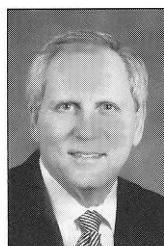

Finally, the decisions and priorities of the Department should always focus on our student-athletes first, as individuals; second, as students; and third, as athletes.

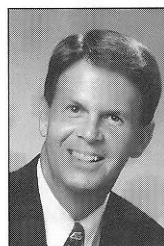

FLORIDA STATE WOMEN'S GOLF TEAM Looks To Continue Championship Play IN 2003-04

Three seasoned seniors and a sophomore who teamed to propel the Florida State women's golf team into the 2003 NCAA Championship form the nucleus of one of the most talented Seminole teams in recent years — one that will look to surpass the heights attained in 2003 when head coach Debbie Dillman led the Seminoles to a top 20 national finish.

The Seminoles return four veteran players — seniors Alison Curdt, Carrie Sordel and Katie Quinney and sophomore Caroline Larsson — who have played in nearly 100 career tournaments including one NCAA, three NCAA Regional and three Atlantic Coast Conference championships. The quartet has helped Florida State to three tournament championships and 20 top 10 finishes during their careers.

The Seminoles hope to capitalize on the collegiate and United States Golf Association experience of the returning

members of their lineup. That experience includes multiple U.S. Amateur, Western Open and state amateur tournament appearances by Curdt, Quinney and Sordel and Larsson's play as a member of the 2003 Swedish National team.

The returning Seminoles need to be at their best to make up for the loss of Kristin Tamulis, an All-American and three-time All-ACC selection during her career at Florida State.

Curdt, Quinney and Sordel begin the year looking to become only the third senior class in school history to make four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances. Only Florida State's 1994 and 1999 senior classes have played in the NCAA Tournament in four consecutive years.

Florida State will have the luxury of choosing from a talented pool of players who will become the fifth member of the Seminoles' lineup. Among those players in contention for a starter's spot are juniors Tyler Johnson and Kristina Prestipino and freshman Jaclyn Burch. Johnson and Prestipino have displayed the ability to compete for Florida State during the first two years of their careers while Burch has enjoyed an outstanding junior career and played in the 2003 U.S. Women's Amateur.

"It's very reassuring as a coach to have so much experience on your team," said Dillman. "Even more important than the experience is the confidence the players have developed during their careers."

"It will take a real team effort to make up for the loss of All-American Kristin Tamulis," continued Dillman. "But I am very confident that this is the kind of team that can make up for the loss of a player of Kristin's caliber."

Curdt begins her senior season as Florida State's most experienced player who needs to have a breakout season to enable the Seminoles to qualify for the NCAA Championship for a second consecutive season. She played the best golf of her collegiate career during her junior season as she earned four top 15 individual finishes including a 12th-place finish at the Florida State hosted ACC/SEC Challenge.

Curdt continued to elevate her game during the summer of 2003 as she played in the U.S. Women's Amateur for the second time in her career as well as qualifying rounds for the U.S. Women's Open. Curdt hopes to strengthen her already impressive resume during her final collegiate season with an additional NCAA appearance and an improved finish in the ACC Championship.

"Alison is coming off of a very busy summer," said Dillman. "She successfully balanced a demanding internship with a competitive golf schedule that included qualifying for her second consecutive U.S. Amateur"

Quinney, who played on the NCAA sponsored U.S. All-Star team that toured the Orient during the summer of

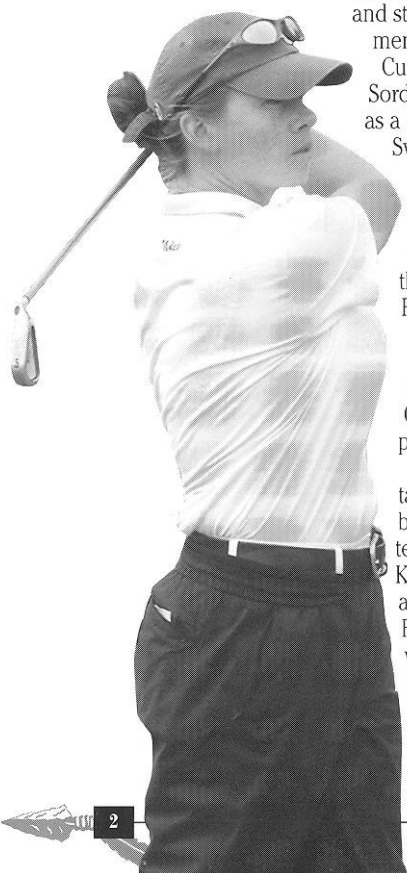
2003, will challenge for the Seminoles' No. 1 position vacated by Tamulis at the end of the 2003 spring season. She has been a member of the Seminoles' starting five since her arrival as a sophomore in 2002 and has earned a pair of top 10 individual finishes during her two varsity letter winning years at Florida State. Quinney has also played on the national stage as she competed in the U.S. Women's Amateur during the summer of 2001.

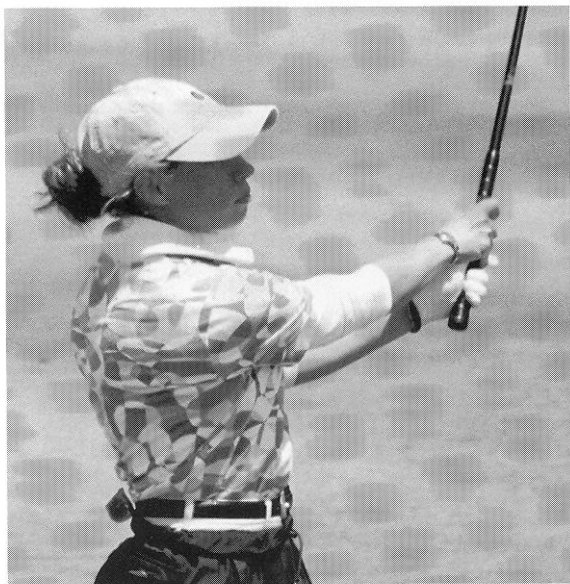
Quinney's career seems to be approaching its peak as her senior year begins. She was at her collegiate best as she recorded her career-low three-round tournament score of 227 at the NCAA East Regional to help the Seminoles qualify for the 2003 NCAA Championship.

In addition to her stellar outing in regional play, Quinney earned three top 25 individual finishes and a near career-best tied for ninth place finish at the Bryan National Collegiate during the spring 2003 season. She carded her career-best single round score of 70 during the second round of the Bryan.

Quinney averaged a career-low 77.58 strokes per round during the fall 2002 season and a near career-low 77.74 during the spring 2003 season.

Carrie Sordel is one of three returning seniors in the Seminoles' 2003-04 starting lineup.

"Katie had a great summer experience as she spent a month playing and touring the Orient," said Dillman. "Her experience not only helped her grow as a golfer but it also helped her grow as a person. I look for Katie to have a significant impact on our team this year proving that good things come in small packages."

Sordel, the third of Florida State's senior co-captains, is also coming off of her best year as a Seminole after averaging a career-low 77.23 strokes during the fall 2002 and spring 2003 seasons. She has competed in every tournament for Florida State in the last two years and in 27 for her career.

Sordel has earned three top 25 ACC Championship finishes during her career and earned her career-best individual finish at the 2003 Ryder/Florida Championship while helping the Seminoles to the team championship. It was Sordel's third career top 10 finish.

Sordel closed the season with a 74 in the final round of the NCAA Championship to tie for the lowest score among her four teammates in the event. As with Curdt and Quinney, Sordel needs to stay in that range for the team to realize its dream of a fourth consecutive postseason appearance in 2004.

"I am looking forward to watching Carrie as a senior," said Dillman. "Her increased maturity and confidence levels should help her realize her potential and lead us into another successful year."

Caroline Larsson, the Seminoles' most surprising player in 2003, certainly displayed her ability for future all-star consideration with her year-long performance as a freshman. Larsson ranked second on the team in stroke average (76.90), scores of par or better (12) and single round low score (68) as she enjoyed one of the top freshman seasons in school history.

