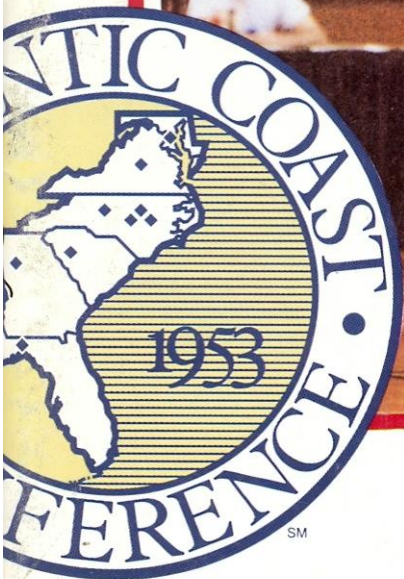
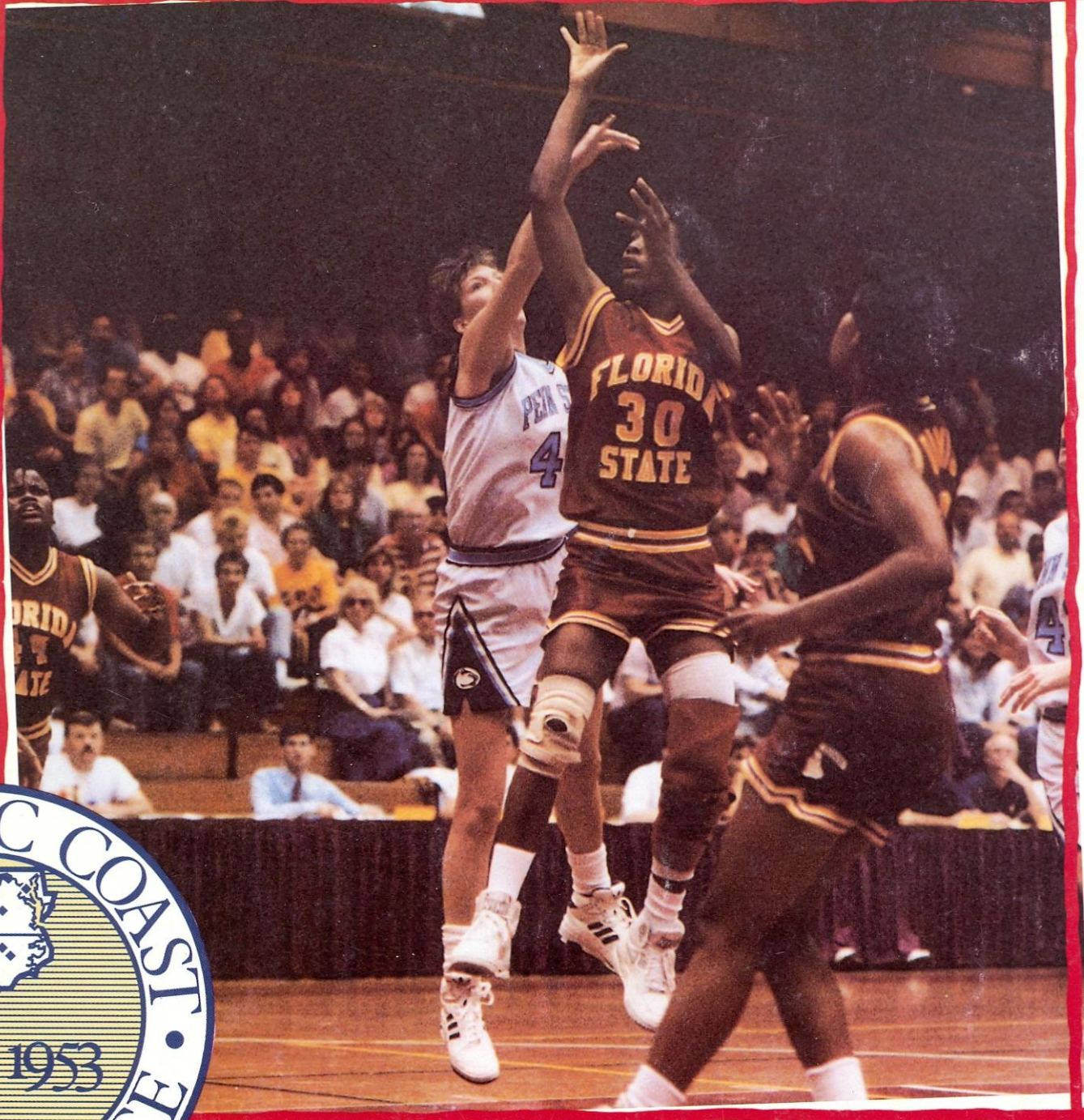

