



2003: THE YEAR IN REVIEW

HE'S THE BEST AROUND



Florida State players weren't the only people affiliated with the soccer team that were being honored after the season. Head coach Patrick Baker had quite an offseason as well. The man who has taken Seminole soccer from the bottom of the ACC to the top echelon of the women's soccer world got a richly deserved honor from *Soccer America*. The soccer magazine named Baker its national coach of the year. It is the top individual honor ever awarded to the Seminole soccer program.

NO. 2 IS NOW NO. 1

Senior Amber Tollefson finished her Florida State career in the ultimate soccer spotlight. A deserving send off for a player coach Patrick Baker calls one of the recruits who helped turn the program into a national power. Tollefson's career has been characterized by unselfishness so it is appropriate she set a new single season record with her game-winning assist versus Florida in the Elite Eight. Tollefson now owns the single season assist record (11) on top of the career assists record (25). She took over both marks with her play in the NCAA Tournament where she had assists in three of FSU's four wins and two were game-winners. Tollefson is now second for assists by a Seminole in a single NCAA Tournament and second for career assists in the NCAA's. She and Jez Ratliff did their job out wide as the two midfielders accounted for half of the team's 14 assists in the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

SO HONORED



After Florida State's run to the College Cup, you figured the postseason awards would come rolling in but I don't think anyone in Tallahassee expected what happened a few weeks after the season ended. Seminole coaches and players picked up 27 postseason honors. Pretty incredible. Even more amazing when you consider FSU had received 35 postseason honors in the previous eight seasons before. Of the 61 postseason honors won by FSU players, 59 have come since head coach Patrick Baker took over the program in 1999. Florida State had its first ever NCAA All-Tournament team selection in India Trotter. The Tribe had a consensus All-American and first team All-American for the first time

ever in Leah Gallegos. In eight seasons a Seminole had garnered All-American honors just four times, this year six All-American honors were bestowed on FSU players. Florida State had its first ever NSCAA first team All-Region pick in Gallegos as well. For the first time FSU had four players named either first or second team all-region by SoccerBuzz and more than one freshman named a freshman All-American by *Soccer America*. Overall, FSU freshmen picked up 11 postseason awards including seven on a national level. Kelly Rowland, who was not even named to the All-ACC freshman team, was named a freshman All-American by *Soccer America* and to the all-region freshman team by SoccerBuzz. FSU's four NSCAA regional winners were the most ever in a single season for the program and Florida State was tied with North Carolina who placed four on the team as well.

2003 Review

DOUBLE IN THE FIRST



For the first time in the history of the program, Florida State placed two players on the All-ACC first team. Striker Leah Gallegos and senior defender Kristin Boyce both took home the first All-ACC honors of their careers. Two other Seminoles were honored as well as midfielder India Trotter and forward Julia Schnugg were each named to the ACC's All-Freshman team. The selection of Gallegos and Boyce doubled the amount of Florida State players to ever garner first team honors. Emma Breland (2000) and Cindy Schofield (2001 & 2002) were the only Seminoles before this season to ever be named to the first team in the nation's top soccer conference. This is the second time in the last three seasons that FSU has placed multiple players on the ACC All-Freshman team. Since 2000, seven FSU rookies have garnered freshman team honors.

ADJUSTING QUICKLY

Since the NCAA Tournament expanded to 32 teams in 1996, only one squad in the nation has made it to the final four in fewer trips to the NCAA Tournament than Florida State. The University of Florida needed just three tries to make it to the College Cup in 1998 while the Seminoles made it to the promised land of women's college soccer on their fourth go-around. Penn State needed five tries before getting to its first-ever College Cup. Florida State hasn't just made it to the College Cup quickly they have looked like old pros getting there. With their journey to the Final Four in 2003, FSU moved its NCAA Tournament winning percentage to .692. One of the best percentages in the history of Division I women's soccer.

