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SEASON REVIEW

WHAT A YEAR!

With its 82-61 victory over Clemson on February 9th, FSU earned its 20th victory of the season. It is the first time since 1990-91 that FSU had earned 20 or more wins and just the fifth time ever in the program's history. FSU's 24 wins in 2004-05 is the fourth most ever.

THE BEST

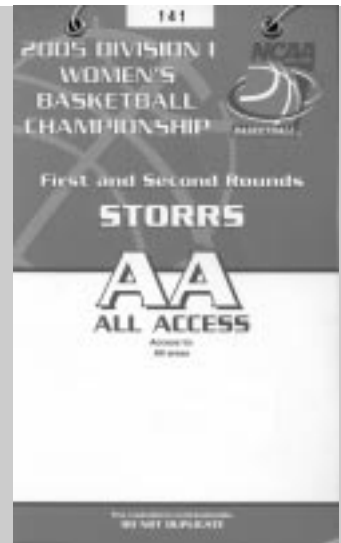
Florida State established the best start in program history in 2004-05. When FSU went 12-0 to start the season, it was the first time that a Seminole team opened a season with 12 straight wins. It was also the first time in program history that a Seminole team won 12 straight games.

THIRTY-TWO GAMES

FSU's NCAA Tourney second round game vs. UConn was the Tribe's 32nd game of the season. The last time FSU played 32 games in a season was 1990-91 when the Seminoles went 25-7. Overall, FSU has played 32 or more games just six times, including this season.

FSU IN POSTSEASON PLAY

In 2004-05, FSU participated in its fifth NCAA Tournament and first since the 2000-01 season. With the NCAA Tourney appearance, the Seminoles competed in their fourth postseason tournament in the last five years! Prior to FSU's participation in the 2001 NCAA Tournament, FSU hadn't played in a postseason tournament since 1990-91 - a 10-year absence. In all, FSU has played in five NCAA Tournaments and three WNITs.



NO. 6 SEED

FSU's No. 6 seeding in the 2005 NCAA Tournament was the highest seed the Tribe has had in the NCAA's current 64-team format. In 2001, FSU's last appearance in the NCAA tourney, the Seminoles were seeded No. 7. Prior to that, the last time FSU played in an NCAA Tournament, the field was just 48 teams. FSU was a No. 5 seed in the Mideast in 1990-91 and hosted No. 8 seeded Appalachian State in the first round.

FSU VS. THE FIELD OF 64

FSU was 7-5 in the regular-season vs. the 2005 NCAA Tournament field. Only two of FSU's seven regular-season losses were against teams not participating in the postseason. The Seminoles faced 10 teams in the regular season that participated in the Big Dance.



LEAGUE TEAMS IN THE NCAA'S

For the third time in conference history, the ACC had seven teams participating in the NCAA Tournament. It also happened in 1998 and 2001. The Atlantic Coast Conference, which was rated first nationally in the RPI rankings, had the most teams

participating in the NCAA tournament. The SEC and Pac-10 ranked second with five teams each.

"BIGGEST" WIN OF THE YEAR

Victories in the NCAA Tournament are always big wins, but this one really was. FSU's 33-point win over Richmond was the Tribe's biggest win, by margin, of the season and biggest since a 38-point win (80-42) over Troy State on Dec. 29, 2003. FSU has had a bigger NCAA Tournament win. In 1991, FSU had a 39-point win over Appalachian State.



2005 ACC COACH OF THE YEAR

The Atlantic Coast Conference announced March 4th that Florida State head coach Sue Semrau was named the 2005 ACC Women's Basketball Coach of the Year. Semrau, who also earned the distinction in 2001, guided the Seminoles to a fourth-place finish (9-5) in the ACC in 2004-05. FSU was predicted to finish eighth in a media preseason poll.

TO HONOR RONALDA

On June 8, 2004, the Florida State women's basketball program lost a special member of its family with the sudden death of Ronalda Pierce, a 6-5 post player from Ashburn, Ga. The players wore #55 on their shoes in her honor this season. The Seminoles paid tribute to Ronalda by celebrating the time, although too short, that they had with her.

NATIONALLY-RANKED

FSU spent five weeks nationally-ranked in 2004-05. The Tribe earned its first Associated Press ranking since 1991 and its first *USA Today*/ESPN coaches poll ranking since 2001 and highest ever at No. 19.

TEAM OVERTIME

The Seminoles had a school-record five overtime games this season and eight overtime periods in all! Never before had FSU played more than three OT games in a single season. If you count the eight overtimes the Tribe was involved in this season, it's actually adds up to 40 minutes — the same as a regulation game. Overall, FSU is 18-10 in overtime games. No other team in the NCAA Tournament 64-team field had more OT games this season than the Tribe. The ACC's Virginia Tech was close with four overtime games this year, including two in losses to FSU.



