Debbie Dillman, one of the top women's golf coaches in the nation, has guided the Seminoles to the NCAA regionals in each of the last two years.

Debbie Dillman is in her 19th season as the coach of the highly successful Florida State women's golf program. Under Dillman's leadership, the Seminoles have become one of the top teams in the nation and are annual contenders for Atlantic Coast Conference and national honors. Florida State has played in the NCAA Tournament nine times and has won 15 tournament championships since Dillman became head coach. In addition, nine different golfers have captured a total of 14 individual championships.

Dillman was a member of Florida State's 1981 AIAW national championship team and played on the Seminoles' 1980 squad that was nationally ranked.

Dillman has developed a perennial national power at Florida State. Her teams consistently rank among the best in the nation and the ACC. In the last two years, she has guided the Seminoles into the NCAA Tournament twice, produced three All-ACC selections and helped the Seminoles improve their standing in the ACC — considered by many to be the toughest women's golf conference in the nation.

Dillman was honored as the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach-of-The-Year in 1992, the Seminoles' first year in the conference. The Seminoles finished second in the conference tournament that season and finished only two strokes behind North Carolina for the team championship.

Dillman has established the Seminole program as one of the nation's best by recruiting the nation's top talent to

Tallahassee. Her strength as a recruiter is evidenced by the number of former players who have played, or who are playing professionally and the number of current players who are enjoying tremendous success as collegians.

Among the numerous current pros recruited by Dillman are Karen Stupples and Tiffany Faucette. Stupples won two tournaments during her collegiate career as a Seminole and qualified for the LPGA on her first attempt. She was also a member of Great Britain's Curtis Cup teams in 1996 and 1998. Faucette was a three-year member of the Seminole women's golf team who is currently playing on the ladies' European Tour. She won the 1997 McDonald's Open

Championship and was runner-up at the 1995 Canadian Women's Amateur Championship.

The Davison, Mich., native grew up in an active golf family. Both of Dillman's parents were involved in country

club management. Dillman captained her high school golf team for four years and twice was runner-up at the Michigan State Championship. For three consecutive years she also captured the Flint Junior Golf Championship, considered one of the top junior tournaments in the state of Michigan.

Dillman brought her talents to Tallahassee where she attended Florida State as an undergraduate and played golf for the Seminoles from 1979-82. During that time she also worked at Seminole Golf Course, enabling her to learn both the competitive and management sides of the sport.

Dillman's interests vary from the golf course to the farm to the beach. She has a daughter, Annie Lynn, who is nine years old.

Assistant Coach

Amy Bond, who was named one of the 50 greatest women's golfers in Atlantic Coast Conference history, is in her

second season as an assistant coach at Florida State. Bond was one of three Florida State players named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary team in 2002.

Bond is an integral part of the Seminoles' program and assists with all of the coaching and administrative duties of the team.

Bond, a 1998 All-ACC selection, was the Seminoles' top player from 1997-1999 as she earned ten top-10 finishes and was named the teams Most Valuable Player each year. She competed in the NCAA Championship tournament as a senior in 1999 (finishing in 30th place) and played in three NCAA regional tournaments during her career. In addition, she finished in the top-20 in four consecutive ACC Championship tournaments and was the medallist at the 1998 Ryder/Florida State championship tournament. Bond earned 14 top-15 finishes during her collegiate

Bond joined the professional ranks and began playing on the SBC Futures Tour in 1999. In 2000, she made 13 cuts in the 17 events she entered and gained tour status that allowed her to play

in each of the scheduled SBC events in 2001. She participated on the tour once again during the Summer of 2002.

The Ocala, Fla., native earned Academic All-America honors during her senior season and was a four-time ACC Honor Roll selection. She earned her bachelor's degree in sports management in 1997 and her master's in sports administration in 1999. Bond was a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Council (1997-99) and represented Florida State University at the NCAA Leadership Conference in 1999.

Bond also enjoyed a successful junior career before coming to Florida State. She won the Marion County championship in 1992 and the Yancy Junior championship in 1991, 1992 and 1994. Bond was a four-year varsity team member at Vanguard High School where she earned all-area honors four times and won the district championship her senior season.
