THE FLORIDA STATE WOMEN'S BASKETBALL PROGRAM enjoys some of the finest video production in the country through Seminole Productions.

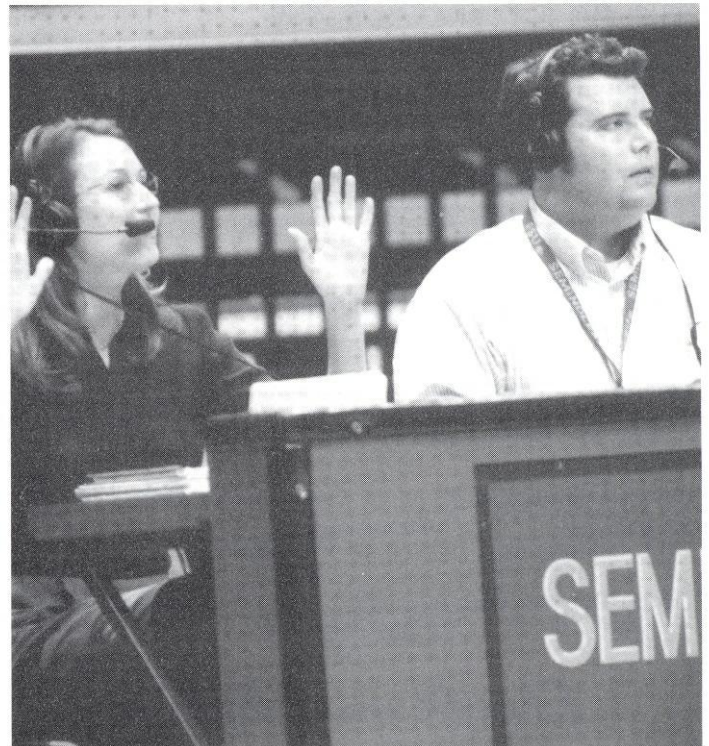
Seminole Productions is an educational auxiliary of the Florida State University Department of Communication. The department began in 1988 by producing an athletics television series called "Seminole Uprising."

Since then, the relationship with FSU athletics has grown. SP now provides virtually every video service in the athletics area including the Bobby Bowden Show, Seminole Basketball Highlights with Sue Semrau and Steve Robinson, The Mike Martin Show and Seminole Sports Magazine, which are aired weekly in the Southeast Region on Sunshine Network. SP also handles the production for In-Game Entertainment of FSU football and men's and women's basketball.

Under the direction of Mark Rodin, Seminole Productions provides complete professional-quality video production services to University Departments, Schools, Colleges, Divisions, and other

activities. Seminole Productions also provides services to state government, local government, and FSU related entities. SP has also produced nature documentaries, informational and training videos, and even an opera for television.

Projects are supervised by the industry's finest professional producers while seniors in the Media Communication program in the Department of Communication provide the crews.

Seminole Productions award-winning productions are produced using high-end, network-quality video equipment. SP uses Betacam SP and Digital DVCam for videotaping, and do master editing on Avid Non-Linear, digital editors and Betacam SP in order to assure a high-quality finished product.

SP also has sophisticated digital video effects equipment and can perform complicated 3-D animation and multi-layer compositing effects. Complete studio facilities are also available.

The Seminoles on Radio

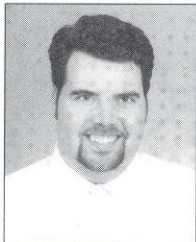
Florida State University's marketing office announced in May that it has extended the contract with WTNT-FM and WNLS-AM of Tallahassee to continue as the flagship stations for Seminole athletics through the 2002-2003 athletic season.

The three-year deal features expanded coverage of Seminole athletics with all football and men's basketball games carried live on WTNT while 16 women's basketball games will be carried live on WNLS this season.

"We have enjoyed our relationship with our flagship stations and are very pleased that we are able to extend and expand on that relationship in this contract," FSU Director of Athletics Dave Hart said.

