

Head Coach PATRICK BAKER

4TH SEASON AT FSU (38-26-4) • 14TH SEASON (125-84-13)



What head coach Patrick Baker has done in just three seasons at Florida State is one of the great success stories in Florida State athletics history. After just one season rebuilding a program which had been under .500 in three of its first four years of existence, Baker guided the Seminoles to back-to-back NCAA Tournaments, a trip to the Sweet 16 and two Top 20 finishes in just his second and third seasons in Tallahassee. Under his guidance, Florida State set the mark for the best record in program history in 2000 and then turned around and broke it in 2001. Of the 19 regional honors awarded to Florida State, 18 have come since Baker's arrival and all nine of FSU's national awards were awarded during his tenure. Baker has guided FSU to six of the program's eight wins over top 20 teams and of those six wins five have been against teams in the top 11. He has also been at the helm for all three of the program's NCAA Tournament victories.

After just three seasons, Baker already owns the record for the most victories in school history with 38, breaking the mark in a huge win against Duke this past season. The Seminoles staged the first-ever two-goal comeback in school history by downing the Blue Devils 3-2 in overtime and giving Baker 32 wins in his FSU career. It took Baker just 56 games to break the record that his predecessor needed 80 games to establish.

After adding the nation's eighth-best recruiting class, which was his second consecutive class ranked in the top 15 in the nation and his third Top 25 class, Baker went on to notch consecutive double-digit wins for the first time in FSU history, posted a perfect 8-0 record at home for the first-time in school history and his team made back-to-back NCAA

Tournament appearances after never reaching the postseason in the previous four years before his arrival. During his three-year rebuilding process, Baker has seen his teams establish more than 130 program firsts, individual and team records. He has also made great strides in having the Seminoles protect their home turf. In home matches, FSU has a .895 winning percentage in the last two seasons

out of the gate to a 3-0 start with wins over Duke and NC State. Considering the fact that FSU had just two ACC wins in the program's first four seasons, the team's 3-0 start in 2001 was a huge leap for the Seminoles. Florida State closed out their ACC regular season schedule by downing

going 17-2-0 at the Seminole Soccer Complex. Florida State had been 15-15-2 at home in the program's first four seasons.

Despite all of Baker's success in his first two seasons, he knew it would take time to make up ground on the other seven members of the nation's premier soccer conference yet he did just that in only his third campaign. Before 2001, Florida State had never finished higher than seventh in the ACC and was predicted to finish fifth by the ACC coaches before the season began. After emphasizing the importance of a better conference finish, Florida State had the most successful conference season, the most regular season ACC wins and the highest conference finish in the history of the program.

The Garnet and Gold started the season by winning its first-ever conference opener at No. 7 Clemson and then burst

Maryland to lock up third place in the regular season with the school's fourth conference win. The team's four ACC victories were just one shy of equaling the five ACC wins the program had amassed in its previous six years combined. The win also moved FSU to 5-2-0 at home in 2000 and 2001 versus ACC teams under Baker compared to 2-9-0 before his arrival.

In the four seasons before his arrival, FSU had never won a game at the ACC Tournament while being outscored 23-1. In 2000, the Seminoles advanced to the semifinals and last year the program played for its first-ever ACC Championship. With its best ever seeding, Baker guided his team to its first-ever appearance in the ACC Championship final by downing No. 21 Maryland 7-2 and then advancing past No. 8 Virginia in a

shootout after four overtime periods.

Coming into the quarterfinals against the Terrapins, Maryland had allowed just 12 goals all season and just seven goals in ACC play. Terrapin starting keeper Ali Wolff had a 0.67 GAA and UMD had allowed just three goals once all year and that was in a 3-1 loss to consensus No. 1 North Carolina. The seven goals scored in the quarterfinals by FSU were the most ever scored in an ACC Tournament game by a team other than UNC. Against the Cavaliers, FSU held Virginia scoreless through 150 minutes of play and keeper Ali Mims made three saves in the shootout to advance Florida State into the final against No. 1 North Carolina.

Florida State's turnaround in the conference is probably the most amazing of all of Baker's accomplishments. Over the last two seasons, Baker's Seminoles have more wins than five of the other seven ACC schools and have the fourth-best winning percentage in the conference. Three of FSU's four All-ACC selections

have come during Baker's tenure, both of FSU's first team All-ACC selections, all four All-ACC Freshman team members are his recruits and all five All-ACC Tournament team members have come since Baker took over the program.