Larsson was largely responsible for the Seminoles qualifying for the NCAA Championship on the final day of qualifying at the NCAA East Regional Championship. Her career-low score of 68 allowed the Seminoles to make up for a 79 counting towards their team score. She finished the event with a career-low 216 score for the three-round tournament.

In addition to her performance at the NCAA East Regional and NCAA Championship, she enjoyed a standout year as she earned her way into the Seminoles' starting lineup upon her arrival.

Larsson only improved her game over the summer as a member of the Swedish National Team. She helped the team

to a second place finish at the European Championships that were contested in Frankfurt, Germany.

Larsson's patience and calm demeanor on the course coupled with the experience she has gained on golf courses all over the world in the last year, make her an ideal candidate to take over the team's leadership role relinquished by Tamulis.

"Caroline is probably the most mature sophomore to ever play at Florida State," said Dillman. "Her international experiences and the experience she gained as a member of the Swedish National Team this past summer has only increased the confidence she gained during her freshman season."

Dillman will choose from returning players Johnson and Prestipino and newcomer Burch to fill the fifth slot in the starting lineup. In choosing between the two returning players with experience and the newcomer with a great deal of promise, Dillman can't go wrong.

Johnson, in her third year as a member of the team, has competed in four events during her Seminole career. Her experience makes her a prime candidate to earn a spot in the Seminoles' starting five.

Prestipino, who is also in her third year as a member of the Florida State program, played in her first two collegiate events during the 2002-03 season.

Burch will also have the opportunity to compete for playing time this year and brings an impressive junior golf resume with her to Florida State. In addition to playing in the 2003 U.S. Women's Amateur and the North/South Amateur she made it through the first round of qualifying before falling in sectional qualifying for the 2003 U.S. Women's Open during the summer prior to her arrival at Florida State.

"We have some very fine young talent on our team that needs to grow up in a hurry for us to be successful this season," said Dillman. "Freshman Jaclyn Burch, who had a full summer schedule, and Michelle Steakin will put up a strong challenge to our seasoned upperclassmen - Tyler Johnson, Kristina Prestipino, Gemma and Amy Harris and Jennifer Harvey - for playing time in the fifth position."

Junior sisters Amy and Gemma Harris will also vie for playing time. Both players competed in two events last season and are solid players who will add depth to the roster.

Florida State's schedule is once again designed to allow the Seminoles to play the most challenging and diverse courses in the nation.

First and foremost on the Seminoles' schedule is the Florida State hosted ACC/SEC Challenge at the beautifully manicured and maintained Raven Course in Destin, Fla. Quickly becoming one of the top events and attracting the top teams in the nation, the ACC/SEC Challenge is the jewel of the Seminoles' schedule. The fourth annual event will take place Oct. 24-26.

"We will once again play a challenging schedule during both the fall and spring seasons," said Dillman. "We have a west coast trip to New Mexico State where we will compete against the likes of Arizona State, New Mexico, New Mexico State and others we only see during the postseason. Our spring schedule is also very challenging and sees us return to the prestigious Liz Murphy tournament at the University of Georgia among other tough challenges."

Florida State enters the 2003-04 season riding a tremendous wave of momentum and looking forward to the challenges the year will bring. With an experienced lineup that has grown accustomed to success, young talent that has come to Florida State to achieve success quickly and a schedule that will challenge the lineup both mentally and physically, the Seminoles will put themselves into the position of achieving their NCAA goals at tournament time.

Debbie Dillman

Head Coach

Debbie Dillman, who has led Florida State to the NCAA Tournament in 10 of the last 12 years, is in her 20th season as the head women's golf coach at Florida State. In 2003, she led the Seminoles to a top-20 national finish at the NCAA Championship played at Purdue University. The Seminoles advanced to the NCAA Championship from the East Regional marking the tenth time during her career Florida State had advanced to postseason play.

Dillman has guided six Florida State teams to the NCAA Championship in her first 19 years in Tallahassee. In addition, Dillman has led the Seminoles to 16 tournament championships and more than 50 top 10 tournament finishes. She has coached three All-Americans and six players who have earned All-ACC honors nine times during their careers.

Dillman has established the Seminole program as one of the nation's best by recruiting the nation's top talent to Tallahassee. Her strength as a recruiter is evidenced by the number of former players who have played, or who are playing professionally and the number of current players who are enjoying tremendous success as collegians.

Among the numerous current pros recruited by Dillman are Karen Stupples and Tiffany Faucette. Stupples won two tournaments during her collegiate career as a Seminole and qualified for the LPGA on her first attempt. She was also a member of Great Britain's Curtis Cup teams in 1996 and 1998. Faucette was a three-year member of the Seminole women's golf team who is currently playing on the Ladies' European Tour. She won the 1997 McDonald's Open Championship and was runner-up at the 1995 Canadian Women's Amateur Championship.

Dillman recruited and coached Kristin Tamulis, Florida State's first three-time All-ACC selection, who graduated from Florida State in 2003.

Dillman has developed a perennial national power at Florida State. Her team consistently ranks among the best in the ACC and the nation. In the last three years, she has guided the Seminoles into the NCAA Tournament three times, produced four All-ACC selections and helped the Seminoles improve their standing in the ACC - considered by many to be the toughest women's golf conference in the nation.

Dillman was honored as the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach-of-The-Year in 1992, the Seminoles' first year in the conference. The Seminoles finished second in the conference tournament that season and finished only two strokes behind North Carolina for the team championship.

Dillman was a member of Florida State's 1980 nationally ranked squad and 1981 AIAW national championship team.

Dillman has established a top team in Tallahassee by recruiting the best throughout the country and the world. Former Seminoles have achieved great

success playing at the professional level while current Seminoles are achieving success at the collegiate level.

Dillman grew up in Davison, Mich., in an active golf family. Both of her parents were involved in country club management. While in high school, Dillman captained her high school golf team for four years and twice was runner-up at the Michigan State Championship. She also won the Flint Junior Golf Championship for three consecutive years that is considered as one of the top junior tournaments in the state of Michigan.

Dillman attended Florida State as an undergraduate and played golf from 1979-1982. While taking classes and playing golf, she also worked at Seminole Golf Course, allowing her to learn both the management side and the competitive side of golf. Dillman has a daughter, Annie Lynn (9).

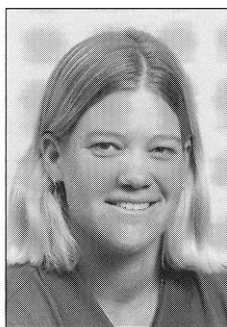

Assistant Coach

Amy Bond, who was named one of the 50 greatest women's golfers in Atlantic Coast Conference history, is in her third season as an assistant coach at Florida State. Bond was one of three Florida State players named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary team in 2002.

Bond, an integral part of the Seminoles' program, assists with all of the coaching and administrative duties of the team.

Bond, a 1998 All-ACC selection, was the Seminoles' top player from 1997-1999 as she earned ten top-10 finishes and was named the team Most Valuable Player each year. She competed in the NCAA Championship tournament as a senior in 1999 (finishing in 30th place) and played in three NCAA regional tournaments during her career. In addition, she finished in the top-20 in four consecutive ACC Championship tournaments and was the medalist at the 1998 Ryder/Florida Championship tournament. Bond earned 14 top-15 finishes during her collegiate career.

Bond joined the professional ranks and began playing on the SBC Futures Tour in 1999. In 2000, she made 13 cuts in the 17 events she entered and gained tour status that allowed her to play in each of the scheduled SBC events in 2001. She participated on the tour during the summer of 2002 and 2003.

The Ocala, Fla., native earned Academic All-America honors during her senior season and

was a four-time ACC Honor Roll selection. She earned her bachelor's degree in sports management in 1997 and her master's in sports administration in 1999. Bond was a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Council (1997-99) and represented Florida State University at the NCAA Leadership Conference in 1999.