COMEBACK KIDS

The V Foundation for Cancer Research announced March 9th that the 2004-05 Florida State women's basketball team was among the finalists for the fifth annual V Foundation Comeback Award. The annual award is open to men and women collegiate basketball student-athletes in all NCAA divisions. It is awarded to an individual or a team who has accomplished a personal triumph in the face of true adversity, be it in health, life or moral dilemma.



WE GOT THE GATORS

FSU's win over Florida may have just been the game that propelled the Seminoles to such success this season. The 72-62 victory on November 22nd in Gainesville not only marked the first time in the Sue Semrau era that the Tribe had beaten the Gators, but the first time in 13 years. The last time FSU had beaten UF was in overtime (90-78) Dec. 15, 1991. The last time FSU had defeated UF in Gainesville was Dec. 17, 1990 (79-78).



THANKS FOR THE PASS

The Seminoles recorded a season-best 23 assists in the Richmond win. It was just the second time FSU has had 20 or more assists in a game. The other was 20 at Virginia Tech. LaQuinta Neely, who came off the bench and played 25 minutes, tied her career-best with eight assists. Holly Johnson added six assists.

2004-05 FINAL ACC STANDINGS

With the inclusion of new ACC members Virginia Tech and Miami, the ACC regular-season format this year included just 14 league games instead of the 16 games played in past seasons. Even with two fewer opportunities, the Seminoles matched their most ACC wins with their 9-5 league mark and a fourth-place finish. In 2000-01, FSU finished tied for third place, but was the No. 4 seed, with a 9-7 ACC mark. FSU has earned eight or more ACC victories in a season just four times and three of those times have been in the last five years under Sue Semrau's direction. Below is a look at what the media present at the 2004-05 ACC Women's Basketball Media Day predicted and what actually happened:

VALUING THE BALL

FSU tied its season-low with 10 turnovers in the Richmond win but even more impressive was the assist to turnover ratio. With 23 assists, the Seminoles managed more than two assists for every turnover in the game. FSU had more assists than turnovers in seven games in 2004-05.

ALL STAR SEASON

The Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) selected its all-star line-up for the 2005 WBCA All-Star Challenge Game and Florida State's Roneeka Hodges was among those on the list. On Saturday, April 2, 2005, Hodges was among the top 20 senior collegiate players in women's basketball who showcased their talents at the University of Indianapolis' Nicoson Hall. Hodges was also invited to participate in the WNBA camp and did so that same weekend.



REGION ALL-AMERICAN

The honors continued to come in for senior Roneeka Hodges. On March 14th, the New Orleans, La., native was named one of six members of the Kodak/WBCA Region II All-America Basketball Team released by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA). With the honor, Hodges is just the third Seminole to be named a Kodak All-Region All American and the first since 1982 when Lisa Foglio and Sue Galkantas garnered the accolades.

ALL-ACC

Roneeka Hodges, who played just one season for the Seminoles, represented Florida State on the All-ACC first team. With the honor, Hodges became just the third Seminole ever to garner All ACC first team. Former Seminole greats Tia Paschal (1993) and Brooke Wyckoff (2001) also earned first team honors. Junior Ganiyat Adeduntan and sophomore Alicia Gladden received honorable mention recognition.



ACC ALL-DEFENSIVE TEAM

Alicia Gladden was named to the five-member ACC All-Defensive team. She was the ACC's leader in steals and ranked among the Top 15 in rebounds and blocked shots per game. Gladden was the first Seminole to earn the honor since Brooke Wyckoff did so in 2000 and 2001.

ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT HONORS

Junior nursing major Ganiyat Adeduntan was named to the 2005 *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District III first team. She joined Virginia Tech's Erin Gibson on the five-member team. Adeduntan had a 3.52 GPA. She was voted first team out of 31 nominations representing 16 colleges and universities in the district which includes the states of Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia.



GLADDEN BREAKS 12-YEAR MARK

Alicia Gladden, who led the ACC in steals all season long, set an FSU record with 101 steals. She broke a 12-year record when she did so as the previous mark was 96 steals in 27 games set by Tia Paschal in 1992-93.

INTELLECTUALLY SPEAKING



Even before the victories started piling up, the Florida State women's basketball team had set a record but this time it had to do with points ... grade points. At the conclusion of first semester, the Seminoles earned an overall team grade point average of 3.27 — the best team single-semester GPA for Florida State in the Sue Semrau era. Eight of the 10 student-athletes on the team earned a GPA of 3.0 or better in the first semester.

