2002 FLASHBACK

♦ Florida State advanced to its second Sweet 16 in the last three years.

The Seminoles registered the fewest regular season losses (5) in the history of the program.

♦ FSU improved to 3-1 versus the Gators since 2000 as they beat Florida in front of a school record 1,603 fans.

Over 12,400 fans came to watch Seminole soccer, the ninth-best total in the nation in 2002.

♦ The Seminoles recorded their first ever win against a conference team in back-to back seasons (Clemson) and then did it two more times versus Maryland and NC State.


GETTING BETTER & BETTER

Since Patrick Baker took over the Seminole soccer program in 1999, the Seminoles have made tremendous strides each season. The team has improved in every possible category and they continue to surpass their previous accomplishments. After seeing two and three ACC teams advance further into the NCAA Tournament than FSU did in 2000 and 2001, the Tribe knocked down another barrier in 2002. For the first time in program history only one ACC team (North Carolina) advanced farther in the NCAA's than FSU did when it reached the Round of 16. Since FSU's first final 16 appearance in 2000, only two ACC schools have been to the Round of 16 more often than FSU (UNC and Clemson). The up-start Seminoles have also had more postseason success than ACC veterans Maryland, Duke, Wake Forest and NC State since 2000.

RISING TO THE TOP

It is easy to forget just how far Florida State soccer has come over the last three seasons. With three straight NCAA Tournament bids, two Sweet 16's, an ACC Tournament Championship appearance and consecutive Top 15 rankings dating back to the 2000 season, one might lose sight of one of the Seminoles most important gains over the last three years. Under Patrick Baker's guidance, FSU has become one of the elite teams in the south. For the first time ever this past season, the Tribe finished second in the region behind only North Carolina and ranked ahead of every ACC school but UNC in the final SoccerBuzz poll. In SoccerBuzz's final regional rankings FSU finished ahead of Clemson, Auburn, Wake Forest, Florida and Duke to name just a few. FSU also finished ahead of everyone in the region except for the Heels in the final NSCAA national poll. To finish the season second in arguably the nation's toughest region is a telling sign of just how far Florida State soccer has come in such a short period of time.

FSU HAS ARRIVED

If there was ever any doubt whether or not Florida State soccer was a national power, the team's second Round of 16 appearance in three years should erase those doubts. With a 2-1 victory over Auburn, FSU improved its NCAA Tournament record to 5-2 before facing UConn. Of the 287 teams participating in Division I women's soccer, Florida State is one of just 14 schools that have been to two of the

last three Sweet 16's. Less than 5% of all NCAA Division I institutions playing women's college soccer have done what Florida State has accomplished over the last three seasons. The Seminoles came within minutes of joining the nine schools that have been to three straight Sweet 16's with their last minute loss at Clemson in 2001. Florida State is on a list with North Carolina, Santa Clara, Portland, Stanford, UCLA, Notre Dame, Texas A&M, Connecticut, Penn State, Nebraska, Virginia, Clemson and Dartmouth as schools that have advanced to the final 16 at least twice in the last three seasons. The ACC is the only conference that can boast having four teams on that list; no other conference has more than two.

NOT JUST GETTING THERE

Not only has Florida State become an NCAA regular since Patrick Baker took over the program but the Seminoles are doing more than just qualifying for the tourney. Florida State joins four other ACC schools in making three straight trips to the NCAA's but only FSU, North Carolina and Virginia have won at least one game in three straight tournaments. Baker's Seminoles are a perfect 3-0 in opening round NCAA tournament games. That is an amazing feat considering it was just three years ago the Tribe made its first-ever postseason appearance.



THREE TIMES 15

With it's run into the Round of 16 last season, Florida State assured itself of the program's third straight national ranking after never spending a single week ranked in the program's first five years of existence. Not only



were the Seminoles nationally ranked when all was said and done but they garnered the program's third straight top 15 ranking when *SoccerBuzz* placed the team 14th in their final poll.

