2006 SEASON IN REVIEW



GOOD TO SEE YOU AGAIN

Not only has FSU been to back-to-back College Cups, but the Seminoles have also advanced to three of the last four national semifinals. Only UCLA has more appearances over the last four seasons than FSU and only three schools have been to more Cups this decade than the Seminoles. UCLA and UNC have both been to five Cups this decade. Portland is in second with four appearances but the Pilots have been to just one Cup since 2003. Florida State is tied with a pair of National Champions, Santa Clara and Notre Dame, for third place with three appearances. FSU and UCLA are also the only two schools to make it to both the 2005 and 2006 College Cups. FSU now joins a prestigious list of only 11 programs that have played in back-to-back College Cups and one of just five schools that have accomplished that feat this decade.

NICE CHOICE

In just two seasons head coach Mark Krikorian is proving himself to be one of the best Division I coaches in the game. In 2006, he became the first DI coach to ever lead his team to back-to-back College Cups in his first two years in the era of the 64-team tournament. Three other coaches have taken their teams to the final four in their first two seasons on the job but Krikorian is the only coach of that group to pull off that feat against a full 64-team field. No coach in America has advanced through eight rounds of NCAA Tournament play in his first two seasons at a school except for Krikorian. Krikorian hasn't just been brilliant in the postseason. For the second straight season his teams have recorded at least 18 wins. The previous single-season record for wins came in 2003 when FSU recorded 17 victories that year. The two highest win totals in FSU history have now both come under Krikorian as his 38 wins are just four short of the wins FSU accumulated in the three seasons before he was hired. It took 92 games from 1995 to 1999 for FSU to notch the 38th win in program history yet Krikorian has done it in just 50 career games.

SCHEDULING CONFLICT

The Seminole soccer team came into the NCAA Tournament having played the third-most games versus NCAA Tournament teams in the nation. FSU played 12 games versus nine teams that were invited to the postseason. After the first three rounds of play, the Seminoles' schedule looked even tougher. Florida State played four games versus the seven teams that were still remaining in the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals. Only North Carolina played more (6) and no other team played more than three. Of the four College Cup participants only Florida State and North Carolina played each other competing twice in 2006. Both games decided by one goal including an overtime victory by UNC in the ACC Championship game.

2006 SEASON IN REVIEW

SUCCESS STORY

The Seminoles have been to seven straight NCAA Tournaments, five round of 16's, three quarterfinals and three College Cups in the last six seasons. Most amazingly, FSU is already in the top 10 for all-time NCAA Tournament wins and the Seminoles rank fifth in the history of the NCAA in wins per trip to the NCAA Tournament. The only schools that have won more games per trip to the NCAA's are North Carolina, Notre Dame, UCLA and Portland. Florida State is one of just two teams with multiple College Cup appearances in the last three years, one of seven teams to make two of the last three quarterfinals, one of just nine schools to advance to the third round four or more times since 2000 and one of just 14 schools to be invited to seven straight NCAA Tournaments. Getting there is one thing but winning once you're in is another. Of the teams that have played 10 or more all-time games, FSU has the fifth-highest winning percentage of any team in NCAA Tournament history. Only the University of North Carolina, Notre Dame, Portland and UCLA have a better success rate in the tournament. FSU is in elite company as only five teams have a winning percentage of .708 or better and three have won National Championships this decade (UNC, Notre Dame and Portland).

GOING OUT ON TOP

For the first-time in school history the Seminoles have a National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) first team All-American, actually two. Both Kelly Rowland and India Trotter were named to the 11-member NSCAA first team All-American squad. Selin Kuralay was named to the second team giving FSU three NSCAA All-Americans, one more than the schools had in its previous 11 years combined.

Trotter was named a second-team NSCAA All-American in 2005, making her the first two-time NSCAA All-American in school history. This is the first NSCAA All-American honor for Rowland and Kuralay. Rowland was named a Soccer Buzz second team All-American in 2004 while Kuralay was named one of 11 Soccer America team MVP's following the 2005 season. The Seminoles were tied with North Carolina and UCLA for the most NSCAA first team All-Americans and the most total All-Americans from one school.

