The pool lanes may be reconfigured to represent an 8-lane by 50-meter pool. The pool is surrounded by grassy area for patrons to sunbathe. The Stults Pool has locker facilities with lockers available for rent. The Stults Pool is located in the heart of

2002-03 SWIMMING & DIVING REVIEW

HARPER CONTINUES IMPRESSIVE **REIGN AS HEAD SKIPPER**

Head coach Neil Harper continued his winning ways at FSU in only his fourth year at the helm. The men tied a school record with 11 dual meet wins, a mark that had not been reached since 1962. The women swam their way to 12 victories, which stands as the second-best total in school history. Last year Harper led the women's team to a schoolrecord 14 victories and the men to their first 10-win season since 1997. With both the men's and women's squads reaching 10 wins, Harper became the first FSU head coach in school history to lead both squads to double-digit victories in consecutive years. The feat is more outstanding when considering that the men's program finished its 54th year and the women completed its 27th year.

Harper recently improved his all-time dual meet win total to 43 for the women and 34 on the men's side. His 43

victories on the women's side are second best all-time at FSU, behind Terry Maul's (1976-1993 / 17 years) 125 wins. His combined record for the women's team is 43-13 (.768 winning percentage) and 34-15 (.846) for the men.

MEN FINISHED SECOND AT ACC, **WOMEN THIRD**

The 2003 ACC Championships were a success for the Seminoles, as the men finished second for the first time since 1999 and the women placed third for the second year in a row. Both finishes equaled school bests. Each squad boasted seven ACC champions and took home Most Valuable Diver awards. In addition, both teams placed nine individuals on the All-ACC first team.

to earn back-to-back All-America honors. For the men, Louis Gagnet placed ninth on the three-meter springboard to earn his award. Overall, the men finished 32nd at the championship meet and the women placed 36th.

SEMINOLES IN THE RECORD BOOKS

The Seminoles attained an amazing nine school records in 2002-03. The women accounted for five new records



led by Andree-Anne LeRoy, who set new standards in the 200 and 400 IM and 800-free relay. LeRoy became the first woman at FSU to swim the 200 IM in under two minutes with a time of 1:59.59, besting current assistant coach Anne Blachford's 1997 record of 2:01.60. Her time of 4:18.40 in the 400 IM passed teammate Lisa How's 2002 record of 4:21.97. LeRoy teamed with How, Loren Hansen and Amy Lo to set the new 800-free record of 7:23.51.

Emma Dutton added her name to the record books in the 100-breast with a time of 1:01.87, breaking Samantha White's 1997 time of 1:02.32. Dutton also aided in the record

setting 400-free relay time of 3:20.76, along with Hansen, Jennie Lyes and Emily Breen.

On the men's side, Louie Gagnet shattered the three-meter springboard marks for both six and 11 dives. His six-dive mark of 380.92 topped his own record of 363.85, which he set last season. Gagnet's 11 dive score of 621.05 surpassed the previous mark of 591.90 held by Paul Spray (1992). Justin Betts was able to beat his own record of 1:48.83 in the 200-IM set last year with a new time of 1:48.61. Wickus Nienaber bested teammate Tal Stricker's 2002 200-breast record of 1:59.68 with his own time of 1:58.30.

SEMINOLES NAMED ACC SWIMMER/DIVER OF THE WEEK FOUR TIMES

FSU tied Virginia for the most ACC Swimmer/Diver of the Week awards with four. The Seminoles have won a league-best three weekly awards on the men's side. Sophomore diver Louie Gagnet, the 2002 ACC Most Valuable Diver, won the first honor for FSU when he shattered the previous FSU and Leach Center Pool records on the three-meter springboard with a score of 380.92. The mark was tops in the ACC last year and surpassed his previous school record of 363.85, which he set as a freshman. That day he

also posted a 312.75 on the one-meter board, that was the second-highest in the league at the time.

Senior Joey Marshburn earned the Seminoles' second award after he finished first in the 50-free with an ACC-best and NCAA B-cut time of 20.31 at the prestigious Georgia Invitational. His time of 44.87 in the 100-yard freestyle placed him second at the Invite and added a second B-cut standard to his season. In addition to his individual performances, Marshburn helped Florida State finish second in a field of five teams at the invitational through his efforts in the 200-yard freestyle relay (1:20.28) and the 400-free relay (2:58.70). The relay times were tops in the ACC and provisionally qualified for the NCAA meet.

Junior Ándree-Anne LeRoy became the first member of the women's team to earn the conference honor last season following an impressive performance in a tri-meet against UNC-Wilmington and North Florida, scoring victories in three events. LeRoy showed her versatility and talent with wins in the 100-backstroke (58.21), 200-breast (2:24.69) and the 200-IM (2:06.41). Her efforts led the No. 20 Lady Seminoles to their eighth and ninth victories of the season.

Fellow junior Wickus Nienaber won his award the same week as LeRoy, when placed first in the 100- and 200-yard breaststroke events with times of 56.61 and 2:05.69, respectively, before leading the Tribe to victories in the 200-medley and 200-free relays against UNCW. The award is the second for Nienaber who earned the honor once in 2001-02.

MEN UPSET TOP RANKED UNC ON THE ROAD, 162-138 The men's squad recorded one of the most important dual-

The men's squad recorded one of the most important dualmeet victories in school history on Jan. 11 when they defeated then-ranked #14 North Carolina on the road, 162-138. The win gave FSU (ranked #25 at the time) an undefeated conference record at 3-0 and improved its overall record to 10-2. The Seminoles' strength and depth in nearly every event led to the victory. The Tribe won nine of the meet's 16 events, while finishing in the top three on 18 occasions.

SEMINOLES FINISH IN THE TOP 25

The men's and women's teams finished the dual meet season ranked in the nation's top 25 in the College Swim Coaches Association of America's nation poll. The women finished 24th, while the men earned a spot at No. 25. The Seminoles received some of its highest rankings ever in the poll during the successful dual meet season. The men were ranked as high as No. 20 and the women reached as far as No. 21.





THIS IS THE ACC

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 51st year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 88 national championships, including 44 in women's competition and 44 in men's. In addition, 114 men and 51 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

2002-03 IN REVIEW

The 2002-03 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national titles and nine individual crowns. In all, ACC schools have won 45 national championships over the last 13 years.

onships over the last 13 years.

The conference(s 2002-03 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, the Virginia men's lacrosse team and Clemson in men's golf. Overall, 95 ACC teams took part in post-season play, compiling an 84-64 (.568) record.

A total of 167 student-athletes from the league earned first, second or third-team All-America honors this past year.



In addition, the ACC produced three national Players of the Year, on national Rookie of the Year and four national Coach of the Year recipients.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top ten nationally in 16 of the 21 sports sponsored by the league for which polls were available. In all, 28 conference teams finished their season with a top-ten ranking.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2002-2003 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses

pay for conference expenses.
On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.