THOSE ARE GOOD TEAMS

The 2002 Seminoles set the record for the fewest losses ever by an FSU team in the regular season and tied the record for the fewest losses for an entire season. The record is seven and was set by the 1996 team but that group never went to the NCAA Tournament so the 2002 team actually lost the fewest games of any Seminole squad

through the ACC Tournament. All seven losses last season came to teams with a combined record of 87-34-14 (.711 winning percentage), six of the seven ended up in the top 25 of the final rankings and only one of those teams wasn't invited to the 2002 NCAA Tournament. What is most amazing is that FSU lost six of those games by a combined seven goals.



THAT CAME TO AN END

There are very few things head coach Patrick Baker hasn't accomplished since coming to Florida State in 1999. The school's secondever coach has turned the program into a national power, taken FSU to three . straight NCAA Tournaments, finished the last three campaigns with a Top 15 ranking and has already played for an ACC Soccer Championship. He has pulled FSU from the bottom of the ACC and taken his team to at least the semifinals in two of the last

three conference tournaments but there is one hurdle Baker hadn't cleared until this past season. Since his arrival in 1999, Baker had never won an ACC road game in the state of North Carolina. FSU had two ties (NC State in 2000 and Duke in 2002) and did defeat Maryland in the ACC Tournament at Wake but was 0-5-2 in NC versus Wake, UNC, Duke and NC State. That all changed Saturday, October 19 in Raleigh, NC. The Seminoles blew past the Wolfpack 5-1 and handed Baker and the Seminole program their first-ever ACC road win in North Carolina.

CORNERING THE COMPETITION

Florida State had an amazing 2002 campaign in many ways but nothing they did was more statistically impressive than the stats they put up in corner kicks. The Seminoles took 164 corners last season compared to just 91 for their opponents. Opponents took more than five corners versus FSU just five times in 23 games last season or just 21% of the time. On seven occasions, FSU opponents could only muster two or fewer corner kicks. In 2001, FSU only held opponents to five or fewer corners in a game nine times in 24 matches or 38% of the time. The 2002 squad set the record for the most corners taken by an FSU team in the history of the program and the Seminoles have taken 100 or more corners every season since Patrick Baker was hired. Before Baker's arrival, FSU had taken more than 100 corners just once in four seasons.

FIGHTING BACK VERSUS THE TOP 20

The 2002 Seminole soccer team opened its 2002 ACC campaign the same way it started in 2001, with a win over Clemson. Florida State downed the 17th-ranked Tigers with a dramatic 4-3 OT victory that featured comebacks from 1-0 and 3-2 deficits. In the eight-year history of Florida State soccer, the Seminoles have won 12 games versus ranked opponents and 10 of those wins have come in just the last three seasons. In FSUs 12 victories against Top 25 competition, the Tribe has staged 10 comebacks in six wins. In one-third (4) of the Seminoles' Top 25 wins, FSU has had to stage two comebacks. The Seminoles defeated No. 10 NC State (1996), No. 6 Florida (2000), No. 7 Clemson (2001) and No. 17 Clemson again (2002) by coming from behind on two occasions. The Garnet and Gold has also come back from one-goal deficits to record wins over No. 2 North Carolina (2000) and No. 21 Florida (2002).



THAT'S FRESH

Florida State's 5-1 win over NC State was a coming out party for some of the freshmen that made up the nation's 25thranked recruiting class. While Leah Gallegos deservedly garnered much of the attention as she was second on the team in points (21) and goals(7) and led the squad in assists (7) two other freshmen stepped up in a big conference road game. Jacksonville's Erica Lewis and Alli Ferreri from Coral Springs, FL both had big games versus the Wolfpack. Lewis recorded two goals, giving her three on the season, and Ferreri notched her first-ever goal and it turned out to be the game-winner. Ferreri's goal also came in her first game playing up top in the FSU offense.



WIDE RIGHT

Sophomore Jez Ratliff had another big night in the opening round of the 2002 NCAA Tournament. The midfielder went on a tear after moving from forward to her natural position in the wide midfield. With her goal versus the Rebels, Ratliff set new career highs for goals and tied the 16 points she recorded in her rookie season. She had seven points in the first nine games since the position switch, which is allowing her to take advantage of her unmatched pace.