Both Rowland and Trotter were also honored by the NCAA Sunday following the conclusion of the Women's College Cup. The Seminole seniors were named to the NCAA All-Tournament team. It was the first such honor for Rowland and the third in four seasons for Trotter. Trotter is the only FSU player to ever be named an NCAA All-Tournament team selection multiple times in her career. Trotter is the only player in the NCAA to be named to three of the last four NCAA All-Tournament teams.

NOTHING NEW

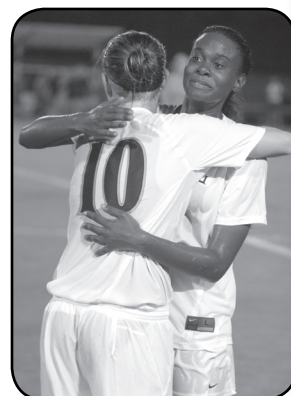


One of the reasons for Florida State's success in the NCAA Tournament has been playing in the ACC. The conference continually proves itself to be the best in the nation and with seven of 11 teams making the NCAA Tournament and two in the College Cup in 2006 nobody can make an argument against the ACC once again. The ACC has placed at least one team in the final four for the 24th time in 25 years. Teams from the Atlantic Coast Conference have excelled in NCAA Tournament play because of the level of competition. The ACC season is basically

like playing in the NCAA Tournament. For example, when FSU took on Notre Dame in the national semifinal, it was the Seminoles 12th straight game versus a 2006 NCAA Tournament team. No other team played seven straight games versus NCAA Tournament teams heading into the NCAA semifinals. Of the four College Cup teams only Florida State and North Carolina played six in a row and every other team had played five or less. Not only did FSU play 12 straight versus NCAA Tournament teams they dominated that competition. In the previous 11 games versus NCAA Tournament teams leading up to the semifinals FSU posted a 7-2-2 record.

THEY ARE SPECIAL

If there was ever any question to how special seniors India Trotter and Kelly Rowland are there are really just two categories you need to look at. What these two players have done when it comes to career starts and NCAA Tournament play is a testament to how much they have done for this program. Trotter and Rowland are first and second all-time at FSU for career starts with a combined 189 games. The only other Seminole to ever start 90 games was Amber Tollefson. No two players in the same class have ever started more games than Trotter and Rowland who bested the record of 169 combined starts set by Tollefson and Kristin Boyce from 2000-2003. The other area where these two have been dominant is in the NCAA Tournament. Trotter and Rowland played in three College Cups. The postseason success FSU has experienced the last four years has a lot to do with these two players. Trotter and Rowland are either first or second in career NCAA Tournament goals, points and game-winning goals. The pair has 29 career NCAA Tournament points, 12 goals and six game-winning goals. What they have combined to do on the biggest stage has never been done by any FSU players. No two Seminoles, regardless of the years they played, have ever combined for more than 20 points, 10 goals or five game-winners in NCAA Tournament play.



LIGHTS OUT DEFENSE

The Florida State offense stole the headlines opening weekend of the 2006 NCAA Tournament outscoring the opposition 9-1. But versus Illinois, the Seminoles continued to do what they did best all season and that was shut people down. FSU blanked Illinois for the team's 14th shutout of the season as the team held the Fighting Illini to just one shot on goal. The Seminoles played stellar defense all season long and the team's record number of shutouts and 0.67 GAA were proof of that. In the 2006 NCAA Tournament, the Seminoles recorded two shutouts in the same NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history. In the team's last 11 NCAA Tournament games dating back to 2004 FSU recorded four shutouts.

IN THE RUNNING

Florida State University placed a soccer player on the watch list for the prestigious MAC Hermann Trophy for the third straight year, but no one has ever got any closer to the award than the pre-season list. That all changed in a big way in 2006 when both Selin Kuralay and India Trotter were named the first semifinalists for the award in program history. FSU was one of four schools to place two players among the 15 semifinalists. Kuralay and Trotter were first and second for Florida State in goals, points and game-winning goals. They combined to score almost half (20) of the Seminoles 41 goals in 2006 and they had eight of the 16 game-winners scored by FSU players. In the last two seasons, Trotter and Kuralay combined for 50 goals and 122 points in a span of 50 games.

