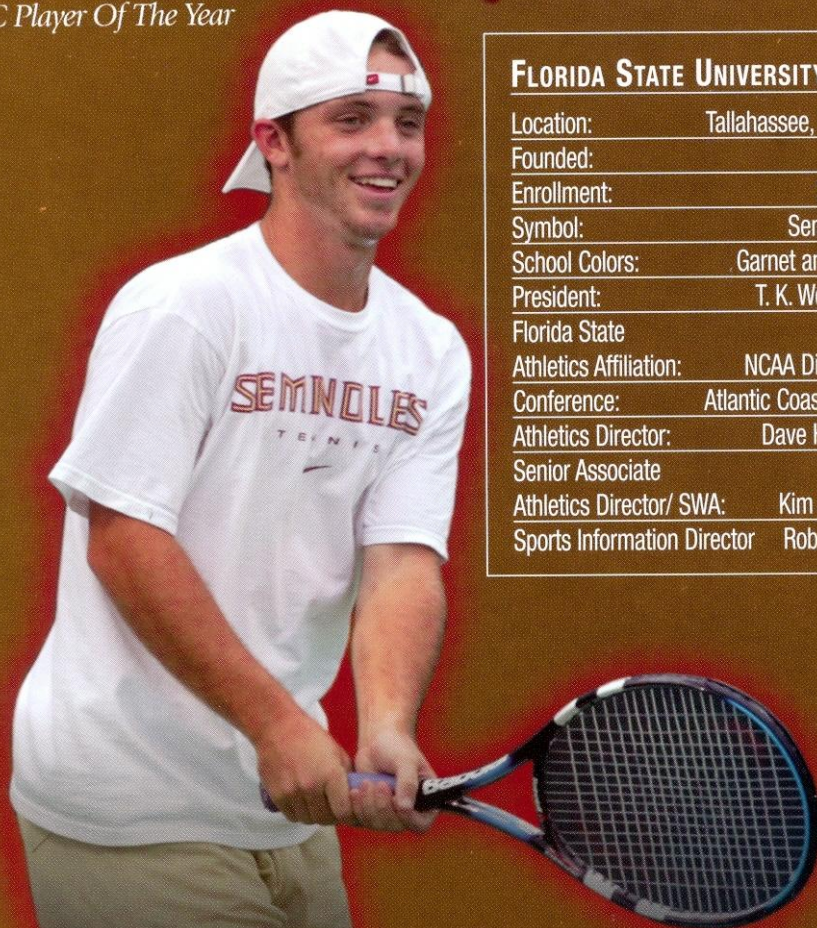

2003-04 SEASON PREVIEW

SEMINOLES LOOK TO RETURN TO NCAA TOURNAMENT

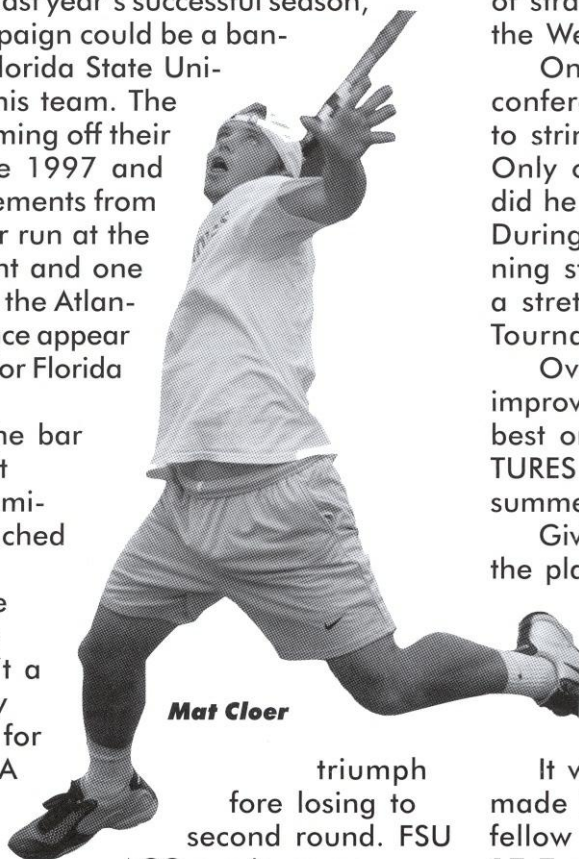
Building from last year's successful season, the 2003-04 campaign could be a banner one for the Florida State University men's tennis team. The Seminoles are coming off their best season since 1997 and bring back key elements from 2002-03. Another run at the NCAA Tournament and one of the top spots in the Atlantic Coast Conference appear to be in the cards for Florida State.

Last season the bar was set a little bit higher for the Seminoles as they reached their first NCAA Tournament since 1998. FSU made sure that it wasn't a one-trick pony by defeating Miami for its first NCAA since 1996, before Florida in the had its best seasons and ended the year tied for second.

Back for this season is a strong mix of upperclassmen along with some talented young players. Florida State brings back six letterwinners, four of which are juniors or seniors, from last season while adding three freshmen. Heading up that bunch is a trio of players who won 18 or more singles matches.

Pacing the Seminoles for the second-straight year will be junior Mat Cloer. The 2003 ACC Player of the Year, Cloer's 29-12 record last season ranks as the fourth-best in school history. He capped off his sophomore campaign with a trip to the NCAA Tournament. Cloer ended the year ranked 38th in the nation by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association.

