## Sue galkantas Retired Number 43


By the time Sue Galkantas graduated from Florida State in 1984, her name was atop almost every individual statistical category in the Florida State records book. Galkantas was one of the most prolific scorers ever to play for Florida State, averaging 19.4 points per game in her career — a mark that still ranks number one on the FSU career lists. She scored an unbelievable 2,323 points over her four-year career (1980-84). That total is the most points ever scored by a basketball player male or female — in Florida State history. Galkantas shined from the moment


Galkantas shined from the moment she stepped onto the court. In her freshman year, she broke the FSU freshman scoring record and was named a freshman All-American in numerous publications. By her sophomore year, Galkantas had already scored her 1,000 point and established herself as one of the top 20 scorers in the nation. In addition to her individual ability, Galkantas will be remembered for her contribution to the FSU women's basketball team during her All-American junior season. She led Florida State to a 24-6 record and to its first trip to the NCAA Tournament. "She is our first bonatide All-

"She is our first bonatide All-American at Florida State," said former FSU coach Janice Dykehouse. "She's the person who is responsible for turning our program around. She could go down in the record books as doing for our program what Dave Cowens did here for the men's program at FSU."

Galkantas was indeed one of the alltime greatest athletes to ever don the Garnet and Gold. She scored in double figures in 115 of 120 career games played and still holds 16 FSU records. In 1989, Galkantas was inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame. At that time, she added another "first" to her resume as she was the first women's athlete in FSU history to have her number retired.









he Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame enjoys a rich tradition. Florida State is fortunate to enjoy an athletics program that reflects the integrity achieved by an academic institution with over 150 years of success. There are 196 members of the FSU

Athletics Hall of Fame. The first and largest class was inducted in 1977 and there has been a class inducted every fall since with the exception of 1996 when Florida State spent the year celebrating its 50th Anniversary of athletics.

Two former women's basketball greats, Sue Galkantas and Tia Paschal, are members of the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame.

## Sue Galkantas

Florida State may never forget the scoring power of Sue Galkantas, who with an amazing 2,323 career points, is the most prolific scorer in Seminole basketball history. That total is the most points ever scored by a player, male or female — in Florida State history.

By the time Gal-kantas graduated in 1984, her name was listed in nearly every statistical category in the FSU records book.

Averaging 19.4 points per game in her career — a mark that still ranks number one on the career lists — was just a glimpse of the impact that she had as a Seminole. In her rookie year, she broke the FSU freshman scoring record and was named a freshman All-American in numerous publications. By her sophomore year, Galkantas had already scored her 1,000th point and established herself as one of the top 20 scorers in the nation. In her junior season, she led FSU to a 24-6 record and to its first

trip to the NCAA Tournament. Overall, she scored in double figures in 115 of 120 games and still holds six career and single-season records. In 1989, Galkantas also became the first female FSU athlete to have her number retired.

## Tia Paschal

The Florida State women's basket-

ball program enjoyed its greatest success during the four-year career of Tia Paschal, who lettered for the Seminoles from 1989 to 1993.

A forward from Thomson, Ga., Paschal was an immediate contributor for Florida State and was a three-year starter after averaging 20 minutes of play as a rookie. She ended her career averaging 19.4 points and 7.4

> rebounds as a senior while earning first team All-ACC honors and second team All-America honors by the American Women's Sports Federation. During her career, she helped lead the Seminoles to two consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances in 1989-90 and 1990-91 as well as a Metro Conference championship in the 1990-91 season. Paschal's versatility

Hall of Fame 1989 facet of the game which is evident by the records she still holds at Florida State. She holds the records for points in a game (38), free throws made (14) in a game and steals in a season (96) and career (269). Paschal is also among FSU's top 10 in six season and seven career records and ranks second all-time in scoring with 1,662 points.

Paschal throughout her career. After redshirting the 1988-89 season with a knee injury, Paschal took the conference by storm as a freshman, earning Metro Conference All-Rookie Team honors. She earned Metro All-Tournament Team honors two seasons and was twice named the conference Player of the Week.

Paschal has continued playing the game that she loves professionally. Since her graduation in criminology in 1993, Paschal's professional overseas experience has included stops in Germany, Sweden and Spain. She also played one season with the Charlotte Sting of the WNBA.










he Florida State women's basketball program has had three players drafted by the Women's National Basketball Association and one other former Seminole who played one year in the league.

