryland and NC State each have shared one ACC title – the Tarapins and South Carolina tied in 1964 while the Wolfpack and Clemson deadlocked in 1990. Florida State captured its first ever ACC Championship title in 2008.

Wake Forest leads all league schools with 22 ACC individual champions. North Carolina is second with 13 followed by Georgia Tech (8), Clemson (7), Duke (6), NC State (6), Maryland (3), Virginia (2) and Florida State (1). In 2007, Florida State's Jonas Blixt claimed ACC medalist honors, which marked the first time an individual from Florida State had claimed the individual title. Virginia's Ben Rusch was the 2012 ACC medalist champion and became the first Cavalier to win the medalist title since 1955.

Seven ACC golfers have captured NCAA medalist honors, with NC State's Matt Hill capturing the latest honor in 2009. Wake Forest claims three of those honors in Curtis Strange (1974), Jay Haas (1975) and Gary Hallberg (1979). North Carolina's John Inman captured individual honors in 1984, Clemson's Charles Warren brought home the individual title in 1997 and Georgia Tech's Troy Matteson in 2002.

This past season, eight of the 11 golf teams advanced to the NCAA Regionals for a second consecutive year (Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, NC State, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest). Three ACC teams (Florida State, Virginia, Virginia Tech) and NC State's Albin Choi advanced as an individual to the NCAA finals. In the NCAA finals, Virginia finished tied for 22nd and Virginia Tech claimed 24th place out of 30 teams. NC State's Albin Choi finished tied for 37th individually in the NCAA's. The top eight teams continued in match play. Florida State (T8th) lost to Kent State (2 over versus Florida State 3 over on 18th hole playoff) and did not advance to the match play portion of the NCAA Men's Golf Championship.

The 11 schools that will carry the ACC banner this season have produced 190 first, second or third team All-Americans, 12 national Player/Collegiate Golfers of the Year, 3 National Senior Players of the Year and three national Coach of the Years.
