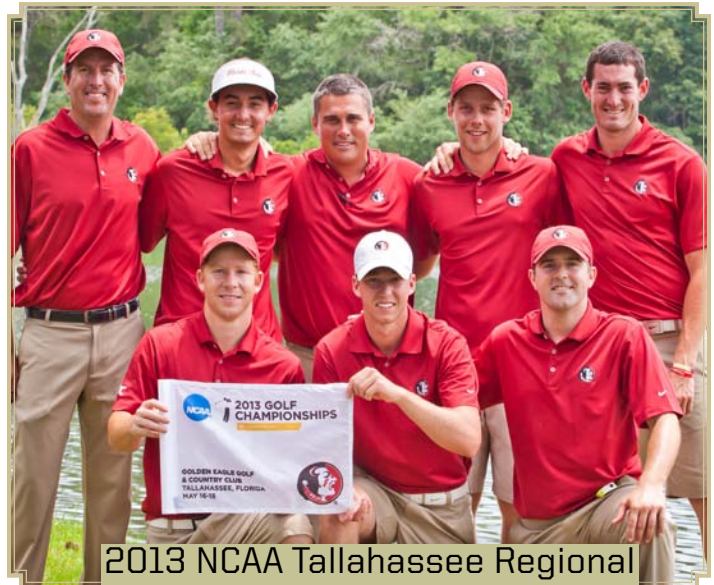




## THIS IS FSU GOLF

### QUALITY LEADERSHIP

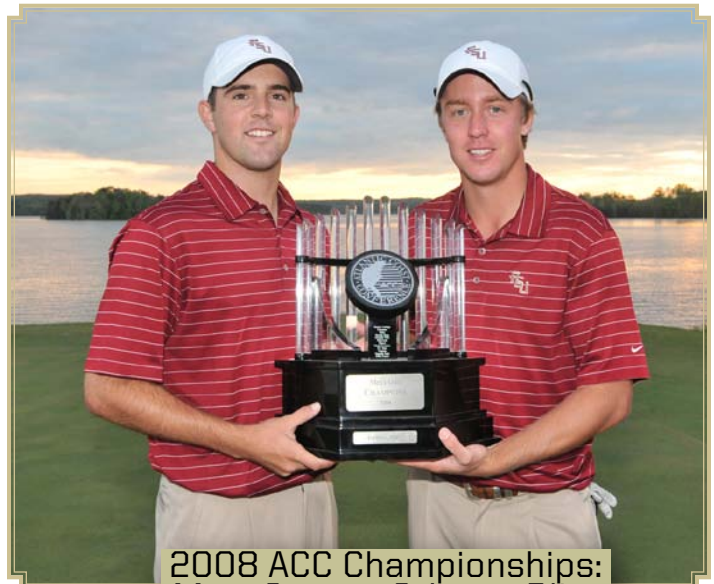
When head coach Trey Jones took over Florida State's men's golf program in 2004, the Seminoles were eighth in the ACC and had not made the NCAA tournament since 1998. Under his leadership, Jones morphed the Seminoles into a winning program, leading the team to seven NCAA Tournament appearances, the most ever in Seminole lore. Jones' coaching expertise led the men's golf team to be recognized as a top contender in the conference and across the nation revamping the perception of the program. The evidence can be found in the 2008 ACC Championship trophy he brought to Tallahassee. In 2012, Florida State finished in a tie for eighth place at the NCAA Championship Finals marking the second time in three seasons the Seminoles finished in the top eight of the national tournament standings.

### PRESTIGIOUS PROGRAM

Florida State is known for developing elite talent and that reputation was further sustained when the men's golf team was invited to compete in the NCAA Tournament for their eighth consecutive season in 2013. This would not have been possible without assistance from the Seminoles' superb athletes such as Daniel Berger, Chase Seiffert and Hank Lebioda. The Seminoles have been successful in the ACC with Hank Lebioda named the 2013 ACC Freshman of the Year, Brooks Koepka being named the 2010 and 2012 ACC Player of the Year, and Jonas Blixt winning the 2008 ACC Championship. The team has had 15 All-ACC Team Selections since 2007 and 7 PING All-Americans. Kyle Cobb was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team in 2012.

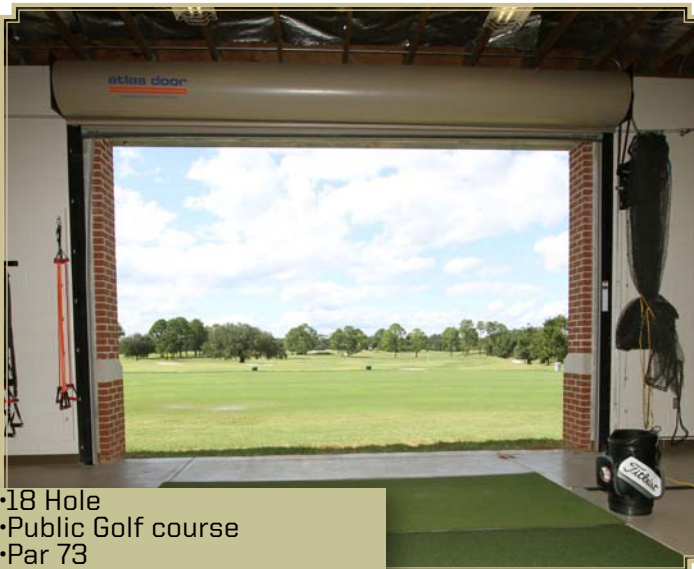




# SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

The Dave Middleton Golf Complex and the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course are home to the PGA Golf Management Program, which is one of only a few programs in the country that is accredited by the Professional Golfer's Association of America. A 27,000-square-foot clubhouse, the Dave Middleton Golf Complex boasts private technologically advanced Wi-Fi classrooms, study and teaching labs, an internship library, a fully equipped club repair room, a pro shop, locker rooms and the Renegade Grill. The \$7 million facility is a two-building complex, which also includes a multi-directional driving range, a video analysis instructional center with hitting bays for inclement weather, chipping and putting greens, as well as locker rooms, team lounge, auditorium and fitness facility.