After missing most of the fall with an ankle injury, Cloer started the spring with a bang as he teamed up with departed senior Rodrigo Laub to take the double title at the ACC Indoor Championships. On the singles side, he won 11 of his first 13 matches, including an upset of 13th-ranked Hamid Mirzadeh of Florida. During league competition he posted a 7-1 record, including a pair

of straight-set victories to earn him ACC Player of the Week on March 10.

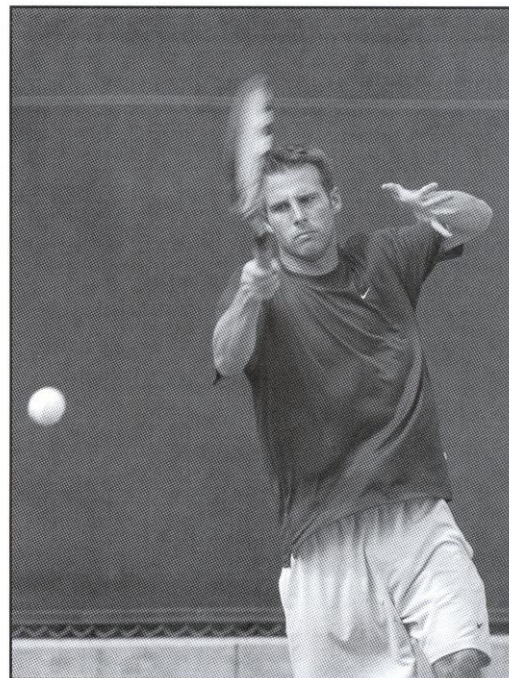
One of the biggest momentum players in the conference, if not the country, Cloer knows how to string victories together with the best of them. Only once during the entire 2002-03 campaign did he not produce at least back-to-back triumphs. During the course of the year he had eight winning streaks of three or more matches, including a stretch of eight of his nine prior to the NCAA Tournament.

Over the summer, the Brevard, N.C., native improved his game by taking on some of the world's best on the United State Tennis Association's FUTURES Tour. Cloer made his best showing of the summer at the Ursula Beck Pro Tennis Classic.

Giving the Seminoles a big boost last year was the play of freshman Jeff Groslimond. Playing primarily at No. 5 singles, the rookie posted a 19-8 record, which ranks second among returners. Against ACC competition he posted a solid 5-2 mark with a dual match ledger of 13-4.

It was in the doubles bouts where Groslimond made his biggest contribution. Teaming up with fellow rookie Chris Westerhof, the duo posted a 17-7 record overall, including a near-perfect 7-1 ledger against the league. The Groslimond-Westerhof combination gave Florida State a very strong No. 3

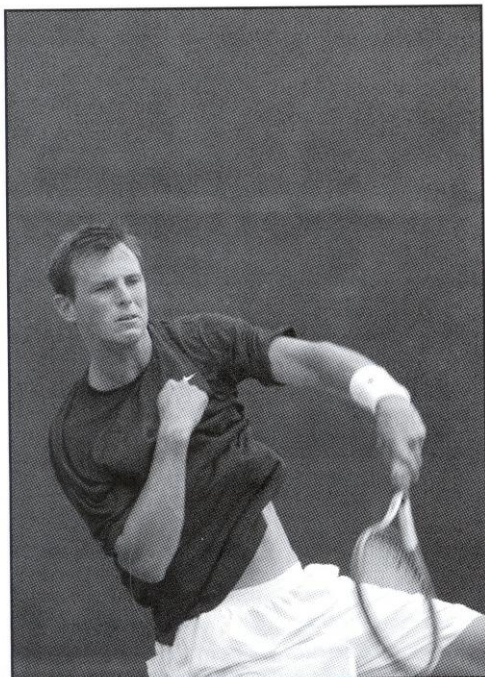

No. 4, the Chattanooga, Tenn., native produced a career-high 18-16 record. Webb will try to harness the success that he carried from the end of the fall season into last spring. He won his first four matches at the Omni Region II Championships then captured his initial three

bouts at the ACC Indoors.

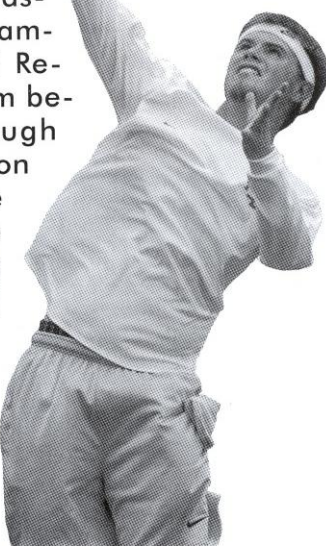
For the spring portion of the schedule, the Seminoles got a boost with the addition of Westerhof. While his play in singles competition didn't match his doubles' success, he may have found a home in the number four slot where he posted a 4-4 mark. During the middle of the schedule, Westerhof put together a nice run of what could be more to come as he won five of seven matches, including a pair of ACC bouts.

Two players have a chance to get the Seminoles a shot in the arm after missing last season. Senior Joe Bassett came back from a knee injury in 2002-03, but only played one match as the

injury kept him out the remainder of the year. Injuries also plagued senior Jarrod Owen who did not get onto the court for a single match last year.

In addition to the seven Florida State will add fresh-Abougzir, Joao Paolo and Jonathas Sucupira to season. Abougzir was as number two in the world and Sucupira alternated as junior national champion and 2002.