DOWN TO 14

FSU's invitation to the 2006 NCAA Tournament was historic for the program. Not only was it the seventh consecutive invitation for FSU but it also meant FSU has played in the NCAA Tournament seven times in 12 years. After going 0 for 5 in the first five years of program history, for the Seminoles to be making the tournament at a 58% clip in program history is pretty amazing. The Seminoles are one of just 14 schools out of 301 playing Division I soccer that have gone to seven consecutive NCAA Tournaments. Of those 14 schools, five are from the ACC. Considering the fact 29 of the 64 teams from the 2005 tournament didn't even make it back in 2006(45%), what FSU has done over seven straight years is amazing. Round of 16 teams Yale, Arizona and Pepperdine are among the most notable schools that did not qualify in 2006. Just one team (Nebraska) missed the tournament for the first time in the last seven years. Of the 14 teams that have been to seven straight NCAA Tournaments eight were still playing in the NCAA Quarterfinals.

GOOD TO BE ALL-ACC

On the eve of the 2006 ACC Women's Soccer Tournament in Cary, N.C., the second-place FSU soccer team got some good news as the Seminoles were honored with five players on the All-Conference team as voted on by the league's head coaches. Three Seminoles were named to the All-ACC first team, tying the school record set in 2005. Four Seminoles were named either first or second team, which also tied a program-best set in 2004. Florida State led all ACC schools in first team selections and was second to only conference champion North Carolina in overall All-ACC honorees. In the last three seasons no team has more first team All-ACC selections than Florida State. The Seminoles lead the ACC with eight first team members since 2003 followed closely by North Carolina at seven. UNC has had 13 players make first or second team over that stretch followed by Florida State's 11. The Seminoles are also second to only North Carolina when it comes to All-ACC freshmen selections all-time as the Seminoles now have 12 compared to UNC's 15.

40-FIED

Ali Mims passed a pretty big milestone in Winston-Salem, N.C. when FSU knocked off No. 9 Wake Forest. The senior keeper picked up her 40th career victory, becoming the only Seminole keeper to ever reach that mark. What is even more amazing is that earlier in 2006 Mims became the only FSU keeper to ever win 30 games in her career. She finished her career 20 victories ahead of her nearest competitor when it comes to wins by a goalkeeper. In the four seasons in which Ali has been eligible to play, she accounted for 61% of the 74 wins amassed by the Seminoles during that stretch. What makes that stat even more impressive is that in 2004 she may have been eligible but did not play because she was not fully recovered from a leg injury and appeared in just three games. In those three other seasons, she accounted for 45 of FSU's 62 victories. Mims not only picked up career win number 40 but she also became the first Seminole keeper to surpass 5,000 minutes in net. She leaves FSU with 48 career wins and 20 career shutouts, which is almost an unimaginable mark for an FSU keeper since the previous career highs were 26 wins and 13 shutouts.





2006 SEASON IN REVIEW

STATE-ING OUR CASE

Winning inside the state of Florida has been a huge priority for Florida State this decade and the results show. The Seminoles are 40-4-0 versus Florida schools since 2000. That translates to a winning percentage of .909 against teams from the Sunshine State over the last eight seasons. The Seminoles are currently on an 11-game win streak versus in-state foes. Florida State's success in state since 2000 has been remarkable especially when you compare FSU's 40-4 record to Florida's 11-7 record over the same time frame. Of those seven losses UF has suffered to in-state foes, five have come at the hands of the Seminoles. FSU has won 16 of its last 17 matches against Sunshine State opponents. Of the last 22 games played versus Florida schools, the Seminoles have posted a 20-2 record with 15 of those 20 wins coming via shutouts. The best record FSU ever posted against Florida schools was 8-0 in 2000. In 2002 the Tribe went 5-0 but an argument can be made that 2003 was the best season ever as far as in-state competition goes. Although FSU wasn't undefeated (6-1), they averaged over 3.5 goals per game and the win in Gainesville over Florida came in the Elite Eight sending FSU to the College Cup. After defeating Jacksonville in the NCAA Tournament, the Seminoles finished the 2006 season 7-0 against Florida schools. It marked the fourth time in the last seven years FSU has run the table versus in-state opponents.