The golf course was renovated in 2004 with the reconstruction of all 18 greens, complexes, tee boxes and the state-of-the-art TiffEagle Turf was installed on all the putting surfaces. Each year the facility hosts over 60,000 rounds of golf. The golf course was recently recognized as one of the top 10 golf courses in the country by the National Golf Foundation for customer loyalty and satisfaction.

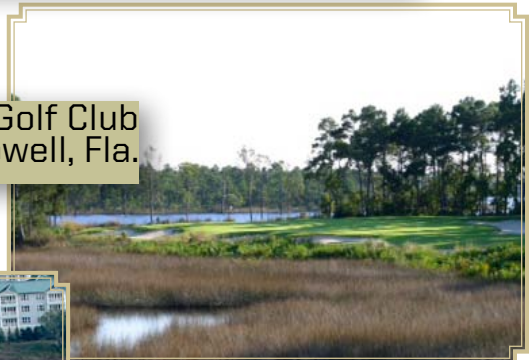

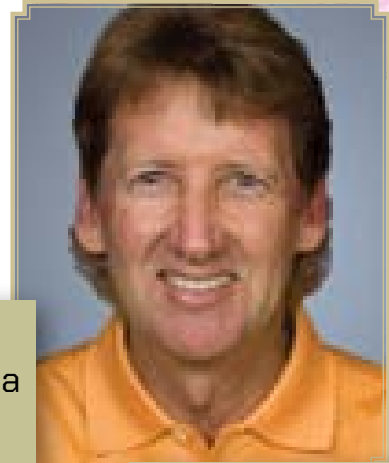

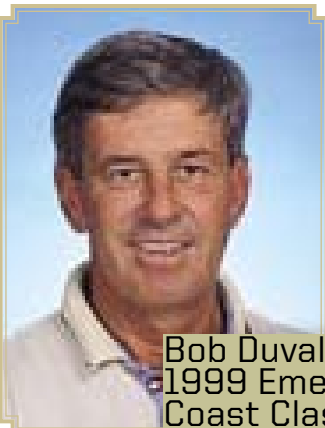

Including the 1993 PGA Championship won by Paul Azinger, former Florida State golfers have won over 50 PGA Tour events. Since Hubert Green won the 1971 Houston Champions Invitational, nearly one dozen former Seminoles have earned overwhelming success on the PGA, Senior PGA (Champions Tour), European Challenge Tour, Web.com, and Buy.com Tours. The members of this fraternity have won more than \$55 million in prize money since finishing their Seminole careers. While representing Florida State and the Seminole golf program, the tournaments where they were victorious include U.S. Open (Hubert Green), the PGA Championship (Paul Azinger and Jeff Sluman), and the Buick Southern Open (Kenny Knox). Most recently, 2008 graduate Jonas Blixt won his second PGA Tournament at the 2013 Greenbrier Classic.



## NOLES IN THE PROS

### Paul Azinger

Starting the PGA Tour in 1982, Paul Azinger had 12 wins including the 1993 PGA Championships. After transferring from Brevard Community College, Azinger completed his collegiate career at Florida State in 1981. While at Florida State, Azinger led the Seminole golf team to its highest ranking ever and was named the Metro Conference Champion and the Most Valuable Player in 1981. Azinger was named to the FSU Hall of Fame in 1988.

The Holyoke, Mass., native was a member of the US Ryder Cup four times (1989, 1991, 1993, 2002) and captain of the 2008 team at the Valhalla Golf Club in Louisville, Kentucky. Throughout his career Azinger was passionate about playing in the Ryder Cup and his hard work paid off as he and America's top golfers returned the Ryder Cup to the United States for the first time since 1999.

Azinger got his first win in 1987 as he went on to win the Phoenix Open, Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational and Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open. In 1992 he won The Tour Championship and followed up with his best year in 1993. He won the coveted PGA Championship along with the Memorial Tournament and New England Classic. After battling cancer, Azinger came back strong by winning the 2000 Sony Open in Hawaii. He spent almost 300 weeks in the top-10 of the Official World Golf Rankings between 1988 and 1994.



### Hubert Green

Seminole golf legend Hubert Green, who won 22 events while playing on the PGA Tour, was inducted into World Golf Hall of Fame in 2007 and was honored at the Induction Ceremony on Nov. 12, 2007 at the World Golf Village in St. Augustine, Fla.

Green came to Florida State in 1965 and served as the captain of the golf team in 1968. He led Florida State to a 10th place finish in the NCAA Championship tournament in 1968 and guided the Seminoles to several impressive dual meet victories over many teams in the southeastern United States including Florida during his collegiate career. Green was inducted in the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame in 1977. He graduated from Florida State and turned professional in 1969.

Green is one of the most successful professional golfers in the history of the sport. He won 19 events while playing on the PGA Tour including the U.S. Open Championship in 1977 and the PGA Championship in 1985. He played on the 1977, 1979 and 1985 U.S. Ryder Cup Teams and is currently playing on the Champions Tour. Green has earned four titles while playing on the Champions Tour with his most recent championship coming in 2002 at the Lightpath Long Island Classic.



### Jeff Sluman

Born and raised in Rochester, New York, Jeff Sluman transferred to Florida State in 1978 and became one of the best golfers on the team until he graduated with a finance degree in 1980. While on the PGA Tour, he won six titles including the 1988 PGA Championship. Named to the 1989 Florida State Hall of Fame Class, his time at Florida State was well spent as he led the team to three tournament wins and the NCAA tournament.

Before he arrived in Tallahassee, he won the 1987 New York State Amateur Tournament. Playing on the PGA Tour from 1980-2009, he finished in the top ten 105 times. His first tour victory happened to be the 1988 PGA Championship but he did not win another tournament until the 1997 Tucson Chrysler Classic. He followed up with another win at the 1998 Greater Milwaukee Open and the 1999 Sony Open in Hawaii. In 2001 he won the B.C. Open and had his last PGA Victory with the 2002 Greater Milwaukee Open.

Sluman still plays professional golf on the Champions Tour and already has two top 10 finishes in 2014 including a second place finish in the Mitsubishi Electric Championship at Hualalai. He's had five wins since 2008 including the 2013 Liberty Mutual Insurance Legends of Golf, the 2011 Nature Valley First Tee Open at Pebble Beach, the 2009 and 2008 Walmart First Tee Open at Pebble Beach and the 2008 Bank of America Championship.

