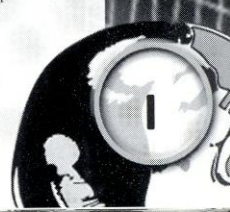
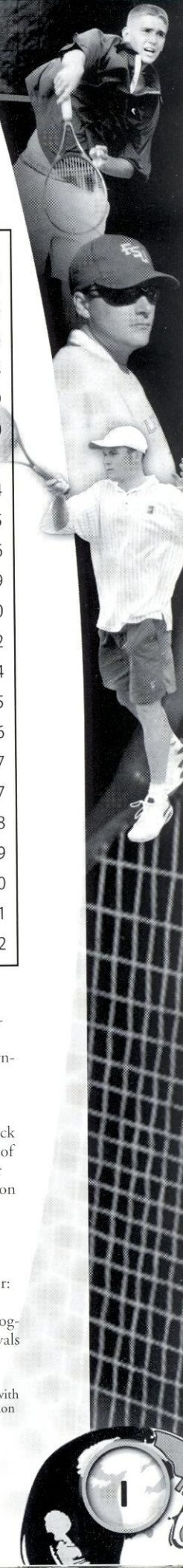

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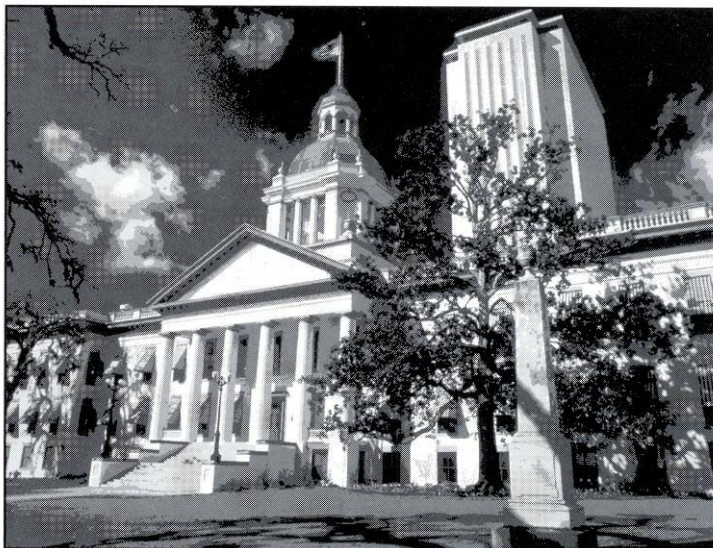
# THIS IS TALLAHASSEE

Near, but far from the glaring strips neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as “The Other Florida” with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida’s capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neo-metropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two- or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.

Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world’s deepest freshwater springs, site of America’s first Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee’s spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee



breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee’s perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candy-striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran’s Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida’s oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for free — unheard of even 100 years ago.



rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida’s panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Accentuating Tallahassee’s Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five “official” canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons



Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion, which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson; and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals.

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons.

Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and anhinga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest freshwater springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."



Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including boating and fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones," and dense forests offer an

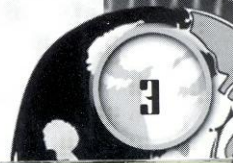
abundance of prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such as the Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally-ranked Florida State Seminoles, Florida A&M Rattlers and the Tallahassee Tiger Sharks, of the East Coast Hockey League. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options"—from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely-acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.





# THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University, which celebrated its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution in 1997, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 50 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:

In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.

In 1994, the college referral service, "Who's Who Among American High School Students," placed FSU among its top 10 — with such universities as Harvard, Duke, Stanford, North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Michigan-Ann Arbor and Yale — of most frequent choices of more than 100,000 of the nation's best and brightest high school students who asked that a specific college be notified of their recognition in "Who's Who."

Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab in 1990 at FSU, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty. The world's largest magnet — two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field — was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in the off-campus research complex, Innovation Park. In 1996, the NSF renewed and increased by 50 percent the NHMFL's funding for another five years.

FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The Card Application Technology Center is a national leader in "smart card" systems.

At the forefront of supercomputing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast and parallel computing in 1990 when it acquired two supercomputers, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Machine and the Cray Y-MP.

In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$100 million University Center, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium; the stadium's south end zone also was enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. With the completion of the west side in 1996, University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.

In 1990, Florida State ranked second in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students.