"Clear Channel is thrilled to be a long-term partner with Florida State to present the premiere sports program in the Southeast," John Hunt, Vice President and Market Manager, Clear Channel Communications said. Todd Van Dyke returns for his second season as the voice of the Seminoles while former Seminole Liberty Taylor will serve as the color analyst for the third straight season.

Van Dyke is a native of Rochelle, Ill., but has lived in Tallahassee for six years and is very active with the FSU Athletics Marketing and Promotions Office.

Taylor, who hails from New Orleans, La., lettered for Florida State from 1991-95. She graduated in 1996 with a degree in nutrition and fitness. In 1999, Taylor earned her master's degree from FSU in Communications and is currently working for Porter Novelli, a public relations and marketing firm based in Washington, D.C. Taylor is also

Florida State University & Sunshine Network

Florida State University and Sunshine Network announced a multi-year contract in August that ensures Sunshine Network will continue to be the exclusive Florida cable home of FSU athletics for many years to come. Six regular-season women's basketball games will be shown on Sunshine Network in 2000-01.

As the first major television property to sign with Sunshine Network prior to its 1988 inception, Florida State and the network have enjoyed a long relationship that has provided Seminole fans with extensive coverage of their athletic program rivaling that of any other Division I program in the country.

Sunshine Network is the state's largest and leading regional sports network with more than 4.8 million cable homes statewide and across the nation via satellite. Under terms of the new long-term agreement, Sunshine Network will televise a minimum of six football games annually on tape delay and produce and make available for distribution those games designated under applicable conference rules for pay-per-view. In addition, the network will produce one preseason football show, a highlight show featuring

the annual spring football game and be entitled to produce a preview show in advance of FSU's appearance in any post-season bowl game.

Also included in the agreement are the rights to a minimum of 10 baseball games and a minimum of 14 women's events including basketball, volleyball, soccer and softball.

Other programming

includes highlights shows for fall and spring sports, call-in and/or coaches shows, "Seminole Summer Showcase," highlighting replays or highlights of previous FSU events, "Seminole Sports Magazine," "Seminole Uprising" and more. Additional FSU athletic events, including men's and women's basketball, are available to Sunshine Network from the Atlantic Coast Conference and its rightsholders.

Part of Sunshine Network's commitment to FSU over the years has been in the area of public affairs programming. This will continue under the new agreement with a variety of programs produced by FSU that will air during Sunshine Network's daily public affairs block.

Sunshine Network will also assist FSU with on-air, website and other promotions, providing multi-media support for the program to the network's vast audience.

"Our contractual partnership with Sunshine Network provides an extremely valuable distribution avenue for Florida State University events which are showcased within our own state and well beyond," FSU Director of Athletics Dave Hart said. "This extension affords us a very comprehensive means of exposure which enhances every facet of our athletics program. We are pleased to extend our contract and relationship with the people at Sunshine Network."

"Extending our relationship with FSU is a formidable milestone in our continued role as the leader in providing coverage of Florida sports to Florida sports fans," Sunshine Network Corporate Vice President and General Manager Jim Liberatore said. "As one of the country's most recognized and respected institutions, both academically and athletically, we value our partnership with FSU and look forward to providing them with unparalleled distribution, quality production, and creative promotion for years to come. Obviously, as a Florida based sports network, Sunshine Network considers Florida State a programming cornerstone and one of our most important partnerships."

"WE SEEK A WHOLENESS OF HEART, but we do not expect to reach the promised land without going through some wilderness together." It was the theme of the Florida State women's basketball European tour this summer and it couldn't be more fitting, because after three years together, Sue Semrau and her Seminoles are more ready than ever to take it to "The Next Level" in 2000-01.

An extra week of practice, four games in Europe and 10 days of travel, not only brought the Seminoles closer as a unit, but it made them hungry.

"The players are more driven and focused than I have seen them before," Semrau said. "We played great basketball in August and every player made a commitment to doing what it takes to move to the next level."

With 10 returning letterwinners, the experience is obvious, but having the opportunity to practice and compete in the month of August adds even more promise to a season filled with high expectations.