With only two returnees from a team that advanced to the NCAA Championship last season, Florida State men's golf coach Trey Jones will lean heavily on a cast of youngsters in his 11th season at the helm of the Seminoles. The nine-player 2014 roster includes three sophomores and five freshmen, but the goals do not change. In pursuit of a third consecutive NCAA appearance - and fourth in five years - Jones will not use youth as an excuse as he continues to build the program into a national power. Jones took a few minutes to discuss his most recent team and the prospects for the immediate future:

**After having a successful veteran team over the last several years, you're transitioning to a very young roster which got its first taste of collegiate golf this past fall. How exciting is that challenge of putting together a new team?**

**TJ:** It is exciting. You look around and you realize how little they know, but they're sponges. They want to be good. They know the traditions here. It's our job to teach those traditions - how we do things - and how they're expected to represent the school and how they're expected to compete.

There are not as many voices talking to them, because the upper classmen aren't in their ear. It comes down to the coaching staff and two of our sophomores.

**Assess what you saw in the fall that may foreshadow promise for the spring, and also what might foreshadow how much more growth will have to take place?**

**TJ:** Early in the year we were going to play more than likely two sophomores and

three freshmen in every event and we ended up playing at Crooked Stick one sophomore and four freshmen, which is crazy. No one is feeling sorry for Florida State and their roster right now. We don't make excuses. There are young guys that play well on the PGA Tour every year. ... Age has turned into not being quite as important as experience and these guys have a lot of experience; positive experience.

We feel pretty good about what we have for talent on this team. What do we need to work on? The guys still don't know what they're doing. We're really rusty. Our wedge games are not good overall. We leave shot after shot on the golf course. I don't like to compare players, but you have to have a benchmark at some point. I mentioned to Jack Maguire and Josh Lee, in the same round, where Jack shot 71 and (former Seminole) Jonas Blixt would have shot 64 on that same ball. Josh shot 75 and Jonas or Brooks Koepka would have shot 66 on that same ball.

There's a lot of cleaning up to do, but no one cares how good you are in October, we just want to be really good in April.

**Share with us a little bit about your freshmen and first-year players and the talent and skill-sets they bring to the table?**

**TJ:** Jack Maguire was a top-five recruit in the country out of St. Petersburg. He has a solid build and tremendous club-head speed and its effortless club-head speed. His ball speed is off the chart. His golf swing is one that will repeat itself and he hits the ball in the center of the club just about every time. I think he's as good a driver of the golf ball in college golf. I'll let him hit a driver on any hole and he hits it as good as anybody. ... What we're going to do is build around that.

Josh Lee, his ball-striking skills are really, really good. Josh wants to be good. He's extremely fit. I think we're going to see Josh improve a lot this spring after having a fall under his belt.

Anthony Alex is a really intelligent player that came in and has really adapted very well. Anthony's strengths are ball-striking as well.

As you can tell, we've got some short game work to do with the freshmen. Once we get that ironed out I think you're going to see them put up some good numbers.

We do have a new player - Harry Ellis - who just got into school. He's going to be the leader of that group. Harry is a January enrollee and is the youngest-ever winner of the English Amateur. We watched Harry this summer in Scotland, and it wasn't just his golf that was truly impressive. It was how he was with the English National Team. He was the leader of that group. His attitude is contagious - an upbeat person and a competitor. What he will bring to our team is some maturity, a great golf game and a lot of leadership skills.

**Your grizzled veterans - sophomores Hank Lebioda and Rowin Caron - both came through with some decent performances in the fall. They seem to be very different types of players. How much leadership can they provide this team?**

**TJ:** There's no question they will. They are trying to figure out where they're at. Unfortunately for those two guys, they went from freshmen to seniors right here within a year as far as a leadership role. I'm positive they'll be leaders more through their actions than through their words. Hank was voted team captain, which was a credit to him.

**Where and how do you set your goals as team goals?**

**TJ:** Our goals are things we can control. The first thing we do is create great habits for everybody. We're not going to regress as a program. We have to keep growing. We're going to identify every single person from an academic standpoint, a golf game standpoint and a physical standpoint and we're going to work to improve those areas throughout the year. That's how we break it down to be a good team.

To say our goal is to win ACC and win a National Championship - yeah, those are things every team wants to do - but there are so many other things we have to do before we get there. We say we're always going to have to improve and we're going to give ourselves a chance to win golf tournaments.

