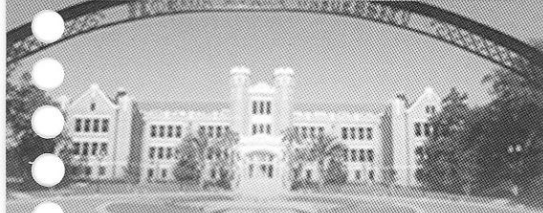
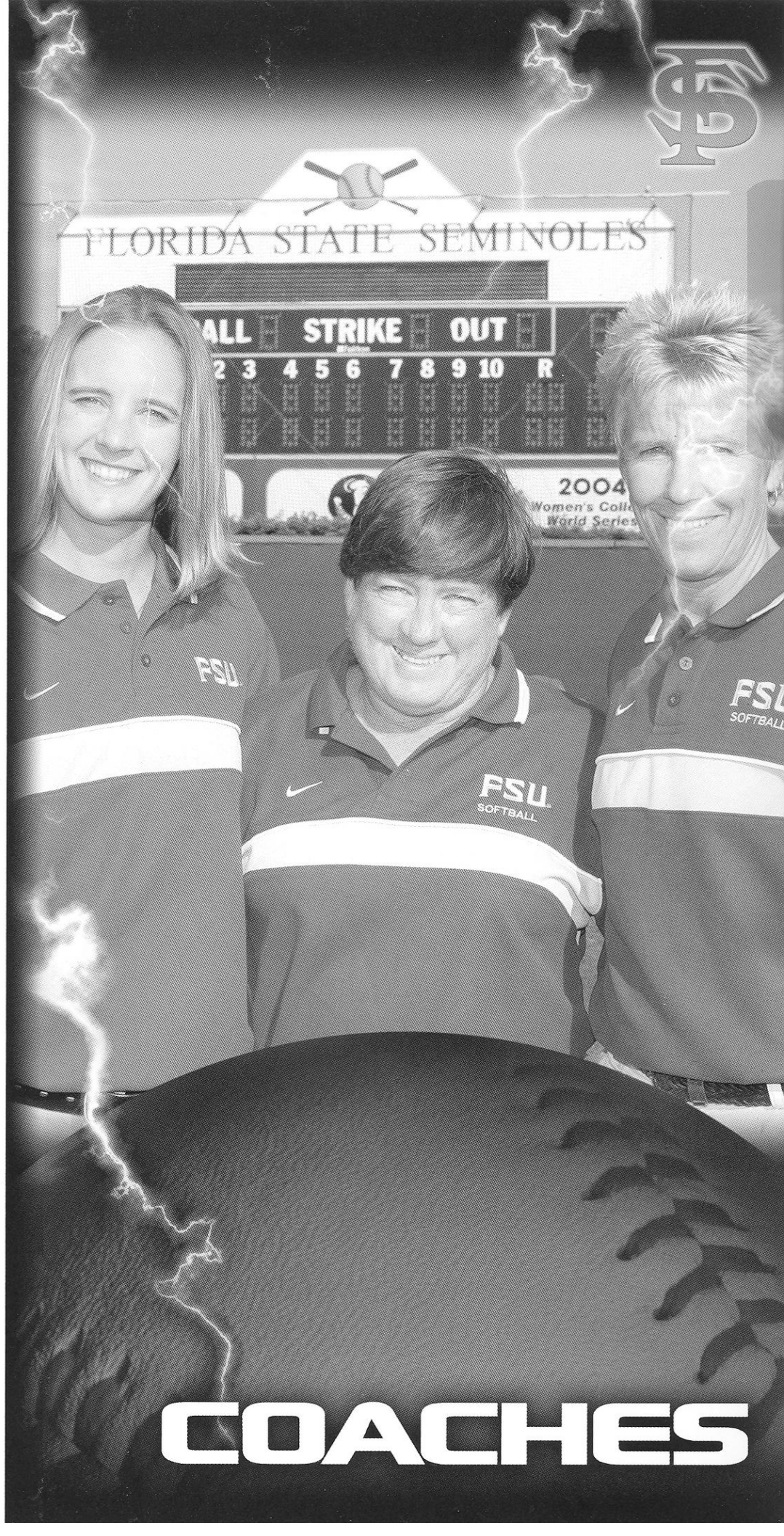

