



2001 SEASON REVIEW

The 2001 softball season saw the Seminoles return to their rightful place amongst the nation's softball elite. Not only did FSU have one of the most successful regular seasons in the history of the program but Florida State hosted an NCAA Regional and was tabbed as one of only eight No. 1 seeds in the nation. FSU joined Arizona, UCLA, LSU, Alabama, Oklahoma, Stanford and Notre Dame as the top seed in their respective region.



The Seminoles had a fantastic run in the Tallahassee Regional playing in front of large, enthusiastic crowds and reaching the Regional Championship by eliminating state rivals Florida and Florida Atlantic. FSU came into the final day of play needing to defeat 6th-ranked Cal twice to earn a trip to the Women's College World Series. After defeating the Bears 2-1 in the early game, FSU took a one-run lead on Cal in the 10th inning of the championship. The Seminoles had the Bears down to their last strike before Cal was able to get a game-winning two-run double to advance to the WCWS.

SIMPLY THE BEST

The 2001 Florida State pitching staff accomplished something that had never been done in the history of Seminole softball. Jen White-Stokes, Leslie Malerich and Jessica van der Linden combined for the lowest ERA in D1 softball in 2001 earning the NCAA's ERA title for FSU. The staff's 0.71 ERA was .06 better than National Champion Arizona's mark and well ahead of national powers UCLA, LSU, Notre Dame and Cal. The Seminole pitching staff was in the nation's top five for most of the season but their 0.80 ERA in the Tallahassee Regional against the nation's top competition pushed them to the top of the pack.

IN GOOD COMPANY

Florida State was one of only four teams to finish the 2001 season in the top 10 in pitching (No. 1), winning percentage (No. 7) and batting (No. 10). The Seminoles were joined by National Champion Arizona, UCLA and Notre Dame in this elite group. Florida State finished 2001 with a 0.71 ERA, .829 winning percentage and a .297 batting average.



STRIKE ONE

After 23 years of accomplishments on the softball field and in the classroom, FSU softball coach Dr. JoAnne Graf added another first to her list when she threw out the first pitch as the Tampa Bay Devil Rays took on the Florida Marlins at Tropicana Field. Coach Graf took part in 'FSU Day' festivities at the ballpark and fired a strike with her ceremonial pitch.



CLEAN SWEEP

For the first time since joining the ACC in 1992, Florida State swept all three major awards at the conference banquet. Head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf won Coach of the Year, junior pitcher Leslie Malerich was named Player of the Year and pitcher/outfielder Jessica van der Linden was named Rookie of the Year. FSU is the first school to ever sweep all three ACC awards and the Seminoles have won more ACC awards than any other school (11 total).

WHAT A STRETCH

The Seminoles marched into the 2001 postseason by going 13-1 to close out the season but the team's 6-0 run from August 18 to August 28 was one of the best spans ever for the team. Besides the 6-0 record, FSU recorded its first-ever sweep of the Gators, head coach JoAnne Graf notched win 1,100 on Florida's home field, the Seminoles locked up their 14th NCAA Tournament bid with a sweep of ACC-rival Virginia and the team scored 18 runs in 12 innings against an ECU team that came into Tallahassee with a 41-18 record. FSU outscored Florida, East Carolina and Virginia 44-8 in the six games while batting .382 as a team, recording 49 hits, 10 doubles, two triples and three home runs and holding their three opponents to a .132 batting average, 14 hits, one double and no home runs. The Seminoles hit .426 with runners in scoring position and .524 with a runner on third base and less than two outs. Half of FSU's 30 RBIs came with two outs. The Seminoles were deadly in the middle innings (third, fourth and fifth) where they outscored their six opponents 30-4 with a majority of the damage coming during the fourth inning (20-0).



RECORD SETTER

All-American Serita Brooks will always be remembered as one of FSU's best but her performance on the bases during the 2001 season has put her in the NCAA record books. Serita set three NCAA records in 2001. She now holds the record for the most steals in an NCAA postseason game when she swiped five bases against Bethune-Cookman. That also put her in the record books for the third-most steals in a game in NCAA history. Probably the most impressive record of all was her 54 consecutive stolen bases dating back to the 2000 season, which is third in NCAA softball history.