PRESS CREDENTIALS:

Request for working press credentials should be directed to

Kim McWilliams through a letter or by phone (904) 644-1091 with at least two days notice. For FSU home games at Tully Gym, media will be seated along the press table on the floor in front of the North stands. Parking areas around Tully are not ticketed during events.

PHOTOGRAPHERS:

Accredited photographers will be admitted to Tully upon presentation of appropriate credentials. The use of flashes will not be permitted in the gymnasium. Working area for all photographers will include the floor area at both ends of the court and along the side of the playing floor opposite the benches. All

television camera persons should abide by the same guidelines as still photographers.

RADIO BROADCAST:

Sections for radio broadcast are reserved at Tully Gym for both home and visiting teams. WNLS 1270 AM will broadcast all games. A line will be available for visiting radio broadcast.

GAME SERVICES: Pre-game notes, rosters and a running play-by-play will be provided along with shot charts, half time and final statistics. Coaches quotes will be provided upon request. A FAX machine is available in Room 100. Arrangements to have box scores or any other written

materials faxed can be made through the SID.

PLAYER AND COACHES INTERVIEWS:

Head coach Marynell Meadors and her players will be more than happy to accommodate the media with interviews. Media representatives may contact Kim McWilliams to set up telephone or personal interviews with players. The best time to reach Coach Meadors by phone is before 11 AM.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS:

Following a five-to-ten minute cooling off period, Coach Meadors and her team will be available for the media in Room 100.

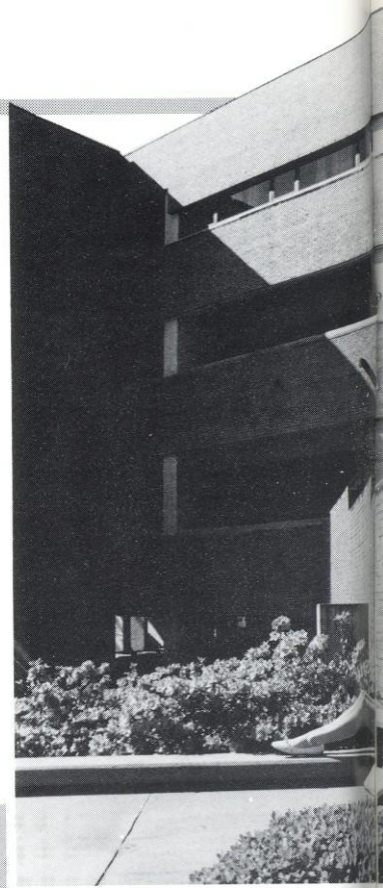
The main campus is spread over 347 acres in Tallahassee.

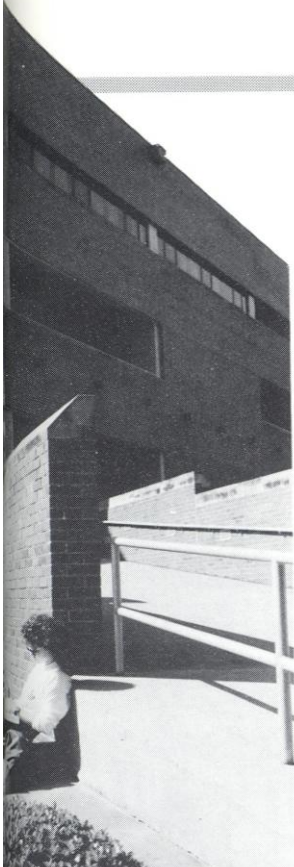

These far reaching programs are but a few of the 271 graduate and undergraduate degree programs offered at Florida State's eight independent colleges. With 1,533 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members

of both the National Academy of Sciences and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel Laureates.