ANOTHER FIRST



The Florida State defense and goalkeeper Joy McKenzie were spectacular in shutting out four straight ACC opponents before a 1-0 loss to UNC to close the regular season. That goal ended the Tribe's ACC shutout streak at 447:34. Most amazingly though, even with the 1-0 loss at UNC, the Seminoles shared the conference shutout title for the season with the Heels. Joy McKenzie wrapped up the individual title. She finished the year with one more blanking than Ali Winget (UNC) or Thora Helgadottir (Duke). Florida State entered the season with five ACC shutouts (regular season play) in eight years. They almost doubled that amount this past season.

LINE-UP SHUFFLE

It is really a credit to the Florida State coaching staff that the Seminoles came as far as they did when you look at the team's line-up last season. Only one player, Jez Ratliff, started every game at the same position in 2003. The wide midfielder started on the right flank all 26 games. Only three other players started every game in 2003 but none at the same spot. Sophomore All-American Leah Gallegos started up top 25 times but made one start as the Seminoles' attacking midfielder. Freshman Kelly Rowland started the first five games of the season as FSU's right back but played centrally the last 20 games. Senior Amber Tollefson made 25 starts out wide on the left side of the FSU midfield but also made one start as the teams left back.

- 16 different Seminoles started for FSU in 2003.
- Only Jez Ratliff started every game at the same position.

- FSU started six different line-ups in 26 games this season.
- Only three players started every game this year for FSU.

THE DEFENSE NEVER RESTS

When it comes to finding the secret to the Seminoles success in 2003 the case is closed and the defense gets the credit. That doesn't just mean the five primary starters on the back line or goalkeeper Joy McKenzie. The Tribe won because of team defending from the forwards all the way back. The 2003 Seminoles allowed 1.07 goals per game, by far the lowest number in school history. The 2003 squad allowed more than a half a goal less per game than last year's team and finished way ahead of the record set by the 2000 team that allowed 1.23 goals per game. Only four of FSU's last 21 opponents were able to score more than one goal versus the Seminoles and nine were shut out by the FSU defense. It's no wonder that FSU went 16-4-1 in its last 21 games and ended up in the College Cup.



PICK YOUR POISON

The 2003 edition of Seminole soccer was the most balanced group when it comes to scoring. They were the first Florida State team ever to have seven players with four or more goals, seven players with 15 or more points and five players with 19 or more points. Each one of those marks is an FSU record. The seven players with four or more goals sets a new mark and the five players with 15 or more points and two players with 20 or more points ties the record set in 2001.

THAT WAS NO. 7

When you play one of the two toughest schedules in the nation you are going to see great players but it got a little out of hand in 2003. When the Tribe traveled to Morgantown for the Sweet 16, West Virginia's Chrissie Abbott was the seventh Hermann Award semifinalist the Seminoles saw that season. If you include the two games versus Carolina, FSU played a Hermann semifinalist 10 times in 2003. In those 10 meetings, FSU allowed just three of the Hermann semifinalists to score a goal and one of the goals came via a Cat Reddick penalty kick.



THEY ARE MADE TO BE BROKEN

Florida State's fourth straight NCAA Tournament opening game victory turned into a record-breaking night for the Tribe. The Seminoles' 5-0 win over the Dartmouth saw 10 records either set or tied. The five goals were the most ever scored in an NCAA Tournament game by FSU and the five assists and 15 points were also team game records. With Julia Schnugg, India Trotter and Rachel McDowell all scoring, a record three freshmen scored in an NCAA Tournament game, which is an FSU first as well. The Tribe also tied the record for most second half goals with four and they tied the mark for largest margin of victory. Individually Camie Bybee's big night produced three records all by herself. She set the mark for goals scored with two, moved to the top of the career list for goals in the postseason (4) and tied the record for points in an NCAA Tournament game (4).