HODGES SETS RECORD



Senior Roneeka Hodges' 39 points in the overtime win vs. No. 15 Maryland set an FSU record for points in a game. The previous record was 38 points held by Latavia Coleman (1998) and Tia Paschal (1993). Both Coleman and Paschal set their marks against North Carolina. Hodges recorded two 30+ point games this season. Only five other Seminoles have ever recorded multiple 30-point games in a single season.

QUEEN FOR A DAY

Senior Roneeka Hodges, nicknamed Queen, was Queen for a day when she scored a career-high 33 points, including 21 in the second half, to lead the Seminoles to a come-from-behind win over UT-Arlington. The 33 points was the most an FSU player has scored since Latavia Coleman had 38 points vs. North Carolina in 1998. Prior to that game, the last time an FSU player had scored 30 or more points was when April Traylor turned in 30 vs. Tulane in the first round of the NCAA Tournament on March 16, 2001.

JOHNSON'S FREE THROW SHOOTING WAS TOPS



Holly Johnson shot a team-high 83.7 percent from the free throw line this season which ranked second in the ACC and set a new FSU single season record. She was perfect from the free throw line 11 times.

LINNEA WAS LI-THREE-A



Linnea Liljestrand recorded four times as many three-pointers in 2004-05 than she did in the previous season and set the Florida State single-season record in doing so. Liljestrand, who had 56 career triples heading into this season, recorded a team-high 54 three-pointers.

The previous record of 51 was set by Wendy Hampton in 1996-97. She ranked 8th in the ACC in 3-pt field goals made per game at 1.69 and 7th overall.

NEELY WAS BRIGHT SPOT

LaQuinta Neely was Florida State's bright spot at No. 21 NC State when she tied her season-high with 10 points off of the bench. It was the second time this season she earned double-digits. The other time was also against a nationally-ranked team in the double overtime win at Virginia Tech. A quiet player whose contributions are not always seen on the stat sheet, Neely tied for first on the team with 4.0 assists per game and had six or more assists in six games, including a career-high eight in the Eastern Kentucky and Richmond wins.



LINNEA MORE THAN TRIPLED

Linnea Liljestrand became a leader for the Seminoles in 2004-05. Already a team captain off the court, Liljestrand also led the way on the court this year. She recorded double figures in a career-high 11 games this year which more than tripled the number of double digit games she had last year (3). She also had three double-figure games as a sophomore and six such games as a rookie in 2001-02.



BIG COUNTRY HAD BIG DAY

Redshirt freshman Nikki Anthony scored a career-high 15 points and grabbed a career-high nine rebounds to help the Seminoles to a come-from-behind win over Miami. Her previous high in points was just six while rebounds was eight. Her .857 shooting performance (6-7) in the game tied for the team best.

HANNAH WENT DOUBLE

Junior post Hannah Linquist exploded for a career-high 10 points in the FAMU win to record double digits for the first time in her Seminole career. Her previous career-high was seven points vs. Alabama State last year. She also grabbed two rebounds in 15 minutes of play.



GLADDEN WILL GET 'EM

Alicia Gladden grabbed a career-high 18 rebounds in the FAMU win. In fact, she already set her career-high in the first half with 11 boards in 18 minutes of play. The last time an FSU player recorded 18 or more rebounds in a game was when Levys Torres pulled down 18 vs. Wake Forest in 2001. An FSU player has recorded 18 or more rebounds in a game nine times (eight different players) in FSU history. Torres owns the record for single-game rebounds with 24 vs. Coppin State in 2000.

OFFENSIVE QUEEN

With 615 points this season, Roneeka Hodges now ranks third on the Florida State single-season scoring list. Only all-time leading scorer Sue Galkantas, who amassed 710 points in 1981-82 and 627 in 1980-81, has ever scored more in a single season than Hodges. Her 19.2 points per game average ranks fifth all-time on FSU's single-season list.

GANIYAT GOT ON UP

Ganiyat Adeduntan, FSU's rebound leader at 7.6 rpg, recorded double-digit rebounds 10 times, including a stretch of four straight games in February. Over the last eight contests, Adeduntan averaged 9.1 rebounds per game.

JOHNSON WAS KEY

As point guard Holly Johnson went, so did the Seminoles. In 20 games this season, the junior had a positive assist to turnover ratio and the Tribe went 17-3 in those contests. In 11 of those games, Johnson also scored in double figures. She was among the team-leaders in assists 21 times, including a career-high eight assists vs. Miami (OH) and Charlotte and had five or more assists in 15 games. She finished the season with 127 assists which set a personal single-season best.