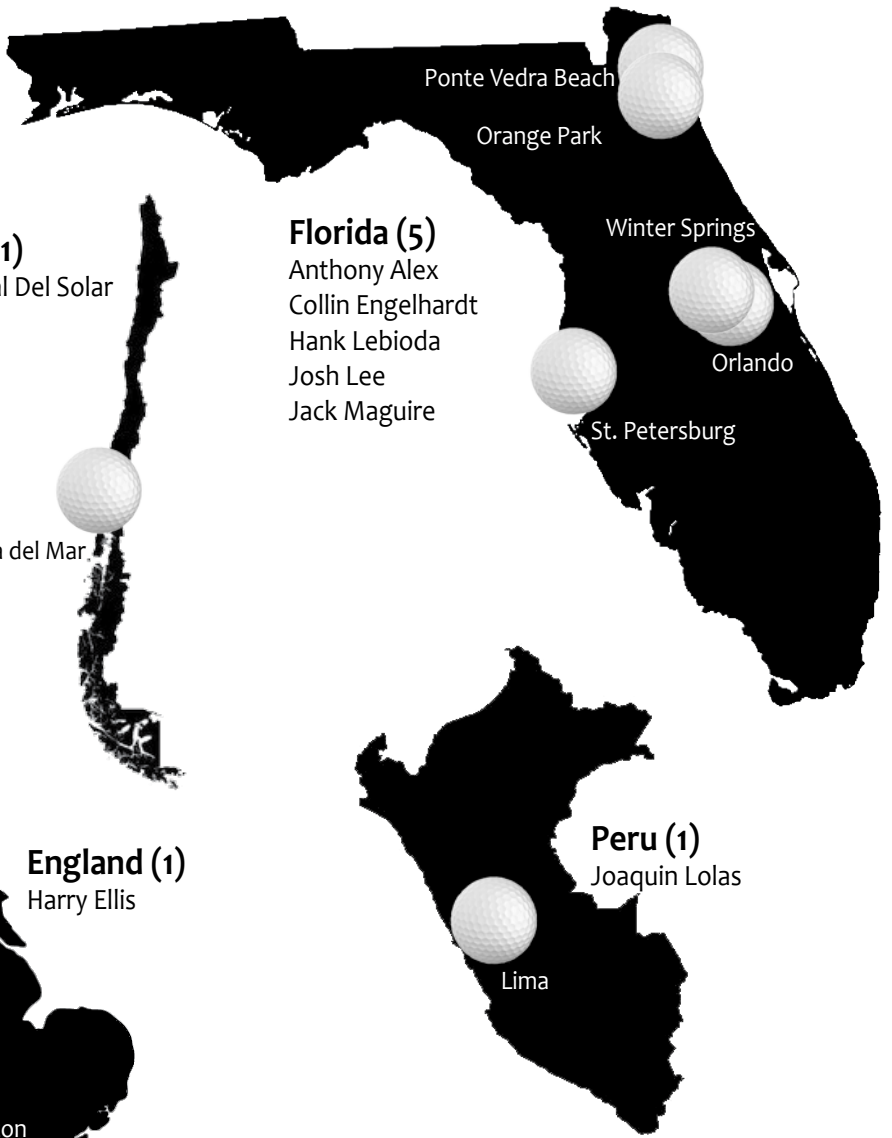

**Redshirt Senior Season: Fall 2013** - Did not play.

**Redshirt Junior Season: Spring 2013** - Played seven rounds in three tournaments this spring for a 71.57 stroke average...five of the rounds were at par or below...tied for seventh place at the Seminole Intercollegiate with a 6-under 210...posted a career low round of 67 in the third round of the Seminole Intercollegiate...bested his top tournament score by four strokes at the Seminole Intercollegiate...finished tied for 12th at the Gary Koch Invitational with a 1-under 215. **Fall 2012** - Did not play.

**Redshirt Sophomore Season: Spring 2012** - A member of the Seminoles' line-up at the 2012 NCAA Championship Finals...helped the Seminoles earn their seventh consecutive bid to the NCAA Championship tournament as he played in four events - three as a member of the Seminoles' line-up and a fourth as an individual participant...inserted into the Seminoles' National Championship line-up after an injury to Doug Letson just a week before the championship...had to get himself back into tournament mode after defeating teammate Kyle Cobb in a playoff to move into the line-up...a sensational round of even par 71 in the first round of the National Championship Finals...his round of 71 tied for the team

lead and helped the Seminoles into a five-way tie for sixth place in the team standings after the first round of the event...second-best finish of his career - and second top 15 finish of his career - as he finished in a tie for 14th place at the Gator Invitational for his best performance of the spring season...three scores of 73 or better (73-72-72), the best tournament score of his sophomore season (217) and his best individual placement (tied for 14th) in helping the Seminoles to a fifth place finish in the team standings at the Gator Invitational...best single round score of the season came as a one under par score of 70 in the first round of the Seminole Intercollegiate...averaged 74.67 strokes in nine rounds during three tournaments. **Fall 2011** - Played in three events and was a member of the Seminoles' line-up in two events - the Fighting Illini Invitational and the U.S. Collegiate Championship - while playing in the Brickyard Collegiate Championship as an individual...best event of the fall season came at the Brickyard as he finished in a tie for 29th place in the individual standings with a four over par total of 220...best single round score of the season came in the first round of the Brickyard with a one under par score of 71...averaged 75.57 strokes in 12 rounds during four tournaments.

# DIRECTOR OF GOLF/HEAD COACH TREY JONES



11th Season

Top national finishes, All-Americans, professional success and academic achievement have become synonymous with the Florida State men's golf program under Trey Jones. Now in his 11th season as the head men's coach and Director of Golf for the Seminoles' men's and women's golf programs, Jones has lifted the sport of golf at Florida State to new heights.

Under his direction, there is no limit on how high the Seminole programs will go.

Jones is responsible for attracting nationally ranked recruiting classes, upgrading the Seminoles' schedule to where it is ranked among the nation's toughest on an annual basis and creating one of the most functional player development facilities in all of college golf on one of the Seminoles' five home golf courses. Jones continues annually to build on the Seminoles' success in developing the nation's top talent into national contenders and collegiate golf's elite players. Named the 2008 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year as he led the Seminoles to the first conference championship in the sport of golf in school history, Jones is no stranger to competing with the nation's best in one of the top conferences for college golf.

Building championship teams and elevating those teams onto the national stage is nothing

new to Jones, who has earned four conference coach of the year awards and led 12 of his 17 teams at the Division I level to the NCAA Championship tournament. His teams consistently hold prominent places in the national rankings, are adept at winning conference championships and are annually among the top producers of All-American and all-conference performers.

Jones has become one of the winningest coaches in school history in his first ten years in Florida State. He is the only coach in school history to lead the Seminoles to seven NCAA Tournament appearances (no other coach has led Florida State to more than five appearances) and he is ranked first in school history with 12 tournament championships (second is nine by Don Veller). The Seminoles have appeared in a school record eight consecutive NCAA Tournaments entering the 2013-14 season.

**2013 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP**  
Florida State finished in 11th place at the 2013 NCAA Championship Finals at the Capital City Club Crabapple in Atlanta, Ga. The Seminoles are just one of two teams to finish in the top 11 of the NCAAs in three or the last four years. Sophomore Daniel Berger led the team at the Championships finishing tied for second with a 6-under 204. Both Berger and Chase Seiffert earned All-American status for the year.

**2010 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP**  
Florida State finished in a tie for third place at the 2010 NCAA Championship Finals to earn the best national finish in school history. The Seminoles fell to Augusta State (the 2010 National Champion) in the semifinals of the championship tournament after defeating Texas Tech in the first round of match play. The Seminoles led the stroke play portion of the tournament and finished in second place to earn the No. 2

seed in the match play portion of the event. The third place finish at the NCAA Championship marked the best finish in school history - one better than the Seminoles fourth place national finish in 1957 and tied for fourth place finish in 1958.