FSU could have a variety of looks at the point guard position. Junior April Traylor, a natural

The Seminoles will have a wealth of leadership with four seniors on the roster. Brooke Wyckoff, a third team All-ACC and ACC All-Defensive Team selection last year, headlines the group. She spent her third straight summer with USA Basketball and was a starter on the elite Jones Cup Team, that won the Gold Medal in Taipei, Taiwan in July and played the USA Olympic team in September in Hawaii. Veterans Vanessa Fuchs and Lako Brown bring a great deal of knowledge, solid work ethic and unselfishness to the team. Levys Torres adjusted well to the Division I game last year after transferring from Chipola Junior College and after winning a bronze medal with her Colombian National Team at the Pan American Games in German, Puerto Rico, she is ready to make the most of her final season.

"The seniors are all leaders in different ways," Semrau said. "Brooke's level of playing experience, not only as a starter at Florida State, but with her USA Basketball experience, is extremely important to our leadership. Vanessa is the hardest worker on our team. She fights for everything, has an extremely positive outlook and has a strong desire to take this program to the next level in any way that she can. Lako is such an unselfish player. She leads by the mere fact that although she hasn't seen a whole lot of playing time, she is rewarded with the respect based on who she is. Her character is to put others first and give encouragement. She's the consummate team player. What Levys was able to do stepping in from a junior college has been a huge lift. She is an

two guard, took over the starting position at the point last year and ranked second in the ACC at 5.2 assists per game. This season, with junior Lakesha Springle and newcomer Petra Hofmann, Traylor will likely see more minutes at her true position. Springle, who played in 28 games last year, has worked extremely hard this summer and was arguably the most improved player during the team's European tour. Hofmann, who hails from Pees,

Hungary, has a lot of experience coming in at the position, not only from her junior college, but on her Hungarian National team.

"I really thought April developed nicely as a player at the point guard position," Semrau said, "but we'll have a lot more versatility and freedom with Petra and Kesha. They are similar players, while April provides a different look. Both Petra and Kesha have the instinct to be good distributors first and scorers second, whereas April becomes a scoring threat at the point. We definitely have options and depth at this position."

The two-guard position is pretty wide open for the Seminoles. Traylor, who was second on the team in scoring at 12.7 points per game, has the most experience at the position. She will be challenged by Fuchs, who has had an outstanding offseason and showed great offensive production in four games in Europe. Sophomores Molly Beal and Shinikki Whiting will also vie for substantial playing time. Beal played in 27 games and earned her first career start in the ACC Tournament while Whiting, who may be the most explosive of the group, had offseason knee surgery and will be ready for action in late November.

"There will be a lot of fight at that position," Semrau said. "All of the players are talented enough to be impact players. Who will start, we just don't know, but if we want to run, then it is great to have people who don't have to play 35 minutes a game."

Wyckoff, who averaged 10.8 points and a team-leading 7.1 rebounds last year, will occupy the three spot, with Brown and Whiting adding depth. Transfer Tasheika Morris will have to sit out this season, but will be a valuable practice player who will challenge the players at this position.

"Brooke has become a great three player," Semrau said. "She's improved her game as a pull-up and a long-range shooter. She's always been a nice penetrator, and a great rebounder and defender and now she's become a threat in so many different areas. Never before have I felt like Brooke had the desire to be a scoring threat that she has now. Lako, who played very well in Europe, challenges the other players and is ready to contribute on the floor when called upon."

Replacing All-ACC player Latavia Coleman will not be easy, but Semrau has a host of talent ready to step up. Torres, who started 13 games in 1999-2000, will be a dominant force inside. Tempo was an issue for Torres, coming from a junior college, but once she adjusted, she showed vast improvement. Katelyn Vujas played in all 29 games and averaged 19.3 minutes per game — the most of all newcomers last year. She averaged 7.2 points and 4.0 rebounds per game. Lauren Bradley started nine games before a foot fracture sidelined her for four weeks. She averaged 6.6 points and 3.8 rebounds per game.

