

50 Seminole Olympians





There might not be a stronger argument for the place the Seminole track & field program maintains on the world stage than the number of Florida State athletes who have competed in the Olympic Games. Dating to the 1972 Games in Munich, Germany, a total of 50 Seminoles - 30 men and 20 women - have donned the kits of their home countries. In all, Seminoles have claimed seven Olympic medals while representing 12 different countries. FSU athletes have been even more prominent on the world's greatest stage in recent Games, with 13 Noles competing in 2008 and 12 more in 2012. With the 2016 Games looming on the horizon, that trend figures to continue in Brazil.

Two-Time National Program of the Year



The Florida State men's track & field/cross country program has twice been presented the John McDonnell Award by the United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA). The Seminoles were recognized for having the nation's most outstanding comprehensive program - based on NCAA Championship finishes in cross country, indoor and outdoor track & field - for the 2010-11 and 2011-12 athletic years. The award is named for the Hall of Fame coach who guided Arkansas to 40 NCAA titles. Only FSU and Oregon have been multiple recipients of the award, which was first presented in



The Bowerman Award

Buoyed by an historic performance at the 2011 NCAA Championship, Florida State junior Ngoni Makusha secured The Bowerman Award, presented to the nation's top collegiate track & field athlete.

Makusha, a native of Zimbabwe, won the 2011 NCAA 100-meter title in a collegiate record 9.89, added a long jump crown with a Drake Stadium record leap of 8.40 meters, then combined with teammates to capture the 4x100-meter relay. He became just the fourth man to claim those three golds, joining legends Jesse Owens and Carl Lewis.

His performance capped a career which included six NCAA titles, eight All-American honors and six Atlantic Coast Conference titles. A bronze medal winner in



USTFCCCA NCAA Division I National Men's Track Athlete of the Year, the Atlantic Coast Conference Male Athlete of the Year.

The Bowerman, which debuted in 2009, is presented annually by the USTFC-CCA to the most outstanding male and female collegiate track & field athletes in the nation. It is named for legendary Oregon track & field and cross country coach Bill Bowerman whom served the sport in numerous ways.



Clockwise from the right, Phillip Riley was a four-time All-American and a national champion in the hurdles, while also contributing as a wide receiver; Warrick Dunn is not only one of the most decorated and celebrated football Noles of all time, but he was also an All-American on the track; Michael Ray Garvin was a seven-time All-American sprinter and holds FSU's all-time kickoff return yardage record; before Antonio Cromartie became an All-Pro cornerback he was contributing indoors in the long sprints for the Seminoles.





Mike Long Track: Home of Champions

Amidst the pines at the northernmost end of the campus' athletic facilities, sits pictureque Mike Long Track. Widely recognized as one of the best facilities in the South, the track remains in the same place it has called home since 1957, making it the longest-tenured home among current FSU athletic facilities.

There is nothing antique, however, about the facilities' amenities, which are befitting of the perennially powerful Florida State track & field program.

Prior to the start of the 2013 season, the 400-meter track and its runways were completely resurfaced with the next generation of the Hobart Texture Synthetic Surface; the same surface installed at Oregon's historic Hayward Field, home to the NCAA Championships and the US Olympic Trials.

The resurfacing came just five years after an 18,000-square foot expansion project, for

what is now called the McIntosh Building. Dedicated on Oct. 28, 2008, the Seminoles' two-story, 22,000-square foot home includes offices, conference rooms and an expansive press box on the second floor.

Entering the building on the ground level, visitors step into an atrium which features a mural of some of the programs' all-time greats, as well as two large-screen TVs and trophy cases. The first floor also houses a state-of-the-art athletic training room, including a new hot/cold tub, training space, offices and all of the modern modalities needed to keep the Seminoles running, jumping and throwing. Athletes also have access to a lounge, which frequently serves as a study spot before and after practice.

In 2015, the first floor equipment room at the west end of the building was completely remodeled to meet the needs of a program which suits up more than 100 athletes each year between the men and women.







Mike Long Track: Home of Champions

Among the many features within the McIntosh Building, are:

- Men's locker room with 50 full-length oak lockers
- · Women's locker room with 70 full-length oak lockers
- · Student-athlete lounge that looks out over the track
- · Medical preparation area with wet area, approximately 900 square feet
- Six coaches' offices, a graduate assistant area, a conference room and a coaches' locker room on the second floor
- Existing building has been modified to have a press area/meet administration area on the second floor and a storage room and squad room and visiting medical area on the bottom floor
- Wireless Internet access in all areas and a two-story, vaulted entryway that will be used to display the rich tradition and history of the men's and women's track and field and cross country programs.
- All visitors to the track will enter through the Legends Plaza that will be erected to showcase the best and brightest of the Seminole Track Family to be completed in the summer of 2008.

