

THIS IS FSU SOFTBALL



Six trips to the Women's College World Series, 16 NCAA Tournaments, 22 All-Americans, nine conference titles in 12 years and one of the nations' premiere softball facilities and that's just scratching the surface of what it means to play softball at Florida State. From the time FSU won its first national championship in 1981, the nation's best players have come to play for legendary head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf and wear Garnet and Gold. For over two decades those players have made FSU one of the most dominant softball programs in the history of collegiate softball.

Only four teams in the history of the NCAA have been to more WCWS than Florida State and no school east of Arizona has been to more NCAA Tournaments than the Seminoles. Florida State's success on the field is remarkable. The Tribe has never endured a losing season in coach Graf's 25 years as they have won 77% of the 1575 games they have played. Only UCLA has amassed more program wins than Florida State's 995 since 1984 and the Seminoles have a winning record against over 80% of the 165 opponents they have faced in the program's illustrious 25-year history. Nothing has changed recently either as over the last 10 seasons, FSU has amassed 505 wins or an average of more than 50 victories a season.

Winning is a big part of what it means to be a Seminole and a reason players come to Tallahassee but it is so much more. Getting an opportunity to play for one of the sport's coaching greats is another big draw. After celebrating her 25th anniversary at Florida State in 2003, coach Graf spent the off-season preparing for the biggest honor of her professional career. Just this past December, the FSU graduate was inducted into the National Fastpitch Coaches' Association (NFCA) Hall of Fame the year after she broke the NFCA record for the most wins ever by a softball coach (1214).

Graf is now just five wins away from becoming just the second coach in NCAA Division I history to ever record 1,000 fastpitch victories and just the third coach ever in college softball to reach that plateau. Graf ranks in the top four of five of the NCAA's six all-time coaching categories. Only one active coach in Division I softball history has more than 900 wins and has won a higher percentage of his/her games than has coach Graf.

As dominant as Florida State has been over the past two decades its unprecedented success is even more pronounced when you look at what the squad has done in its 12 years of Atlantic Coast Conference play. The Seminoles have been

crowned ACC champions nine times and have produced nine ACC Tournament MVP's. Graf has been named the conference's top coach on five occasions and a Seminole has taken home the conference's MVP trophy five times as well. Florida State is 73-16 all-time in ACC play winning a gaudy 82% of its conference games and the Tribe has finished atop the ACC regular season standings 10 times in 12 years. If you add up all the NCAA Tournament appearances by the four other ACC schools and then multiplied them by five, the entire ACC still would not have been to the NCAA Tournament as many times as FSU. Florida State's ACC dominance was never more evident than when the Seminoles placed an astounding 24 players out of 53 on the ACC's 50th anniversary softball team.



One of the great joys of playing softball at FSU is stepping on the diamond at the state-of-the-art Seminole Softball Complex, which is one of the nation's top facilities. The softball specific stadium includes ticket and concession buildings, stadium seating and a spacious press box, including press seating, radio/television booths and high-speed Internet access. The two-level Mary Ann Stiles & Barry Smith Team Building houses the coaches' offices which overlook the softball field, a reception area, a combined workroom, large team and coach's locker rooms, visiting team locker rooms and training and equipment rooms.

Playing for one of the nation's top programs under the guidance of the country's premiere softball coach, graduating from a prestigious university and playing on a 'field of dreams' are all a part of the package that is Florida State softball.

Field of Dreams

Florida State University is home to one of the premiere softball complexes in the nation. The Seminole Softball Complex is state-of-the art in every facet and provides Florida State softball players with an all-inclusive complex that includes locker rooms, meeting rooms and one of the best playing surfaces anywhere in the country. The Seminole Softball Complex has hosted back-to-back NCAA Regionals in 2001 and 2002 and the stadium will play host to its fifth ACC Championship this year. Florida State has posted 127 wins in its five years at the complex. Even more impressive, FSU has gone 74-12 at the complex the last three years for an amazing .860 winning percentage. The complex was also recently featured in Athletic Business Magazine's 2002 Architectural Showcase.

Florida State's dream of a new, state-of-the-art softball complex became reality when ground was broken in a ceremony in the spring of 1998. Construction workers worked continuously to complete the facility, which also houses the Seminole soccer stadium. The result was the creation of one of the nation's premier collegiate softball and soccer facilities.

