



2005 Year In Review



Sixth Time



Florida State head coach Mark Krikorian had a pretty good first season in Tallahassee to say the least. His team established over 50 firsts and records, scored more goals than any FSU team, defeated 11 ranked opponents including three top 10 squads and he led his team to the national semifinal. He has also done something else only a handful of other coaches have been able to accomplish. Krikorian is just the sixth coach in the history of DI Women's soccer to lead his team to the national semifinals in his first season at a school. The other first-year coaches are: Ian Sawyer (Stanford, 1993), Carl Beal (Colorado College, 1990), Randy Waldrum (Notre Dame, 1999), Paula Wilkins (Penn State, 2002) and Jean Paul Verhees (California, 1987). Former FSU head coach Patrick Baker led the Seminoles to their first-ever College Cup in 2003 and FSU

is now one of six schools who have gone to the College Cup under the direction of two different coaches. Four of those teams (Florida State, Cal, Notre Dame and Colorado College) each went to the College Cup for a second time under a first year coach. Krikorian is the only coach of those four who led his team to the College Cup after the previous year's squad did not win at least one game in the tournament directly preceding his hiring. Notre Dame, Cal and Colorado College each advanced to at least the quarterfinals the year before a new coach came on board.

Who Would Have Thought

In 2004 Florida State came into the season with 10 of 11 starters returning from a team that advanced to the College Cup. It seemed like there would be more consistency in the 2004 line-up than any year before but injuries hit and FSU ended up starting 16 different line-ups in 20 games. Considering the team had the best regular season in school history is amazing with all that shuffling in the starting 11. Coming into 2005, FSU brought in nine newcomers and returned just four starters from the previous year yet nine players started 19 or more games at the same position in 2005. Of those nine players, five were first year starters.

We're Back

In 1999 the idea of advancing to the NCAA Tournament was a goal for the Florida State soccer program but far from a reality at that point. Six years later the Seminoles are hanging with the biggest names in the game. In the last three seasons, only two teams have made multiple trips to the College Cup and FSU is one of those teams. UCLA is the only team to play in all three College Cups since 2003 and FSU is the only other program to go more than once. That puts FSU ahead of teams like North Carolina, Portland, Santa Clara and Notre Dame who have all won National Titles since 2000. This decade only five teams have been to the College Cup more times than Florida State and only seven schools have made multiple trips.

The 2005 Seminoles were a remarkable story and not just because they went into Chapel Hill and ousted the Tar Heels to advance to the 2005 College Cup. The team was picked to finish sixth in the ACC preseason coaches poll yet they were one of only

four teams still playing in Division I soccer on the final weekend of the season. For the first time in school history the Seminoles were the last ACC team still alive in the NCAA Tournament advancing further than all five teams picked to finish ahead of them in the ACC preseason poll. Florida State was the only No. 2 seed to advance to the College Cup and the Seminoles were the only team in College Station, TX that advanced past a higher ranked

team in the NCAA Tournament and they did it twice (Cal and UNC). The 2005 Seminole team overcame a lot more than just ranked opponents. This group saw their head coach (Patrick Baker) leave to take another job December 8. Mark Krikorian wasn't hired until January 12. The team lost seven starters including two who transferred back to California (Leah Gallegos and Julia Schnugg). Almost half the letter winners from the previous season were gone and of the 29 goals scored in 2004 (the lowest total ever), players who accounted for 20 of those goals were gone as well. Nobody expected much from the 2005 Seminoles. Not the ACC coaches and not the national pollsters as FSU came into 2005 unranked in a preseason poll for the first time in four years.

OT x 2

If you went to overtime with Florida State in 2005, you better have been prepared to play two. After the North Carolina match in the NCAA quarterfinals, the Seminoles had been in three OT games and all of them were double overtime affairs. Florida State fared very well in those matches going 2-0-1. FSU scored golden goals versus Duke and Loyola Marymount and downed the Tar Heels in a shootout. Historically the Seminoles have been very good in OT games. In 34 lifetime OT games, FSU has only lost five. Their 13-5-16 record is good for a .617 winning percentage. Since 2000, FSU has lost just once in overtime posting an 11-1-11 record. That equates to a .717 winning percentage in the closest matches they have played in the last six seasons. In the NCAA Tournament, FSU has never lost an OT game going 2-0-2. The only time Florida State played an OT game in the NCAA Tournament and didn't advance was in 2004 when BC eliminated them in the first round. All three of FSU's other OT games have come in the second or third rounds of the tournament.