Bond also enjoyed a successful junior career before coming to Florida State. She won the Marion County championship in 1992 and the Yancy Junior championship in 1991, 1992 and 1994. Bond was a four-year varsity team member at Vanguard High School where she earned all-area honors four times and won the district championship her senior season.

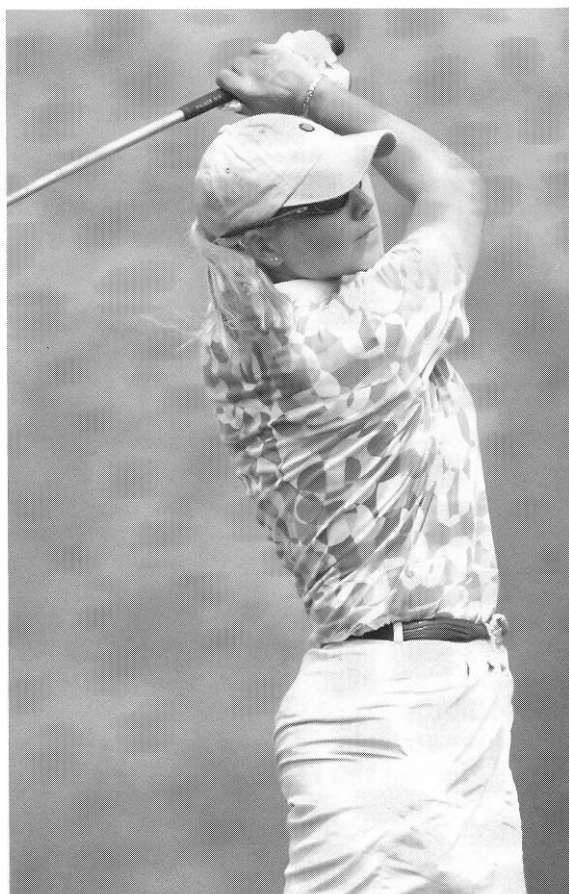
FSU FACT:

Florida State Competes In NCAA Championship For Fifth Time In School History

Tamulis Earns All-America Honorable Mention Honors

Florida State Enjoys Outstanding Year in 2002-03

Florida State finished in a tie for 19th at the NCAA Championship, played in their third consecutive NCAA Regional Tournament, won the team championship at the Ryder/Florida Championship tournament for the second consecutive season and finished in the top 10 in 10 of its 11 tournaments during the fall 2002 and spring 2003 seasons as Debbie Dillman's squad enjoyed one of the top women's golf years in school history. Senior All-American and All-ACC honoree Kristin Tamulis led the way as she claimed individual championships at the Lady Gator Invitational and Ryder/Florida Championship during the spring season as the five members of the Seminoles' starting lineup earned a total of 13 top-20 individual finishes.

Florida State Women's Golf Team Ranked 23rd Nationally

Florida State, which finished in a tie for 19th place at the NCAA National Championship, finished the season ranked 23rd nationally in the final *GolfWeek/Sagarin Performance Index*, 17th in the final ranking by GolfStat and 24th by *GolfWorld* magazine in its final ranking. The Seminoles were in the nation's top 25 by *GolfWeek* during each of the final ten weeks of the season and were included in the nation's top 30 throughout the spring 2003 season. Golfstat ranked the team 20th or higher during each of the final 10 weeks of the season. The Seminoles were ranked 12th by GolfStat during the weeks of Oct. 7 and 14, 2002.

Tamulis Ranked 23rd in Final Individual Rankings

Senior All-American Kristin Tamulis finished the season ranked 23rd in the nation in the final individual *GolfWeek/Sagarin Performance Index*. She ranked as high as 18th during the season after beginning the spring season ranked 46th nationally. Tamulis, one of the top golfers in Seminole history, spent the final two years of her career ranked among the nation's top 50 golfers.

Tamulis Earns All-American Honorable Mention Honors

Kristin Tamulis, who led the Florida State women's golf team to the NCAA

Championships for the fifth time in school history in 2003, earned All-American Honorable Mention honors by the National Golf Coaches Association following the 2003 season. Tamulis led the Seminoles to a top-20 national finish as one of the top Division I golfers in the country this past season. It marked the first time during her career she has earned All-American honors.

Florida State Finishes Well at the NCAA Division I Championship

Florida State finished in a tie for 19th place at the NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship at the Kampen Course at the Birk Boilermaker Golf Complex on the campus of Purdue University. The Seminoles carded a team round of 303, 26 strokes better than their first round score to jump over Tulsa and move into a tie with Kent State on the final day. Senior Kristin Tamulis finished in a tie for 28th place with a 305 total for the four round tournament. Southern California, ranked No. 3 in the nation entering the tournament, led wire-to-wire to win its first ever championship. The Trojans finished 15 strokes ahead of second-place Pepperdine. Mikael Parmlid of Southern California defeated Andrea Vander Lende of Florida in the first hole of a playoff to claim the individual championship.

Seminoles Finish Eighth at NCAA Regional

Florida State finished eighth in the NCAA East Regional at the Salem Glen Country Club in Clemmons, N.C., and qualified for the 2003 NCAA Championship. The Seminoles, who were led by freshman Caroline Larsson's career-best score of 68 in the final round, earned the eighth and final qualifying spot from the East Region into the NCAA championship. The Seminoles finished five strokes behind seventh-place South Carolina and four strokes ahead of ninth-place Furman. Larsson shot a career-low three-under par 68 to lead the Seminoles in the final round. She birdied five of her 18 holes and was over par on only one hole. Larsson's score of 68 is four strokes better than her previous career-low single-round score of 72 that she carded in the first round of the NCAA East Regional and the third round of the ACC Championship. She finished in a tie for 11th place in the individual standings. No. 1-ranked Duke won its fourth consecutive East Regional championship and will play in the NCAA Championship for the 16th time. Brandi Jackson of Furman University won the individual title with an eight-under par score of 205.

Florida State Individual Finishes

With all five members of Florida State's starting lineup earning at least one top 20 individual finish, the Seminole starting lineup earned 13 total top 20 finishes and placed three golfers in the top five at the Ryder/Florida Championship during the spring season.

Tamulis Earns All-ACC Honors for the Third Time

Senior All-American Kristin Tamulis earned All-ACC honors for the third consecutive year this season in a vote by the league's six head coaches in 2003. She became the first women's golfer in Florida State history and only the 12th in ACC history to earn all-conference honors at least three times during her career. Jenny Chuasiriporn and Candy Hannemann of Duke are the only women in ACC history to earn All-ACC honors during each of the four years.

Tamulis Sets School Record with Round of 65

Senior All-American Kristin Tamulis shot a school record and career-low six-under par 65 in the final round and finished in a tie for fourth place in the individual standings at the 15th Annual ACC Championship at Salem Glen Country Club. Tamulis' record-setting day helped the Seminoles shoot a season-low 286 in the final round of the event.

Tamulis Among ACC's Top Golfers

Senior All-American Kristin Tamulis finished the 2003 season as the ACC's fourth-highest ranked golfer and one of only four with a scoring average below 74.00 strokes per round. Tamulis averaged a career-best 73.94 strokes per round in 31 rounds during ten tournaments during her senior season. A mere .75 of a stroke separates each of the top five golfers in the ACC since competition for the six conference teams began in September.

Curdt Enjoys Best Season as Seminole

Junior Alison Curdt was at her best as a Seminole during the 2002-03 season. She averaged a career-low 77.23 strokes during the entire year and after averaging a career-low 75.25 strokes per round during the fall 2002 season. Curdt carded her three best three-round tournament scores during the fall as she carded a career-best 223 at the Florida State hosted ACC/SEC Challenge, a 224 at the Landfall Tradition and a 225 at the Tar Heel Invitational. She also carded her career-best single round score of 69 in the second round of the Tar Heel Invitational.