FSU's high-tech program in structural biology in 1991 received the University's largest single foundation grant, \$4 million.

Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "Seminoles," joined the Atlantic Coast Conference as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the 1993 National Championship and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the University's first Heisman Trophy.

The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with a pool, saunas, basketball and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991.

FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of black Ph.D. students it graduates. Over the five years, 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African Americans.

As this list of highlights attests, Florida State





is excelling in the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the University's 12th president, Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is \$474.3 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$102 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, Seminole Boosters and FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 451.6 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,281 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the University maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State offers 286 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin

Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

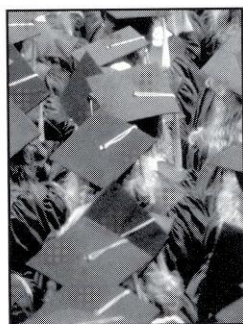
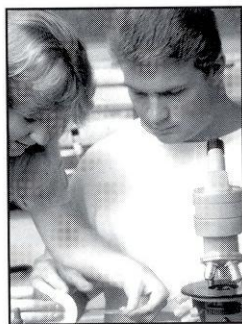
With 1,655 members, the FSU faculty has included nine National Academy of Sciences elected members, nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,887 administrative/professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.1 million book titles, 16,384 serials and 4.5 million micro-forms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,929, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its 30,264 students and their needs and interests (of the student population: 45 percent are male; 55 percent are female; 20.1 percent are minorities; and 2.5 percent are foreign students). The University Honors Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student Center, Student Government, Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate.

In all areas of its mission — excellence in teaching, research and public service — Florida State University is advancing boldly toward the 21st century.





New men's head tennis coach Dwayne Hultquist brings a winning tradition and optimistic outlook to the Florida State men's tennis team. The past eight years, Hultquist served as the assistant coach to the all-time wins leader among active coaches, Dave Snyder, at the University of Texas. Hultquist, a Penn State graduate, helped lead the Longhorns to six Big 12 Conference Championships and seven consecutive NCAA appearances. Hultquist takes over a Florida State men's tennis program that has had 13 consecutive winning seasons.

"My family and I are very excited about joining the Tallahassee community and becoming Seminoles," said Hultquist. "The program has great potential and is backed by an outstanding administration that is committed to excellence."

Hultquist played collegiately at Penn State where as a senior team captain he led the Nittany Lions to the NCAA tournament. On September 24th, Hultquist added former four-time All-American John Roddick to his coaching staff. Roddick will serve as assistant coach after coming from Boster Tennis Management in Boca Raton, Fla., where he coached world ranked juniors.

Team leader, senior Mike Ingham, who could move into FSU's all-time top 10 in wins this year, enters his senior season with 67 career wins. Ingham and junior Chad Mooney, who led the Noles in wins in 1998-99 with 19, will be looked upon to instill the tradition of Florida State tennis to a young Seminole team. The young Noles will welcome the return of one of its former members in 1999, junior Jay Travis returns after a one-year hiatus. Travis, whose sister Christy plays on the women's team, played doubles with Mooney and Ingham as a freshman.

Back for their second year at FSU, are sophomores Noah Schnell and Jeff Scarella. After suffering a preseason broken finger, Schnell came on strong to become a solid starter for FSU, finishing the year as one of six team members with double-digit wins, and the only freshmen to accomplish that feat since Ingham did it in 1996-97. Scarella gained valuable experience in doubles while playing alongside FSU's No. 1 singles player last year Davidson Kozlowski. Scarella and Kozlowski finished the year as FSU's No. 1 doubles team.

Coach Hultquist brings three newcomers along with him to the tennis program this year. Freshman Deni Franulovic was a top-ranked junior before coming to FSU from the Bollettieri Tennis Academy. Joe Bassett and Rodrigo Laub join the Seminole men's tennis program after distinguished careers in high school. Bassett comes to Tallahassee from Monticello, Fla., and Laub hails from Atlanta, Ga. This bunch is the first class of the Hultquist era and with Hultquist's dedication to recruiting, it should be the building block for future great Seminole recruiting classes.

"I want to recruit the best players in the state and nationally to take this program to the next level," said Hultquist.