JUST ONE TEAM DID THAT

The reason 3/5's of the FSU defense (goalkeeper included) were ACC All-Tournament selections was pretty obvious. The group allowed just one goal in the run of play all tournament and they were also the only group to record a shutout the entire weekend. While North Carolina scored 15 goals they also allowed five. Florida State on the other hand allowed just four in the three games and one came on a penalty kick.

FITTING RIGHT IN



Every freshman on FSU's 2003 roster played in an NCAA Tournament game in 2003 with most of the minutes coming against Dartmouth. The 5-0 win allowed head coach Patrick Baker to remove some starters and get some experience for his first year players, not that they need it. Of the nine players that scored goals for FSU in the 2003 NCAA's, four were freshmen. India Trotter, Kelly Rowland, Rachel McDowell and Julia Schnugg all scored their first ever NCAA Tournament goals and accounted for five of FSU's 12 goals.

4 DIVIDED BY 2 = ACC



There was an obvious ACC flavor at the 2003 Women's College Cup and it had more to do with the location of the SAS Soccer Complex. With both Florida State and North Carolina making it to the final four, it was the ninth time in NCAA Tournament history that two teams from the same conference made it to the final four. The only two conferences that have sent two teams to the final four are the Atlantic Coast Conference and the West Coast Conference. The ACC has done it five times and the WCC has done it four times. The WCC has only ever sent Portland and Santa Clara to the final four while the ACC has seen UNC and NC State (twice), UNC and Virginia, UNC and Duke and UNC and Florida State make it to the last weekend of the season.

FALLING IN RANK



Before head coach Patrick Baker took over the Seminole soccer program, FSU had defeated two teams ranked by the NSCAA in four years and both of those wins came in 1996. With the Elite Eight victory over No. 7 Florida, FSU has now knocked off 12 teams in the NSCAA poll since 2000. Even more amazingly half of those 12 wins have come against top 10 teams. The Seminoles won four games in 2003 against teams ranked by the NSCAA at the time of the game, which is the second-most in school history and exceeds the amount from the 2001 and 2002 seasons combined. The most wins over NSCAA

ranked teams in a season came in 2000 when the Tribe knocked off five in one year. The win over the Mountaineers was FSU's first-ever win over a Top 10 team in the NCAA Tournament and the Seminoles did it again less than a week later with the win over Florida. The highest-ranked team FSU had ever beat before WVU was No. 11 Florida in 2000 when the Seminoles advanced to their first-ever Sweet 16 with a 2-1 win. Overall, FSU is 3-3 all-time in the tournament versus ranked teams with all three of those wins coming away from home.

TAKING CARE OF STATE BUSINESS



When Patrick Baker arrived in 1999, he made winning games versus in-state teams a priority and it has paid off. With a 7-0 win over FAU, FSU moved to 24-2-0 against Florida schools since 2000. The Seminoles are undefeated at home against teams from Florida (13-0-0) and have outscored those opponents 47-13 in Tallahassee. The last time FSU walked off the Seminole Soccer Complex field with a loss against a Florida team was August 29, 1999 in a 3-0 loss to Miami, which was just the second game of head coach Patrick Baker's FSU career. The only road losses in that span came in Gainesville to the Gators.

Overall since Baker arrived in 1999, the Seminoles have posted a .878 winning percentage against their in-state rivals, going 29-4-0 and Baker has a winning record versus every in-state team he has faced in his five years. During those five seasons, FSU posted undefeated records against Jacksonville (6-0-0), FAU (1-0), South Florida (5-0-0), Florida International (3-0-0), UCF (5-0-0), and Stetson (1-0-0). The Seminoles only blemishes came against Florida (4-3-0) and Miami (4-1-0). Before Baker's arrival, the Seminoles posted a 9-7-1 record against teams from the Sunshine State. That is an increase of 319 percentage points since he was hired.