Sordel Enjoys Best Year of Career

Junior Carrie Sordel averaged a career-low 77.23 strokes per round in 11 tournaments this year. She earned her career-best individual finish of third and third career top-10 finish at the 2003 Ryder/Florida Championship and tied her career-low single-round score with a 71 in the first round of the 2003 Lady Gator Invitational.

Sordel Earns Best Finish at Ryder/Florida

Junior Carrie Sordel finished in third place at the 2003 Ryder/Florida Championship to earn her career-best individual finish. She finished only four strokes out of first place in the event with a score of 224. Sordel carded her tournament-best score of 72 in the second round.

Quinney Among the Top Seminoles

Junior Katie Quinney enjoyed the best year of her Seminole career as she finished 2002-03 with a career-low 77.68 during Florida State's 11 tournaments. She finished the fall 2002 season with a career-low 77.58 stroke average in four tournaments and ranked fourth on the team with a 77.74 average during the spring 2003 season. Quinney carded her career-low single-round score of 70 during the second round of the Bryan National Collegiate in helping the Seminoles to a top-10 team finish in the rain-shortened event.

Quinney Heats Up in NCAA East Regional

Junior Katie Quinney recorded her career-best three-round tournament score of 227 at the NCAA East Regional to help the Seminoles qualify for the NCAA Championship. She averaged 75.67 strokes (more than two strokes below her season average) in regional play to help the Seminoles take the eighth and final qualifying spot by six strokes over Furman.

Larsson Plays Well as a Freshman

Freshman Caroline Larsson finished her first season ranked second on the Seminoles with a 76.90 stroke average in 11 tournaments during 2002-03 fall and spring seasons. She quickly developed into one of Florida State's most consistent players since joining the Seminoles' lineup during the fall. Larsson played in all 11 of Florida State's tournaments this year and has improved her stroke average by nearly two strokes from the fall season (77.92) to the spring season (76.47).

Auburn Earns Team Title at ACC/SEC Challenge; Seminoles Finish Fourth

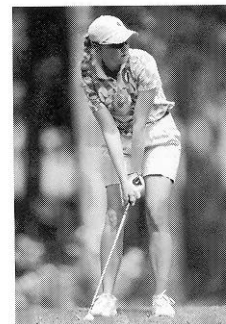

This Is Tallahassee



Tallahassee has been the capital city of the state of Florida for nearly 200 years.



Florida State University is located in Tallahassee - the capital city of the state of Florida.

Among low, rolling hills, down moss-draped canopy roads, within picturesque historical districts and across seas of flowering azaleas lies a magical part of the Sunshine State-Tallahassee, Florida's capital city. With its intriguing combination of power-play politics and classic character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm, Tallahassee is a side of Florida few expect to find.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 25 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula in an area known as "The Big Bend." Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Georgia neighbor than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to establish a permanent, central location for the seat of government. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" — derived from the words "talwa," meaning town, and "ahassee," meaning old. This historic meeting place remains Florida's capital today.

Boasting more than 145 properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Tallahassee is a living showcase of Florida history and heritage. The crowning jewel of Florida's historic "Capitol Hill" is the Old Capitol, beautifully restored to its 1902 splendor complete with the red-and-white striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia. The 22nd-floor observatory of the New Capitol Building offers a breathtaking view of this

surprising Southern city, awash in flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias and hundreds of lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes.

Charming downtown historic districts graced with lush linear parks lead visitors to the Knott House Museum, The Columns, First Presbyterian Church, John G. Riley House Museum and Old City Cemetery. Free walking tours and replica turn-of-the-century street cars carry passengers to antebellum mansions, picturesque churches and other downtown delights.

Minutes from downtown lies the lush 52-acre natural habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, home to the rare Florida panther and other furry "natives."

The area surrounding Tallahassee reveals numerous other historic and archaeological treasures, such as De Soto State Archaeological and Historical Site, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Mission San Luis, Natural Bridge Battlefield and San Marcos de Apalache. Visitors can explore prehistoric Florida at the Museum of Florida History, where they are greeted by a giant 12,000-year-old mastodon pulled from nearby Wakulla Springs.

On the shores of Wakulla Springs, alligators still laze under the watchful eyes of "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress trees. The site of

many underwater scenes in "Tarzan" movies, it's one of the world's deepest freshwater springs. Glass-bottomed boat tours across these mystical waters are available.

Other sightseeing favorites include the floral masterpiece of Alfred B. Maclay State Gardens; Bradley's Country Store; FAMU Black Archives and the Tallahassee Antique Car Museum. Nearby small towns offer fascinating excursions to places such as Pebble Hill Plantation, Florida Caverns State Park, Monticello Opera House and St. George Island.

Tallahassee is almost as rich in cultural treasures as it is in history. A widely acclaimed collection of art, science and history museums and galleries, year-round festivals and non-stop entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, feed a variety of cultural appetites.

Visitors with a hunger for the great outdoors will find Tallahassee ideal for all types of outdoor recreation—from canoeing down dark, cypress-lined rivers and biking up steep slopes to exploring backcountry wildernesses and hunting for bobwhite quail. Area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away — offer a paradise for boating and fishing. Lakes Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones." Local wildlife areas, such as the St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest, are perfect spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

And while Tallahassee also features eight golf courses and plenty of places to raise a racquet, it's a wild array of spectator sports that leave the crowds screaming for more. The Florida State Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers provide collegiate action while the Tallahassee Thunder is the city's

featured arena football team. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

For another favorite "sport" — shopping — two large regional malls and many specialty centers offer an array of "playing options," from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops. Unique shopping locales include downtown parks, lakeside cottages and small Southern towns. Tallahassee serves a scrumptious selection of tantalizing restaurants ranging from fast food to five-star. Local specialties include homemade country sausage, melt-in-your-mouth steaks, wild game and succulent seafood fresh from the Gulf.

From luxury to economy, accommodations are plentiful and include restored bed and breakfasts, rustic "gentlemen" lodges, beachside escapes and comfortable chain hotels. For those who choose to follow in the footsteps of early travelers, Tallahassee also boasts 15 beautiful campsites. Continuous air service, Amtrak and four major highways make it easy for visitors to get to Tallahassee. But no matter how you arrive, the history and hospitality of Tallahassee make it difficult to ever leave for long.

"This is clearly one of the most exciting things to ever happen to Tallahassee," said a jubilant Mayor Scott Maddox. "For those of us who call Tallahassee home, the All-America City award verifies what we've known for so long — that we have one of the greatest cities in all of America!"



Tallahassee Is An All-American City

On June 26, 1999, judges from the National Civic League named Tallahassee as one of 10 cities to win the prestigious All-America City (AAC) award from the 1999 All-America City conference in Philadelphia. The All-America City award is the most prestigious and coveted award a community can win. The annual award recognizes exemplary, grassroots and problem-solving efforts of communities that cooperatively tackle challenges and achieve measurable results. Judging is based on the overall level of community involvement in solving critical local problems, including public-private partnerships.

MUSEUMS AND CULTURE

The Federal Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) named the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science as one of the nation's exemplary museums on September 19, 2000. The Tallahassee Museum, along with 176 other museums, was selected out of a field of 823 applications from museums throughout the nation in a highly competitive competition. The museum features a 52-acre natural habitat zoo, nature trails, authentic 1880s farmstead, hands-on Discovery Center, birds of prey aviary, reptile exhibits, annual events and more!

OTHER POINTS OF INTEREST INCLUDE:

- Mary Brogan Museum of Art and Science:** Interactive hands-on science center and national traveling art and science exhibitions.
- Mission San Luis:** Site of Spanish/Indian village settled from 1656-1704. Ongoing excavations/exhibits/reconstructions.
- Museum of Florida History:** Permanent exhibits include a nine-foot mastodon, Spanish galleon treasures, Civil War memorabilia, reconstructed steamboat and Prehistoric Florida plus traveling exhibits.
- Old Capital Museum:** Restored to 1902 appearance featuring red candy-striped awnings, stained glass dome, House and Senate Chambers, Supreme Court and Governor's office.
- Maclay State Gardens:** Enchanting floral architecture surrounds 1930s home of NY financier Alfred B. Maclay.

