1990-91 Season Outlook

Lady Seminole Basketball: The Dream Team

As the Florida State Lady Seminole basketball team looks ahead to the 1990-91 season, head coach Marynell Meadors must be living out a coaches dream come true.

How many teams can boast a 21-9 record, an NCAA Tournament appearance, have the same starting five and 11 of 14 players off that team returning? Is Meadors the envy of coaches around the country.?

"All I can say is, is that I am very proud of this group of returning players," said Meadors. "Our seniors have been the foundation of the FSU teams of the late '80s. They have been the group that has allowed us to establish ourselves nationally. But, we must look ahead and try to be an even better team this season."

Returning for the 1990-91 season are an average of 69.3 points of the 76.7 that the Lady Seminoles scored in the past season. On the rebounding side, 35.2 rebounds per game return from a total of 39.5 that was averaged in 1989-90.

It all began to take shape in the January 8, game against Tulane in the Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center. Meadors sent Wanda Burns, Robin Corn, Chris Davis, Chantelle Dishman and Tracy Walker to mid-court for the opening tip. That game resulted in a 103-66 win for the Lady Seminoles.

Those five continued as starters for the rest of the season and are projected as the starting combo for a November 23 tipoff against Missouri-Kansas City in the St. John's Lady Bear Classic for the 1990-91 season opener.

"The big key to our success will be our pressing defense," said Meadors, speaking of the coming season. "That will present many offensive opportunities for us. To start those offensive opportunities, the team will have to do a better job of rebounding. But our sophomores of this year now have a sense of how to be successful due to a full year of experience. And we've got plenty of senior leadership this season."

Leading the Lady Seminoles into 1990-91 are a trio of senior starters which have had their hands on the ball since they suited up for Florida State three years ago.

Wanda Burns, Robin Corn and Chris Davis, "have been a foundation for starting the program and its tradition," according to Meadors. The trio of veterans saw action in all games of the 1989-90 season while ending the season as one, two and three in the minutes played category.

Of the three, Wanda Burns, a 5-8 guard from Macon, GA, is the playmaker. Burns defines quickness on the basketball court. A first-team All-Metro Conference selection, Burns can score from the outside, penetrate the lane for a layup, grab rebounds and drive the length of the floor, send a no-look pass to a waiting post player or pick an opponent's pocket clean for a steal.

While averaging 17.8 points and 4.2 rebounds per game, Burns added 103 assists and 77 steals to her final tallies. If that's not enough, she set a new single season free throw record, connecting on 115 of 139 freebies for an .827 accuracy mark. Should her seemingly endless energy supply stay intact, Burns will become the tenth Lady Seminole to eclipse the 1,000 point mark, as she enters the season with 822 total points.

Calling the shots for FSU on the floor is point guard Robin Corn, a 5-9 Asheville, NC native, who has started 82 of

84 games since the 1987-88 season. Currently fifth among alltime career assist leaders, Corn enjoyed her finest season in 1989-90 averaging 7.3 points, 4.6 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 2.0 steals per game. With 87 assists, she will become the FSU career leader in that category.

With Corn running the court, "it's just like having a coach on the floor," according to Meadors. "She makes so many right decisions out there. And they usually lead to good things."

Playing the key swing position in the Lady Seminole offensive attack is 5-9, forward from Pensacola, FL, Chris Davis. With a 13.3 ppg career scoring average, Davis surpassed the 1,000 point mark late in the 1989-90 season and will continue to progress in the coming season.

A second-team All-Metro selection for the past two years, Davis has the ability to change the pace of a game with a hot shooting hand. Besides her scoring abilities, Davis totalled 92 assists and 58 steals last season and even more surprising considering her guard-like stature, she led the team with 27 blocked shots.

This season, according to Meadors, could be the one to show the true talent of Davis. "Chris has had three good years for FSU, but that outstanding year is still waiting. This could be it."

With that senior talent, it's hard to believe that Meadors still has two experienced underclassmen in the starting five.

Breaking into the collegiate ranks as the Metro Conference Freshman of the Year, Chantelle Dishman, a 6-1 forward from Lexington, KY, led the team with 203 rebounds for an average of 7.0 per game. Scoring came easy for Dishman as well. As the team's third-leading scorer, Dishman came alive in the big games scoring 25 against Georgia and 18 in the NCAA Tournament game against Penn State and 17 against Southern Miss. The fact that she had six double figure scoring and rebounding games is not to be overlooked.