"With a year of experience under their belts, all three of these

players are very capable of starting," Semrau said. "Levys is more comfortable and confident this season and is ready to be an impact player. Katelyn has worked really hard this summer and is becoming more of a power, low-block player, but she also has the ability to step out and hit the jumper. A healthy Lauren Bradley is an awesome finesse player who can do so many things. She can play the high post and is a great passer. I think we will be very mobile and versatile at that post spot."

A contest with UNC-Asheville on Sunday, November 19th at the Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center will get the ball rolling for the Seminoles, who will play 18 games against teams that participated in postseason action last year. FSU will have 13 regular-season home games, including two contests in the 2000 *Tallahassee Democrat* Seminole Classic, November 25-26, which features Michigan State, Virginia Tech and Chicago State.

The Seminoles will have an early date with the Gators this season when FSU visits Florida in Gainesville on November 21st. The Tribe's schedule is also highlighted by a pre-Christmas road trip to New York where the Seminoles will play St. Francis and Fordham. Other non-conference opponents include Central Florida, UT-Chattanooga, Mercer, Coppin State and Xavier.

"I think this year's schedule presents some great challenges for our program," Semrau said. "Obviously, the ACC will once again be strong, but I think we've scheduled some non-conference opponents that will prepare us well for our conference season."

"New York is the seniors' choice for our pre-Christmas trip and it will be a great opportunity to experience a different part of the country. There's not a more perfect time to be in New York than Christmas time. We play two teams with new coaches and I am sure will their programs will have a lot of enthusiasm and freshness."

The Seminoles will also be able to reap the benefits of the European trip the team took in August. FSU embarked on a 10-day journey through France and Switzerland where the Tribe went 4-0.

"Our European tour was a trip of a lifetime," Semrau said. "Not only did it allow us to compete, but we played against some solid teams. The opportunity to spend 10 days together overseas was a real team-bonding experience. As far as the educational aspect, that's just immeasurable. Not many people their age, or any age, get that opportunity."

HEAD COACH • FOURTH YEAR • CALIFORNIA-SAN DIEGO '85

"I HAD A PASSION AND DESIRE TO BUILD SOMETHING," Florida State women's basketball head coach Sue Semrau said upon her hiring in June of 1997.

From the moment she stepped onto the Florida State campus, Sue Semrau brought hope and excitement back to the Florida State women's basketball program. With vast coaching experience at two Division I schools, Semrau brought a great deal of wisdom and vision to a program starving for such nourishment.

"Sue's integral role in the building process at two different programs, along with her tremendous energy and reputation as a recruiter, were the most important profile characteristics in her selection as our women's basketball coach at Florida State University," FSU Director of Athletics Dave Hart said.

From the moment she stepped onto the Florida State campus, Sue Semrau brought hope and excitement back to the Florida State women's basketball program.

Semrau's philosophy in rebuilding the Florida State program has been a simple one. Semrau runs her program in such a way where players are treated as people first, students second and athletes third. She is a relationship coach who believes in initiating relationships rather than waiting for others to do so.

After three seasons at the helm of the FSU program, Semrau's style has been embraced by all who have come in contact with her. She has won the hearts of the Florida State media, fans and most importantly, the student-athletes, which has become very

evident in her recruiting success. Semrau and her staff brought in the nation's 8th-ranked recruiting class in 1999. The current FSU roster is highlighted by a *Parade* All-American, six *USA Today* honorable mention All-Americans, 1999's Miss Florida and Miss Alabama Basketball recipients as well as a three-time USA Basketball performer in senior Brooke Wyckoff, who is one of just 12 players nationally, and the only ACC player, to be named to the 2000 Jones Cup Team.

Semrau's friendliness and ease with the media have prompted the group to refer to her as the "female Bobby Bowden." And the "Lunch with Sue," — a Booster-sponsored biweekly luncheon on campus — has become so popular that the event had to be moved to a larger room.