Florida State continues to progress and grow — from its foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women and its coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution. In all areas of teaching research and service, Florida State University is advancing boldly into the 21st century.





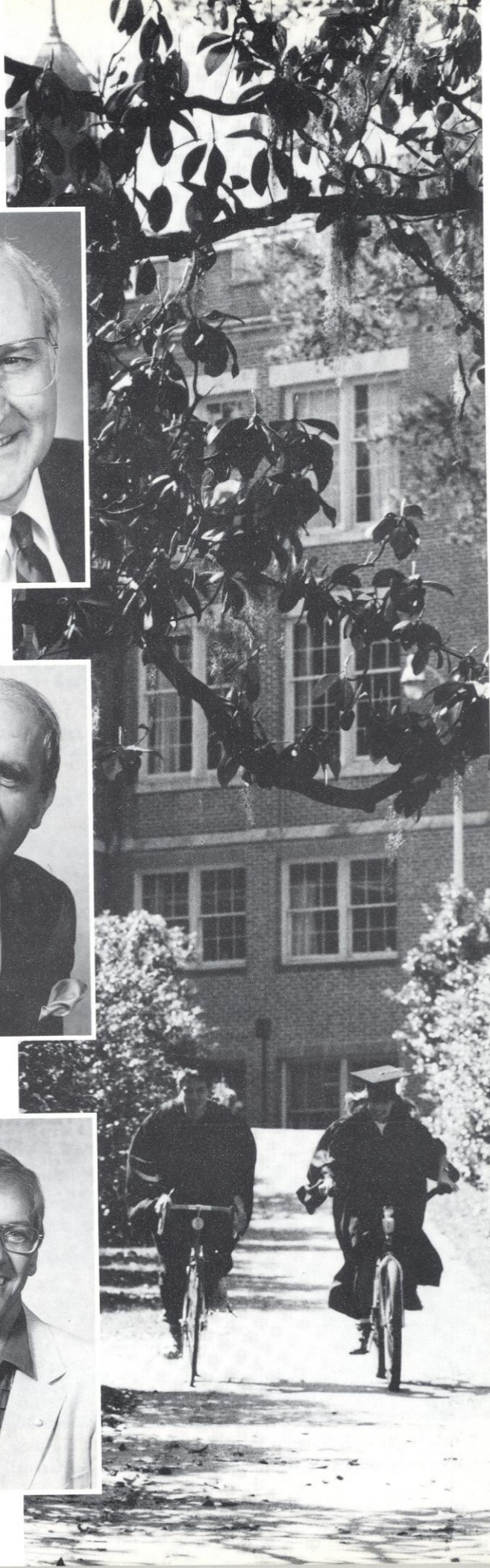
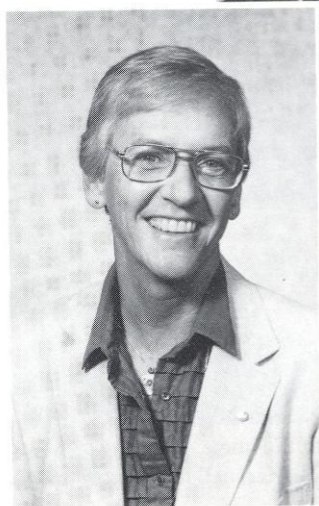

OUTLOOK

The 1991-92 Lady Seminole Basketball Team

Fans who have followed Marynell Meadors over the last five seasons at Florida State have seen the development of new era in the women's basketball program. And if you ask Meadors she'll say it's only the beginning.