The 1999-2000 edition of the Florida State men's tennis team looks to build on the early success of last

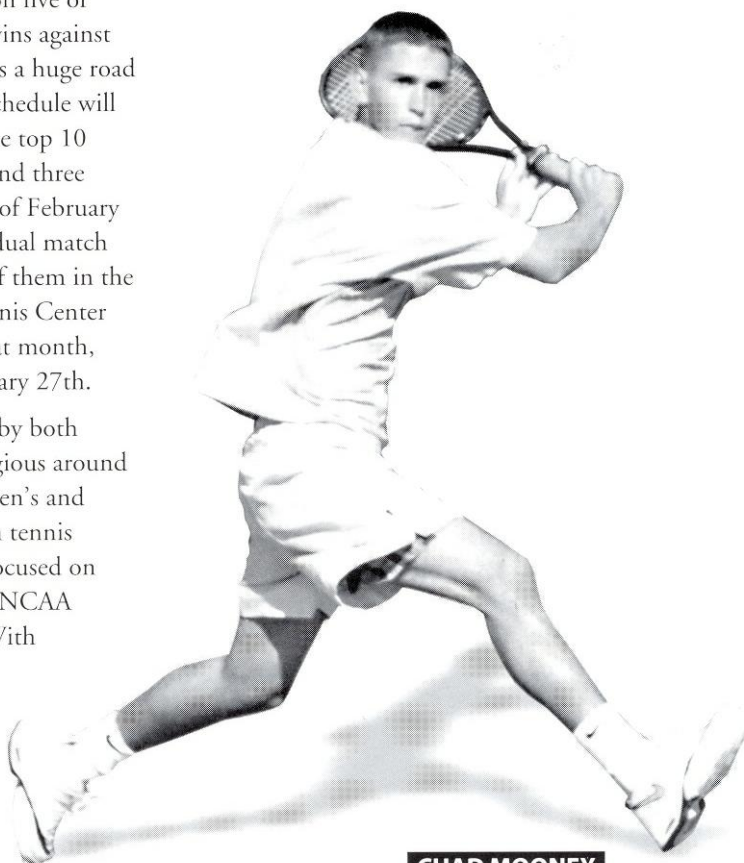

year's team. In 1998-99, the Seminoles won five of their first six matches and had impressive wins against Virginia and Southern Mississippi as well as a huge road win at North Carolina State. This year's schedule will consist of two teams that were ranked in the top 10 at the end of last year, Duke and Florida, and three more that were in the top 30. The month of February will set the stage for Florida State's spring dual match season, when they play eight matches, all of them in the friendly confines of the Scott Speicher Tennis Center here in Tallahassee. The final match of that month, the Seminoles will host rival Miami, February 27th.

The optimism brought to the program by both Hultquist and Roddick is becoming contagious around the tennis center. Earlier this fall, as the men's and women's tennis teams hosted a junior team tennis league, the subject of most conversations focused on not when the Noles would get back to the NCAA tournament but how far would they go. With two sophomores, three freshmen and one player who returns from a year away from the team, coach Hultquist will have plenty of time to instill a winning attitude and philosophy that can be carried on for years to come.

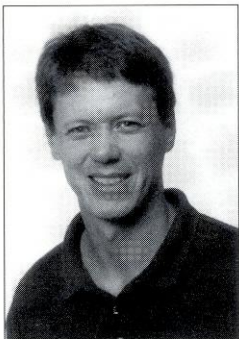

## DWAYNE HULTQUIST

Penn State, 1986



With a great love for the sport of tennis, Dwayne Hultquist has always wanted to be able to accomplish two things. He has always wanted to become a head coach of a collegiate tennis team, and he always wanted to be an integral part of a successful Division I athletics program. On July 20, 1999, Florida State Athletics Director Dave Hart announced

Hultquist's hiring as the Seminole head men's tennis coach, culminating a decade long journey to fulfill his dreams. Hultquist's immediate goal for FSU is to strengthen its schedule to provide for upward movement in the rankings. He is a firm believer in playing tougher competition in order to improve and he is making a concerted effort to add as many top ranked teams to the schedule as possible. As the new head coach of the FSU men's tennis team, Hultquist arrives with high hopes for the future of the Seminole tennis program.

"We are excited to have Dwayne aboard to lead our men's tennis program," said Hart.

Hultquist comes to Florida State after serving eight seasons as the assistant coach at the University of Texas. There, while working under legendary coach Dave Snyder, he became known for his excellent recruiting abilities. He was also responsible for scheduling, fund-raising, individualized coaching and many of the day-to-day operations of the team. While at Texas, Hultquist helped lead the Longhorns to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16, each of the eight years he was there.

