Finally, the decisions and priorities of the Department should always focus on our student-athletes – first, as individuals; second, as students; and third, as athletes.

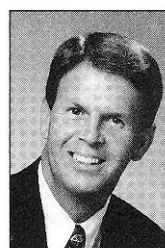
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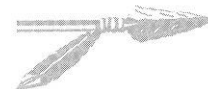

AS SEMINOLES BEGIN 2004-05 SEASON

The Seminoles have earned two consecutive top 20 national finishes and are looking to sustain that success as they continue the process of developing the program into one of the elite programs in the world of collegiate women's golf.

As evidenced by its two top 20 national finishes in the last two years, the Florida State women's golf team is well on its way to cementing its status as one of the nation's top programs. The Seminoles have played in the NCAA Tournament in 12 of the last 14 years and advanced to the NCAA Championship seven times during that span. Individually, at least one Seminole has earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors in each of the last four years.

Florida State finished 19th nationally in 2004 and returns two starters – Caroline Larsson and Jaclyn Burch – who were integral players in helping the Seminoles earn five top five team finishes and a fourth place finish at the NCAA East Regional last season. Larsson and Burch could be joined in the starting lineup by senior Tyler Johnson or junior Kristina Prestipino, who both played as members of the Seminoles' starting lineup in 2004, or any one of the five talented newcomers who have become part of the Florida State tradition of winning for the first time this season.

WITH A PAIR OF EXPERIENCED STARTERS, A STRONG GROUP OF SIX VETERANS AND FOUR TALENTED FRESHMEN ON ITS ROSTER, THE FLORIDA STATE WOMEN'S GOLF TEAM IS EAGERLY ANTICIPATING THE START OF THE 2004-05 SEASON.

"Our two leaders are Caroline and Jaclyn who both played in every event last season," said head coach Debbie Dillman. "We will count on those two players to be strong during each round we play. At the same time, we are confident that the experience Tyler and Kristina gained last season will benefit them as they accept expanded roles within our team. We are also comfortable that all five of our incoming players have the ability to mature quickly and become part of our starting lineup."

That said, Dillman has to replace three of the most successful players in the recent history of the program as seniors Alison Curdt, Carrie Sordel and Katie Quinney finished their careers as they walked from the 18th green at the 2004 NCAA Championship

at the Grand National Golf Course at Auburn University. The trio helped Florida State reach two NCAA Championships, four NCAA Regionals and helped the Seminoles win four tournament championships in the last four years.

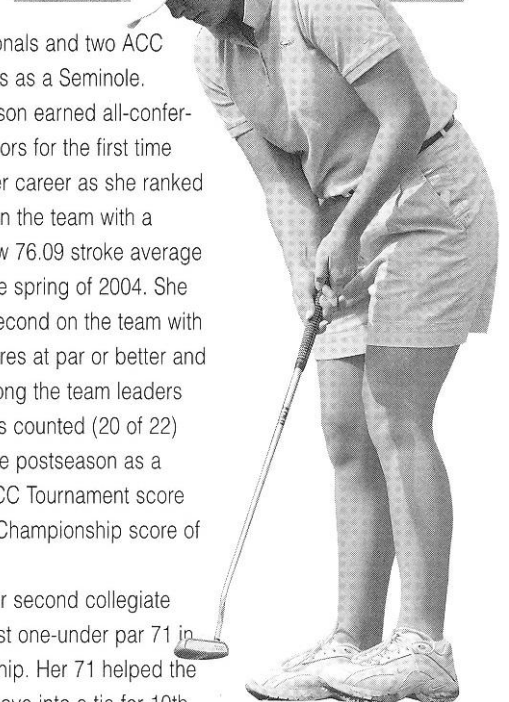
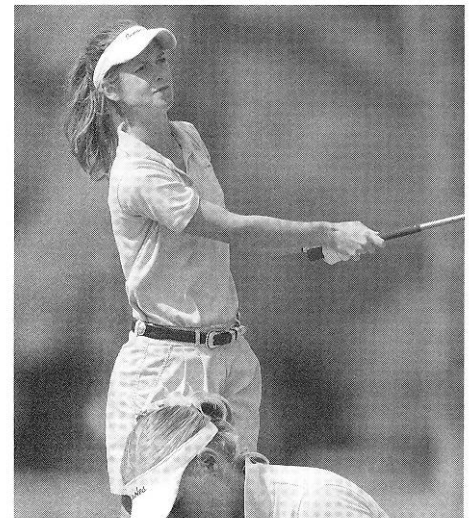
"Alison, Carrie and Katie were very consistent golfers throughout their careers and they will certainly be missed," said Dillman. "They helped us make our program what it is today and they will be hard to replace. They also helped us build a strong foundation and helped teach our younger golfers how to be successful."

That success begins with Larsson, who has played in two NCAA Championships during her career. She was an All-ACC selection in 2004 and could prove to be one of the top golfers in the top conference in the nation as she begins her junior season. Larsson is the Seminoles' team leader who has played in 22 events including two NCAA Championships, two NCAA Regionals and two ACC Championships during her first two years as a Seminole.

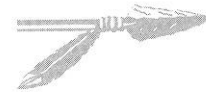
Larsson earned all-conference honors for the first time during her career as she ranked second on the team with a career-low 76.09 stroke average during the spring of 2004. She ranked second on the team with three scores at par or better and nine scores at 75 or below and was among the team leaders with better than 90 percent of her rounds counted (20 of 22) for the season. She performed well in the postseason as a sophomore as she achieved the best ACC Tournament score of her career (222) and the best NCAA Championship score of her career (300).

Larsson saved her best round of her second collegiate season when she carded a season's-best one-under par 71 in the third round of the NCAA Championship. Her 71 helped the Seminoles shoot a 295 team total and move into a tie for 10th place in the team standings after three rounds. Larsson finished the championship with a total of 12-over par for the four

Tyler Johnson will look to use her experience to join the Seminoles' starting lineup in 2005.

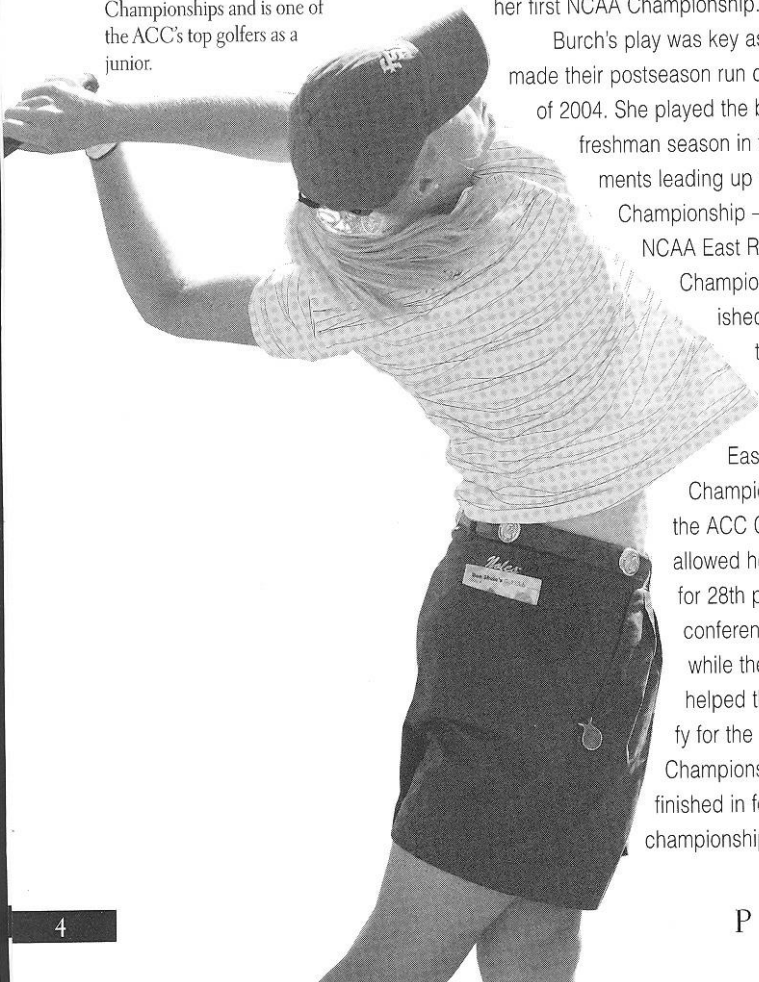

rounds after finishing 33-over par at the 2003 NCAA Championship.

"Caroline Larsson will be our leader both on and off the course," said Dillman. "She has played in two NCAA Championships and a number of big tournaments during her first two years at Florida State. Combine her collegiate experience with the high-level of golf she has played in Europe and you can see why she has the chance to be one of the top golfers in the nation."

Burch, a sophomore, will also be a key to the Seminoles' success in Dillman's 21st season. She broke into the Seminoles' starting lineup as a freshman and played in 11 events during the fall 2003 and spring 2004 seasons.

She played well in her first career NCAA Championship appearance with four scores in the 70's and her career best of 72 in the final round of the event. Burch was the highest-ranking Seminole on the final day of her first NCAA Championship.

Burch's play was key as the Seminoles made their postseason run during the spring of 2004. She played the best golf of her freshman season in the two tournaments leading up to the NCAA Championship – the ACC and NCAA East Regional Championships. Burch finished with career-best tournament scores of 231 in the ACC and NCAA East Regional Championships. Her 231 at the ACC Championship allowed her to finish in a tie for 28th place in her first conference championship while the identical score helped the Seminoles qualify for the NCAA Championship as the team finished in fourth in the regional championship. She helped

Florida State solidify its position in the NCAA Regional and its invitation to the NCAA Championship with a 74 in the final round of the event. Burch closed out the season as she established her career-best single-round score with an even-par 72 in the fourth and final round of the NCAA Championship. She led all five Seminoles in the final round of the competition.

"We were very pleased with Jaclyn's performance during her first season," said Dillman. "She displayed the ability to compete on the collegiate level and improved with every tournament during the year. Her play in the final round of the national championship was brilliant and showed us that with continued improvement that she can be one of the top golfers in the ACC during her career. Jaclyn's future is very bright."

As underclassmen, both Larsson and Burch are golfers of the present and the future for the Seminoles. Both broke into the starting lineup as freshmen and have helped the team earn national success in the last two years. With a great deal of collegiate golf ahead of both players, the Seminoles' No. 1 and 2 players will match up favorably with any one in the nation for years to come.

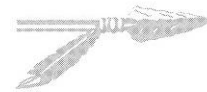
Dillman has recruited well and enters the season with many strong options in place to fill the remaining three spots in the starting lineup. She has the good fortune of being able to choose from a collection of three seniors, two juniors and a sophomore who have all earned playing time during their Florida State careers, and a trio of highly-touted freshmen all with the potential to step into the lineup immediately.

The top candidates to fill two of the open spots in the lineup are senior Tyler Johnson and junior Kristina Prestipino. Johnson played in the 2004 ACC Championship and Prestipino earned starting assignments in two of the Seminoles' four regular season tournaments during the spring of 2004.

Johnson, who has played in nine career tournaments as a Seminole, is among the favorites to earn one of the three vacated spots in Florida State's starting lineup. She played in a single-season career-high three events as a member of the Seminoles' starting five during the spring of 2004 including her first career ACC Championship.

Her best outing in 2004 came at the Ryder/Florida Championship as she helped the Seminoles to a fourth place finish in the team standings with a career-low 239 tournament score. Johnson finished in 35th place at the 16th annual ACC Championship and carded her tournament low score of 82 in the third round of the event.