CROWDED HOUSE

When 972 fans came out to see the Garnet and Gold win their third straight NCAA Tournament opener, they comprised the largest postseason crowd to ever watch a game at the Seminole Soccer Complex. It was also the seventh-largest crowd in program history. Four of the eight largest crowds in FSU soccer history came last season and half of the Top 10 all-time crowds came out to watch the 2002 Seminoles. Overall, FSU drew 12,422 fans in 2002 and finished the season ranked in the top 10 for overall attendance and in the top 20 for average attendance. The Seminoles set a school record for overall attendance (ninth-best in the NCAA) in 15 home games. FSU had never approached 9,000 fans in a season before shattering the school record last year. The average crowd of 828 (19th-best in the NCAA) was the best ever in the program's eight year history. The Seminoles set five single-game attendance records last season including the largest crowd in school history when 1,603 spectators saw FSU down Florida 2-1. The team also played in-front of three 1,000-plus crowds in one season for the first time in program history.

TGI FRIDAY NIGHT

With FSU's win over Ole Miss in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament, the Seminoles continued some amazing streaks when it comes to Friday night games. Since Patrick Baker took over the Seminole soccer program in 1999, FSU has still never lost a home game on a Friday night (12-0-2) and has defeated every ranked opponent on Friday nights at the Seminole Soccer Complex (4-0-0). The Seminoles are also 16-1-3 since 1999 at home under the lights and FSU is 8-1-0 at night against ranked teams at home. In his four seasons at FSU, Baker has recorded wins under the lights in Tallahassee versus No. 6 UF (2000), No. 7 Texas A&M (2000), No. 20 Wake Forest (2000), No. 2 UNC (2000), No. 21 Maryland (2001), No. 17 Clemson (2002) and No. 21 Florida (2002).

WHAT A DIFFERENCE

When you think of ACC women's soccer you probably think of North Carolina, Clemson, Virginia and Duke as the traditional conference powers over the last five years but Patrick Baker is doing his best to get the Seminoles included in that group. Over the last three seasons, FSU is only behind North Carolina and Clemson for total wins among ACC schools, which is simply amazing considering FSU won just 31 games in its first four seasons. In the last three years alone, Baker's Seminoles have exceeded that number by nine wins while going to three NCAA Tournaments, two Sweet 16's and finishing in the Top 15 for three straight years.

HALL OF FAME ALREADY

While head coach Patrick Baker has accomplished some amazing feats in his short career as a head coach, it is hard to imagine anyone being elected into a hall of fame just months after their 35th birthday but that is the case for Baker. FSU's all-time winningest coach traveled to NC Wesleyan after FSU's game with UCF to be inducted into the college's hall of fame. Baker's first head coaching job was at Wesleyan where he was hired straight out of Otterbein University. Between 1989 and 1994, all Baker

did was lead the Bishops to three straight appearances in the NCAA Division III Tournament. He compiled a record of 45-21-4 and was named the Dixie Conference's Coach of the Year in 1991 and 1992. He was also named the National Soccer Coaches Association of America Division III South Region Coach of the Year in 1991. He led the Bishops to a Dixie Conference Co-Championship in 1992 and his teams finished in the top ten three times.



FIRST TO DO THIS AND THAT

Los Angeles native Leah
Gallegos accomplished two things
that have never been accomplished
in Florida State soccer history with
her hat trick versus Clemson. First,
she became the only Seminole to
ever record three goals in an ACC
match. Second, she became the first
FSU freshman to ever garner ACC

Player of the Week honors. Melissa Juhl (1996) and Amber Tollefson (2001) both won the award as sophomores. Cindy Schofield won the award twice as a junior in 2001 and Jill Ford is the only FSU senior to ever be named POW when she won the award in 1998. Gallegos wasn't the first freshman to record a hat trick though. Actually, first-year players have recorded five of FSU's seven all-time hat tricks.



