For the 20th time in program history – the sixth highest total in NCAA history – the Florida State softball team advanced to the NCAA Tournament. In addition, it was the Seminoles' eighth-straight appearance. For the third year in a row Florida State was shipped off to an SEC school as they were sent to the Tuscaloosa Regional – one of the hardest of the 16 sites. The regional showed its teeth early as the Seminoles were upset by Cal, 13-6, in the opening round. The host Crimson Tide were also upset on the first day, setting up an elimination game between Florida State and Alabama. The Tide got the best of the Seminoles as they were knocked out of the tournament with the 6-3 decision.

WOOTSON BECOMES FSU'S SECOND THREE-TIME ALL-AMERICAN

With all the great players that have taken the field for Florida State, second baseman Veronica Wootson will go down as one of the best of the best. The senior capped off her career with Third Team NFCA/ Louisville Slugger All-America honors. Wootson joined Shamalene Wilson as the only other player in school history to earn a trio of All-America awards. Overall it was the 34th All-America honor earned by a Florida State player.



MONTEZ NAMED ACC FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR

Tremendous play during the conference season made outfielder Monica Montez stand out more than the rest of the league's rookies as she was named ACC Freshman of the Year. Montez was the league leader during conference games with 0.13 triples per game and second with a .429 batting average. The Corona, Calif., native had a flair for the dramatic with a pair of walk-off home runs, including one against Maryland in the bottom of the 14th inning. Montez is the sixth Seminole to win the award and the third in the last five seasons.

SEMINOLES SET RECORD FOR ACC WINS

By taking the final two games of its series at North Carolina, Florida State finished the ACC portion of its schedule with a 13-7 mark to set a new school standard for conference wins. The previous mark had been 11 wins by the 2005 squad. The series victory over the Tar Heels also gave Florida State the number four seed for the ACC Tournament. The host Seminoles posted convincing victories over North Carolina (8-0) and Maryland (7-4) before Georgia Tech eliminated FSU. Veronica Wootson, Yuruby Alicart and Robin Ahrberg were named to the ACC All-Tournament Team.

FSU REACHES 40 WINS FOR 26TH TIME

While 40 might be the new 30 when it comes to age, 40 wins is still the standard for measuring a good season and no coach has reached 40 wins more times than Dr. JoAnne Graf. A sweep of a May 2 doubleheader at Troy gave Florida State its 26th 40-win season under Graf. The 2007 campaign marked the 17th time in the last 18 years that Graf's teams have reached the 40-win plateau. To put it into perspective, the seven other softball schools in the conference have 23 40-win seasons combined.

FOUR SEMINOLES GARNER NFCA ALL-SOUTHEAST REGION HONORS

Florida State placed four players on the NFCA/ Louisville Slugger All-Southeast Region teams with two on the First Team and two more on the Second Team. The First-Team honorees were repeats from 2006 as second baseman Veronica Wootson and shortstop Yuruby Alicart led the way. For Wootson, it was the third First-Team All-Region selection of her career. While the First Teamers were making their second appearance on the team, the two Second Team representatives were getting their first nod. Outfielder Whitney Buckmon earned her first All-Region honor while freshman outfielder Carly Wynn was the first FSU rookie to collect All-Region accolades since Wootson in 2004.

FLORIDA STATE TOPS ALL SCHOOLS WITH FIVE ALL-ACC SELECTIONS

The league coaches recognized the talent on last year's Florida State squad with five All-ACC selections, the most by any school. Leading the way was senior shortstop Yuruby Alicart as she earned her second First-Team award. Senior Veronica Wootson became just the eighth player in school history to collect three All-ACC awards with her Second Team honor. Florida State's three other Second Team selections were all first-time winners: outfielder Whitney Buckmon, pitcher Tiffany McDonald and outfielder Monica Montez.

CHECK OUT THE BIG BRAIN ON MELISSA

Maintaining a high grade point average can be tough for any student, but it can be particularly difficult for student-athletes. Sophomore Melissa May found a way to excel in both and was recognized for her efforts on and off the field with a CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Second-Team Academic All-District Three selection.

May maintains a 3.91 grade point average in child development while being one of the top pitchers in the ACC. Throughout three semesters at Florida State she has been on the President's List once (4.0 gpa) and twice on the Dean's List (3.5 gpa and higher). She posted a team-best 1.82 ERA that ranked her third in the conference while also rating in the league's top ten for shutouts (4th – five), innings pitched (7th – 4.77), complete games (7th – 12) and opponent batting average (10th - .236).



2007 SEASON IN REVIEW

DR. GRAF COMPLETES 29TH SEASON WITH 1,399 WINS

Already the winningest coach in NFCA history, Dr. JoAnne Graf just missed another milestone at the end of the 2007 season. The Seminoles 44-25 mark left Graf just one win shy of becoming the first coach in softball history to amass 1,400 victories. In addition to going over the 1,400 barrier, Graf needs just 20 wins to be the second coach to collect 1,200 fastpitch victories.