2003 Review

WRECKING THE RECORDS

When you play a school record 26 games, records are going to fall and that was the case in 2003 for Florida State. The Seminoles run to the College Cup helped the team obliterate the record book but it wasn't just due to the amount of games. Florida State set single-season records for wins (17), points (182), goals (60), assists (62), shots (446), shots on goal (194), shutouts (9) and neutral site victories (3). That is amazing but even more so are the per game records, which have nothing to do with a longer season. The 2003 Seminoles were the best ever as far as points/game (7.28) and shots/game (17). Florida State averaged 2.44 goals per game, which was just behind the record 2.55 set in 1996. While the 2003 Seminoles' season may have been longer you also have to take into account who those games came against (ACC Tournament and NCAA Tournament games).

CAN'T LOSE IF THEY DON'T SCORE

Florida State saw its school record string of six straight shutouts, which began with a 3-0 win over UCF, come to an end in North Carolina. The Seminoles didn't record their first shutout of the season until October 1, which was the 10th game of the campaign. Since that time, FSU had recorded clean sheets versus nine of its next 15 opponents. The Tribe had not allowed a goal in 637:34, the longest shutout streak in program history. It was also the first shutout streak of any significance to include ACC teams as this streak encompassed four games versus conference foes. Previous records for shutout streaks were held by the 1999 squad (333:35) and the 1997 squad (277:44).

HOME, AWAY, HIGHER, LOWER



Florida State's path to the College Cup was unlike anyone else's. The Seminoles were the only team that beat a higher seed to get to Cary, NC and they did it twice. Florida State was the only team that had to go on the road for the Sweet 16 and the Elite Eight. All the other teams in the College Cup played at home the last two weekends. The Tribe was the only squad that made it to the final four by beating the highest seeded team in their bracket. They were also the only squad to emerge from a bracket where none of the seeded teams were knocked out by an unseeded opponent. The Seminoles were the only team that made it to Cary by going on the road in back-to-back weeks and knocking off higher seeded squads on their home pitch. Not bad for a team that was 4-4-1 during the regular season at an opponent's field.

Not many teams have been able to pull off what FSU pulled off on its way to the College Cup. In order to get to Cary, NC the Seminoles had to win in two stadiums where opponents just don't win. The Tribe first defeated a West Virginia team that was 19-1-0 at home in its last 20 games with their only loss coming to Elite Eight squad Penn State. They then marched into Gainesville and beat a Gator team that was unbeaten at home dating back to the start of the 2001 season (17-0-2). Those teams were a combined 36-1-2 (.949) at home before FSU beat them both. That meant Florida State had a .6% chance of going into Morgantown and Gainesville and leaving both stadiums with a win.

LIKE A DUCK TO WATER



Few teams have adjusted to life in the NCAA Tournament as well as the Seminoles. 2003 was just the squad's fourth ever trip to the NCAA Tournament and they have already been to the Sweet 16 three times and advanced to their first ever College Cup in 2003. Only eight of 297 schools playing women's soccer have

been to three of the last four Sweet 16's, which is amazing. Even more amazing though if you consider that FSU is the only school of the eight that made its first NCAA Tournament appearance during that four-year span.

The Tribe under head coach Patrick Baker is one of the more remarkable postseason stories. The team is 9-4 all-time in their four NCAA Tournament appearances for a .692 winning percentage. The Tribe's first four NCAA trips have been special as they have averaged 2.25 wins per tournament appearance. That is the third-best average of wins per appearance in NCAA Tournament history. While all of that success is impressive, it isn't even close to the most astounding number when it comes to success at the NCAA Tournament. Florida State's nine wins in their first four trips ranks third all-time for wins in a team's first four trips to the NCAA's. Only North Carolina and Notre Dame have more victories in their first four postseason appearances than FSU.