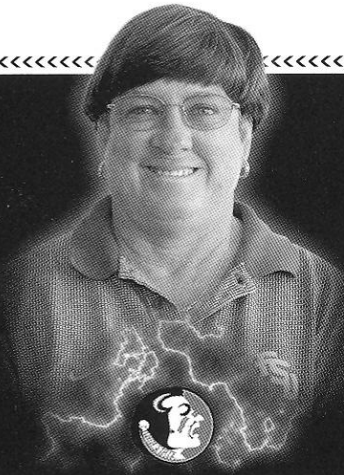

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

TWO-TIME AIAW NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Before FSU made the switch to fast pitch softball, JoAnne Graf's squads dominated the slow pitch game as evidenced by back-to-back National Titles in 1981 and 1982. Not only did



Graf's teams win National Titles, but they went to the national tournament three straight seasons, won five consecutive state titles and saw five players earn All-American honors.

FAST PITCH WIN NUMBER 1,000

Head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf's 1000th NCAA win didn't come easy on Feb. 11, 2004. A scrappy Mercer Bear team fought FSU all the way but a three run sixth inning broke the game open for the Seminoles as Graf joined one of the most exclusive clubs in NCAA softball with the 5-1 win. The long-time Seminole coach picked up her 1000th fast pitch victory becoming just the third Division I coach ever to win 1,000 games and only the fourth in NCAA history at any level to reach that plateau. No NCAA coach with 1000 wins has a better winning percentage than the FSU coach. "Florida State is my alma mater and it is a special place for me," she said moments after the victory. "It is kind of neat that this is the only place I have ever coached and all 1000 wins came here."



It seems that every single season Hall of Fame coach Dr. JoAnne Graf patrols the third base line for FSU, another record falls and 2004 was no different. One of the most prolific coaches all-time in collegiate softball, Graf kicked down another barrier last year when she recorded her 1,000th NCAA win against Mercer. The victory was special because it stands a part from the two slow pitch national titles Graf won in her first five years at Florida State. She is only the second Division I coach to ever reach that milestone and just the third coach overall in NCAA history to record 1,000 victories. Her accomplishment was recognized by Sports Illustrated as Graf appeared in the "Faces In The Crowd" section. Reaching that milestone erased any doubts that Graf is the greatest DI softball coach in the history of the game. No other coach with 1000 wins in any division has a higher winning percentage than Graf and no coach has more NFCA wins (slow pitch and fastpitch combined) than Graf's 1276, almost 100 more than her next competitor.

Graf enters her 27th season at the helm of the Florida State softball program in 2005. The legendary coach is fresh off leading her team to its 26th straight winning season, seventh Women's College World Series appearance, and 17th NCAA Tournament berth in 2004. On top of having her second national player of the year and first Honda Award winner for softball last season, Graf had three players named National Fastpitch Coaches' Association All-Americans for the second straight year. After the Tribe's 62-12 mark in 2004, Graf now has a lifetime winning percentage of .777 and .770 in fastpitch competition alone.

Her 2004 squad shaped up to be one of her best ever and is a testament to how good of a coach Graf is. Last year's squad lost two-time All-America Brandi Stuart and opened the year with a freshman at second, a freshman in right field and a first-time starter in center field. Despite the squad's youth, Graf led the team to its highest-ever in-season ranking at No. 2 in the nation and even had her squad receive a first place poll vote for the first time ever as well. The 2004 team was the runner-up at the prestigious NFCA Leadoff Classic and also advanced to the semifinals of the Kia Klassic. Her Seminoles recorded 13 wins over ranked

opponents, advanced to the Women's College World Series and they are just the sixth Graf-led squad to ever reach the 50-win plateau.