"Tyler gained invaluable experience last spring and worked as hard as she ever had during the summer before her senior season," said Dillman. "She has the ability to score low and showed us that she can be competitive against top-ranked collegiate competition. I expect her to play well all year long to

help us once again reach our goals of playing in the post-season for the third consecutive year."

Prestipino has been one of the Seminoles' top reserves during her career and has competed in five tournaments as a Seminole. She played in both the Lady Gator and Lady Gamecock tournaments during the spring of 2004 as a member of the Seminoles' starting lineup and helped Florida State to a ninth place finish at the Lady Gamecock.

As a member of the Seminoles' "B" team, she was the Seminoles' top finisher in the Lady Eagle Invitational during the spring 2003 with a career-best tied for seventh place finish. She carded her single-round career-low score of 77 in the first round of the fall 2002 ACC/SEC Challenge and in the second round of the spring 2003 Lady Eagle Invitational.

"Kristina is a player who we knew would begin to blossom for us at about this time during her career," said Dillman. "She is a long hitter and needs only experience to realize rapid improvement in her game. Her best golf as a Seminole is ahead of her and we are excited about Kristina's potential to make a nice fit in our starting lineup."

Senior sisters Amy and Gemma Harris will also contend for playing time again this season. Amy has played in three career events and Gemma has participated in four including the Ann Rhoads/University of Alabama Intercollegiate during the fall of 2003. Both players competed for the Seminoles' "B" team at the Lady Eagle Invitational during the spring of 2003 with Gemma earning medalist honors during the event.

Junior Jennifer Harvey and sophomore Michelle Steakin will also compete for playing time. Both players have competed as members of the Seminoles "B" team at the Lady Eagle Invitational during their careers. Harvey has competed in the event in both 2003 and 2004 while Steakin was in Florida State's lineup in 2004.

A strong class of five newcomers – one with two years of collegiate experience – and all five with strong credentials will begin the year with the opportunity to play their way into the lineup.

Junior Kristin Sordel joins the team from UCF where she earned two varsity letters and played as a member of the Knights' starting lineup the last two years. She has competed in 16 career events including a pair of Atlantic Sun Championships and is a prime candidate to earn a spot in the starting lineup as the year begins. Sordel has competed in a number of high-profile collegiate events including the A-Sun Championship, the Ryder/Florida Championship and the Lady Gator Invitational during her career. She is the sister of former Seminole Carrie Sordel who was a member of the Seminoles' starting lineup from 2001-04.

Florida State's group of freshmen includes Whitney Brummett, Ashley Kemp, Whitney Wright and Ashleigh

Anderson. All four players are talented, tested and possess the ability to earn playing time at any time during the season.

Brummett is a strong hitter who realizes great distance on her drives. She was an all-state first-team selection as a senior and voted as the Most Valuable Player of her high school team four straight years.

Kemp, one of six Florida natives on the Seminoles' roster, is also a long hitter as her long game is the best part of her golfing repertoire. She earned high school All-America honors four times and finished as the state championship runner-up her senior season.

Wright will also compete for playing time upon her arrival at Florida State. She possesses an excellent putting game and consistently keeps her shots in the fairway.

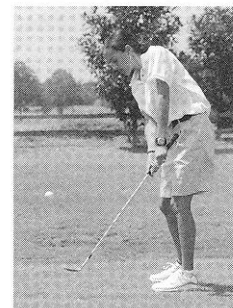
"Each of our three freshmen are players we are very excited about," said Dillman. "All four complement each other and have displayed the desire to improve each time they are on the course. We expect big things from all three players during their careers."

Florida State's success on the national stage comes about in part because the Seminoles annually play one of the nation's most difficult schedules. Their recent success has earned the team invitations to a number of the nation's top events for the upcoming season.

Florida State will host the fifth annual ACC/SEC Challenge at the Raven Course at the Sandestin Golf and Beach Resort in Destin, Florida, in October. The tournament has developed into one of the top tournaments of the year attracting the best teams from the two best women's golf conferences in the nation. Among the teams scheduled to play this year are Duke, Auburn, Wake Forest and Florida. The Seminoles will also return to the Lady Tar Heel and Lady Paladin Invitational and play in the College of Charleston-hosted Cougar Classic during the fall.

"Our players want to be challenged each time we play," said Dillman. "Our schedule this year will challenge our players as much as in any other season. We play on so many different types of courses that offer different opportunities for all of our players to improve on a week-to-week basis. Our schedule prepares us from one week to the next and ultimately prepares us to be successful in the postseason at regionals and nationals."

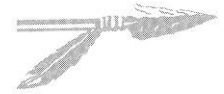

HEAD COACH

The Florida State women's golf team has been a fixture in the national rankings for the last 20 years. The Seminoles have also become regular contenders for both team and individual honors in the Atlantic Coast Conference since joining the league in 1992. In addition, the Seminoles are annually invited to play in the most prestigious tournaments in all of college golf and can usually be found near the top of the leader boards in those events.

The driving force behind Florida State's success is Debbie Dillman who is in her 21st season as the Seminoles' head coach. She has led the Seminoles to the NCAA Tournament in 11 of the last 13 years, guided the team to 17 tournament championships and nearly 60 top 10 finishes. Dillman has coached three All-America players and eight individuals who have earned All-ACC honors a total of 11 times.

Dillman has led the Seminoles to consecutive top 20 national finishes with strong showings at both the 2003 and 2004 NCAA Championships. The Seminoles finished among the nation's top 20 teams at the 2003 NCAA Championship at Purdue University and the 2004 NCAA Championship at Auburn University.

Dillman has established the Seminole program as one of the nation's best by recruiting the nation's top talent to Tallahassee. Her strength as a recruiter is evidenced by the number of former players who have played, or who are playing professionally and the number of players who enjoyed tremendous success as collegians.

Among the numerous current pros recruited by Dillman are Karen Stupples and Tiffany Faucette. Stupples won two tournaments during her collegiate career as a Seminole and qualified for the LPGA on her first attempt. She was also a member of Great Britain's Curtis Cup teams in 1996 and 1998. Stupples earned her first LPGA Championship in 2004 as she won the Welch's/Fry's Championship. Faucette was a three-year mem-

ber of the Seminole women's golf team who is currently playing on the Ladies' European Tour. She won the 1997 McDonald's Open Championship and was runner-up at the 1995 Canadian Women's Amateur Championship.

Dillman recruited and coached Kristin Tamulis, Florida State's first three-time All-ACC selection who graduated from Florida State in 2003. Tamulis has played in each of the last three U.S. Women's Open tournaments.

Dillman's teams consistently rank among the best in the ACC and the nation. In the last four years, she has guided the Seminoles into the NCAA Tournament four times, produced six All-ACC selections and helped the Seminoles improve their standing in the ACC – considered by many to be the toughest women's golf conference in the nation.

Dillman was honored as the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year in 1992, the Seminoles' first year in the conference. The Seminoles finished second in the conference tournament that season and finished only two strokes behind North Carolina for the team championship.

Dillman was a member of Florida State's 1980 nationally ranked squad and 1981 AIAW national championship team.

Dillman has established a top team in Tallahassee by recruiting the best throughout the country and the world. Former Seminoles have achieved great success playing at the professional level while current Seminoles are achieving success at the collegiate level.

Dillman grew up in Davison, Mich., in an active golf family. Both of her parents were involved in country club management. While in high school, Dillman captained her high school golf team for four years and twice was runner-up at the Michigan State Championship. She also won the Flint Junior Golf Championship for three consecutive years that is considered as one of the top junior tournaments in the state of Michigan.

Dillman attended Florida State as an undergraduate and played golf from 1979-1982. While taking classes and playing golf, she also worked at Seminole Golf Course allowing her to learn both the management side and the competitive side of golf. Dillman has a daughter, Anne-Lynn (10).

AMY BOND

ASSISTANT COACH

During her career as a player and an assistant coach at Florida State, Amy Bond has become a part of and helped sustain the Seminoles' outstanding winning tradition. During her three years as a player, she helped lead the Seminoles to three NCAA Tournament appearances including the 1999 NCAA Championship. As an assistant coach, Bond has helped the Seminoles reach the NCAA Tournament three times including consecutive appearances in the NCAA Championship in both 2003 and 2004.

A 1998 All-ACC selection, Bond was the Seminoles' top player from 1997-1999 as she earned 10 top 10 finishes and was named the team Most Valuable Player each year. She competed in the NCAA Championship tournament as a senior in 1999 (finishing in 30th place) and played in three NCAA regional tournaments during her career. In addition, she finished in the top 20 in four consecutive ACC Championship tournaments and was the medallist at the 1998 Ryder/Florida State championship tournament. Bond earned 14 top 15 finishes during her collegiate career.

She was named one of the 50 greatest women's golfers in Atlantic Coast Conference history – one of only three Florida State players named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary team in 2002.

Now in her fourth season as an assistant coach, Bond is an integral part of the Seminoles' program and assists with all of the coaching and administrative duties of the team. Her recruiting duties have recently been expanded as she spent the summer of 2004 at various junior golf tournaments searching for the next great Seminole player.

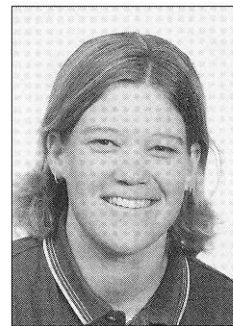
During her first three years as an assistant to head coach Debbie Dillman, Bond helped coach the Seminoles to 2002 NCAA Central Regional Championship and the 2003 and 2004 NCAA Championship where they earned top-20 national finishes both years. She also coached three All-ACC selections – Kristin Tamulis (2002 and 2003) and Caroline Larsson and Katie Quinney in 2004.

Bond has also enjoyed success as a professional golfer.

She joined the professional ranks and began playing on the SBC Futures Tour in 1999. In 2000, she made 13 cuts in the 17 events she entered and gained tour status that allowed her to play in each of the scheduled SBC events in 2001. She participated on the tour during the summer of 2002 and 2003.

The Ocala, Fla., native earned Academic All-America honors during her senior season and was a four-time ACC Honor Roll selection. She earned her bachelor's degree in sport management in 1997 and her master's in sports administration in 1999. Bond was a member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Council (1997-99) and represented Florida State University at the NCAA Leadership Conference in 1999.

Bond also enjoyed a successful junior career before coming to Florida State. She won the Marion County championship in 1992 and the Yancy Junior championship in 1991, 1992 and 1994. Bond was a four-year varsity team member at Vanguard High School where she earned all-area honors four times and won the district championship her senior season.

Florida State Women's Golf Team Earns Second Consecutive Top 20 National Standing in 2004

Larsson and Quinney Earn All-ACC Honors

Seminoles Finish Tied for 19th at 2004 NCAA Championship

Freshman Jaclyn Burch led Florida State with a career-low 72 in the fourth and final round and the Seminoles finished in a tie for 19th place in the team standings at the NCAA Women's Golf Championship at Grand National Golf Course. It marked the second consecutive season the Seminoles finished in the nation's top 20 after also finishing in a tie for 19th place at the 2003 National Championship. Burch led the Seminoles with her first career even par score and finished the tournament in a tie for 88th place with a 307 total for the 54-hole event. Her previous best score of 74 came three times during the spring season including most recently in the third round of the NCAA Regional.

It was her fourth score at 75 or below for the season. UCLA won its second national championship as it defeated No. 10-ranked Oklahoma State by three strokes and No. 1 ranked Duke by 11 strokes. It was the Bruins' first national championship since 1991.

Sarah Huarte of California won individual medalist honors as she outpaced Karin Sjodin of Oklahoma State by one stroke.

