



DEBBIE DILLMAN

HEAD COACH

24th Season at Florida State

If sustaining success for nearly a quarter of a century is the goal of every coach on every level in every sport, then consider Florida State head coach Debbie Dillman a successful coach on the Division I collegiate level in the sport of women's golf. One of the top coaches in the nation, Dillman has made a career of leading the Seminoles into NCAA Championship play and to lofty national rankings while producing All-America golfers and All-America scholar-athletes throughout her tenure at one of the most highly competitive universities in the country.

Dillman has led the Seminoles to the NCAA Tournament in 15 of the last 18 years, guided the team to 21 tournament championships and nearly 80 top-10 finishes during her Florida State career. She has coached four All-American players and 10 individuals who have earned All-ACC honors a total of 15 times and has led the Seminoles to three conference championships.

Florida State has been a fixture in the national rankings during each of Dillman's 23 years as the program's head coach. The Seminoles have become regular winners of both team and individual championships in the Atlantic Coast Conference since joining the league in 1992. In addition, the Seminoles are annually invited to play in the most prestigious tournaments in all of college golf and

can usually be found near the top of the leader boards in those events.

Dillman's teams consistently rank among the best in the ACC and the nation. In the last eight years, she has guided the Seminoles into the NCAA Tournament seven times, produced 10 All-ACC selections and helped the Seminoles improve their standing in the ACC - considered by many to be the toughest women's golf conference in the nation. The Seminoles finished in third place in the ACC Championship in 2007 and 2008.

Dillman has established the Seminoles program as one of the nation's best by recruiting the world's top talent to play at Florida State. The Seminoles have had at least one player earn All-American and All-ACC honors in nearly each of the last 10 seasons with those players achieving success professionally once they have finished their careers at Florida State.

in third place six times. Since becoming members of the ACC, the Seminoles have advanced to the NCAA Tournament 14 times.

Dillman was honored as the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach-of-the-Year in 1992, the Seminoles' first year in the conference. The Seminoles finished second in the conference tournament that season and finished only two strokes behind North Carolina for the team championship.

Dillman was a member of Florida State's 1980 nationally ranked squad and 1981 AIAW national championship team.

Dillman grew up in Davison, Mich., in an active golf family. Both of her parents were involved in country club management. While in high school, Dillman captained her high school golf team for four years and twice was runner-up at the Michigan State Championship. She also

Two former Seminoles -- Karen Stupples and Kris Tamulis -- are currently achieving tremendous success on the LPGA level. Stupples, an All-America and two-time All-ACC selection under Dillman, has earned more than \$2 million during her career, won the 2004 British Open and represented England in the Solheim Cup in 2005. Tamulis, an All-American and three-time All-ACC selection, joined the LPGA Tour in 2005 and has won more than \$200,000 as one of the top young players in professional golf.

Four golfers who excelled under Dillman are currently playing professionally: Stupples and Tamulis on the LPGA Tour, Caroline Larsson on the Futures Tour and Tiffany Faucette on the Canadian Tour.

Dillman has helped Florida State compete as one of the top teams in the ACC since joining the league in 1992. The Seminoles have consistently finished placed among the top four teams in the conference and have finished

won the Flint Junior Golf Championship for three consecutive years which is considered to be one of the top junior tournaments in the state of Michigan.

Dillman attended Florida State as an undergraduate and played golf from 1979-1982. While taking classes and playing golf, she also worked at Seminole Golf Course allowing her to learn both the management side and the competitive side of golf. Dillman has a daughter Anne-Lynn (14).

Florida State, 2004
Third Season At Florida State

Katie Quinney, who has been a part of five NCAA Tournament teams in her five seasons as a Seminole player and coach, is in her third coaching season at Florida State. She played on three NCAA teams and has helped coach the Seminoles into the NCAA Tournament in both of her first two seasons as an assistant coach at

her alma mater. In her third season on the Seminoles' coaching staff she has been promoted to associate head coach and recruiting coordinator.

In addition to working with two consecutive NCAA Tournament teams, she has accompanied All-America Caroline Westrup to both of the last two NCAA Championships where the Seminoles' star has earned a pair of top-15 individual finishes.

Quinney is a 2004 Florida State graduate who earned her degree in psychology after earning three varsity letters as a member of the Seminoles' starting line-up. Following her graduation she played professionally on the Futures, Asian and Canadian professional tours.

Quinney, who earned All-ACC honors in 2004, is one of 11 players in school history to earn All-ACC honors. She finished with a career-low scoring average and earned three top-five individual finishes in earning All-ACC honors as a senior. Quinney finished in third place in the Liz Murphey Collegiate, tied for fourth at the Ryder/Florida Championship and a tie for fifth in the ACC Championship. She then finished in a tie for 12th place at the NCAA East Regional Championship to lead the Seminoles to a fourth place finish and into the NCAA Championship for the third time in her career.

Quinney works hand in hand with head coach Debbie Dillman to continue the Seminoles' tradition of recruiting top-caliber student athletes and finishing annually among the top collegiate teams in the nation. She works with Dillman in all aspects of the program including recruiting, scheduling, team travel, academic development and team community service projects.

Quinney, 27, helped the Seminoles reach the NCAA Championship in 2002, 2003 and 2004 making her senior class one of only four in school history to play in consecutive NCAA Championships during their careers. Her career-best single-round score of 67 came during the second round of the spring 2004 ACC Championship while the best individual finish of her career came as a third place finish at the spring 2004 Liz Murphey Collegiate Classic and the fall 2003 Ann Rhoads/University of Alabama Intercollegiate.

During her career as a Seminole she played in three NCAA Cham-

pionships, three NCAA Regional Championships, three ACC Championships and helped Florida State win three team championships (spring 2002 Ryder/Florida Championship, spring 2003 Ryder/Florida Championship and fall 2003 Ann Rhoads/University of Alabama Intercollegiate).

Quinney was a member of the NCAA All-Star Women's Golf Team that played in a series of tournaments to the Orient during the summer of 2003. She was one of only ten golfers who played in the month-long tour. During their stay in the Orient, the team traveled to and played in Korea, Thailand, Japan and Hong Kong. The NCAA All-Stars played in a total 16 different tournaments during their stay in the Orient. The tournaments consisted of pro-am and competitive matches against that country's all-stars.

The Atlantic Beach, Fla., native played in US Women's Amateur Championship twice and was named to the Trans America Athletic Conference All-Freshman team during her first collegiate season at Jacksonville University.