Her commitment to community service has also been a priority for the program and it all starts on the court. Following every Seminole home game, fans are invited to circle the court to meet the players and coaches. But that's just the beginning. The Seminoles have performed a variety of services, including the Walker Ford Tutorial Program, in which the players donate two hours of their time on Saturday mornings to tutor elementary-aged children. They have helped package and deliver meals with Elder Care Services for the "Meals on Wheels" program, cleaned and cooked at the Ronald McDonald House, done lawn work and helped plant a garden at a local women's shelter, gone Christmas caroling at a retirement home and visited children in the Pediatrics Ward.

From day one of her reign, Semrau emphasized a need to build consistency in every facet of the women's basketball program from when and where the Seminoles practices, to where they hold meetings, to what time they eat dinner. With Semrau's arrival to Florida State in the summer of 1997, the Seminole women's basketball program had had three different head coaches in three years. Now in her fourth season, Semrau's commitment to building a respectable program at FSU has provided stability to the once-floundering program.

Florida State has seen dramatic improvements in Semrau's three seasons. In her first season, she led FSU to the most victories since 1992-93 and its best ACC record and finish in five years. In 1999-2000,

the Seminoles had their best season under Semrau's direction. Latavia Coleman, Brooke Wyckoff and April Traylor all received All-ACC honors while Coleman was the first FSU player since 1993 to earn ACC All-Tournament first team honors.

Prior to coming to FSU, Semrau served three years as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Wisconsin under Badger Head Coach Jane Albright. Semrau joined Albright at Northern Illinois in 1991 where she assisted in leading NIU to three consecutive NCAA tournament appearances.

In her three seasons at Wisconsin, Semrau contributed to the Badgers' three straight winning seasons and two NCAA tournament appearances, including the program's first ever back-to-back 20-win seasons. Wisconsin also posted its best record in program history, a 21-8 mark in 1995-96, during Semrau's tenure.

"With the hiring of Sue Semrau, Florida State has demonstrated its commitment to the total student-athlete," Wisconsin head coach Jane Albright said. "Sue will very much be a player's coach. Every athlete in her program will become a better person, student and athlete. She is an accomplished recruiter, and her knowledge of the game is exceptional. This hire ensures a positive future for Florida State women's basketball."

Semrau has also been noted for her recruiting efforts at Wisconsin with a 1995 recruiting class that ranked eighth in the country by Blue Star Index. The Badgers' 1997 class features the program's first WBCA Prep All-American and the first multiple *Parade Magazine* honoree.

In the summer of 1996, Semrau was the head coach of a team of college alumni that competed in the Athletes in Action Spring Australian Tour.

Semrau came to Northern Illinois after serving as head women's basketball coach and assistant athletic director at Occidental College in Los Angeles for four years where she compiled a 51-47 overall record. She also coached soccer for two seasons and was responsible for the administrative duties of fundraising and promotions at the Division III institution. At Occidental, Semrau was a member of the NCAA regional selection committee and chaired the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference for women's basketball.

Prior to her appointment at Occidental, Semrau worked as the public relations and promotions director for the L.A. Heat professional soccer team from 1986-87, and the public relations director for the Seattle Storm soccer team in the previous year. In 1986-87, she also served as an assistant basketball coach at Santa Monica High School.

A native of Seattle, Wash., Semrau is a graduate of Shorecrest High School where she earned all-conference honors in her senior year. She went on to attend the University of Puget Sound for two years, garnering Freshman of the Year honors. Semrau transferred to the University of California-San Diego in 1984 where she ranks 13th in all-time scoring and fourth in all-time assists. In 1985, she graduated from the University of California-San Diego with a bachelor's degree in communications, and received her master's degree in athletic administration from the University of Southern California in 1988.



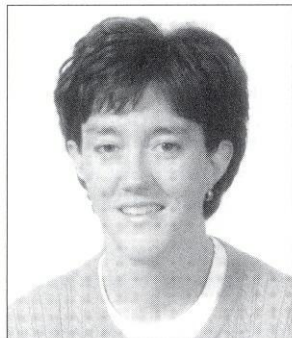

THERESA A. GERNATT, KNOWN BY MOST AS COACH "TAG", begins her fifth season as the top assistant coach for the Florida State women's basketball program. Gernatt came to FSU as an assistant coach in 1996 and retained her position upon Sue Semrau's arrival in 1997. Her familiarity with the FSU athletics program was a great advantage to Semrau as was her familiarity with the coaching staff that Semrau assembled. Gernatt worked with Semrau and Angie Johnson back in 1994-95 when she served one year as an administrative assistant for the Wisconsin women's basketball program.