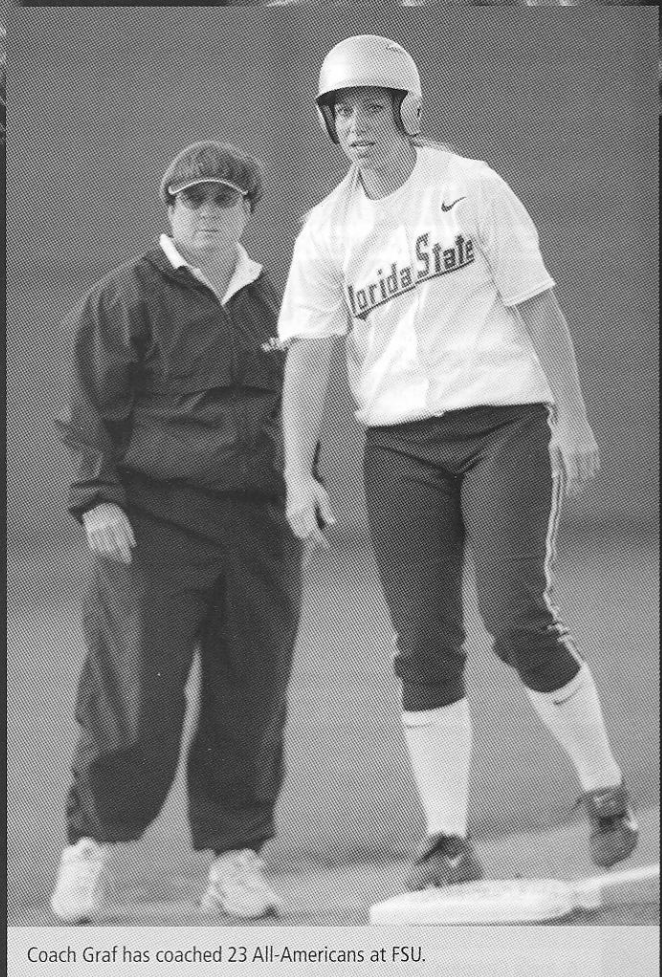


Graf's Seminoles once again proved to be the class of an ever-improving Atlantic Coast Conference as she led the Seminoles to a 9-1 record and the team's 11th regular season title in 13 years. The successful ACC campaign resulted in Graf's sixth ACC Coach of the Year title as she has now captured almost half of the conference's top coaching awards that have been handed out. Graf is the only ACC coach to ever win the award in consecutive years and she has now done that twice in her career. The Seminole boss has taken home the coach of the year trophy three times in the last four years and the only other coach in ACC history to even win the award on more than one occasion is North Carolina's Donna Papa.

In 21 years of fastpitch competition at FSU Graf has never had a losing season and her teams have advanced to 17 NCAA Tournaments (including 2004) despite the fact that many came as at-large bids due to no conference affiliations. She currently ranks in the top four of every Division I ranking for coaches. Of the three NCAA coaches that have reached the 1,000 win mark; none has a winning percentage close to Coach Graf's.

Graf enters her 27th season at the helm of the Florida State softball program in 2005. The legendary coach is fresh off leading her team to its 26th straight winning season, seventh Women's College World Series appearance, and 17th NCAA Tournament berth in 2004. Graf has built the Florida State softball program into one of the nation's elite. She has had a winning season every year of her career, only four schools in NCAA history have gone to more World Series than Graf's Seminoles and only five universities have been able to surpass Graf's mark of 17 NCAA Regional appearances. Her Seminoles are in the top 10 for all-time NCAA Regional wins and consecutive NCAA Regional appearances. Florida State is also in the top four for consecutive trips to the Women's College World Series.

Coach Graf is also one of just three coaches to lead a team to the College World Series in three straight decades.

On top of all of those records, Graf has coached 23 All-Americans including her sixth first team NFCA All-American last season.

As dominant as Graf has been on the national stage, her success in the ACC is even more impressive. In 13 years of Atlantic Coast Conference play, Graf has guided her team to 10 conference titles while no other ACC school has won more than one. Her Seminoles are the only ACC school to go to the College World Series and she has led FSU to more than three times as many NCAA Regionals as the whole conference combined. Florida State has amassed 33 more ACC wins than any other conference school and since joining the ACC the Seminoles have more All-American selections than the rest of the conference combined. Six of the ACC's 12 players of the year are Seminoles and 10 of 12 ACC Tournament MVPs also wore Garnet & Gold. The Tribe's 62 All-ACC selections are double that of any other school. The Tribe's conference dominance under Graf was never illustrated more clearly as when 23 Seminoles were named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary softball team. Florida State players comprised 43 percent of the 53-player roster.

Coach Graf earned her sixth ACC Coach of the Year title in 2004 and six players earned All-ACC honors.