During the fall, FSU got back into the swing of things with the Seminole Fall Classic, ITA All-American Championships and the Omni Region II Tournament. A firm believer of scheduling tough non-conference competition to prepare for the league slate, Hultquist has once again loaded the spring schedule with challenging opponents. Apart from conference competition, which includes five NCAA teams, the Seminoles spring schedule features seven schools that went to the NCAA tournament, topped off by defending national champion University of Illinois on March 20.

DWAYNE HULTQUIST

HEAD COACH (FIFTH YEAR) • PENN STATE '86



Finally having a full roster comprised of his own players, fifth-year head coach Dwayne Hultquist made huge strides last season with the Florida State University mens' tennis team.

The Seminoles ended the 2002-03 season in the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1998 and won their first match in the national summit in seven years. The final No. 32 ranking was the school's highest since 1995.

Florida State produced a 15-10 record, the school's best in five years, to push Hultquist to sixth in FSU history with a 51-45 mark. The Seminoles have won at least ten matches in each of his first four seasons.

After four straight years of finishing fifth in the Atlantic Coast Conference, the Seminoles produced their best rating at No. 2 in 2003. FSU also produced its second ACC Indoors doubles champion, with two tandems ranked at the end of the year.

Individual accolades rolled in as Hultquist's aide, Ty Braswell, was named ITA Assistant Coach of the Year. On the court, Mat Cloer became the first Seminole to earn ACC Player of the Year honors.



With a passion for the sport of tennis, Hultquist has always wanted to accomplish one thing. That one thing is the desire to become a successful Division I collegiate coach. In the summer of 1999, Hultquist's hiring as the Seminole head men's tennis coach culminated a decade-long journey to fulfill his dream.

In his first year, Hultquist brought the Seminoles a winning record of 14-10. In his second year, the men's team entered the 2001-02 season ranked No. 59 by the ITA.

Hultquist arrived at Florida State after serving eight years as an assistant coach at the University of Texas. While working under legendary coach Dave Snyder, Hultquist became known for his excellent recruiting abilities. He was also responsible for

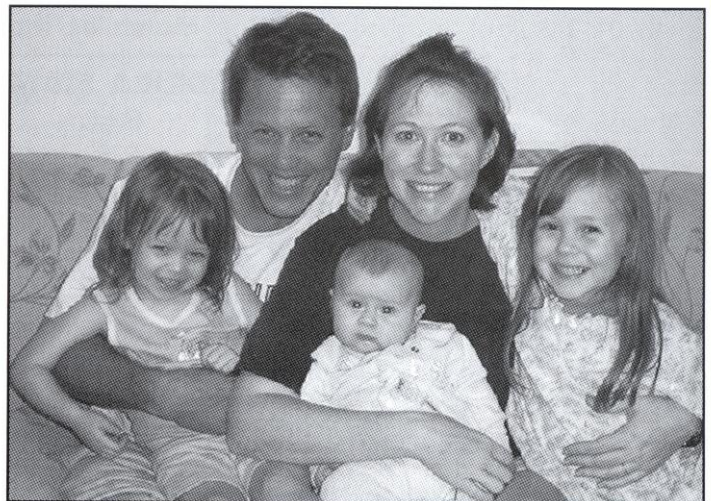
scheduling, fundraising, individualized coaching and many of the day-to-day operations of the program. While at Texas, Hultquist coached nine All-Americans, helped lead the Longhorns to six conference titles and made it to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in each of his eight years.

Hultquist began his tennis career at Penn State where he was a four-year letterman and team captain in 1986. During that same year, he was an NCAA Tournament qualifier in doubles, and earned all-conference honors in both singles and doubles. After graduating from Penn State, Hultquist turned pro, playing in the United States, Israel and Asia. During his career, Hultquist was selected to play on national teams that traveled to Korea and China for competition.

Hultquist's coaching career began when he accepted a job with the USTA in 1988. His playing experience helped prepare him to become the USTA Boy's National Team Coach.

In 1991, Hultquist began his collegiate coaching career when he accepted a graduate assistant position at the University of Kentucky, where he was responsible for recruiting and co-directing the National Collegiate Indoor Team Championships.

Hultquist is married to the former Angela White. The couple has three daughters, five-year-old Devan, three-year-old Avery and Addison, who was born in August of 2003.

TY BRASWELL

ASSISTANT COACH (FOURTH YEAR) • FLORIDA STATE '99



When Florida State University head coach Dwayne Hultquist hired Ty Braswell to be his assistant coach in 2000, he knew that he was getting someone who would make a big impact on the Seminole program. Last season, the rest of the country caught up to Hultquist's foresight.

After his third season with the Tribe, the 28-year Braswell was recognized by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association with

its Assistant Coach of the Year award. It was the first time that a Florida State aide had earned the honor.

In his fourth year as an assistant, Braswell will continue to offer his leadership and knowledge of the game. Having graduated from FSU only five years ago, where he was a celebrated member of the team himself and team captain from 1997-99, Braswell knows what it takes to lead this team to victory.

While on the court he assists Hultquist with the players' development, Braswell is just as important away from competition. He coordinates team travel and equipment purchases, while assisting in recruiting and academics. The classroom is one area that the Seminoles can learn a lot from Braswell, a three-time ACC Honor Roll selection.