Packing A Punch



The 2005 Seminoles established new single season marks for goals and points. In one less match the 2005 team bested the 2003 squad by five goals and four points. One of the reasons for that was the play of Sel Kuralay and India Trotter. For the first time in team history, FSU had two players with 12 or more goals in a season and if you add in Viola Odebrecht and her nine goals, FSU has three players with nine or more goals for the first time in program history as well. The previous record for most goals by a pair of teammates was 27 and that was set in 2001 when Cindy Schofield had 17 goals and Camie Bybee 10. Last year Kuralay and Trotter combined for 29 goals, which is the same amount of goals scored by the entire team in 2004. Only one FSU team has ever produced even two players

with nine or more goals in a year so the fact FSU had three in one campaign shows how productive the 2005 squad was offensively.

Second Sight

Florida State's victory in the round of 16 over Cal once again showed how dangerous FSU is in the second half of games. With the two goals versus the Bears, Florida State scored 40 second half goals in 2005, the most in school history and more than five other FSU teams scored all season. No Florida State team has ever recorded more than 32 goals in the second half of games prior to the 2005 team. FSU scored the game-winning goal in the second half or overtime 10 times and seven of those games came versus teams that were ranked at some point. Florida State outscored teams by 30 goals in the second half and the other stats were even more one sided. In the second half, the Seminoles took 110 more shots than their opponents, 38 more corners and put an amazing 60 more shots on goal. FSU's second half production was remarkable compared to their opponents and even compared to their own performance in the first half. This Seminole team's goals increased by 74% in the second half, shots by 39%, corner kicks by 17% and shots on goal 98%. Defensively FSU was better in the second half as well. While they have allowed the same number of goals in each half, the real stat that shows how good they were is that this group gave up just one second half goal all season that cost FSU a game.

Like A Fish To Water



For a team that never played in the NCAA Tournament prior to this decade, Florida State made its presence felt quickly. The Seminoles have been to six straight NCAA Tournaments, four round of 16's, two quarterfinals and

two College Cups in the last six seasons. They are one of just two teams with multiple College Cup appearances in the last three years, seven teams to make two of the last three quarterfinals, one of just 11 schools to advance to the third round four or more times since 2000 and one of just 15 schools to be invited to six straight NCAA Tournaments. Getting there is one thing but winning once you're in is another. Few teams have done a better job winning NCAA Tournament games than Florida State. Of the teams that have played 10 or more all-time games, FSU has the seventh-highest winning percentage of any team in NCAA Tournament history. FSU is in elite company. Only seven teams have a winning percentage of .660 or better and three have won National Championships this decade (UNC, Notre Dame and Portland). Overall only 11 teams have won 60% of their NCAA Tournament games and that group includes four National Champions.

He Deserved It



You never know what will happen when it comes to ACC Coach of the Year voting and that's why it was such a pleasant surprise that Florida State's Mark Krikorian won the program's first ACC Coach of the Year honor. The Seminole boss came into the 2005 season with more questions than answers and led FSU to its best conference season, to

two record win streaks, to a second place finish in the conference and to wins over six teams ranked in the NSCAA top 25. Krikorian guided the Seminoles into uncharted territory as far as win streaks of seven and nine games. He is only the second coach in ACC history to lead his team on a seven game win streak inside the conference and Krikorian's Seminoles were the only team in the ACC Tournament to finish higher than they were predicted in the preseason coaches' poll. Florida State was pegged to finish sixth and wound up in second place. The only other ACC teams to exceed expectations were Miami who was picked 11th and finished 10th and NC State who was tabbed 10th and finished ninth. Every other team in the conference either finished where they were predicted or lower.

Trot-A-Lot

India Trotter had an amazing junior year that saw her garner All-America honors. She scored 13 goals and had nine assists for 35 points. Amazing numbers considering the midfielder came into 2005 with three goals, six assists and 12 career points. Trotter didn't slow down at all in the NCAA Tournament either. In five games, the Ft. Lauderdale, FL native scored in four matches while accumulating five goals including all three of FSU's game-winners surpassing her career total

coming into the season. Trotter had three points all-time in six NCAA Tournament games coming into 2005. She doubled that total on opening weekend alone. With another goal versus UNC, Trotter is now all alone in first for career points, goals and game-winning goals in NCAA Tournament play. She is just the second Seminole to ever record a multi-goal game in the NCAA postseason joining Camie Bybee who scored twice versus Dartmouth in 2003. She now holds the single game NCAA Tournament record for shots with seven and is tied for first for goals and points in an NCAA Tournament game as well.