After setting the NFCA's all-time wins record in 2002 with 1,125 victories, Graf was inducted into the organization's Hall of Fame in the fall of 2003. She entered the 2003 season coming off one of her most successful years at the helm of the FSU softball program as her Seminoles finished the season ranked fourth in the nation after they advanced to the semifinals of the Women's College World Series, where they recorded an opening round upset over No. 1 UCLA.

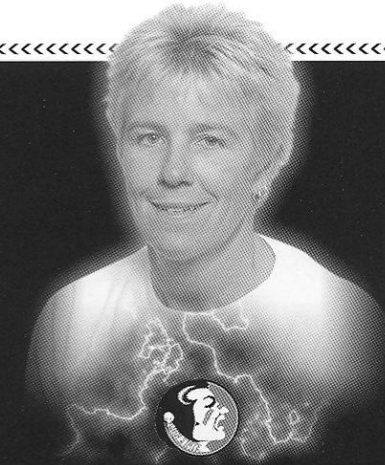
The Tribe's run at the 2002 WCWS was one of the top moments in program history. The Seminoles entered the WCWS as the eighth seed and used a home run in the top of the ninth inning off first team All-American Keira Goerl to upset the top-ranked and top-seeded Bruins in the first game of the tournament. After a 1-0 loss to eventual national champion Cal and WCWS MOP Jocelyn Forest, Florida State bounced back by eliminating Nebraska 4-3 and advancing to the semis versus No. 2 Arizona. Florida State staged another dramatic comeback tying the game 2-2 in the bottom of the fifth off reigning national player of the year Jennie Finch. Florida State took the Wildcats to 11 innings before seeing their dream run come to a close.

Every year Graf seems to surpass another major milestone. From winning her first slow pitch National Championship in 1981 to becoming the all-time winningest coach in NFCA history in 2002, Graf's career has been nothing but remarkable. On May 6, 1999 in a 2-1 victory over South Florida, Graf became the first coach in Division I softball to earn 1,000 wins, including slow and fast pitch competition and in 2001 she picked up her 1,100 win by downing rival Florida. Including slow pitch victories, Graf now has 1,276 wins in her career and probably most amazing of all is that every victory has come as the Seminoles head coach.

Graf has been named ACC Coach of the Year six times, including the last two seasons. She earned her first back-to-back conference coach of the year titles in 1992 and 1993 after leading the Seminoles to conference championships. In 1997, Graf received her third award thanks to co-championship status in the ACC. In 2001, the Seminoles won their fourth ACC title. In 2001 and 2002, Graf and her entire staff were named the Southeast Coaching Staff of the Year. In 1995, she was selected the ACC/Metro Conference Coach of the Year after guiding Florida State to a 9-1 league record and an automatic bid to NCAA regional play. She has led FSU to 15 seasons of 50 wins or more, including three seasons when the Seminoles recorded more than 60 victories.

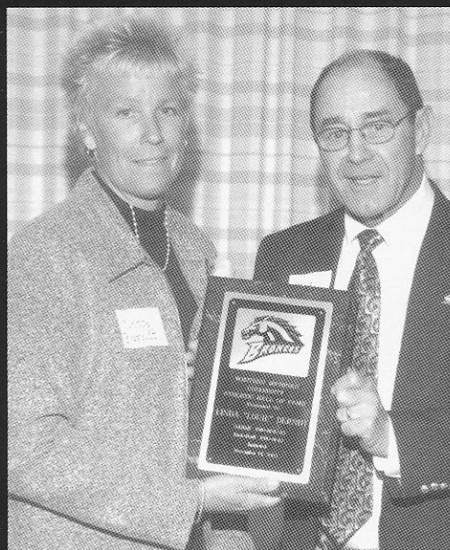
Graf, who was voted the South Region Coach of the Year in 1986, has seen 92 of her players selected to All-Region teams, including 19 players in the last four seasons. Her coaching has produced 21 All-Americans since 1990, including six first team selections in left fielder Danielle Cox (1999), center fielder Shamalene Wilson (1996), second baseman Lisa Davidson (1993), second baseman Brandi Stuart (2002) and pitcher/outfielder Jessica van der Linden (2003, 2004).