Impressive grounds feature 200+ floral varieties plus hiking, biking and nature trails, swimming, fishing and boating.

Tallahassee Antique Car Museum: Impressive showroom features award winning Chevys, one-of-a-kind Ford Roadster, 1913 CarNation Tourer, 1931 Duesenberg, 1956 T-Bird, Delorean, Cadillacs, Corvettes and more. Plus two original Bat Mobiles.

The Capitol: One of five tower Capitols in the U.S. features panoramic view from 22nd-floor observatory/art gallery, House and Senate viewing galleries.

WHERE'S THE BEACH

Where sunny days are filled with the great outdoors ... where time is measured by tides and life's rhythms move with the surf ... beaches are just a short drive from Tallahassee.

Alligator Point: Natural dune public beach, 45 miles south of Tallahassee.

Carrabelle: Coarse public beach, featuring swimming and shelling, 60 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

Dekle Beach: Pristine sandy beach, clear water featuring boating, swimming, picnicking and more, 70 miles east of Tallahassee.

Mashes Sands Beach: Public beach, shallow bay water featuring swimming and crabbing, 40 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

St. George Island: Pristine 29-mile barrier island beach, clear water, featuring swimming, shelling, boating and fishing, 80 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

Shell Point: Lovely, small peninsula surrounded by St. Marks Wildlife refuge. Secluded beach and clear water that is popular for sailing and windsurfing, 25 miles south of Tallahassee.

Canopy Roads: The abundance of trees and timber is a resource uncommon to many other areas of the state. The beauty of the local trees is exemplified in Maclay Gardens State Park, which is the site of several of Florida's champion trees including the flowering Dogwood, the Hawthorn tree, the Horsesugar tree, the Sweetbay Magnolia and the Silverbell tree. These trees and others often extend their branches over the roadway to create a canopied effect, a feature that is held in high esteem by local residents and visitors.

This Is Florida State

Florida State University, a graduate research institution, stands among the nation's elite in both academics and athletics. Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida, the university is situated in the heart of the state's capital city. The university's main campus blends Jacobean Revival and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods and azaleas of North Florida.

As the university has progressed and grown - from its pre-Civil War beginnings as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, to the Florida State College for Women and, finally returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947 - it has developed into an acclaimed research institution, a top ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and a standard setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

The university has entered the 21st century with excellence in all areas of its mission - teaching, research and public service, including many noteworthy milestones.

- Beginning in fall 2003, the College of Law will offer its first graduate level law degree program, an LL.M. program for foreign lawyers to gain a better understanding of the United States' legal system.

- In March 2003, the department of dance joined the Association for Dance and Performance Telematics (ADaPT), the nation's only interdisciplinary association that uses video and digital technology to expand the creative possibilities of dance performance into the virtual world.

- In February 2003, the School of Motion Picture, Television

and Recording Arts won the first, second and third place awards in the comedy category of the 24th annual Academy of Television Arts and Sciences Foundation College Television Awards. The sweep was a first in the history of the annual student competition.

- In February 2003, FSU and the city of Pembroke Pines entered into a first of its kind agreement to establish a charter school to open in August 2003 that will serve 550 kindergarten through fifth grade students and 50 autistic students.

- In February 2003, English Professor Mark Winegardner was chosen by Random House Publishers over several authors from around the world to write the sequel to Mario Puzo's "The Godfather." Winegardner hopes to have the book

written by the end of 2004.

- In January 2003, the College of Medicine's Center for Health Equity announced the opening of its Gadsden County office, which will focus on racial and ethnic disparity in maternal and child health issues there.

- During the fall 2002 semester, the Office of Graduate Studies began the pilot phase of the university's Electronic Theses/Dissertations Project that will eventually store all such scholarly work digitally in both the FSU University Libraries and the UMI/ProQuest Dissertation Archive, an off-site Library of Congress repository.

- In October 2002, the College of Medicine became the first new allopathic medical school in the country since 1982 to receive the approval of the Liaison Committee on Medical Education - the nationally recognized accrediting authority for education programs leading to the M.D. degree - by being granted initial provisional accreditation.

- In September 2002, FSU installed the IBM eServer p690, nicknamed Eclipse, which is the second phase of a computing system that can now perform 2.5 teraflops (2.5 trillion calculations per second) and is ranked No. 34 among all government, industry and academic supercomputers in the world (ranked by the University of Tennessee and the University of Mannheim in Germany, www.top500.org).

- During the fall of 2002, FSU had 204 National Merit Scholars, 74 National Achievement Scholars and 203 Hispanic Scholars enrolled.

- In April 2002, the National Weather Service opened its 121st Weather Forecast Office in a four-story addition to the James J. Love Building, home of the FSU department of meteorology. It is the 14th WFO to be collocated on a university campus and will give FSU meteorology students first-hand experience observing and working with professional meteorologists.

- In April 2002, WFSU-TV was among nine public television stations praised for their involvement with the PBS Ready To Learn service and early childhood literacy by President George W. Bush and First Lady Laura Bush during a White House ceremony.

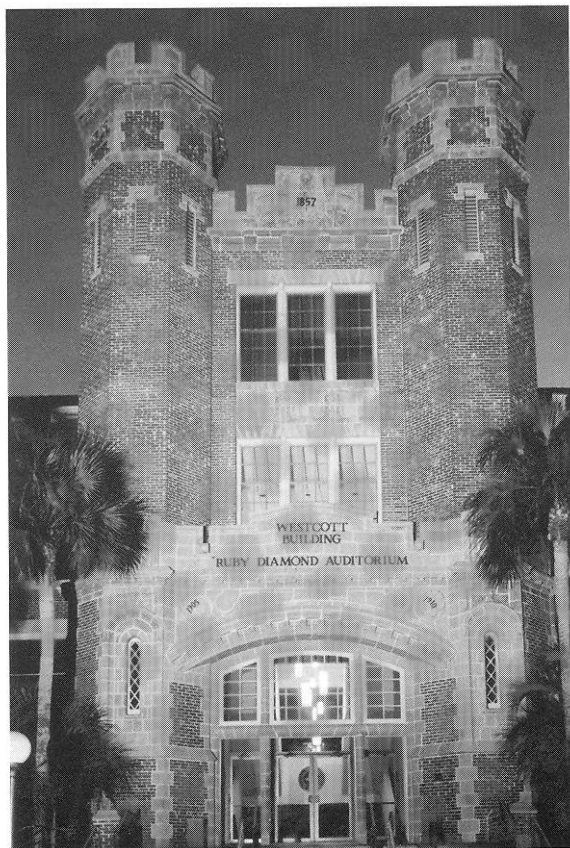
- In February 2002, Florida Gov. Jeb Bush announced the creation of a \$2.5 million FSU center that will develop the best methods to teach reading, to be headed by Joseph K. Torgesen, the FSU Robert M. Gagne Professor of Psychology and Education who is the nation's leading expert on how children learn to read. The center, which will collaborate with the University of Central Florida, will train teachers in what works.

- In October 2001, FSU began its second capital campaign for private funds. The \$600 million FSU Connect campaign surpassed the halfway mark with \$306 million in May 2002. The university's first capital campaign, An Investment in Learning, closed in January 1998 with \$301 million, surpassing its original \$200 million goal.

- From October to November 2001, Pulitzer Prize-winning author Robert Olen Butler, an FSU Francis Eppes Professor who holds the Michael Shaara Chair in Creative Writing, was the first author ever to write a short story live on the Internet. Butler allowed the world to watch him write an original short story, keystroke for keystroke, two hours a day for 19 days.

