2007-08 OUTLOOK 07-08 Preview

Which five consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament, the goal for Florida State men's tennis is to not just make it to the tourney, but to make a run to the final site in Tulsa, Okla. Bolstered by one of the nation's top recruits in freshman Clint Bowles, the blend of youth and experience should make the Seminoles a force to be reckoned with in the ACC, and at the national level.

Hultquist Outlook

"I think we've got a very good team. I think our depth - you never know with injuries – is going to be very important, for our guys to be working hard to make that happen and being ready to play. I think we want to do well in the conference. We want to make the national indoors every year, and then make a run at the end."

Singles

The Seminoles begin the season with two players ranked in the FILA/ITA preseason rankings. Sophomore Jean-Yves Aubone begins the season ranked No. 70 while Blue Chip recruit Clint Bowles is the second highest ranked freshman at No. 105. Perhaps FSU's biggest strength is its depth bringing back four players who all contributed big victories last season. Senior Sam Chang has already defeated four ranked players in fall tournaments, while juniors Chris Cloer and Maciek Sykut look to improve on solid seasons last year. Sophomore Brad Mixson is also set to continue winning matches, which was evident by his team best 15-4 record last season.

Hultquist Outlook

"I feel good about our singles. We had a good run with Sam and Clint making the All-American main draw, and a couple of other guys showing some good results as well. So, I think we look strong, but we want to be better. We worked hard this fall, and will continue into the spring."

Doubles

Florida State has always taken pride in its doubles play and this year is no exception. The Seminoles begin the year with the 26th ranked doubles team in the FILA/ITA preseason rankings with senior Sam Chang and junior Maciek Sykut. The Noles also look to have another dynamic duo in sophomore Jean-Yves Aubone and freshman Clint Bowles.

Hultquist Outlook

"We've got a couple of new doubles teams, and doubles is all about chemistry and how you get along with your partner and knowing where each other's going to be. So, we've got a little work to do on where our doubles is going to be."

Schedule

Not only does Florida State play in one of the toughest conferences in the nation, the ACC, the Seminoles also play some of the best teams in the nation each and ever year. The Seminoles schedule includes matches against Pepperdine, Florida and Notre Dame to go along with conference opponents Virginia, Duke and North Carolina. A trip to Hawaii in February will provide some excitement before Florida State gets to the meat of their schedule.

Hultquist Outlook

"We have an incredibly difficult schedule. The ACC may be the strongest conference in the country from top to bottom. We'll have eleven of those matches, which will be very difficult. Then our outof-conference schedule has some of the best teams in the country. We're playing home and away and there won't be any easy matches. We want to schedule the best teams and we've done that."



Dwayne Hultquist Head Coach Ninth Season at FSU (Penn State '86)

nder Dwayne Hultquist's leadership, Florida State men's tennis has emerged as one of the top programs in the nation. When Hultquist took over the Florida State program in 1999, the Seminoles were struggling to compete in the state of Florida, let alone in the Atlantic Cost Conference or at the national level. A lot has changed in eight years as FSU is a player on the national scene and a staple in the NCAA Tournament.

In 2007, Hultquist led Florida State to a 17-10 record as the Seminoles received their highest ranking

> Hultquist has also proven himself as one of the best recruiters in the country. In the last two years he has recruited some of the top high school talent in the nation, evident by Florida State's top ranked recruiting class in 2006 and the signing of one of the nation's best in Blue Chipper Clint Bowles.

> On the Florida State career charts, the 17 wins during 2007 moved Hultquist up to third in alltime victories with a 117-88 record over eight years. Hultquist can take over second place with 13 wins to pass Richard McKee, who coached from 1984-90, and is bearing down on the top spot, now held by 1991-99 coach David Barron (141 wins).

> Undoubtedly, year six in the Hultquist era was the best season in school history. For starters, the Tribe not only made their third straight trip to the national summit. but FSU reached the 2005 NCAA Elite Eight for the first time ever. Florida State also finished with its highest-ever national ranking at No. 13 and FSU stamped its first 20-plus win season since 1985. Hultquist led his squad to an impressive 21-8 mark and a second-place finish in the ACC. Under Hultquist's tutelage in 2005, Mat Cloer, became the school's first singles All-American and won the program's first national honor with the ITA Arthur Ashe Award.