**2008 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP**  
Florida State, which was led by All-Americans Jonas Blixt and Matt Savage, won its first ever Atlantic Coast Conference championship as it defeated Duke by three strokes at the 2008 ACC Championship at the Old North State Club at Uwharrie Point. The Seminoles defeated Duke as they rallied from a one stroke deficit after two rounds to claim the school's first ever ACC championship in the sport of golf. Each of the five team members contributed to the victory as the Seminoles closed the 54-hole tournament with four players under par. Blixt and Savage led the way with eight-under par 208 scores as they both finished in a tie for third in the individual standings.

**RECRUITING**  
Known as one of the nation's most dynamic recruiters, Jones is nationally recognized as one of the top talent scouts in all of collegiate golf. His ability to recruit talented players, which in turn helps him build solid teams, is one of the aspects of coaching that has made Jones a top Division I coach. Florida State's recruiting class ranked fourth best in the nation in 2007, fifth best in 2008, sixth best in 2005 and among the nation's top 15 in 2006, 2010 and 2012.

**BROOKS KOEPKA**  
Jones coached Brooks Koepka - the school record holder for lowest stroke average in a single season (71.09) and for a career (71.85) - the ACC Golfer of the Year in 2010 and 2012 and a three-time All-ACC selection. Koepka was named the ACC Golfer of the Year twice, the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2009 and earned All-American twice in his career in leading the Seminoles to four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and two top-10 NCAA Championship Finals finishes. As a senior, Koepka tied the school record with a nine under par score of 63 in the third round of the FAU Spring Break Invitational and set the school record with his 199 total for three rounds of the event. Koepka won three events as a senior - at the Brickyard Collegiate Championship, the Seminole Intercollegiate, the FAU Spring Break Invitational.

**JONAS BLIXT**  
Jones coached one of Florida State's all-time best players - Jonas Blixt - to All-American honors and the first individual ACC Championship in school history. Blixt earned Ping/Division I All-American First Team honors in 2008 and Ping/Division I All-American

second team honors in 2007. He is one of only three players in school history to earn All-American First and Second Team honors during his career. Blixt won the ACC individual championship in 2007 to become the first Seminole to win ACC medalist honors. He helped lead Florida State to the 2008 ACC Championship - the first ACC golf championship in school history - and earned All-ACC honors twice during his career. Blixt is currently playing on the PGA Tour with two wins, the 2012 Frys.com Open and 2013 Greenbrier Classic.

### ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Committed to the academic and athletic success of his student-athletes, Jones has coached 31 members of the ACC Academic Honor Roll, seven members of the ACC Academic Golf Team and two members of the Golf Coaches' Association of America All-American Scholar team. His team was also nationally recognized in 2010 as one of the few schools in the NCAA to achieve a perfect APR score of 1000 since the inception

of the Academic Progress Rate program in 2003. During his tenure at Georgia State, he coached 10 members of the Atlantic Sun All-Academic team and 20 members of the TAAC All-Academic team.

### JONES NATIONALLY

Jones has been an active member of the Golf Coaches Association of America since 1993. He is currently a member of the steering committee for the Collegiate Golf Hall of Fame. Jones served the board as the Division I Director for the East Region and served as the chair of the District 3 South Regional NCAA Selection Committee. He was also a representative in the District 3 South NCAA Selection Committee from 1999-2002.

### PERSONAL

Jones is married to the former Cathy McVeigh, who is the coordinator of financial aid for student-athletes at Florida State. They are the proud parents of a daughter, Jordan (12) and a son, Drew (8). Jones earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education with a minor in business administration from North Alabama in 1991. Jones is a 22-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks. He was the head men's coach and Director of Golf Operations at Georgia State for eight years (1996-2003) before becoming only the fifth coach in the history of the Seminole program in 2004. Prior to his career at Georgia State, Jones was an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College (1992-95) and his alma mater North Alabama (1991). Jones developed his teaching, coaching and recruiting philosophies as he helped hone those programs into national contenders.

## WOMEN'S HEAD COACH AMY BOND



4th Season  
Florida State ('99)

Since being named the head coach at her alma mater in 2010, Amy Bond has gone about building a team that will consistently qualify for the NCAA Championship Tournament, compete for ACC and national championships and produce All-ACC and All-American student-athletes.

In her first three seasons at Florida State, the Seminoles have played in three NCAA Championships, produced the school's first NCAA Regional Champion (Maria Salinas in 2012), earned two All-American citations (Maria Salinas in 2011 and 2013), earned three All-ACC selections (Maria Salinas in 2011 and 2012 and Jessica Negron in 2013) and had nine players earn All-ACC Academic honors.

As the fifth head coach in the history of the program, Bond's commitment to success at Florida State has become a way of life. First as a player, then an assistant coach and now as its head coach, Bond's energy and enthusiasm for elevating and securing the tradition of the program is rivaled by few coaches in all of collegiate golf.

As a player she earned a spot on the ACC's 50th Anniversary team, as an assistant coach she helped the Seminoles to three NCAA Tournament appearances and as the head coach, she has led Florida State to three NCAA Championship appearances in her first three years.

Throughout her career at Florida State, she has played as one of the Seminoles top players (she was named Florida State's team MVP in 1997, 1998 and 1999), played with a number of touring professionals (including two-time LPGA major winner Karen Stupples) and has coached many of Florida State's recent greats including the only four-time golf All-American in school history (Caroline Westrup). While achieving success during her career as a player and a coach, Bond has never lost sight of her ultimate goal: the success and achievements of her student-athletes.

### RETURNING HOME

Amy Bond joined the long and illustrious list of Florida State alumni who have returned to their alma mater when she was named the Seminoles' head coach on June 25, 2010. She returned to her Seminole roots after an outstanding playing career at Florida State (1995-99) and a five-year career as an assistant coach (2001-06) when she helped lead the Seminoles to the NCAA Championships three times. Bond is one of four Florida State alumni who are current head coaches at Florida State joining Frank Bradley (men's and women's swimming and diving), Jennifer Hyde (women's tennis) and Mike Martin (baseball).