Dishman's running mate at the post position will once again be fellow sophomore, Tracy Walker, a 6-2 center from Quincy, FL. With Walker and Dishman in the middle, FSU has a dominant force. Averaging 6.8 ppg and 5.1 rpg, Walker made her inside shots count as she hit 74 of 125 field goals for a .592 percentage.

The wealth doesn't stop after the starting five. The 1989-90 season saw the Lady Seminoles with nine players clocking an average of 10 minutes of playing time a game or better. Meadors says that the bench is even deeper for the coming year.

"As the players gained experience last year, the depth becomes better for this year," said Meadors. "We will definitely be able to keep fresh people in the game. This means a more aggressive team on the floor at all times."

First off-the-bench and fighting for a starting spot is 6-

1 sophomore forward Tia Paschal. With the size and agility to play both inside post and outside wing, Paschal averaged 8.7 ppg and 4.7 rpg in 1989-90. After being named to the Metro Conference All-Rookie team, Paschal capped her season with a 32-point performance in the Metro Tournament and earned a spot on the all-tournament team.

"With versatile players like Tia Paschal, we can spread the floor out more," Meadors said. "She can play either inside or outside and that tends to confuse defenses."

Also seeing time in all 30 games of last season was Danielle Ryan, a 5-10, sophomore point guard from Medford Lakes, NJ. Ryan was there to spell Robin Corn when needed and made lasting impressions as both an excellent ball handler and shooter.

The experienced bench continues as Meadors can turn to seniors Karen Galloway, a 6-2 center from Lake Wales, FL and Kelli Test, a 5-9 guard from Ringgold, GA, in a pinch. At 6-2, Galloway can be a force in the middle and blocked seven shots in 21 games last season. Test is a constant three-point threat and picked up good experience over the summer playing on an international level in Costa Rica.

Also available for duty are FSU's pair of juniors, Tanya Fowler, a 5-9 guard from Live Oak, FL and Shannon Hodge, a 5-11 forward from Mechanicsburg, PA.

Adding outside shooting depth to the 1990-91 FSU lineup are a pair of freshmen. A 5-6 guard from Joliet, IL, Alison Arnoldi hit 47 percent of three-point attempts as a high school junior and was successful on 37 percent of the long shots as a senior. Christy Derlak, a 5-10 forward from Dayton, TN, is one of the versatile types that can spread the floor and can move from inside to outside.

All this assembled talent is a must considering the 1990-91 schedule the Lady Seminoles will face. On tap for the year are seven opponents which advanced into post-season play last season. NCAA Tournament teams from 1989-90 include; LSU, final four participants Virginia and Auburn, Southern Mississippi, Georgia and South Carolina, while Miami took part in the WNIT.

"I don't think the schedule can get much tougher," Meadors said. "I've always been one to play a tough schedule. It's easier to get a team prepared for name schools. We now have the type of players who want to play a tough schedule and are striving for name recognition."

The name recognition is now waiting to fall in Florida State's direction. The 1990-91 team has the experience of playing and winning big games. But there are four months and 27 opponents standing in the Lady Seminoles way. Will the dream be lived out?

On September 15, 1990, Florida State University officially joined and became the ninth member of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Of FSU's 16 varsity sports, all but football will begin competition in the ACC with the beginning of the 1991-92 athletic year.

Beginning with the 1991-92 season, the Florida State Lady Seminole basketball team will compete on a home-and-home basis with:

Standing five foot, five inches, Marynell Meadors may be small in stature. But what she lacks in physical size, she makes up for with big ideas and expectations.

Her big ideas convinced Florida State administrators to give her a chance to turn around a fledgling women's basketball program almost five years ago. Her big expectations were to bring Florida State into national prominence with three recruiting classes.

With the 1989-90 class of freshmen, plus two previous recruiting efforts, the Florida State Lady Seminoles were looking at a 21-9 record and an appearance in the 48-team NCAA Tournament at the season's end.

It's not to say that all this came about easily. Meadors and company struggled early. But consider this. In the monumental 1989-90 season, FSU topped a two-season win total of just four years ago and in the last two seasons, the Lady Seminoles have more than doubled the two-season win total of just a few years ago.

Yes, things have progressed nicely due to a wide open, fast-paced, defensive pressure style of play which the Lady Seminoles have perfected, and followers have come to enjoy.

In a successful 20-year coaching career, Meadors has proven herself in places other than at Florida State. In 16 seasons at Tennessee Technological University, Meadors accumulated 363 wins after starting the program from scratch in 1970. She became the first women's coach to win 300 games at one institution and ranks fourth among national leaders in career wins with 418.