"This is a great situation to be in here at Florida State," said Hultquist. "We have some skilled players who just need some more experience and if we can add a few more talented players in the next few years, we can begin to take the step to the next level."

Hultquist began his tennis career at Penn State where he was a four-year letterman, and team captain in 1986. During that same year, he was an NCAA Tournament qualifier in doubles, and earned all-conference honors in both singles and doubles. After graduating from

Penn State, Hultquist turned pro, playing in the United States, Israel, and Asia. During his career, Hultquist was selected to play on national teams that travelled to Korea and China for competition. He also went on a goodwill tour for the U.S. in Okinawa, Japan. There he participated in exhibition matches and helped direct clinics for the U.S. Military.

Hultquist's coaching career began after his playing days were over when he accepted a job with the USTA in 1988. All of his playing experiences helped prepare him to become the USTA's Boy's National Team Coach. There he was able to travel overseas for international tournaments, as well as tournaments such as the Orange Bowl, Easter Bowl, and the Reebok Cup. Hultquist also received the opportunity to coach at the Nick Bollettieri Tennis Academy. It was at the Bollettieri Academy that he coached world class players like Lihini Weerasuriya, who went on to win a USTA National Championship and another talented junior who went on to win the doubles championship at the 1989 Orange Bowl. During his year at the academy, Hultquist was promoted to the women's traveling coach.

In 1991, Hultquist began his collegiate coaching career when he became a graduate assistant at the University of Kentucky. While working there for a

little over a year he was responsible for individualized coaching, recruiting and co-directing the National Collegiate Indoor Team Championships. When the position at Texas opened up Hultquist jumped in and he hasn't looked back. Hultquist married the former Angela White.

The couple has a two-year old daughter, Devan.

**University of Georgia, 1998**



John Roddick became the newest member of the Florida State University coaching staff when he took the job as assistant men's tennis coach on September 24, 1999. Roddick will attempt to help new head coach Dwayne Hultquist take the Seminole men's tennis program to the next level. In his first year as an assistant coach at

the college level, Roddick will serve many duties both on and off the court. Initially, Roddick's focus will be on recruiting and helping Hultquist gel together a young, inexperienced team.

"John not only brings outstanding knowledge of the game but he maintains a great rapport with players," said Hultquist. "The entire team is excited to have an assistant with such an extensive player and coaching background."

Roddick was a four-time All-American at the University of Georgia, where he won the National Clay Court Championship as a junior and reached the semifinals of the NCAA Singles Championships as a senior. In his four years at Georgia, Roddick won over 200 matches, compiling a 117-44 record as a singles player and a 95-32 record as a doubles player.

His senior year he was honored as the University of Georgia's Most Outstanding Athlete, an award that came with some tough competition. One of the nominees for the award was former Bulldog football All-American Champ Bailey, who currently plays in

the NFL for the Washington Redskins. Off the court, Roddick was named an SEC scholar athlete as a sophomore, junior and senior, while earning a bachelor's degree in history.

After graduating from Georgia, Roddick coached world ranked juniors at Boster Tennis Management in Boca Raton, Fla. Roddick coached Mandy Fish and David Martin to top 10 and top 20 rankings in the ITF Junior World Rankings. He also led players through such tournaments as the Australian Open and Wimbledon. While at the academy, his other responsibilities included recruiting players, coordinating travel schedules and developing fitness plans. After spending a year in Boca Raton, Roddick decided to re-enter the college tennis world at Florida State University. As a coach he will bring all of his playing experiences and insight to a young team that is looking to take shape and a program that is looking to grow for years to come.

"I am excited to join coach Hultquist and have the opportunity to coach at the college level," said Roddick.