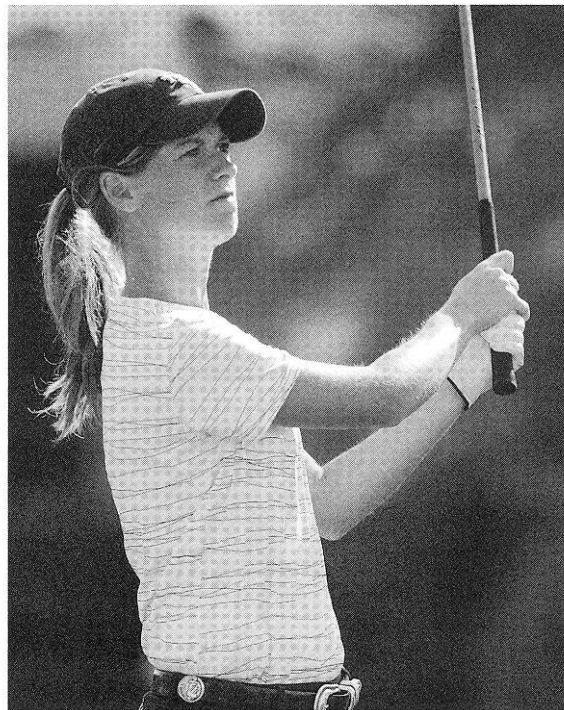
Florida State in the NCAA Championship

Florida State finished in a tie for 19th at the NCAA Championship at the Grand National Golf Course in Opelika, Ala. The Seminoles were led by senior Carrie Sordel (Windermere, Fla.) who finished in a tie for 38th place in the individual standings. Florida State shot its best 72-hole national championship score of 1,198 (58 strokes fewer than last season) and broke the 1,200 stroke mark for the first time in six NCAA Championship appearances.

Seminoles in the National Rankings

Florida State finished the season ranked No. 29 in the GolfWeek/ Sagarin Power Rankings.

The Seminoles were ranked 30th in the nation prior to the ACC Championship and 32nd nationally when they began play in the NCAA East Regional Championship. The Seminoles were ranked No. 23 in the nation before finishing tied for 19th at the NCAA



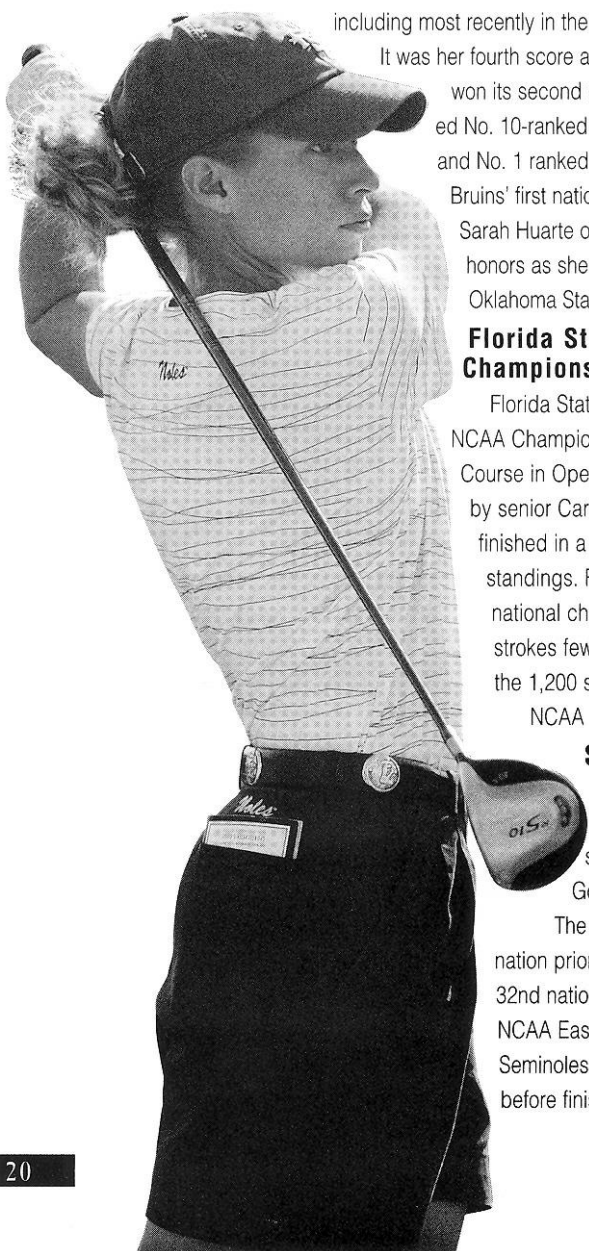
Jaclyn Burch played in 11 events including the 2004 NCAA Championship as a freshman.

Championships during the spring of 2003. Florida State was ranked as high as No. 12 nationally in 2003. The Seminoles are the fourth highest ranked team in the ACC behind No. 1 Duke, No. 13 Wake Forest and No. 17 North Carolina. Seminole senior Katie Quinney (Atlantic Beach, Fla.) finished the season ranked 56th in the national individual rankings – she had been ranked among the nation's top golfers throughout the spring season. Quinney entered the NCAA East Regional ranked 59th nationally and moved up four spots after finishing in a tie for 12th place in the event.

Quinney and Larsson Earn All-ACC Honors

Senior Katie Quinney and sophomore Caroline Larsson earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors in a vote of the league's seven head coaches in 2004. It marks the first time Quinney and Larsson have earned all-conference honors and only the second time in school history that two players have been so honored in the same season. Quinney and Larsson are the seventh and eighth Seminoles to earn All-ACC honors with those eight players earning the honor 11 different times. The pair joins Seminole greats Erica Firnhaber (1992), Marie Josee-Rouleau (1993), Karen Stupples (1994 and 1995), current Seminole assistant coach Amy Bond (1998), Louise Wright (2001) and Kristin Tamulis (2001, 2002, 2003) as Seminoles who have earned All-ACC honors. Of those six players, Bond, Stupples and Wright were named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary team in 2003.

Katie Quinney closed out a stellar career by earning All-ACC honors in 2004.





Sordel Earns All-Region Honors

Carrie Sordel earned All-South Region honors for her ninth place finish at the NCAA East Regional Championship at the Mission Inn Golf and Tennis Resort in Howey-In-The-Hills, Fla. She led the Seminoles to a fourth place finish in the event which qualified the Seminoles for the NCAA Championship for the second consecutive season. Sordel carded a two-under par 70 in the second round of the event and finished with a 54-hole total of 222. Her single-round score of 70 established a career best while her 222 tournament score tied her career best. The tied for ninth place finish was the fourth top 10 finish of her career.

Seminole Senior Class in Stellar Company

Florida State's senior class of Alison Curdt, Carrie Sordel and Katie Quinney played in its second consecutive NCAA Championship in 2004. It marked only the third time a Seminole senior class had played in two NCAA Championships during their careers at Florida State. The Seminoles' class of 2004 is joined by the classes of 1992 and 1994 as the only graduating groups who have known all about the NCAA's at the end of at least two of their seasons at Florida State.

Curdt and Larsson Earn Academic Honors

Alison Curdt and Caroline Larsson earned Academic All-America honors from the National Golf Coaches Association at its annual awards dinner held in conjunction with the NCAA Women's Golf Championships. Curdt earned Academic All-America honors for the third time in her career. The senior with a double major in psychology and professional golf management earned the honor as a sophomore, junior and senior (freshmen were ineligible for the honor in 2001). Curdt has already finished her academic requirements for her psychology degree and is only one semester shy of earning her PGM degree. She will serve a golf internship at the Mission Inn and Golf Club during the summer of 2004. Larsson, a psychology major, earned the academic honor for a second consecutive season. After two full years as a student at Florida State, Larsson has never received any grade less than an A- (and she has only ever received two of those grades). To earn All-America mention from the NGCA, players must possess at least a 3.5 grade point average for their academic career and be a significant contributor to the team for the season.

FLORIDA STATE'S FALL 2003 SEASON

Florida State won the team championship at the Ann Rhoads/University of Alabama Intercollegiate and earned two top five and four top 10 team finishes during the fall 2003 season. The Seminoles claimed the championship of the Alabama Tournament as Katie Quinney (third) and Alison Curdt (fourth) finished in the top five in the individual standings and a total of four Florida State players finished in the top 20. Florida State also earned a fifth place team finish at the Price's Give 'Em Five Intercollegiate at New Mexico State University as Quinney finished in a tie for sixth place in the individual standings. Quinney again led the Seminoles as she finished in a tie for

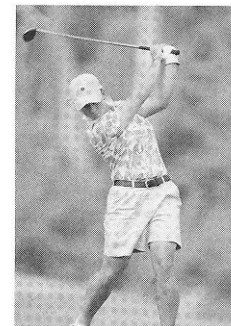
12th place at the Florida State-hosted ACC/SEC Challenge. The Seminoles finished in eighth place in the team standings at the ACC/SEC – a tournament that has become one of the premier women's golf tournaments in the nation. Quinney led the Seminoles with a career-best 74.80 stroke average for the season.

FLORIDA STATE'S SPRING SEASON

Florida State earned three top five and five top 10 team finishes and had two different golfers earn three top five individual finishes during the spring 2004 season. The Seminoles earned five consecutive top 10 team finishes with ninth place finishes at the Lady Gamecock and Liz Murphey Classics, a fourth place finish at the Ryder/Florida Championship, a fifth place finish at the ACC Championship and a fourth place finish at the NCAA East Regional. Four different golfers – Alison Curdt (at the Lady Gator), Caroline Larsson (at the Lady Gator and Lady Gamecock), Carrie Sordel (at the NCAA East Regional) and Katie Quinney (at the Liz Murphey, Ryder/Florida and ACC Championships) led Florida State as its top finisher. The Seminoles utilized four different lineups with Curdt, Larsson (Danderyd, Sweden), Quinney and Jaelyn Burch (Wildwood, Mo.) being the constants and playing in all seven events while Tyler Johnson (Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla.) played in three and Kristina Prestipino (Coral Springs, Fla.) played in two. Carrie Sordel (Windermere, Fla.) played in both the NCAA East Regional and NCAA Championship.

Florida State Finishes Fourth at NCAA Regional

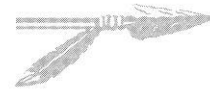
Florida State finished in fourth place at the 2004 NCAA East Regional and advanced to the NCAA Championship for the second consecutive year. The Seminoles finished with a 904 team score and finished as one of the eight teams from the region to advance to the national championship. Seeded 13th in the region entering the event, the Seminoles stunned a number of highly ranked teams to advance to the pinnacle event of the women's collegiate golf world. The Seminoles finished fourth in the event behind No. 1-ranked Duke, UNLV and North Carolina with a team score of 904. All four of Florida State's countable scores in the third and final round came in at two-over par 74 and gave the team a final round score of 296. The Seminoles moved into fourth after finishing the first round in eighth place and the second round in seventh place.

Quinney Enjoys Best Season

Katie Quinney enjoyed her best season during the spring of 2004 as she earned All-ACC honors and led the Seminoles to the NCAA Championship for the second consecutive season. In addition, she helped lead the Seminoles to a fourth place finish at the NCAA East Regional and a tied for 19th place finish at the NCAA Championship. Quinney carded her career-low single-round score of 67 in the second round of the ACC Championship – the 67 was the best single-round score of her career, her best personal score in three ACC Championship appearances allowed her to finish with her best ACC score over 54 holes of 213 and earned her top ACC finish at tied for fifth place. Her best previous ACC finish had been tied for 21st during the 2003 championship. Quinney's career-best 54-hole tournament score of 211 came at the Liz Murphey Collegiate Classic as she carded a 70-71-70 to finish with all three scores under par in the event. She closed out her final collegiate season as she earned four consecutive top 10 individual finishes and was a total of 14 strokes over par in four consecutive events (Liz Murphey Collegiate Classic, Ryder/Florida Championship, ACC Championship and NCAA East Regional) leading up to the NCAA Championship.