The Lady Seminoles have enjoyed success over the past few years. After taking a first ever Metro Championship and the school's only first round NCAA win last year, the Seminoles head into the most prestigious conference in the country ... the ACC.

"The team is really excited about playing in the ACC," said Meadors. "It's a competitive conference and brings us into a new level of basketball. We're not sure how we'll stack up at first, but I have the utmost confidence in this team."

One of the reasons for Meadors' confidence is the fact that five of her starters return after a record-breaking year in 1990-91.

Senior Robin Corn is one of those players. Corn, "a true leader and quarterback for the team," went down last year in the second game of the season with a knee injury. Her absence was thought to be disastrous at first. Corn accumulated 269 assists and 141 steals in her first three seasons at FSU to rank her at the top of the all-time records. But something positive did come out of Corn being a red shirt - junior, Danielle Ryan.

Ryan, playing opposite MVP Wanda Burns, gained the confidence and playing time to help her develop as a player. She finished the season with 9.7 ppg, and hit double figures in 16 of FSU's 32 games.

"It was major when Robin went down at the beginning of the season, but Danielle really came in and did an impressive job," Meadors said. "She exceeded every goal I had for her last year and will be a definite leader for us this season."

The junior power continues from a pair expected to lead the Lady Seminoles once again. Chantelle Dishman and Tia Paschal will no doubt be an important key to this premiere season in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Dishman was named MVP of the Hilton Classic last year in addition to earning recognition on two all-tournament teams. In only her second collegiate season, Dishman averaged 16.2 ppg and 7.7 rpg. She recorded a season high 34 points against Marquette in the third game of the year and finished the season ranked third nationally in field goal percentage (.656) while setting a Metro Conference and Florida State record.

"Chantelle definitely estab-

lished herself as a power forward last year. The ACC should be a real challenge because she'll be going up against the best in the country," said Meadors.

Paschal continues to be a consistent threat at the number three forward position. She scored in double figures in all but five games and averaged 13.9 ppg. Besides being named Metro Player of the Week, Paschal was selected to the All-Metro Team.

Rounding out the top five returnees is junior, Tracy Walker. The playing time Walker received last season is her strongest asset. Her continuous improvement was obvious with each game she played.

"Tracy is one of the best scoring forwards we've ever had, plus

she's a great rebounder," said Meadors.

Also bringing depth to the Lady Seminoles this season are seniors Tanya Fowler and Shannon Hodge. Both are three year letter-winners who have provided solid back-up to the team.

Christy Derlak and Alison Arnoldi proceed to the sophomore ranks. Arnoldi will be a strong three-point shooter this season and "has the ability to play a lot of basketball at FSU." Derlak, the team's sixth player last season, will return to her position at forward after averaging 4.4 ppg.

Also joining the sophomore roster is Mary Berryhill, who returns to the Lady Seminoles after a three-year stay in the

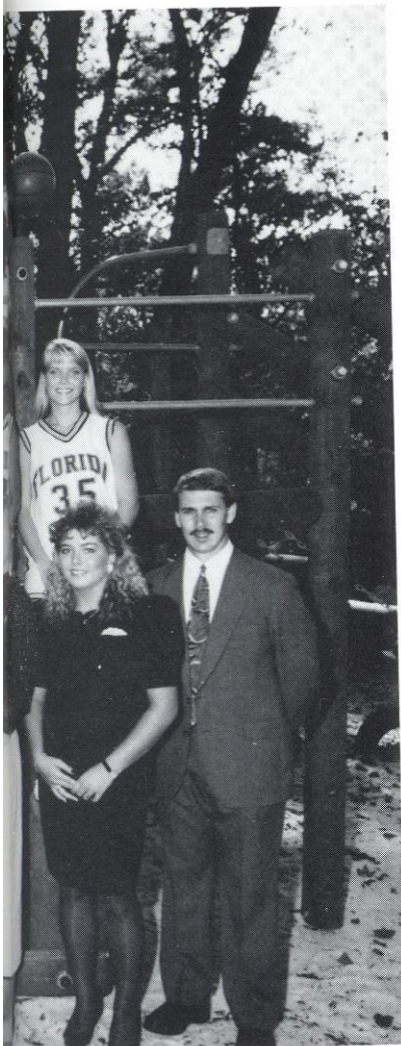


Army. Berryhill, formally Mary Buchannon, played for FSU as a freshman in 1987 and returns as a more physical conditioned center at an intimidating 6-6.