Baker's transformation of the Seminole soccer program took less time than anyone could of imagined as he turned Florida State into a national power in just his second year on the job. Baker led the 2000 squad to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament and was named the Southeast Coach of the Year and runner-up National Coach of the Year by *SoccerBuzz*. He guided the Seminoles into the national rankings for the first time and his 2000 squad broke 33 team and individual records and recorded 25 program 'firsts'. After just one full year of recruiting, the 2000 Seminoles recorded victories over National Champion North Carolina and nationally ranked teams Texas A&M, Florida (twice) and Wake Forest on the way to their first-ever NCAA tournament where they won two games advancing into the Sweet 16.

Evidence of Baker's outstanding coaching job can be seen in the squad's



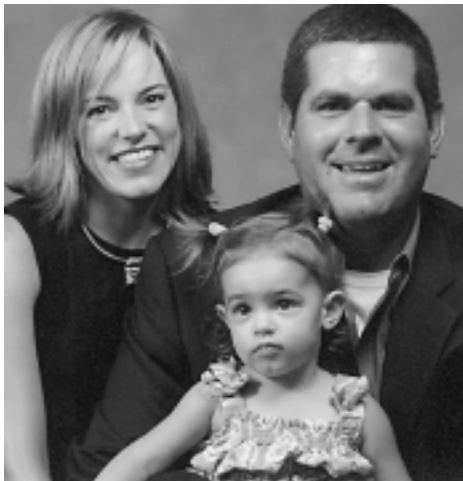

improvement against common opponents from the 1999 to the 2000 season. Florida State had a positive turnaround against 12 of the 14 opponents they played in 1999 and 2000 and one of the two negatives, South Alabama, was still a win. The Seminoles record went from 1-9 against this group in 1999 to 8-5 in 2000 and FSU had a 46-goal turnaround against this group. Add that to first-time victories against six opponents and it is easy to see how far Baker had taken the Seminoles in just two seasons. This trend continued in 2001 as Baker's Seminoles faced 13 teams they also faced during the 2000 season. Florida State picked up five wins against teams they lost to during the 2000 season and overall the team had a six goal turnaround against this group which included North Carolina, Clemson, Florida, Duke, Virginia, Wake Forest and Maryland.

In 1999, Baker took over a program that had just one winning season in four years and had only won 15 of the previous 41 games before he was hired. He immediately improved the FSU program from a 7-11-3 record in 1998 to 9-10-1 in 1999. Baker, only the second coach in the history of Florida State women's soccer, led the Seminoles into the Southeast Regional Rankings for the first time since 1996. Florida State spent four weeks as the No. 10 team in the region and twice tied the record for the longest winning streak in team history (four games).

Before taking over the Seminole program, Baker served as the women's head coach at the University of Pennsylvania for five years. During his tenure at Penn, Baker established a 42-37-5 record,



won an ECAC Championship and was named the 1997 Mid-Atlantic Region Coach of the Year. Prior to his head coaching stint at the University of Pennsylvania, Baker achieved similar success at the Division III level where he coached North Carolina Wesleyan to three NCAA Division III tournament appearances and three Top 10 finishes. He compiled a record of 45-21-4 in his five years and was twice named the Dixie Conference Coach of the Year. In 1991, Baker was named the National Soccer Coaches Association of America Division III South Region Coach of the Year. In 2002, Baker was elected into the UNC Wesleyan Athletic Hall of Fame.

For the past two years, Baker has spent time assisting U-19 National team head coach Tracey Leone at the Arco Training Center in Chula Vista, Calif. preparing the team for the inaugural U-19 FIFA World Championships. He helped the US National Team prepare for a match against the Mexican National Team and then for a European tour later in 2001. He recently finished serving as the director for Region III of the girl's Olympic Development Program (ODP) and was named an assistant coach for the 2000 U-16 women's national team.

Baker has attended South Region ODP camps since 1990 and has a total of

14 years experience at all levels of the ODP. Prior to working with the U-16 team, he assisted head coach Lauren Gregg with the women's national team. He served as Gregg's assistant for the U-21 national team for three years and was also the assistant coach for the 1999 U-21 women's national team. He served four years at the U-14 state level in North Carolina and was the 1996 U-17 ODP state coach for Pennsylvania. Baker coached the U-16 and U-18 ODP South Regional camps for eight years and was the assistant coach for the U-17 South Region team from 1991-93. Baker was also the U.S. South Region amateur coach for five years where he received the national coach of the year award in 1994.