As Semrau's top assistant, Gernatt is instrumental in Florida State's recruiting process, serving as the program's recruiting coordinator. Her efforts were rewarded in 1999 when she and the women's basketball staff signed the No. 8 ranked recruiting class in the nation. With Gernatt's help, the current FSU roster consists of a *Parade* All-American, six *USA Today* honorable mention All-Americans, 1999's Miss Florida and Miss Alabama Basketball recipients as well as three-time USA Basketball performer, senior Brooke Wyckoff.

Gernatt came to FSU in 1996 after serving one year as an assistant coach at Mississippi State. At MSU, Gernatt monitored the academic progress of the student-athletes, managed the program's tape-exchange and assisted with on-court responsibilities.

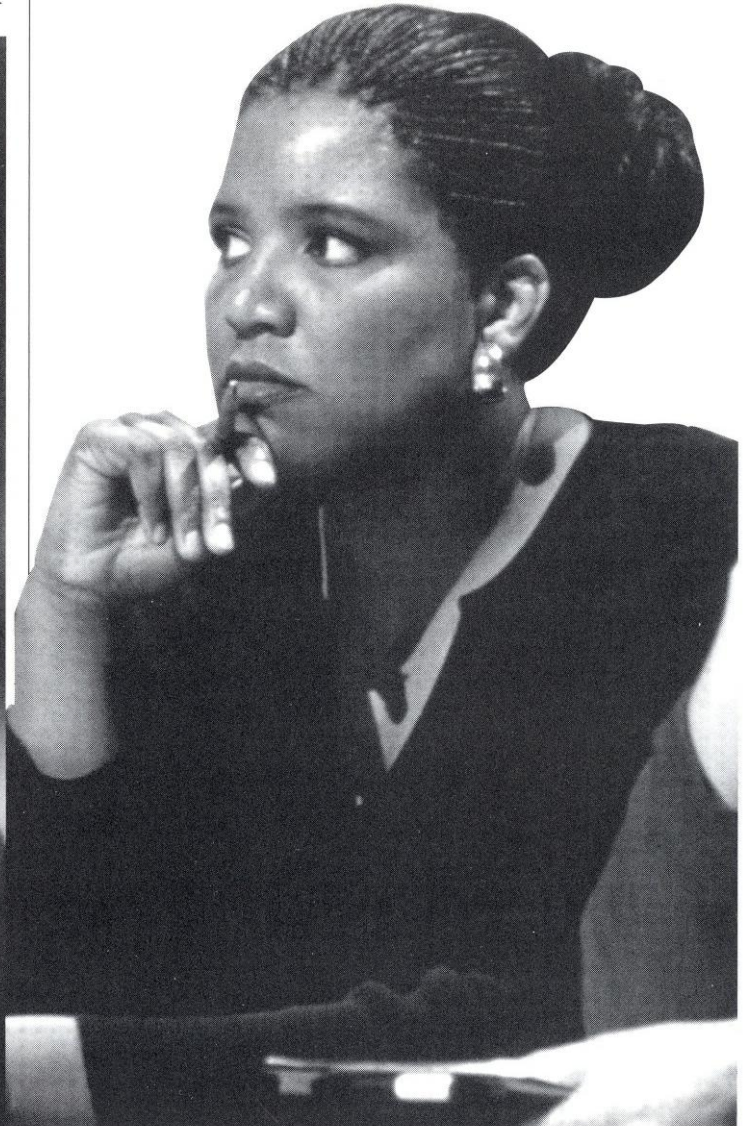


Aside from her on-the-court coaching duties, Johnson is responsible for monitoring the academic progress of the Seminoles. For three consecutive years, seven women's basketball players have earned their place on the ACC Academic Honor Roll — the most since Florida State joined the league. Johnson also works closely with the women's basketball support club, the Hoop Troop, and is very instrumental in the planning of such events as the an-

nual Hoop Troop Golf Outing and the Alumni Game.