After her first taste of success at FSU, a 16-11 campaign in the 1988-89 season, Meadors took that same brand of basketball to the 1989 Olympic Festival in Oklahoma City, OK as the coach of the north team. Following an opening round loss to the east team, her

squad rebounded to win its other two games and avenge the earlier loss to take the gold medal.

The Festival victory puts Meadors in line to coach other international teams in competition such as the Pan American Games, World Games and the United States Olympic team.

In her 20 years as a head coach, Meadors has produced 14 20-win seasons, won the Ohio Valley Conference Championship four times while at Tennessee Tech and was named the Ohio Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 1978 and 1984. Twelve times, under Meadors, Tennessee Tech advanced into post-season play.

The 1989-90 season proved to be a season of firsts in her long career as she experienced the same accolades, but this time it was as head coach of Florida State. She picked up her first 20-win season at FSU, was named the Metro Conference Coach of the Year and advanced into post-season play.

As a spokesperson on the sport, Meadors has been honored with positions on several selection committees during her coaching career. Since 1976, she has been a member of the Selection Committee for Women's Basketball Top 25. She has also held posts on the Kodak All-American Selection Committee, the Stayfree Coach and Player of the Year Awards, the Converse Coach of the Year Award, the National Sports Festival Selection Committee, the U.S. Olympic trials and the NCAA Mideast Basketball Committee.

At Florida State, Meadors has worked to educate the community on women's basketball. She is a regular speaking guest at local functions and has worked to publicize Lady Seminole basketball through newspapers by being available for interviews at any time. The 1988-89 season produced a landmark as Meadors initiated the broadcast of all FSU games on radio and also appeared on a weekly television show reviewing past games and previewing the upcoming opponents.

Following the big ideas and expectations of Marynell Meadors, Florida State women's basketball is headed for big things in the 1990-91 season.



Entering her fourth season on the Florida State coaching staff, Robyn Markey, has learned the ins and outs of the women's basketball world as one of the finest recruiters in the nation. As recruiting coordinator, Markey has established direct linet to the player of the year in the states of Florida and Georgia.

Markey's recruiting talents over the past three years has brought in a new corps of players to fulfill the Marynell Meadors dream of bringing FSU to the top of

the women's basketball pack.

Markey is no stranger to the Meadors' style of coaching. She was the starting point guard for the Meadors-led Tennessee Tech Golden Eaglettes from 1977-81, a period which Tennessee Tech won 88 games. She holds a spot in the Tech record book with 134 games played to rank first and also is listed in five all-time categories including scoring and rebounding. She capped her career at Tech as the captain of the squad her senior year.

After serving as a volunteer coach at Tennessee Tech for the 1981-82 seasaon, Markey moved on to an assistant coach position at the University of Delaware for the 1982-83 season. She then accepted the head coach

position at the University of Vermont.

In addition to her collegiate coaching experience, Markey has served as director of several basketball camps—including ones in Vermont, New Jersey and Belguim. She currently assists in the Marynell Meadors Basketball Camp. She also has gained valuable promotional experience working with the Kargaroo and Pro Keds shoe companies.

Besides her recruiting talents which she devotes to FSU women's basketball, Markey coaches the Lady Seminole guards and post players in daily practices and

assists with on-floor coaching duties.

Freda Glover enters her third season as an assistant coach for the Lady Seminoles as one who can take care of business both on the court and off.

While Glover, a former collegiate post player, can be found sweating it out on the floor with FSU posts and guards, she also assists to keep the Florida State operation running

smooth in the office.

With a bachelor's degree in business administration from Cheyney and a master's degree in public administration from Missouri, Glover heads up the FSU scouting procedure and follows the academic progress of Lady Seminole athletes. She also assists Robyn Markey in the recruiting progress, as well as her on-court duties. In the off-season, she assists with the Marynell Meadors Basketball Camp.

During her four years as a player at Cheyney University in Cheyney, Pennsylvania, Glover started for the highly successful basketball team at center and consistently ranked

among national scoring and rebounding leaders.

Following graduation, Glover continued her education at Missouri while beginning her coaching career. As an assistant coach at Missouri, the Lady Tigers won the Big 8 Conference in the 1982-83 season.

Last summer, Glover was the head coach of the Christian Sports Outreach International Team, a group of college-aged women which played a nine-game tour in Europe. Traveling through Belgium, Austria, Germany and Holland, Glover's squad finished with a 6-3 record.

A noted speaker, Glover is an active member in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.