LAUTSCH TOOK NO TIME AT ALL

Christie Lautsch played just seven minutes combined in the first two games and then came the Eastern Kentucky contest. In that game, Lautsch wasted no time at all making her presence known. She scored a team-high 16 points in 14 minutes and also grabbed four rebounds. The rookie finished the season strong averaging 6.0 rebounds per game in FSU's final two games, including a career-high seven boards in the Richmond NCAA Tournament win.

ADEDUNTAN EARNED ACC PLAYER OF WEEK HONORS

The Atlantic Coast Conference announced Monday, Jan. 24th that Florida State's Ganiyat Adeduntan was named Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Basketball Player of the Week, marking the second straight week a Seminole earned the award. Adeduntan, a junior forward had the game of her career as Florida State defeated North Carolina 79-73 in overtime. The Athens, Ga., native scored a career-high 26 points to lead all players and added a team-high nine rebounds. She also led the team with a career-high five assists. From the floor, Adeduntan was 10-for-16 (.625) including a 3-for-4 (.750) mark from behind the three-point arc and a 3-for-4 mark from the free throw line. In her 37 minutes of play, Adeduntan had no turnovers.



HODGES WAS A TWO-TIME ACC POW

Roneeka Hodges was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Basketball Player of the Week January 17th after guiding Florida State to two ACC

wins, including a thrilling 95-91 overtime win over No. 15 Maryland. It was the second ACC Player of the Week honor for the senior from New Orleans, La. Hodges scored an FSU-record 39 points in the Maryland win and also had a team-high six rebounds. Hodges also led FSU in both points (24) and rebounds (9) in the road win at Clemson. She shot 61 percent from the field in that game and 40 percent from three-point range. For the week, Hodges averaged a remarkable 31.5 points, 7.5 rebounds and shot 59 percent from the field, 63 percent from three-point range and 46 percent from the line. In 37.0 minutes per game, she averaged just two turnovers.

The first time she earned ACC honors this season was Dec. 20th when Hodges averaged 24.5 points and a team-high 5.5 rebounds per game in the Seminoles two victories over Florida Atlantic and UT-Arlington. Against UT-Arlington, she registered a career-high 33 points as the 'Noles improved to 8-0 this season. The senior guard also shot 54.1 percent from the floor and averaged two assists per game.



JOHNSON WAS "CLUTCH"

Holly Johnson hit the "big shot" on more than one occasion this season. She not only had the best game of her career with career-highs of 16 points, 8 rebounds and 4 steals in the 3OT win over Virginia Tech, but she hit a three-pointer with 9.2 seconds left to lift FSU over Georgia Tech in the regular-season finale, hit a 10-foot jumper with 2.5 seconds left to give FSU a 71-69 come-from-behind win at Wake Forest and sealed the double OT win at Virginia Tech with two free throws with 19 seconds left in the second overtime.

A THREE FOR THREE



Tiffany Buckelew, who wears No. 3, scored her first points as a Seminole in the FAMU game and ironically, it was a three-pointer.

GLADDEN'S SHOT WAS HIGHLY LIKELY

When the ball left Alicia Gladden's hands this season, it was likely she was going to score because the sophomore guard shot a team-high 52 percent from the field which ranked 4th in the ACC. She was third on the squad with 201 field goal attempts.

TO THE LINE

FSU went to the free throw line 133 more times than their opponents. Roneeka Hodges, who attempted a team-high 159 free throws, was the only player to reach the century mark, making a team-high 101. Alicia Gladden was second with 124 attempts and made 93.



DID YOU KNOW?

- 🕒 FSU's biggest halftime lead was 20 points (45-25 vs. Miami Ohio).
- 🕒 The most points FSU scored in a half was 46 vs. FAMU and Richmond (first half).
- 🕒 The most points FSU scored in a game this season was 95 vs. Maryland.
- 🕒 FSU's largest margin of victory this season is 33 (87-54 vs. Richmond).
- 🕒 FSU set a single-season record in 2004-05 with 166 three-pointers (135 was previous record) and 516 three-point shot attempts (422 was previous record). The Tribe made four or more three pointers in 24 games.
- 🕒 The most points FSU allowed this season was 91 by Maryland (in OT).
- 🕒 FSU had double-digit victories in 16 games.
- 🕒 In 21 games, at least three Seminoles tallied double digits.