Johnson, like Semrau, came to Florida State in 1997 from the University of Wisconsin, where she served as the Badgers' third assistant for three years. Some of her responsibilities at UW included opponent scouting, coordinating video exchange and arranging student-athletes community service. In her final season at UW, she also served as the team's academic liaison. Johnson was also active with the BadgerBall Booster Club, the Jane's Gem kids club and was co-director of the BadgerBall Girls Hoops Camp for two summers.

Prior to joining the Badger staff, Johnson was the assistant basketball coach at Paul G. Blazer High School in her hometown of Ashland, Ky. ROY HEINTZ, THE FORMER ATHLETICS DIRECTOR and Head Girls' Basketball Coach at The First Academy in Orlando, Fla., became the newest member of the Florida State coaching in July. He replaced Leslie Davies, who left the program after three years to pursue other interests.



Heintz was with The First Academy since July of 1996 where he compiled an impressive 72-25 record as head coach of the girls basketball team and led the Lady Royals to the 1997-98 and 1998-99 Florida Class A state championships. A two-time Florida Athletic Coaches Association District Coach of the Year, Heintz also oversaw and directed the Junior Varsity, Junior High and 7th grade girls teams. 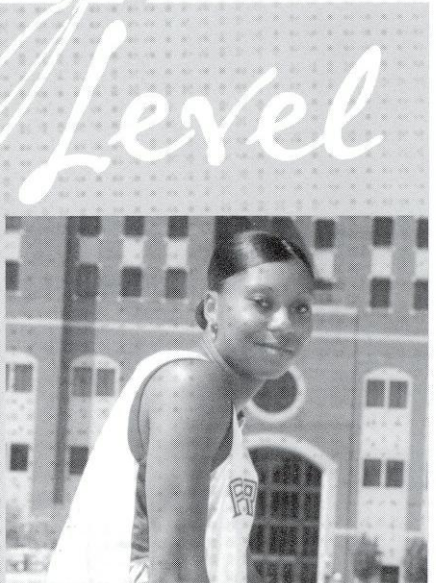

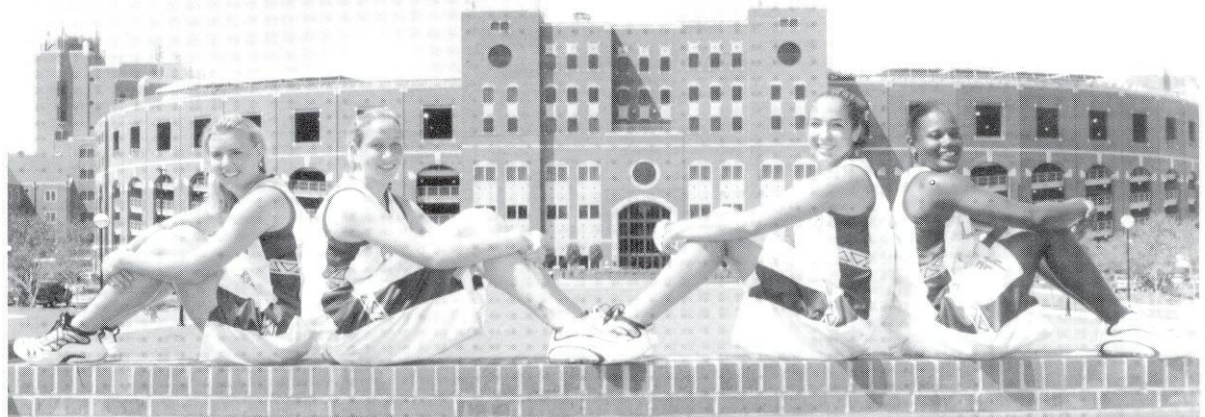