Jessica van der Linden will go down as one of the greatest players to ever be coached by Graf and she had nothing short of a dream season in 2004 as she became the most decorated female athlete ever at Florida State. van der Linden was named the USA National Softball Player of the Year, a back-to-back NFCA All-American, a Honda Broderick Award winner for softball, and she was named one of five nominees for an ESPY Award in the "Best Female College Athlete" category. She became the first female athlete from FSU to ever be nominated for an ESPY.

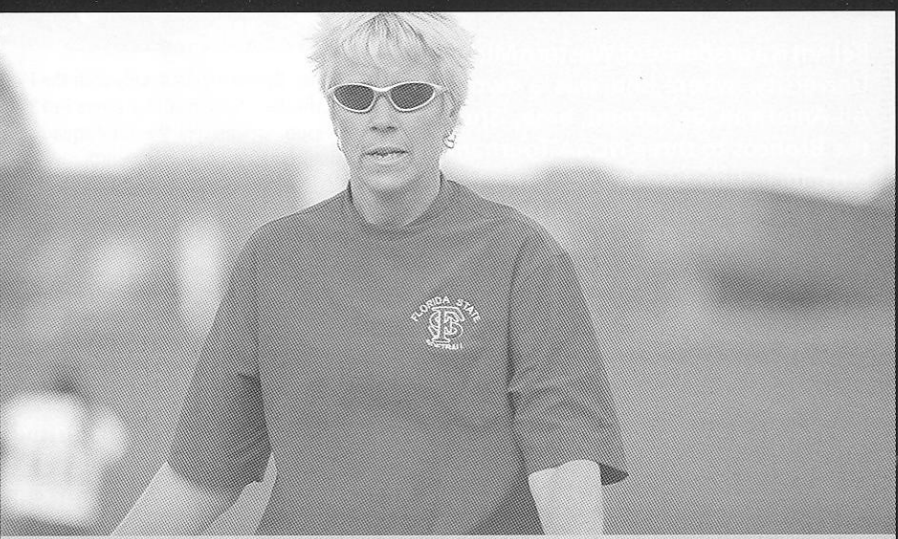
Seminole softball head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf announced on July 14, 2004, that longtime first assistant Louie Berndt was promoted to associate head coach. Berndt, who first served as a Seminole assistant in 1989, returned to Florida State in 1999 and has joined with Graf to lead Florida State to five straight NCAA Regionals, four regional finals and two Women's College World Series over the last five seasons.

"This is a well-deserved promotion for Louie," said Graf. "She has earned this new title and I am lucky to have an assistant of her caliber working with me and for Florida State. Since her return in 1999 our program has had one of its best runs in school history and I look forward to continuing this

productive relationship for a long time."

Berndt works mainly with the Florida State hitters and outfielders and serves as the Tribe's recruiting coordinator. Since her return, the Seminole softball program has landed four NFCA All-Americans including USA Softball National Player of the Year and Honda Award winner Jessica der Linden. Two of FSU's recruits have been named ACC Rookie of the year in her tenure (van der Linden and Veronica Wootsen) and van der Linden became the first-ever back-to-back ACC Player of the Year.

On top of her recruiting expertise, Berndt's coaching of the FSU hitters and outfielders has paid