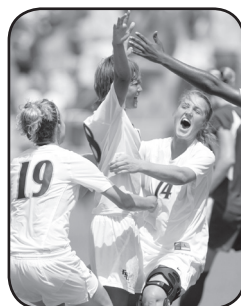
OH WHAT A NIGHT

The Seminoles' victory over Wake Forest in Winston-Salem was a pretty special one. First of all it was the first win for FSU in Winston-Salem versus the Deacons in program history and just the fourth regular season win for FSU in the state of North Carolina. In five previous games versus Wake at Spry Stadium, the Seminoles were just 0-4-1. Second, it was just the sixth comeback in program history from 2-1 down and just the third ever when trailing 2-1 versus an ACC opponent. Third, the victory marked the 200th win of Mark Krikorian's collegiate coaching career. Fourth, the game-winning goal was scored by Libby Gianeskis who had never scored a game-winner in her three year career but also had never scored a goal either.

THE CAPITAL OF SOCCER IN FLORIDA

Florida State's 1-0 win over Florida was pretty amazing for a few reasons but mostly due to the unprecedented turnout of the Tallahassee community. The Seminoles downed their rivals in front of a record crowd of 4,582, shattering the previous record of 1,912 by 2,670. The crowd was over 3,000 above the listed capacity of the Seminole Soccer Complex as fans packed every inch of open space on the hills, in the stands, behind the street side goal and all along the floors of the parking garage adjacent to the field. The crowd wasn't just impressive for Florida State. It was the second-largest crowd to ever watch an FSU/UF game and the 21st-largest regular season crowd in the history of NCAA women's soccer. The number of fans that came to the UF game was staggering when you compare it to some other crowd statistics at FSU. The 4,582 fans that came to that one game were more than the people who showed up to watch the Seminoles in four entire seasons. In 1995, 1997, 1999 and 2001, FSU drew fewer than 4,582 fans for the entire home campaign. The 17,399 fans that came to watch 13 FSU home games in 2006 represent the largest single season home attendance in school history. The Seminoles played in front of over 1,000 fans in eight of 13 home games in 2006. Florida State drew four of the five largest crowds in school history including the largest daytime crowd ever (vs. Virginia Tech - 1,895) and the largest NCAA Tournament crowd ever (vs. Clemson - 1,754). FSU set a school record by drawing five crowds of more than 1,300 fans in one season. FSU obliterated the single season record for per game attendance as well as 500 more fans per game came out in 2006 than any previous season.

BREAK THAT STREAK



Florida State's opening day win over Portland was a milestone win for the program. FSU had defeated a defending Nation Champion before (North Carolina in 2000) but this was the Seminoles' first ever win over a team ranked No. 1. The win ended Portland's 26-match unbeaten streak while marking FSU's first win over a West Coast Conference power as the Seminoles were 0-2 versus the Pilots and Santa Clara coming in. Not only did FSU beat Portland but they did it in a manner that is pretty rare. FSU became just the third team in the last 41 matches prior to the game to score two goals against Portland. The Seminoles also had more shots versus the Pilots (25) than any other team had against Portland in the last five years. FSU also limited Portland to the fewest shots (5) as a team since October 24, 2004.

WE STILL RANK

After four glorious weeks at No. 1, the Seminoles reign atop the Soccer America poll came to an end after a 2-1 loss to North Carolina. Florida State was still ranked as high as No. 3 before their road split at Wake and Duke. The No. 1 ranking from Soccer America was the first in school history. Florida State jumped three spots to No. 1 in the poll after all three of the top teams in the preseason rankings suffered a loss and FSU opened the year with an upset of defending National Champion Portland. Florida State's previous all-time highest ranking was third and that came in four different polls. The highest ranking the team had ever received from Soccer America was No. 3 and that came September 6, 2004. FSU once again finished a season in the top five of the final polls. This is the third time in the last four years that the Seminoles finished a season as a top five team.