Curd Close Stellar Seminole Career

Senior Alison Curdt shot her near career low of 70 (two-under par) in the first round of the NCAA Championship at the Grand National Golf Course in Opelika, Ala., to close her stellar Seminole career in style. Curdt's 70 in the first round of the

NCAA Championship was her best single-round score in eight rounds during the two national championship events she played in during her career and was one of two times she shot par or better during the spring 2004 season. She starred for the Seminoles in the NCAA East Regional and helped the Seminoles qualify for the NCAA Championships a second straight time in 2004. She was one of four Seminoles who shot a two-over par 74 in the third and final round of the regional to help Florida State finish fourth and qualify comfortably for the NCAA Championship. Florida State entered the final day of the regional in seventh place in the team standings and needed to perform well on the final day to earn one of the top eight spots in order to qualify for nationals. Curdt did her part in total a 74 to help the Seminoles to a 296 team total and a trip to the NCAA Championship for the second consecutive year. She was the Seminoles' top finisher at the season-opening Lady Gator Invitational and finished in a tie with teammate Caroline Larsson in the team and individual standings.

Curdt Never Missed a Tournament

Senior Alison Curdt played in her 42 tournaments as a member of the Seminoles' starting lineup during her four-year career. She never missed competing in a tournament during her Florida State career. Curdt was in the starting lineup for Florida State in every tournament since the Auburn Tiger Derby during the fall of 2000.

Sordell Leads Way for Seminoles in Postseason

Carrie Sordel was the Seminoles' driving force at both the NCAA East Regional and the NCAA Championship as she finished in a tied for ninth at the East Regional and in a tie for 38th at the NCAA Championship. Both finishes led the Seminoles in the individual standings. During her career, Sordel helped lead the Seminoles to two NCAA Championship Tournaments (2003 and 2004) and four consecutive NCAA Regional appearances (2001, 2002, 2003 and 2004) during her career. Her career-low single-round score of 70 came in the second round of the 2004 NCAA East Regional and helped her finish in a tie for ninth in the event. Her ninth place finish led the Seminoles to a fourth place team finish and a berth in the NCAA Championship. Sordel's scored of 70 also allowed her to finish with a career-best 222 total for the 54-hole event at the Mission Hills Golf and Tennis Resort.

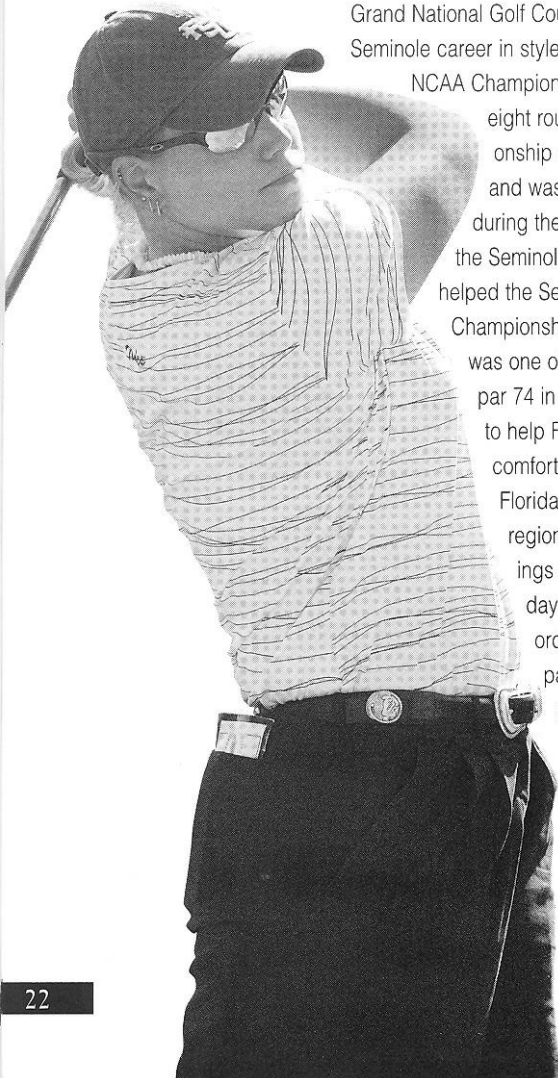
Larsson Enjoys Best Season of Career

Caroline Larsson, who earned All-ACC honors for the first time during her career, ranked second on the team with a career-low 76.09 stroke average during the spring 2004 season. She ranked second on the team with three scores at par or better and nine scores at 75 or below and was among the team leaders with better than 90 percent of her rounds counted (20 of 22) for the season. Larsson helped lead the Seminoles to the NCAA Championship for the second consecutive year where she earned her career-best NCAA Championship individual finish of tied for 59th place. She performed at her best in the postseason as she achieved the best ACC Tournament score of her career (222) and the best NCAA Championship score of her career (300). Her score in the 2004 ACC Championship was 14 strokes and five individual positions better than her placement in the 2003 ACC Championship while her score in the 2004 NCAA Championship was 21 strokes and 29 individual placements better than her performance in the 2003 NCAA Championship.

Larsson Saves Her Best for Last

Caroline Larsson saved her best round for the best time of the year as she carded a season's-best one-under par 71 in the third round of the NCAA Championship at the Grand National Lake Course at Auburn University. Her 71 helped the Seminoles shoot a 295 team total and move into a tie for 10th place in the team standings after three rounds. Larsson finished a total of 12-over par for the four rounds of the NCAA Championship after finishing 33-over par at the 2003 NCAA Championship.

Alison Curdt enjoyed a standout four-year career as a Seminole.





Burch Enjoys Fine Freshman Season

Jaclyn Burch broke into the Seminoles' starting lineup as a freshman and played in 11 events during the fall 2003 and spring 2004 seasons. She played well in her first career NCAA Championship appearance with four scores in the 70's and a 72 in the final round of the event. Burch carded her career-best single-round score of even-par 72 in the fourth round of the NCAA Championship as she finished as the highest ranking Seminole on the final day of her first NCAA Championship.

Johnson Earns Playing Time

Tyler Johnson (Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla.) played in a single-season career-high three events during the spring of 2004 including her first career ACC Championship. She shot her career-low single-round score of 75 in the first round and earned her career-best 36-hole score of 153 of the fall 2003 ACC/SEC Challenge. She has earned three varsity letters during her career at Florida State.

Prestipino Earns Playing Time in 2003-04

Kristina Prestipino earned her way into the Seminoles' starting lineup for two tournaments during the spring of 2004 - the Lady Gator Invitational and the Lady Gamecock Classic. Her two appearances in the starting lineup marked the first during her career as a Seminole. Prestipino's best single round score of the season came as an 81 in the third round of the Lady Gamecock and was counted towards the team score. Florida State finished in ninth place in the team standings in the event.

Harris Leads Seminole "B" Team During Spring

Junior Gemma Harris (Sheffield, England) won individual medalist honors at the Lady Eagle Women's Golf Invitational at Cypress Head Golf Club in April. She led the Florida State's 'B' team to a second place finish in the team standings. For Harris, it was her first career victory in only her fourth event since joining the team as a freshman in 2001. Harris posted a 79 in the first round, which left her in third. She finished the event with a 77, on the par 72 course, which was tied for the best score of anyone in the tournament. She finished the 36-hole event at plus 12 with a combined score of 156. Her nearest competition was three strokes back.

Women's Golf Team Wins Director's Cup for Community Service for Third Straight Year

For the third consecutive year, the Florida State women's golf team won the prestigious Athletic Director's Cup for Community Service at the annual Golden 'Nole Banquet held during the spring semester at the University Center Club on the FSU campus. Athletics director Dave Hart initiated the Athletic Director's Cup for Service during the 1996-1997 academic year in order to promote community service participation among all teams. In addition, this annual award helps to recognize the thousands of hours of community service FSU student-athletes have completed. The women's golf team

donates much of its time to the Dick Howser Center for Childhood Services in Tallahassee every Friday during the school year. The organization is named for the late Dick Howser, former Seminole head baseball coach and manager of the New York Yankees and Kansas City Royals. The center is a charitable organization that receives monetary support from the citizens of Tallahassee and its surrounding communities.



The Seminole women's golf team has won the Director's Cup for Service in each of the last three years.

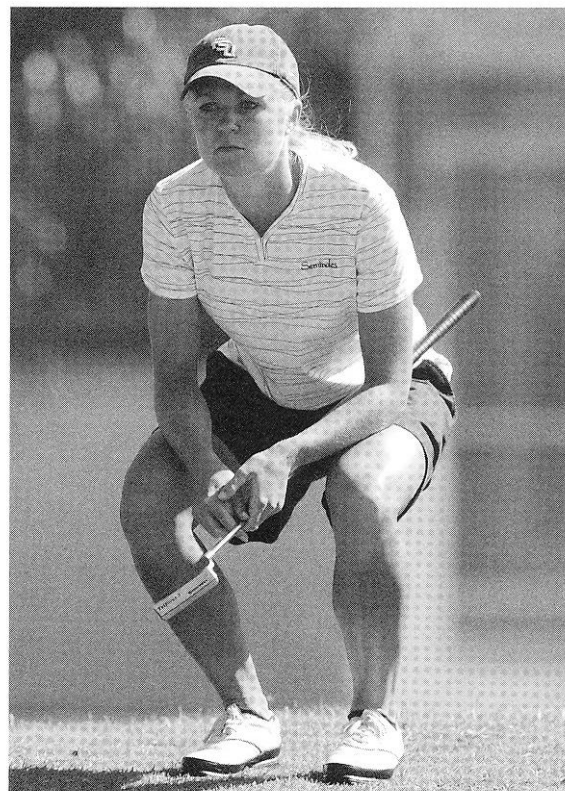
Women's Golf Team Earns Top 20 Final National Standing

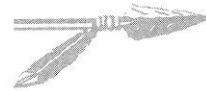

This Is Florida State

Florida State University, a graduate research institution, stands among the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

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Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida, the university is situated in the heart of the state's capital city. The university's main campus blends Jacobean Revival and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods and azaleas of North Florida.

As the university has progressed and grown - from its pre-Civil War beginnings as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, to the Florida

State College for Women and, finally, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947 - it has developed into an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and a standard setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

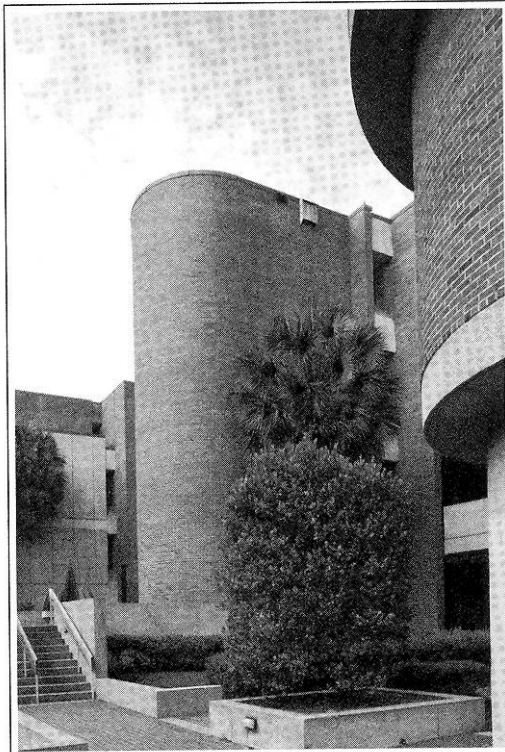
The university has entered the 21st century with excellence in all areas of its mission - teaching, research and public service, including many noteworthy milestones over the past year.