SEMINOLES RECEIVING RECOGNITION IN THE POLLS

For the first five weeks of the season the Seminoles were a fixture in both top 25 polls. Florida State reached its highest ranking of the year after a successful showing at the NFCA Leadoff Classic as FSU peaked at No. 19. Even though the Seminoles dropped out of the top 25 after week five, they continued to receive votes throughout the year.

FLORIDA STATE SCHEDULES AND BEATS THE BEST

Just as it does every year, Florida State's schedule was loaded with the toughest teams in the country. The Seminoles' schedule featured 19 games against ranked opponents – the second highest total in the league – but FSU did have an ACC-best ten games against ranked non-conference teams. The Seminoles best win of the year was a 3-1 decision over No. 12 Washington at the Judi Garman Classic.

WOOTSON BLASTS HER WAY INTO FSU HISTORY

Despite never leading the team in home runs during her four years at Florida State, Veronica Wootson ended her career as the Seminoles' all-time home run leader. The three-time All-American belted back-to-back home runs in game one at Georgia Tech on April 7 to pass Brandi Stuart for the all-time mark with 26 home runs. She would go on to hit three more the rest of the season to put the new record at 29 home runs. For the season she hit a career-high 11 home runs.

WOOTSON FINISHES CAREER RANKED AMONG NCAA & ACC ALL-TIME LEADERS

A starter in all 273 games that she played in, Veronica Wootson made her mark on the national and conference level. Her 875 at-bats are a conference record and rank her 13th in NCAA lore while her 199 runs are second in the ACC and 23rd in the nation. In addition, on the league charts she is 5th for hits (282), seventh for triples (22), eight in stolen bases (78) and ninth for home runs (29).

FSU RECORD BOOK PLASTERED WITH WOOTSON'S NAME

The end of the 2007 season marked the completion of one of the best careers in Florida State history. When it was all said and done, three-time All-American second baseman Veronica Wootson stamped her name into the FSU record books on ten different offensive lists, which trails only All-American Brandi Stuart (11) for the most in school history. Wootson is in the top five of nine of those categories, including a school-record 29 home runs. In addition, she ranks second in triples, runs and doubles (41) while placing third for RBIs (141) and hits (282).

SOFTBALL CAREER CONTINUES FOR WOOTSON IN NPF

As it turns out, Veronica Wootson's seventh-inning single against Alabama in the NCAA Tournament was not her final competitive at-bat. The three-time All-American was picked up by the Akron Racers of the National Pro Fastpitch league. Wootson is the 15th Seminole that has either played or been drafted by a professional softball team. Former All-American second baseman Brandi Stuart played for Akron during the 2004 season.

ALICART SLUGS HER WAY INTO FSU RECORD BOOKS

Even though she was only with the Seminoles for two short years, shortstop Yuruby Alicart made her presence known in the FSU record books. The slugging Venezuelan destroyed the Florida State career slugging percentage record with a new mark of .622 that was 30 points higher than the old standard set by Tiffany Daniels. In addition, Alicart rates second for home runs (26), fifth for doubles (36) and ninth in RBIs (110).

MORE SINGLE SEASON RECORDS FOR ALICART

After bursting onto the scene with a pair of single season records during her first year at Florida State, shortstop Yuruby Alicart duplicated the feat during her final campaign. The two-time All-Region selection upped her own home run mark by belting 14 round trippers as a senior. An RBI single in her final collegiate game against Alabama in the NCAA Tournament established a new RBI mark of 56 runs. Alicart almost made it three records as her 17 doubles fell just two short of her own record set in 2006.

MCDONALD SETS CAREER SAVES RECORD

Given the make-up of the game, the save is usually hard to come by, but junior Tiffany McDonald has been the best for Florida State when it comes to saving the day. The right-hander threw the final two and two-thirds innings in the second game of the May 2 doubleheader at Troy to set the Florida State career saves record at eight. The Belfair, Wash., native needs just three more saves to move to the NCAA career list. It was the third save of the year for McDonald, which is just one off the single-season mark she equaled in 2006.

MCDONALD MAKING HER MOVE UP THE CHARTS

While Veronica Wootson and Yuruby Alicart were littering their names on the offensive career charts, hurler Tiffany McDonald was busy making a name for herself within the pitching categories. She climbed to number four on the appearances list with 131 games. She needs 49 appearances as a senior to break the school record set by Leslie Malerich. With an average of 232 strikeouts per season, McDonald is almost a lock to become the school's strikeout leader as she enters her final season at No. 6 with 695 strikeouts, putting her 204 back of Jessica van der Linden's mark. The right-hander is also sixth on the innings pitched list at 699.