GETTING CLOSER & CLOSER



The 2003 ACC Championship final was an absolute joy to watch as No. 1 North Carolina and No. 7 Florida State played the closest ACC Final in 15 years. Florida State led the Heels after 50 minutes and according to UNC head coach Anson Dorrance he couldn't remember ever trailing for that length of time (almost 23 minutes) in an ACC Final. The Seminoles became the first team to even score on the Tar Heels in an ACC Championship game in five years and they were the first team to score two goals on UNC in the championship game since 1994. The Tar Heels came into the ACC final with a shutout streak that extended for over 540 minutes and they had won those six games by an average score of 4-0. In their 15 ACC Tournament finals, UNC had an average margin of victory of more than three goals every time out. Kelly Rowland scored both of FSU's goals in a 3-2 loss and in turn became the first Seminole to ever score twice in a game versus Carolina and the first player to score two goals in a game versus UNC since Wake Forest's Sarah Kosey did it October, 10 2002.

FIVE ALIVE

Going to the final four has its perks. On top of being the center of attention for the whole collegiate soccer world, you get to play on national television and fight for the right to be known as National Champion. While the Seminoles didn't bring home the national title the pollsters seemed mighty impressed with their run to the College Cup. FSU finished the season as a consensus top five by the polls that released new rankings after the final four (*Soccer America* released its final poll before the NCAA Tournament). Florida State had never received a top 10 ranking from any of these polls before 2003 and midway through the season FSU wasn't even ranked in any of those polls. In the NSCAA poll, FSU jumped from 19 to 4 in the last three polls. The Tribe finished the season setting a new all-time high for national ranking in all four collegiate soccer polls.

YES, ANOTHER FIRST



Kelly Rowland's performance in the ACC Tournament made her a lock for all-tourney honors and she was even a favorite for tournament MVP late into

the final match. She wasn't alone on the team either as a school-record four Seminoles were included on the 2003 ACC All-Tournament team. Two of the most overlooked Seminoles when it came to postseason honors got recognized as Rowland became just the second FSU rookie ever to be ACC All-Tournament and junior Joy McKenzie was the first FSU goalkeeper to ever make the team. They were joined by striker Leah Gallegos and defender Katie Beal, who is now the only Seminole to ever be a two-time ACC All-Tournament team selection.

KEEPING 'EM OUT AND PUTTING 'EM IN



With 12 goals in the 2003 NCAA Tournament, the Seminoles eclipsed the team record for single-season goals. The Tribe scored 60 goals in 2003 marking the first time in team history that a Seminole squad reached 60 goals in a season. The team also set a record for the fewest goals allowed in a season with 28. No team in FSU history has ever possessed the goal scoring prowess and as stingy a defense as the 2003 squad. Florida State was a plus 32 in goals scored versus goals allowed. That is 10 goals better than the previous record of 22 set in 2001. Florida State had just one season in the first four were they scored more

13 UNLUCKY?



With its 1-0 win over Maryland, FSU picked up its 13th win of the season. It was the fourth straight season FSU recorded at least 13 wins. In the first five years of Seminole soccer, the Tribe had never recorded 13 wins and had 12 or more victories just once. The only other ACC school that has secured 13 or more wins for four straight seasons is North Carolina. Overall, FSU has won the second-most games amongst ACC teams since 2000. Only Carolina has accumulated more victories in the last four seasons. Florida State has at least 10 more wins than four other ACC schools since 2000.

IN-TEN-SE FINISH

It is hard to imagine anyone closing out the season in more impressive fashion than FSU did in its last 10 games leading up to the NCAA Tournament. In that span the Seminoles played eight NCAA Tournament teams including national No. 1 seed North Carolina twice. They played seven teams that were ranked and five of those games were played against teams that were ranked in the top 12 at some point last season. The only teams they faced that didn't make the tournament were ACC foe NC State (9-9-1) and a Florida Atlantic team (16-4-1) that missed the NCAA Tournament due to a PK loss in the A-Sun Finals. In that span Florida State outscored its opponents 20-5. Giving up just five goals is especially remarkable considering FSU played Carolina twice and on seven occasions in 2003 the Tar Heels scored five or more goals in a single game. Also, only one of those five goals was given up in the run of play. Leah Gallegos averaged almost a goal a game in that run and scored more than half her season total in those 10 matches with nine. Defenders Katie Beal and Kelly Rowland played huge roles offensively and defensively. Each central defender contributed seven points in the 10 games. The FSU defense and goalkeeper Joy McKenzie were simply remarkable. The squad shutout seven of those 10 opponents and only allowed goals in back-to-back games once and that came in a 1-0 loss to UNC and a 2-1 win over Wake Forest.