Braswell became a member of the Florida State coaching staff when he accepted the position as the men's assistant on July 1, 2000. By accepting this position on the tennis team, Braswell switched from player to coach.

During his senior campaign in 1998-99, Braswell was the only ranked Seminole in singles and tied his career high with 19 wins. Braswell also won the Flight One Singles Championship at the Seminole Fall Classic and advanced to the quarterfinals of the ITA Region II Indoor Championships where he defeated the No. 13 player in the nation.

In the 1997-98 season, he boasted 17 victories in doubles and gained an ACC tournament victory over Georgia Tech's nationally ranked doubles team. Braswell played at the No. 1 and 2 singles position all season where he held a singles ranking as high as 60 in the ITA ratings.

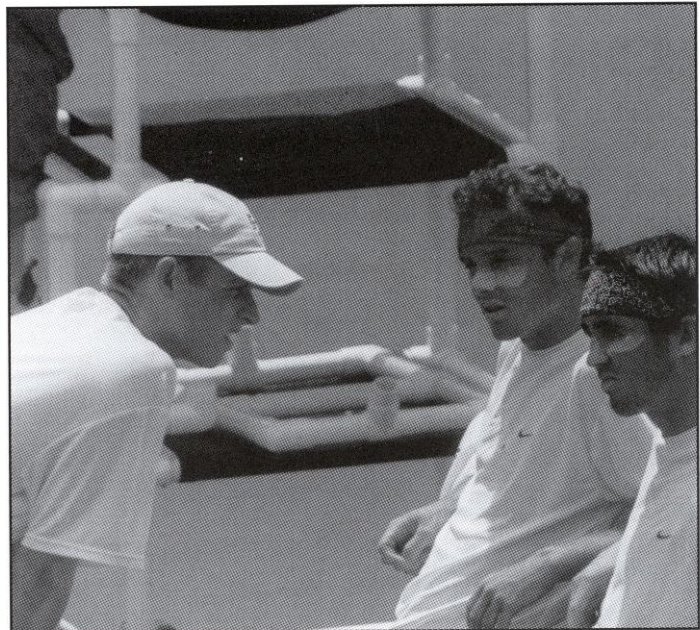

The previous season, Braswell played at the No. 1 and 2 singles positions while defeating five nationally ranked players including Florida's Jon Glover to clinch a 4-3 victory over the tenth-ranked Gators. Braswell teamed with Yvo Niks to win the ACC No. 2 doubles championship.

As a freshman in 1995-96, he played at the No. 3, 4, and 5 singles positions where he put together a respectable 18-13 singles record which was third best on the team. In addition, Braswell was 10-7 at No. 2 and 3 doubles. He also clinched the Flight 4 Singles Championship in the Seminole Fall Classic.

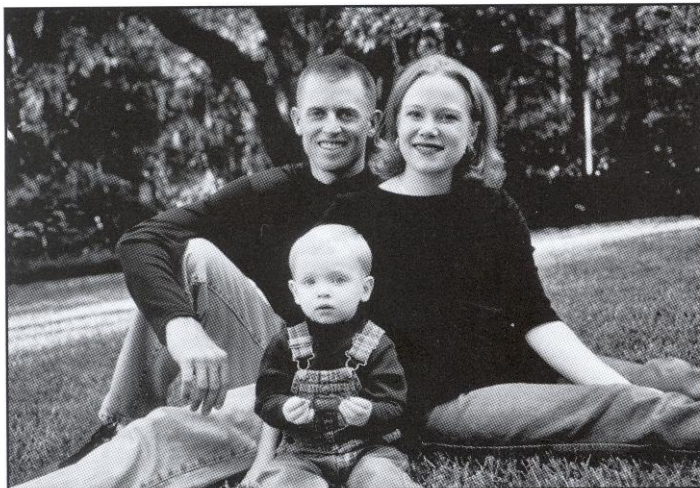


During his prep career, he was ranked as high as No. 5 in the country in the Boys 18 and under division, while being ranked No. 1 in Florida in Boys 18 and under division.

Braswell participated in the 1995 U.S. Olympic Festival in Colorado where he won two gold medals and one silver medal. He was a finalist in the 1993 U.S. National Clay Court Championship.

From 1999-2000, Braswell served as the assistant tennis pro at Laurel Oak Tennis Club in Sarasota, Florida.

Braswell graduated from Florida State in 1999 with a degree in sports administration. In October of 1999 Braswell married the former Anna Nixon. The Braswells are the proud parents of their first child, Micah Brooks who is one-year old.