### RECRUITING SUCCESS AT FLORIDA STATE

In five years as an assistant coach at Florida State, Bond helped recruit four players who earned All-ACC honors a total of eight times and formed the nucleus of two top 20 ranked teams. The Seminoles finished in a tie for 16th nationally in 2006 and in a tie for 19th nationally in 2004. She was also instrumental in recruiting Caroline Westrup - the only four-time All-American and four time All-ACC selection in school history.

### BOND ON THE NATIONAL SCENE

Bond is the vice-president of the Women's Golf Coaches Association Board of Directors; she was elevated to the position at the 2012 NCAA Championship Finals in Franklin, Tenn. As her first duty as the vice president of the organization, she had the honor of announcing Seminole senior Maria Salinas as an All-American at the NGCA Honors Banquet. Bond has risen steadily through the ranks of the national governing board after serving the organization as its treasurer. Bond began on the NGCA Board as its treasurer (2009-12), is currently its vice president (2012-14) and will serve as its president during a two-year term beginning in 2014. The NGCA was formed in 1983 as an organization to promote participation in women's collegiate golf. The vision of NGCA since its inception has been to encourage the playing of intercollegiate golf for women in correlation with a general objective of education and in accordance with the highest tradition of intercollegiate competition.

### ACADEMIC ACCOLADES

Bond has made it part of her coaching philosophy to demand outstanding academic achievement from every one of her players. She began developing that philosophy as a player at Florida State as she was named an Academic All-American in

1998 and 1999 and earned ACC Academic Honor Roll accolades three times during her playing career (1996, 98, 99). A total of 35 players have been named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll during her Seminole career as a member of the Seminoles' coaching staff, four players (for a total of five awards) have been named to the All-ACC Women's Golf Team in her first three seasons as the Seminoles' head coach. She has also seen nine different players named to the All-America Scholar Team and eight players named to the ACC Academic team during her first three years as the Seminoles' head coach.

### COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAMPIONS

The Seminoles women's golf team won its 12th consecutive Athletic Director's Cup for Service at Florida State's annual Golden Nole Banquet 2013. The Athletic Director's Cup for Service is presented annually and is the most prestigious award given to the Seminole student-athletes. It goes to the team that contributes the most service hours to the community over the course of an entire year. The Seminoles won the Athletic Director's Cup for Service in each of Bond's five years as an assistant coach and in her first three seasons as the Seminoles' head coach.







## ASSISTANT COACH ROBERT DUCK



3rd Season  
Augusta State ('01)

Robert Duck's diverse and successful career in the sport of golf - on the collegiate and professional levels - and his fantastic ability to relate his experiences as a coach and a teacher, are attributes that serve him well as a member of the Florida State golf coaching staff.

In his third season as an assistant coach with both the Seminoles' men's and women's programs, Duck has helped continue Florida State's tradition of NCAA appearances, All-Americans and All-ACC performers during his tenure. He works with both programs at Florida State in the areas of player development, recruiting and daily team and individual coaching responsibilities.

Duck has helped coach both programs into the NCAA Tournament while working with All-Americans and All-ACC honorees on both teams. In his first two seasons at Florida State, the men have produced two All-Americans, five All-ACC selections, one ACC Golfer of the Year and one ACC Freshman of the Year while the women have produced one All-American and two All-ACC performers.

Duck has helped coach the Florida State men to five tournament championships in his first two seasons. The Seminoles earned tournament championships at the 2012 Seminole Intercollegiate, the 2012 FAU Spring Break

Invitational, the 2013 Gator Invitational, the 2013 Seminole Intercollegiate and the 2013 Gary Koch Intercollegiate. He has helped the Seminole women advance to the 2012 NCAA Central Regional and 2013 NCAA West Regional Championships.

The Seminoles - both the men and the women - were ranked among the nation's top 25 teams throughout his first season at Florida State. The men were ranked as high as No. 13 while the women were ranked as high as No. 22 nationally in 2012. The men finished the 2013 season ranked No. 12 nationally.

### COACHING EXPERIENCE

Duck, one of the rising stars in collegiate coaching, is in his third season as an assistant coach at Florida State. He was the acting head coach at Augusta State in 2002, served the Jaguars as a volunteer assistant coach during the 2001-02 season and was an assistant coach for the program during the 2002-03 season. During his tenure as the acting coach at Augusta State, the Jaguars were ranked as high as No. 9 nationally.

### COLLEGIATE PLAYING EXPERIENCE

Duck enjoyed a standout career at Augusta State (1998-01) where he earned All-America honors as a sophomore (1999) and led the Jaguars to three NCAA Championship appearances (1998, 1999, 2001). He is one of the top golfers in the storied history of the Augusta State program and remains listed prominently in the record book nearly 15 years after his playing career ended. Duck is ranked second in school history for lowest stroke average by a freshman (73.22) (which stood as the school record for nearly 15 years). It is an average that still ranks in the top 15 in school history. His career stroke average of 73.86 is

ranked 14th in school history. During his career he earned 12 top 10 and 28 top 20 individual finishes.

### COLLEGIATE COACHING EXPERIENCE

Duck's ability to communicate with the players he coaches is illustrated by the successes those players have earned on the golf course. In only two years at Florida State he has worked with three All-Americans, five All-ACC honorees, one ACC Golfer of the Year and one ACC Freshman of the Year. Each of the four teams (two men's and two women's) he has helped coach at Florida State has played in the NCAA Tournament and both teams have been ranked in the nation's top 25 during the first two years of his tenure in Tallahassee.

### NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY AS A PLAYER

Duck led Augusta State to three NCAA Championship tournament appearances and helped the Jaguars to a seventh place finish as a senior. The seventh place finish was the best in program history at the time. With the foundation put in place by Duck and his teammates, the Jaguars won the NCAA Titles in 2010 and 2011.

### SUCCESS IN PROFESSIONAL WORLD

Duck enjoyed a successful career as a manager of professional golfers for the Hambric Sports Group (2003-2012) before accepting his current assistant coaching position at Florida State. Based in London, Duck was the supervisor of the European Division of Hambric Stellar Golf. He was a player manager who oversaw public relations and marketing for seven clients including 1988 Masters champion Sandy Lyle, 2005 European Tour Rookie of the Year Gonzalo Fernandez-Castano, former Augusta State All-American Oliver Wilson and Francesco Molinari.