DOUBLE-TROUBLE

Florida State had 12 double-doubles this year after having just four in 2003-04. Here's a look:

Ganiyat Adeduntan (6):

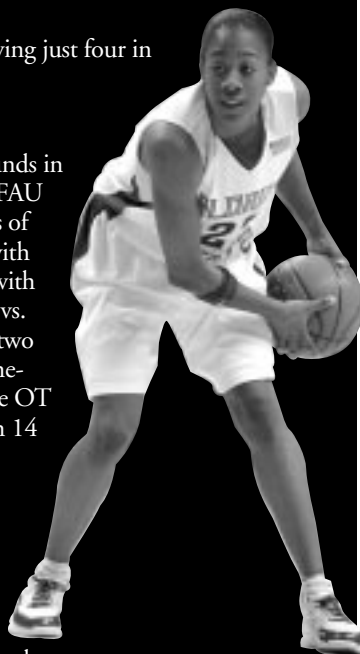
★ First career double-double with 12 points and 11 rebounds in the win at Florida; second career double-double in the FAU win with 14 points and 11 rebounds in just 25 minutes of play; third career double-double in the Louisville win with 22 points and 12 boards; fourth career double-double with 21 points and a then-career-high 13 rebounds at home vs. Clemson; made it five double-doubles on the year and two consecutive with 17 points and 10 rebounds in the come-from-behind win at Wake Forest; helped FSU to a triple OT win over Virginia Tech with 20 points and a career-high 14 rebounds.

Alicia Gladden (4):

★ Recorded her first career double-double with 13 points and 10 rebounds (then career-high) in the Eastern Kentucky win; with 14 points and a career-high and game-high 18 rebounds vs. FAMU, Gladden recorded her second double-double of the season; was one of two players who recorded double-doubles in the Louisville game with 16 points and 11 rebounds for her third double-double; made the most of her 39 minutes of play in the overtime loss to UVA in the ACC Tourney with 20 points and a game-high 14 rebounds.

Roneeka Hodges (2):

★ Scored a then career-high 23 points in the win over Miami and added 12 rebounds for her first double double of her Seminole career; was one of two players to go double in the come-from-behind win at Wake Forest with a game-high 26 points and 11 rebounds for her second double-double.



SHARP SHOOTERS STANDING STILL

FSU shot 80 percent or better from the free throw line in nine games this season and went 7-2 in those contests. FSU's best outing, by percentage, was .933 (14-15) in both the loss at Montana and the win vs. Clemson.

Five times this season, two Seminoles scored 20 or more points in the same game and the Tribe went 4-1 in those contests. In all five instances, Roneeka Hodges was one of those two players to record 20 or more points.

THE CLOSE ONES

FSU was involved in some close games this season and was pretty successful. In games decided by four points or less, FSU went 4-2 this season. In games decided by 10 points or less, FSU was 9-3. Of FSU's eight losses, five of them were by 11 or more points.



SEMINOLE CLASSIC CHAMPS

Led by Seminole Classic Most Valuable Player Roneeka Hodges, who had 23 points and 12 rebounds, FSU took a 82-56 win over Miami Ohio to earn its fifth straight Seminole Classic title. The Seminoles opened the game with nine unanswered points and went on to hit a season-high 10 three-pointers in the convincing victory. Linnea Liljestrand, who was named to the Seminole Classic All-Tournament team, and Holly Johnson, scored 16 and 12 points, respectively. Johnson also had a career-high eight assists and just one turnover in 36 minutes of play. Alicia Gladden was also named to the all-tournament team.

SAN JUAN SHOOTOUT CHAMPS

San Juan Shootout Most Valuable Player Roneeka Hodges scored a game-high 25 points to lead the Florida State women's basketball team to a hard-fought 83-72 win over UNC-Charlotte in the championship game of the tournament. Alicia Gladden also earned Shootout all-tournament team honors. The Seminoles won the battle of the unbeaten to improve to 11-0. The last time FSU had won an in-season tourney, other than its own, was in 2001-02 when the Seminoles opened the season in St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands and were named Paradise Jam tournament champions.



SKYING HIGH

Sixteen times this season, at least one Seminole recorded double-digit rebounds in a game. Ganiyat Adeduntan led the way with 10 games of double-digit rebounds while Alicia Gladden achieved the feat four times and Roneeka Hodges did it twice. Coming into the season, neither Adeduntan or Gladden had ever had double digit rebounds in a game. Overall, a much smaller FSU outrebounded its opponent in 19 of 32 games and went 18-1 in those games.



WE LOVED THE '70'S AND THEN SOME

The Seminoles went a perfect 14-0 this season when scoring 70 or more points in a game. FSU scored in the 80's six times and in the 90's twice this season. Only 11 times did FSU allow its opponent to score 70 or more points and only five of those times did the Tribe lose the game.