WHAT A GROUP

Needless to say that head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf was honored by her selection as the 2001 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year but she was especially proud when her staff was named NFCA Southeast Region Coaching Staff of the Year. "This is a great honor for our staff. It think it is so wonderful that the NFCA recognizes the whole staff because it would be impossible to experience the kind of success we've had at FSU without the help of some great assistant coaches. Louie (Berndt) and Heather (Compton) do a fantastic job and are a big reason we advanced as far as we did in 2001."



MORE-IER

Monique Marier came to Florida State after leading the nation in home runs in 1999 at the Junior College level and being named a first-team NJCAA All-American. However, Division I softball is a whole different animal and many wondered if she could successfully make the leap. After going two for four with four RBIs on a double and a three-run homer against Georgia Southern to open the season, Marier batted .385 with a double and a triple and she led the Seminoles with a slugging pct. of .615 in the first tournament of the year.

The hot start never seemed to end as the junior went on to finish her first year at FSU with a .311 batting average, 14 doubles, three triples, six homeruns, 41 RBIs and a slugging percentage of .543. She led the team in doubles, home runs, RBIs and slugging percentage and was second on the squad with three triples and 89 total bases. Marier was also perfect in 2001 posting a 1.000 fielding percentage.

'K'NOLES

In the Tomahawk Bash, the Seminole pitching staff struck out 31% of the batters they faced. The staff combined for 38 strikeouts with 11 of those being "struck out looking". Leslie Malerich lead the way with 15 K's in 14 innings. Jen White-Stokes who struck out 12 in 13 innings and Jessica van der Linden who K'ed 11 batters in 11 innings followed her. The Noles averaged three more K's per game than their Tomahawk Bash opponents.



TOURNEY MVP

Although no official tournament MVP was named for the Tomahawk Bash, it wouldn't be hard to argue that Brandi Stuart deserved the title. Stuart had three multi-hit games in the Bash and of her eight hits, five came with runners on base. She singled and scored the winning run against FIU in the championship game and she hit .500 for the tournament going 8-for-16. She recorded the game-winning RBI against FAMU in the tournament opener and Stuart registered a fielding percentage of 1.000 with 10 put outs and nine assists. She led FSU in batting average, on base percentage, hits and RBIs for the weekend.





2001 SEASON REVIEW

TOURNEY MVP II

The Seminoles opened up the 2001 campaign by playing in four tournaments in the first five weekends and they took home all four tournament titles. When you get to the championship game, you are usually facing the best team in the field and the Seminoles came to play in every one of those games. Florida State hit .267 as a team in those four championships against the ace of their opponent's staff and they showed that they knew how to win the close game as they outscored their opponents by just five runs (11-6).

The Seminole pitching staff was one of the main reasons for FSU's success in those championship games, Leslie Malerich and Jen White-Stokes combined for an ERA of 1.00, with four complete games and 27 strikeouts. Malerich, the reigning ACC Player of the Year, went 3-0 with a 1.33 ERA in 21 innings of work. She recorded 22 strikeouts and held opposing batters to just .120 at the plate. White-Stokes, a Louisville Slugger All-Region first team selection, was 1-0 in championship action. She shutout FAU while striking out five batters and walking none in a three hit complete game win.

The Seminoles also had some clutch hits in tournament title games last season. Brandi Stuart hit .583, Jessica van der Linden hit .455 and Kimmy Carter hit .400 in championship game action. Van der Linden led the Seminoles in championship game RBIs with four and Stuart had a game-winning, bottom of the seventh inning homerun to beat Boston College and she led the team with a .917 slugging percentage.

CLUTCH HITTING

If you are looking for one reason why FSU got off to a 35-6 start in 2001, look at the way FSU hit in clutch situations. The Seminoles batted .272 with the bases empty but were batting .333 with the bases loaded, .341 with runners in scoring position, .345 with runners on and an amazing .509 with a runner on third and less than two outs. The Seminoles were advancing runners successfully 52.8% of the time and they batted .317 with two outs. Brandi Stuart and Monique Marier came up with more big hits than anyone on the team. The duo hit .405 with runners in scoring position, .459 with runners on base, .714 with the bases loaded, .867 with a runner on third and less than two outs and advanced runners successfully 58.5% of the time.