- In May 2004, Vice President Dick Cheney became the first U.S. vice president and the highest-ranking government official ever to deliver a commencement address at FSU.
- In the 2005 edition of the *U.S. News & World Report* guidebook "America's Best Graduate Schools," published in April 2004, the university's master's programs in public affairs were ranked 26th overall, and the specialty of public management administration ranked even higher at 15th. Also, public affairs master's programs in city management and urban policy ranked 24th, and public finance and budgeting ranked 26th.
- In March 2004, *Hispanic Magazine* ranked FSU 22nd among its "Top 25 Colleges for Latinos." Among only public schools, FSU ranked 11th.
- FSU's art therapy program has received national approval, similar to accreditation, for its master's level program from the American Art Therapy Association. FSU is only the 31st school nationally to achieve this recognition.

- In the spring of 2004, FSU made available its public service video "Avoiding the Credit Card Monster," 10 minutes of basic financial advice to youthful credit novices, to every high school and K-12 institution in the nation.
- In March 2004, FSU celebrated the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory's 10th anniversary of scientific research and educational outreach. FSU operates the lab, unique to the

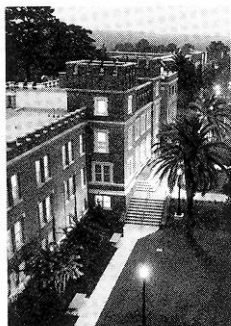
Western Hemisphere, in conjunction with the University of Florida and the Los Alamos National Laboratory.

- The FSU department of psychology was recognized by the American Psychological Association for its clinic that provides mental health services to the community and training and research opportunities for students.
- Faculty members in the FSU School of Information Studies began editing *Library Quarterly*, the pre-eminent scholarly journal of research in the library and information studies community, with its October 2003 issue.
- The FSU College of Medicine added a doctoral program in biomedical sciences in the fall of 2003, with the first seven students recruited to begin this fall.
- President T.K. Wetherell and his wife, Virginia B. Wetherell, made

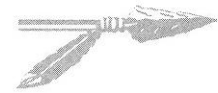


The Fine Arts Center at Florida State houses the School of Visual Arts and Dance and the Fine Arts Program.

- the largest personal donation to a public university in the United States by a sitting president. Through their estate, the Wetherells will leave to FSU their 1,000-acre Oak Hill Plantation in Jefferson County, worth \$7.5 million.
- In October 2003, the FSU athletic training/sports medicine major received national accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs. The major is offered in the department of nutrition, food and exercise sciences in the College of Human Sciences.
- In October 2003, the Chinese Ministry of Education gave 1,000 new Chinese books to FSU in recognition of the university's growing Chinese studies program.
- The FSU Museum of Fine Arts achieved the highest honor for a museum - accreditation by the American Association of Museums.
- On Aug. 29, 2003, FSU launched its "everythingFSU" gate-

way on the World Wide Web at fsu.com. The gateway showcases the best of the university each day, including news and features, and offers users a unique electronic postcard service.

Under the leadership of FSU's 13th president, T.K. Wetherell, who took office in January 2003, and its 13-member Board of Trustees, the university continues to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service. The trustees are: Chairman John Thrasher of Orange Park; Harold Knowles, J. Stanley Marshall and Jim Smith, all of Tallahassee; Emily "June" Duda of Oveido; David Ford of Rosemont, Pa.; Dr. Jessie Furlow of Quincy; Manuel "Manny" Garcia III of Winter Springs; William "Andy" Haggard of Coral Gables; Dr. E. Ann McGee of Winter Springs; Derrick Brooks of Tampa; FSU Faculty Senate President Valliere Richard Auzenne and Student Government Association President Jarrett Eady.

A senior member of the State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act. It began in Tallahassee with its first class of male students in 1857 and added women in 1858.

FSU's operating budget is \$857 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$160 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the Seminole Boosters, the FSU Alumni Association and the FSU Foundation.

The main campus is spread over 448.3 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990's. FSU encompasses 1,445.2 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin, Gadsden and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the university maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory at Turkey Point on the Gulf of Mexico and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years, FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia, Vietnam, the Czech Republic, Greece, Croatia, Ireland, South Africa, Ghana and the Caribbean. FSU's student centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.

Florida State offers 300 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its nine colleges - Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University); Human Sciences; Law; Medicine; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin O'D Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) - and eight schools - Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture,



Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 2,119 members, the FSU faculty has included 10 National Academy of Sciences elected members, four American Academy of Arts and Sciences members and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 3,682 administrative and support staff members.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.6 million book titles and 9 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library is located at the heart of the university's science research complex. FSU also maintains music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library.

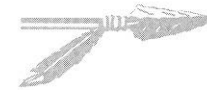
FSU's 6,851 graduate students pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

Of FSU's 37,328-student population, 56.3 percent are female, 43.7 percent are male, 27.6 percent are minorities and 3.8 percent are foreign students.

The Magnet Lab at Florida State is the only one of its kind in the Western Hemisphere.

Located at the center of campus, the Westcott Building is home to the picturesque campus fountain.





FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY COMPLIANCE OFFICE

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student-athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce you to some of the rules governing NCAA athletics.

Key Definitions You Should Know

Representative of Athletics Interests: A representative of the institution's athletics interests (AKA Booster) is an individual who is known (or should have been known) by a member of the institution's athletic department to:

- Have participated in or to be a member of an agency or organization promoting the institution's intercollegiate athletics program;
- Have made financial contributions to the athletics department or to an athletics booster organization of that institution;
- Be assisting or to have been requested (by the athletics department staff) to assist in the recruitment of prospects;
- Be assisting or to have assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families; or
- Have been otherwise in promoting the institution's athletics program.

Once an individual is identified as a representative, the person retains that identity forever.

Prospective Student-Athlete: A prospective student-athlete ("prospect") is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade, regardless whether he or she participates in athletics. A prospective student-athlete maintains his or her identity as a prospect, even after he or she signs a National Letter of Intent or financial aid agreement, until he or she attends the first day of practice or participates in an official team practice, whichever is earlier.

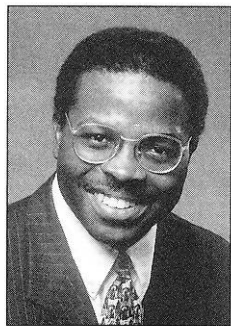
Contact: A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parents, relatives or legal guardian(s) and an institutional staff member during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting. In the sport of golf, a coach can contact you once in the month of April at your school and three more times after July 1 before your senior year in high school.

Evaluation: An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to assess your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

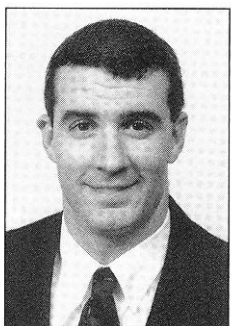
Phone Calls and Letters

During the month of March during your junior year in high school, a coach may make one phone call to you. After that, phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 before your senior year in high school. A coach or faculty member is limited to one phone call per week except that unlimited phone calls may be made:

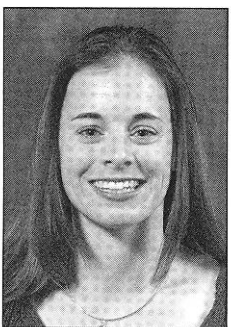
- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university.
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you.
- During the time beginning with the National Letter of Intent signing date through the two days after the signing date and after a National Letter of Intent or scholarship agreement is signed.

A prospect of any age could receive the following from a coach:

- Questionnaire
- Camp brochure
- NCAA educational information

After September 1 of a prospect's junior year, a coach could provide:

- Written correspondence, including letters, e-mails, instant messages and text messages
- Game programs
- Media guide
- Schedule cards
- Official academic, admission and student services publications and videotapes produced by the institution and are available to all students

After a prospect signs a National Letter of Intent, a coach could provide:

- Information
- Student-Athlete Handbook (could also be provided on an official or unofficial visit)

Who is Permitted to Recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Boosters may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Alumni and Boosters Do's and Don'ts

- You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.
- You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware you are making these contacts in regard to employment.
- You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletic programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.
- You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.
- You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.
- You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.
- You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.
- You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).
- You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.
- You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the Compliance Office.

New Opportunities for Leadership, Education and Service

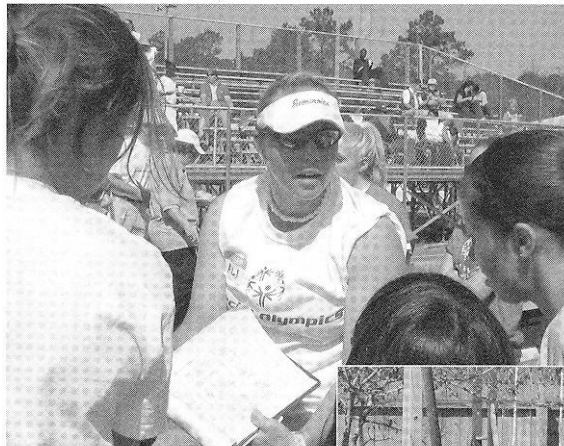

Personal Development

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the N.O.L.E.S. program. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers' Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.

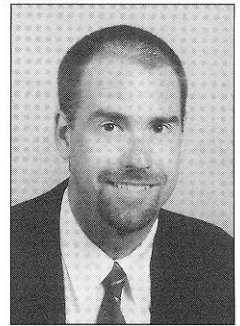
Leadership Development

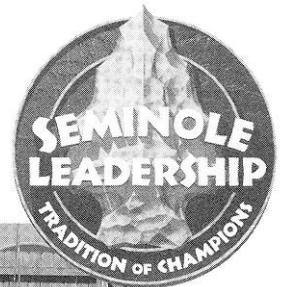

as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back to school picnic.

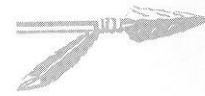

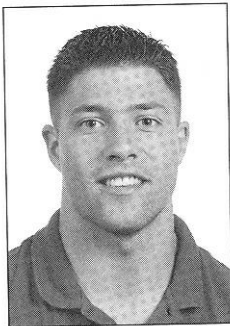
The women's golf team has won the Director's Cup for Service the last three years.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

The strength and conditioning program at Florida State University is designed to improve athletic performance through an individualized regimen of stretching, lifting, speed, power, agility and conditioning drills. The goal of the program is to maximize the performance of the Seminole golfers while reducing the risk of injury.

Physical development is critical in order to excel at the collegiate level. The strength and conditioning staff individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole student-athletes beginning with a preconditioning program before the season gets under way. The focus of the strength and conditioning staff revolves around building stronger and more well-conditioned athletes. The staff is goal-orientated towards providing the Florida State student-athletes with the best instruction, tools and resources in the nation.