AMONG THE BEST EVER

Since Florida State started playing ACC soccer in 1995, the schedule for ACC teams obviously moved to seven games. In those nine years, only North Carolina squads have allowed fewer than the five goals in seven games that FSU allowed this year in ACC play. The record for goals allowed is two and that was set by Carolina (1996, 1997, 1999). The Heels also hold down the second spot by allowing just three goals in seven ACC games (1995, 1998, 2003). The only other teams to allow five or fewer goals in an entire conference season are FSU this year and Clemson in 2000 (5). So as impressive as FSU was in cutting their lowest goals allowed from 11 to 5, this stat really puts into perspective just how special that feat was.

FRESHMAN TRADITION

The fact that Julia Schnugg shattered the FSU freshman assists record is not that surprising. For one thing she was as talented a freshman as any FSU has ever had and her pedigree might be the best ever for an FSU recruit but she was also just following tradition. For three straight years, an FSU freshman has tied the all-time freshman assist record with seven. Emma Breland set the mark in 2000. Camie Bybee tied the mark in 2001 and then Leah Gallegos equaled them both in 2002. Schnugg broke tradition though as she beat the record with 10 on the year. Schnugg is the fourth consecutive first-year player to move to the top of that list.



FOUR IN FOUR



It is hard to remember a time when Florida State wasn't playing in the NCAA Tournament but it wasn't that long ago. Since head coach Patrick Baker took over the program, Seminole soccer fans have only known ACC Championship game appearances, NCAA Tournaments and Sweet 16 runs. The team's 2003 NCAA Tournament appearance was their fourth in a row. The Tribe had never been to the tourney in the program's five year history

coming into the 2000 season now they are one of just 21 teams playing D-I soccer in the NCAA's for the fourth straight year, which is just over 7% of the 297 teams playing the sport. Amazingly, five of those 21 schools are playing in the ACC. No other conference has more than three teams on that list.

TURN THE BEAT AROUND



After downing NC State 1-0, Florida State approved its record versus the Wolfpack to 3-0-0 since 2000, which shouldn't really surprise anyone since it has become the rule more than the exception for Florida State as of late. The Seminoles not only have a winning record over the last three seasons versus four of the ACC's seven teams, they are undefeated. Versus Maryland, Duke, Clemson and NC

State, FSU has gone 11-0-1 in its last three matches versus each of those schools. To put that in perspective, the Seminoles were 1-9-2 against those teams in from 1998-2000. In those six seasons, FSU recorded just three wins against this group in 25 meetings for a winning percentage of .107. The turnaround started with Baker's arrival and took just one season. From 1995 to 1999, the Seminoles posted a 3-30-2 record in regular season conference games, a winning percentage of .114. Since then FSU has defeated every ACC squad in a conference game except for Virginia. Against Clemson, Maryland and NC State, the Tribe is an amazing 7-2-1 and overall in that span, Florida State is at .500 or above against four of the seven ACC schools since 2000.

Since starting the soccer program at FSU in 1995, FSU has established quite a legacy for competing against the best in the nation. That point has never been as clear as when you look at just the amount of games they have played

against recent National Champions and College Cup teams. The Seminoles have faced a defending National Champion in six of the last eight seasons and faced the eventual National Champion six times in a row from 1996-2001. Since 1996, FSU has played 12 games in eight years versus College Cup teams. The Tribe has played 11 games against seven National Champions and has faced every National Champion but one over that span.