Meadors is also anxious to work with her four freshman coming in this season **Katina Cobbins, Liberty Taylor, Connie Robinson, and Allison Peercy.**

"I expect to see the freshmen compete for a few positions," said Meadors. "The younger ones are quick athletic players and the older ones are going to have to work hard to keep up."

A new challenge, new players, and the same press and run strategy are sure to earn the team another successful season as they continue the winning tradition of Florida State basketball.

Marynell Meadors has made the move to make women's basketball a winning tradition at Florida State University. Stepping into the position and rebuilding the program was no easy task, but after five seasons, 80 wins, a Metro Championship and two NCAA appearances ... she can truthfully say "We're on our way."

Meadors enjoyed a successful 16 year career at Tennessee Tech where she built the program from scratch. She accumulated 363 wins, became the first women's coach to win 300 games at one institution and ranks in the top five among national leaders with 443 career wins.

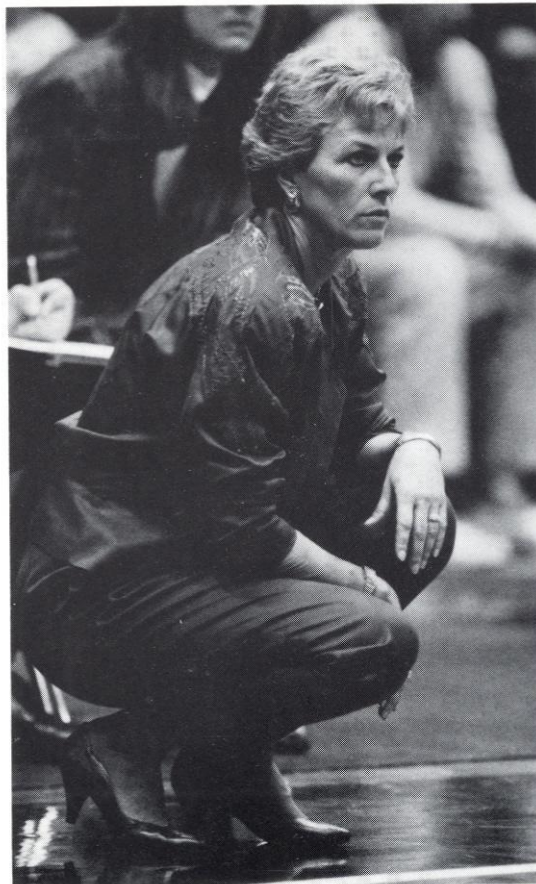
While at Tennessee Tech, Meadors produced 14 20-win seasons, won the Ohio Valley Conference Championship four times, was named Coach of the Year twice, and advanced her team into post-season play 12 times.