- In June 2001, NBC Nightly News anchor Tom Brokaw donated more than 5,000 collections of World War II memorabilia that had been sent to him as the result of his three-book series on "The Greatest Generation" to the FSU Institute on World War II and the Human Experience. FSU created the institute in 1998 to "save the memories of those who saved

the world” by collecting letters, diaries, memoirs and photos from participants in the war effort, in order to preserve the materials for classroom teaching, scholarly research and public viewing.

- In May 2001, FSU welcomed the charter class of its College of Medicine.
- In March 2001, FSU opened the Center for the Advancement of Human Rights that trains undergraduate students from nine FSU colleges and schools to be human rights advocates so they can be placed with international human rights organizations.
- In the blackenterprise.com 2001 “Top Fifty Colleges for African Americans” rankings, FSU was rated 23rd in the nation, up from 26th in 1999.
- In the March-April 2001 issue of National Jurist that rated the nation’s “most wired” law schools, the FSU College of Law was ranked 13th.

• At more than \$343.7 million, FSU’s endowment has been ranked 127th in the nation by the National Association of College and University Business Officers, the benchmark of higher education fundraising success, in 2001.

• In 1994, the Carnegie Foundation classified FSU as a “Research University I,” placing it among the nation’s top research universities. In 2000, the distinction was renamed “Doctoral/Research University-Extensive.”

Under the leadership of FSU’s 13th president, T.K. Wetherell, who took office in January 2003, and its 13-member Board of Trustees, the university continues to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service. The trustees are: Chairman John Thrasher of Orange Park; Harold Knowles, Dr. J. Stanley Marshall and Jim Smith, Vice Chairman, all of Tallahassee; Emily “June” Duda of Oveido; David Ford of Rosemont, Pa.; Dr. Jessie Furlow of Quincy; Manuel “Manny” Garcia III of Winter Springs; William “Andy” Haggard of Coral Gables; Dr. E. Ann McGee of Winter Springs; Derrick Brooks of Tampa; FSU Faculty Senate President, Dr. Valliere Richard Auzenne, Student Government Association President Patrick Sullivan and University President Dr. T.K. Wetherell.

A senior member of the State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act. It began in Tallahassee with its first class of male students in 1857 and added women in 1858.

FSU’s operating budget is \$808 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$150 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the Seminole Boosters, the FSU Alumni Association and the FSU Foundation.

The main campus is spread over 463.4 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s. FSU encompasses 1,423.2 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin, Gadsden and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the university maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its marine laboratory at Turkey Point on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years, FSU has reached far beyond Florida through

international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia, Vietnam, the Czech Republic, Greece, Croatia, Ireland, South Africa, Ghana and the Caribbean. FSU’s student centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the nation’s best in Europe.

Florida State offers 300 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its nine colleges - Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University); Human Sciences; Law; Medicine; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin O’D Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) - and eight schools - Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 2,043 members, the FSU faculty has included 10 National Academy of Sciences elected members, four American Academy of Arts and Sciences members and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 5,262 administrative and support staff members.


Library holdings at Florida State include 2.5 million book titles and 6.8 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library is located at the heart of the university’s science research complex. FSU also maintains music, library science and law libraries and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library.

FSU’s 6,605 graduate students pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

Of FSU’s 36,683-student population, 56 percent are female, 44 percent are male, 23.5 percent are minorities and 4 percent are foreign students.

golf courses

The Seminoles enjoy the finest golf courses in the state of Florida for both tournaments and practice.

Quality practice facilities and championship style golf are crucial to your improvement in the game of golf. The athletic administration and the support of the boosters at Florida State have helped build a first-class practice complex to promote the development of the current and future Seminole golfers. The improvements and enhancements of the golf course and its facilities will provide Florida State with one of the finest training complexes in the country.

THE DAVE MIDDLETON LEARNING CENTER

During the fall of 2001, Florida State completed a \$5.7 million dollar project that dramatically enhances the facilities for the Seminoles' men's and women's golf teams. A new clubhouse featuring coaches' offices, team lockers, an instructional auditorium, a traditions area and an exercise room will be completed. An exclusive practice academy and a video-teaching center will be part of the Florida State golf home.

DON A. VELLER SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

A university-owned facility that has undergone extensive improvements since 1998. Projects involving the addition of supplemental irrigation and the construction of several new greens and tees have resulted in a well-conditioned golf course with a challenging design.

GOLDEN EAGLE COUNTRY CLUB

Golden Eagle is a special place for the women's golf team and is considered to be the best golf course in Tallahassee – a true championship-style layout and a staple for team play.

SOUTHWOOD

A Fred Couples design, developed by the Arvida Group. The staff and membership have given the Seminole women's golf team unlimited access to their excellent facilities which gives our players an opportunity to practice and play at any time. The quality of the Southwood course makes for an environment that is conducive to overall personal and team improvement.

KILLEARN COUNTRY CLUB

Killearn's 27-hole championship golf course challenges players of all skill levels with its rolling hills and tree-lined fairways. As the former site of the PGA Tallahassee Open and the LPGA Centel Classic, this par 72 course offers a 7,006-yard layout. Matching the caliber of the golf course, the Club offers a well-constructed practice range and a short game facility.

CAPITAL CITY COUNTRY CLUB

Capital City Country Club is the oldest venue on the Seminoles' playing rotation. It features a shorter layout of 6,550 yards with narrow fairways and fast, undulating greens which help FSU prepare for the demanding playing conditions at the NCAA Championships. The membership is an integral part of the history of the Seminole golf program, and supports the team in every way possible.



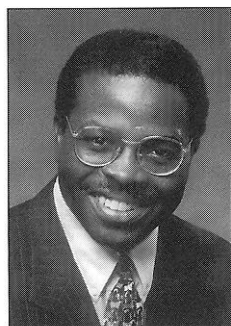
Golden Eagle Country Club in Tallahassee is a championship style layout that serves as the host of the Seminole Intercollegiate each spring.

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student-athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

Who is permitted to recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Key terms you should know

You become a prospective student-athlete if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid official visit to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

Phone calls and letters

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student-Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information

- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution are available to all students
- Schedule cards
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year

Alumni and boosters' do's and don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

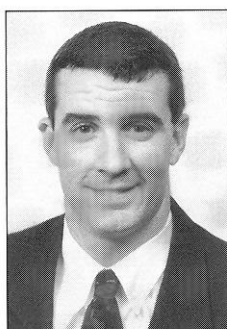
You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.

Personal Development

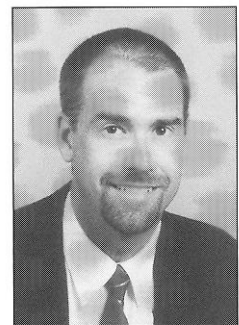
Leadership Development

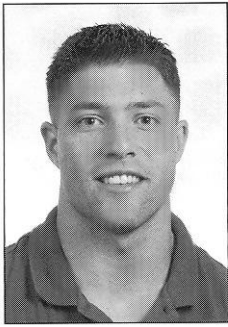

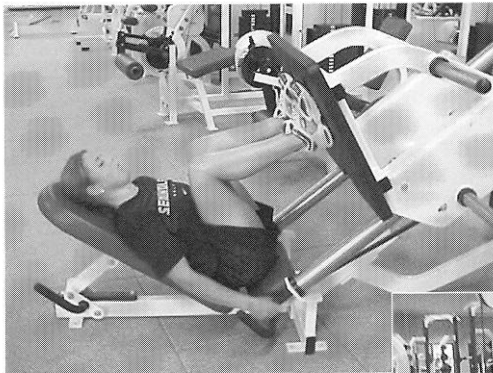

Strength and Conditioning

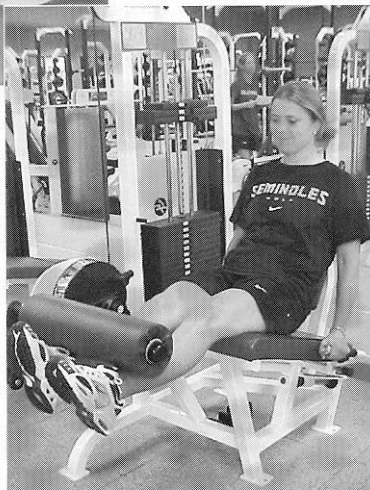
The strength and conditioning program at Florida State University is designed to improve athletic performance through an individualized regimen of stretching, lifting, speed, power, agility and conditioning drills. The goal of the program is to maximize the performance of the Seminole golfers while reducing the risk of injury.