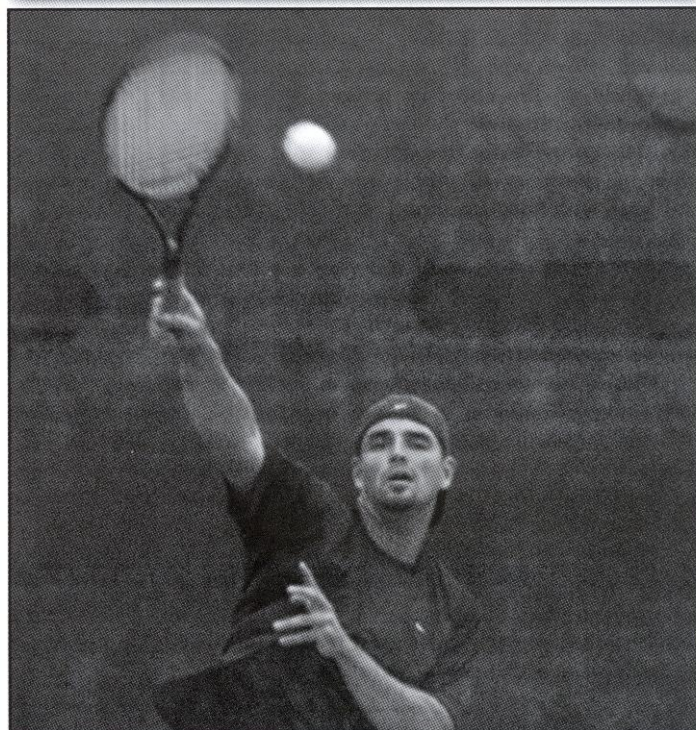

At Florida State: Starts junior campaign eighth all-time in school history with 42 doubles victories—after 20 wins last season—needing 11 more to own the mark...Stands six singles wins from cracking Florida State's top ten.

SEMINOLES GAIN NATIONAL ATTENTION IN HULTQUIST'S FOURTH SEASON

With a roster made up entirely of his recruits, Florida State University men's tennis coach Dwayne Hultquist had big expectations for the 2002-03 campaign. The Seminoles brought back seven letterwinners from a squad that posted a winning record along with a talented group of newcomers for Hultquist's fourth season in Tallahassee.

Those expectations were not only met, but exceeded as FSU turned out one of the best seasons in recent years. The Seminoles ended the 2002-03 season with a 15-11 mark, the program's best since 1998. Within the Atlantic Coast Conference, they finished tied for second at 6-2, equaling its highest finish in program history.

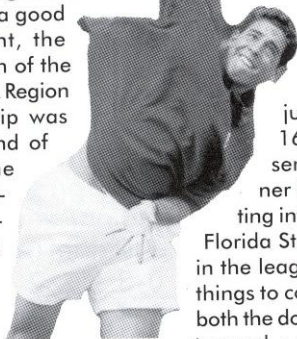
Another first for the Tribe under Hultquist was a return to the NCAA Tournament. The spring season got off on the right foot as host came away with the title at the Seminole Team Tournament. From there, FSU headed north for a pair of matches and came back with not only two wins, but a triumph over its first ranked opponent of the year. In hard-fought match, the Seminoles took home a 4-3 victory over #34 Notre Dame.

Tuning up for the conference schedule, Florida State took its lumps during the month of February against some tough competition. The Seminoles fell to ranked opponents Florida, Alabama and Rice while dropping contests to NCAA Tournament participants Miami and SMU.

All the hard work Florida State put in during the non-conference schedule paid off when it came time for ACC play. FSU opened the year with a 4-3 victory over No. 25 Wake Forest before going on to win three of its next four league bouts. Included in that run was a 4-3 triumph against No. 21 Virginia—the Seminoles highest ranked upset in seven years—and their first win over No. 41 North Carolina since 1997. Florida State ended the regular season by beating No. 25 Georgia Tech 4-3.

Five days after playing the Yellow Jackets in the ACC finale, the Seminoles were back on the court against Tech in the quarterfinals of the conference tournament. Once again FSU prevailed with the same 4-3 score. The following day, the Seminoles had their run stopped by Clemson as the No. 27 Tigers defeated Florida State for the second time in 2002-03 with a 4-3 decision. Three weeks later, the Seminoles beat Miami in

the NCAA Tournament before finishing the season against Florida.

Well rested after sitting out most of the fall with an ankle injury, Cloer came out firing during the spring season. The sophomore paced the squad with a 29-12 record, the fourth-best ledger in school history. After turning in a 7-1 conference mark, he became the first men's tennis player in school history to be picked as ACC Player of the Year.

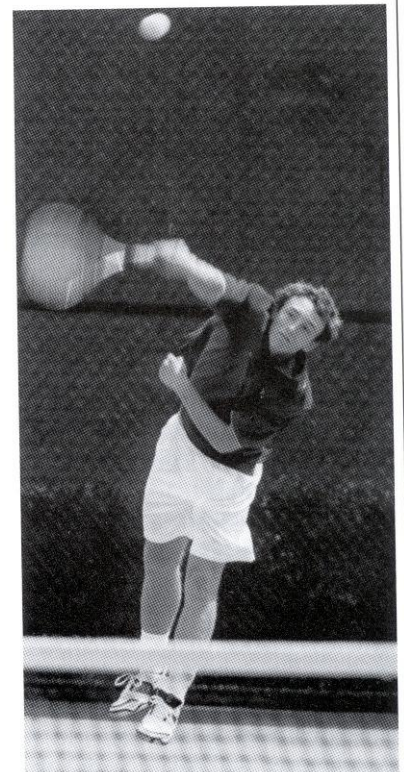
The Brevard N.C., native ended his second season at FSU with a first round loss at the NCAA Tournament. One of the big reasons for his final No. 38 single ranking by the ITA was Cloer's play against fellow ranked opponents. Twelve of his 29 victories came against rated competitors, but what might have been more impressive is that he only had one loss to a non-ranked opponent.

Two other Seminoles joined Cloer with 20-win seasons. The senior Laub went 24-12, including a perfect 7-0 ACC ledger, to close out his final season at Florida State. Jurd, a junior out of Paris, France, posted a 20-14 mark and ended the year ranked 28th in the Mideast Region. All told, over half the Seminoles' roster produced double-digit singles victories with six players notching ten or more wins.