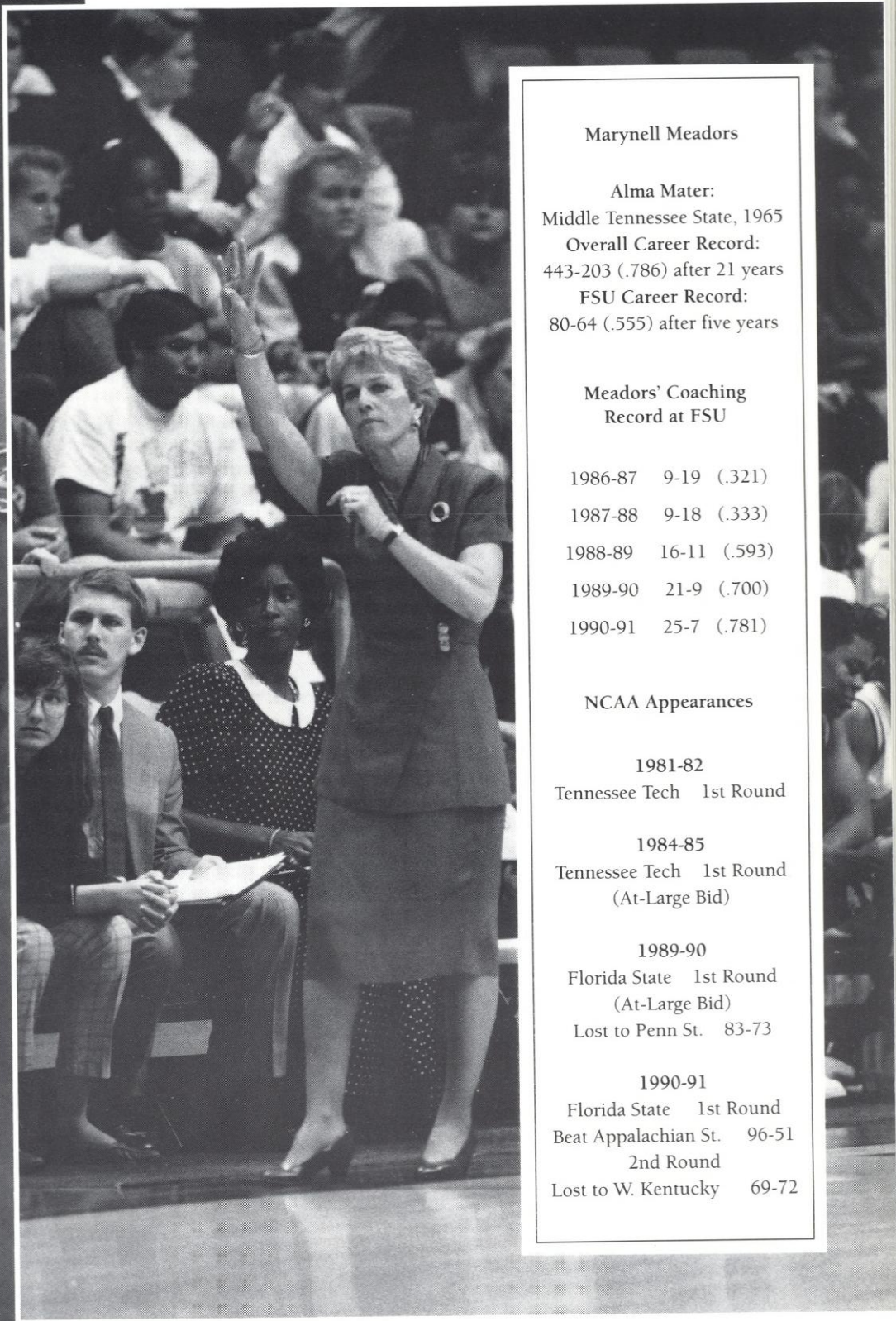
In her career at Florida State, Meadors was named Metro Conference Coach of the Year for the 1989-90 season and Co-Coach of the Year in 1990-91. She has led the Lady Seminoles into the NCAA play-offs the last two years in row.

In 1989, Meadors served as head coach for the North Team at the Olympic Festival in Oklahoma City, OK. Following

an opening round loss to the East team, her squad rebounded to win its other two games and avenge the earlier loss to take the gold medal.

As a spokesperson on the sport, Meadors has been honored with positions on several selection committees during her coaching career. Since 1976, she has been a member of the selection committee for Women's Basketball Top 25. She has also held posts on the Kodak All-American selection committee, the Stayfree Coach and player of the Year Awards, the Converse Coach of the Year Award, the National Sports Festival selection committee, the U.S. Olympic Trials and the NCAA Mideast Basketball Committee.