Physical development is critical in order to excel at the collegiate level. The strength and conditioning staff individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole student-athletes beginning with a pre-conditioning program before the season gets underway. The focus of the strength and conditioning staff revolves around building stronger and more well-conditioned athletes. The staff is goal-orientated towards providing the Florida State student-athletes with the best instruction, tools and resources in the nation.

Strength and conditioning for golf must be carefully planned and geared to a golf build. Preparing the Seminole student-athletes to be successful on the golf course encompasses exercises that match the characteristics of the game. The best way to build strength for golf is to understand the principals that govern the sport itself, then apply the exercises, sets and repetitions to being successful on the golf course.

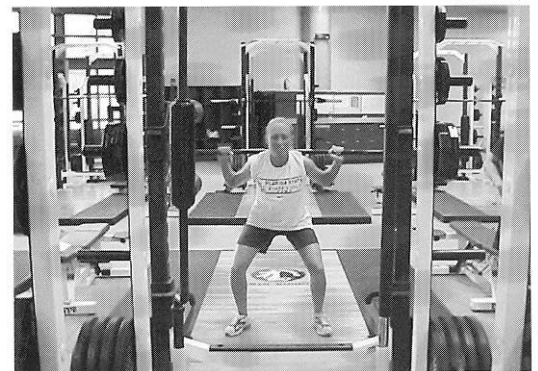

Graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach Josh Hingst works directly with the women's golf team.

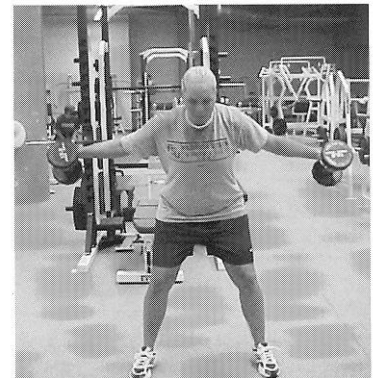

Athletic Academic Support

An Overview of an Award-Winning Academic Support Program

Academic, personal and professional support is essential to college success. At The Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program that enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Director, Mark Meloney states, "Our philosophy is to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assist all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

Our program operates on a "proactive" rather than "reactive" approach. Our academic staff does not wait for crises to occur. We gather important background information on each entering student-athlete, build an academic profile and develop individualized support programs which are tailored to the unique needs of each student-athlete. We also stay informed on the daily progress of the student-athletes through consistent communication with our faculty.

The academic support unit is housed in the \$126 million dollar, state-of-the-art University Center Complex. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 20 IBM compatible computers and laser jet printers. In addition, the athletic skyboxes are used for group and individualized tutorial instruction. The academic support staff is comprised of a director, an administrative assistant, five academic counselors, several graduate assistants, individualized learning specialists and a cadre of approximately 50 tutors and mentors.

Mark Meloney was named the program's director in 1997 and brings 13 years of advising experience to the position. Over the past seven years, Meloney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student-athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from *Athletic Management* magazine.

Academic Support Tutorial Program

The Athletic Department at Florida State University has made a commitment to providing our student-athletes with one of the finest and most comprehensive tutorial programs in the nation. The tutorial program is just one of several key support services that is available to all student-athletes as they progress towards their ultimate goal of obtaining a college degree. We hire approximately 70 tutors a year, from a variety of academic departments, who are committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach in assisting student-athletes with course comprehension and study skills. The tutors are usually seniors or graduate-level students who have outstanding academic backgrounds. Tutorial assistance is available for all academic course work and may be obtained by filling out a tutorial request form at the beginning of the semester, or as needed.

Academic Honors and Awards

Florida State University student-athletes have achieved great success in obtaining recognition for academic excellence. More than \$200,000 in postgraduate monies have been granted to Seminole student-athletes over the past six years, as well as a number of other academic honors and awards.

Florida State University named a school record of 187 student-athletes to the 2002 Atlantic Coast Conference Honor Roll. In the 2001-2002 academic year alone, Florida State boasted two ACC Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship Winners, an ACC Scholar Athlete Award Winner, a NACDA Minority \$10,000 Postgraduate Scholarship Award Winner and Florida State's sixth National Football Foundation \$18,000 Postgraduate Scholarship Winner.

The Academic Support Program is committed to recognizing the academic success of all student-athletes. The Athletic Department, in conjunction with Seminole Boosters, Inc., sponsors the annual "Golden Torch Gala," a black-tie academic awards banquet, each fall. The ACC Honor Roll student-athletes, as well as the individuals with the highest GPA on their respective teams, and the men's & women's teams with the highest GPA are recognized at this event.

Team meetings are held each year, during which time student-athletes are notified of potential honors and awards and are encouraged to apply. Combining a strong grade point average with athletic accomplishments, community service activities and leadership experiences make for a student athlete capable of obtaining unlimited academic honors, awards and postgraduate opportunities.

This is Florida State Women's Golf

The Seminole women's golf program has a long tradition of success. Since the spring of 1990, the Seminoles have won ten team championships – an average of nearly one a year. Equally as impressive is the more than 60 top-five individual finishes the squad has compiled in just over 100 tournaments.

The Seminoles claimed the championship of the Ryder/Florida Championship during the Spring of 2003. During the event, All-American Kristin Tamulis finished first in the individual standings to mark her first of two career individual wins.

Many Seminole golfers have made their mark on the Seminole record book during their careers. Led by two-time All-ACC selection Karen Stupples, who won two individual tournament championships during her career, a total of seven Florida State golfers have earned individual medalist honors at seven different tournaments. Stupples earned All-America second-team honors in 1995.

Since the beginning of the 1990 season, 20 Seminole golfers have posted top-five individual finishes. Current Seminole assistant coach Amy Bond, who completed her career in 1999, captured medalist honors at the Ryder/Florida Championship and led Florida State to the team title in the event. Bond earned All-ACC honors that season. Tamulis finished second at the Ryder/Florida Championship in leading the Seminoles to the team title in 2002.

Florida State has played in the NCAA Regionals in each of the last two seasons and made eight NCAA appearances from 1991-99 including seven straight from 1991-97. Florida State played in the NCAA Tournament and made eight regional appearances during the decade of the 1990's.

1981 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM

The Florida State women's golf team won the 1981 A.I.A.W. National Championship with a three-stroke victory over the University of Georgia. The Seminoles finished the tournament with a 1,220 four-round score to best the Lady Bulldogs who finished the event with a 1,223 score.

Florida State entered the final round of the championship with a one-stroke lead over Georgia but had to rally to win the event. The Seminoles stumbled on the front nine during the final day and fell behind by a mere two strokes. The turn, however, proved to be Florida State's turn of fortune as four of the five Seminole golfers birdied the 17th hole and Florida State was on its way to its first national championship.

The Seminoles' national championship team featured three of the top all-time golfers in Florida State history. Lisa Young, Florida State's finisher during the 1981 national championship, earned All-America honors that season along with Michele Guibault. Barb Bunkowsky, who earned All-America honors in 1982, finished 14th in the national championship field as she birdied the final five holes of event to help lead the Seminoles to the title.