FSU's win over No. 6 Cal in the third round of the NCAA Tournament marked the highest ranked team FSU had ever beaten in an NCAA Tournament game and the win gave Florida State seven wins over teams ranked in the top 25 of the NSCAA, which established a new single season record. The previous record for wins over NSCAA ranked teams in a season was five and set in 2000. Overall FSU played 16 games versus teams ranked at one point during the season in any of the four polls. The Seminoles were 11-4-1 in those games. Not only did that squad beat seven NSCAA ranked teams in 2005, FSU beat six of those ranked teams in the last 13 games of the year. Florida State not only set a school record for wins over top 25 teams but

also over top 10 teams. The 2005 squad's three wins over top 10 NSCAA teams was a school record as well. The Seminoles had never won more than two games in a season versus top 10 teams and that happened just once. In 2003 FSU beat No. 10 West Virginia and No. 6 Florida in consecutive weeks to go to the College Cup. That was the only time in team history that the FSU won back-to-back games versus top 10 squads. Before the national semifinal versus UCLA, FSU had been the lower ranked team in the NSCAA heading into seven previous matches and they have gone 4-2-1 in those games and were undefeated in four straight.

Mim-imal Success For Opponents

Ali Mims' remarkable career just keeps adding more chapters. The redshirt-junior from Ponte Vedra Beach, FL has undergone more than 20 surgical procedures and missed almost three years of action due to a broken tibia but boy did she come back strong in 2005. With her shutout of FAU in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament, Mims set a new Seminole record for single season shutouts with her eighth of the year breaking a nine year old record. She surpassed the 7.5 recorded by Melissa Juhl in 1996. Mims is now threatening the career record held by Juhl and Joy McKenzie, which stands at 13. She still has a sixth year of eligibility remaining to chase down the career mark. Mims also set the single season GAA record. Her 0.90 GAA is just edged out the record set by McKenzie in 2003 when she posted a GAA of 0.92. Mims joined McKenzie as only the second FSU keeper to ever record a sub-1.00 GAA for a season. Mims' career GAA is now at 1.11 and currently 0.05 behind the career record held by McKenzie as well. Mims has already passed McKenzie in one other very important category. With the win over Cal, Mims is now the winningest keeper in Seminole history. The junior goalie has 27 career victories, which is first all time.



All-That

Florida State couldn't have asked for much more from fellow ACC coaches when the All-ACC selections were revealed. The All-ACC first team featured more Seminoles than any other school in the conference. Selin Kuralay, Viola Odebrecht and India Trotter were all named to the first team while no other ACC school had more than two players make the first squad. FSU also had three All-ACC freshmen, which tied Virginia for the most. That was a big number for the Seminoles who

had been one of the most successful teams as far as all-freshman selections since that award came into existence in 2000. Florida State is the only ACC team to place three rookies on an All-ACC freshman team twice. UNC and Virginia have each done it once. Those are the only teams FSU trails in all-freshman selections as well. The Heels and Cavs have had 12 freshmen make that team while FSU has had 11. They are the only three schools with double digit selections.

Taking Offense

The 2005 Seminoles were the most dangerous offensive group ever assembled at the school. FSU finished the season with 65 goals, which is the most scored by an FSU team. FSU broke the all-time record set in 2003 versus Illinois, which were four fewer games than the 2003 team needed. The team's 58 assists ranks second all-time. FSU amassed 188 points in 2005 which also bested the program record set in 2003. The real measure of how dangerous the offense was can be seen in the average per game numbers. The 2005 Seminoles averaged 0.52 more points per game than the record and they are also finished ahead of the record goal per game mark as well. This team set records for goals in ACC play and multi-goal games in conference matches. The 2005 Seminoles didn't just stack up against past FSU squads. The 2005 team ranked with the best offenses in the nation. FSU finished the year with the nation's 16th-highest scoring offense and they were second to North Carolina in all six team offensive categories among ACC squads.