Hultquist hit the ground running in the fall of 2005 and led his troop to an impressive fall campaign. For the Seminoles efforts, Florida State not only earned the school's first invitation to the 2006 USTA/ITA National Men's Team Indoor Championship, but it also garnered a respectable preseason ranking of No. 11 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association.

In Hultquist's fifth season, FSU reached heights it hadn't scene since the mid 1990's. The Tribe's second trip to the national summit was their first back-to-back appearances since the 1997-98 campaigns, and they ended the 2004 year ranked for the 11th season in a row with a 10-13 record.

Individual honors were also bountiful in 2004 with Mat Cloer claiming his second ACC Player of the Year honor, only the third time

has gone to the same player in back-to-back years. Then-freshman Ionathas Sucupira was named to the All-ACC team, a first by an FSU rookie since 1992.

Florida State had a break-out year during Hultquist's fourth season as the 2003 squad returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1998 and ended the year with a 15-10 mark. The Seminoles produced their best finish in the ACC standings, taking second, while winning the ACC Indoor Doubles Championship for the second year in a row.

Individual accolades rolled in as Hultquist's former aide, Ty Braswell, was named ITA Assistant Coach of the Year. On the court, Cloer became the first Seminole to earn ACC Player of the Year honors

With a passion for the sport of tennis, Hultquist always wanted to accomplish one thing. That one thing was the desire to become a successful Division I collegiate coach. In the summer of 1999, Hultquist's hiring as the Seminole head men's tennis coach culminated a decade-long journey to fulfill his dream.

In his first year, Hultquist brought the Seminoles a winning record of 14-10. In his second year, the men's team entered the 2001-02 season ranked No. 59 by the ITA.

Hultquist arrived at Florida State after serving eight years as an assistant coach at the University of Texas. While working under legendary coach Dave Snyder, Hultquist became known for his excellent recruiting abilities. He was also responsible for scheduling, fundraising, individualized coaching and many of the day-to-day


in league history that the award \mathbf{P} operations of the program. While \mathbf{P} at Texas, Hultquist coached nine All-Americans, helped lead the Longhorns to six conference titles and made it to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in each of his eight years.

Hultquist began his tennis career at Penn State where he was a four-year letterman and team captain in 1986. During that same year, he was an NCAA Tournament gualifier in doubles, and earned allconference honors in both singles and doubles. After graduating from Penn State, Hultquist turned pro, playing in the United States, Israel and Asia. During his career, Hultquist was selected to play on national teams that traveled to Korea and China for competition.

Hultquist's coaching career began when he started working with USTA in 1988. During his tenure at the USTA, he traveled with the Boy's National Team to South America as well as the Orange Bowl and Easter Bowl tournaments.

In 1991, Hultquist began his collegiate coaching career when he accepted a graduate assistant position at the University of Kentucky, where he was responsible for recruiting and co-directing the National Collegiate Indoor Team Championships.

Hultquist is married to the former Angela White. The couple has four daughters, Devan (9), Avery (7), Addison (4) and Mackenzie (1).



Nick Crowell Assistant Coach Fifth Season at FSU (Texas '00)

n his fifth year on staff at Florida State, assistant coach Nick Crowell has had a profound impact on the Seminoles. Since his All-American playing days at the University of Texas, Crowell has been a winner so his recent coaching success at FSU surprises no one. Simply put, Crowell is one of the top assistant coaches in the country.

In 2007, Crowell helped lead the Seminoles to their fifth straight NCAA Tournament. During the season Florida State also achieved their highest ranking in team history at No. 10.

In May 2006, Crowell was named the ITA Mideast Region Men's Tennis Assistant Coach of the Year and became a finalist for the national award.

"Nick brings a lot of dedication, energy and enthusiasm to our program," said head coach Dwayne Hultquist.

While earning All-America honors in doubles play for the Longhorns, Crowell played for current FSU head



coach, Dwayne Hultquist, who was an assistant coach at the time. Since Crowell's arrival, Florida State has reached the NCAA Championships every season and shattered several team records.