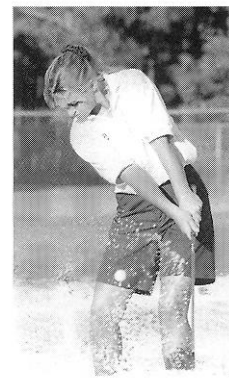

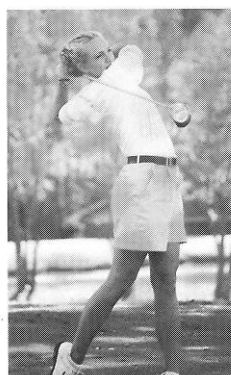

A Closer Look – The Atlantic Coast Conference

The Atlantic Coast Conference boasts a rich tradition of success in women's golf. Each of the six teams in the ACC is considered to be among the best in the nation and together form the top women's golf conference in the nation.

Florida State joined the ACC and began competing for the conference championship in 1992. The Seminoles have been one of the most successful women's golf teams in the league since their arrival. The Seminoles have finished second in the league championship three times (1992, 1995 and 1999) and finished third in 2001. Debbie Dillman was named the ACC Coach of the Year in 1992.

Former Seminole Kristin Tamulis earned All-ACC honors for the third consecutive year in a vote by the league's six head coaches in 2003. She became the first women's golfer in Florida State history and only the 12th in ACC history to earn all-conference honors at least three times during her career.

In 2003, Tamulis shot a school record and career-low six-under par 65 in the final round and finished in a tie for fourth place in the individual standings at the 15th Annual Atlantic Coast Conference Championship at Salem Glen Country Club. Tamulis' record-setting day helped the Seminoles shoot a season-low 286 and finish in fifth in the team standings as competition in the 54-hole event.

Tamulis earned her third consecutive top-five ACC Championship finish. She finished fourth in 2002 and tied for third in 2001. Tamulis' previous career-low score of 68 came during the third round of the Landfall Tradition during the fall of 2001. After shooting seven-over par 78 in the first round of the event, Tamulis improved her individual standing by 10 positions over the final 36 holes.

Junior Alison Curdt earned her second consecutive top-15 individual finish as she carded a 75 in the final round and finished in a tie for 15th place. The finish was Curdt's best ACC finish in three ACC Championships. Her previous best ACC finish was 20th in 2001.

TAMULIS EARNS ALL-ACC HONORS FOR THIRD TIME

Senior All-American Kristin Tamulis earned All-ACC honors for the third consecutive year in a vote by the league's six head coaches in 2003. She became the first women's golfer in Florida State history and only the 12th in ACC history to earn all-conference honors at least three times during her career. Jenny Chuasiriporn and Candy Hannemann of Duke are the only women in ACC history to earn All-ACC honors during each of the four years.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

FSU's student-athletes contributed over 4,500 volunteer hours in service to the community in 2002-2003. They also helped to raise \$64,000 in direct support to charities.

Florida State student-athletes volunteered their time working with students from every elementary and middle school in Leon County as well as schools in nearby Wakulla and Gadsden counties.

ACADEMICS

Seven of Florida State's 17 athletic teams — that's 41 percent — currently have a 3.0 or better grade point average.

Since joining the ACC in 1991, FSU has had six National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame National Scholar Athlete Award winners — the most among all ACC schools and a figure that ranks second nationally in the past 10 years.

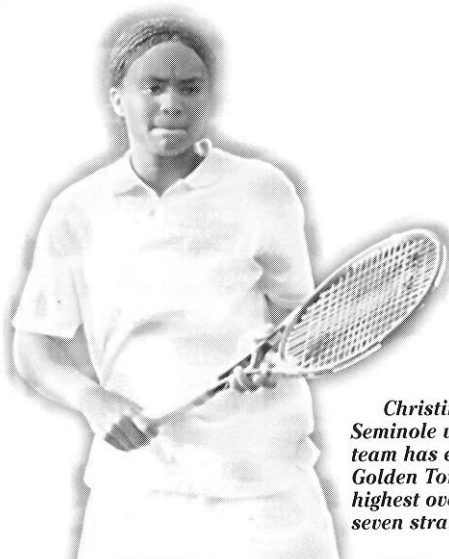

COACHING EXCELLENCE

When it comes to legendary head coaches, it is hard to argue anyone has been as fortunate as Florida State. The Seminoles have three coaches who have established records that rank them with the greatest coaches ever to roam an NCAA sideline.

Florida State is the only NCAA school with three coaches in the top 10 for all-time victories in their sport and in the top five in wins and winning percentage among active coaches. Mike Martin (baseball), Bobby Bowden (football) and JoAnne Graf (softball) have combined for 2,839 wins and each coach appears in the top two for either active winning percentage (Martin), active wins (Graf) or all-time wins (Bowden).



POSTGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

In 1996, Seminole Daryl Bush was the first ever recipient of the State Farm National Scholar Athlete of the Year Award, now given annually.

Florida State boasts two NACDA PostGraduate Award winners in the last three years. The scholarship, which originated in 2001, grants \$10,000 scholarships to its recipients.

In 2001, former Seminole Chris Weinke was the recipient of the first ever ACC Scholar Award which is given annually to an excellent athlete and top scholar who is not going on to graduate school. Football's Chris Hope (2002) and baseball's Matt Lynch (2003) have also earned the distinction.

Florida State has more all-time ACC Honor Roll selections (1,499) than all-time All-ACC honorees (1,479). On top of that number, 24 Seminoles have been named Academic All-Americans and 18 Florida State athletes have received postgraduate scholarships.

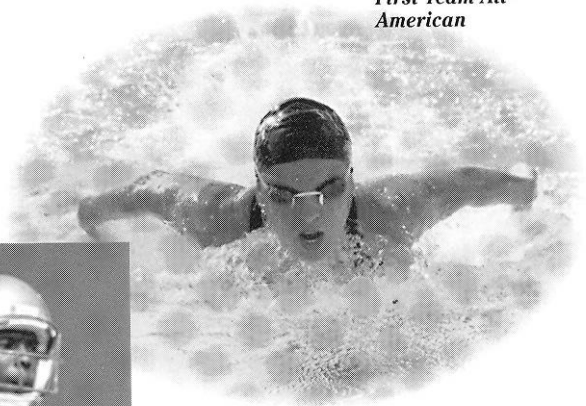

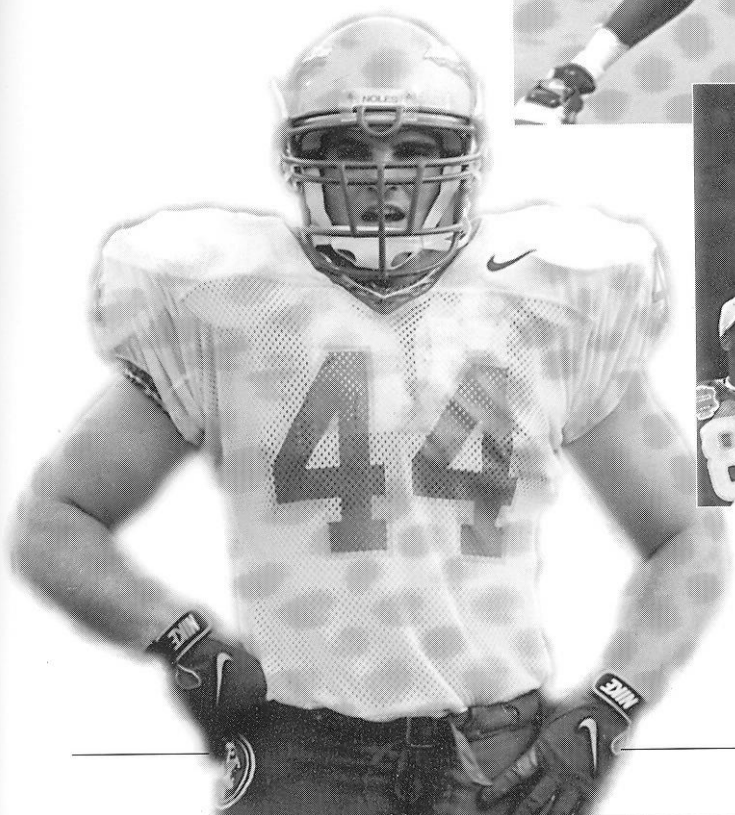