We Got 20

As quickly as the wins rolled in for the Seminoles the records fell. With a win over No. 23 Clemson in the regular season finale, the 2005 Seminoles set records for the most regular season wins (17), the best regular season winning percentage (.850), the fewest losses (3), the most ACC wins (7) and the highest ACC winning percentage (.778). Florida State's success in 2005 was unprecedented as no Seminole squad had ever won more than 13 regular season games or recorded fewer than five losses. It was the first time since 2000 that FSU set new records for winning percentage in both regular season and ACC play. Florida State's overall winning percentage in 2005 was 145 percentage points higher than the all-time record for winning percentage in a regular season. With the NCAA Tournament win over Cal, the Seminoles reached 20 victories, something that had never been done by any FSU team.

You Go K-Row

Hermann Trophy watch list member Kelly Rowland had another typical Kelly Rowland season in 2005, which is good news for FSU. The junior was once again at the center of a record-setting defense, she once again led all defenders in goals, assists and points and most importantly once again she started every match. Rowland has never missed a start in her three-year career and now owns the longest consecutive streak of starts at 71. She bested the record of former Seminole defender Kristin Boyce. That isn't the only record Rowland has set. With her goal versus Cal, Rowland set another offensive record for a back. Rowland has 12 goals and 15 assists in her career making her the first defender ever at FSU to record double-digit goals and assists and she is all alone in first in all three offensive categories. Her goal bumped her career point total to 39, which was already a school record for a defender. She is also the program's most decorated player.

Rowland has been honored as a member of Soccer America's National Team of the Week a school record eight times in her three-year career. No other FSU player has ever received the award even three times. With those eight weekly honors, Rowland has been named to a national team of the week 10 times in her career making her the only Seminole ever to reach double digits in weekly national awards. No other FSU player even has five career national weekly honors. With a full year still remaining, Rowland could establish a set of records and streaks that may never be broken by another Seminole back.



Multi-Wins By Multi-Goals

Florida State's record run of scoring three goals in an ACC game and winning those games by a multiple goal margin continued in the last conference game of the year as FSU beat NCAA Tournament team Clemson 3-0 in South Carolina. The 2005 team recorded more three-goal games and multi-goal wins in ACC play than any other squad in school history. At one point Florida State had four straight ACC wins in which the team had scored three or more goals, and overall they scored three goals in seven ACC games in 2005. Coming into the season, FSU had recorded three or more goals in an ACC game just nine times in 10 years. What's even more impressive is the margin of victory in ACC matches last season. Seven of FSU's eight conference victories were decided by two or more goals compared to just two of the team's previous 21 victories. With all the goal scoring success and the defense keeping ACC teams to a near-record low goal total, the 2005 Seminoles posted an amazing +10 goal margin in ACC games making the 2005 team just the second in the history of the program to outscore their ACC opponents in a season. The only other team to accomplish that feat was the 2003 team, which outscored its conference competition by four goals. The Seminoles also established a new program-best for ACC goals with 25 and the 10 goals allowed were the second-fewest behind the 2003 team.

Florida State's offense was record setting in 2005 but what was so special about the team was the combination of that offense with one of the top defensive seasons in team history as well. Florida State set the record for the most shutouts and the lowest GAA in program history. The record for fewest goals allowed was set in 2004 at 21. The 2005 squad allowed only 22. The most amazing stat concerning the defense was the fact that they allowed just nine goals to non-conference opponents in 12 games. When you combine that kind of stellar play in the back with this explosive offense it is easy to see why FSU posted the ninth-best winning percentage in America last season.

Florida State scored 43 more goals than they allowed last year, which was easily a new school record. The previous best was a +32 in 2003. In 2004 FSU was only a +8. Only one other team in school history has ever finished a year with a goal differential better than +16.

Stacking Up

Sel Kuralay launched an offensive assault on the FSU record books in her first season in Tallahassee. The forward led the Seminoles in goals (16), points (41), game-winning goals (6), assists (9), shots (94) and shots on goal (39). With her assist versus Cal she ended the year tied with India Trotter for first in that category as well. The Australian Olympian put together the most impressive single offensive season in program history. Only one player ever in FSU soccer history ever led the team in every offensive category (points, goals, assists, game-winning goals, shots and shots on goal) and that was Emma Breland in 2000. In 2001 and 2002 Cindy Schofield led FSU in every category but assists. A case can be made that Kuralay's season is the best among an impressive group. She played fewer games but is second in points and third in goals, she is first in assists and is second in game-winning goals and shots while tying the record for multi-goal games. Even if Kuralay's season just ranks among the best, she is in good company. In 2000 Emma Breland was named a finalist for National Freshman of the Year. In 2001 and 2002, Schofield garnered All-America honors. In 2003, Leah Gallegos became the first NSCAA All-American in school history.