The 2006 season found the Seminoles concluding the year with a respectable 18-12 record with arguably the hardest strength of schedule in the nation. Florida State's 18 wins tied as the second-most number of program victories in the last 16 seasons. FSU advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championship and made the school's first four-peat appearance in the Big Dance since its run of five consecutive trips from 1994-98. Crowell was a big factor in the success of Ytai Abougzir, who became the first Seminole in 12 seasons to qualify for both the NCAA Singles and Doubles Championship.

In 2005, Hultquist and Crowell led the Tribe to a Cinderella-run that included a trip to the NCAA Elite Eight for the first time in school history. Florida State also finished with its highest-ever national ranking at No. 13 and stamped in the record book its first 20-plus win season since 1985.

In his first year with the Seminoles during the 2004 season, FSU reached heights it hadn't seen since the mid 1990's. The Tribe's second trip to the national summit was their first backto-back appearances since the 1997-98 campaigns and they ended the 2004 year ranked for the 11th season in a row with a 10-13 record.

Since graduating from Texas in 2000 with a bachelor's degree in sports management, Crowell has been playing professionally on the Challenger and FUTURES tours. Two seasons ago he reached the semifinals in doubles play at the Seascape Challenger (Aptos, Calif.) and the Challenger of Dallas. Unfortunately, an injury cut his career short and he became a teaching pro at Holly Tree Country Club in Tyler, Texas.

"The thing that separated Nick from the others was, not only was he a great player, being a two-time All-American, but there was the connection we had back at Texas and the success we had there," Hultquist said. "My last three years we won the Big 12 every year and Nick was a huge part of that. He understands what it means to be at a top five program."

Early in his career at Texas, Crowell established himself as one of the top doubles players in the country. During his freshman season, he teamed up with Paul Martin to advanced to the quarterfinals of the doubles draw at the NCAA Tournament, earning him his first All-America honor.

That season he also earned the Big 12 Conference and ITA Region VI Freshman of the Year awards. His rookie of the year accolade from the league would be the first of many for Crowell. Starting his sophomore year, he earned all-conference honors his last three seasons in singles and doubles.

Finishing his career just as he started it, Crowell captured his second All-America honor during his senior season as he and playing partner Michael Blue advanced to the round of 16 at the NCAA Tournament. Earlier in the season, the two paired up to win the doubles title at the ITA National Indoor Tournament.

With nearly 100 doubles victories during his tenure with the Longhorns, Crowell ranks third in school history with 98 triumphs. His 29 doubles wins with Martin during 1997 still ranks in the top five. Sparked by a 35-win season in 1997, he ranks 15th on the all-time singles list.

A native of Amarillo, Texas, the 28year-old Crowell currently resides in Tallahassee and is engaged to Lindsey Smith of Tallahassee.

Mat Cloer Volunteer Assistant Coach First Season at FSU (Florida State '05)


s one of Florida State's most decorated players, Mat Cloer helped bring the Seminoles to new heights. Now as the teams new volunteer assistant coach, he hopes to finish what he started.

Competing for the Seminoles from 2002-2005, Cloer finished his career just seven wins shy of becoming the all-time career singles leader in school history. He left Florida State with 85 singles wins and 69 doubles victories. Cloer was a two-time ACC Player of the Year and during the 2004-2005 season, Cloer became the first player in school history to earn All-American honors in singles. No. 12 Florida State Men's Tennis Upsets No. 8 Florida For The First Time In 10 Years

It was an exciting day at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center on February 17, 2007 as No. 12 Florida State men's tennis defeated No. 8 Florida 4-3 for the first time in 10 years. The Seminoles were joined by more than 500 fans as they improved the overall season record to 6-2. The Seminoles last defeated Florida in 1997 under the direction of head coach David Barron. Jonathas Sucupira stormed back for a third set victory over the Gators' Daniel Cash 3-6, 6-3, 6-3 to give Florida State the match clinching point. The victory gave Florida State its 10th straight home win.

Seminoles Earn Highest Ranking In Program History

The Seminoles next captured another in-state victory defeating Miami in the Atlantic Coast Conference season opener. The win came just one week after earning the highest national ranking in program history at No. 10 on the ITA/FILA Poll. The previous highest ranking of No. 11 was earned in the 2006 ITA/FILA Preseason Poll after the Seminoles ended the 2005 dual season in the NCAA Championship Elite Eight.