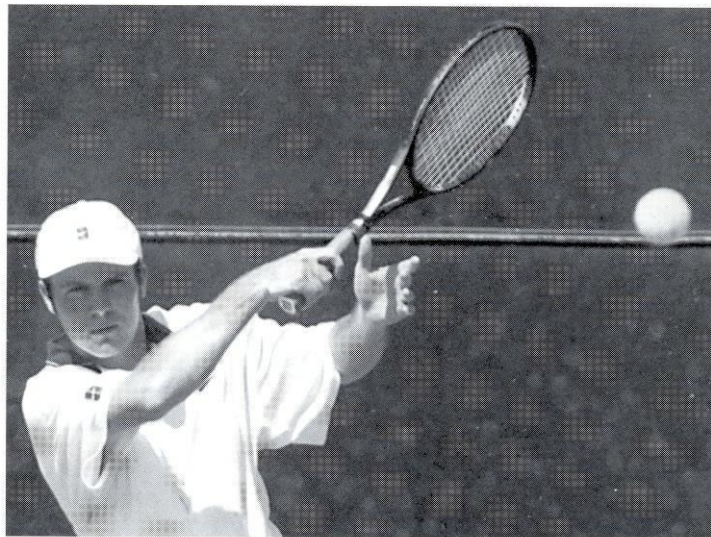

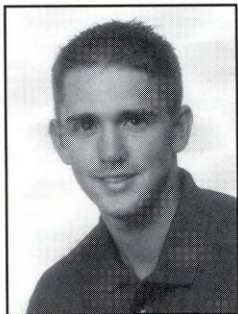

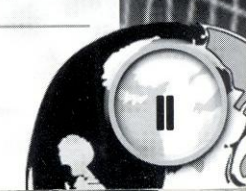

Despite numerous individual accomplishments, the veteran Florida State men's tennis team had a season full of ups and downs in 1998-99. Perhaps the most notable of accomplishments was that of former head coach David Barron, who became FSU's all-time winningest tennis coach on January 29 in a 6-1 victory over Jacksonville. Barron finished his FSU coaching career with a record of 141-84. The Seminoles finished the season 13-10 for its 13th consecutive winning season, but failed to make the NCAA Tournament for the first time in six years.

Four seniors also departed after completing their FSU careers in the spring, Davidson Kozlowski (31 wins in two years at FSU), Ty Braswell (19 wins tied for the team lead in 1999), Yvo Niks (three 20-win seasons and one 19-win season) and Steve Weinstein (won a career high 17 matches as a junior before suffering an injury as a senior that limited his play).

The foursome compiled a 61-43 record and made three trips to the NCAA tournament in their four years at FSU.

Their highest ACC finish was second in 1996 and their highest final national ranking was 34th in 1997.

Florida State opened the 1999 dual match season winning five of its first six matches, behind the excellent play of sophomore Chad Mooney, who opened the season with six straight victories. At the end of January, Kozlowski represented Florida State at the ACC Men's Indoor Championships. At the Championships, Kozlowski defeated the second-ranked player in the country and advanced to the semifinals. It was a sign of good things to come for FSU despite preseason injuries to Weinstein and freshman Noah Schnell. FSU played six of its first nine matches at home, winning all six at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center by an average margin of four points.

With the team 7-2, the Seminoles went on their longest road trip of the season, a four-match trip that took them to Gainesville, Fla., and up to Durham, N.C. After dropping two tough matches to Florida and Wake Forest, the team rebounded with its first of two shutouts

on the season with a 7-0 win against Maryland. The next day the team faced top-ranked Duke in Durham. The Seminoles battled hard but could only manage one point in Kozlowski's come from behind victory over Andres Pedroso 0-6, 6-1, 6-3. Upon returning home, FSU split with ACC foes Virginia and Clemson. In a heated match with Virginia, freshman Jeff Scarella and Niks each were victorious in three sets. Scarella defeated UVA senior Kent Koch in perhaps the biggest win of the year to set up Mooney's match clinching 6-3, 7-5 victory over UVA's Tommy Croker.