SENIOR LEADERS

Despite the fact the FSU was unable to capture its seventh straight conference title at the ACC Tournament in Raleigh, NC, don't blame seniors Natalie Bennett, Serita Brooks and Staci Brandon. All three players raised their game to a season high level. Bennett was hitting .267 on the season with no homeruns, 18 RBI and a .342 slugging percentage. At the ACC Tournament, she led the team in hitting (.462), doubles (2) and slugging (.846). She also hit her first homerun of the season. Brooks hit 84 percentage points higher (.375) than her season average (.291) and slugged 112 percentage points higher (.500) than her season average (.388). Brandon hit .300 with a double, two RBIs, a .400 slugging percentage and a 1.000 fielding percentage after fielding just .903 for the season.



THAT'S A FIRST

In 23 seasons of softball, the Seminoles have played 141 different teams, yet in 2001 FSU faced nine teams they had never played before. Two of those nine came during a road trip through Alabama. FSU had never faced the University of Alabama-Birmingham or Jacksonville State who they saw in back-to-back doubleheaders last season. Florida State went 13-1 against its nine first-time opponents.

WHITE HOT

Jen White-Stokes, FSU's MVP in 2001, had an unbelievable 2001 campaign and probably put together one of the most dominating months in FSU history last April. White-Stokes was named an NFCA Outstanding Performer, ACC Pitcher of the Week twice, ACC Player of the Week twice, SASA Pitcher of the Week twice and SASA Player of the Week. She threw just the second perfect game in Seminole Softball Complex history in a SASA game versus East Carolina and she also stood alone when you looked at the nation's top hitting pitchers. White-Stokes had the nation's eighth-best ERA (0.55) and no player with a top eight ERA had a higher batting average than her .362. For the month, she went 7-1, posted a 1.19 ERA, pitched six complete games in her seven starts, recorded three shutouts, struck out 23 batters and held opponents to a .183 batting average. White-Stokes was just as good at the plate over the same stretch. Over the 19 games, she hit .386, scored 13 runs, knocked in 14 RBIs, slugged .491 and had an on base percentage of .426. Now that's impressive.



1ST VS. 2ND

Despite the fact that the Seminoles posted almost identical first half (20-3) and second half records (19-4) prior to entering postseason play, there were quite a few differences when you took a closer look at the stats individually and collectively. NOBODY turned her season around more than Jen White-Stokes. White-Stokes started the season with a 5-2 record and a 0.73 ERA while hitting .293 at the plate with three RBI. While those numbers are very respectable, they are nothing compared to what White-Stokes did over the last 23 games. She raised her average to .375 (82 percentage points), knocked in 16 RBIs and had an on-base percentage of .403 (up from .326). What White-Stokes did on the mound was even more impressive. Over the last 23 games of the regular season, she went 9-0 with an amazing 0.22 ERA in 12 appearances. White-Stokes doubled her shutouts (three in the first half versus six in the second half) and allowed just two earned runs versus six in the first half.

Robyn Gauger was also a force during the second half of 2001. The Seminole first baseman raised her average 98 percentage points (from .235 to .333) and hit two triples and two homers (she didn't have a triple or homer over the first half of the season) during the last 23 games. In limited action, catcher Elisa Velasco made the biggest jump of any Seminole. Over the first 23 games of the season, Velasco hit .080 in 25 at bats. In the last 23 games (19 at bats), Velasco batted .526 and her second half average was 446 percentage points higher than her first half average. She had two doubles compared to none in the first half, was slugging .632 compared to .080 and she raised her on base percentage from .115 to .591. Velasco also has five RBIs in the second half compared to just one to start the year.

As a team, the Seminoles hit 39 percentage points higher in the second half (.319 versus .280), scored 23 more runs, hit twice as many home runs (8 versus 4), had 16 more RBIs (99 compared to 83) and had a slugging percentage that was 67 percentage points higher than that of the first half of the season (.367 compared to .434). The Seminoles also raised their on base percentage from .354 to .374 and went from stealing 29 bases on 32 attempts to stealing 40 bases on 41 attempts.