Baker served as a member of the Division I Mid-Atlantic Rankings Committee from 1995-1998, was the ISAA/adidas South Region Rankings Chairman in 1993 and the chairman of the ISAA/Gatorade South Region Rankings Committee from 1990-1992. Baker also served as the chair of the NCAA Division III

South Region Committee in 1993 after serving two years on the NCAA Division III South Region Tournament Committee in 1991 and 1992.

Baker received his bachelor's degree from Otterbein College in 1989 as a double major in radio & television broadcasting and journalism with a minor in public relations. He graduated with a 3.67 GPA, was a starter all four years for the men's soccer team and was named team captain as a junior and senior. Baker was a member of the Ohio Athletic Conference (OAC) All-Academic Team from 1986-1989, was a first team All-Conference selection in 1989 and played on three OAC Championship squads. He played soccer for 11 years in England and Germany while his father was stationed overseas with the US Military. He is married to the former Kelly Sack. The couple welcomed their first child, Emma Louise Baker, February 10, 2001 and they will welcome another addition to their family in 2003. ⚽

Assistant Coach JOHN GALAS

3RD SEASON AT FSU • UNIVERSITY OF LIVERPOOL '99 MBA • UNIVERSITY OF OREGON '97 BA

A Woodland Hills, Calif. native, assistant coach John Galas enters his third season as the Florida State women's soccer goalkeeper coach. Galas has spent the past seven years as either a head coach or assistant at all levels of soccer and has extensive experience coaching goalkeepers.

Galas faced one of his biggest challenges since arriving at Florida State in 2001 as he had to coach three talented but young keepers. Under his guidance, Florida State didn't miss a step in goal. The Seminoles, and their three freshman keepers, went on to record six shutouts and helped the team



record the most wins in school history on top of advancing to the ACC Championship finals. After less than three months working with this group, the keepers really started to shine in the postseason. Kerry York and Ali Mims combined to shutout No. 8 Virginia for 150 minutes in the 2002 ACC Championship semifinals before Mims saved three penalty kicks in the shootout to send FSU to the finals. In the NCAA Tournament, the young net minders once again rose to the occasion as Mims and York allowed just one goal in two games as the Seminoles reached the round of 32 for the second consecutive season.



The 2000 Seminoles had one of the most successful seasons in the history of the program and Galas' work with Sarah Crawford was a key factor in FSU's turnaround. The year before Galas' arrival at Florida State, Crawford posted a 1.90 GAA which fell 35 percent to 1.23 after just one season. Crawford also saw her shutouts quadruple from 1.5 to 6 and her save percentage go from 77 percent to 82 percent. Crawford was named a *SoccerBuzz* All-Southeast Region second team selection, an NSCAA All-Southeast Region third team selection and she was the first Seminole to ever be named to the All-ACC Tournament team.

In 1999, Galas served as the director and head coach of the Eugene Goalkeeping Academy. During the summer of 1998, he worked as a goalkeeper coach at Soccer Plus Goalkeeper School in San Diego, Calif., where, in 1999, he served as an assistant director for the school. Soccer Plus was founded and directed by Tony DiCiccio, the head coach of the World Cup Champion USA women's soccer team.

Galas served as an assistant coach for the University of Oregon women's soccer team from 1997 to 1999 where he mainly worked with the team's goalkeepers. Galas, during a one-year hiatus from Oregon, also worked with one of England's premier club teams, Liverpool Football Club in 1998. Galas was afforded access to all of Liverpool's training sessions and was given a rare opportunity for an American coach to observe how one of the world's most successful club teams train. Galas also served as a goalkeeping coach for the club's Community Coaching Scheme. He will return to England next year to take his Football Association Goalkeeping Coaching B License at the Lilleshall National Sports Center. The license allows goalkeeping coaches to coach at the Football League Centers of Excellence, Football League Academy, Premier League Academy and at semi-professional and youth levels.

Galas has played an active role in youth soccer throughout his career. Prior to joining the University of Oregon staff, Galas served as an assistant coach/goalkeeper coach for both the boy's and girl's soccer programs at South Eugene High School in Oregon and as an assistant coach for the Willamette District U-23 state team. While coaching at South Eugene, the boy's team won the state title in 1998 and the girl's team advanced to the state final one year and

the state semifinal another year.