Robyn Markey has been instrumental in the success which the Lady Seminoles have enjoyed over the past few years. She serves as the coordinator for recruiting, supervisor of fall conditioning, director of the Little Lady 'Nole Club and organizer of Meador's summer camp.

A 10-year coaching veteran, Markey is no stranger to the press and run style which Meadors brought to Florida State. She started at point guard for Meadors at Tennessee Tech from 1977-81, where she earned her degree in secondary education. Markey is still listed in seven all-time career records at Tennessee Tech.

After graduating and serving on her alma mater's coaching staff for a year, Markey took the assistant coaching position at the University of Delaware for the 1982-83 season. She then moved to the University of Vermont where she was the head coach before joining Meadors at Florida State.

Originally from Mt. Laurel, NJ, Markey has a sister and four brothers one of whom is her twin.

Entering her fifth year on the Lady Seminoles coaching staff, Freda Glover continues to provide valuable insight to the game before and after the tip-off. Glover works throughout the season scouting future teams which has assisted the Seminoles in reaching their 46 wins over the last two seasons. She is also involved in recruiting new athletes, supervising the academic progress of the players and coordinating Meadors' team camps during the summer.

After a successful four year career as the starting center for the Lady Wolves at Cheyney State University of Pennsylvania, Glover continued her education at the University of Missouri where she was also the assistant basketball coach. Glover's 1982-83 squad claimed the Big 8 Conference championship title. After completing her master's degree, she moved to her present position as assistant coach at Florida State.

Glover was born in Natchez, Mississippi and moved to Atlanta where her mother still resides.

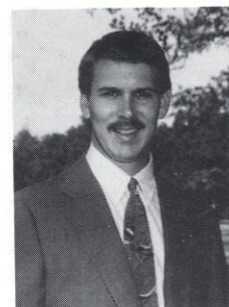


KAREN KRAEMER

Review of a Championship ...

Five years ago when Marynell Meadors stepped in as head coach, she wanted to make FSU's women's basketball program a winning tradition. The successful 1990-91 season proved they are well on their way.

The season brought many accomplishments for the Lady Seminoles: the team won 25 games for the first time in eight years; they brought home a Metro Championship; the NCAA first round win against Appalachian State was a first; the two wins over South Carolina were the first in the 18 game series; for the first time in eight years the team was ranked in the AP Top-25.

The season's success had much to do with the phenomenal play of third team All-American Wanda Burns who averaged 18.5 ppg, rebounded 4.5 rpg and tallied 136 assists on the season. Burns led the Seminoles in eight categories and racked up honors and awards including being named MVP of the Metro Tournament and Player of the Year. Her absence due to graduation will certainly be felt along with the space left by fellow senior Chris Davis. Davis finished the season with 10.7 ppg and 5.5 rpg. Between Burns and Davis, they averaged over 50 minutes of playing time in each competition.

The Lady Seminoles did not disappoint the more than 9,400 fans that came to Tully Gym and the Civic Center to watch the action. The team took only two losses at home, one in double overtime to South Carolina (91-92) and the second to top-ranked Auburn (64-79).

The highlight of the season came at the end when the Lady Seminoles went into the Metro Conference Tournament as regular season co-champions for the first time ever. After defeating Cincinnati and then host-team Louisville, the Seminoles went into Sunday's championship game against

South Carolina, a team they had only beaten once in 13 years.

"It was the most exciting game of the season," said Meadors. "Winning the Metro Championship has been a goal for years. What a great way to go out of the conference."

The 54-53 Seminole victory went down in the history books along with a follow up first round NCAA win against Appalachian State. More than 1,300 fans gathered in Tully to witness the 96-57 win.

The Lady Seminoles ended their season with a three-point heart-breaker to Western Kentucky in the second round. But Meadors and the team had little to be disappointed about after accomplishing so much in one year.

"Now that we've been there, we know that's where we want to be," said Meadors. "This team now *knows* what it's like to be a champion, and that puts us one step closer to a national title."