Latavia Coleman was drafted in the third round of the 2000 draft by the Houston Comets and then sent to the Indiana Fever in a draft day trade. Brooke Wyckoff and Levys Torres were both selected in the 2001 WNBA Draft, to the Latavia Coleman Orlando Miracle and Miami Sol, respectively, marking the first time that two Seminoles were drafted in one year by the women's professional league. Wyckoff, a second round pick and 26th overall, has been in the league four seasons, including two years with the Connecticut Sol. Torres, a third round pick and 37th overall, played just one season with Miami before returning to her native South America.



## **Q&A With Brooke Wyckoff**

**Q&A With Brooke Wyckoff** Former Seminole women's basketball great Brooke Wyckoff, a second round draft pick to the Orlando Miracle in 2001, has been in the WNBA for four years. On May 19, 2004, Wyckoff, in her second season with the Connecticut Sun, was placed on the injured list after she tore her ACL and she had to sit out the 2004 season. Overall, Wyckoff has played in 98 games, including 54 starts, in her WNBA career. In the off-season, she plays professionally for Mann Filter, based in Zaragoza, Spain. During the 2003 WNBA season, Wyckoff set career highs in points (17 vs. Minnesota) and rebounds (12 vs. Detroit) this season while helping lead the Sun to the Eastern Conference finals where they fell to eventual WNBA champion Detroit. FSU Sports Information caught up with Wyckoff and asked the former Seminole standout a few questions:



The WNBA? Brooke: Florida State women's basketball is a big time program with a great staff, coaches and a great group of people who prepared me in every way, not only in the basketball game, which was big, but in life also. Being a protessional not only has to do with being a basketball player but handling yourself professionally in the real world. Having a well-rounded group of people around me helped me to prepare.

## Was there any one thing that the coaches told you to be prepared for?

Brooke: My coaches at FSU instilled a work ethic in me that as long as I work as hard as I can work, good things will happen. All of the coaches prepared me for whatever situation came across. They told me that no matter what, keep working hard, have a good attitude and be coachable. Those are three things that have carried me through the WNBA even more than my actual basketball skills.

How are the coaches in the WNBA similar and different from Coach Sue? Brooke: My coach in Connecticut is Mike Thibault. He is similar to Coach Sue in that he is very encouraging. I need a coach that is encouraging -- not screaming all of the time at me when I make a mistake but helping me realize my strengths and giving me the confidence that I need to do the things on the court to help the team. Differences, Coach Sue was a great friend on and off the court and in the professional world it is a little different. I mean Mike is a great person, but he is my boss and obviously you don't have the chance to get to know someone that well in that setting.

## Tia Paschal

hal Outside of the game itself, how different is professional basketball compared to college? Brooke: There is a big difference. You go to work, which is practice or a game, and then you are done and you have your own free time. College basketball is a lot different. You have to keep up with your studies. There is a built in life around you with people your own age, activities to do other than basketball, obviously school. In the professional world, it is not like that. You're an adult. You take care of your own things and you don't have schoolwork to do so you have more free time, which can be a good or bad thing. Basketball is your job and that has to be your main focus where as in college, studies are your main focus first and basketball second.

## How different is the actual game?

Brooke: The game is different in the way that everyone is on the same level. From the person who plays 40 minutes to the person who plays two minutes a game on your team. Everyone has been a star in their college program or where ever they are from. Every team that we play in the WNBA each night has that same caliber of players. In the college game, you obviously play teams that are weaker or stronger.

What advice can you give players hoping to go into the WNBA? Brooke: My advice is to be the most rounded player you can be but also be great in one thing and stand out in one area. Also try to develop the parts of your game that may not be there right now because when you do get to the WNBA, a lot of people switch positions. It takes a few years, and hopefully a coach is willing to invest in you if you do change positions. Try to work as hard as you can. It is really just kind of luck and also a good work ethic and good attitude really takes you a long way in this whole thing.

What kind of adversity have you had to deal with as a professional player and did the adversity you had to deal with at FSU help to prepare you for that? Brooke: It has kind of been that way too in my professional career because the first two years we were not as successful as we wanted to be and then the whole move and people not thinking that it would really work out, our team wouldn't be good in Connecticut. We ended up making the playoffs and doing really well. Being at FSU taught me to put things in perspective. It is just a game. When things get rough, just buckle down and remember what is important and keep a good attitude because things will turn around. They always do.

What about Florida State's program and how it has grown? Brooke: I am proud to be a part of this awesome program. Anyone who is new and just comes to this basketball facility and sees this would be amazed. Not everyone knows just where it came from and just how hard the staff has worked to put it all together. People are recognizing it and good players are coming here and it is so exciting.