On the doubles side, the tandem of Herrera and Jurd carried its success from the ITA Regional throughout the entire year. The duo tallied a 25-13 mark, equaling the school record, while ending the year ranked 43 in the country. ACC Indoors Champion Cloer and Laub were rated 58th following a 19-12 campaign.

At mid-season, the Seminoles got a big boost from the addition of freshman Chris Westerhof. The South Africa native teamed up with fellow rookie Jeff Groslimond to win their first four doubles matches, including an upset of 56th-ranked Behrmann/Hahn of Florida. The freshmen duo captured 10 of their first 12 bouts on their way to an 18-7 mark for the year.

Down the road, the 2002-03 season will be known as a year of firsts for the Seminole men's tennis team. The first NCAA appearance since 1998, with the team's first NCAA victory in seven seasons to go along with FSU's best ACC finish since the 1996. But coach Hultquist and the entire squad hope that the biggest first is that this is the first of many big seasons to come.

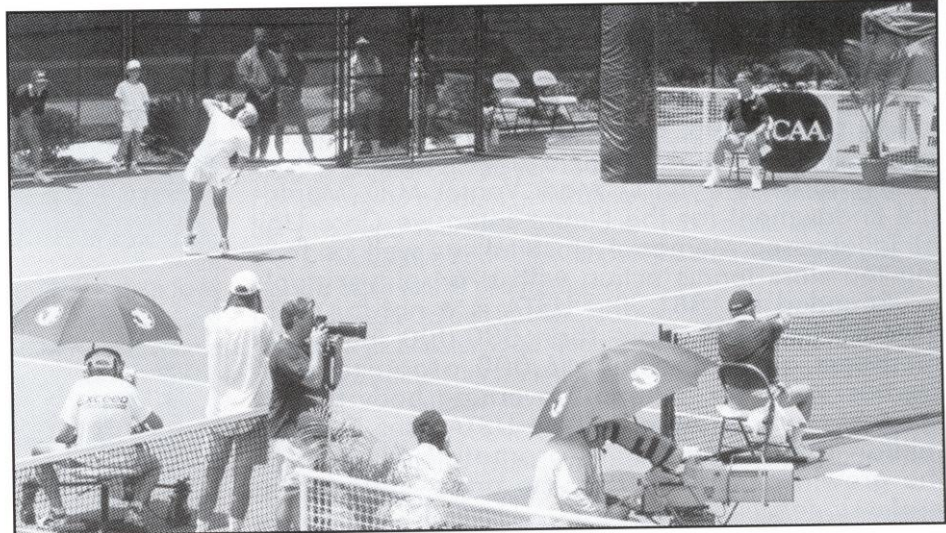
SCOTT SPEICHER TENNIS CENTER

HOME OF THE SEMINOLES

With the first stage of construction completed in the summer of 1993, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts opened its gates to the public for the first time at a Children's Miracle Network charity tournament. Since then, many successful tournaments including the 1996 NCAA Women's Championships, have graced the courts at one of Florida State University's premier athletic facilities.

Costing \$1.2 million to build and then another \$800,000 for recent additions, Florida State's Speicher Tennis Center has become an example of the increasing dedication and commitment the University has to all of its 17 varsity athletic programs.

The Speicher Tennis Center houses 12 lighted hard courts, over 1,000 court level seats, coaching offices, men's and women's locker rooms, equipment and storage rooms, a team lounge and a public address system. The growing pride Florida State has for its tennis program and its premier tennis center was



State University. Speicher was considered the first American casualty during Operation Desert Storm, but was later reclassified by the United States' government as missing in action in 2001 and missing/captured a year later. By Presidential directive, the facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

H. Donald Loucks was the program's first tennis coach and is aptly known as the pioneer of Florida State tennis. He began his coaching career in 1936 at the Florida State College for Women where he coached all sports. This was the beginning of an association with Florida State which crossed six decades, 1936 - 1980, ending in his retirement as Professor Emeritus of Physical Education. In 1942, while serving as an officer in the Army, Loucks was stationed at West Point where he coached plebe basketball and tennis teams.

In 1947, Loucks became Florida State's first basketball

coach and a year later was named the school's first tennis coach. His tennis team was the first athletic team to have a winning season. The varsity tennis courts were named for Loucks in 1981. He served as Dean of Men from 1957 - 1967 and was known as a servant of leadership, service and devotion to many worthy causes.

The Speicher Tennis Center was designed by EMO/Architects, Inc., a Tallahassee-based architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc., an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by private sources and supervised through the state university system of Florida.

Through its ten year existence, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts has served as the home courts for all Florida State men's and women's home dual matches, the annual Seminole Fall Classics, City of Tallahassee tennis championships, various USTA regional and zonal tournaments, the 1994 and 1995 Men's Intercollegiate tournament and the annual Children's Miracle Network Charity Invitational benefiting Shands Hospital in Gainesville.

Founded in 1881, the USTA is a not-for-profit organization with more than 530,000 individual members and more than 6,000 organizational members. As the national governing body for the sport of tennis in America, the USTA uses its \$154 million annual budget to promote and develop the growth of tennis, from the grass roots to the professional levels.

A 128 player pre-qualifying tournament was held at FSU with the top qualifier participating in the 64 player qualifying tournament, which was held on June 2 and 3.