The complex, which was completed in the spring of 1999, includes ticket and concessions buildings and spacious press boxes, including press seating and radio/television booths. The two-level Mary Ann Stiles & Barry Smith Team Building features a reception area, softball and soccer coaches offices, which overlook their respective stadiums, a combined workroom, large team and coaches locker rooms and training and equipment rooms.

The Florida State Soccer/Softball Complex was "officially" opened with a ribbon-cutting ceremony Saturday, April 17th. The event, which was held in conjunction with Florida State's 30th Anniversary of Women's Intercollegiate Athletics Spring Celebration, drew approximately 150 spectators, including University dignitaries and Athletics Department personnel. Several former Florida State student-athletes and staff also returned for the monumental event.

The ceremony began with the ribbon-cutting at the front gates of the complex. FSU President Sandy D'Alemberte, Director of Athletics Dave Hart, Softball Head Coach Dr. JoAnne Graf and Soccer Head Coach Patrick Baker, and team representatives did the honors. Among the speakers in the program were D'Alemberte, Hart, Associate Athletics Director Kim Record and Dianne Montgomery, Dean of the School of Social Work, who serves as Chair of the Title IX Committee and is a member of the FSU Athletics Board. Dr. Judith Blucker, FSU's first softball coach and former Vice President at Florida International University, also addressed the crowd.

Following a tour of the facility and a barbeque, the Seminoles entertained guests on the field with a sweep of Florida International.

The Seminole Softball/Soccer Complex is located in between the Dick Howser Baseball Stadium and the Mike Long Track on Chieftan Way. The facility can be accessed from both Chieftan Way and Stadium Drive.







ACC DOMINANCE

A big part of coach Graf's legacy is the program's dominance in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Starting with their first championship in 1992, Florida State has won twice as many ACC titles (9) as the rest of the conference combined and the Seminoles have won the regular season championship ten times in 12 years. No other ACC program has ever gone through their regular season conference schedule undefeated yet FSU has done it four times. The Tribe is the only ACC school to ever go to the Women's College World Series and they have done that on six occasions. FSU's 16 All-Americans are more than the rest of the ACC combined and the Seminoles have won 28 more ACC games than their nearest competitor.

The first endowed position scholarship for women's athletics at FSU was named in honor of Betty Palmer and fully-funded by Dr. Fran Cannon. The scholarship is held by the Seminoles starting shortstop and honors a woman who preached values as well as skills and shaped the lives of many young women throughout her life as a faculty member at FSU and a recreation supervisor.

Dr. JoAnne Graf

The architect of one of the most successful Division I softball programs in collegiate sports and the first Division I coach to reach the 1,000 win plateau, this fully-endowed scholarship honors FSU head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf, Coach Graf has achieved an unprecedented level of success throughout her 22 seasons at the helm of the Seminole softball program. Not only has she won two slow pitch National Championships but her teams have appeared in six College World Series, made 15 NCAA Regional appearances and won eight ACC titles. This endowment will ensure Coach Graf's winning legacy for years to come. Funds are continuing to be raised for this scholarship.

Judy Spainhour

This fully-endowed scholarship is funded by Professors Charles and Joan Haworth in honor of Judy Spainhour. The gift is made in appreciation of Judy's spirit and support of FSU's women's softball. The Haworths are recognizing Judy for her special sense of humor and warmth and her continued support of FSU athletics.

Carla Bingham

The fourth endowed scholarship for Seminole softball is in honor of one of our own. Carla Bingham was a two-time All-American and played third base for FSU in 1982 and 1983. She helped FSU to a 102-21 record over those two seasons and was a member of FSU's 1982 AIAW National Championship team. In 1997, Carla lost her battle with breast cancer and this scholarship assures her memory will live forever. This scholarship is continuing to be funded.



Kari Keith

Kari Keith was an amazing athlete who came to Florida State on a softball scholarship in 1986 but went on to become a two-sport star on the track and the softball diamond. Keith, from Ft. Lauderdale, FL. played softball for all four years and was named to the Lady Seminole Invitational All-Tournament Team in 1987 and 1988. Although she had never picked up a javelin in her life, Keith broke the school record and qualified for the NCAA championships in just her second meet ever. She was in training for the 1992 Olympic games when she lost her life in a two-car accident in Tallahassee. This endowed scholarship pays tribute to one of FSU's best and brightest.

Robert Graf, Jr.

This softball scholarship was created and endowed to ensure the tradition of excellence in women's athletics at Florida State University and to always remember Bobby Graf, brother of softball coach JoAnne Graf, who will live on forever in our hearts. This scholarship has been funded by family friend Donald Hinkle.