FRESHMEN CONTRIBUTING

Even with a strong nucleus of returning players, several freshmen made a big impact on the team in 2007. Heading the list were outfielders Monica Montez – the 2007 ACC Freshman of the Year – and Carly Wynn, an NFCA Second Team All-Southeast Region selection. Wynn was third on the team with a .336 batting average while Montez was close behind at .312. Behind the plate, Robin Ahrberg was the Seminoles' starting catcher in her first season. She drove in 25 runs and led the team with 14 sacrifices. Her battery-mate, Terese Gober, came on strong at the end of the season to produce a 13-4 record and a 2.11 ERA. She finished the year ranked in the ACC's top ten in six categories.

2007 SEASON IN REVIEW

SEMINOLES ONE OF THE BEST AT TURNING TWO

With the 2007 season under their belts, the double play combination of Veronica Wootson and Yuruby Alicart was spectacular at turning two. The duo helped the Seminoles rank 10th in the country last year at 0.48 double plays per game. In addition, Florida State was tied for 16th at 0.26 triples per game. Within the individual rankings, Veronica Wootson was 43rd at 0.91 runs per game.

SEMINOLES TOP THREE FOR HITTING AND PITCHING IN THE ACC

Florida State had the best balanced team in the conference last season, ranking second with a team batting average of .288 while the pitching staff produced a team ERA of 1.97 that ranked third. The Seminoles led the way with a league-best 18 triples while they were second in runs (337), hits (514), doubles (91) and RBIs (296). The pitching staff gave up a league-low 22 home runs and threw an ACC-high 468 innings last year while the opponents' .208 batting average was the third lowest.

PITCHING STAFF MAKES BIG IMPROVEMENTS IN 2007

Florida State saw its biggest improvement during 2007 from the pitching staff. The team ERA went down by nearly a run to 1.97. Another key number that was more than cut in half was home runs allowed as the staff surrendered a league-low 22 home runs, compared to a school record 47 round trippers given up in 2006. FSU's three starters all had an ERA under 2.15 and all three produced at least ten victories - a first since the 2001 staff had three ten-game winners. In addition, opponents' batting average dropped as did the number of walks given up, while the strikeout total rose.

HOST WIN SEMINOLE CLASSIC

The start of the 2007 season got off to a roaring start as the host swept their way through the Seminole Classic. Florida State outscored its opponents 28-6 and held opponents to just 13 hits in the entire tournament. The Seminoles started (13-5) and ended (8-0) the weekend with a run-rule victory over Samford while beating Florida A&M and Radford along the way. Second baseman Veronica Wootson was named tournament MVP while Robin Ahrberg, Terese Gober, Brittany Krbec and Tiffany McDonald all made the all-tournament team.

MCDONALD, MAY AND GOBER ALL THROW NO HITTERS IN 2007

While Florida State went the whole 2006 season without a no hitter, all three starters on last year's pitching staff produced one. Junior Tiffany McDonald made sure FSU wouldn't go the whole year without a no hitter as she blanked Florida A&M on day one of the Seminole Classic. The next week lefty Melissa May followed suit by tossing a no-no over Memphis

in the Sunshine State Tournament. Freshman Terese Gober got into the act against Jacksonville as she started the April 17 doubleheader by shutting down the Dolphins. The three no hitters were the most by the staff since the 2004 campaign produced eight.

FSU DIGGING THE LONG BALL

The last six years have seen a power surge for the Seminoles as the five best years for home runs have come since 2002, but last year was better than any in terms of home runs. A solo home run by freshman Carly Wynn was the 45th of the season for the Seminoles, breaking the record set by the 2004 squad. Paced by Yuruby Alicart's record 14 home runs, Florida State had ten different players hit at least one home run and seven players hit three or more. The long ball translated into a lot of wins as half of FSU's 44 wins came when a Seminole hit a home run.

OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION STRONG IN 2007

Paced by the new home run record, Florida State had one of the best seasons at the plate. The Seminoles hit 91 doubles as a team and produced 294 RBIs, which are the second-highest totals in school history. The category that matters the most – run production – was up to 337 to rank fourth all-time. Florida State hitters had a better eye at the plate, drawing the fourth-most walks in school history (203), while striking out 40 less times.

ACC DOMINANCE

A big part of Coach Graf's legacy is the program's dominance in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Starting with its first championship in 1992, Florida State has won twice as many ACC titles (10) as the rest of the conference combined and the Seminoles have won the regular season championship 10 times in 15 years. No other ACC program has ever gone through their regular season conference schedule undefeated yet FSU has done it four times. The Tribe is the only ACC school to ever go to the Women's College World Series, having done that on seven occasions. FSU's 24 All-Americans are more than the rest of the ACC combined and the Seminoles have won 28 more ACC games than their nearest competitor.