Mike Long Track's primary role is to serve as the training and competitive home to

Seminoles, whose men won the 2006 and 2008 NCAA Championships, and whose women have also claimed a pair of NCAA team titles. Each spring Florida State hosts as many as three events at its facility, kicking things off each March with the FSU Relays.

Named after FSU's first full-time head track & field head coach, the complex has attracted some of the top meets in the nation. Mike Long Track and the City of Tallahassee played host to the USA Track and Field National Junior Championships in 1988 and the AAU National Championships in 1991.

Florida State has also hosted the Atlantic Coast Conference Outdoor Track and Field Championships three times (1992, 2005 and 2015) and will do so again in 2016. It was also the host site for the 2008 NCAA East Regional Championships. Great Britain's Summer Olympic team staged its training camp in Tallahassee and utilized the track prior to the 1996 Games.

To this day it still serves as the training site for a good number of national and world class athletes - many of them former Seminole greats - who are competing post-collegiately under the guidance of members of the FSU staff.



All-Time Men's Head Coaches

Ken Miller, 1949-54 Ken Miller was the first head track & field coach in Florida State history, leading the program for six seasons. Miller oversaw the program's launch, including the site of the original track on the old west campus, near where Tallahassee Community College is today. The Seminoles compiled a 20-15 record during his career. He began his competitive track career at Marin Junior College and moved to the University of Oregon in



1937, before embarking on a coaching career that took him from the high school ranks to the University of Michigan. Following World War II he accepted a position as head track coach at Lock Haven (Pa.) State College, where he was also an assistant football coach. Miller completed his doctorate degree before taking the FSU position in 1949.

Mike Long, 1955-77

Mike Long came to Florida State as an assistant football coach in the fall of 1953 from Fort Myers, but soon expanded his duties to the basketball court and track, where he settled into the post as the patriarch of the program. In his 23 years at the helm, the Seminoles amassed a remarkable 131-32 record, including five undefeated seasons. On six other ocassions his team's lost just one meet. He excelled as a coach in the



heat of battle and instilled a fierce sense of competitiveness in his athletes. Universally acknowledged as the Father of Florida State Track & Field, he put the Seminoles on the national map. The Mike Long Track complex is named in his honor.

Dick Roberts, 1978-88


Dick Roberts spent 18 years as a member of the FSU coaching staff, leading the Seminole to a 92-25-1 record while claiming 11 consecutive Metro Conference titles and nine top 20 finishes. He coached 34 athletes to 71 All-American honors, including four national champions. Among that group was two-time Olympian and national champion Walter McCoy, who returned from the Los Angeles Games with a gold medal in the 4x400 relay.



He spent eight seasons as an assistant to Mike Long in addition to serving as the head cross country coach and an academic advisor. As an FSU student-athlete (1961-64), the St. Petersburg, Fla. native lettered three times as a middle distance runner, and held several school records.

Terry Long, 1989-2003

Terry Long spent 15 seasons as the Seminoles' head coach, maintaining the same level of excellence that was established by his father, Mike, and that he enjoyed as an FSU student-athlete. An outstanding hurdler, he had the nation's fastest time in the 220 hurdles as a senior. Long guided FSU to its first Atlantic Coast Conference champions, winning four consecutive league titles - indoor and outdoor - during a three-year span. One



of his many highly-acclaimed student-athletes was Kim Batten, who claimed a silver medal in the 400 hurdles at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta and also competed in the Sydney Games four years later. Long's association with the program began as a 13-year-old, when his father Mike began his FSU legacy in 1953 and stepped into the same role 21 years after his retirement.

2006 Outdoor

Led by sprinter Walter Dix and thrower Garrett Johnson, the Seminoles claimed the school's first men's track & field NCAA Championship by powering past runner-up LSU by a 67-51 final count on the campus of Cal State Sacramento.



2008 Outdoor

With sprinter Walter Dix and long jumper Ngoni Makusha claiming individual golds, FSU stacked up eight first-team All-American honors at Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa to once again edge LSU for the team title, 52-44.



2007 Top Scorers

The Seminoles actually lifted the trophy three consecutive times, only to have its 2007 crown vacated by the NCAA Committee on Infractions several years later. Two golds from Walter Dix, one from Ricardo Chambers and a 4x100 relay triumph propelled FSU to a 54-48 final edge over LSU for a second consecutive year at Cal State Sacramento.





Walter Dix: Most Decorated Nole Of All Time

Over a four-year stretch from 2005-2008, Florida State sprint star Walter Dix was arguably the greatest collegiate track & field athlete of a generation. The Coral Springs, Fla. native won eight NCAA titles, set the standing collegiate 200-meter record (19.69) and still ranks No. 5 all-time among collegians in the 100-meter dash (9.93).