Seminoles Excel With Home Court Advantage

Florida State men's tennis began the 2007 dual season with a huge home advantage going undefeated in its first 11 matches at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center. During the streak the Seminoles defeated four teams from the ACC, the toughest conference in the nation and notched a victory of No.8 Florida.

NCAA Regionals Held at Scott Speicher Tennis Center

High hopes returned to the Seminoles when the NCAA announced Florida State would host rounds one and two of the NCAA Regionals in Tallahassee for the first time in school history. The Seminoles flew through round one defeating Manhattan 4-0 before bowing out to Florida in the second round.





Sucupira and Chang Selected To 2007 NCAA Doubles Championships

Florida State's senior and co-captain Jonathas Sucupira and junior Sam Chang were selected to compete in the 2007 NCAA doubles competition. The duo defeated Louisville's No. 18 Damar Johnson and Slavko Radman 6-3, 7-6 (2) in round one of the NCAA doubles tournament, later falling in the Round of 32 in a three-set battle to Illinois' No. 8 Kevin Anderson and Ryan Rowe.

Cloer Wins Singles Title, Deye/O'Shea Take Doubles

Chris Cloer made it look easy for most of the 2007 ITA Summer Circuit tournament, but teammate Michael O'Shea pushed him to the limit as Cloer captured the men's singles title. Cloer's victory marks the third consecutive year a Seminole has won the Summer Circuit tournament. Current Seminole Sam Chang won the event in 2006 while former Seminole Jonathas Sucupira was champion in 2005. O'Shea later partnered with teammate Bobby Deye to defeat Cloer and senior Jason Hood to capture the doubles championship.

Bowles Wins National Championship

Florida State incoming freshman Clint Bowles can now be called National Champion after his victory in the USTA Boys' 18 Clay Court National Championships. Bowles needed only 44 minutes to dispatch fifth seeded Bradley Klahn 6-2, 6-0, winning the last 11 games of the match. 



Which the first stage of construction completed in the summer of 1993, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts opened its gates to the public for the first time at a Children's Miracle Network charity tournament. Since then, many successful tournaments including the 1996 NCAA Women's Championships and a 2007 Men's NCAA Regional have graced the courts at one of Florida State University's premier athletic facilities.

Costing \$1.2 million to build and then another \$800,000 for recent additions, Florida State's Speicher Tennis Center has become an example of the increasing dedication and commitment the University has to all of its 17 varsity athletic programs.

The Speicher Tennis Center houses 12 lighted hard courts, over 1,000 court level seats, coaching offices, men's and women's locker rooms, equipment and storage rooms, a team lounge and a public address system. The growing pride Florida State has for its tennis program and its premier tennis center was honored just after it's opening in 1994, when



the United States Tennis Association (USTA) awarded the structure with its "Top Notch" facility award.

The Speicher Tennis Center was named in honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University. Speicher was considered the first American casualty during Operation Desert Storm, but was later reclassified by the United State's government as missing in action in 2001 and missing/captured a year later. By Presidential directive, the facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

In 1947, Loucks became Florida State's first basketball coach and a year later was named the school's first tennis coach. His tennis team was the first athletic team. The varsity tennis courts were named for Loucks in 1981. He served as Dean of men from 1957-1967 and was known as

a servant of leadership, service and devotion to many worthy causes. The Speicher Tennis Center was designed by EMO/Architects, Inc., a Tallahasseebased architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc., an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by private sources and supervised through the state university system of Florida.

Through its nine year existence, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts has served as the home courts for all Florida State men's and women's home dual matches, the annual Seminole Fall Classics, City of Tallahassee tennis championships, various USTA regional and zonal tournaments, the 1994 and 1995 Men's Intercollegiate tournament and the annual Children's Miracle Network Charity Invitational benefiting Shands Hospital in Gainesville.










by the NCAA. In addition to the student-athlete competitors, scholarships are also provided to student trainers, managers and graduate assistants who are vital to the athletic program

graduate assistants who are vital to the athletic program. The last 15 years have seen a three-fold rise in the cost of athletic scholarships at Florida State. Today, more than \$300,000 is needed to permanently endow a Florida State athletic scholarship. Established in 1986 under the direction of William M. Parker of Clearwater, the Seminole Boosters Endowed Scholarship Program is the final step toward perpetual funding of all scholarships for student-athletes at Florida State.