### PERSONAL

Duck is married to the former Michelle Digsby. The couple have two daughters, Annabel (6) and Hannah (3). He earned his bachelor's degree in marketing from Augusta State in 2001. A native of Northampton, England, he represented Great Britain-Ireland as a member of the 1998 Palmer Cup team. Duck played in the 1997 European Amateur Championship and finished tied as the runner-up with Sergio Garcia and Luke Donald.



## ASSISTANT COACH MATT SAVAGE



2nd Season  
Florida State ('09)

Matt Savage, who helped coach both the Seminole men's and women's golf teams into the NCAA Championship Tournaments in 2013, is in his second season as an assistant coach with both programs at Florida State. Savage plays an integral role in the continued success of the Seminoles as he works with each of the players on a daily basis while assisting with the day-to-day administrative responsibilities of each team. Savage works with both programs in the areas of skill development, recruiting, practice planning and match coaching.

In 2013, Savage helped the Seminole men to their third appearance in the NCAA Championship Finals in the last four seasons where they finished in a tie for 11th place in the team standings. The Seminoles finished in third place in the NCAA Tallahassee Regional and in second place in the ACC Championship after winning tournament championships during the regular season.

Savage is considered to be one of the top golfers in Seminole history. He earned All-America honors in 2007, was the first player in school history to earn All-ACC honors three times, played on one NCAA Championship final and four NCAA Regional Championship teams and led the Seminoles to the first ACC Championship in school history in 2008. Savage closed his career in 2009 with a 73.09 scoring average in 44 career tournaments - the

fifth best average in school history.

### INDIVIDUAL RECOGNITION

Savage helped coach two All-Americans - Daniel Berger and Chase Seiffert - the ACC Freshman of the Year and four All-ACC selections - three men and one women - in his first season as an assistant coach at Florida State. Daniel Berger earned PING and Golf-Week All-American First Team Honors while Seiffert earned All-American Honorable Mention honors by GolfWeek. Berger, Seiffert and freshman Hank Lebioda all earned All-ACC Honors with Lebioda earning ACC Freshman of the Year honors. Jessica Negron earned All-ACC and All-West Region honors.

### NATIONAL SUCCESS

Savage earned medalist honors at the 2008 North and South Amateur Championship at Pinehurst, advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2006 U.S. Amateur Public Link Championship and played in the 2006 U.S. Amateur Championship.

### 2008 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

Savage led Florida State to its first ever Atlantic Coast Conference Championship on April 20, 2008 as the Seminoles defeated Duke by three strokes at the 55th Annual ACC Championship at the Old North State Club at Uwharrie Point. The Seminoles defeated the Blue Devils by four strokes in the third round as they rallied from a one stroke deficit after two rounds to claim the school's first ever ACC championship in the sport of golf. Each of the five team members contributed to the victory as the Seminoles closed the 54-hole tourna-

ment with four players under par and only one at over par. Savage led the way with an eight-under par 208 score and finished in a tie for third place in the individual standings.

### ALL-AMERICAN HONORS

Savage earned regional All-American honors in both 2008 and 2009 and earned All-American Honorable Mention honors from the Golf Coaches' Association of America in 2007. He was named to the PING / All-Southeast Regional All-American team in 2008 as he led the Seminoles to the ACC Championship and was named to the Ping / Southeast Regional All-American team in 2009 as he led Florida State to an appearance in the 2009 East Regional Championships. Savage earned Ping / Division I All-America Honorable Mention Honors as a sophomore after finishing in ninth place in the individual standings at the NCAA Championship Finals and earning 11 top 25 finishes in 12 events in 2007.

### PREP STAR

Savage won the individual state championship, led his team to the state title, was named Mr. Golf in the State of Kentucky and earned National Player of the Year honors by the National High School Golf Coaches Association as a senior at St. Xavier Prep in Louisville in 2005. Savage earned All-America honors from the AJGA as both a junior and a senior, was a four-time All-State First Team honoree and played in the US Publincs Championship in 2005.

### ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Savage was an academic standout during his collegiate career at Florida State as he was named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll in 2006, 2007 and 2009 and earned his degree in communication studies in 2009. He is one of only three players to earn All-Academic honors at least three times under Seminole men's coach Trey Jones.







## SUPPORT STAFF

### OPERATION MANAGER CHAD SMITH

Chad Smith, who has played an integral role in helping the Seminole men's and women's golf teams both advance to their respective NCAA Tournaments in each of the last two seasons, is in his third season as the Golf Operations Manager at Florida State.

Smith works directly with Director of Golf and Head Men's Golf Coach Trey Jones and Head Women's Coach Amy Bond and each of the golf student-athletes on the day-to-day management of the teams.

Smith was the manager of player services at the American Junior Golf Association prior to his appointment at Florida State. His primary role was mentoring junior golfers in their quest to earn college scholarships. In his position with the AJGA he handled all contact and benefits programs for more than 5,000 member golfers. As an undergraduate student at Florida State, he was an intern in both the Seminole Athletics Marketing office and the FSU Licensing Office in Seminole Boosters.

As a member of the golf staff, Smith's responsibilities include managing the business affairs for both teams, arranging all aspects of team travel and overseeing the improvement and maintenance of Florida State's nationally renowned facilities at the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course. He also serves as the Co-Tournament Director for the annual Seminole Intercollegiate Golf Tournament and will play an integral role in the tournament operations when Florida State plays host to the 2014 NCAA Tallahassee (East) Regional women's golf championship at Southwood Golf Course. Smith is also a co-director for the Seminole women's tournament in February and helped run the 2013 NCAA Tallahassee Regional men's golf championship.

Smith, who graduated from Florida State with a bachelor's degree in sport management in 2005, returned to his alma mater in 2011.