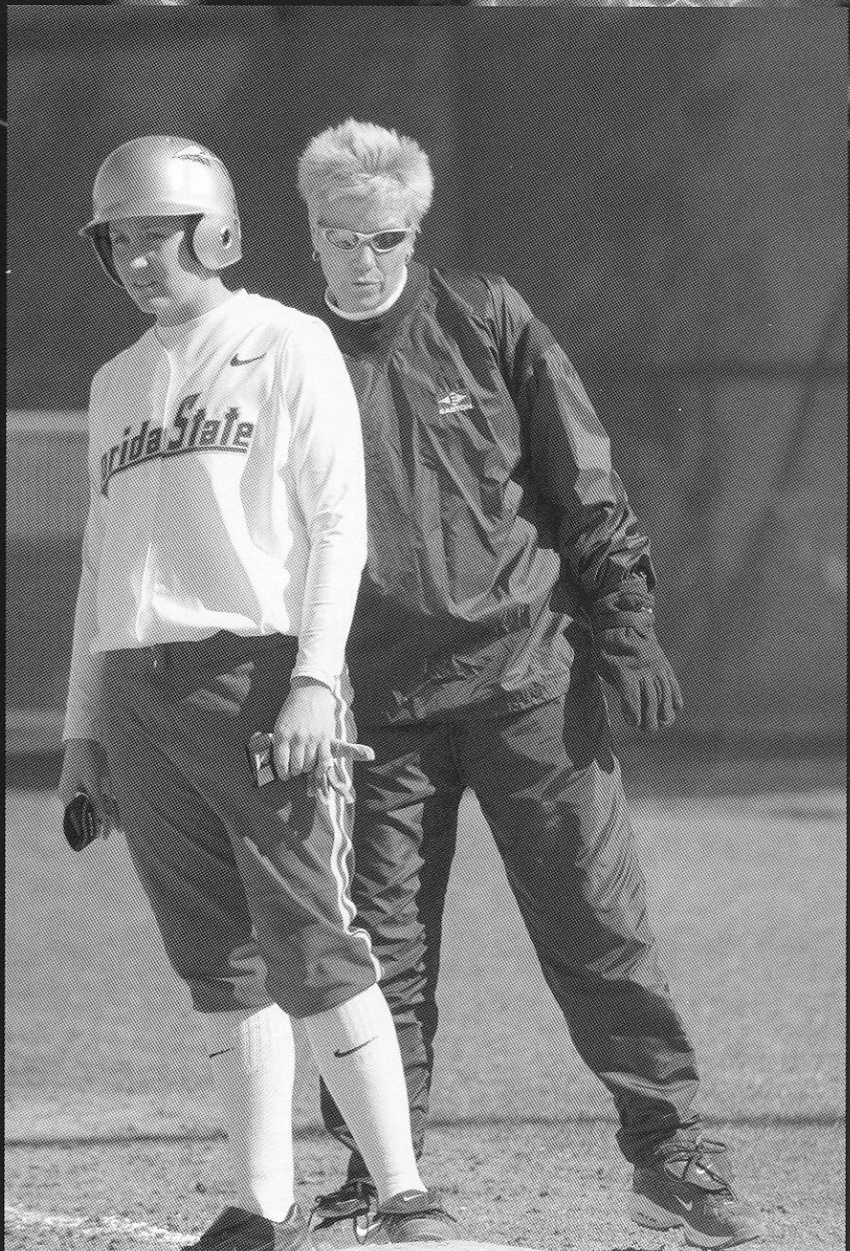

dividends as well. Last season Florida State shattered the single season home run record and four of the six highest single season HR totals have all come since Berndt returned to FSU in 1999. This year's squad also set new records for RBIs, runs and walks. Three of FSU's seven all-time highest batting averages have come under Berndt's guidance and the team has finished among the NCAA leaders in that category in each of the last two seasons. In 2004, FSU finished seventh in the nation in triples per game and 17th in scoring offense. Defensively, Berndt's outfielders made just three errors in 123 chances for a combined .975 fielding percentage.

She came to FSU after serving as the head softball coach at Marshall University for six seasons. She was brought to Marshall to help jumpstart the softball program, which was reinstated in 1993. In 1994, Berndt made her head-coaching debut and guided the Thundering Herd to a 17-21 record. In 1995, just her second season at the helm, Berndt led Marshall to its first-ever Southern Conference Tournament title and to its first NCAA Tournament. She was named the Southern Conference Coach of the Year in 1996 after the squad set numerous school records with a 39-23 record. Several of Berndt's players at Marshall received All-Conference accolades, including back-to-back freshman "Player of the Year" honors.

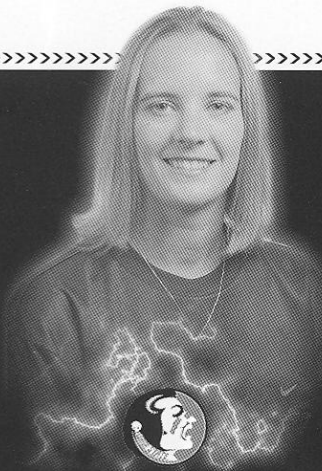
Berndt is a graduate of Western Michigan University, where she was a two-time All-American at second base. She led the Broncos to three NCAA Tournament bids, including two World Series berths where her squad finished fifth in 1982.