CENTURY CLUB

Forward Cindy Schofield set more than 30 career, single season and postseason records in her four years at FSU but she probably set the most meaningful mark on one of the most important plays in program history When Schofield scored the game-winning goal versus Auburn that sent FSU into the Round of 16, it marked the 102nd point in her illustrious FSU career. It is hard to put into perspective how big that is in FSU soccer history except to say she is the only Seminole to ever accomplish that and she is

27 points in front of the player with the second-most points in team history. When you add up the points of the third and fourth-most prolific goal scorers in FSU history, they are still 12 points shy of Schofield's total. The goal also represented the 40th of Schofield's career, which is another record nobody to ever wear Garnet and Gold has ever even threatened. The most goals scored by a player other than Schofield is 28. Schofield is the only player in FSU history to record 80, 90 and then 100 points. She is the only player to record 30 and then 40 goals and the only player to ever record 20 or more assists. And don't forget she is the first Seminole ever to break the 200 shot barrier also.

UNLISTED

The Hermann Award is soccer's version of the Heisman Trophy and Florida State has never had a finalist for the award but a case could be made that last year they should have. Cindy Schofield had her second truly special season and her numbers, team's accomplishments and competition level matches any of the 15 finalists. She was third amongst the 15 Hermann Award finalists in points, she had the fourth-most goals among the group, her team went as far in the NCAA's as half the team's on that list and she played in the nation's premier conference. On top of that she produced in the big games scoring goals versus seven Top 20 teams, five ACC foes and eight teams that made the NCAA Tournament. She scored twice in the 2003 NCAA's with both goals being game-winners and she is a leader on one of just 14 teams in the nation that have been to the Round of 16 twice in the last three years.

VHO'S BACK?

Last year Camie Bybee was coming off a freshman season that saw her challenge for every rookie record in FSU history and ended up with her selection to the 2001 All-ACC rookie team. After scoring three goals and recording three assists in the first eight games of 2002, Bybee got back on the board against the Terrapins in the ACC quarterfinals, which narrowed the score to 3-2. She then got her second NCAA goal in two years against Auburn putting FSU up 1-0 in the Round of 32 match. Both of Bybee's

career NCAA Tournament goals have now come against Auburn. With her goal in the tournament, Bybee now has 15 goals and 42 points in just two seasons as a Seminole. No FSU player has ever had a better freshman and sophomore season than Bybee. She already ranks amongst FSU's career leaders for goals, points and game-winning goals. To put into perspective how successful Bybee has been you need only look at Cindy Schofield's numbers in her first two years. Schofield, who owns every offensive record for the regular season, postseason and in conference games, had eight goals and 24 points after her sophomore campaign. Bybee has already doubled the amount of goals and almost twice as many points. While she has a long way to go before she unseats Schofield, Bybee is off to an amazing start to her career.

SHE DOESN'T JUST SCORE

Freshman forward Leah Gallegos put together one of the best offensive seasons ever by a Seminole rookie. She set the freshman record for shots (64), she is fifth all time for goals by a freshman (7), tied for second in game-winning goals (3) and she is fourth in points (21) but the Los Angeles native does more than score. When she assisted on Cindy Schofield's game-winning goal versus Auburn, it gave her seven assists on the year, which is tied for the most ever by a first-year player at FSU. It also moved her into a tie for third all-time in single season assists.



OFFENSIVE EXPLOSION

The FSU offense exploded against NC State in Raleigh. The Seminoles' five goals were the most the team has ever scored in a regular season ACC contest and the most goals scored in any game dating back to the 2001 ACC Championships. It had been 18 straight games since FSU put up five or more goals and that last

explosion came in a 7-2 victory over the Terps in the 2001 ACC Tournament quarterfinals. The five goals were just a sign of how much FSU picked up its offense in the second half of the season. After averaging .75 goals a game in the first six contests of the year, FSU scored at a clip of 2.24 goals a game in their last 17 matches. Most amazingly, 10 of those 17 games came against teams who were ranked at the time of the game or who ended the 2002 season ranked. In those 17 games, FSU scored five goals once, four goals once and three goals on five occasions.