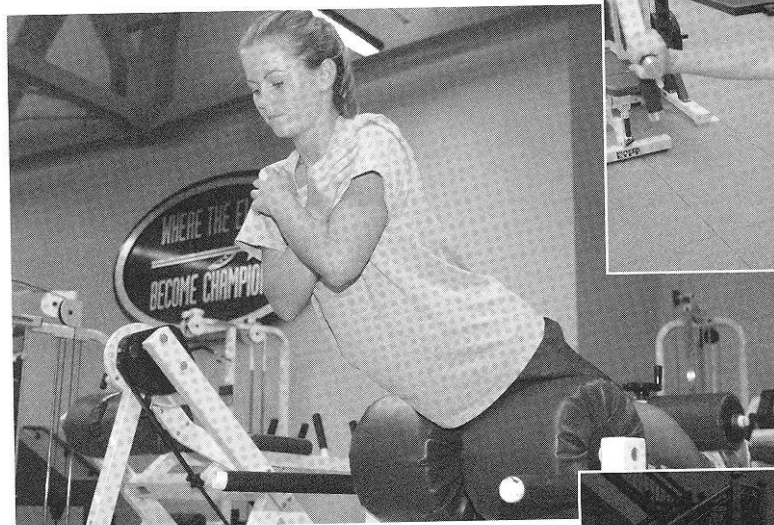
Strength and conditioning for golf must be carefully planned and geared to a golf build. Preparing the Seminole student-athletes to be successful on the golf course encompasses exercises that match the characteristics of the game. The best way to build strength for golf is to understand the principals that govern the sport itself, then apply the exercises, sets and repetitions to being successful on the golf course.

Graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach Josh Hingst works directly with the women's golf team.

Hingst comes from the University of Nebraska where he served as a student assistant for three years, graduate assistant for one year and fulfilled duties as the swimming Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach and Director of Performance Nutrition for six months. While at Nebraska he worked with football, men's and women's basketball, swimming and diving and tennis.

Hingst attended the University of Nebraska where he graduated earning a bachelor's degree in the fields of exercise science and nutritional sciences and dietetics. He became a full-time member of the Seminole Strength and Conditioning staff in 2003. Hingst earned his master's degree in clinical nutrition with an emphasis in sport nutrition in 2004 at Florida State.

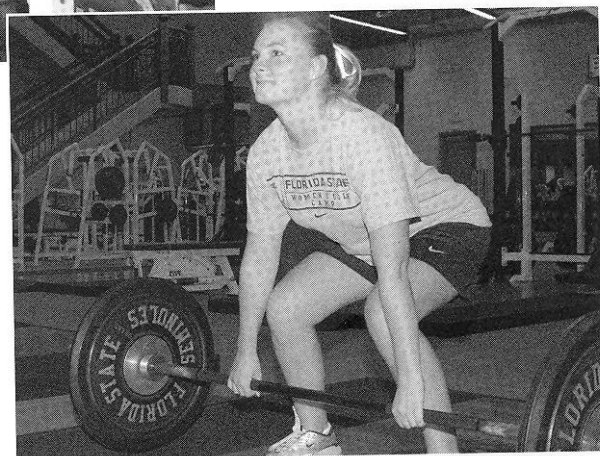

ATHLETIC ACADEMIC SUPPORT

An Overview of an Award Winning Academic Support Program

Academic, personal and professional support is essential to college success. At The Florida State University, an outstanding support program has been developed that enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Florida State Athletic Academic Support Program Director Mark Meloney states, "Our philosophy is to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assist student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continuous support all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

Florida State's program operates on a "proactive" rather than "reactive" approach. The academic staff does not wait for crisis to occur. They gather important background information on each entering student-athlete, build an academic profile, and develop individualized support programs which are tailored to the unique needs of each student-athlete. They also stay informed in the daily progress of the student-athletes through consistent communication with the Florida State faculty.

Over the past several years, the academic support unit has been housed in the in the \$126 million dollar, state-of-the-art University Center complex which includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 20 IBM-compatible computers and laser jet printers. Over the summer the academic support unit along with several other athletic departments moved into their new home in the Moore Athletic Center. The multi-million dollar structure, which is located in the north end zone of Doak Campbell Stadium, is the new home of Florida State athletics. Some of the features in the new academic support unit area include a 32-station computer lab for student-athletes, 10 private tutorial rooms and a five-station "Learning Center" for student-athletes with learning deficiencies and/or disabilities. The compliance, student services, business, sports information and athletics marketing offices are also housed in the facility, providing a more efficient and functional department, thus allowing student-athletes an opportunity for balanced and improved time management. The academic support unit is comprised of a director, an administrative assistant, six academic counselors, several graduate assistants and a cadre of approximately 50 tutors and mentors.

Meloney was named the program's director in 1997 and brings 19 years of advising experience to the position. Over the last nine years, Meloney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student-athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from *Athletic Management Magazine*.

Tutor and Mentor Program

The athletics department at Florida State University has made a commitment to providing the student-athletes with one of the finest and most comprehensive tutorial and mentor programs in the nation. The tutorial program is just one of several key support services that is available to all student-athletes as they progress towards their ultimate goal of earning a college

degree. Florida State hires approximately 50 tutors a year, from a variety of academic departments, who are committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach in assisting student-athletes with course comprehension and study skills. In addition, mentors are academic role models who have demonstrated the ability to teach and give guidance in areas of academic developmental skills. They are responsible for providing assistance in the development of skills such as note taking, test preparation and communication with faculty.

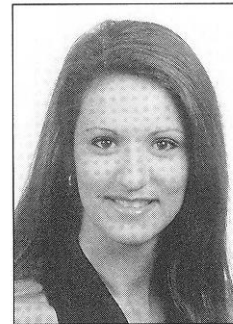
Study Hall

In an effort to help ensure the academic success of the student-athletes, professionally supervised study sessions for each athletic team are organized. The main focus of the study hall program is to help students develop consistent and appropriate study patterns by providing structured settings to work on class assignments and to provide tutorial assistance before academic problems arise. Although the criteria for study hall is left to the discretion of each academic counselor, typically freshmen, first-year transfers and upperclassmen who have not yet achieved a satisfactory cumulative grade point average are asked to attend study hall.

Academic Honors And Awards

Florida State University student-athletes have achieved great success in obtaining recognition for academic excellence. More than \$260,000 in postgraduate monies have been granted to student-athletes over the past eight years, as well as numerous other academic honors and awards.

Florida State University named 172 student-athletes to the 2004 Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Honor Roll. In the 2003-04 academic year alone, Florida State boasted three ACC Weaver James Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship winners, one NCAA Women's Enhancement Scholarship winner and several Academic All-Americans.

A CLOSER LOOK AT THE ACC

The Atlantic Coast Conference boasts a rich tradition of success in women's golf. Each of the seven teams in the ACC is considered to be among the best in the nation and together form the top women's golf conference in the nation.

Florida State joined the ACC and began competing for the conference championship in 1992. The Seminoles have been one of the most successful women's golf teams in the league since their arrival. The Seminoles have finished second in the league championship three times (1992, 1995 and 1999) and finished third in 2001. Debbie Dillman was named the ACC Coach of the Year in 1992.

The Seminoles are one of four ACC teams to have participated in the NCAA Championship in each of the last two years and have earned top 20 national finishes in both seasons.

Florida State finished in fifth place at the 16th annual Atlantic Coast Conference championship tournament at the Salem Glen Country

Club in Clemmons, N.C. in 2004. Senior Katie Quinney finished in a tie for fifth place to lead the Seminoles in the individual standings. Quinney closed the tournament with a two-over par 74 to finish with a 213 total - she came within two strokes of tying her career-best tournament score - 211. Quinney is the second consecutive Seminole golfer to earn a top five ACC individual finish. Senior All-American Kristin Tamulis finished in a tie for fourth in 2003. Senior Alison Curdt earned her second consecutive top 15 finish at the ACC Championship as she finished in 15th place. She carded an one-over par 72 to lead the Seminoles in the third round and finished with a season-best 221 total for the 54-hole tournament. Sophomore Caroline Larsson also finished strong as she carded a three-over par 74 and finished in 16th place. She, too, finished with a season-best tournament score of 222. The 16th place finish was Larsson's best ACC finish of her two-year career; she finished in a tie for 21st place in last year's championship.

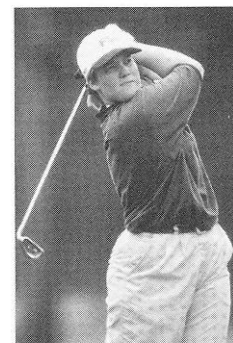

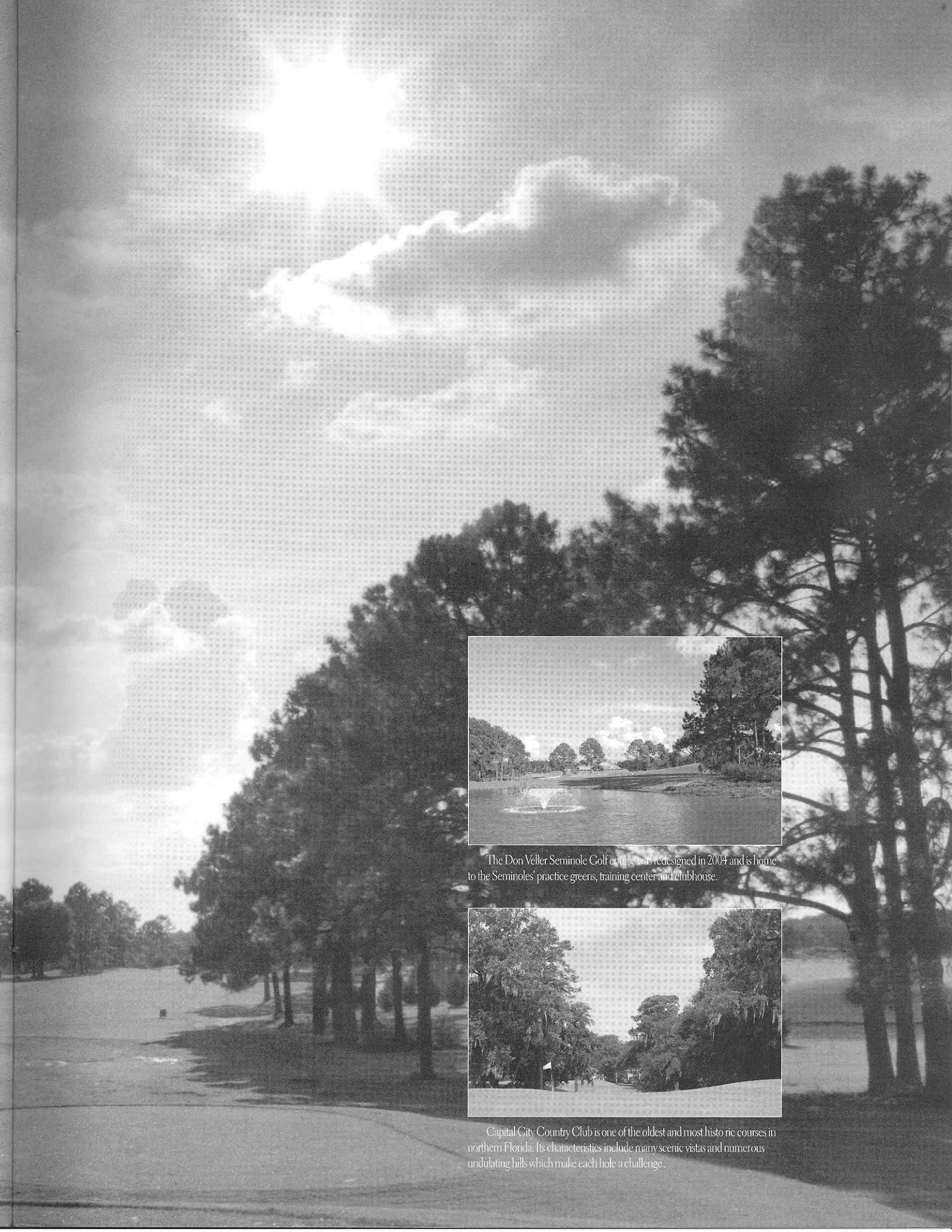

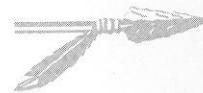

The debut of Southwood, which held its grand opening in 2002, gives Tallahassee a course it can call excellent. 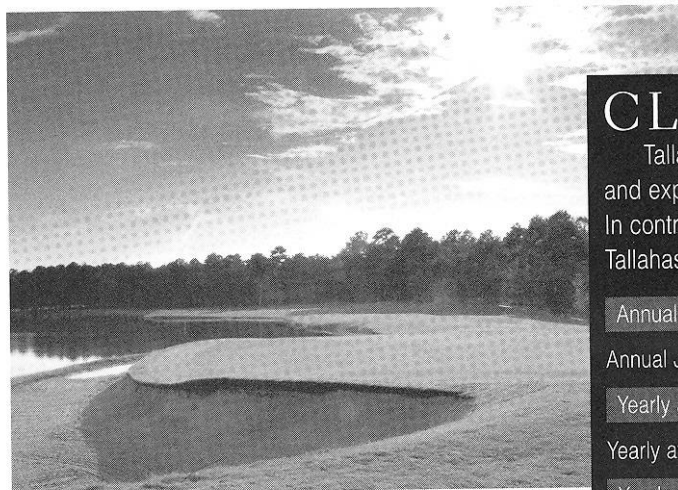