A pro-am tennis round robin was played on Monday, June 2, 2003. The event allowed local amateurs paired with touring professionals to play against another pro-am team in a round robin doubles format.

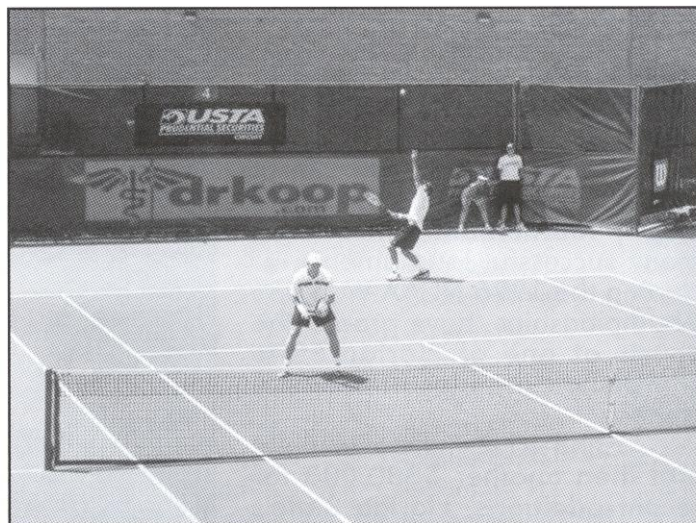
The main draw which began on Tuesday, June 4 and included a 32-player singles draw and a 16-player doubles draw.



All four advanced to the quarterfinals with the number five and four seeds moving on to the finals. In the end, No. 5 Paul Goldstein won the tournament when fourth-seeded Alex Kim retired in the fourth set. Goldstein was leading the final set 4-0 after the two split the opening bouts.

While Mother Nature allowed the singles draw to finish, the same couldn't be said for the doubles tournament. All-eight first-round matches got in the books before rain canceled the quarterfinals.

Once again the Challenger had a Florida State feel to it as four hometown players took part in the tournament.



The Seminoles loan representative in the singles draw was sophomore Mat Cloer. Fresh off a spot in the NCAA Tournament and ACC Player of the Year honors, Cloer held his own in his back yard.

Receiving a wild card entry in the first round, Cloer backed up his play when he defeated Thomas Blake 2-6, 7-5, 7-6 (6). The draw wasn't so kind in the second round as he faced the top seed, Eric Taino. Cloer fought hard in his second round match, but dropped a 6-0, 6-2 decision.

During the doubles draw, three current Seminoles and a former member of the Tribe were on hand. Cloer teamed up with assistant coach Ty Braswell to win one match in the qualifier.

That put them in the main draw against up-coming FSU rookies Jeff Groslimond and Chris Westerhof, who received a wild card entry. Experience prevailed over youth as Cloer and Braswell posted a 7-6 (5), 6-4 victory. Rain prevent the tandem from playing Rodolphe Cadart/Danai Udomchok in the quarterfinals.

The 2002 tournament saw five Seminoles playing in the pre-qualifying round with Xavier Luscan earned a wild-card berth in the following week's field of 32

Each year the USTA Tallahassee Challenger provides the opportunity to see world class tennis in the only professional tennis event in Tallahassee. The USTA provides a unique opportunity for local tennis players to participate in a pro-am event with professionals playing on the ATP tour. This event features players ranked in the 100-200s in the world. The Challenger is the sole event for local children to participate as "ball kids" in a professional tennis event. Tallahassee is given the chance to showcase the community and to house professional players and umpires during the event. The Tallahassee Challenger gives the opportunity to improve health care in the community by contributing to the endowment

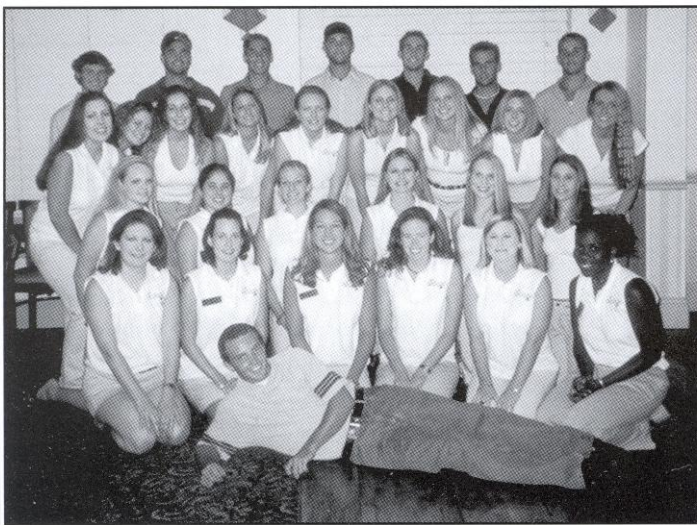

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 51st year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 88 national championships, including 44 in women's competition and 44 in men's. In addition, 115 men and 51 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

Over the last seven years, ACC men's tennis has risen to one of the top conferences in the country. At least four league schools have qualified for the NCAA Tournament since 1997.

Furthermore, since 1992, at least once team from the conference has advanced to the third round of the national summit. Overall the league's nine schools have posted 50 victories in 65 NCAA Tournament appearances.

2002-03 IN REVIEW

The 2002-03 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and ten individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 45 national team titles over the last 13 years.

The ACC's 2002-03 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, Virginia in men's lacrosse and Clemson in men's golf.