SEC YA REAL SOON

Florida State has become very familiar with seeing SEC opponents in the NCAA Tournament. Of FSU's seven NCAA Tournament matches, four have come against members of the Southeastern Conference and FSU is a perfect 4-0 in those games. In 2000, Florida State traveled to Gainesville and eliminated the Gators on their way to the school's first-ever Sweet 16. In 2001, FSU opened tournament play by defeating Auburn 1-0 at Clemson, SC. Last season, the Seminoles defeated Ole Miss and Auburn to reach the Sweet 16 for the second time in school history.

MULTI-TASKING

When Cindy Schofield converted a penalty kick versus Wake Forest, it completed just the second-ever two-goal comeback in FSU history. The striker scored both goals and in the process set the alltime FSU record for multi-goal games. After two goals versus JU, Schofield scored two or more goals in a game on seven occasions. In 2001, she set the single season record with four multi-goal games as she scored a school record 17 times. Since Patrick Baker took over the FSU program in 1999, Seminole players have recorded 16 of the program's 27 multi-goal games.

RECORD SETTERS

Not only did the Seminoles set all kinds of records in 2002, last year's squad was full of some of the greatest statistical players to ever wear Garnet and Gold. The 2002 Seminoles own 58% (28 of 48) of the top six best single season marks in eight major offensive categories and 25% of those were established during the 2002 campaign. Four of the top nine single season point totals and single season goal totals, two of the top three single season assist totals, three of the top six shot totals and seven of the top 10 totals for shots on goal were all set by members of the 2002 team.

Members of the 2002 Seminole squad own 55% of the Top 10

all-time marks for points, points per game, goals, goals per game, assists, assists per game and shots on goal. Four of the top nine points and points per game totals were established by current FSU players. Two of the top seven career goal records and three of the top seven goals per game records are held by members of the 2002 team. Five of the top eight career assist marks and four of the top five records for assists per game were also established by players on the 2002 team. Lastly, seven of the top 10 career marks for shots on goal have been established by the players on the 2002 team.

BEALING BETTER

The return of 2001 SoccerBuzz first team freshman All-American Katie Beal was a huge boost for the Seminoles. In the eight games she started after recovering from an early season illness, FSU recorded two shutouts. The Seminole defense recorded just two shutouts in the previous 14 games before her return. In the first four regular games after Beal returned to the starting line-up, FSU recorded just its third shutout of the season, allowed just four goals and limited opponents to the second-fewest shots over any three-game stretch last season. On top of her defensive work, Beal recorded three assists in her five starts including the first multi-assist and multi-point game of her career. Coming into 2002, the Alexandria, VA native had recorded just one assist. Last season she tripled that number with three on the year.



PULLING TRICKS OUT OF HER HAT

Freshman Leah
Gallegos had a recordsetting night against No. 17
Clemson. The Seminoles
first-ever player from the
state of California seemed
like anything but a freshman playing her first game
in the nation's premier
soccer conference. Her
three goals in less than 30
minutes marked just the
seventh hat trick in the

program's eight-year history and the first ever recorded by an FSU player in an ACC contest. She is just the fifth Seminole freshman to ever record a hat trick and the first newcomer to do it in four years. Thanks to her big night, Gallegos became FSU's first-ever freshman to garner ACC Player of the Week honors and she was also named to the Soccer America and Soccer Buzz national teams of the week.

THE ROAD TO SUCCESS

The 2001 FSU soccer team was the first to ever record an undefeated home season going 8-0-0. While the 2002 team didn't match that amazing feat they accomplished something even more spectacular. For the first time ever, FSU finished a regular season undefeated on the road (4-0-1) after beating Maryland and GMU. Before Patrick Baker's arrival, the Seminole soccer program had posted an all-time road record of 13-23-2 for a winning percentage of just .368. In those four seasons, FSU was .500 or above on the road just once. Since Baker came to FSU in 1999, Florida State has been at .500 or above in road games for three straight seasons, has posted a .562 road winning percentage and has increased its winning percentage every season. While FSU has lost away from the Seminole soccer complex in 2002, that one loss was in a neutral site game to No. 10 Charlotte. In true road contests, FSU defeated Miami, No. 19 NC State, No. 16 Maryland, George Mason and tied Duke.