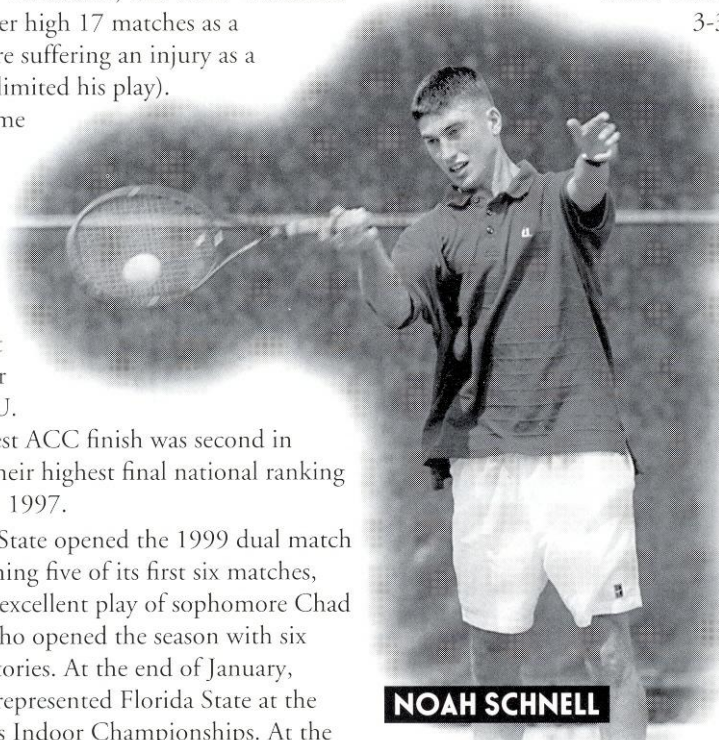
At the end of March, the team took to the road again, this time to Raleigh, N.C. In Raleigh, the Seminoles earned perhaps their biggest road win of the year, a 5-2 stomping of 24th-ranked North Carolina State. The win improved the Noles record to

3-3 in the ACC. The next day against North Carolina an injury forced Weinstein out of the lineup. Weinstein had come on to give the Noles a lift winning two straight matches handily, 6-1, 6-1. UNC pulled out the match 4-3, giving the Seminoles their third 4-3 loss of the year. Of the Noles 10 losses in '99, four were to ranked teams and three were by one point.

Individually, the Seminoles had five players win over 15 matches. Niks, Mooney and Braswell tied for the team lead in wins with 19. Mooney led the Noles in dual match wins with 16 wins. Braswell led the Seminoles in the ITA rankings, cracking the top 100 twice in singles during the spring. Braswell also teamed with Kozlowski to form FSU's No. 1 doubles team for

much of the season. The duo won 17 of 27 matches together. Niks teamed with junior Mike Ingham to form the spring's winningest doubles tandem. The pair won 14 of 20 dual matches together.

The team finished off the year at the ACC Tournament dropping their first round match to third-seeded Georgia Tech. FSU took the doubles point to start the match but could only take one singles match, Schnell's victory at No. 6, and lost 4-2. FSU earned the doubles point with wins from Ingham and Niks at No. 2 and Braswell and Mooney at No. 3.

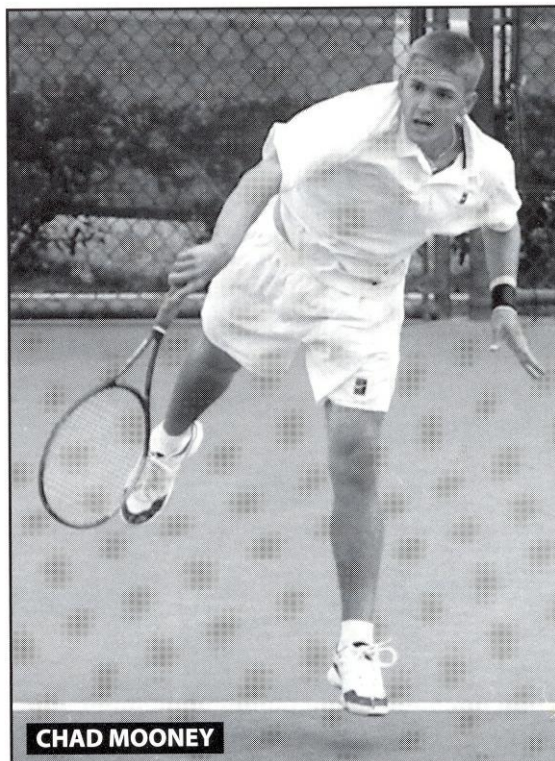

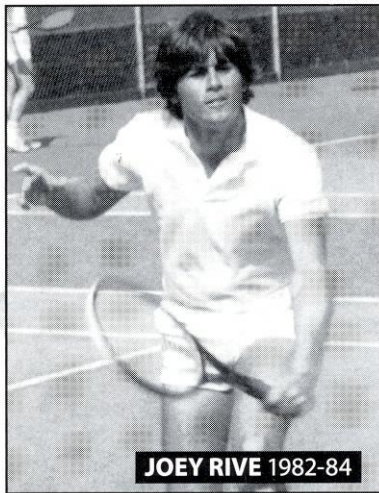