This Is Tallahassee



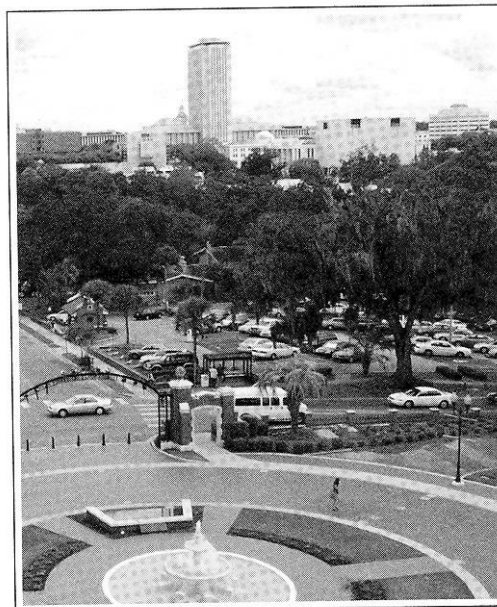

Among low, rolling hills, down moss-draped canopy roads, within picturesque historical districts and across seas of flowering azaleas lies a magical part of the Sunshine State—Tallahassee, Florida's capital city. With its intriguing combination of power-play politics and classic character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm, Tallahassee is a side of Florida few expect to find.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula in an area known as "The Big Bend." Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Georgia neighbor than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to establish a permanent, central location for the seat of government. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" — derived from the words "talwa," meaning town, and "ahassee," meaning old. This historic meeting place remains Florida's capital today.

Boasting more than 145 properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Tallahassee is a living showcase of Florida history and heritage. The crowning jewel of Florida's historic "Capitol Hill" is the Old Capitol, beautifully restored to

its 1902 splendor complete with the red-and-white striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia. The 22nd-floor observatory of the New Capitol Building offers a breathtaking view of this surprising Southern city, awash in flowering azaleas, snowy

dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias and hundreds of lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sinkholes.

Charming downtown historic districts graced with lush linear parks lead visitors to the Knott House Museum, The Columns, First Presbyterian Church, John G. Riley House Museum and Old City Cemetery. Free walking tours and replica turn-of-the-century streetcars carry passengers to antebellum

mansions, picturesque churches and other downtown delights.

Minutes from downtown lies the lush 52-acre natural habitat and 1880's farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, home to the rare Florida panther and other furry "natives."

The area surrounding Tallahassee reveals numerous other historic and archaeological treasures, such as De Soto State Archaeological and Historical Site, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Mission San Luis, Natural Bridge Battlefield and San Marcos de Apalache. Visitors can explore prehistoric Florida at the Museum of Florida History, where they are greeted by

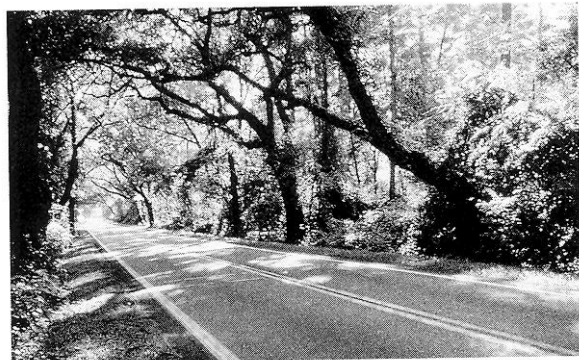
a giant 12,000-year-old mastodon pulled from nearby Wakulla Springs.

On the shores of Wakulla Springs, alligators still laze under the watchful eyes of "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress trees. The site of many underwater scenes in "Tarzan" movies, it's one of the world's deepest freshwater springs. Glass-bottomed boat tours across these mystical waters are available.

Other sightseeing favorites include the floral masterpiece of Alfred B. Maclay State Gardens, Bradley's Country Store, FAMU Black Archives and the Tallahassee Antique Car Museum. Nearby small towns offer fascinating excursions to places such as Pebble Hill Plantation, Florida Caverns State Park, Monticello Opera House and St. George Island.

Tallahassee is almost as rich in cultural treasures as it is in history. A widely acclaimed collection of art, science and history museums and galleries, year-round festivals and nonstop entertainment at the 12,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center feed a variety of cultural appetites.

Visitors with a hunger for the great outdoors will find Tallahassee ideal for all types of outdoor recreation—from canoeing down dark, cypress-lined rivers and biking up steep

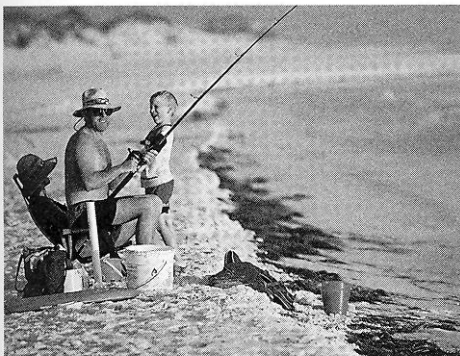
slopes to exploring back country wildernesses and hunting for bobwhite quail. Area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away — offer a paradise for boating and fishing. Lakes Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the “big ones.” Local wildlife areas, such as the St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest, are perfect spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

And while Tallahassee also features eight golf courses and plenty of places to raise a racquet, it's a wild array of spectator sports that leave the crowds screaming for more. The Florida State Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers provide collegiate action while the Tallahassee Thunder is the city's featured arena football team. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

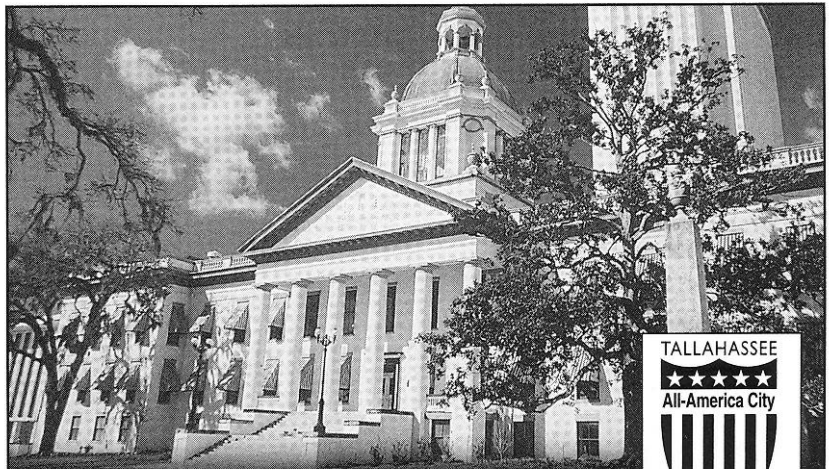
For another favorite “sport” — shopping — two large regional malls and many specialty centers offer an array of “playing options,” from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops. Unique shopping locales include downtown parks, lakeside cottages and small Southern towns. Tallahassee serves a scrumptious selection of tantalizing restaurants ranging from fast food to five star. Local specialties include home-made country sausage, melt-in-your-mouth steaks, wild game and succulent seafood fresh from the Gulf.

From luxury to economy, accommodations are plentiful and include restored bed and breakfasts, rustic “gentlemen” lodges, beachside escapes and comfortable chain hotels. For those who choose to follow in the footsteps of early travelers, Tallahassee also boasts 15 beautiful campsites. Continuous air service, Amtrak and four major highways make it easy for visitors to get to Tallahassee. But no matter how you arrive, the history and hospitality of Tallahassee make it difficult to ever leave for long.

“This is clearly one of the most exciting things to ever happen to Tallahassee,” said a jubilant Mayor Scott Maddox. “For those of us who call Tallahassee home, the All-America City award verifies what we've known for so long — that we have one of the greatest cities in all of America!”

Impressive grounds feature 200+ floral varieties plus hiking, biking and nature trails, swimming, fishing and boating.

Tallahassee Antique Car Museum: Impressive showroom features award winning Chevys, one-of-a-kind Ford Roadster, 1913 CarNation Tourer, 1931 Duesenberg, 1956 T-Bird, Delorean, Cadillacs, Corvettes and more, plus two original Bat Mobiles.

The Capitol: One of five tower capitols in the U.S. features panoramic view from 22nd-floor observatory/art gallery, House and Senate viewing galleries.

WHERE'S THE BEACH

Where sunny days are filled with the great outdoors ... where time is measured by tides and life's rhythms move with the surf ... beaches are just a short drive from Tallahassee.

Alligator Point: Natural dune public beach, 45 miles south of Tallahassee.

Carrabelle: Coarse public beach, featuring swimming and shelling, 60 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

Dekle Beach: Pristine sandy beach, clear water featuring boating, swimming, picnicking and more, 70 miles east of Tallahassee.

Marshes Sands Beach: Public beach, shallow bay water featuring swimming and crabbing, 40 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

St. George Island: Pristine 29-mile barrier island beach, clear water, featuring swimming, shelling, boating and fishing, 80 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

Shell Point: Lovely, small peninsula surrounded by St. Marks Wildlife refuge. Secluded beach and clear water that is popular for sailing and windsurfing, 25 miles south of Tallahassee.

Canopy Roads: The abundance of trees and timber is a resource uncommon to many other areas of the state. The beauty of the local trees is exemplified in Maclay Gardens State Park, which is the site of several of Florida's champion trees including the flowering Dogwood, the Hawthorn tree, the Horsesugar tree, the Sweetbay Magnolia and the Silverbell tree. These trees and others often extend their branches over the roadway to create a canopied effect, a feature that is held in high esteem by local residents and visitors.