For the past two years, Galas has served on the Olympic Development Program (ODP) Region III staff as a goalkeeping coach in Montevallo, Ala working with the U-14 squad. He was also an assistant coach for the ODP in Portland, Ore. working with the U-17 boy's team in 1997. Prior to his work with the ODP, Galas was a head coach for the South Eugene Soccer Club U-14 boy's team, a head coach for the U-17 girl's team and the U-18 boy's team at Lane County Association F.C. Galas coached the U-15 boy's team and served as the head coach for the U-18 girl's team at McKenzie United S.A. He also served as a marketing assistant and operations assistant for the 1999 Women's World Cup in Portland.

The Oregon graduate is a member of the United States Soccer Federation, National Soccer Coaches Association of America, the Football Association Coaches Association and the Oregon Youth Soccer Coaches Association. Galas currently holds a USSF National "B" Coaching License and completed his NSCAA National Diploma in January of 2001.

Galas received his bachelor's degree in history from the University of Oregon in June of 1997. While playing for the University of Liverpool, Galas earned his master's degree in football industries in December of 1999. The University of Liverpool is the only school in the world that offers an MBA focusing on the global aspects of the soccer industry. Galas married his wife, the former Anna Brockmeyer, July 31, 1999. ⚽

Assistant Coach SAMANTHA ANDERSCH

2ND SEASON AT FSU • FAIRFIELD UNIVERSITY '00 MBA • JAMES MADISON UNIVERSITY '97 BA

Assistant coach Samantha Andersch enters her second season with the Florida State women's soccer program. Andersch joined the Seminole staff after a stellar career as a player at James Madison University, a graduate assistantship at Fairfield University and a head coaching stint at Staples High School.



Andersch has been involved with coaching at all levels of soccer for the past 14 years. Most recently, she coached the Junior Varsity soccer team at Staples High School in Westport, Conn. Before taking that position, she spent two seasons serving as a graduate

assistant for the Fairfield Stags women's soccer program where she was involved with evaluating potential recruits, assisting in practice and game preparations and providing academic support and retention for student-athletes. While at Fairfield, the Stags made an NCAA Tournament appearance in 1999, won the MAAC Conference Championship in 1999 and posted a 24-14-4 record in two seasons.

Andersch coached the Fairfield Strikers U-14 Youth Travel Team and the Diamonds U-13 Premier Travel Team during the 1998 and 1999 seasons. She spent two summers as a soccer camp

instructor at the Fairfield University and Princeton University Soccer Camps.

As a four-year starter in the midfield for James Madison University, Andersch ranks fourth on the Dukes all-time career assist list, 11th on the career points list, 15th on the all-time goals list and her JMU teams were ranked in the top 25 every season she played. Andersch was selected to compete in the Umbro Select Senior All-Star game in 1996 and was an NSCAA/Umbro All-Region first team selection in 1996. As a freshman, Andersch led the team in assists and tied the university's single game record for assists (3).

In high school, Andersch was a two-time NSCAA All-American and a *Parade* All-American. She was a U-14 National Pool player and played for the U-19 and U-16 Region I Olympic Development teams. A native of Columbia, Md., Andersch was named *Washington Post* All-Metro first team three times and All-Region and All-State twice.

Since completing her master's degree in computers in education, Andersch taught for a year and a half. She started her teaching career at Tomlinson Middle School in Fairfield, Conn., where she taught eighth grade mathematics. She then moved to Staples High School where she spent the year as a computer science teacher instructing students on computer operations and software systems. ⚽



Recruiting Q&A

Why do you think recruits choose Florida State over other Top 20 schools?

I think it's really a combination of the excellent academic opportunities and rich athletic traditions. Many of our recruits select FSU for a visit as it meets their academic and athletic needs, and then fall in love with the campus atmosphere and state-of-the-art soccer complex. The warm weather and beautiful climate definitely helps too! A future Seminole decides she wants to make positive contributions to our team chemistry.

How important is recruiting to the success of the program?

Recruiting is one of the most important pieces of the puzzle. Our coaching staff recruits nationwide in search of talented soccer players. We believe that the unique mix of individuals we bring in builds a critical foundation for future success. We take pride in challenging our players both on and off the field as we care about them as students, athletes, and individuals.

What do you look for in a prospective student-athlete?