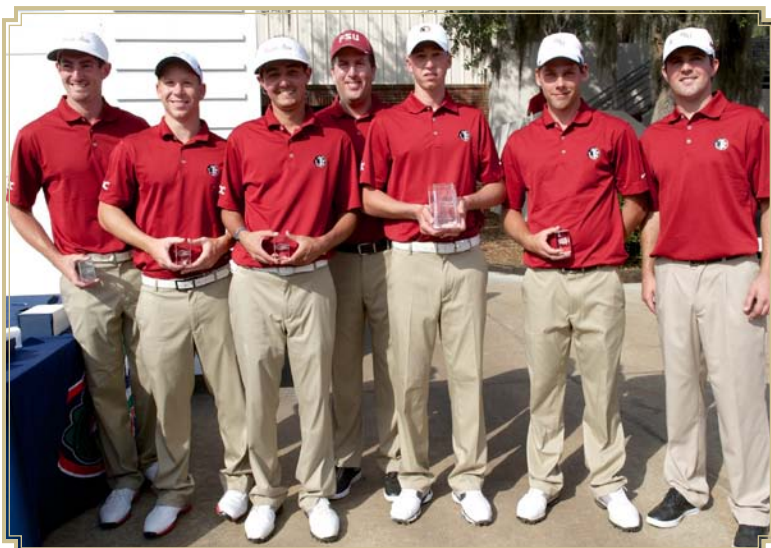

## 2013 SEASON IN REVIEW



### THREE TIMES A WINNER

For the first time since 2008, the Florida State men's golf team won three tournaments in a season. The first win came at the Gator Invitational, the first win there since 1981. The team won by 15 strokes at on the campus of the University of Florida. Daniel Berger won his first collegiate Individual Medalist honor as he won by three strokes. Senior Doug Letson posted his highest collegiate finish tied for third after a career low round of 66 in the second round.

Hosting the Seminole Intercollegiate, Florida State knew they had a strong team which was evident by the final results. Not only did the team win defeat second place Mississippi State by seven strokes, six Seminoles finished in the top 15. Berger won his second Individual title of the year while senior Chase Seiffert finished one stroke behind him in second. Freshmen Rowin Caron and Hank Lebioda finished fifth and 11th, respectively, while junior

Joaquin Lolas best his lowest tournament score by four strokes with a 210 to finish tied for seventh. Letson closed out the top 15 with a 1-under 215.

Florida State won the Gary Koch Invitational by an impressive seven strokes as all six Seminoles finished in the

top 12. Freshman Rowin Caron had his first collegiate individual title as he tied for first place with a 9-under 207. Berger was only four strokes behind him as he finished in fourth. Seiffert and Lebioda tied for 10th while Letson finished tied for 12th. Playing as an individual, Lolas finished tied for 12th as well.

### ALL-AMERICAN POWER

Sophomore Daniel Berger and senior Chase Seiffert racked up honors after stellar seasons for both of them. After finishing second at NCAAs, Berger was first team All-American by Golfweek and the Golf Coaches Association of American. Seiffert finished the season ranked No. 32 in the nation to earn honorable mention by Golfweek. The last first team All-American for the Seminoles was back in 2008 by Jonas Blixt. The last time two golfers were named All-Americans was in 2010 by the GCAA when Brooks Koepka earned first team honors and Drew Kittleson earned honorable mention.

### FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR

As selected by the 11 ACC head coaches, Hank Lebioda was named as the ACC Freshman of the Year. The Seminoles led the conference by having three players selected the All-ACC squad. Lebioda led all ACC freshmen, and ranked ninth overall in the conference, in stroke average. He became the second Seminole to earn the honor. Joining Lebioda was sophomore Daniel Berger, the runner-up for ACC Player of the Year, and senior Chase Seiffert.

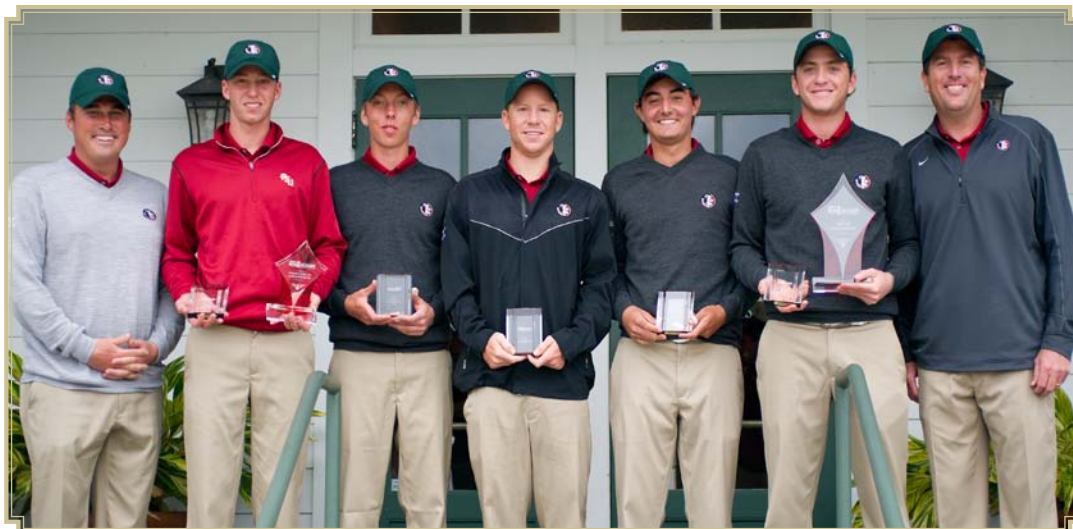
### POSTSEASON PLAY

At the NCAA Championships, sophomore Daniel Berger finished in second place to mark the best finish by a Seminole since Nolan Henke in 1997. After a 2-under 68 on the final day of competition, he finished the tournament with a 6-under 204. The team finished one stroke away from a playoff for match play, but was unable to capitalize on their great play and finished tied for 11th. Florida State advanced to the Championships after finished third place at the Tallahassee Regional hosted by the Seminoles.

Florida State had the lead at the ACC Championships after the first and second rounds, but swirling wind and a downpour of rain was too much for the team to hold onto the lead. After going 7-over on the last two holes, the team lost the lead and finished tied for second. Senior Chase Seiffert finished tied for second place for the third time that season. He finished the tournament with a 10-under 206.

### PALMER CUP TEAM

Sophomore Daniel Berger was named to the Palmer Cup team in April to compete against other collegiate golfers at the Wilmington Country Club in Wilmington, Delaware. The format pitches American college golfers against European college golfers, much like the annual Ryder Cup. With Berger's help, the United States won 20.5-9.5.