What is not debateable is Dix's position as FSU's most decorated track & field athlete. His 18 first-team All-American certificates leads all Seminoles: men and women.

More importantly, he was the linchpin to the greatest fouryear run in program history. FSU followed up a fourthplace NCAA Outdoor finish in 2005 with three* consecutive team titles. The Seminoles were eighth at the 2005 NCAA Indoor Championships, but finished no worse than third each of the next three years. Had Dix not missed

the '08 meet due to illness, FSU would have undoubtedly overcome its three-point final defict to champion Arizona State for an indoor national crown.

Dix won four ACC individual titles in his 2005 rookie season between the indoor and outdoor campaigns, sweeping Freshman of the Year honors. It was the first of two noteworthy ACC sweeps of his career. FSU won all eight men's team titles - four each, indoors and outdoors.

Though Dix currently retains only two school marks - the 200 indoors and outdoors - his meteoric career with the Noles opened recruiting doors. As a result, FSU remains one of the elite sprint programs in the country.

Fittingly, Dix capped his 2008 senior campaign by winning two bronze medals at the Beijing Olympic Games.



From trailblazers Frances Hall and Judy Blucker, to Ken Miller, who moved over after launching the first men's team, the Florida State women's track & field team quickly rose to national prominence with the aid of several distinguished head coaches.

Hall was the first head coach for the women's team in 1969 and passed the torch to Blucker, who spent the 1970 season at the helm. It was Miller, architect of the first men's teams from 1949-54, who provided the Seminoles with stability for a four-year run (1971-74) at the helm. By the time Paul Toran took over in 1975, adding track duties to his successful stint as the cross country coach, the Seminoles were building the foundation for one of the strongest programs in the ration.

After six seasons, Toran was succeeded by his former assistant Roger Smith, who guided the Seminoles to back-to-back third-place finishes at the AIAW Outdoor National Championships in 1981 and '82. Smith actually took a leave of absence during the '82 season, recruiting for the 'Noles from his home in Oregon, while leaving the day-to-day duties to assistant Gary Winckler. Winckler assumed the role as interim head coach and ushered in the NCAA Championship era, taking over the program full-time a year later.

Under Winckler's direction the Seminoles rose to their greatest heights to date. An NCAA Outdoor runner-up finish in 1983 was the precursor to a grand run as FSU followed with a fourth-place Indoor finish in '84 before claiming the program's first NCAA team title Outdoor that season. As an encore he directed the loaded squad to the 1985 NCAA Indoor title in 1985 and a share of second-place at the '85 Outdoor Championships before departing.

From 1986-2003 Terry Long, the son of legendary men's coach Mike Long, continued to turn out All-American talent. His tenure included bringing FSU its first ACC women's title Outdoors in 2000. Upon retirement, Long passed the torch to assistant Bob Braman - now in his 12th year at the helm - who has produced five NCAA top 10 finishes and a pair of ACC Triple Crowns.

Since its inception in 1969, the Florida State women's track & field program has produced two NCAA team titles and eight podium (topfour) finishes at the championships, to go along with 20 individual and eight relay golds at the NCAA Championship level. In all, 15 different women have represented FSU at the Olympic Games.


Led by a dynamic corps of sprinters the 1984 Florida State women piled up a meet record 145 points, out-distancing runner-up Tennessee by 21 to claim the program's first national title at Historic Hayward Field in Eugene, Ore. Randy Givens claimed two sprint golds and Marita Payne added one of her own. Together they teamed with Brenda Cliette, Michelle Finn and Janet Davis to sweep both relays en route to the championship. Cliette was the runner-up to Givens in the 100 and 200, Payne backed her 400 gold with a bronze in the 200. Finn was fourth in the 100 and Davis was sixth in the 200. FSU also received scoring contributions from Ovrill Dwyer-Brown, Chris McKay and Joann Brown in the hurdles, Kelley Hackler and Nancy Rettie in the middle distance events and Wendy Markham in the high jump.

1985 Indoor

On the heels of its first outdoor championship the previous spring, coach Gary Winckler's retooled 1985 squad claimed the NCAA Indoor title at the Carrier Dome in Syracuse, N.Y. The Seminoles nipped fellow powerhouse Texas, 34-32 for the crown behind individual titles from Michelle Finn (55m) and veteran Esmeralda Garcia (triple jump). Nancy Rettie placed third in the 1000m and joined Kelley Hackler, Christine McKay and Brenda Moore on the fifthplace 3200m Relay. Garcia rounded out the scoring with the third-place finish in the long jump.