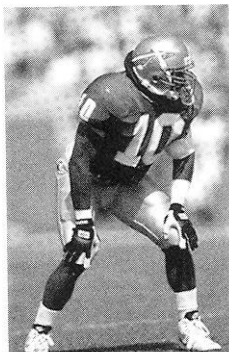
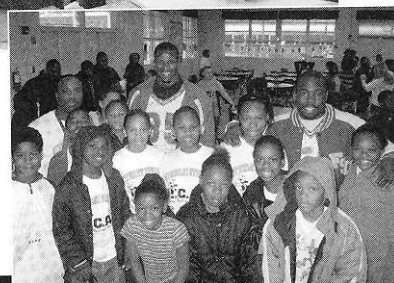
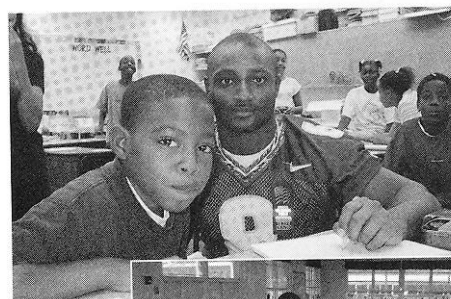


Big Time Athletics

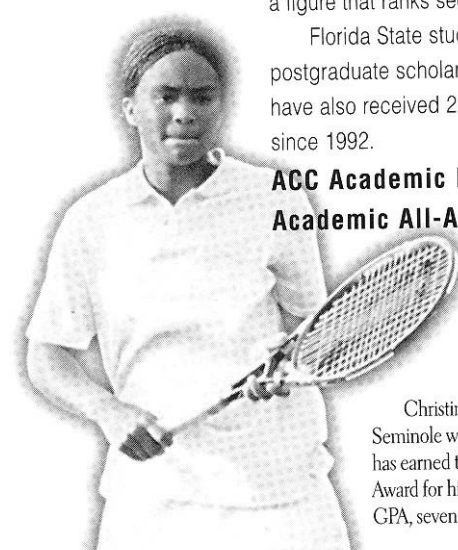
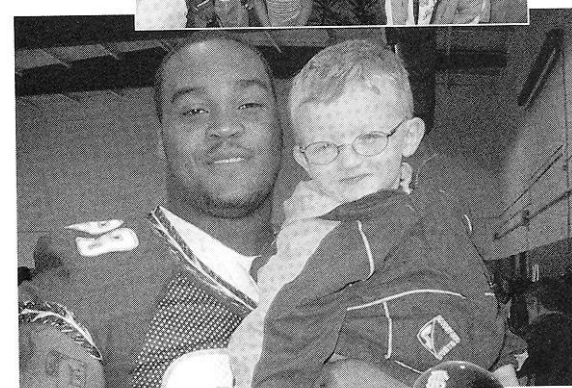
ACADEMICS

Seven of Florida State's athletic teams currently have a 3.0 or better cumulative grade point average. In the spring of 2004 semester, 204 Seminole student-athletes achieved a minimum of 3.00 semester GPA while average team semester GPA was 2.939.

Since joining the ACC in 1991, FSU has had six National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame National Scholar Athlete Award winners — the most among all ACC schools and a figure that ranks second nationally in the past 11 years.

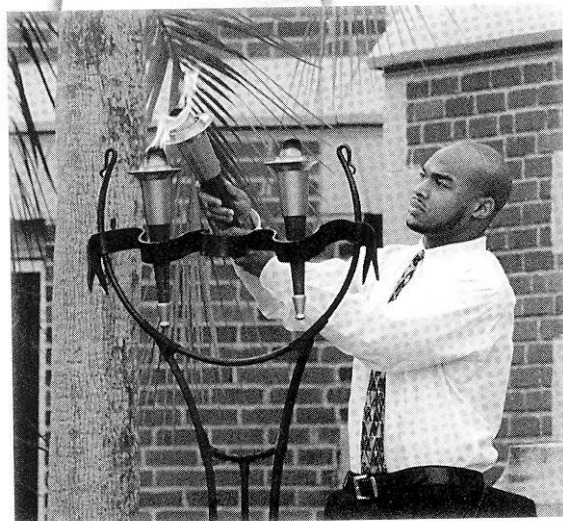

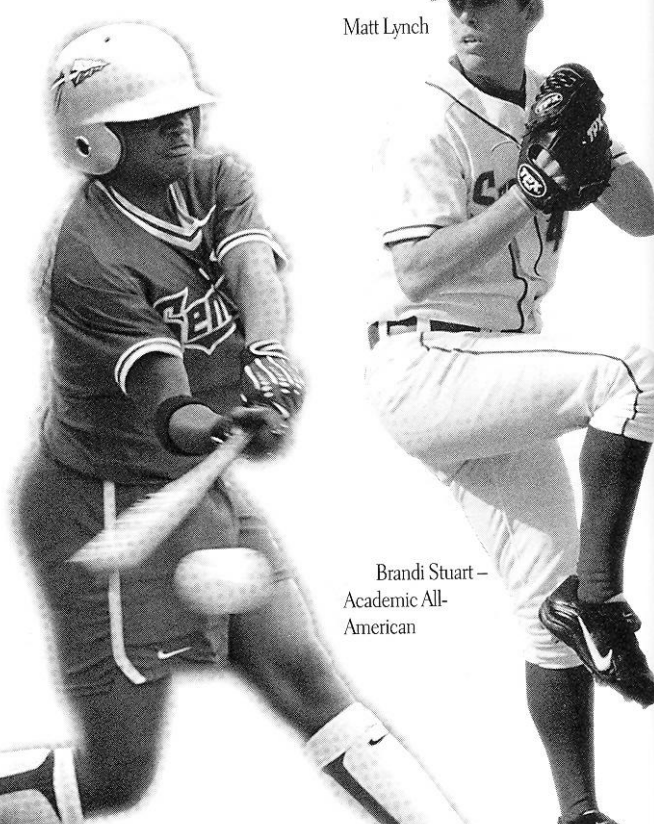

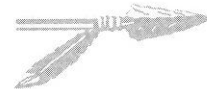

COACHING EXCELLENCE

When it comes to legendary head coaches, it is hard to argue anyone has been as fortunate as Florida State. The Seminoles have three coaches who have established records that rank them with the greatest coaches ever to roam an NCAA sideline.

Florida State is the only NCAA school with three coaches in the top 10 for all-time victories in their sport and in the top five in wins and winning percentage among active coaches.

Mike Martin (baseball), Bobby Bowden (football) and JoAnne Graf (softball) have combined for 2,956 wins and each coach appears in the top two for either active winning percentage (Martin), active wins (Graf) or all-time wins (Bowden).

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Florida State teams have earned 11 national championships over the years while 21 student-athletes have been crowned individual national champions in their respective sports.

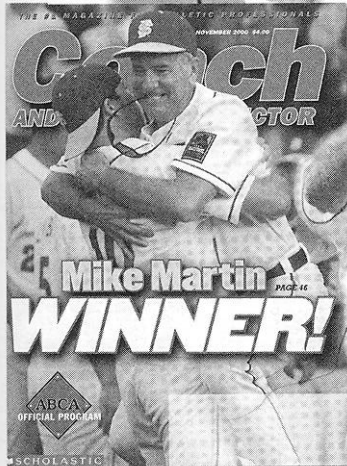
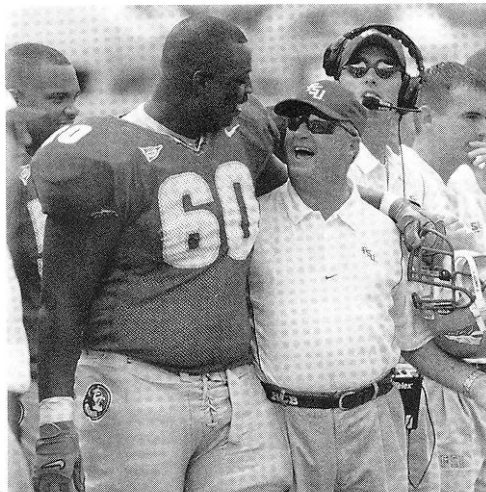
In 1996, Seminole Daryl Bush was the first ever recipient of the State Farm National Scholar Athlete of the Year Award, now given annually.

Florida State boasts two NACDA Postgraduate Award winners in the last three years. The scholarship, which originated in 2001, grants \$10,000 scholarships to its recipients.

In 2001, former Seminole Chris Weinke was the recipient of the first ever ACC Scholar Award which is given annually to an excellent athlete and top scholar who is not going on to graduate school. Football's Chris Hope (2002) and baseball's Matt Lynch (2003) have also earned the distinction.

Florida State has more all-time ACC Honor Roll selections (1,671) than all-time All-ACC honorees (1,529). On top of that

number, 24 Seminoles have been named Academic All-Americans and 21 Florida State athletes have received post-graduate scholarships.

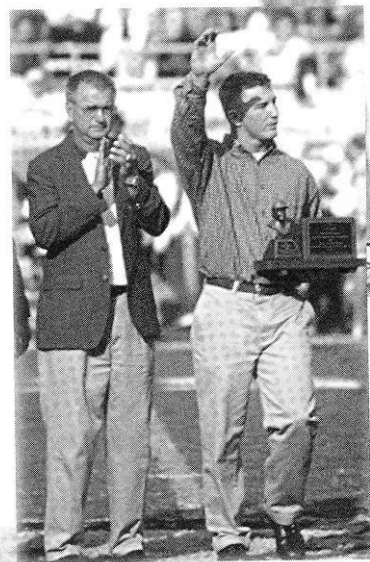

Florida State's team sports have a combined .689 winning percentage all-time and have earned 7,760 victories. Eight of Florida State's nine team sports have an all-time winning record.

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE WOMEN'S GOLF



Jane Geddes played on Florida State's 1981 A.I.A.W. National Championship team and has been one of the top pros on the LPGA tour.

The Seminole women's golf program has a long tradition of success. Since the spring of 1990, the Seminoles have won 11 team championships – an average of nearly one a year. Equally as impressive is the more than 70 top-five individual finishes the squad has compiled in just over 100 tournaments.

Florida State won the championship at the Ann Rhoads/University of Alabama Intercollegiate during the fall of 2003. The Seminoles claimed the championship of the Ryder/Florida Championship during the Spring of 2003. During the event, All-American Kristin Tamulis finished first in the individual standings to mark her first of two career individual wins.

Many Seminole golfers have made their mark on the Seminole record book during their careers. Led by two-time All-ACC selection Karen Stupples, who won two individual tournament championships during her career, a total of seven Florida State golfers have earned individual medalist honors at nine different tournaments. Stupples earned All-America second-team honors in 1995.

Since the beginning of the 1990 season, 20 Seminole golfers have posted top-five individual finishes. Current Seminole assistant coach Amy Bond, who completed her career in 1999, captured medalist honors at the Ryder/Florida Championship and led Florida State to the team title in the event. Bond earned All-ACC honors that season. Tamulis finished second at the Ryder/Florida Championship in leading the Seminoles to the team title in 2002.

Florida State has played in the NCAA Regionals in each of the last four seasons and made eight NCAA appearances from 1991-99 including seven straight from 1991-97. Florida State played in the NCAA Tournament and made eight regional appearances during the decade of the 1990's.

1981 National Championship Team

The Florida State women's golf team won the 1981 A.I.A.W. National Championship with a three-stroke victory over the University of Georgia. The Seminoles finished the tournament with a 1,220 four-round score to best the Lady Bulldogs who finished the event with a 1,223 score.

Florida State entered the final round of the championship with a one-stroke lead over Georgia but had to rally to win the event. The Seminoles stumbled on the front nine during the final day and fell behind by a mere two strokes. The turn, however, proved to be Florida State's turn of fortune as four of the five Seminole golfers birdied the 17th hole and Florida State was on its way to its first national championship.

The Seminoles' national championship team featured three of the top all-time golfers in Florida State history. Lisa Young, Florida State's finisher during the 1981 national championship, earned All-America honors that season along with Michele Guibault. Barb Bunkowsky, who earned All-America honors in 1982, finished 14th in the national championship field as she birdied the final five holes of event to help lead the Seminoles to the title.

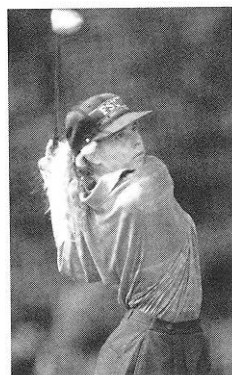