Our staff needs to get the best possible recruiting class each year. Based on our needs, we try to identify a player who we believe will make a positive impact on our program and who can help us get to the next level. I like players with a good work ethic and leadership

ability in addition to a good sense of humor. The players we look for strive to be successful in every aspect of life.

What advice would you offer a prospect in the recruiting process?

Do your homework. First you want to find a school that fits your educational interests as well as your soccer aspirations. The best way to get to know a school is to spend time with the students and faculty and explore the campus. When you get the chance to speak to a college coach, ask specific questions that will help you make a good decision.

Where does the coaching staff recruit?

To be aggressively recruited, we have to see you play in as competitive a situation as possible. Our recruiting path takes us to many venues throughout the country including, Olympic Development Programs, the Raleigh Shootout, the Orange Classic, the President's Day Cup, the Houston Shootout and the San Diego Surf Cup. We also recruit from our summer soccer camps (Patrick Baker Soccer Camp).

What is the best way for a recruit to be identified by the coaching staff?

Play in high-level tournaments with your club teams and try-out for ODP. Send videotape that highlights individual game clips. Spend a day in Tallahassee and visit our facilities, meet the coaching staff and players.

1ST SEASON AT FSU • FLORIDA STATE '00

One of Florida State's all-time greats, Angela Bonaffino returns to her alma mater as a member of the 2002 coaching staff. Bonaffino will serve as a team manager with Florida State this year where she will pursue a



master's degree after spending the past year working in her native Ontario, Canada.

Bonaffino spent the past year honing her coaching skills as she assisted her former high school squad, Holy Cross Secondary School, as the team finished second in all of Ontario. She also served as the Head Instructor at Jets Soccer and has coached at the Patrick Baker Soccer Camp and Austin Peay Soccer Camp. She secured her Level I Coaching License this year and also spent time refereeing locally.

While in Ontario, Bonaffino took business courses at Brock University and continued to play soccer with the St. Catharine's Jets. She captained the Jets to a Top 10 national ranking in the Premier Division.

After graduating from Florida State in 2000 with a degree in food and

nutrition, Bonaffino spent eight months working at Premier Health and Fitness Center in Tallahassee. She used her undergraduate degree as she served as Junior Strength and Conditioning Coach and a fitness instructor.

Bonaffino had a stellar playing career as a Seminole and still appears amongst FSU's career leaders for assists and shots and still ranks among FSU's best for assists in a single season. In 1999, the senior captain was voted team MVP after starting 18 of 20 matches, scoring one goal and setting a school record with seven assists. She led the squad in 1999 with 35 shots and her goal was the game-winner against Florida International. As a junior, Bonaffino recorded game-winning assists versus Mercer and Auburn as she started 17 of FSU's 19 matches.

As a sophomore in 1997, Bonaffino scored the game-winning goal versus Stetson as she built on a solid freshman campaign that saw her garner rookie of the year honors. In her inaugural season, Bonaffino started all 20 matches for FSU as she recorded four goals and four assists. She tied for third on the squad with 12 points and had multi-point games versus NC State and Tennessee. Her assist against the Wolfpack was the first game-winner of her Seminole career.

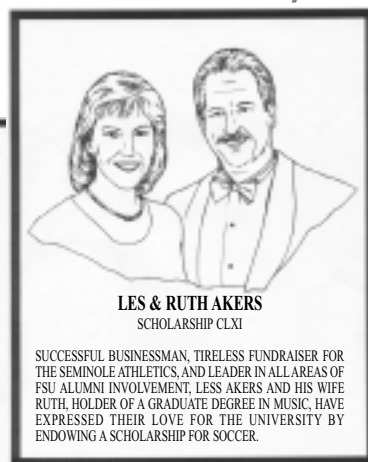

The last fifteen years have seen a three-fold rise in the cost of athletic scholarships at Florida State. Today, more than \$300,000 is needed to permanently endow a Florida State athletic scholarship. Most of the top public universities with whom Florida State competes and to whom we are compared, have endowed all of their athletic scholarships.

Established in 1986 under the direction of William M. Parker of Clearwater, the Seminole Boosters Endowed Scholarship Program is the final step toward perpetual funding of all scholarships for student-athletes at Florida State. Those individuals who contribute to the endowment fund for athletic scholarships at Florida State University gain membership in the Seminole Heritage Foundation.

Thanks to the efforts of Hunter McIntosh and Les and Ruth Akers an effort has now begun to ensure the endowment of the Florida State Soccer program.