Overall, 95 ACC teams took part in postseason play compiling an 84-64 (.568) record. A total of 167 student-athletes from the ACC earned first, second or third-team All-America honors this past year. In addition, the ACC produced three national Players of the Year, one national Rookie of the Year and four national Coach of the Year recipients.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 16 of the 21 sports sponsored by the league for which polls were available. In all, 28 ACC teams finished their season with a top 10 ranking.

Last season was one of the best for the conferences men's tennis teams. A league-record six schools played in the NCAA Tournament, with three collected at least one victory.

Seven ACC players received invitationals to the NCAA Tournament, with four doubles teams accepting a bid. At the end of the year, 12 ACC singles players were ranked as well as nine doubles teams. The ACC also produced four ITA All-Americans.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2003-04 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, league officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

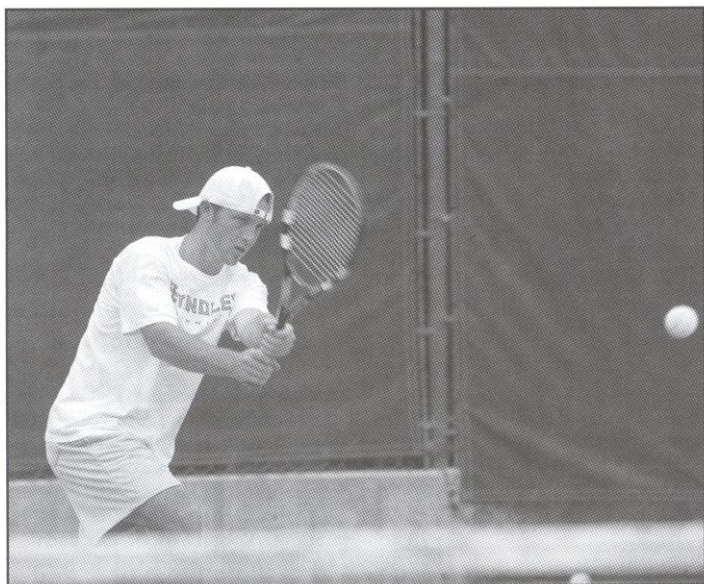

Dixie Conference Affiliation (1949-1951)

The 1949, 1950 and 1951 teams, coached by Florida State tennis pioneer, H. Don Loucks (1949-50) and Ralph Matherly (1951), won the Dixie Conference team championship for three consecutive years. The Dixie Conference was made up of seven small schools within the Southeast including Florida State, Stetson, Millsaps, Mercer, Howard, Lambuth and Oglethorpe.

Metro Conference Championship History (1976-91)

The Metro Conference, originally tabbed the Metro Six, was formed on June 13, 1975. It's charter members included Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, Louisville, Memphis State, St Louis and Tulane.

Expansion was soon on the horizon, as the league membership increased its size to seven schools when the Florida State University was admitted on July 28, 1976.

After Georgia Tech left the conference following the 1978 season, Virginia Tech quickly filled the void. Then St. Louis left the Metro. But waiting in the wings was the University of South Carolina who joined in 1983 to increase the membership to eight schools. However, Tulane forfeited its membership when its basketball program was discontinued following the 1984-85 season.

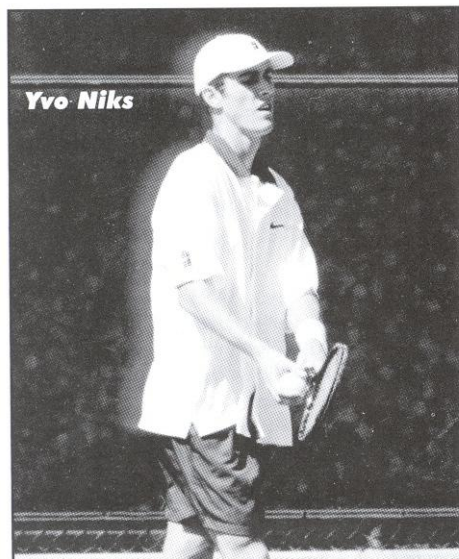

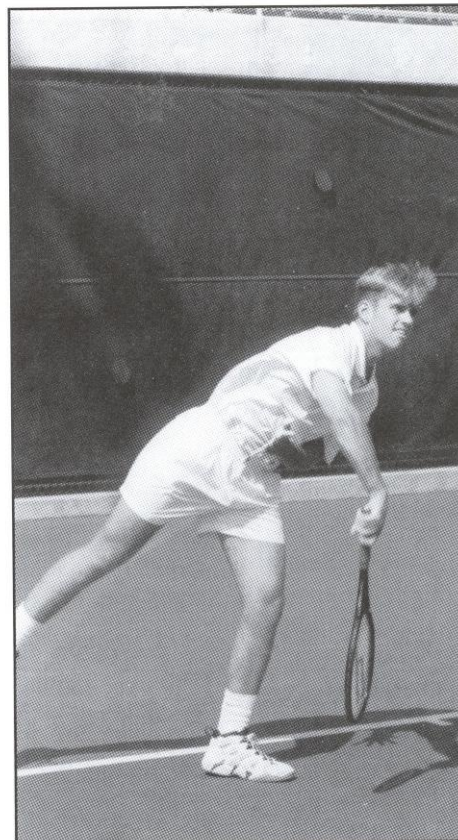

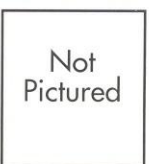