During her Western Michigan career, Berndt's teams won 132 games during her career. The team leader in hitting three straight seasons, Berndt had a career .321 batting average and .973 fielding percentage and she set the record WMU for hits in a season. An All-Mid American Conference and NCAA All-Region selection, Berndt was also invited to the Pan American Team tryouts and was selected to play in the Tri-Nation Games in Colorado Springs, Colo., during her senior year. She was also a three-time letterwinner in basketball for the Broncos. In 2003 she was inducted into the Western Michigan Hall of Fame due to her stellar playing career.

Offensively, the 2004 squad set new records for RBIs, runs, walks, and shattered the single season home run record.

In 1985, Berndt turned her efforts to coaching as an assistant at Nicholls State. She helped lead Nicholls to a school-record 47 wins that year. In 1987, the Colonels won the Gulf Star Conference Championship. Berndt joined the FSU staff as a pitching and outfield coach for the 1989 season. She helped the Seminoles to a Top 20 ranking and a second-place finish at the Southwest Regionals. From 1989 to 1993, she helped rebuild a struggling Ohio State softball program. The Buckeyes won the Big Ten Championship in 1990 and advanced to NCAA Regionals.



MEGAN MATTHEWS BUNING

ASSISTANT COACH/PITCHERS · 1ST SEASON · SOUTH CAROLINA 2003

Megan Matthews Buning begins her first season as a member of the nationally-recognized Florida State softball coaching staff. Matthews, who was hired on September 7, 2004, will serve as Florida State's pitching coach and aide Hall of Fame coach Dr. JoAnne Graf in recruiting and other duties.

Matthews comes to Florida State after an impressive SEC career as a pitcher from the University of South Carolina. She holds the school records for strikeouts, complete games, innings pitched, and she is one win shy of the all-time win record. The USC graduate was named a third-team All-American in 1999 and is a two-time All-SEC selection. A four-year letterwinner, Matthews received her Bachelor of Science in Exercise Physiology with a concentration in Motor Development and a cognate in Athletic Training in 2003 where she was a member of the SEC Honor Roll from 2000-2003.

As a player, Matthews was labeled the workhorse of the Carolina pitching staff where she recorded 101 career wins and is 11th on the NCAA all-time strikeout list with 1,090 to her credit. A three-time All-Southeast Region team member, she was honored as the SEC Player of the Week seven times, a USC record. In 2002, Matthews was selected as the USC Female Student Athlete of the Year after leading her school to the SEC Tournament Championship where she was named MVP.

On top of her playing experience at USC, Matthews spent the last year as a professional softball player for the New England Riptides and honed her coaching skills as a private pitching instructor with over 40 students in Asheville, North Carolina. In April 2004, she took part in the Olympic Test event for the British National Team and was the winning pitcher for the Gold Medal Game in Athens, Greece. In 2002, she was a silver medalist at the Puerto Rican Olympic Festival and also served as a guest pitcher for the British National Team at the Canada Cup in Vancouver.

Matthews, who served as a head coach of an 18-and-under traveling fast pitch team in 2003, has her name listed within several categories of the SEC Softball Record book. She holds the record for appearances (194), and is second in innings pitched (1,110.1), strikeouts (1,090), and saves (16). Matthews is third in victories (101), fourth in shutouts

(32), sixth in complete games (99), and her 1.29 ERA is a ninth-best. During her stellar freshman campaign in 1999, she led the nation in saves after totaling nine.

A former All-American standout at Riverside High School in Greer, South Carolina, Matthews was named the Gatorade Southern Region Player of the Year in 1998 and was also a three-time 3A State Player of the Year in 1996, 1997, and 1998. Furthermore, she was a conference player of the year three times, all-state four times and all-conference five times while leading her team to the 3A State Championship three times (1995-1997). For her outstanding career, Riverside High School retired her jersey in 2002.

The former Megan Elizabeth Matthews married Mr. Shaun Buning Sept. 27, 2003. Buning graduated from the University of South Carolina in May 2003 and is a certified athletic trainer. The couple resides in Tallahassee.

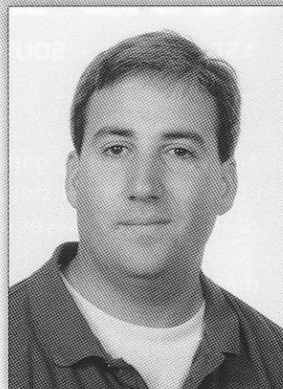
